

Sanford Basketeers Invade Tavares Tonight

Locals Strive For Second Win Over Tavares Tonight

Coach McLucas Is Fearful Of Letdown After Eustis Game

After their brilliant effort to lead the undefeated Eustis quint to its first setback of the season, the Celery Feds today turned their attention to their contest this evening with the Tavares basketeers whom the locals will battle at 8:30 o'clock on the Tavares High school floor.

In the last battle of the two teams which took place a month ago on the local court, the Sanfords registered a 32-23 victory, displaying an offense and defense that worked almost to perfection. In contrast, they grabbed a 9-0 lead in the first period, stretched the margin to 15-10 by half time and then led 18-10 at the start of the last period. From all indications, the Feds should come through more or less easily in tonight's contest.

Coach Leonard McLucas, pleased with his progress showing against Eustis, is fearful of a letdown following the strain of the contest with the Panthers. Any inclination to take things easy, however, would, in all probability spell defeat for the Feds. Starting the same crew which played the entire contest Tuesday night, McLucas expects to snag another victory as Zachry and Morgan take the forward posts, Purdon goes in at center and Dal Ferguson and Les Phillips take up the guard duties.

The Tavares lineup will consist of the Newman brothers at the forward positions, Shiver at center and Padgett and McQuibb at guards unless a last minute change finds Boyd or N. Newman in the starting lineup. The Sanford B team which defeated the Tavares B squad, 19 to 7, here in their first meeting, is expected to chalk up another victory tonight in the preliminary game at Tavares, slated to begin at 7:30 o'clock.

Ship's Death Toll Mounts; Seventh Dies

Explosion Aboard Wyoming in Fight To Marine Gun Crew On 6-Inch Rifle

Powder Is Set Off In Breech

Explosion Used As Training Vessel On Pacific Coast

SAN PEDRO, Calif., Feb. 18.—(AP)—The death toll of a gun explosion aboard the old United States ship Wyoming was raised to seven today when Sidney Kenney, marine private, died from his injuries on the second hospital ship.

A thirty-pound powder charge of a five-inch shell went off in the breech of a six-inch gun on the demilitarized Wyoming during maneuvers yesterday.

The Wyoming was laying down a barrage to cover the evacuation of a landing party on the beach of San Clemente Island when the explosion sent fragments of steel and iron through the bodies of the gun crew and against the bulkheads.

Admiral Arthur J. Hepburn, commander-in-chief of the U. S. fleet, tonight issued the following official list of dead and injured:

Chamber Says 100 More Rooms Needed For Baseball Unit

At least 100 more rooms are needed to house athletes who will attend the Chalmers Lookout Football School opening here March 1, Ralph Bagwell, Chamber of Commerce secretary, said today.

Less than 200 rooms in private residences have been made available to the students, Mr. Bagwell declared, and he pointed out the need for registration by those who have accommodations in their homes.

Current registrations indicate that more than 200 persons will attend the school, although Joe Bagwell, chief of the Washington Southern Power System, said a preliminary estimate that more than 200 would be on the rolls before the school opens.

Salvation Army Finance Drive Will Help Many

Citizens who contribute to the Salvation Army's financial drive beginning about Mar. 16 will donate to a wide scope of humanitarianism, it was indicated by statistics set down today in the annual report of C. J. Ferri, commander of the Army post here.

For instance, in 1936 the Army gave assistance to 200 families in Seminole County. These figures were in delicate circumstances and were made to obtain vital necessities, clothing, etc., which have found it difficult to do so.

There were three cases where indigents were badly in need of medical attention, and this was supplied by the Army on funds.

County To Receive \$8,658 From Taxes Of Legal Betting

Seminole County will receive \$8,658.17 as its share of taxes collected through legalized betting at Florida race tracks, Comptroller J. M. Lee reported today from Tallahassee.

A total amount of \$390,097.96 is to be distributed among the State's 67 counties, according to the comptroller's office.

Lee and State Treasurer W. V. Knott announced the distribution as the first for 1937.

Officials of the Racing Commission said they expected later collections to bring in sufficient funds so that each County this year will receive more than the \$16,794 paid last year.

All collections in taxes on race wagering and track admittances go to the counties in equal shares, after expenses of Racing Commission operations are deducted.

Last year collections totaled \$1,426,957. Commission expenses amounted to \$285,856, the counties receiving \$1,141,101.

Simpson Advises Visit To Orlando Fair Before End

T. E. Simpson, Chamber of Commerce president, today called localities' attention to Saturday as being the last day of the Central Florida Exposition in Orlando and urged them to see the County both before and after the festival closes tomorrow night.

The prize-winning meat exhibit of the Seminole Chapter, Future Farmers of America should be noted, Mr. Simpson said. He also said a visitor should not overlook the vegetable display arranged by C. E. Dawson, County farm agent, and the home kitchen products booth established by Miss Josephine Reppin, County home demonstration agent.

This County's displays have been attracting considerable attention, the Chamber president said, and a large number of Seminole County citizens have seen them.

U.S. May Act To Get Steel For Warship

Wahki-Healy Act Is Cause For Industry Withholding Bids For Orders

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today the Government would be forced to act soon to change steel needed in the construction of naval vessels.

The steel industry has failed to bid on a large part of orders placed by the Navy, Naval officers have attributed this to operation of the Wahki-Healy Act which sets up wage and hour standards for Government contractors.

At his press conference, the President said he did not know whether new legislation would be necessary.

Unless steel is obtained soon, naval officers say, construction work on a number of submarines and destroyers will have to be stopped.

A warning that if the expansion of the British navy is to continue it will become necessary for the United States to adopt a new navy program came last night from Chairman Davis I. Walsh, (D-Mass.), of the Senate Naval Affairs Committee.

Writer Gives Analysis Of Court Revision Program

Sanfordites Asked To Vote On President's Proposed Judiciary Change; Ballot At Bottom Of Page

To sound out the sentiment of the Sanford readers on President Roosevelt's proposal to revise the supreme court, The Sanford Herald, in cooperation with the other U. S. newspapers carried by NRS Service, Inc., is holding a poll on this question. A ballot for your use appears at the bottom of this page. At noon of Feb. 5, 1937, President Roosevelt sent to Congress a historic message. It strongly suggested that Congress enact new laws in order that the Judiciary "may function in accord with modern necessities."

The message was accompanied by a letter from Attorney-General Cummings backing up the suggestions made, and a draft of a bill drawn in the Department of Justice to make the plan effective.

The message recommended several reforms in judicial procedure and in the conduct of the federal courts. Chief among them were plans for "a constant and systematic addition of younger blood" to "vitalize the courts."

Attention immediately centered on the proposals which applied to the U. S. Supreme Court, foundation stone of the judiciary, one of the three co-ordinate branches of U. S. government, legislative, executive and judiciary. These proposals were immediately recognized as the most far-reaching effort in many years to alter the U. S. Supreme Court.

In considering President Roosevelt's proposal regarding the U. S. Supreme Court, it is best to start at the beginning. What is the supreme court?

The United States is governed under a written Constitution, that is our basic and fundamental law, adopted by the people 150 years ago when the present government began. Everything Congress does, everything executive officials do, comes as a result of powers given them or denied them by the people in adopting this Constitution. (Continued on page four)

Favorable Army Report Would Insure Canal

House Committee To Act On Waterway By Early March

A favorable report on the Florida ship canal by Army engineers would result in an approval of the project by the House Rivers and Harbors Committee, the Associated Press today quoted Rep. Martin Smith, (D.) Washington, as saying.

"The opposition to the project at the last session of Congress was based chiefly on the fact that it had not received the approval of the Army engineers in a formal report and it will be included in an omnibus rivers and harbors bill to be laid before the present Congress.

The House Committee, of which he is a member, has disagreed with the engineers, only four times in history, Smith said.

The Washington congressman said if the Army engineers recommendations are favorable, the project will be approved by the committee and it will be included in an omnibus rivers and harbors bill to be laid before the present Congress.

Army engineers said the War Department's River and Harbor Board had virtually completed its study of the project and would make its report soon to the chief of engineers. One source predicted the \$163,000,000 waterway would be placed before the House Committee early in March.

Madrid Claims Drive Successful

France Investigated Report Of Gun Aimed At Pyrenees

Portugal today was declared ready to join European neutrality blockade of Spanish civil war, comprising a list of 27 nations trying to stifle the conflict through non-intervention.

The general neutrality scheme, including a ban on foreign volunteers, and a patrol system to guard against arms movements in the war zone is scheduled to become effective tomorrow at midnight.

Madrid's defenders, meanwhile, claimed a measure of success in their bitter stand at the gate to the Capital. Reports said Government troops had plunged into insurgent lines at Pinaros in a desperate attempt to silence artillery which has swept the all-impervious highway to Valencia. The road still is under Government control but is swept by insurgent fire.

While London awaited final instructions from Lisbon on a compromise solution for Portugal in the neutrality agreement, France launched an investigation of reports that insurgent artillery had been trained on her Pyrenean border.

Reports from the Basque Government, allied with the Valencia-Madrid Government, quoted refugees as saying batteries under the direction of German engineers had been placed on the Spanish side of the Franco-Spanish border.

Official French comment was withheld, but picked tri-color troops were on their way to the border to enforce the ban on volunteers.

Damage Suits For \$20,000 Are Filed In Seminole Court

Circuit Court here today received three damage suits totaling \$20,000 filed by residents of Miami against the Florida Fresh Distributing Company of Orlando.

E. F. Housholder, attorney for the plaintiffs—Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Mershon and Miss Mariette Turner—said the litigation was based on an accident Dec. 27, 1936, on the Orlando-Sanford highway.

The bill of complaint set forth that the plaintiffs were passing several trucks of fruit of the fruit company when a trailer sideswiped the passenger car causing it to overturn and injuring the three occupants.

Mr. and Mrs. Mershon each are asking \$5,000 damages, while Miss Turner seeks \$10,000 from the defendants.

Truluck Reported To Be Recovering

J. H. Truluck, office manager of the Security Lumber Company who had a finger amputated during a Wednesday inspection trip of the firm's manual shop, was reported "resting comfortably" by attaches in Fernak-Laughton Memorial Hospital today.




Lack of housing accommodations, unless Sanford citizens come forward immediately with rooms to rent, may seriously handicap the Chatsanooga Lookout baseball school slated to open here Mar. 1, Henry Watson, president of the Sanford ball club, emphasized today.

Watson appealed urgently for the registration at the Chamber of Commerce of Sanfordites who have one spare room or some sort of sleeping or boarding accommodations. He said it is not necessary to call personally at the Chamber office. Registrations will be taken by telephone.

The baseball president further revealed that instead of the original two-week schedule for the school, the time has been extended to one month.

Students enrolling for the course have been guaranteed that room and board will not exceed \$8 per week, Watson announced.

Watson pointed out that 1937 is the first year of the baseball school in Sanford and declared it holds infinite possibilities for the city in future years if the project is supported by citizens.

Its publicity value, in his opinion, is priceless, since the program of students from a hundred or more cities will be followed by the newspapers in the communities sending in the youngsters.

Watson, in another statement today, announced a directors' meeting of the Sanford Baseball Association for Tuesday night at 7:30 o'clock in his office on Park Avenue.

Robert H. Stinchfield, national president of the American Bar Association, presented arguments against the president's proposal.

You vote on this ballot. You all have faith in your vote. You don't wish to give up the right to vote on any issue where your voice ought to be heard. Very well, let's see what is now proposed.

NRA was said by the supreme court to be unconstitutional; that is, NRA wasn't a law at all because it violated certain of your rights; that you and the state surrendered them.

This is what is to be done, from your standpoint; the court is to be changed by the proposed law. How? Let's see if it isn't perfectly plain.

There are nine members of the supreme court. Six more men will be chosen by the president. When asked to decide, at least three of the present nine justices have, almost every time, upheld these new laws. Add the six justices to be chosen. You have nine, more than a majority.

Some of the present nine might resign if the law is passed; they would feel that the court's power had forever gone, surrendered to the president.

For the court to act merely as the mouthpiece of the executive would destroy every chance to perform its duties independently, the only way in which patriotic, sincere judges could act. The new supreme court building had as well be made a new wing of the White House. The third branch of our government would have disappeared.

Senate Committee Approves Tariff

Vandenberg Ready To Carry Battle To Higher House Floor

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—(AP)—Unimpeachable authorities disclosed today that President Roosevelt is considering a flexible program to outlaw excessively low wages and long hours through a revision of the fair trade practice and anti-trust laws.

Besides fixing mandatory wage and hour standards, the proposed legislation would provide for a broad system of voluntary agreements under which businessmen could ban unfair and wasteful trade practices.

The President, it was said, had not had time to consider details but regards the plan favorably. Officials said Administration legal experts believe the program could be fitted into the present framework of the Constitution and pass the Supreme Court.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—(AP)—The Senate Finance Committee stamped its approval yesterday on the Administration's proposal to extend the Reciprocal Tariff Act three years.

A heavy Democratic majority in the committee rejected seven proposed amendments.

Extension of the present law, which expires June 12, already had been approved by the House. Leaders said they planned to bring up the issue on the Senate floor Tuesday, if possible. Sharp controversy appeared likely then over a proposal made yesterday by Senator Lewis (D., Ill.), to prohibit reciprocal trade agreements with debt-faulting nations.
