

### Small Claims Court Okayed By Longwood

Proposals to provide facilities for Judge F. R. Miller of Sanford to hold small claims court in Longwood, as has been requested by numerous business people of the area, were approved Thursday night at a continued session of the city council.

Mayor-elect David Wentworth offered his services to open and close city hall for the court sessions and was authorized to meet with Judge Miller to work out the necessary arrangements.

In other business, a resident of Longdale Terrace appeared to request a change in zoning ordinances to permit construction of auxiliary buildings closer than 25 feet from property line. He explained that having no knowledge of this restriction he already had erected an 8 by 20 foot structure to house garden and power tools within the set back area and that he had been informed it must be removed. He was advised to do no further work on the building and that changes in the zoning are being considered.

In other business, council set fees of the building inspector at the rate of 50 per cent of permit fees with a maximum of \$50 for any single permit. A letter was read from County Commission Chairman James Avery asking council's opinion on banning Hwy. 17-92 side parking, however, Chairman R. C. Carlson was asked to seek further clarification on the matter before action is taken.

"Receipts are up five percent and more, than half a million pieces of mail have been dispatched from the local office," she said.

### Yule Citrus Demand Up

LAKELAND (UPI) — Utilization of Florida citrus went up sharply last week due to heavy holiday demand for fresh fruit and the increase in concentrating activity.

Florida Citrus Mutual reports that shipments of fresh oranges last week totaled about 1,800 cars while processing plants were turning two million boxes into juice.

Shipments totalled only a few more than 1,000 cars and processor use was 1.25 million boxes, according to Roy Hunt of Mutual's director of market information.

Fresh orange shipments as of the end of last week totalled 6,500 cars, up about 600 cars from last year. Indian River shippers are moving slightly more than 100 cars weekly.

Tangerine shipments are 60 percent of the state last week. Tangerines have been shipped fresh this season with 800 cars on the road last week.

Interior packing houses are receiving \$175,000 on all sizes or oranges for the 1 1/2 size. Almost all packed sizes run 2008 and 2528.

The boy was trapped when the cave he and a friend were digging collapsed at 10 a. m., about a block from the Sparks home at 1555 Hilltop Road.

The friend, Douglas Reed, 15, ran to sound the alarm. Fifteen to 20 men, armed with shovels, dug out four to five feet of sand, to recover the boy's body.

The boy had been an eighth grade student at South Seminole Junior High School.

**GOP Case Against Burch**

**Chairman Just A Taker Of Orders For Barry?**

WASHINGTON (NEA)—National Chairman Dean Burch is seen by many Republican leaders not simply as the symbol of Sen. Barry Goldwater's philosophy but as his mere agent.

The distinction is critical in understanding why his removal from office has become so important a short-range goal to party professionals of both conservative and progressive leanings.

A politician with unimpeachable Goldwater credentials told this reporter that Burch has at all times functioned in the national chairmanship as a kind of administrative assistant to the senator, a man who executed orders but originated virtually nothing of major consequence in GOP affairs.

The political charges that Burch, an Arizona lawyer without broad-based political experience, has no power base of his own. In the professional's this means he has no independence and is wholly dependent on Goldwater's will.

They consider it symptomatic that in replying to the Republican governors' Denver Declaration for new leadership and policies, Burch said:

"Senator Goldwater and I have discussed the statement in detail and I can report that he concurs in the aims, goals and need for a broadly based Republican party."

A chairman of stature, say these professionals, would respond in his own name and

let it go at that. The Goldwater source says flatly that all the significant decisions of the 1964 campaign were made by Goldwater, his close friend Denison Kitchel, or idea man William Baroody of Washington.

The tight grip held by this trio was frustrating even to some key men in the Goldwater entourage that early resignation was contemplated by a few. Only the fact that they felt "too heavily committed" held them back.

Since so many influential Republicans accept the Goldwater man's appraisal of Burch as a mere "order-taker," they think the GOP national committee under his guidance could never be more than a Goldwater appendage in the narrowest sense.

They are prepared to believe many of the harsh tales circulated throughout the country about committee operations under Burch.

They were shocked at the wholesale midsummer firings of veteran committee workers who were more loyal to the party than to the moderates. They reacted the same way to Burch's sweep of non-Goldwater elements from the important executive committee.

Pinkerton detectives stationed in committee headquarters unsettled many. One worker, however, dismisses this as "kids playing soldier." A veteran woman employee reports that special passes were required for entry into some rooms. Spying of one worker upon another is reported.

Post election dismissals are of course, a necessity, since committee personnel rolls are inflated to meet heavy campaign demands. But evidence is strong that Burch used this occasion for further removal of veterans whose employment long predated Goldwater's nomination.

In the weeks since the election, many first rank Goldwater lieutenants also have left the fold. The net of it, says one second echelon man who recently packed his bags to leave Burch in charge of a scratch team.

Among those who remain are many members of young Americans for Freedom and others whose dedication to Goldwater at various times has seen the national committee wholly as his personal vehicle.

Pennsylvania Gov. William Scranton, who campaigned hard for Goldwater in his own and nine other states, is an disenchanted with Burch's committee management that he says "I would not want him for chairman whether his style were conservative, moderate or liberal."

Some members respected GOP professionals.

"We do not want in that job an order-taker for Goldwater," Scranton, Riverview, Pa., says.

Some say that the chairmanship is unimportant because the committee between

elections is only a "house-keeping agency."

The fact is, however, that professionals often see the national committee as a highly useful frame for national party action, as a coordinator of the 50 state parties in the never-ending preparation for the "next election." To them it is an important means of speaking with a national voice.

Whatever new party agencies may now be devised in accord with proposals by many GOP leaders, the national committee is not viewed by party veterans as a worthless administrative shell. These men and women—many with sturdy Republican

Five times as many students are being trained to be safe drivers in the drivers' education course at Lyman High School as a result of the new-type training program inaugurated this year, according to Coach Dick Copeland, driving instructor.

## Controversial Plane To Make First Flight

FORT WORTH (UPI)—The controversial TFX fighter plane, which inspired some heated flights of political oratory, will make its own first flight some time this week—perhaps today.

Now dubbed the F111, the TFX made two high-speed taxi runs Sunday, as a warm-up for its maiden flight.

The General Dynamics Corp., which built it, said the sleek two-man jet fighter-bomber would take off for the first time "this week—probably in a day or so."

H. L. Johnson, General Dynamics test pilot, was scheduled to pilot the F111, with another veteran General Dynamics test pilot, Val Prah, in the co-pilot's seat. Both are from Fort Worth.

The takeoff was to be from the Carswell Air Force Base runways, located between the air base, itself, and the General Dynamics plant.

The battle over the TFX centered on the fact that General Dynamics got the contract from the Defense Department to build it.

Several congressmen said the contract should have gone to the Boeing Corporation of Seattle. They charged that Boeing submitted a lower bid and General Dynamics got the contract because it was politically expedient.

Sen. Barry Goldwater, the Republican presidential nominee, repeated the charges during the presidential campaign, picking a speaking appearance in Fort Worth to do it.

## UCLA Coach Beats Gun, Quits

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Official confirmation was awaited today that UCLA was looking for a new head football coach to replace Bill Barnes, resigned.

Barnes apparently beat the university's plans to officially announce it was not going to renew his contract by disclosing his resignation Sunday.

UCLA Athletic Director J. D. Morgan was expected to officially confirm Barnes' resignation and the school's plan for the 1965 football season this week, possibly today.

Frequently mentioned as successors to Barnes were Ray Nagel of Utah Jordan (later, former Yale coach), Homer Beatty of Los Angeles State, and Tommy Prothro, whose Oregon State Beavers play Michigan in the Rose Bowl on New Year's Day.

Barnes said he knew "some people were not happy with our win-loss record 4-6 this year and that's the big thing, of course."

## Record Numbers

## 30 Whites Believed Massacred

LEOPOLDVILLE (UPI)—White men and children in the town of Banalia and Batwasende in the Congo were reported today to have been massacred by rebels. The rebels' latest victims were said to include at least one American and one Canadian. Fifteen Britons, eight Dutchmen, four Belgians and an Australian also were among the missing.

White-led Congo troops reached the scene in time to rescue 14 white women in the town of Batwasende. In Banalia, however, all they found was blood-stained clothing.

"We heard the shooting, but we don't know what happened to the others," said Mrs. Chester Birk, 34, of Calgary, Alta., one of the women rescued in Batwasende.

"I believe we were saved by a very narrow margin. The rebels had already sent a messenger ordering the simbas rebels to kill all remaining Whites. The white mercenaries caught him and shot him."

Mrs. Birk's husband was one of a group of 16 whites presumably shot by the rebels three weeks ago.

The survivors were flown by helicopter from Batwasende to Stanleyville and brought here. In addition to Mrs. Birk, the survivors included Louise Rimmer and Vera Morgan, missionaries from London, and 11 Italian nuns.

The survivors reported the shooting of their school to newspapermen in Leopoldville airport.

"After the fall of Stanleyville, this group of us were taken in one day in three days," Mrs. Birk said.

Then it was a matter of being taken to a camp and being held there for a few days. That made the situation very dangerous. The rebels were very close to the camp.

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## U. S. To Accept Bids For Ex-German Firm

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Justice Department wants to make sure that there is broad public ownership of stock in General Aniline and Film, the German company seized in World War II.

Acting Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach announced that the U. S. government's 33.3 per cent interest in the company would be sold by competitive bids to an underwriting group.

The winning bidder will be required to re-sell the stock in small parcels that will prevent any individual from obtaining more than 10th of one per cent interest in the company, Katzenbach said.

General Aniline and Film was seized by the government from Interhandel, a Swiss holding company, in 1942 under the Trading with the Enemy Act on charges that Interhandel was controlled by the Germans.

After extensive legal battles, a settlement with Interhandel was reached March 3, 1964.

The firm is a large manufacturer of chemicals, dyes, and photographic and reproduction products. It produces Ansco film among other products.

Its headquarters are in New York City and it has plants in New York, New Jersey, Alabama, California, Kentucky, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Texas.

In 1963, it reported profits after taxes of more than \$8 million, with assets of more than \$202 million.

Katzenbach said no institutional investor, such as a mutual fund or an insurance company, would be able to buy more than 50,000 of the more than 11 million shares to be offered for sale.

No individual will be able to buy more than 1,000 shares, he said.

These limitations were among recommendations Katzenbach accepted from a special committee set up to advise him on how the government should dispose of its holdings.

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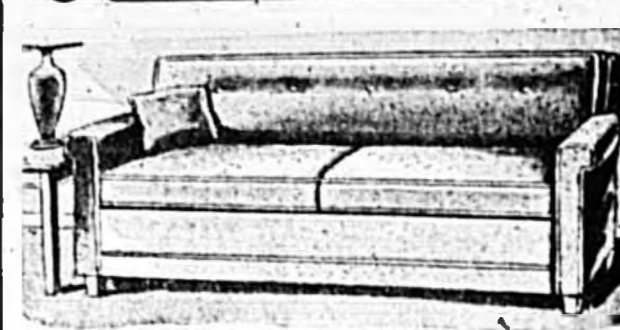

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### Power Struggle Seen Brewing Among Russians

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Less than three months after Nikita Khrushchev's fall, another struggle for power is said to be brewing in Russia. According to American intelligence reports, the new conflict involves the rival bureaucratic machines of the Communist party and the Soviet government. Leonid Brezhnev is boss of the party. His fellow "collective" ruler, Premier Alexei Kosygin, heads the government. Nikita Khrushchev, before his political demise, combined the function of party chief and premier and was thus in control of both vast bureaucratic machines. The latest crises in the Kremlin, apparently simmer-



ing since the new collective rulers took over, emerged after Izvestia printed an article urging "greater independence" for government officials.

Izvestia traditionally represents the view of the government hierarchy. Pravda, Moscow's other influential newspaper, is the official mouthpiece of the party.

T. Kiselev who authored the controversial Izvestia article is himself a top government official. He accused the disgraced Khrushchev, among other things, of having "battered the government organs," which must now be compensated for their setback and given greater authority and responsibility.

Nothing is ever printed by accident in the tightly regulated Soviet press. What lends special significance to Kiselev's article is the fact that since Khrushchev's ouster in October the new Communist party boss Leonid Brezhnev has been favoring the opposite approach. He has been advocating more party control of the government and Russia's economic and social agencies.

The article, printed prominently in Izvestia, was thus an open challenge to Brezhnev's policy statement which asserted the party's right to control the actions of Kosygin's government.

Defining the functions of the party and those of the government has long been a source of friction in domestic Soviet politics. It was the clash between Khrushchev and former Premier Malenkov immediately after Stalin's death in 1953.

It was Lenin himself, for reasons of early Soviet policy, who first created the fiction that the Communist party and the government were distinct and separate agencies serving the Russian dictatorship.

After the Reds seized power in Russia in 1917, Lenin became head of the government. He never held an official post in the Communist party, though he had a moral influence on party affairs during his lifetime.

After Lenin's death however, Stalin used his powerful position as party secretary to attain the premiership. He thus became political boss of Russia and chief of the government both. An identical course was followed by Khrushchev.

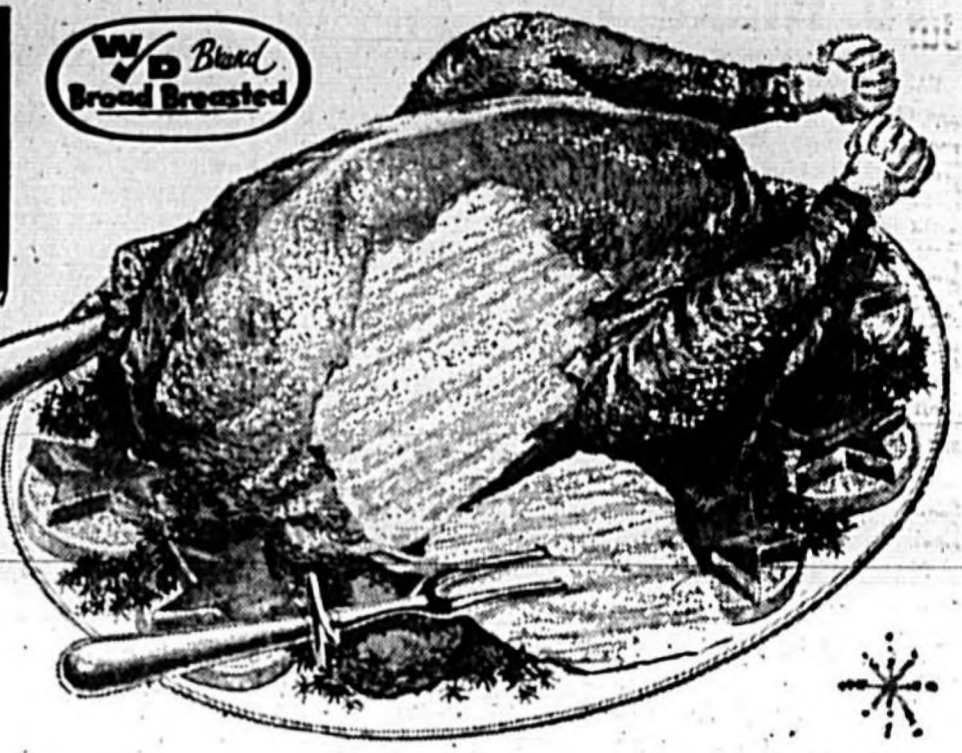
Khrushchev's defeat of Malenkov, which represented a victory for the party machine over the government apparatus, was the first step toward the eventual elimination of the collective leadership that came to power after Stalin's death.

## 'Equality Of All' Sacred To All, Justice States

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The ideals of "equality of all" and "individual opportunity" are held sacred by all Americans, yet in them lies a conflicting struggle, according to state Supreme Court Justice Stephen C. O'Connell.

O'Connell told a Florida State University graduating class Saturday night to adopt excellence as a personal goal and contribute to making its pursuit a national goal.

He told the 755 graduating students that Americans are dedicated to two conflicting ideals—the ideals of equality of persons, and the insistence that each individual be given the opportunity to develop to the fullest of his potential, to produce as far as he can in a competitive race.

"There is danger," he said, "when the effort to assure equality between persons results in binding the individuals into a fatal rigidity of standard geared to the abilities of the slower."

Efforts to nullify the more able, deny them the opportunity to fulfill their greatest potential and lower the standards of performance for all.

The young judge said the no-self-corrective forces have arisen to counter-balance the "overstressing of egalitarianism" that has already occurred and there seems to be little likelihood that any will.

## Food Fair Stores Have Record Sales

PHILADELPHIA (SpI) — Food Fair Stores, Inc., reported record sales for the 16 weeks ended Nov. 14.

Sales in the period amounted to \$333,437,000, an increase of 3.2 per cent over sales volume of \$323,130,000 in the like period last year, it was disclosed by Louis Stein, president of the retail food chain.

Net income after taxes was \$2,601,000, the equal after preferred dividends to 36 cents per share on the average number of common shares outstanding during the period.

In the year earlier period, net income amounted to \$2,882,000, or 40 cents a share on the same share basis.

Sales for the 28 weeks ending Nov. 14 also rose to a new high of \$579,027,000. This is an increase of 2.5 per cent over sales of \$564,436,000 for the similar 1963 period. Net income after taxes for the last

28 weeks period totalled \$4,030,000, the equal after preferred dividends, to 50 cents per common share compared with \$3,104,000, or 76 cents a share a year ago.

The 28 week results were adversely affected by the strike in the Baltimore-Eastern Maryland area, it was noted. However, net income of 30 cents per share for the latest 16 weeks compares with 20 cents per share reported in the first 12 weeks of the current fiscal year.

Since the start of the current fiscal year, last May 2, Food Fair has added 23 new food stores and department stores. It now operates 187 supermarkets and 32 J. M. Fields department stores in the Eastern region and 13 food markets and drug stores in southern California and Nevada.

## 41 Persons Die In Train Crash

TACOTALPA, Mexico (UPI) — Forty-one persons were killed and more than 100 injured Sunday night when a freight train crashed full tilt into a passenger train stopped at the station here.

Today rescuers still were working to free passengers trapped in the wreckage of the train cars. Urgent pleas were sent out for blood donations, and the facilities of all hospitals in the area were mobilized.

The passenger train had been traveling from Merida, in Yucatan State, to Coatzacoalcos, in Veracruz.

Four of the passengers were American. Three escaped without injury. The fourth identified as Miss Warner was said to have lost both arms.

Railway officials said the engineer of the freight train apparently had fallen asleep.

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### Red Newspaper Would Organize Santa Clauses

MOSCOW (UPI)—Should Santa Claus be nationalized? It's a possibility, the newspaper Soviet Latvia said in cataloging the faults of "Grandfather Frost," the Russian equivalent of Santa.

But it admitted the idea of setting up a special Grandfather Frost office, even under the Soviet government, "seems to belong to realm of fairy tales."

The newspaper complained that men who dress up each year to play the role of the kindly, snow-bearded Grandfather Frost often turn out to be calculating, profiteering and money-grubbing.

The "Grandfathers" find regular employment each new year, which is the Soviet gift-giving holiday. But they are in such demand, the paper said, that mothers have to rush all over town seeking out men to don false whiskers and appear at children's parties.

When the "Grandfather Frost" finally arrives, it said he demands "10 rubles for me. Five for my wife. Pay in advance."

His wife is supposed to sit in a corner to portray a beautiful snow maiden. But more often, it said, she is an old hag with a hoarse, deep voice and a cigarette in the corner of her mouth.

On the day of the party, the newspaper said, Grandfather Frost and his "Snow Maiden" arrive. The excited children dance around him, pull his beard, accept his presents.

But after 40 minutes, it said, he looks at his watch and is on his way—to his five or six other engagements that day.

"Wouldn't it be better," the newspaper asked, "to organize the Grandfather Frosts in a more orderly way?"

### Japs Have Word For It, Also

TOKYO (UPI)—The Yomiuri, one of Japan's biggest newspapers, warned its readers against the dangers of drinking too much at year-end parties.

"People become drunk when they take too much alcohol," the newspaper said. "This is found in all drinks — beer, sake, liquor and whiskey."

"Be sure to stop at the danger point and don't drink on an empty stomach."

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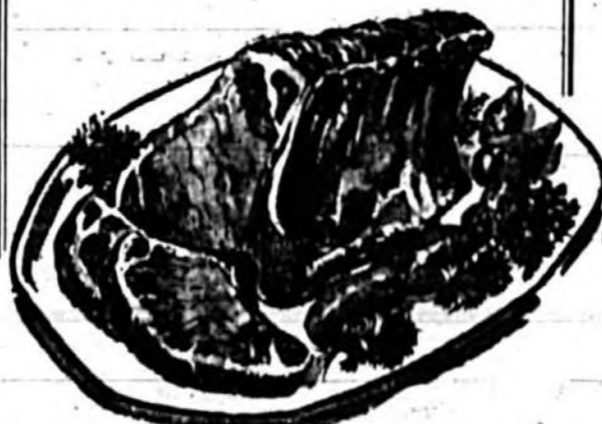

### Canadian MPs Ponder Moves After Recess

OTTAWA (UPI) — Weary members of Canada's 28th Parliament over the weekend pondered their next moves during a lull in the longest, one of the most controversial and perhaps strangest sessions in Canadian political history.

The session was recessed Friday on its 214th day by the minority Liberal government of Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson.

Barring unforeseen circumstances, the 285 members will return Feb. 16. There are promises then of more turmoil, bitterness and trouble for a government already scarred by scandal and closure.

There are indications as well Pearson will make some cabinet changes during the eight-week vacation as he does some political fence-mending in preparation for a possible 1965 election.

There is speculation he will bring in a new minister from the province of Quebec and get rid of some of the members from that province who have caused him considerable embarrassment in recent weeks.

**BRIBERY CHARGES**  
Most of the bitterness and scandal boiled to the surface in the last few months of a session that likely will be best remembered in history as the year of the great flag debate.

It was during this time that charges of intimidation and bribery against aides to cabinet ministers first erupted.

Three ministerial assistants, including Pearson's own parliamentary secretary, were charged by Conservative MP Erik Nielsen with trying to bribe a Montreal lawyer in connection with a man wanted in the United States on dope-smuggling charges.

Nielsen's accusations resulted in an inquiry — still continuing — conducted by Quebec Superior Court Justice Frederic Dorian.

No sooner had the House of Commons recovered from this thunderbolt than Immigration Minister Rene Tremblay and Secretary of State Maurice Lamontagne were accused of buying furniture under irregular circumstances.

The two ministers had bought furnishings with a total value of about \$10,000 from a Montreal firm that later went bankrupt under a cloud of suspicion.

**MINISTER ACCUSED**  
The commons during the last day of sitting clamored for a full-scale debate on the alleged irregularities. It was refused by harried Speaker Alan MacNaughton only after the ministers made statements to the house.

It also was during the last week of the session that the commons witnessed the unusual spectacle of the prime minister being accused of deliberately misleading the lower chamber and the opposition demanding he go before the committee on elections and privileges for an investigation of his conduct.

But the dominant issue of the first 10 months of the session was the flag-or flags.

It split four of the five parties, widened the chasm between French and English-speaking members and threatened to break the country wide open.

It saw the single red maple leaf born as Canada's first distinctive national flag after 97 years, amid the bitterness of government closure urged by French-speaking members of the opposition.

### Burch Confident Will Keep Job

WASHINGTON (UPI) — GOP National Chairman Dean Burch, back from a strategy meeting with Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, says he has enough party support to keep his job.

Burch returned from a meeting in Phoenix with Goldwater, who picked the 35-year-old attorney for the top party post after receiving the Republican presidential nomination.

The chairman told newsmen "I've had a survey made and it shows I have enough votes."

# Buffalo Bills Down Patriots; Division Champions

## Jackie Kemp Unchallenged Hero Sunday

The Buffalo Bills are the American Football League's Eastern Division champions because Jackie Kemp played his own game and made both the Boston Patriots and teammate Cookie Gilchrist dance to it.

Kemp was the unchallenged hero Sunday when the Bills whipped the Patriots 24-14, to win the right to meet the San Diego Chargers in the AFL title game at Buffalo next Saturday.

He completed 12 of 24 passes for 286 yards and a touchdown and scored two touchdowns himself as the Bills beat the Patriots for only the second time in seven games under Coach Lou Saban.

Behind the triumph, however, was the fact that Kemp repeated the strategy that caused the big blowoff between Gilchrist and his teammates on Nov. 15—by making Gilchrist's running secondary to his own passing. And he did it under the most difficult conditions imaginable—on a slippery turf during a snowstorm.

Gilchrist clinched his second AFL rushing title with 981 yards gained to 946 for rookie Matt Snell of the New York Jets but the 52 yards Cookie gained Sunday had little or nothing to do with the Bills' victory.

Back on Nov. 15 when the Patriots snapped the Bills' nine-game winning streak, the 250-pound Gilchrist walked off the field in a huff because Kemp wasn't calling his signal often enough.

Kemp sent the Bills off to a 7-0 first-period lead with a 66-yard scoring pass to Elbert Dubenion. His first one-yard plunge made the score 14-0 in the second period and his second blast through the heart of the Boston line increased the score to 24-0 in the fourth period.

The Patriots, who beat the Bills, 26-8, in a playoff for the Eastern title last year, scored in the first and last period on passes of 36 and 15 yards from Babe Parilli to Tony Romeo.

The Bills had an edge in first downs, 17-15, and in rushing yardage, 94-53, but the Patriots had a slight edge in passing yardage, 294-266.

The Kansas City Chiefs drubbed the Jets, 24-7; quarterback George Blanda and flanker Charlie Hennigan set AFL records as the Houston Oilers downed the Denver Broncos, 34-16, and the Oakland Raiders scored a 21-20 victory over the Chargers in their Sunday games.

Len Dawson threw touchdown passes of 11 yards to Frank Jackson and 55 yards to Chris Burford, raising his total touchdown passes for the season to 30 and handing the Jets their seventh straight loss on the road. Snell, the former Ohio State fullback, ground out 103 yards to set a Jets club mark and a new AFL season rushing record for a rookie.

Blanda completed 16 of 27 passes for the Oilers, setting new AFL season records of 805 attempts and 262 completions and Hennigan surpassed Lionel Taylor's mark of 100 completions with a catch in the third period. The game was the last for Coach Sammy Baugh, who announced Friday that he is quitting the Oilers.

## Ara Parseghian Coach Of Year

DES MOINES, Iowa (UPI)—Notre Dame's Coach Ara Parseghian was named coach of the year Sunday by the Football Writers Association of America.

Parseghian, who led Notre Dame to a 9-1 mark in his first season at the helm, received 60 per cent of the votes cast by more than 600 sports-writers across the country.

## AFL Breeds Own All-Pro Elite Stars

NEW YORK (NEA)—The three strongest teams in the American Football League this year were the San Diego Chargers, Boston Patriots and Buffalo Bills—a contention which is proved by the standings.

It also shows up in the second annual All-AFL team named today by Newspaper Enterprise-Association and chosen by that eminently qualified jury, the eight head coaches of the league. The Chargers placed six men, Patriots five and the Bills four on the offensive and defensive platoons.

An elite group is growing up in the young league, which has now completed its fifth season, and it's noticeably dominant in the all-star ranks. Of the 22 men voted the best in the AFL, only three got their starts in professional football outside. All the rest, from perennial All-AFL offensive tackle Ron Mix of San Diego to sophomore cornerback Dek Westmoreland, also of San Diego (and picked as a rookie on last year's team), are pure bred.

The exceptions are Babe Parilli, the remarkable quarterback of the Boston Patriots, an 11-year pro who some people might be interested to know, was Bart Starr's first inspiration as a T-quarterback when the Green Bay signal caller was still in high school; Tommy Addison, who got a quick looking in training camp with the Baltimore Colts before migrating to Boston, and the incomparable Cookie Gilchrist, who trampled everything in Canada before transferring his 251 pounds to Buffalo.

Another indication of the close competition in the AFL is the fact there was no unanimity at any position. No man pulled all the votes of the eight coaches, who are permitted to include four of their own men on the ballots.

Three men came within one vote: Mix, who built himself up to 250 pounds and is recognized as the best offensive lineman in the young history of the league; Lance Alworth, the baby-faced flanker of the Chargers who is called "Bambi" and is the greatest touchdown threat in football from any place on the field, and Tom Sestak, the strong man of the Buffalo defensive line at tackle.

Five men polled six votes: Parilli, Gilchrist, guard Billy Shaw of Buffalo, middle line-backer Nick Buoniconti of Boston and defensive tackle Ernie Ladd of San Diego.

If the AFL wants to make a case for incipient maturity, it can point out Ladd. He came up with San Diego four seasons ago from Grambling as the biggest man in pro football, with the biggest appetite, and amazing agility for his size. When Ernie wanted to play, no one could handle him. Sometimes Ernie would rather eat.

This year, he has become a model of consistency with undiminished size (327 pounds) and Charger coach Sid Gillman, casting his ballot, proudly pointed out Ernie as "best of all the stars."

Closest jockeying for position was at tight end, with Fred Arbanas of Kansas City shading San Diego's Dave Kocourek; tackle, which went to Stew Barber by a hair over the Chiefs' Jim Tyrer; corner line-backer, with Addison squeaking by Mike Stratton of Buffalo, and safety, where Ron Hall of Boston edged Fred Glick of Houston and George Saines of Buffalo.

## Three Detroit Lions Coaches To Be Fired

DETROIT (UPI)—Three assistant coaches of the Detroit Lions probably will be fired by veteran players Joe Schmidt and Yale Lary likely to become player-coaches.

Team owner William Clay Ford said Sunday night an announcement concerning the three assistants—Les Bingaman, Don Dull and Bob Nussbaumer—would be made late this afternoon.

He is scheduled to have his third conference in five days with head Coach George Wilson at that time.

However, it has been learned by United Press Internat-

ional that Ford has already ordered the ouster of the three sides and that he wants Schmidt to become defensive line coach and Lary defensive backfield coach. As of Sunday he had not talked either player into signing a contract to coach and play in 1965.

And UPI also learned that if Wilson objects too strenuously, Ford will give him his walking papers, too.

A team official said, "Ford plans to listen to George one more time before lowering the boom. And that may be the last time the two will talk business since these firings are really a tap at Wilson's coaching, too."

The charges resulted from player complaints to Ford that they were not getting the proper coaching from assistants.

Players voiced the opinion that they could have won the National Football League's Western Conference title this season with better tutoring. The Lions finished fourth with a 7-5 record.

## Tennis Tourney For Jrs. Opens

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—The Orange Bowl International Junior tennis championships were scheduled to get underway today with a big group of the finest young players ever assembled for the affair.

"We all know that Texas has a great football team," said Bryant, a close friend of Royal. "They lost only once all season and that resulted when they went for two on the extra point try. Darrell had to go for two, since he was a defending champion, ranked No. 1 at the time and a tie would have been like kissing your sister."

Assistant Coach Howard Schnellenberger, assigned to prepare the Tide for Texas' brand of ball, said quarterback Joe Namath would start and be passing plenty to the flats to try to halt the Long

horns' eight-man blitz. The Alabama line also will try to stop the ferocious Texas pass-rush.

Namath will be starting his first game since hurting his right knee in the third tilt of the season. He has played since but junior Steve Sloan started the last seven games.

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## Buffalo Bills, Chargers In Championship Playoff

BOSTON (UPI)—Lou Saban's last laugh was a resounding ho-ho-ho.

Saban, coach of the new champions of the American Football League's Eastern Division, the Buffalo Bills, was quaffing champagne and sounding for all the world like Santa Claus.

Saban summarized his

squad's victory over Mike Holovak's Patriots in a single word: "Kemp."

He was speaking of old pro quarterback Jack Kemp, a veteran used sparingly in recent weeks while young Daryl Lamonica brought the Bills down to the final game with an 11-2 record.

Saban kept the identity of his starting quarterback a secret right up to the delayed game starting time at Boston. He had informed Kemp only 24 hours earlier that it was his assignment to beat Boston. Kemp passed magnificently through snowflakes that actually obscured his receivers on occasion.

# 'Bama Wins Status With Va. Tourney

ATLANTA (UPI) — The University of Alabama has become synonymous with football but the Crimson Tide unexpectedly is on the rise in basketball as well.

In a season when winning on the road appears more difficult than ever before, Alabama has established itself as a dark horse candidate for the Southeastern Conference title.

The Crimson Tide achieved this status this past weekend by winning the Virginia Tech tournament and thus becoming the only SEC team to date to capture a holiday title away from home.

Sixth-ranked Vanderbilt, the pre-season conference favorite, also won a tournament — but on its home court, and 9th-ranked Kentucky couldn't even do that.

Alabama, which hasn't been a single contender since 1956, beat host Virginia Tech 72-53 and highly regarded North Carolina 66-61 to raise its record to 5-1. Only Southeastern team with a better mark is unbeaten Tennessee which topped Buffalo 79-54 Saturday night for its fourth straight victory.

The Crimson Tide doesn't have a score among the 11 in the conference but has averaged 81.5 points per game — about 17 more per game than its opponents.

Alabama lacks the big manufactured by most teams but its starting five ranges from 6-foot-4 to 6-6. Its scoring leaders are senior Hotie Andrews of Irondale, Ill., at 19.8 and team Sharpshooter of same Ill., at 14.8.

The Crimson Tide posted only a 14-12 mark last season but won five of its last six games, including victories over SEC champion Kentucky and runner-up Tennessee.

Tonight, the Crimson Tide will tie at Richmond (Va.) University and another victory would find Alabama off to its best start since December 1954.

Elsewhere tonight, North Carolina will be at Florida Georgia Southern at Auburn, William and Mary at Georgia Tech and Game at Baton Rouge.

Vanderbilt raised its record to 5-2 by rasing past season's unbeaten Baylor 92-74 and then edging Oklahoma State 60-58 in its tournament final.

UCLA, whose 30-game winning streak was shattered on the very first day of the college basketball season, had laid a solid foundation for a new one with the help of a football weapon — the blitz.

Arizona State rolled over Murray State, 107-96, to capture the Sun Devil Classic crown, and Evansville, which has knocked off five major colleges in a row rocked Louisiana State 93-73. In the Evansville Holiday Tournament at Larry Humes poured in 45 points.

Alabama, heretofore noted only for its football team, stunned North Carolina, 66-61, to win the Virginia Tech Holiday. Although the host team didn't win in this case, it did finish third by crushing Mississippi State, 104-75.

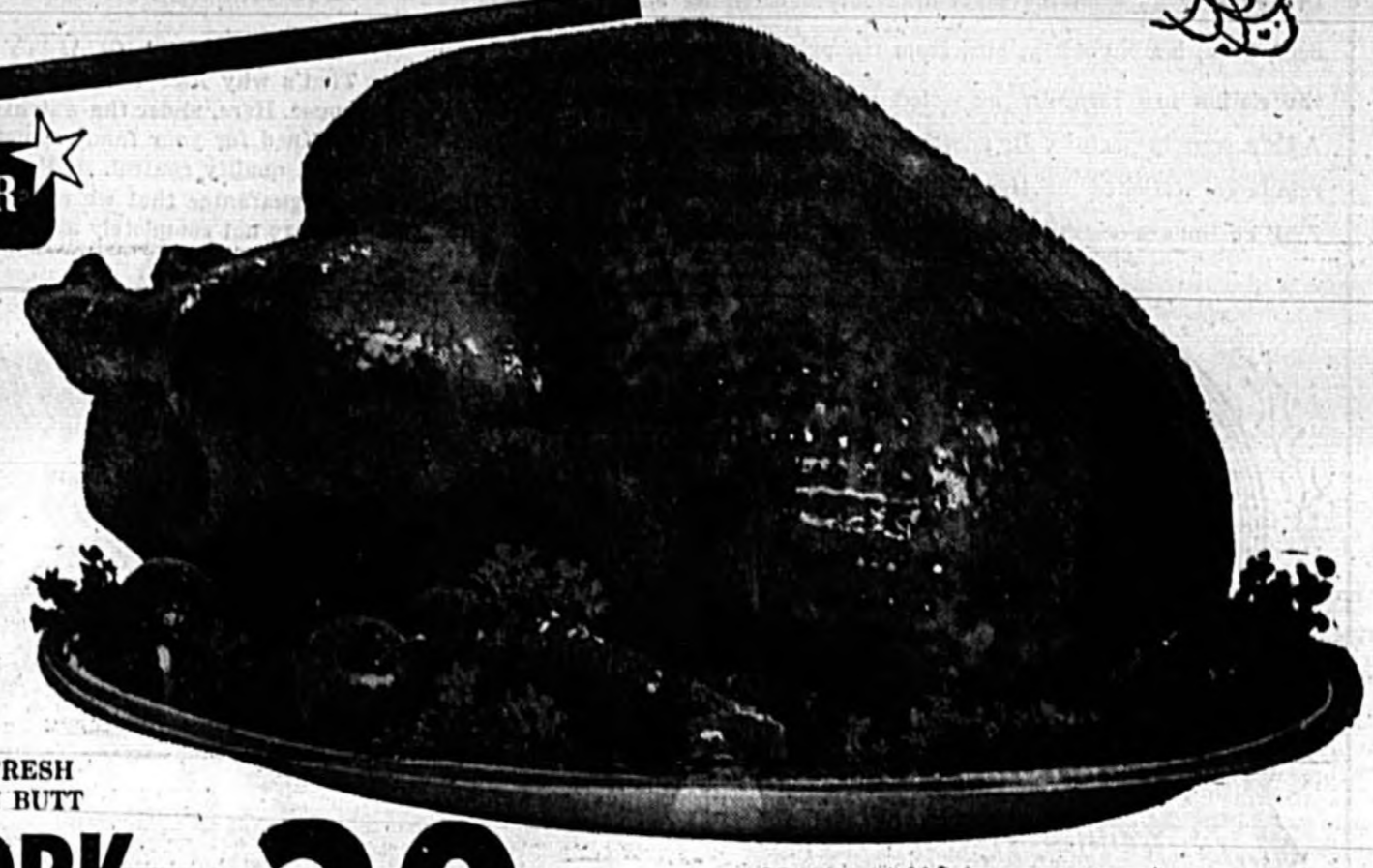

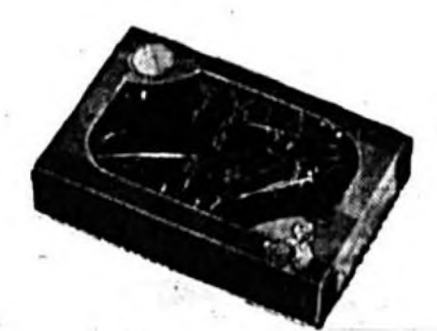

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# Give 'Em Trade

The battle to win the souls of the emerging countries and to admit them as mature members of the free community is far from over. In fact, the outcome is not at all sure.

The ever-widening gap between rich and poor nations poses a grave danger to free enterprise and world financial stability, as well as to world peace.

That is the consensus of 175 business leaders from 58 countries recently surveyed by the National Industrial Conference Board, a businessmen's research organization.

The gap is widening because the poor nations, the traditional suppliers of raw materials who are just beginning to industrialize, must still import more from the advanced nations than they sell to them.

The challenge is somehow to reverse this flow of wealth and bring it into balance. This means more than helping the underdeveloped nations build factories and learn industrial skills. It means providing a market for the goods that these factories and skills produce.

"Aid alone cannot bridge the economic gap," says G. Clark Thompson, vice president of the conference board. "Aid is no substitute for increased trade."

The problem is that allowing the free inflow of manufactured products into the developed countries may undercut markets there. But as one British executive put it, that is the price that must be paid if the standard of living of the 2.5 billion people in the have-not countries is to improve.

"The consequences of preventing a rise in their standard of living are too awful to contemplate," he replied to the survey, "and this de-

gree of sacrifice on the part of the developed countries must be accepted if the peace of the world is to be secured."

All responsibility does not fall on the rich nations, however. The others must, among other things, use efficient business methods, modern quality control, product research, keep honest books and institute tax reforms and improve banking systems where needed.

One suggestion was that they sign an "International Magna Carta" pledging adherence to agreements, protection of private property, compensation in case of nationalization and international arbitration of disputes.

A serious alarm has been sounded but, says Thompson, despite bitterness and concern in some parts of the world, "underneath lies a common and sincere desire to find equitable solutions."

# Three-Pact Struggle

Up to now the Red Chinese have been holding back from the new Kremlin leadership the choice invective which they used to heap upon Nikita Khrushchev.

"... Timid as a mouse... the great capitulationist of all time... Those were just a few of the epithets.

And the Soviets replied in kind.

"Factionalism... Trotskyism... infantile leftism... warmongering... craving for nuclear weapons..."

The downfall of Khrushchev brought a respite from the

name-calling which shortly could begin again.

For the Chinese terms for settlement of their quarrel with the Soviets have been total surrender. And to these terms the Soviets neither will nor can afford to agree.

Introducing the budget for 1965, new Soviet Premier Alexei Kosygin declared: "We want to develop our relations with the United States of America and some steps have been made in this direction—although they have been small ones."

That alone is enough to trigger a Red Chinese tirade. For the United States, al-

though declared by the Chinese to be a "paper tiger," is also the force declared to be the greatest enemy of socialism and the chief barrier to the Red Chinese philosophy of violent revolution.

Kosygin paid lip service to Communist aims in Cuba, South Viet Nam and the Congo. But the whole tenor of his presentation was that of a technician intent upon co-existence and the means to bring the U.S.S.R. out of economic chaos.

The struggle between Moscow and Peking is in three parts.

—The ideological struggle for leadership of world communism.

—Traditional rivalries, including border claims. (In the first of these, the Russians cannot surrender without becoming a second-class nation in world communism. On this point, the Chinese demand not only the downgrading of Khrushchev, but the reinstatement of Stalinism.)

The Chinese, far behind the Russians in industrial development, demand equal sacrifices of all Communist nations until a common level is reached by all. But the Russians are faced by a grumbling population at home and have more to lose in a nuclear war.

Flushed by their recent acquisition of a nuclear bomb, the Chinese have been even less backward than usual in stating their position on various subjects.

One has dealt with their long joint border with the Soviet Union, the longest in the world. They have warned the Russians they will not give up one inch of their territory in Sinkiang Province, a province not inhabited by Chinese but by a population primarily Moslem.

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Recently I was in the neighborhood of Tan Lac village, where Vietnamese government forces have just decisively defeated a Viet Cong battalion, killing 115 Red troops. It was reported as the heaviest Viet Cong loss of 1964.

The things I saw and heard during my trip to that area cause me to think this unusual victory was no accident.

The American Army adviser for the Fourth Corps Area was a ramrod-stiff officer with no taste for sloppiness. "My problem," he said, "is that the Vietnamese troops want to stand in outposts to guard their hamlets. They wait for the Viet Cong to come. But I'm getting them to destroy those outposts and depend on aggressive patrolling."

"If you're in an outpost, the Viet Cong can hit you when they want. Or they can circle around you and hit the hamlet. They have the advantage. If you're out on patrol, you can hit them. It takes you off the defensive and that's half the battle."

"But you've got to destroy the outposts. If the outposts are there, they cling to them."

Maybe this aggressive training accounts for the fact that the Vietnamese government forces in the Tan Lac battle kept pressing despite losses.

In the same Tan Lac neighborhood I met the American head of a team of Scuba well drillers, working to bring well water for the first time to a hamlet where much of the drinking water had to be brought in by wagon at prices poor farmers could not afford to pay. It put in this well, these Americans and their Vietnamese assistants had to travel daily through Viet Cong-controlled territory.

Though the well was not yet finished at the time I was there, the attitude of the people living in the neighborhood, for miles around was changing from suspicion to cooperation.

The villagers were still afraid of the Viet Cong. Some—with sons, brothers or husbands out with the guerrilla forces—were loyal to the underground. But there were changes. Young people were beginning to volunteer for militia. Some farmers were secretly giving information on the whereabouts of the Viet Cong.

According to reports, the Tan Lac victory was possible because the government troops had continuous accurate knowledge of where the Viet Cong were. In most places I visited in South Viet Nam, most villagers refused to tell what the Viet were doing or where they were. In many places, numbers of villagers spied on the government forces for the Reds. Without this cooperation, the Viet Cong forces could not succeed.

I was talking to an American major not far from Tan Lac. "It's push, push, push," he said. "We tell them the Reds are certain to set up ambushes. But our Vietnamese government troops insist on pushing down the roads straight into an ambush. They won't put out scouts even though they agree they should. Every time it's the same. We talk and talk and it does no good. So now we're teaching them to set up counter traps for the Viet Cong, they instinctively evade the Communist Viet traps."

"Sometimes you have to get around the corner and coming back at the problem from a different angle. That's why I like my job."

"They are both beyond the usual lifespan of Americans, so by law of averages, they might pass away at any time.

"In recent years I have given them clothing and a TV set, but they have their dresser drawers packed full of hose, handkerchiefs, shirts, etc.

"So I am at my wit's end, Dr. Crane, what else can I give them?"

Millions of you readers might take your aged parents down to the dentist and either get new dentures for them.

Or have their present false teeth re-lined so they will fit and function much better.

For elderly folks, though most generous with their grandchildren, will grow miserably about spending a penny on their own enjoyment.

So they will stumble along with outmoded eye glasses or miss much of the music, birds' songs and conversation for lack of one of the new modern hearing aids.

Or they will forego raw vegetables and tough meat because of lack of good false teeth.

In the latter case, they often develop secondary anemia by going on a semi-soft menu of mashed potatoes and gravy. Or they dunk their doughnut or toast in coffee to soften it.

So you children (or grandchildren) should take over and drive them down to the dentist for a dental check-up. "Oh, but my old teeth will do me," they usually protest. "For I may not have many more years to use them, anyway!"

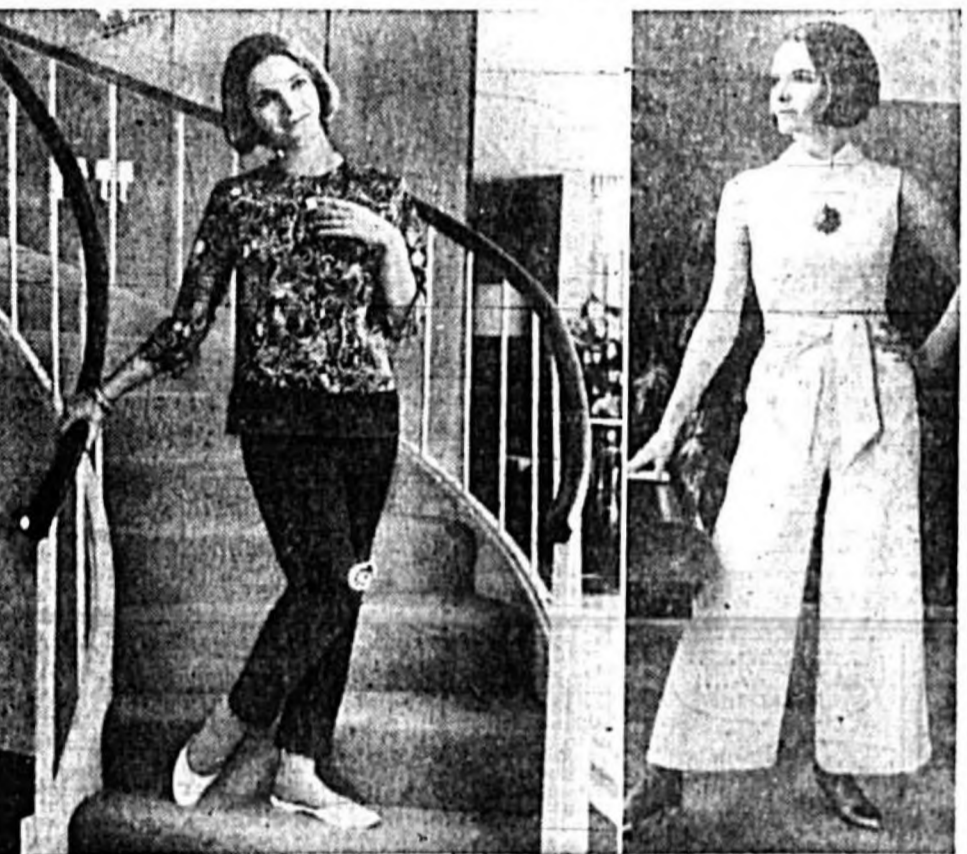

## Jacoby On Bridge By Oswald Jacoby

When today's hand was played at the Valley View studio in Richardson, Tex., about half the North-South pairs played part-score contracts in no-trump or clubs while the other half reached the no-trump game and wound up making three or four odd depending on just how the defense went.

There is nothing noteworthy about the hand except that when Mrs. Jacoby and I hold the North-South cards I invented a new bid.

With 16 high-card points, a five-card suit and two tens, I held a maximum no-trump, so after Mrs. Jacoby's two club response (Stayman), my two diamond rebid to deny a four card major and her two no-trump rebid to show eight or nine high card points. I would

normally have gone right to three no-trump. Her two club response had guaranteed at least four cards

in one of the majors and it occurred to me that if her four-card major was spades and she was weak in either hearts or diamonds, the hand might play better at four spades than at three no-trump. Of course, it is mighty dangerous to invent new bids when your partner happens to be your wife, but we have survived bridge table disasters in our 32 years together, so I bid three spades. She looked a trifle puzzled—who could blame her—but naturally went to the same three no-trump that I would have bid ordinarily so there is no way so far to tell whether my new bid was any good at all, but we may experiment with it some more if it ever comes up again.

### 7-County Boom Seen

"Except for Brevard County," said Robert Doyle, executive director of the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council, "Seminole County will experience the highest percentage of population growth in the seven counties comprising this section of Florida."

This was part of brief resume presented to Seminole County Commissioners today during their regular meeting at the Courthouse.  
Doyle's figures, obtained from preliminary reports by various consultants, indicate that this county's population will zoom to 155,000 by 1980. "That's just 15 years away," said Doyle, "and it's not a long time when you consider that activities at the Cape began just 15 years ago."

Doyle declared that Brevard County will undergo the largest population explosion since the survey indicates that county's numerical growth will rise from its present 175,000 to 410,000 by 1980.  
Populationwise, the seven-county area's population will hit the astronomical figure of 1.6 million by 1980. "This," he added, "will almost double the present population."

Doyle said that a complete inventory of all public and private utilities in this region has been made and immediate indications are that there are far too few to adequately serve the present population much less that anticipated in the next few years.  
"Airports," he declared, "are not well located, according to surveys and contacts with Eastern, Delta and National airlines." As to highways, "Standards are being very closely studied," Doyle claimed, especially in view of the site of the proposed university and the highway connections which will be required. "Further," said Doyle, "we are giving close attention to a new trend, that of putting research and industrial area right on university campuses."

In the field of economics, Doyle pointed out "By 1980 the east central Florida region will be the richest market area in Florida. It will have the highest per capita income," he stressed. "Brevard County is listed along the 16 richest counties in the United States."  
"The type of industry we are attracting to this region is what areas through the country are trying to get," Doyle claimed. "We are and will be getting people with more than average incomes and that means we must also be prepared to meet the problems of more schools, more police and fire protection, and additional services these people will require."

"Another area under study," Doyle listed "the preservation of the St. Johns River basin because one of the major reasons why people are coming into this section is because of the climate and the recreational facilities and this is the basic reason why we have all this potential today. Already," he added, "inroads are being made into our physical environment."  
"In agriculture," he said, "we're working on a feasible program in the three counties which will bear the brunt of the population increase — Seminole, Orange and Brevard — to protect our citrus industry as well as water conservation because it's here we have our basic water recharge area."  
Doyle thanked the Commissioners, especially Gen. J. C. Hutchinson and Chairman James P. Avery, for their cooperation with the Council during the past several years. Hutchinson and Avery will leave office on Jan. 5.

### Bright Future Painted For Seminole

Executive Manager John Krider of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce last night painted to the potentially bright future of this area's economy when he addressed a meeting of the Seminole County Board of Realtors at Seminole Plaza in Casselberry.  
He listed the establishment of a metropolitan telephone system, higher education in the form of a county community junior college and the East Central Florida University, and the development of water projects which would include a port terminal, the Sanford marina and the St. Johns-Indian River canal projects.  
In the immediate future, Krider stressed the current growth of the county's economy and pointed to an expected \$75 million in bank deposits during 1965 as compared with a predicted \$58 million in 1964 and the \$50 million figure hit in 1963.

"Here in Seminole," Krider declared, "the brightest outlook for continued industrial growth is in the field of electronics." He included research and manufacturing and was obviously referring to government contracts for aeronautical and space research projects which are being received by area based electronic firms.  
During the meeting, S. K. Wilson, vice president of the Florida Board of Realtors' Executive Committee, presided. Stewart Helmly as president of the county board for 1964, Herbert E. Stenstrom was installed as vice president, Ben P. Ward Jr. as secretary, Raymond Kensing as treasurer and Ernest Southward a director.

### Commission Approves Bid For State Act

The first official action since 1949 toward the establishment of a port terminal for St. Johns River barge traffic came today when the Board of Seminole County Commissioners put its stamp of approval on a proposed act which will be presented to the 1965 session of the Florida legislature for adoption.  
The proposed act was presented to the board by Jack Holt, a member of the Port Authority Committee of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce which is headed by Francis Flourmill Jr.

The committee was formed two years ago by the trade body's board of directors and this year—under the guidance of subcommittee chairman Gordon Frederick and James P. Avery—the committee retained the engineering firm of Lockwood and Green of Greenville, S. C., to make the necessary feasibility studies.  
Although final reports are not yet available from the engineering firm, periodic progress reports presented by the project director for the company overwhelmingly indicate the necessity for such a terminal as one of the prime developments of the river's potential in the area of transportation.

Many Central Florida firms and industries have already provided Lockwood and Green with information as to the tonnage they would import and export on river barges when the terminal is constructed.  
Today's action means that the County Commissioners will submit the enabling act in its present form to the county's legislative delegation — State Sen. Mack Cleveland Jr. and State Rep. Joe Davis — for further action by the State Legislature in the next session.

The enabling act, if adopted by the legislature, will create a port authority with members of the authority's board being named by the governor.  
According to the committee, once the port authority is established the board would immediately seek to locate the terminal and arrange finances for its construction.

Members of the chamber's port committee visited ports in both Florida and Georgia, named consultants, sifted through the maze of reports, and the recommendations of the consultants were on the agenda of other ports on the interstate waterways and today obtained the County Commission's official blessings.

### Local Schools Roll Up 6.48%

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Eleven counties that have experienced school enrollment increases of more than five per cent above last year were given additional state school funds totaling \$1,963,704 today.

The biggest growth came in Howard County, site of the national music test center at Cape Kennedy. The enrollment there jumped 11.5 per cent over the expected five per cent increase, entitling the county to an additional \$774,208.  
Other reallocation funds and rate of increase above five per cent included Seminole 1.8 per cent, \$37,129.

### Grim Warning For Holiday

CHICAGO (UPI) — The National Safety Council said today between 550 and 650 persons would be killed in traffic accidents during the Christmas holiday weekend.

The holiday officially starts at 6 p.m. local time Thursday and ends at midnight Sunday.  
Howard Pyle, president of the safety council, said this year's production took into account the 10 per cent rise in traffic fatalities since 1963. The record for a three-day Christmas holiday, such as this year, was set in 1955 when 609 traffic deaths were reported during last year's one-day holiday, 226 persons were killed on the nation's highways.

### Orlando Firm Wins Contract

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) — An Orlando company will build a \$1.51 million training building for lunar astronaut, the Army Corps of Engineers announced today.

The contract was awarded to Smith & Sapp Construction Company, with completion set for November.  
The building will be used to provide simulator training for the Apollo spacecraft's command and lunar excursion modules. It will be located near the manned spacecraft operations building in the industrial complex.

### Pacific Coast Towns Hit By Raging Floods

Drenching rains and gales caused the worst floods in years along the Pacific Coast today.

Entire towns were evacuated and houses were swept away by the raging waters.  
Residents of California's Red River Canyon said the degree was worse than the disastrous floods of 1955. Hundreds of cargoes were evacuated from the area.  
One town sank under five feet of water.  
Flood waters chewed supporting earth from the roots of the canyon's famed red wood trees and many of the trees were likely to topple.

### Control Board Member Quits

FORT LAUDERDALE (UPI) — State Board of Control member Dr. Charles Forman has written Gov. Earl R. Swoyer and asked that he not be considered as a member of the state's new Board of Regents.

Forman said in the letter he did not want to serve as a regent because he is opposed to Gov. elect Hayden Burns.  
"His duties as a member of the Broward County School Board were requiring most of his time," Forman said in the letter, and told Swoyer he could not adequately serve as a regent.

### New Warplane Flight Perfect

FORT WORTH (UPI) — The first TEX, a warplane that started some political wars of its own, zoomed to 15,000 feet in its maiden flight Monday.

The test, although cut short by mechanical troubles, was called "practically perfect."  
"I am a happy fellow," said Air Force Secretary Eugene Zuckert after the test flight.

Sanford and Seminole County got an early Christmas gift yesterday when announcement was made that Blake Paint Corporation is moving to this area from Orlando.

The firm will locate its facilities in a building off Grapeville Avenue (SR 425) and an Atlantic Coast Line Railroad siding.  
Blake Paint will have about 15 employees at the start with others expected to be hired as the plant expands its operations. It makes lacquers, synthetics and industrial paints.  
The plant will occupy a 20,000-square-foot area and will have 400 feet of railroad siding. Target date for work to begin is Feb. 1.

Renovation of the structure will be handled by the LeRoy Robb Construction Company, and Sanford Electric Company will wire the plant to fill the company's needs.

John Krider, executive manager of the Seminole Chamber of Commerce, represented the development company in negotiations. The local finance institutions participating were Florida State, Sanford Atlantic National Bank and First Federal Savings and Loan Association.

W. D. Blake is president of the company and Mrs. Marilyn L. Blake is vice president. Atty. Stuart Smith represented the Blakes in the transaction and Atty. Joe Davis the development firm.

### Bryant Looks To The Future
