Fernandina, August 13.-Europe is not the only place having war There is an ice war in Fernandina and although it may seem paradoxical it promises to be a hot ice war. The price of ice last year was 80 cents a block of two hundred pounds The city put in a municipal plant first of June and named a price of \$3.50 a ton and in small lots 60cents a cake of 300 pounds and 15 pounds for 5cents. This price existed until the first of this week when the Southern Utilities Company made a, price of \$2.00 a ton, 10cents for for 50 pounds. Henry Worth Thornton, Picked by English Directors to Take Charge of Great Eastern Road, Will Demonstrate U. S. Methods.

New York .- "Your best chance of success," said Henry W. Thornton, comes when you are in your shirt sleeves."

Thornton is the young American ern railroad in England.

The member of the board of directors who did the picking tactfully added to his declaration that Thornton is the best young rallmader cruis ing that English railroad men have run to seed.

"They do not grow," said the director, wagging his head like a mechanical bear. "They do not expand. Their field of vision is limited."

However that may be and English railroads resolved themselves into a lodge of sorrow when they read it and then began to gather bricks for Thornton-the American youngster has been growing and expanding ever since . he got into railroading.

But, according to the commuting public of England, its directing heads assay heavily in pure bone. Ticket sales are never stopped, no matter how badly the line may be blocked. Trains are held in smoke-filled tunnels, rather than permit a step aside

from routine procedure. "Any one can handle engines and cars and tunnels," said a railroad man, "but Thornton is a wonder at handling men. That's why England took him."

He must not only teach the railroad using public of England to love the Great Eastern, which entails a complete reversal of all the laws of human nature, but must also win the loyal support of the Great Eastern's

In a way, American railroaders and their methods will go on trial with Thornton in England. This may not seem fair, but it is the fact.




