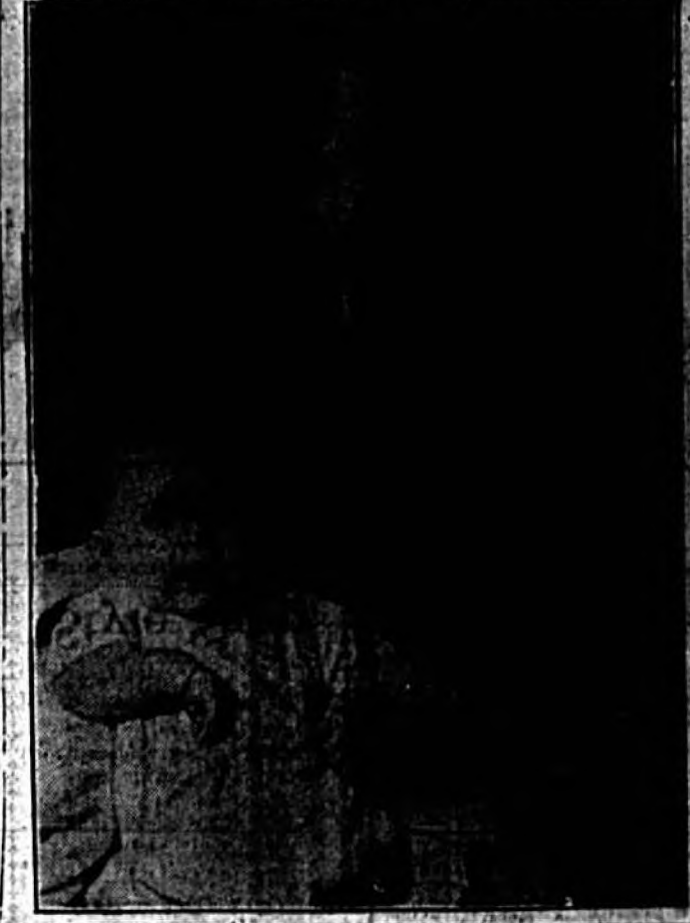

Sanford And County Experience Day Of Peace, Tranquillity, Officials Report

Many Accidents In Other Cities

Death Toll Taken By Motors In Various Sections Of State

"Put it in box car letters that there was not an accident of any kind in Seminole County on Christmas Day, as far as we have been able to ascertain," Sheriff J. F. McClelland stated today.

Chief Roy Williams of the Sanford police department made a similar report—no accidents.

There were no fires. Chief Mack Cleveland of the fire department stated that not one alarm was turned in either on Christmas Day or Christmas Eve.

Neither the sheriff's office or the police made an arrest, not even of a drunken man.

Two persons were killed in St. Petersburg traffic accidents yesterday, bringing the 1935 traffic toll here to 19 deaths. Two others were injured.

Earl Henry Benjamin, 37, a grocery store manager, was killed instantly at daybreak when his car crashed into a parked street car.

Henry Havelock Gregory, 76, retired jeweler from Paterson, N. J., was struck down by an automobile.

OCALA, Dec. 26. —(AP)—Kenneth Analey, 36, employe of the Moorhead Engineering Company, was killed in an automobile accident when he was west of Ocala yesterday.

Divergent Are Proposals For Next Congress

Democrats For Short, Harmony Session But G. O. P. May Prolong It Months

WASHINGTON, Dec. 25. —(AP)—New Dealers and opponents concentrated today on a rickety different plans for the new session of Congress opening Jan. 3, eight days hence.

Roosevelt men were striving for a short harmonious session and here were reports that President Roosevelt might propose much in the way of more legislation beyond a new neutrality bill and appropriation measures.

Moreover, the American Liberty League was fighting for drastic revision of the Utility Holding Company Act, AAA, Social Security plan and tax legislation.

Some legislators see close fights which may stretch the session into summer, pointing to Congress as an ideal forum for campaign speeches.

The first big issue expected to come up is the \$2,000,000,000 bill for the neutrality bill.

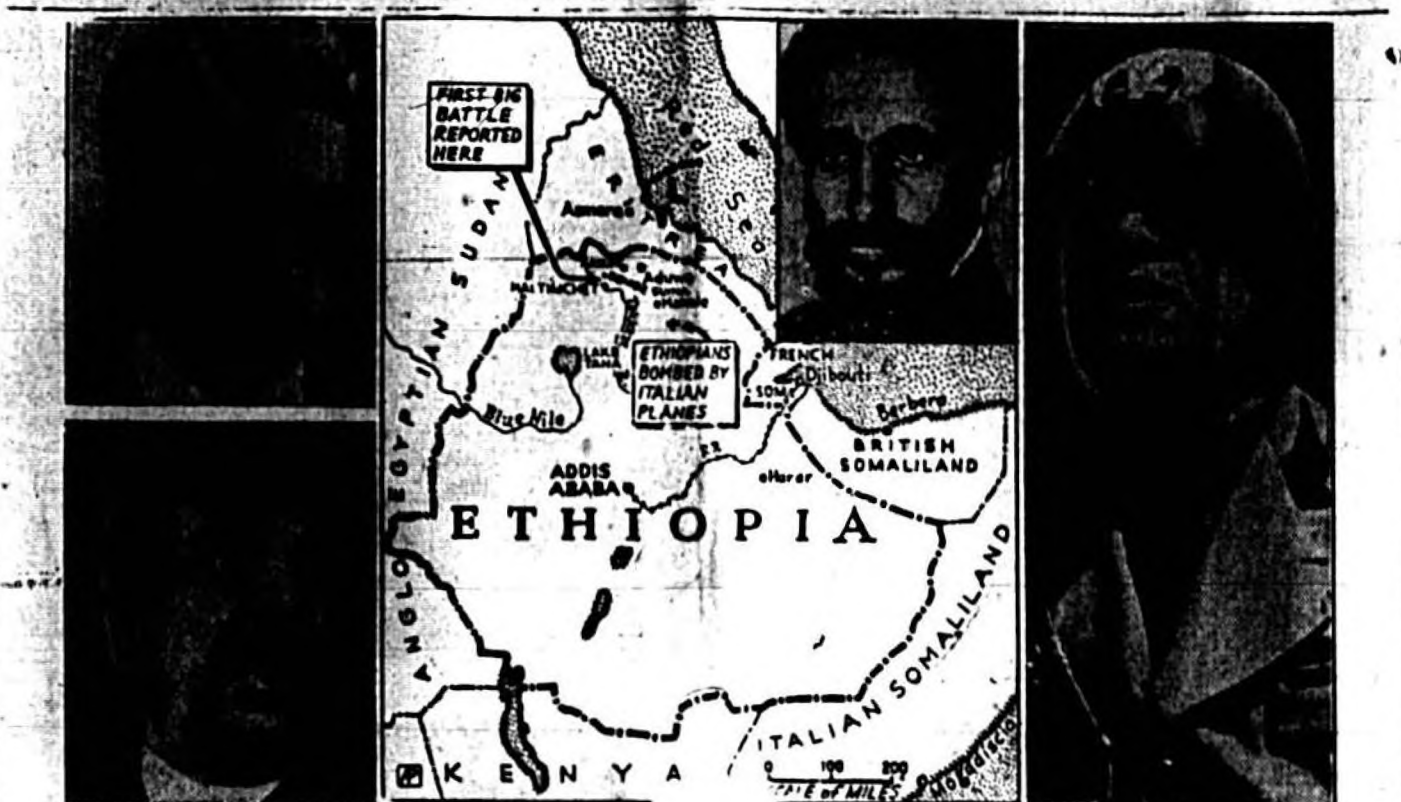
Persons wishing to write the civil service examination must apply to the civil service board of examiners, U. S. engineer office, in Ocala not later than Dec. 30.

Lower Temperatures Predicted Tonight By Meteorologists

Present low temperatures will be lower tonight, but because of cloudiness and prevailing winds there will be no danger from frost, according to the predictions of Meteorologist E. S. Ellison of the government's new crop warning service. In his telegram to County Agent C. R. Dawson this afternoon, the meteorologist stated that "both cloudiness and wind will serve to prevent a fall in temperatures to extreme low levels tonight in all parts of the district, and the lowest temperatures will be slightly above 32 degrees at all stations." He predicted the lowest temperature at 8 o'clock Friday morning.

The forecast issued from the U. S. Weather Bureau in Jacksonville at 11:23 A. M. today reads: "Partly cloudy and colder; frost if clear; below freezing in north."

261,960 Gallons Gasoline Used In County In Month

Gasoline consumption in Seminole County during the month of November totaled 261,960 gallons, even though it is one of the smallest counties in the state, according to tabulations issued today by the Department of Agriculture in Tallahassee.

The largest consumption, more than three and one-half million gallons, was in Dade county (Miami), Duval county (Jacksonville) ranked second with the consumption of slightly less than two and one-half million gallons, and Hillsboro county (Tampa) was third with the consumption of slightly more than two million gallons of gasoline.

Palm Beach, Pinellas and Polk counties each exceeded one million gallons in gasoline consumption. The total amount of gasoline burned in the state during the month was 22,469,323 gallons, exclusive of that sold to government agencies.

During the month residents of Seminole County bought 41,732 gallons of kerosene. The total amount of coal oil sold in the state in November was 2,982,231 gallons. Dade, Duval and Hillsboro counties also leading in consumption of the fuel.

Spies In Ethiopia Being Rrounded Up By Nations At War

Christmas Plea For Peace Made By King George

Millions Of Subjects On 7 Continents Hear British Ruler

SANDRINGHAM, England, Dec. 26. —Speaking over a radio hook-up that carried his voice to 500,000,000 subjects in seven continents, King George on Christmas Day praised the unity of his far-flung imperial family, and urged it to remain at peace with the rest of the world.

"It is good to think that our family of peoples is at peace in itself and united in one desire to be at peace with other nations—the friend of all, the enemy of none," he said.

Yesterday's address, one of the few which the King actually writes himself, climaxed his jubilee year. It reached approximately one-quarter of the world's population over what probably was the longest radio hook-up in history.

"I wish you all, my dear friends, a happy Christmas," the aging monarch began.

"I have been deeply touched by the greetings which in the last few minutes have reached me from all parts of the Empire. Let me in response send to each of you a greeting from myself. My words will be very simple, but spoken from the heart, on this family festival of Christmas."

"The year that is passing, the twenty-fifth since my accession, has been to me most memorable. It called for a spontaneous offering of loyalty and, I may say, of love, which the Queen and I can never forget. How could I fail to note in all the rejoicings, not merely respect for the throne, but a warm and generous remembrance of the man himself, who, may God help him, has been placed upon it.

"It is this personal link between me and my people which I value more than I can say. It binds us together in all our common joys and sorrows, as when this year you showed your happiness in the marriage of my son and your sympathy in the death of my beloved sister. I feel this link now as I speak to you. I am thinking not so much of the empire itself as of the individual men, women and children who live within it, whether they are dwelling here at home or in some distant outpost of the empire.

"In Europe and many parts of the world, anxieties surround us. It is good to think that our family of peoples is at peace in itself and united in one desire to be at peace with other nations—the friend of all, the enemy of none. May the spirit of good will and mutual helpfulness grow and mutual helpfulness grow and mutual helpfulness grow."

Sanford, Fla., Dec. 26. —(AP)—The Ethiopian government reported today its soldiers had shot down an Italian airplane at Daggah Bar. Officials reported the pilot, unidentified, was beheaded.

The Ethiopian government secret police meanwhile pressed an intensive drive against suspected Italian spies. One Greek was expelled from the country today. He was the sixth expelled on charge of espionage. Deportation is considered the supreme penalty for foreigners here, since no whites are executed in Ethiopia.

Rome also reported a roundup of spies. Military police in East Africa took 12 natives wearing Italian uniforms before a court martial. Three were turned over to a firing squad, and nine were given prison sentences.

Italian advisers said the Ethiopians were routed with heavy losses as a caravan descending to the Ethiopian salt fields was attacked by the Danakil irregulars, fighting for the Italian army.

Three Spies Sentenced ASMAR, Ethiopia, Dec. 25. —(AP)—Three Italian spies were given life terms by an Ethiopian court today. The spies were captured in Italy's colonies, were sentenced yesterday to be shot in the back.

Nine others were given sentences ranging from one to 10 years in prison.

The twelve, it was charged, went to Italian Somaliland where they got government jobs or joined the Italian army. Italian police asserted they had discovered the Ethiopians had made an agreement to procure military information for the Addis Ababa government.

The knowledge which the men had of the Italian army was the main reason for their arrest. (Continued On Page Three)

Gov. Hoffman Has No Intention Of Giving Hauptmann Reprieve

TRENTON, N. J., Dec. 25. —(AP)—Governor Harold G. Hoffman's press representative announced today that the Governor had authorized him to say that "at the present time" he did not contemplate a reprieve for Bruno Richard Hauptmann, should the Court of Pardons refuse clemency.

The announcement was made in reply to published reports that the Governor would grant Hauptmann a 30-day stay of execution if the Pardons Court fails to act. William Conklin, press representative, said Governor Hoffman told him to say, "At the present time I have no such plan in mind." Previously, the Governor had said any report of a contemplated reprieve was "unauthorized."

Hauptmann is under sentence to die in the electric chair during the week of Jan. 12.

HOT SPRINGS, Ark., Dec. 26. —One person was burned to death and an undetermined number of persons were reported missing after the burning walls of a theater collapsed and fell on a two-story brick hotel yesterday. Smoldering flames delayed search for possible victims.

Firemen several blocks away were attracted by the flames bursting through the roof of the building but the 80-foot rear wall crumbled and fell before they arrived. Fire broke out immediately in the smaller hotel building adjacent to the theater.

Four other small hotels, an electrical supply house and a number of smaller places of business were damaged. The crowded block burned for several hours.

Youth Of Italian Soldiers Shocks Ethiopian Colonel

Veteran Plans Raids By Night On Camps On Invading Foes

BY MARK HARRON
DIREDAWA, Ethiopia, Dec. 21.—(AP)—Colonel Bayna Meshal, the "grand old man" of Ethiopia's veteran warriors, is shocked by the youth of so many of the soldiers of Italy's column.

"Poor boys," he shook his gray head, as he talked before departing for his post near the Ogaden front. "These Italian youths cannot stand up to the sabre."

Col. Meshal is a veteran of many battles in Ethiopia and a every village he stopped on his way from Addis Ababa he was greeted by gray beards who had fought under him years before. They would rush to greet him, take his hands and fall on their knees to touch their foreheads to his sandals.

The old colonel was attended by a dozen natives carrying his luggage—several clubs and whips, two rifles, a large curved sabre (which he commented dryly, was "for the Italians") and a leather bag filled with heavy silver thalers, the only money accepted by natives.

"By day the Italians are masters," Col. Meshal said. "We cannot stand up to tanks and airplanes. But night is a different story."

"We will crawl like serpents among them, knives in our teeth for fangs. Then we will stab and stab. Many will not even wake up."

"It is a pity so many of the Italian soldiers are only young boys. But we must use all our strength and skill to combat their modern weapons."

A report of rain on the southern front was handed the colonel.

"That is good," he smiled. "A day of rain is worth ten tons of munitions to us. The Italians must have mobility to be effective but rain will stop their tanks. Our airplanes, their motorized guns. Rain gives us more time to prepare for them before they get into our mountains."

"We will have many surprises for them. They will not expect the mud baths we will have for their tanks. Our soldiers are digging pitfalls in the paths of the tank corps, just as you would dig a trap for a lion."

"These holes are filled with mud and soft earth, covered with sand and into them the tanks will plunge. Then our soldiers, perhaps armed only with knives and spears, will rush up and complete the work."

Col. Meshal was in command of the Ethiopian troops policing the Addis Ababa-Djibouti railway for a number of years. He speaks no English, but is fluent in French and Spanish. He proudly exhibited a letter from his 12-year-old son which ended:

"With esteem and affection, and I wish I could come to the front with you."

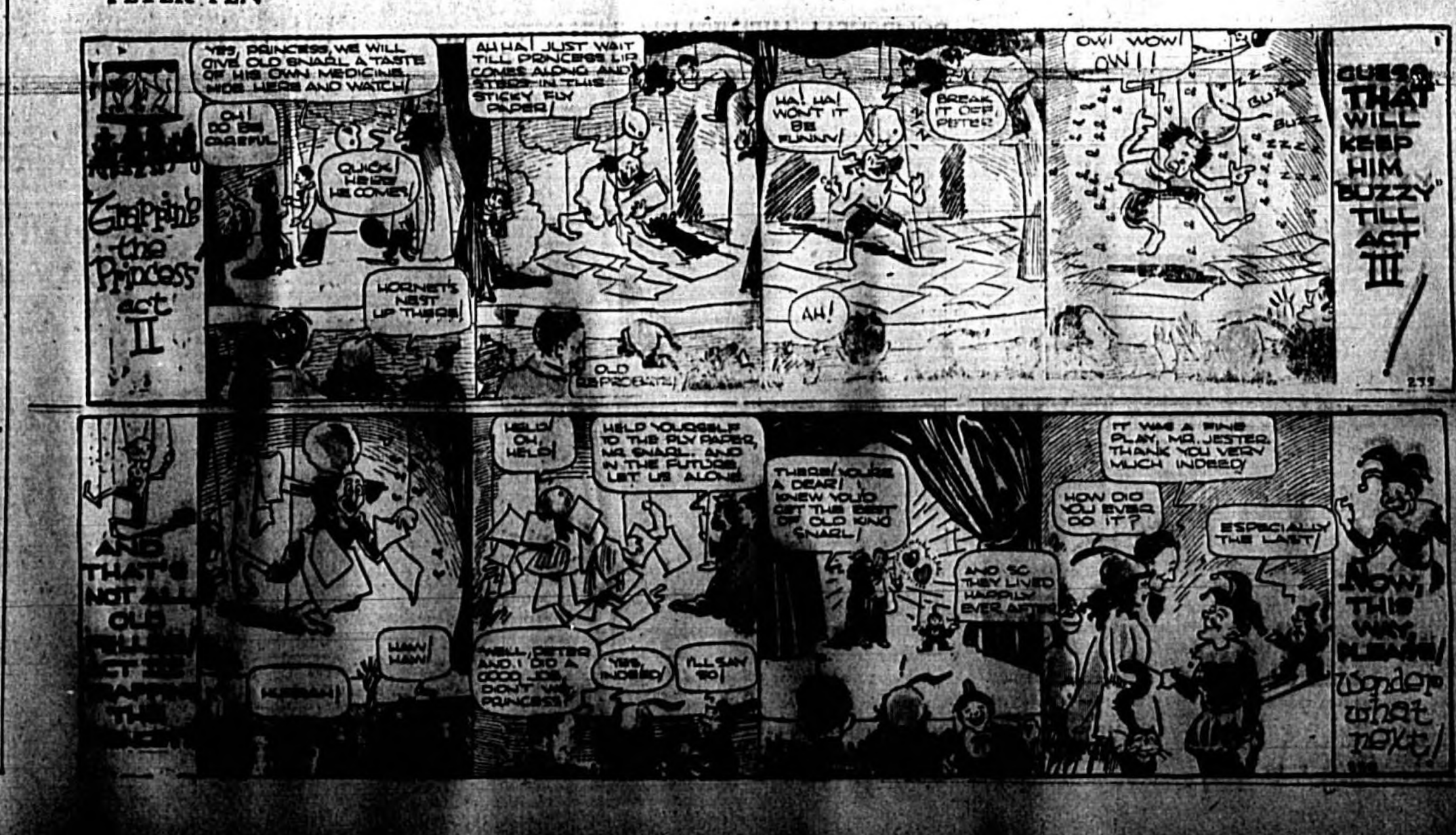

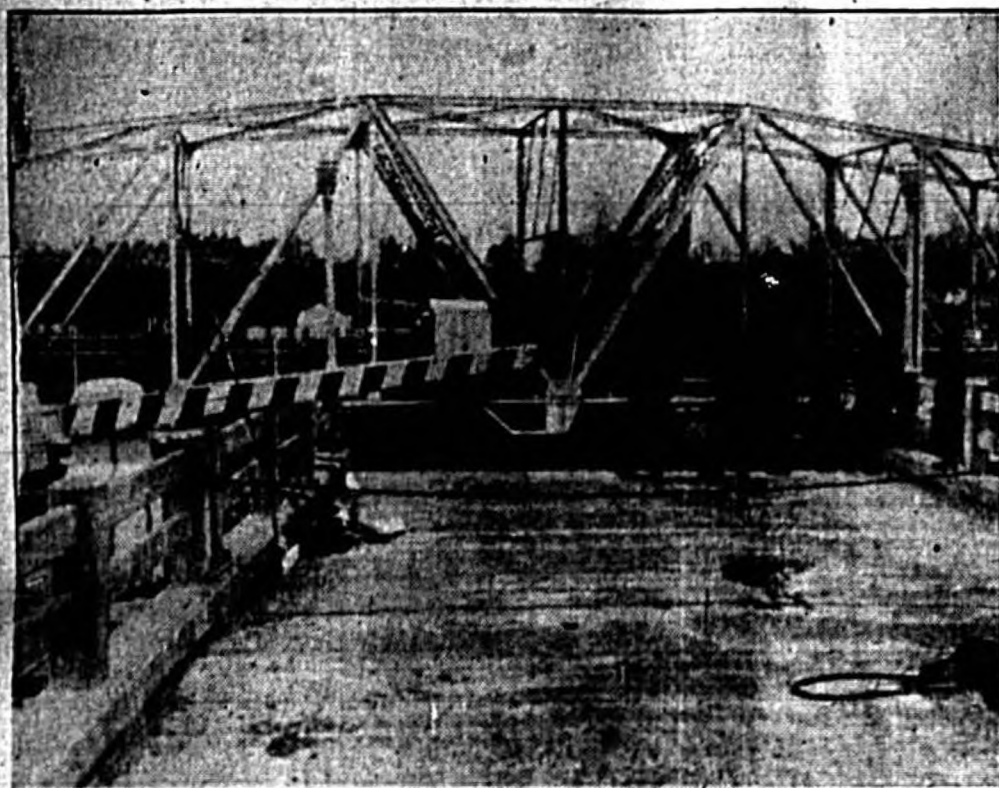

Freeze Delays at Fails To Damage Celery

Celery will be delayed by unusually low temperatures which prevailed last night, but no lasting damage is done to the crops in the Sanford and Oviedo sections, according to reports received today.

In the opinion of P. N. Whitehurst of the Standard Growers there will be little shipping of celery out of this section before Jan. 20, the "big movement" of the crop not to begin before Feb. 1. H. J. Lehman, grower of celery in some sections, said it will all come out in a few days. He said in previous years he had celery laid flat on the ground by the cold, but in a few days it all straightened up, and he would know that anything that happened to it.

C. E. Dawson, county agent, received few reports this morning, but those that had come from the office indicated that the celery crop several miles from Sanford was about 25 degrees below zero last night.

It is believed that practically all of the truck crops not destroyed by previous cold waves were wiped out by last night's freeze. Mr. Dawson stated he would not give a nickel for all the celery in the county now. He said a small patch of celery in the county had been killed last night. Mr. Dawson said that the celery in the county this year had expressed the best results possibly some of the crop had escaped the freeze.

28 States Report 200 Deaths From Latest Cold Wave

CHICAGO, Dec. 27. —(AP)—Death, resulting directly or indirectly from the widespread and record cold wave, struck down residents of 28 states which contributed to the total of approximately 200. Traffic deaths were the most numerous, 86, but 55 died from exposure.

Many sections reported the wave the coldest for many years. It being the coldest Christmas season in the history of Kentucky. Meanwhile, a new snow carpet moved out of the north-west, carrying warmer weather for frost-bitten nation. It was due to winter the same path over which the aero chill has been hanging. All but five states—California, Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Nevada—have had freezing temperatures.

Snowdrifts and ice still isolated some communities. Great South Bay, along the southern edge of Long Island, New York, is frozen over for the third time in 15 years, and coast guardmen rigged up ice accretions to carry food to families cut off from the mainland. No bread has been brought into Centerville, Maryland, since Christmas Eve, but heavy Yule stocks continued to hold out. Buses were blocked off from the South and mails could not get through. Mails are also delayed at Easton, Maryland.

115 Varieties Of Birds Found Near Sanford

Constant Increase In
Number Is Shown
By Yearly Census
For "Bird Lore"

One hundred and fourteen different kinds of birds were counted in Seminole County recently by enumerators for "Bird Lore" magazine. The 1935 census showed 96 varieties and the 1934 census listed 77 different kinds of birds in this section.

The area covered by the census enumerators extends from Sanford to the western shore of Lake Henry, including portions of the St. Johns River and the Lake Jessup marshes, and contiguous areas not exceeding 15 miles in diameter.

The different kinds of birds seen, and the number of the various varieties are as follows: Field-billed Grebe, 3; Cormorant, 4; Water Turkey, 4; Man-of-War Bird, 1 (rare in interior counties); Ward's Heron, 18; American Egret, 16; Snowy Egret, 5; Louisiana Heron, 42; Little Blue Heron, 46; Green Heron, 5; American Bittern, 1; Red-legged Black Duck, 1; Florida Duck, 4; Gallinule, 1; Pintail, 8; Green-winged Teal, 100; Blue-winged Teal, 500; Shoveler, 20; Scaup, 200; Ring-necked Duck, 2; Canvasback, 20; Hooded Merganser, 2; Turkey Vulture, 41; Black Vulture, 67; Sharp-shinned Hawk, 7; Cooper's Hawk, 1; Red-tailed Hawk, 2; Red-shouldered Hawk, 5; Broad-winged Hawk, 1; Bald Eagle, 7; Marsh Hawk, 29; Duck Hawk, 1; Sparrow Hawk, 48; Bobcat, 1.
