Assorted Breads Bran Raisin Loaf 1 cup bran flakes, 1 cup whole-wheat flour, 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 egg, beaten, 1 cup raisins, 1/2 cup molasses, 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup oil, 1/2 cup butter. Old Fashioned Nut Bread 2 cups whole-wheat flour, 2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 3/4 teaspoon baking powder, 2/3 cup broken nuts, 1/2 cup chopped dates or raisins, 1/2 cup milk, 2 tablespoons shortening, melted. Thoroughly blend ingredients and pour into waxed paper-lined loaf pan. Let stand 10 minutes and bake an hour in moderate oven (350). Never add sugar to cooking fruits until just before the sauce is done. This saves sugar. 2 tablespoons of honey can be used for sweetening a cup of dried prunes, peaches, apples or figs. Add the honey the last thing also.

But before the average citizen was aware of the necessity for such conservation. However, through the abundant use of foods not under rationing and the keeping of a strict check on

whatever scarce items are used, the Army has been able to provide a surprisingly good menu for the soldiers. Utilizing these same practices, Army "chow" will continue to be of the same high quality in the future. "Butter?" Sgt. C. J. Hocker, a man of seven years Army mess experience, said. "We serve it at only one meal a day—breakfast. You see, we have a strict allotment of five pounds for each 100 men in a three-day period. And that has to cover both cooking and table use too."

## RATIONED FOODS FROZEN ALL NEXT WEEK

According to the State Office of Price Administration, the following types of food are included in the rationing order: All canned and bottled fruits, fruit juices and combinations including apple sauce. All canned and bottled vegetables, including vegetable juices and combinations, catsup and chili sauce. Baby foods in cans and jars, including strained or chopped foods made of vegetables, fruits or meats. Canned milk, canned milk formulas and condensed, popular varieties are not to be rationed. All types and varieties of canned soups (no dehydrated soups). Dried and dehydrated fruits (prunes, raisins and others). Home canned foods and other home processed foods need not be declared.

considered. Sgt. Hocker and Lt. Daniel have been providing excellent nutritious meals that would delight both the food connoisseur and the dietitian. The current and most pressing shortage—meat—is being combated by the insertion of meatless meals at regular intervals on the menu. Bones and other seemingly useless scraps are converted into delicious soups, gravies and other dishes. There need be no doubt—the Army is working hand in hand with the civilian to help lick the Axis by conservation.



### WAR QUESTIONS and ANSWERS

1. Q. Why have shoes been rationed?  
A. Wartime demands for leather and manpower have slowed down the production of civilian shoes. More of the remaining supply is needed for our armed forces.  
2. Q. How will shoe rationing relieve the strain of reduced production?  
A. Shoe rationing will divide the supply fairly and will enable merchants to maintain reasonably adequate and balanced stocks.  
3. Q. How do I buy shoes under the ration order?  
A. Between Feb. 9 and June 15, 1943, you give your shoe merchant stamp No. 17 from War Ration Book One (the Sugar Book). This stamp will enable you to buy one pair of shoes between now and June 15.  
4. Q. Can anyone else buy a pair of shoes with my stamp No. 17?  
A. Only people who are related to you by blood, marriage, or adoption and living with you in your household. The stamps belonging to a family household can be used within the family as that household thinks best.  
5. Q. Are all kinds of shoes rationed?  
A. The ration order covers unisex shoes made in whole or in part of leather, or with rubber soles, including all ordinary types and hard-soled moccasins, casual, play, platform, and rubber soled athletic shoes.  
6. What kinds of shoes are not rationed?  
A. Waterproof rubber footwear—including rubber articles, lumberman's overs, galfers, work, storm, and dress rubbers, clogs and toe rubbers. (Ration Order No. 6 already covers nine types of men's rubber boots and rubber work shoes.)  
Soft and hard-soled house and

boondoll slippers—including scuffs, mules, dorays, romeros, operas, and soft-soled moccasins.  
Soft-soled infants' shoes and ballet slippers.  
7. Q. Are shoe repairs rationed?  
A. No, shoe repairs are not rationed.  
8. Q. How many pairs of shoes does the new ration regulation allow each person?  
A. In general, each person will be allowed one pair between Feb. 9 and June 15, 1943. Future allotments will be announced later.  
9. Q. Suppose some special circumstances make it necessary for a person to buy more than one pair of shoes between now and June 15?  
A. If your health or occupational needs are involved, state your need in writing to your War Price & Rationing Board. If your need is real, your Board will issue you a special certificate of need. Shabby shoes or shoes that can be repaired must be considered adequate for your use.

Armstrong arched his shoulders to be moved by swaying about. He could get you good with a short punch. Hank was adept at slipping punches, he'd slip one and hit you.

If Henry has retained as much of his old time stamina as Pacific Coast reports, he is liable to give Beau Jack a lesson when and if they tangle here.

But all this is just to say that this passing can't see an Armstrong-carbon copy in Jack. It just seems to get you.

He is quite a fighter. He's come a long way in a short time. From Negro battalions in Georgia to the lightweight championship in Illinois more than two years. He is still young, and can't be expected to show the tricks of the trade that the veteran triple-champ did.

Jack let it hang, had a long trainer. He is always in shape. He has plenty of courage, and he's a puncher, and can deliver a high impulse along with a jab and lightning changes will find him hard to take.

### Hopes Of France Are Revealed In Smuggled Papers

NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—The voice of fighting France came out in fighting tones every other Tuesday from an old stone mansion near the Hudson River. There a band of literary publishers, publicists and writers met to discuss the future of France.

## Red Armies Drive To Point 25 Miles North Of Taganrog

### In North, Russians Storm Onward At Rapid Clip Toward Nazi Base Of Orel

The Russian armies today slashed more than half the army through the 70-mile Nazi "escape corridor" from Rostov, driving to a point only 25 miles north of Taganrog on the Sea of Azov. Dispatches said Taganrog's lifeline was severed with the capture of Matveevskurgan on the rail line.

In the north, the Russians stormed within 30 miles of the major German base of Orel and drove on at a rapid clip beyond Kharkov.

Advancing with a speed in creating little effective opposition, the Red Army in pursuit of beaten Nazi troops in the area west of Rostov has cut the only escape railway in the front. The Russians announced in the midnight communique recorded here by the Soviet monitor.

The rail line was cut with the capture of the district center of Matveevskurgan, 25 miles north of Rostov. Although it was not immediately clear from which direction the victorious Russians came, it was entirely possible that large forces of Germans were trapped by the stroke.

The Russians have been operating both north and east of Matveevskurgan, and the town could have been taken from either direction. If the Soviet forces came down from the north, the trapped Germans might be counted in great numbers probably less if the Russians advanced from the east.

Even in the latter case, however, observers believed sizeable Nazi groups might well be caught in the Taganrog area.

Communications dealt with had succeeded in the areas north and northwest of Rostov, indicating the Soviet armies were quickly cutting into the Germans retreating from this great area.

Elsewhere the Russians were still closer to the Nazi stronghold of Orel, at the north end of the new active front. The communique reported the capture of the railway town and district center of Zalesoschen, only 30 miles east of Orel, Verkhnyaya Sosna, 46 miles southwest of Orel, and Pokrovskoye, 10 miles south-east of the stronghold.
