**U. S. Army Plans  
Further Steps To  
Conserve Foods**

ORLANDO, Feb. 18. (Special)—With point rationing soon to go into effect for the civilian population, the United States Army is planning further steps toward food not under rationing and food conservation within the service, to augment its present whatever scarce items are used, measures already in force against the Army has been able to provide a surprisingly good menu for the soldiers. Utilizing these same practices, Army "chow" will continue to be of the same high quality in the future.

Lieutenant R. C. L. Hocker, a man of several years Army experience, said: "We have at only one meal a day—breakfast. You see, we have a strict allotment of five pounds for each 100 men in a three-day period. And that has to cover both cooking and table use too."

And coffee, that product accessible in any restaurant?

"We have to watch that too. It's kept down to a daily ration of five and four-tenths pounds daily for each 100 men."

Squeaking of sugar which is so necessary in the manufacture of high explosives, the sergeant said: "The use of sugar is confined to about three and one third ounces a day for each man. And like butter, this must cover both table and cooking use. In the latter respect it must be considered that unlike the civilian, we cannot buy cake, pie, desserts that already contain sugar, but we either must consume a portion of our sugar in cooking these types of foods."

## Red Armies Drive To Point 25 Miles North Of Taganrog

In North, Russians Storm Onward At Rapid Clip Toward Nazi Base Of Orel

UPI ASSOCIATED PRESS  
The Russian armies today dashed more than half the army through the 70-mile Nazi "escape corridor" from Rostov, driving to a point only 25 miles north of Taganrog on the Sea of Rostov. Dispatches said Taganrog's lifeline was severed with the capture of Matveevkurgan on the rail line.

In the north, the Russians stormed within 30 miles of the major German base of Orel and drove at a rapid clip beyond Khar'kov.

Advancing with a speed in during little effective opposition, the Red Army in pursuit of beaten Nazi troops in the north had driven 150 miles since the victoryous Russians came, it was entirely possible that large forces of Germans were captured by the stroke.

The Russian forces had been advancing both north and east of Matveevkurgan, and the town could have been taken from either direction. If the Soviet forces came down from the north the trapped Germans might be counted in great numbers, probably less than the Russians advanced on the rail line.

Even in the latter case, however, observers believed sizable Nazi groups might well be caught

in Taganrog, where the Communists dealt with Red successes in the areas north and northwest of Rostov, indicating the Soviet armies were quickly cutting into the Germans retreating from this great area.

Elsewhere the Russians were moving in still closer to the Nazi stronghold of Orel, at the north end of the now active front. The communists reported the capture of the railway town and district center of Zalegushchik, only 30 miles west of Orel, between Salsk, 40 miles southeast of Orel, and Pekovskoye, 10 miles south of the stronghold.
