

England Beach Riots Stop

LONDON (UPI) - England's seaside towns returned to an uneasy peace today following the invasion this weekend of rival youth gangs who fought running battles on the beaches in the second major outburst of mob violence in a week. Police leaves were canceled in the northern resort of

Scarborough where roadblocks ringed the town and a special magistrate's court was created to deal with the aftermath of Easter weekend rioting. Authorities could give no explanation for the disturbances except to say the youths "just wanted a confrontation with us." The gangs of mods, rockers

and punks apparently battle each other, but unite to fight intervening police.

Blast Kills 4 In Greece

ATHENS, Greece (UPI) - Four people died and three others were seriously injured in an illegal holiday fireworks explosion on the eastern Aegean island of Kalymnos, police said today.

A police spokesman said a group of islanders, using explosives from World War II mines lifted from the seabed, had made more than 1,000 fireworks for a traditional, but illegal Easter celebration on the island "They were throwing them around on the hillside above the port when someone hurled one into the waiting pile (of fireworks)," the spokesman said. "It exploded and blew them to bits."

Angry Words Iraq, Iran Bare Teeth; Region In State Of Alert

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) - Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, fueling fires that threatened to break into open war, urged Iraq's army today to "join the people" and overthrow the regime of President Saddam Hussein.

At the same time, the English language newspaper Arab Times in Kuwait said the entire Gulf region had gone into a state of alert because of speculation the United States might bomb oil fields in southern Iran.




The Tale Of Two Governors

The recent primaries in Wisconsin and Kansas turned out to be an important chapter in the 1980 presidential campaign. This episode might be entitled "The Tale of Two Governors" because Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. was the big loser and Gov. Ronald Reagan, the big

President Carter, true enough, managed a landslide victory over his chief challenger, Sen. Edward Kennedy, and confirmed that his losses to Kennedy recently in the New York and Connecticut primaries were momentary dips along In The Debt the road to his renomination, just as his campaign managers had predicted. But the startling defection of so many Democratic and independent voters in Wisconsin's crossover primary has raised some doubts about how much the Democratic presidential nomination will be worth

in November. Although Brown promised to fight all the way to the convention hall — or at least as long as he had a breath left in his body or a dollar in his pocket — Hubert J. Hintgen. he finally concluded that the voters simply weren't prepared for his campaign to "protect the earth, serve the people, explore the universe." That Brown should speak of his presidential candidacy as not being "ready for 1980" suggests other tries in other years, perhaps in the Orwellian fullness of 1984. This could well be. Having tasted the glory as well as the gall of national politics, Brown may now find California too small, its problems too tiresome. And this is the potential tragedy of Brown. Like the dog in Aesop's fable surely is one of the most embarrassing that dropped a juicy bone to jump after the operations being conducted by the governreflection of a larger one in the water. Brown has forsaken reality, where he could have made an enduring contribution as an innovative leader in debt. 





County Administrator Roger Neiswender was directed to draft a letter to the city manager stating that the correct date for termination of the

War Of Words Militants: Hostages Could Die

By United Press International The Islamic militants holding the 50 American hostages in the U.S. Embassy in Tehran today threatened to kill all the captives if the United States takes military action against

"We warn the American government with all frankness that if it launched a military aggression against Iran, we shall immediately kill all the hostages," the militants said in a statement broadcast by Tehran Radio, monitored in Kuwait. The threat came two days after the United States severed diplomatic relations with Iran and imposed a trade embargo. There were growing indications Washington was considering a naval blockade or some other military action should the reprisals not work and the hostages remain held.

The militants said the safety of the hostages, now in their 158th day of captivity, was in the hands of the "criminal" Carter administration. In an earlier statement, they said Washington's decision to

break relations with Iran was a "blessing because these rela-

tions were the root of trouble." Iran hinted Tuesday that it take new anti-U.S. steps because of the sanctions imposed by President Carter, and warned

American allies their flow of Iranian oil would stop if they backed Washington.
