##### Union Threatens Strike Of NYC

SYRACUSE, N. Y. (UPI) — Michael W. Herr, strike chairman of the railroad trainmen on the New York Central Railroad east of Buffalo said today that as far as he is concerned the presidential agreement between the unions and railroad management is not satisfactory and that the trainmen would strike the Central at 12:01 a. m., EST, Saturday.

Herr said a strike would threaten Boston, New York and Philadelphia.

Herr said, regardless of the terms, the unions have taken a beating in the way government pressure was applied to bring an agreement and that "collective bargaining has taken a blow."

Neil P. Speirs, head of the switchmen's union, headquartered in Buffalo, said in Washington that the treaty was a "balanced agreement." Speirs indicated that the switchmen would be asked to ratify the pact when specific details are drawn up.

### Kelly Assails Cost Of Road Consultants

State Sen. Scott Kelly charged today that the past two administrations have been wasteful in paying out millions of dollars for road consultants.

In a speech to supporters at Miami, Kelly said "Millions have been paid out in consultant fees in the present and just previous administrations. The money has been wasted because some of the projects became obsolete."

Miami Mayor Albert King High was in Coral Gables, just outside Miami, talking to a realtors' meeting.

"Votes are more important than dollars. If you believe that principles are more important than huge war chests of some candidates who are buying their way to Tallahassee, then I believe you should vote for me."

High also cited his record as mayor of Miami during four terms, and repeated promises to cut out wasteful spending at the state level.

Wednesday High blasted the reappointment plans of three opponents: Fred Dickinson, Sen. John Mathews and Jacksonville Mayor Haydon Burns.

### House Approves Arms Money Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House has approved unanimously a \$4.7 billion defense money bill providing all that President Johnson asked plus unrequested funds for development of a new bomber.

House passage by a vote of 365-0 Wednesday sent the measure to the Senate where action must wait until the end of the civil rights battle, possibly in late May or early June.

The House action came after two days of debate, during which members argued bitterly on only one point—a controversial 35-65 per cent split between private and naval shipyards in assignment of Navy repair and conversion work.

Chairman Carl Vinson, D-Ga., of the armed services committee argued in vain that the required allotment to private shipyards was jeopardizing the Navy's own yards.

### 'Phone Barrier' Tour Made By State Official

Seminole County's "telephone barrier" was studied Wednesday by Wilkins Linhart, utility engineer of the Florida Public Utilities Commission. He said he will report his findings to the Commission.

Linhart, guided on his tour of South Seminole County by J. O. (Jess) Gregory, conferred with James P. Avery Jr., chairman of the County Commission; Harold Decker, Fern Park-Casselberry Chamber of Commerce, and Morris Ruby, English Estates School principal.

Linhart discussed his findings and possible future telephone action with Karyle Housholder, president of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce.

Before departing from Sanford for his home in Fruitland Park, Linhart said he was "amazed at both the extent and the quality of new developments in the area south of Sanford." He further predicted that when the telephone barrier is lifted the volume of cross-country calls will multiply by a factor of five to six. He based his estimate on past experiences with similar problems in other like circumstances.

Some of the South Seminole areas visited included Howell Park, English Estates, Tanglewood, Oakland Shores, Florida Haven, Altamonte Springs, Bretton Wood, Casselberry, Longwood and Lake Mary.

### Rail Accord Hailed As Victory For LBJ

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Members of Congress "praised settlement of the long-standing railroad dispute today as a triumph for collective bargaining and a personal victory for President Johnson."

Sen. Paul H. Douglas, D-Ill., said: "A great victory for the American people, for collective bargaining, and a great tribute to the persistence of the President."

Both Republicans and Democrats hailed the agreement removing the threat of a nationwide strike. There was no speculation of the political effect of the development in an election year.

But legislators expressed candid relief that the touchy issue would not be dumped back in their laps so close to national elections. Only last August, Congress passed the first peacetime compulsory arbitration bill in history to block a rail walkout.

Sen. Kenneth B. Keating, R-N.Y., said: "We are all indebted to the President for his work and perseverance."

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., said: "I think the President has performed the impossible and come up with a miracle. I couldn't be happier that this is now off the minds of all of us."

Senate Democratic Whip Hubert H. Humphrey, Minn., lauded the railroads and unions for "demonstrating

### VAH-5 Pilots Pass Carrier Landing Tests

The Navy's first unit to fly the new RA-5C Vigilante reconnaissance bomber continues operations at the Sanford Naval Air Station this week as a weekend in which the first carrier operations.

The Navy announced today that all pilots assigned to Sanford's Heavy Attack Squadron Five (VAH-5) completed the required day and night arrested landings during carrier qualifications aboard the USS Saratoga off the coast of Florida last week.

This is a Navy prerequisite for every pilot prior to an extended operation at sea involving flight from an aircraft carrier deck.

VAH-5, the first fleet squadron to fly the twin-jet RA-5C, is scheduled for deployment to the Western Pacific aboard the USS Ranger this summer. The "Carquals" were, in effect, a final exam for the VAH-5 fliers.

Aside from carrier suitability tests, conducted by the Naval Aviation Test Center two weeks earlier, this was the first time that the aircraft had been operated from a carrier deck.

The Sanford pilots were praised by supervising commanders, including Rear Adm. Robert Goldthwaite, Commander Fleet Air Jacksonville.

Meanwhile, Sanford's training arm, Heavy Attack Squadron Three (VAH-3), was qualifying pilots for duty with subsequent RA-5C equipped squadrons.

Currently undergoing instruction in VAH-3 are flight crews and support personnel from VAH-5, which is scheduled to receive its first RA-5C this week.

A third squadron, VAH-1, currently has men in training for its transition from the A-1A (attack) version of the Vigilante to the more advanced RA-5C later this year.

NICOSIA, Cyprus (UPI) — Hopes for conciliation on Cyprus dimmed today with the angry Turkish Cypriot rejection of President Makarios' peace plan that called for a general amnesty.

United Nations peace force officials feared the dominant Greek Cypriots headed by Makarios might now use more forceful means to eliminate Turkish Cypriot resistance. Makarios implied a threat against the Turks when he proposed his three-point plan Wednesday.



## Bryant Heckled During Speech

NEW YORK (UPI)—Florida presented a dazzling show of porpoises, parrots and life-size beach scenes to World's Fair visitors today, but raw Yankee weather and civil rights demonstrations marred its premiere.

"A dream made into reality" was how Gov. Farris Bryant described the \$3.8 million layout of six pavilions, but he had to make his speech opening the Showcase over the chants and freedom songs of the demonstrators.

One demonstrator, a husky white youth, watched the formal opening from atop a 70-foot concrete pillar supporting the roof of the open-air amphitheater where porpoises will frolic 10 times a day for the estimated 18 million visitors to the Florida complex during its two-summer run.

When the pole-sitter came down, he was quickly gathered in by New York City police and carried off along with some two dozen other members of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE), which made Florida one of its targets at the opening of the World's Fair.

The pickets, nearly 100 of them, were on hand early in the day, walking in a circle in the patio area of the Florida complex and staging a sit-down across the entrance to the main pavilion.

One of the governor's party, state Game and Fish Commission member Lee E. Lawlor, removed five or six of the sitters bodily in order to get through the door. He was taunted by shouts of "You're not in Florida now... Why didn't you bring your dogs?"

When Bryant and other state officials arrived at the

fairgrounds in the morning for a preview of the Florida layout one group of pickets shouted at him, "Jim Crow must go — Governor Bryant must go." Bryant ignored the taunt.

## Homemakers Corner

By Mrs. H. L. Johnson

I have tried several recipes this past week which were sent to me from Mississippi and every one of them was just wonderful. Here is one of them.

### HAMBURGER DUMPLINGS

1 lb. ground meat  
1/2 cup fine crumbs  
2 tbsps. chopped onion  
1 tsp. salt  
1/4 tsp. pepper  
1/2 cup catsup

Open one can of prepared frozen biscuits (or make a pie crust if desired). Roll biscuits flat. Combine all ingredients. Place about 1/2 cup of meat filling in center of each flattened biscuit. Moisten edges with milk and bring together. Place in shallow pan. Bake in hot oven about one hour or until pastry (biscuits) are well baked. Serve dumplings with a flavorful tomato or creole sauce.

### I also tried this BEEF STEAK IN CASSEROLE. It is a meal in one.

1 lb. round steak  
4 small onions  
4 medium potatoes  
1 can English peas  
2 tbsps. butter  
2 tbsps. salt  
1/2 tsp. pepper

Trim meat and cut in pieces for serving. Melt butter in frying pan and add onion cut in small pieces. Fry until a light brown and turn into casserole. Add a little water to frying pan to rinse out and pour this over onions. Rub fry pan with fat cut from meat and sear meat quickly on both sides. Put into baking dish on top of onion. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Add potatoes cut into slices placing them around the edge of the dish, and filling the center with peas. Cover and bake 2 hours in oven set at 250 degrees.

### And these APRICOT COOKIES. Delicious.

Cream:  
1 cup sugar  
1/2 cup shortening  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1/4 tsp. lemon flavoring

Add:  
2 eggs  
1 cup raw dried apricots chopped up

Sift together:  
2 1/2 cups flour  
1 tsp. soda  
2 tbsps. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt

Add to creamed mixture and mix thoroughly. Drop by teaspoons on lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake 10 to 15 minutes in 350 degree oven or until done.

### Mrs. Mary Lemon calls this CHIP CHOP PUDDING.

Take 4 slices of bread, cut into little squares. Put 2 cups milk in sauce pan with 2 tbsps. butter; add the chopped up bread. Slightly beat 3 eggs and add 1/2 cup of sugar and 1 tsp. salt to egg mixture. Mix up and then stir slowly into sauce pan of bread, milk and butter. Then add 1 tsp. vanilla and 1/2 cup of chocolate chips and nuts. Pour into casserole and pop into oven at 325 degrees for 45 minutes. Serve warm with whipped cream or half and half cream.

### Use that head of cabbage in this THIRTY BELOW COLD SLAW.

1 pkg. (8 oz.) pineapple gelatin  
1 cup boiling water  
juice of 1 lemon  
1 8-oz. can crushed pineapple undrained  
1/2 cup mayonnaise  
1 pkg. salad dressing mix  
2 cups finely chopped cabbage  
1 tbsp. finely chopped green pepper

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add lemon juice, pineapple, mayonnaise and salad dressing mix. Beat with beaters until thoroughly blended. Chill until slightly thickened. Fold in cabbage and green

### pepper. Turn into 8-inch square pan and chill until firm. To serve, cut into squares and top with mayonnaise. Serves 9.

### From the National Dairy Council we received these DOZEN DOLLAR STRETCHERS and my can we use those extra dollars, too.

1. Add bits of snappy cheese to chopped cooked vegetables heated with milk to make a tasty satisfying soup. Bits of leftover meat taste good too.
2. Serve macaroni and cheese for a main dish and add bits of leftover green vegetables or meat, or hard cooked eggs to the mixture.
3. Use cheese sauce or cream sauce for leftover meat and vegetables. Serve over toast or rice.
4. Use ground beef in loaves, patties, meat balls and in meat sauce over spaghetti. Serve creamed dried beef over boiled or baked potatoes.
5. Buy less expensive cuts of meat to cook slowly, using some liquid, as with a pot roast.
6. Choose beef, lamb or pork liver instead of calves liver.
7. Brown eggs may be less expensive than white but have the same nutritive value.
8. Use dried beans and peas in casserole dishes with tomatoes and ground beef or pork.
9. Use tomato juice instead of orange juice at times.
10. Buy fresh fruits and vegetables in season if they are less expensive than frozen or canned.
11. Use leftover vegetable juices to flavor soup; use leftover juices from canned fruits in gelatin and fruit sauces for cake or ice cream.
12. Split leftover biscuits or rolls, butter or sprinkle with cheese and brown under broiler.

### er. Refreshen slightly stale bread by toasting.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson, buoyed by his triumph in averting a nationwide rail strike, held out hope today for lasting labor peace in the strife-torn railroad industry.

The President announced settlement of the 4½-year-old railroad work rules dispute in a radio-television address Wednesday night—little more than 46 hours before the scheduled shutdown of the nation's vast rail network was to begin.

The settlement came on the 13th day of the 15-day truce that the Chief Executive had arranged so he and a special team of federal mediators could try to get a negotiated agreement. The crisis had developed when a surprise strike against the Illinois Central Railroad threatened to spread into a national walk-out.

Johnson forecast continued economic advances now that the threat of a national transportation tieup was removed by the rail agreement.

Union sources said the settlement, which still must be ratified by rank-and-file members of the five operating brotherhoods, was a "pretty good deal." Observers said the railroads were not happy with the terms but felt they were the best they could get and avoid a crippling strike.

It was believed to be the first labor-management agreement worked out under such close White House scrutiny since President Harry S. Truman's time.

Johnson declared it was "just and fair." He said it would allow modernization and still take account of human problems created by technological progress.

## Prayer Amendment Is Pushed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A New Hampshire congressman said today the Supreme Court apparently believed Americans "are getting so big for their britches that they don't need God in their public institutions."

Rep. Louis C. Wyman, R-N.H., sharply attacked high court decisions outlawing prayer and Bible-reading as part of regular public school programs and called on Congress to reverse their effect.

Appearing before the House Judiciary Committee at the second day of hearings on 147 prayer measures, Wyman urged support of a proposed Constitutional amendment that would establish the right of all persons to either participate or decline to take part in prayers and Bible reading in schools or other public places.

The New Hampshire con-

gressman brought to the committee petitions bearing the names of 16,000 persons from Ohio and Kentucky in support of his legislation. He said the 1962 and 1963 court decisions on prayers "as in several decisions relating to investigation of communism" have "tortured out of all proper proportion and perspective the simple English meaning of the Constitution."

Wyman said belief in God was the "single difference" between communism and "the Christian-Judaeic tenets of our system," and Congress should see to it that the difference was maintained.

"To leave prayer exercises solely in the home or in the church is to mean that for many children there will be no prayers at all and no exposure to prayer, but unfortunately too many parents are too busy, too disinterested or outright disinclined," he said.

"It is important in this world that we in the United States be on God's side. The Supreme Court prayer decisions do not help in this objective." The committee returned to work with some members still smarting over what they took to be implications in Wednesday's testimony that they might be "anti-God."

# Plane 'Incidents'

Another unarmed American plane, a reconnaissance bomber this time, has been shot down over East Germany. Happily, its three crewmen parachuted to safety.

Not so lucky were the three aboard an unarmed trainer shot down six weeks before, also over East Germany. Their deaths made a total of 80 American killed since 1950 in incidents involving U.S. planes and Iron Curtain territory.

Such "incidents" make headlines for a time. Then, except for the friends and families of those immediately involved, they apparently are forgotten and the dead written off as cold war casualties.

If the war stays cold, it is because the heat generated at the friction points where the two systems

rub against one another is allowed to dissipate, even if that heat consumes a few human lives.

We are told that this is the reality of our time. But that does not make it easy to accept. So we put aside patriotism and righteous indignation and seize upon excuses: The planes did violate borders; the Russians apparently did give them fair warning; the latest plane was designed for photo reconnaissance; survey of their domains is an extremely raw nerve in the Russian make-up.

We try to understand but, fundamentally and ultimately, we cannot. We can only hope that somehow these deaths will be redeemed, not by revenge but by building a world where such things no longer happen.

# Little White Lies

The well-known tendency of the gals to skip just a little bit when telling their ages is costing the government money. (In all fairness, male fibbing is just as frequent — well, almost.)

It seems that this desire to appear younger than we are results in what demographers call "age heaping," and this raises a hob with their population charts. That is, ages tend to congregate around certain numbers when it is obvious that people aren't born in clumps like that.

Armed with a \$13,700 grant from the National Science Foundation, Prof. Melvin Zelink of Ohio State University will attempt to ascertain

the amount of age heaping in the nonwhite population in censuses from 1880 to 1960. The professor previously completed a similar study of the white population.

He found that people tend to give their ages in numbers ending in zero or five. He estimates that about 33 percent of white females who reported themselves to be 40 years old in the 1890 census were actually some other age. (It's a safe assumption that it was not a lower age.)

But in the 1960 census, Prof. Zelink found extremely heavy heaping on age 59. Seems a lot of people didn't like to admit they were born in the last century.



# Democrats Changing Tune

WASHINGTON — Administration Democrats are publicly and privately changing their tune about the significance of Alabama's strong showing in the recent Wisconsin Presidential primary.

Wisconsin Governor John Reynolds, running as a "favorite son" stand-in for President Johnson, won that election by a 2-1 margin. Wallace, running as a state's rights segregationist, came in third. But he received one-third of all the votes cast, an impressive number for a stranger from the South to win in the North.

Senate Whip Hubert Humphrey, floor leader for the Johnson civil rights bill now pending, belittled Wallace when the returns came in.

"Governor Wallace's effort was a flop, f-l-o-p," Humphrey announced. "In most Midwest states if you put your name on the party ballot you get 25 per cent of the vote, dead or alive."

Another favorite-son candidate, Senator Daniel Brewster, whom Wallace has challenged in the Maryland Presidential primary on May 19,

at once declared after a rapid check around his state, "Governor Wallace has far more strength than we had anticipated. I now believe that he will make quite a substantial showing."

And pro-civil rights liberals in the Senate now concede that if Wallace runs strong in Maryland, and before that in the May 3 Indiana Presidential primary where he is also entered, it will be difficult to beat modifying amendments to the civil rights bill which will be on the Senate floor at that time.

Senate Republican Leader Everett Dirksen of Illinois thinks that Wallace's showing in Wisconsin won support for the "corrective amendments" he favors, particularly to the fair employment practices section of the bill. Those who side with him contend that the unexpected support for Wallace in Wisconsin was a protest vote against the movement toward racial equality, especially in housing. There are few Negroes in Wisconsin, but recently the number has increased greatly in Milwaukee where Negroes are moving in-

to previously all-white neighborhoods.

Dirksen and his supporters would interpret a substantial vote for Wallace in Indiana and Maryland as added evidence of a public desire to go slow on the road to equal rights. Undoubtedly their case would be strengthened with those Senators now listed on the tally sheets of both parties as "undecided" on the civil rights bill as it now stands.

Certainly with this group a Wallace show of strength in other Northern states would be more persuasive than another Southern filibuster as reason for compromising the present bill.

Signs are that the foes of the bill understand this fact of Senate life. The Wallace campaigns in Indiana and Maryland will evidently be as well financed as was his blitz in Wisconsin. There he spent heavily on television, radio and newspaper advertising including two half-hours of prime TV time in Milwaukee.

A big vote for Wallace in the May Presidential primary can mean votes for the Dirksen limitations on the civil rights bill in the Senate.

# Political Notebook

WASHINGTON — (NEA) — Now comes a man to say that the picture of Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge as a vice-presidential nominee who afternoon-napped his way through the 1960 campaign is completely false.

He is Vincent O'Brien, presently news editor of the Lynn (Mass.) Item, who was Lodge's press secretary in that campaign. He traveled with the candidate for 40,000 miles through 30 states.

Reading constant comment from politicians and others on Lodge's reported midday snoozing, O'Brien, his patience evaporated, speaks up: "I hate to see the history of the 1960 campaign distorted . . . The fact of the matter is that Lodge did not sleep in the afternoons."

Yet it is true, he says, that the ambassador did not pursue an endless round of campaign stops from dawn to midnight. He was, in fact, unavailable during part of every working day.

"He thought it was a lot of nonsense to spend every waking hour shaking hands. To him, Nixon and Kennedy and Johnson were frenetic in their campaigning."

"He decided at the beginning that he would campaign mornings and afternoons, mornings and evenings, afternoons and evenings, but never all three on a given day."

How did Lodge spend his "free time" during the day? According to O'Brien, he used it steadily for talks with his staff, for strategy planning, for preparation of major speeches. Adds his former press aide: "He took very little time off. I still have in hand his daily campaign schedules hour by hour. Anybody who would read them over could see he did not have much time for napping."

Lodge's defender does not say that the candidate never stretched out on a bed in working hours.

"Sure, there were times when he would hit a town at 5:30, take a shower, lie down for a bit, have a steak and then be ready to go for the evening rally."

"But the two-hour nap in the middle of the afternoon is a myth."

O'Brien says most of the "specific cases" which purport to document Lodge's leisurely campaigning never occurred as now reported.

There is one about his supposedly ducking out on five speaking engagements to take his wife, Emily, for a look at Niagara Falls.

O'Brien's version: The ambassador arrived in Niagara Falls at 4:30 p. m. after a long swing that began in Atlantic City and took him through several upstate New York towns. He showered and dined, had some photographs taken, then went to the evening meeting. Only after that, late in the evening, did Lodge say:

"Let's unwind a bit. Let's take a look at the falls." The 1960 nominee is also supposed to have canceled five of seven appearances in Kansas City. A visitor claims he barged into his hotel suite to find Lodge "lolling in a chair in his bathrobe, watching a movie on television." Says O'Brien:

"Frankly, I don't think he has ever seen a movie on television. I don't think he ever watched anything but the news and the big debates of 1960. As for canceling out, the fact is we had only one scheduled stop in Kansas City and we kept it."

O'Brien thinks most of the "nap stories" arise from the irritation of local leaders who were frustrated in their attempts to "overschedule" Lodge when he hit their territory. He believes, too, that the "myth of the afternoon nap" has now spread like a contagion to politicians who had not the slightest evidence of how Henry Cabot Lodge spent his afternoons when he was not with them.

# Could Have Been A Play

UPI Foreign News Analyst At the Auschwitz war-time trial, Frankfurt—it could have been a play, perhaps entitled, "The Trial."

And the 22 men, sitting off to the left of the blue-draped stage, some punchy, some bald, some with eye glasses, could have been an occasional bored audience of respectable businessmen just passing middle age.

A bit of all these elements are present here in the high-calling auditorium of Frankfurt's new community house, not yet quite completed.

For this courtroom drama, the atmosphere is coolly functional, as functional as the Auschwitz crematoriums and gas chambers which these 22 men are accused of operating for the benefit of Adolf Hitler's "purification" of the German race. . . 2.5 million to 4.5 million victims. . . four crematoriums each capable of disposing of the bodies of 8,

000 victims at once. . . The "squirr" . . . "dusting out the barracks" . . . the "Hoger" "Swing" . . .

These are phrases and figures grimly familiar now at West Germany's largest war crimes trial. In the years since West Germany received a status just short of sovereignty, its courts have sentenced more than 5,000 war criminals.

More than a dozen similar trials will be held between now and May 8, 1965, the date 20 years after the war when all war crimes not yet under investigation, including murder, must pass into limbo.

Numbers, if they are large enough, can surpass reasonable understanding. Repetition dulls the mind to horror.

But here the horror of Auschwitz comes alive again. The "squirr," mentioned almost casually by a defendant, was the hypodermic needle which killed some victims be-

fore methods became more efficient. "Dusting out the barracks" meant mass extermination to make way for more victims. The "Hoger swing" was a technique developed by Wilhelm Hoeger to beat prisoners. "I always quit when blood began trickling down the prisoner's pants. . ."



### Elimination Of Traffic Hazard Program's Aim

An emergency \$120,000 street paving program "to remove a critically dangerous safety problem" was approved by the City and County Commissions in joint session this morning.

The approved paving plan will bring about elimination of traffic hazards on 13th Street and on Southwest Road.

City of Sanford, which previously had announced plans for improving 13th Street, said it will widen, install storm sewers and catch basins, pave the street, install curbing and sidewalks from French Avenue to Crooms High School.

This program will cost an estimated \$70,000. City engineers have been instructed to commence drafting plans for the project. This planning and stockpiling of necessary materials is expected to require 60-90 days, when actual construction will be started.

The Southwest Road project will follow, with the County bearing 75 per cent of the cost and the City bearing the other 25 per cent. This project will extend from 13th Street to Country Club Road.

County engineers estimated the cost will run about \$50,000 for paving, storm sewers and catch basins, curbing and sidewalks.

The following statement was released at the conclusion of the joint Commissioners' meeting this morning:

"Both Commissions have jointly agreed to remove a critically dangerous safety problem presently existing on West 13th Street, from French Avenue to Crooms Academy and Southwest Road from 13th Street to 46A. The joint Commissioners were in agreement on the vitally needed project.

"It was further agreed that construction would commence at the intersection of 13th Street and French Avenue and proceed from that point to the ultimate completion of the project — the completion date expected to be in the Fall of 1965. Actual construction will not commence for 60 days in order that engineering and planning and stockpiling of materials can be accomplished.

"It was further agreed that portion of the project of 13th Street from French Avenue to Crooms will be constructed by City forces while Southwest Road from 13th to 46A will be constructed by County forces."

## VAH-9 Gets Its First RA-5C's

Heavy Attack Squadron Nine (VAH-9) today received its first needle-nosed RA-5C Vigilante, as the Navy began equipping its second squadron for global deployment with the new twin-jet reconnaissance bomber.

The squadron held brief acceptance ceremonies at the Sanford Naval Air Station this morning.

Commander James L. Shipman, VAH-9, Commanding Officer, accepted the aircraft in behalf of his 270 officers and men. His squadron joins VAH-5, also Sanford-based, as the second unit to be equipped for extended sea deployment of the RA-5C. VAH-5 is scheduled for deployment to the Western Pacific aboard the USS Ranger this summer.

Other RA-5Cs are assigned to Heavy Attack Squadron Three, which is providing training for flight crews and support personnel.

The RA-5C, powered by two 17,000-pound thrust engines, is capable of bursts approaching twice the speed of sound.

Until recently, VAH-9 flew the A-3B Skywarrior a twin-jet attack bomber which will eventually be phased out of the Sanford operation.

## Crowd Greets LBJ On Tour

SOUTH BEND, Ind. (UPI) — President and Mrs. Johnson, starting out on a whirlwind tour of poverty-stricken areas, were surrounded and held almost immobile for about five minutes today by a crowd of hundreds which broke through security lines.

## U. S. Announces Base Closings

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara today announced the shutdown — complete or partial — of 22 military installations and facilities with the elimination of 10,056 jobs.

McNamara told news conference that the shutdowns and reductions plus the sale of two industrial reserve plants, the consolidation of defense contracting offices in 29 U. S. cities and several other economy measures would save \$68 million annually in the United States and abroad over the next 3 1/2 years.

Closings in Florida include the seadromes at the Naval Air stations in Jacksonville, Key West and Pensacola, all of which will be inactivated in January, 1965.

He also said that eight economy measures would be taken overseas — in Europe and the Western Hemisphere — but that these would not involve NATO forces. He said these actions would eliminate 3,600 military and civilian jobs and would save \$21 million, he said.

The biggest single cutback announced today was at the Army's Watertown, Mass., arsenal where 1,840 jobs are to be eliminated by September 1967 at an estimated saving of \$5.3 million.

McNamara said only the Army's materials research agency would be retained at Watertown. He said most of the arsenal's facilities would be sold.

"All career employees whose jobs are eliminated will be offered other job opportunities," McNamara said.
