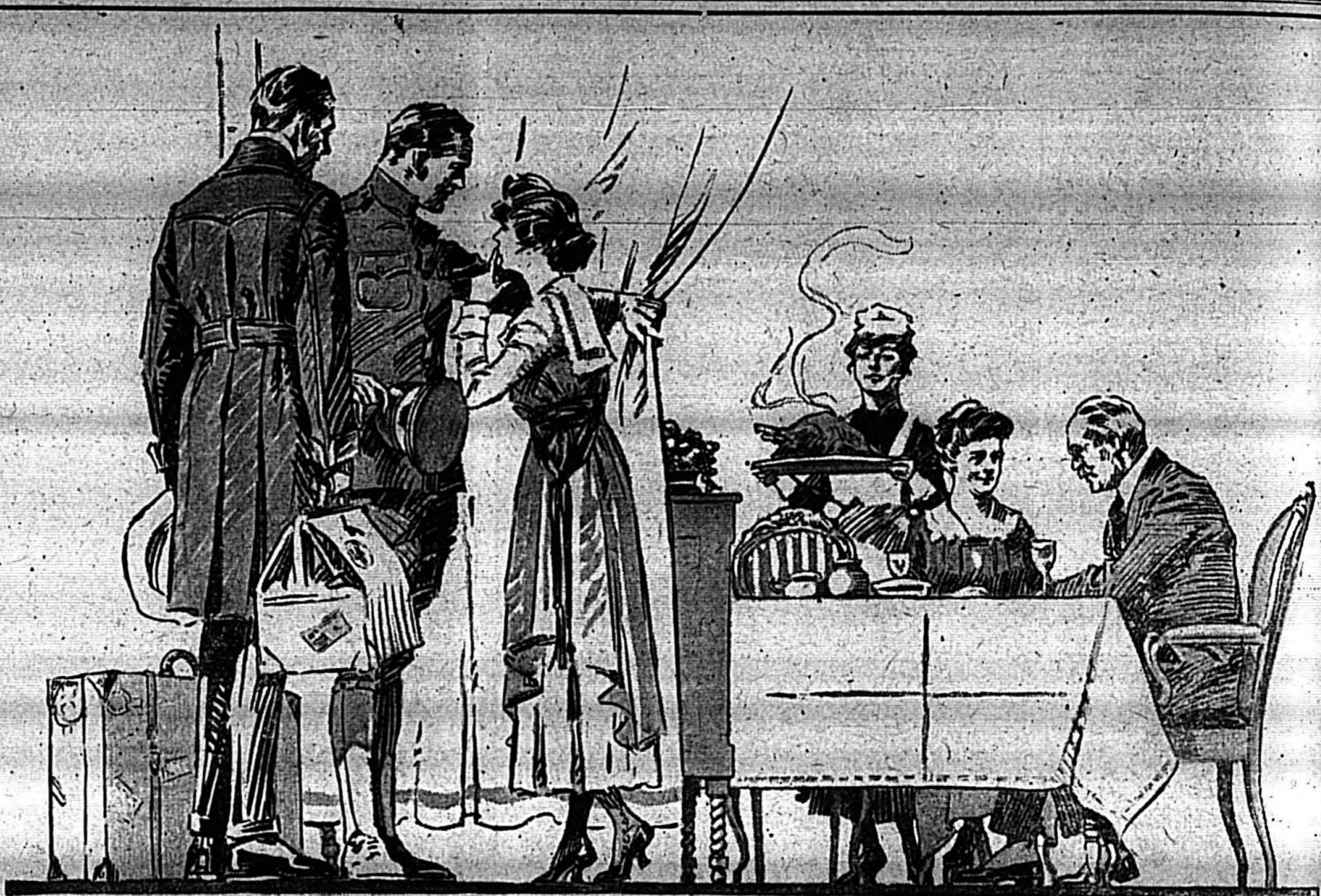

November 5, 1917.

Mr. R. J. Holly,  
Sanford, Fla.

Dear Mr. Holly:  
I am stationed here now and expect to be for awhile, but should I happen to be transferred this address will reach me all O. K. I am anxious to keep up with everything in Sanford and I know the best way is through the Herald.

The Government is so strict about what we write, until I hardly know what to write about, therefore, the letters to my friends at home will be few, so you see I will have to depend on you for all the news.

I like this country fine, and while everything has not been like a bed of roses, still, I would not have missed this trip for a million dollars. We have nice warm quarters and plenty to eat so you see I have nothing to kick about. A United Cigar Store would do a big business over here, as it is almost impossible to buy American cigars, cigarettes and tobacco. We get it once in awhile in the Y. M. C. A. This organization is one of the best things yet for the soldiers and one that we all appreciate.

### FLUX AND REFLUX OF GERMAN ARMY

English Writer Shows How Forces Were Swung to and Fro.

#### WEST TOTAL NEAR MAXIMUM

On Sept. 1 the Fighting Troops There, He Figures, Reached 1,369 Battalions—Roumania's Entry Causes Swift Change.

With the French Armies.—The flux and reflux of the German forces on the western and eastern fronts, together with their rapid augmentation on either side whenever occasion called for an increase of effectives, have been now clearly set forth. The figures given refer to the various phases of the war, starting with the invasion of Belgium in August, 1914, going right through the allied offensives of 1915 and 1916, the German operations before Verdun, the movements on the Russian and Roumanian frontiers, and concluding with the position as it was on September 1 this year.

It will be seen that in 1914 the Germans threw onto the western front, including the army that forced its way through Belgium, 1,100 battalions of infantry; while on the Russian front, from which they did not await much activity, they left only 822 battalions. By September 1 this year these totals had been enormously raised, for on that date they had on the Franco-Belgian-British front no fewer than 1,369 battalions, while on the eastern front they had in position 965 battalions. Thus at the present moment they are employing 2,334 battalions on both fronts, whereas at the opening of hostilities only 1,912 were engaged.

From One Side to Other.  
A glance at the totals of the battalions in line on the two fronts at different periods of the war is interesting, as showing how the principal effort of the Germans has swung from time to time from one side to the other.

The attack on Belgium and France absorbed the attention of the German staff when war broke out in August, 1914, and the Russian front was left to a very great extent to take care of itself. At that time the infantry effectives were disposed as follows:

Divisions of 4 Regts. each. Battns.	
On the western front.....	86½ 1,100
On the eastern front.....	55½ 722

The battle of the Yser in November, 1914, caused the Germans to intensify their effort in the West. They brought up their effectives to a higher total there, but at the same time they were becoming rather anxious about the Russian front, and therefore added to the number of their troops on that side, making the position as follows:

Divisions of 4 Regts. Battns.	
On the western front.....	104½ 1,332
On the eastern front.....	27½ 359

Then came the Russian offensive, which compelled Germany to look round in order to find more troops to meet it. She therefore reduced her effectives somewhat on the western front and sent them eastward, at the same time bringing some more battalions from the interior to add to those on the Russian frontier. In September, 1915, by which time the maximum of the German effort had been reached on that side, the position stood:

Divisions of 3 or 4 Regts. Battns.	
On the western front.....	103 1,280
On the eastern front.....	67 780

Verdun was the next great movement the Germans had in view, and in order to win a victory there they had changed the disposition of their infantry effectives by bringing many divisions westward, so that the position in June, 1916, was:

Divisions of 3 or 4 Regts. Battns.	
On the western front.....	125 1,576
On the eastern front.....	48 614

Brings Further Changes.  
A fresh awakening of activity in the East was occasioned when Roumania came into the war. This brought further changes in the proportional strength of the German forces on the respective fronts. In December, 1916, they were as follows:

Divisions of 3 or 4 Regts. Battns.	
On the western front.....	129 1,612
On the eastern front.....	79 999

In July, 1917, which saw the opening of both British and French offensive movements, the Germans were compelled to re-enforce their armies on the western front, and this brought with it a reduction of their strength on the eastern frontier. The totals were then:

Divs. generally of 3 Regts. Battns.	
On the western front.....	155 1,954
On the eastern front.....	79 999

Owing to events connected with the revolution in Russia, Germany threw some more troops into the eastern field of operations, and on September 1 the situation was as follows:

Divisions of 3 Regts. Battns.	
On the western front.....	147 1,860
On the eastern front.....	83 1,065

These figures refer merely to the troops engaged in the fighting line, and leave out of account those in garrison in the interior of the country, as well as those on the lines of communication.

At the beginning of the war the strength of the German battalion was about 1,000 men. On the assumption that this strength has been maintained the correspondent's statement indicates the presence of 1,300,000 German troops on the western front in September.

contemplated. And again if the Bolshevik crowd makes peace with Germany it does not mean that the majority of the Russian people want a peace with Germany at any price or one that is bought and paid for with German money as this peace pact with Lenin seems to mean.

Meantime the Allies will not treat with any of these factions and will wait for some order to come out of the chaos. All that need to be feared is that the Germans with their usual diplomacy may free the thousands of German and Austrian prisoners and get permission to buy supplies from Russia that are badly needed in the empire.

Should Russia make any such treaty as contemplated it will never be ratified by the real Russians and the early demise of the Bolshevik can be seen whenever they make such a treaty that practically amounts to treason against the true and patriotic Russians.

Germany is playing for time in order to take as much of her army from the eastern front as possible and endeavor to stem the victorious French and English armies and if this can be done in the next few months Germany will not particularly care about Russia or her attitude of peace.

However we can look ahead far enough to perceive that no matter what happens in Russia in the next year we can expect but little help from that strife torn country and we might just as well mark her off the list as far as efficient assistance in this war is concerned.
