A number of states are currents by considering changes in birth registration procedures in order to protect the child born out of wed-lock. Mare and more states are adopting the simple birth card that has on it only the name of the person, the place and date of birth, the race and suz. The complete record, on which is afeguarded and is accessible only to those who may have a direct interest in the matter. "Do you know," says Miss Huffman, "that one state setually issues white birth records to legit-imate children for school on-tranes and orange-colored records to shildren registered is illegit-imate? Think what this means to the child with the orange-colored certificate."
