

# Ervin Tells Of 'Gestapo Mentality'

# 'Bug' Figures Tell Different Tales

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some of the present and former top officials in government are telling very different stories about their mutual connections with the Watergate scandal.

And Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., chairman of the Senate Watergate committee, says he has read secret White House documents that disclose a "Gestapo mentality" existed at the highest levels of the Nixon administration.

Ervin's comments at a news conference in Winston-Salem, N.C. Thursday were the strongest he has made about the positive issues uncovered by broadening Watergate investigation.

The secret papers he was discussing surfaced when fired White House Counsel John W. Dean told a federal judge he had taken them from the White House. The judge gave the North Carolina senator a copy. There is a blueprint for domestic espionage, but President

Nixon said the plan was never implemented because the late FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover, objected to it.

"It would be a great shock to the American people" if the contents of the papers are made public, Ervin said, adding that he plans to ask the nation's intelligence agencies for their recommendations regarding release of the documents.

The Watergate committee chairman, a Democrat, said the papers detail White House plans to set up "an interagency

operation to spy on Americans, especially those who disagreed with the administration."

Since the disclosure several weeks ago that the Central Intelligence Agency may have been pressed into Watergate-related service, a number of congressional watchdog committees have launched separate, secret inquiries into the activities of America's official espionage agency.

The resulting testimony has pitted former top White House aides against the highest echelons of the CIA and FBI.

As related by some of the officials themselves and by members of various committees, here are some of the conflicts that have shown up in recent sworn testimony behind closed doors.

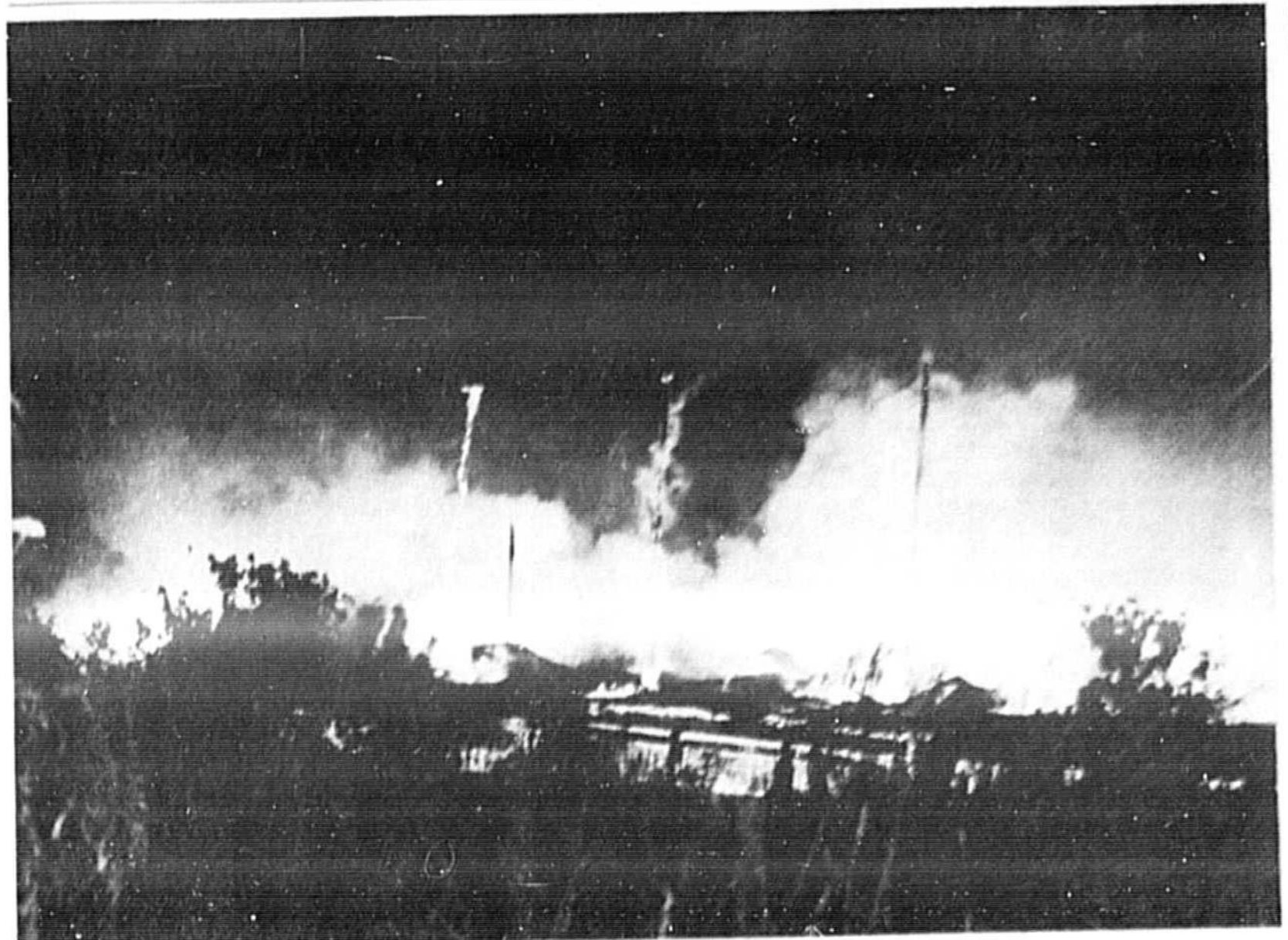
Gen. Robert E. Cushman Jr., former deputy director of the CIA and now commandant of the Marine Corps, said that John D. Ehrlichman asked him by phone on July 8, 1971, for CIA assistance to E. Howard Hunt, since convicted in the Watergate conspiracy.

## Watergate At A Glance

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here, in brief, are the latest developments in the Watergate scandal:

**TESTIMONY** — Congressmen taking testimony from leading figures involved in various aspects of Watergate say some present and former top officials in government are telling different versions about the same aspects of the scandal.

**ERVIN** — Sen. Sam Ervin Jr., Watergate committee chairman, said the American public would be shocked if the contents of top-secret papers taken from the White House by fired Counsel John W. Dean III were revealed. He said the papers disclose a "Gestapo mentality" existed at the highest levels of the Nixon administration.

## Racketeers Fear State Grand Jury

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Racketeers in Florida would have to start looking over their shoulders more often if a bill creating a statewide grand jury becomes law, its House sponsor says.

"They would have one more law enforcement tool to worry about," said Rep. Jack Shreve, D-Merritt Island, Thursday after the House approved 83-21 a bill strongly advocated by Gov. Reubin Askew.

Shreve said he expected the Senate to consider the measure today during the final scheduled day of the 1973 Legislature.

"We've put a lot of work into this," said Shreve. "If they don't, it would be a real waste."

Under the bill, the governor could ask the State Supreme Court to empanel a 23-member grand jury with powers to probe crime in more than one county.

Voicing fears of a "political witchhunt," Rep. Edmond Fortune, D-Pace, successfully proposed an amendment which would limit the grand jury's jurisdiction to criminal offenses such as bribery, gambling, kidnaping and murder.

The house also accepted an amendment by REP. William "Billy Jo" Rish, D-Port St. Joe, requiring the governor to register in his petition to the Supreme Court what crimes were to be investigated.

Rep. Jeff Gautier, D-Miami, was defeated 62-37 in an effort to replace Askew's proposal with a bill giving existing county grand juries the authority to investigate multi-county crimes.

Mere possession can mean several years in jail. Meanwhile, to cut off demand, the government requires that every user caught be confined for at least 30 days of treatment. And this treatment regularly begins with "cold turkey" withdrawal, unassisted by chemical crutches.

Many U.S. physicians believe the agony of this kind of treatment is neither necessary nor desirable. They prefer a

## Court Order Prohibits Turner Leaving U.S.

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Controversial and wide-ranging businessman Glenn W. Turner, named in a 28-count indictment alleging mail fraud, is banned from leaving the United States.

Turner is also barred from leaving Central Florida without the knowledge of the court.

U.S. Magistrate Donald Dietrich installed the travel bans Thursday after Turner appeared before him and pleaded innocent to charges in the federal grand jury indictment.

Dietrich ordered that Turner file an itinerary with the Middle District Court of Florida before traveling outside the central portion of the state.

The magistrate also gave Jerris Leonard, Turner's lawyer and a former U.S. assistant attorney general, 10 days in which to file pretrial motions. And he put a lid on trial publicity.

## Manslaughter Trial Goes To Jury Today

A Circuit court jury was scheduled to begin deliberations at Sanford this afternoon after closing arguments by the state and defense in the DeWayne Fritz

Hanson manslaughter trial. Assistant State Atty Newman Brock rested the state's case after Mrs. Hanson, called as a court witness, said she did not remember telling investigators earlier that her husband had "few or several beers" before leaving their

home in the car that was later involved in a fatal accident. Defense attorney Edward R. Kirkland said Hanson would not testify. After a lunch recess and closing arguments, expected to take at least two hours, the case was scheduled to go to the jury.

Hanson, 35, Winter Park, is charged with culpable negligence in the May 13, 1971, deaths of Todd and Scott Meadows, ages 4 and 2, in a flaming collision at Red Bug and Tuskaawilla Roads in south Seminole during a heavy rain.

Winter Park Hospital emergency room physician Clyde Meade testified Thursday before the four-man, two-woman jury that the boys were dead on arrival and probable causes of death were severe head injuries.

Leon Meadows, 39, East Second St., Chuluota, said he

was returning home with his wife and sons from shopping at Castleberry for a birthday gift for their oldest boy when their sedan was struck broadside in the intersection by a car without headlights in the rain.

Meadows said he saw only the grill and bumper of the car, a split second before it smashed into his car and sent it spinning in flames off the roadway.

Officers testified Hanson's car came to rest over 200 feet further south on Tuskaawilla and they smelled alcohol on his breath after the wreck.

A state toxicologist testified tests on a blood sample taken from Hanson showed 10 blood alcohol content. State law specifies 10 as being drunk.

State Trooper Ernie Leggett said Hanson's vehicle was traveling 35 miles per hour when it ran a stop sign and hit the Meadows car.

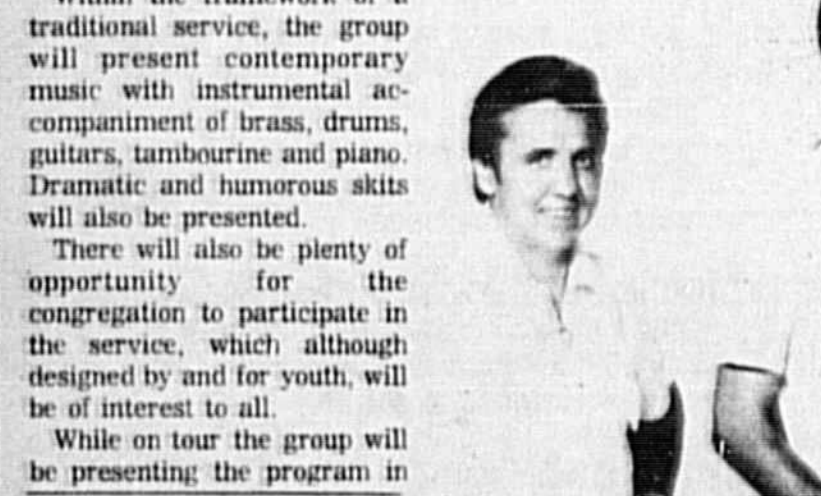

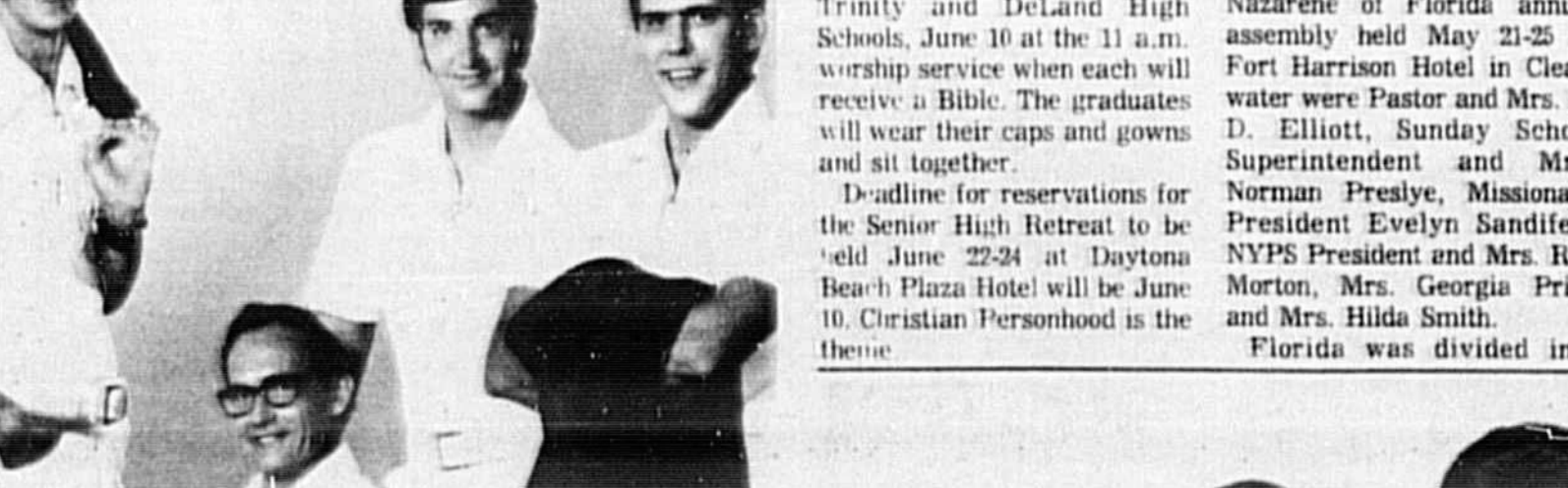

Congress To Settle Differences War Funds Talks Planned

WASHINGTON (AP) — A conference committee will have the task of thrashing out a compromise between a Senate bill that would cut off all funds for U.S. military action in Indochina and a milder House version.

The Senate Thursday voted to cut off all funds for U.S. combat activity in Cambodia and Laos. The House had voted 219 to 188 May 10 to deny any funds in a \$3.6-billion appropriation bill for any further hostility by the United States in Cambodia.

A majority of Republicans turned against President Nixon's bombing policy as the Senate voted 63 to 19 for the anti-bombing amendment sponsored by Sen. Thomas P. Eagleton, D-Mo. The Senate ban, which applies to all money ever appropriated by Congress for any purpose, was attached to the same \$3.6-billion bill.

Administration spokesmen had said that the House action, even if the Senate concurred, would not have stopped the bombing. 182 raids were started in March to force withdrawal of North Vietnamese troops from Cambodia, in compliance with the Jan. 27 Vietnam cease-fire agreement, the administration said.

Eagleton said final adoption of his amendment after a House-Senate conference agreement would make any further U.S. combat activity in Cambodia and Laos illegal.

Red Cross Asks Seminole Help

A tornado strike, a home destroyed, gone in a few seconds is the work of a Red Cross volunteer in a small town in Seminole County. The Red Cross is asking for help to help with these necessities.

Just a few days ago tornadoes cut a swath in many areas across the nation, leaving hundreds of families with nothing. Earlier in the year severe floods were seen. Recently families were left almost destitute when their homes were engulfed by the muddy waters of overflowing rivers.

The American Red Cross says it has no money to assist the victims of recent tornadoes.

Immunity Going Out?

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — With virtually no debate, the Senate has passed and sent to Gov. Reubin Askew a bill that would do away with the state's sovereign immunity against lawsuits.

Sponsors said the measure would allow persons who are injured or suffer loss as a result of negligence by a state or county, or a state or county employee, to sue for damages.

Presently, the only relief a wronged person can receive is by having a legislator introduce a "claims bill."

The Senate passed the bill on a 21-10 vote. The House approved the measure earlier this session.

The state's sovereign immunity against lawsuits stems from the old English common law concept that a king or sovereign could do no wrong.

# Daddy's money oils the skids for fiancée

DEAR ABBY: I am a 19-year-old girl with a broken heart. I met Rick in college at the beginning of the year. We fell in love and planned to be married this summer. Rick is a graduate student.

My daddy is in oil and has a lot of money, but I wish we were poor because Daddy's money is what caused my problem. When Rick went to talk to Daddy about marrying me, Daddy asked Rick to meet him at his office. Daddy had a lawyer there with some papers for Rick to sign, saying if the marriage didn't work out Rick wouldn't get any of my money. I'll be getting when I turn 21.

Rick wouldn't sign anything, instead he called me and said he didn't want any part of a family like mine, so now I am without a boyfriend. My daddy said if Rick really loved me he would have signed those papers. I told my daddy he had no right to ask Rick to sign anything. Please tell me what you think about all this? I don't have a mother.

DEAR ABBY: Because my husband and I are unable to have children of our own, we applied as foster parents through our state welfare department.

Our first child was a teen-age girl, fresh out of a girls' correctional institution. It was a frustrating experience for us—and for her, too. After admitting our failure, the case worker removed her from our care and gave us another foster child. Since then, we have had many more teenagers. Many were helped. A few we have not, but those we've helped have more than compensated for the others.

Abby, you wouldn't believe the number of friends and relatives who ask us: "Why do you take in those damaged children who have been and kicked around and taught to lie and cheat? If they were your OWN, you'd have to put up with them, but you're crazy to ask for unnecessary headaches. Can you really love those kids?"

Our reply: "Most of our children are just like your children, with one exception. Our children have been denied the love and understanding of their natural parents. We have tried to provide them with that love and understanding. If you and your spouse were to suddenly die, and neither friends nor relatives wanted to take on 'unnecessary' headaches, what would happen to your children? I guarantee you, we could love them as easily as we love the children we now have."

What else can we say, Abby? FOSTER PARENTS

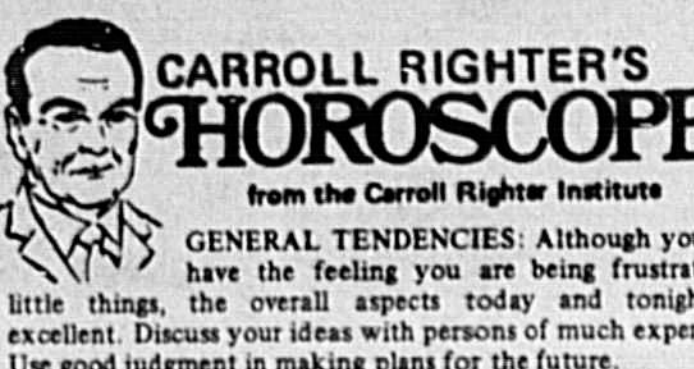

## Cosmetic Surgery Experiment Surgeon Tests Acupuncture

Hollywood—Acupuncture has come to cosmetic surgery in the United States. Dr. Robert A. Franklin, renowned as "Dr. Beauty" for his innovative techniques in plastic surgery and a star-studded clientele of show business personalities, says he believes he is the first U.S. physician to practice acupuncture in cosmetic surgery.

Franklin, who has been using acupuncture as a substitute for traditional anesthesia for two years, said its use is still in the experimental stage. "We don't know all of the implications. The system is still under test but shows great promise," he said at his Sunset Blvd. Beauty Pavilion, a \$1-million rotunda-shaped clinic.

Franklin said he prefers to substitute acupuncture only in selected cases, small facelifts of 20 to 30 minutes duration or breast operations with patients who are young and in good health. "Experimentation may indicate it can be used for longer periods of time," he said.

# One Game Amateurs Must Avoid

CHICAGO (AP) — If you've never seen a bush of soybeans it's hard to imagine why scores of men would be willing to pay \$10 for them.

But scores of men are willing to pay that much and more for a bushel of the oily, pea-shaped beans. And many don't even know what soybeans look like. Yet they buy and sell thousands of bushels of soybeans by dealing in commodities futures, contracts promising delivery at some future date.

Thousands, and sometimes hundreds of thousands, of dollars are won and lost daily in such dealings at the Board of Trade.

In the past few weeks, the commodities futures boom has nearly tripled the price of soybeans in a year and almost doubled that of wheat and corn.

Consumers will eventually feel the price increase at the meat counter, say many traders.

# Drugs, Alcohol Abuse Meetings

Drug and alcohol abuse are both symptoms of underlying problems, said the Rev. George H. Moreau, coordinator of personnel services, Diocese of Orlando, in his talk recently at the regular meeting of Alcohol and Drugs Anonymous (ADA) in the All Souls Annex, Sanford.

Moreau, a priest who travels nationwide opening doors for help, stressed the need for education among doctors and psychiatrists who give drugs to patients recovering from alcohol or drug abuse.

The teenager who uses drugs is doing so to still an inner crying for help, love and understanding, said Moreau. He suggested that parents of teenagers insist on their children being home at a regular time each day for the evening meal, perhaps—and this would make it easier for the parents to detect erratic behavior which might mean he is on drugs.

"Be calm, receptive and alert towards the needs of children," advises Moreau.

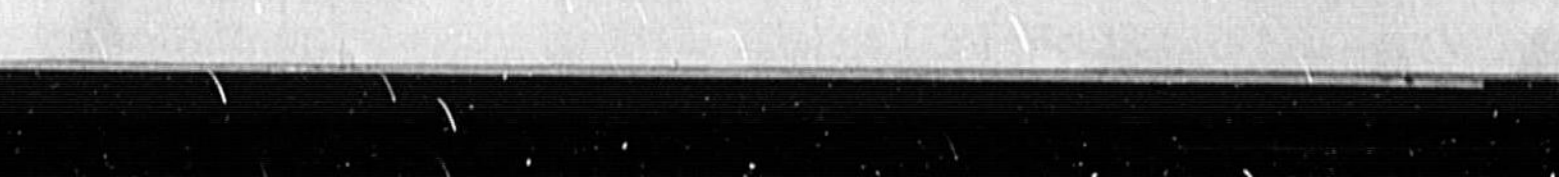

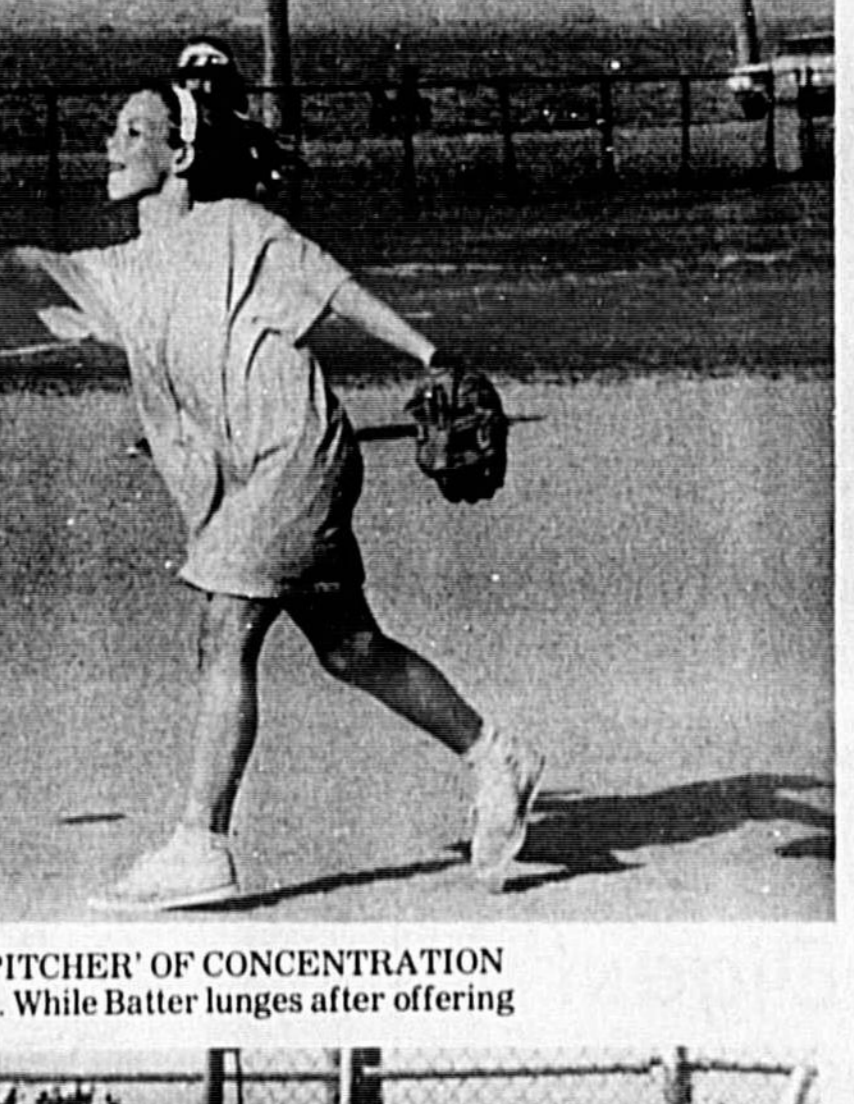
More than half the field of 147 matched or bettered par 72 and there were 60 in sub-par figures.

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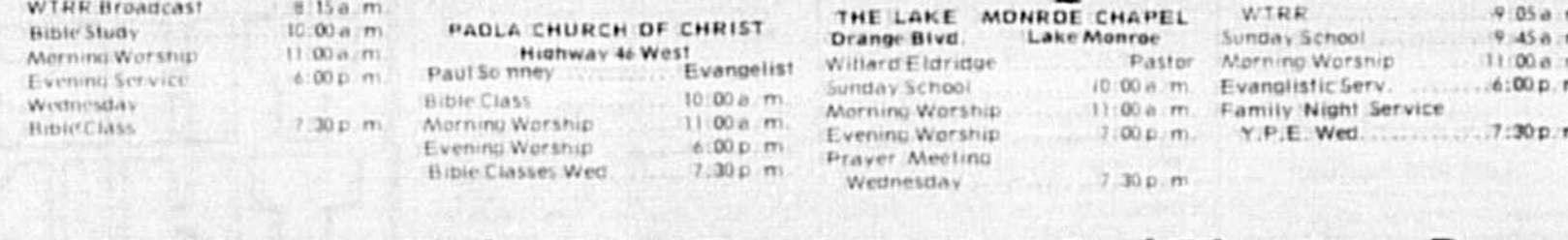

## Threatened With Eviction Tenant Chief Arrested

The Sanford Housing Authority (SHA) board voted Friday to evict the Rev. Goldie M. Eubanks as the 60-year-old tenant chief chairman was booked at county jail for disorderly conduct after allegedly disrupting housing authority operations.

SHA chairman John Smith called a special meeting and three board members voted to evict Eubanks from his low-rent public housing apartment in Cowan Moughton Terrace. Smith made the motion to evict, which was supported by the board members Richard Evans and Vann Parker.

George W. Brown arrived too late to vote and Sam Light was absent.

Smith said a letter being sent to Eubanks tells him to vacate by midnight June 30.

Eubanks, contacted at home after he posted \$100 bond, said he didn't know about the eviction but will seek help in fighting it.

Sheriff's Sgt. Oscar Redden Jr. said he was at the SHA office on "official business" when a SHA employee complained Eubanks was creating a disturbance.

Redden said he arrested Eubanks after warning him about interfering with a sheriff's investigation.

Eubanks said he was at the SHA office on tenant council business and was merely questioning employees about Redden's investigation. "I still don't know what it's about and I wasn't interfering," Eubanks said.

Sheriff John Polk said Eubanks' arrest "had nothing to do with an investigation being conducted by this department."

However, Eubanks said he feels his arrest "stemmed from extensive investigations at the office" by police and sheriff's deputies.

May 10, one SHA grievance committee recommended the board evict Eubanks if he continued to "harass" SHA personnel. No action was taken.

## State Legislature Back Next Week

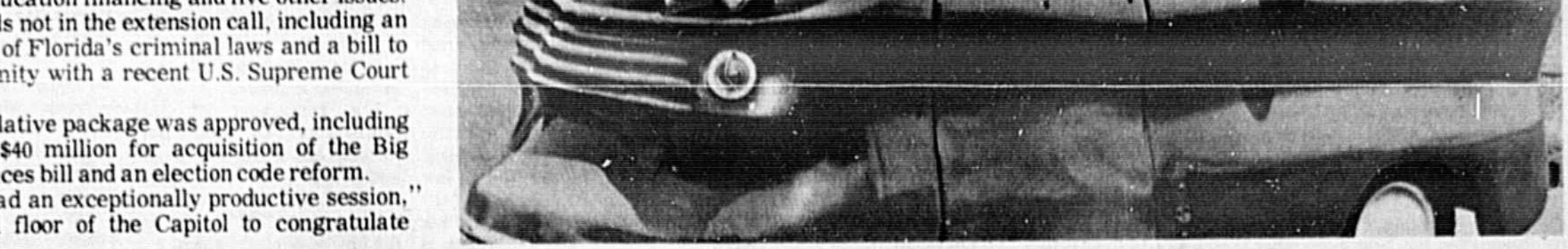

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Florida legislators have ended their 1973 regular session but will be back next week for an extended session to iron out differences in a \$3.9 billion spending bill, education financing and five other issues.

The adjournment killed all pending bills not in the extension call, including an ethics code for public officials, a rewrite of Florida's criminal laws and a bill to bring the state abortion law into conformity with a recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling.

But most of Gov. Reubin Askew's legislative package was approved, including proposals for a statewide grand jury, \$40 million for acquisition of the Big Cypress Swamp, a deceptive trade practices bill and an election code reform.

"With a whirlwind finish, I think we had an exceptionally productive session," Askew said as he went to the second floor of the Capitol to congratulate legislators Friday.

## Hanson Found Guilty

A Circuit Court jury Friday at Sanford convicted a 35-year-old Winter Park man of manslaughter in a May 1971 south Semole traffic accident in which two boys were killed.

Defense attorney Edward R. Kirkland argued references to alcohol in the trial before Circuit Judge J. William Woodson were "windy dressing" and Dwayne Fritz Hanson made a "tragic mistake" when he ran a stop sign at Red Bug and Tusawilla Road during the heavy rain and smashed into the side of a sedan carrying Leon Meadows, of Chulotua, his wife and two sons, ages 4 and 2.

The boys were dead on arrival at a hospital.

Assistant state atty. Newman Brock presented a sample of Hanson's blood that showed .15 blood alcohol content. State law specifies .10 as being drunk.

Brock said Hanson was drunk, ran a stop sign and was traveling without headlights.

Woodson ordered a presentence investigation for Hanson and allowed to remain free on \$100,000 bond. Hanson could receive 60 years in prison.

Kirkland told Hanson as they left the courtroom, "Don't worry about it. This is only round one," indicating the convictions will be appealed.

Reports that mentally retarded and socially maladjusted pupils are being moved to Pine Crest Elementary School for the 1973-74 school year have caused waves of discontent among some parents.

The Seminole school board approved at a recent meeting School Supt. Bud Lyster's recommendation that to relieve pressure on overcrowded classrooms in the southeastern section of the county, these "exceptional" children be moved to Pine Crest school.

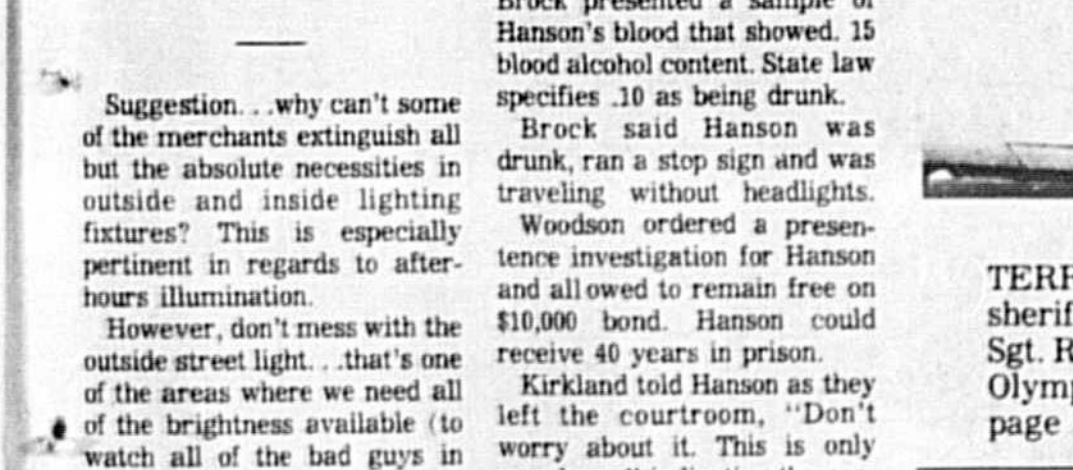
These children include trainable mentally retarded (TMR) pupils presently at Longwood elementary, and children in the emotional social adjustment (ESA) units at Red Bug elementary.

Some of the parents of children at Pine Crest objected to the move on the grounds their children may be physically harmed by the exceptional children; there will be no summer recreation program because of renovations at Pine Crest; the music and projection rooms will have to be converted into classrooms; and it will cause taxpayers unnecessary expense.

Mrs. Mary Wientgier, director of Exceptional Education, said, "Parents may be assured that no exceptional children will be sent in with their youngsters who cannot be well supervised. There are some children who are 'dramatic,' she continued, "but I am sure the exceptional children will be well supervised. It's ridiculous for parents to feel threatened by the program — it's just some people don't understand it." She added, "There are some children presently at Pine Crest being considered for the exceptional program. They have been in the program for a number of years. The ESA program worked well at Red Bug, and at Longwood the TMR pupils met with wonderful acceptance by the teachers and parents."

Playground contact is good for both sections of the school, and we will always be controlled." Although there will be no recreational program at Pine Crest this summer, the pupils may join programs at Gold-choon, Harper and Midway schools, starting on June 18 and Sanford also has a program, said Andy Bracken, School Administration spokesman.

"It is a recommendation to relocate the exceptional children at Pine Crest, he said, adding "no solution could be ideal, adding, "We will just have to make the best of the teachers and parents."
