

Take a look at how the country of Japan handled its drug problem. By getting tough with both pushers and addicts, they have cut their heroin addiction to the vanishing point

Ten years ago, they had a heroin epidemic featuring an estimated 40,000 addicts.

In 1963 they passed a law for the persons selling heroin to receive life sentences Mere possession can mean several years in jail. Meanwhile, to cut off demand, the government requires that every user caught be confined for at least 30 days of treatment. And this treat ment regularly begins with "cold turkey" withdrawal, unassisted by chemical crutches.

Many U.S. physicians believe the agony of this kind of treatment is neither necessary nor desirable. They prefer a

Pennsylvania Avenue Humphrey Is Helping Rebuild Democrats

WASHINGTON - In the gritty crisis period of the California Democratic persidential primary last June, a New York newspaper carried a page one headline which had prophetic overtones. It

> "McG Over The Hump In California"

The headline and its relating story told the story which had ended the political mission of Sen. Hubert Humphrey, D-Minn., in his 1972 bid to become president. Competing in a number of primaries, he had been outlasted by Sen. George McGovern, D-S.D., who eventually won the nomination and lost the election by an overwhelming margin to President Nixon.

In the light of political affairs for Democrats at the time and considering they had shunned Humphrey--the party's 1968 nominee for president-all courses of action seemed bleak for obtaining the White House in the near future. The Democratic Party is still struggling with basic organizational porblems following

Unnoticed High Taxes

Part of the reason that high taxes go unnoticed, by and large, is the disguised manner in which they are collected. The federal income tax is deducted from most people's pay checks; the sales tax is part of the purchase price, the property tax is "hidden" in the monthly house payment, etc.

But Tax Foundation Inc., which publishes monthly facts and features about taxes in the United States, has computed how long the average person works in an eight-hour day to pay his 1973 federal, state and local taxes. The average person works longer to meet his tax bill than he does to pay for food, clothing and shelter combined, Tax foundation says. Its computations show this breakdown for an eight-hour

Taxes — 2 hours, 39 minutes Housing and household operation - 1 hour Food and beverages - 58 minutes Transportation — 40 minutes Clothing and shoes - 25 minutes Medical care — 23 minutes Recreation — 18 minutes

All other - 1 hour, 37 minutes So for those people who start to work at 8 a.m., it's after 10:30 before they start making anything they can take home

Guevara's Dream

Activities Of Peronists Are Startling

MIAMI, Fla .- Ernesto "Che" Guevara, Cuban Premier Fidel Castro's onetime comrade-inarms, had a dream that he would one day return home to Argentina, victoriously. While he did not live to see it materialize, the resumption of

power in the South American nation by the Peronists makes likely at least a symbolic, a spiritual return of the Argentine medic turned guerrilla. President Hector Campora and his mentor, the long-exiled Juan Domingo Peron, have said that their government will promptly resume formal relations with the Cuban

Communist regime for which Guevara fought and died. As if to underline Peronist cordiality toward Cuba, Campora sent his son, Carlos, to Havana personally to invite Cuban President Osvaldo Dorticos to attend the inauguration in Buenos Aires. It was not a perfunctory invitation, but rather a warmly

worded message. "In the name of the Superior Council of the National Justicialist Movement, 'Campora extended Dorticos' the most cordial invitation to honor us with your presence...We fervently desire that you accompany us on that triumphal occasion."

Dorticos, Cuba's puppet president, had no trouble getting permission from the Cuban Communist Party and the Cuban government, and flew to Buenos Aires with Foreign Minister Raul Roa and other Cuban Communist of-

Watergate, U.S. Foreign Policy

NEW YORK - "We have no intention," Henry Kissinger told a gathering of newsmen here, "of buying an illusory tranquillity at the expense of our friends...'

This promise by the President's chief foreign policy adviser was made as part of what Kissinger termed a "New Atlantic Charter" and, thus, concerned primarily with Europe. However, Kissinger made much the same pledge in the name of the President when he devised the Vietnam cease-fire that Hanoi has dishonored and which Moscow and Peking have done little to force the North Vietnamese to observe. Apparently unmoved by the Kissinger-creatd disaster in Asia, Mr. Nixon has given his foreign policy chief the green light to devise a similar disaster for Europe. Historically, the first "Atlantic Charter," drawn up by Franklin D. Roosevelt and Winston Churchill on Aug. 14, 1941, at sea during World War ii, was a set of vague and dangerous generalities that helped shape the disastrous foreign policy of FDR and played a critical part in granting to Russia's Joseph Stalin critical concessions.

The "New Atlantic Charter" is based on much the same mushy premises for which the West paid dearly in the postwar period when Stalin decided to dishonor all the agreements he had made ah wartime conferences such as Yalta. We need to remember that under the current Soviet leadership, the Stalinist era has steadily undegone favorable historical treatment to erase its hideous crimes against the Russian people and Stalin is now again looked upon as a secular political saint by powerful elements of the Moscow

The European distrust of the Nixon-Kissinger foreign policy is not just the result of the Vietnam cease-fire, but the ill-conceived trade and monetary policies abroad and domestic economic bungling at home. The Watergate affair to foreign nations was a tragic confirmation that Mr. Nixon cannot control his own government at home.



Some close White House watchers, experienced in government, believe now that President Nixon is in a weakening fall-back position and may soon stand in

danger of losing the presidency. His newest public statement, in which he acknowledges that in the name of national security he himself imposed limits on the White House-authorized Watergate inquiry and failed to heed early warnings of possible wrongdoings by high officials, is being read with shock in this capital. A common reaction is:

"If the President can say these things today, why could he not have said them weeks or months ago? The judgment, then, is skeptical, even among seasoned sources friendly to Mr. Nixon. He is seen as stumbling backward under a widening, intensifying barrage, giving ground because he has to, likely to make further retreat.

"I don't know how many shoes he's got to drop, but he's going to drop them one by one. The President himself indicated this may not be his final word on Watergate. These are the very last lines

of his 4,000 word statement: "As more information is developed, I have no doubt that more questions will be raised. To the extent that I am able, I shall also seek to set forth the facts as known to me with respect to those questions."



They see a certain assured, cool detachment in his first mportant utterance on April 17, when Mr. Nixon said he was conducting his own fresh investigation of Watergate. His April 30 speech is put down as a major yielding to pressure, carrying with it acceptance of the resignations of top aides H. R. Haldeman, John Ehrlichman, and John

They rate his newest atterance, with its long elaboration of complex efforts to plug security leaks, as a painful concession of the President's early suspicions about Watergate-even as he protests again he had no prior knowledge of the June 17, 1972, break-in at Democratic offices. One experienced observer thinks Mr. Nixon's presidency is now clearly doomed, that each fall-back darkens his prospect and renders him less and less able to govern the

This man sees the President moving toward one of two positions, both of them bad. Of the first, he says: "If he maintains his posture of innocence, then the broader the scandal gets-and it seems to be broadening almost every day-the worse he looks. In fact, to insist he know so little when se much was going on around him could make him look like an idiot.'

The perceived alternative, of course, is that Mr. Nixon snew far more than he has, up to now, grudgingly coneded. It is argued that to acknowledge this further involvement step by step is to crumble before the country's eyes and lose the last streds of his credibility.



Archibald Cox

Archibald Cox, the Harvard constitutional and labor law professor nominated as investigator and prosecutor in the Watergate affair, s a troubled man-intellectually torn between his deep bilief in strict constructionism as favored by the Nixon appointees to the U.S. Supreme Court and his devotion b the action principles of President John Kennedy, whom he served with fervor. If his past is a precedent, Cox will attempt above all to relate this Watergate affair to its niche in the pages

of constitutional law, its place in history, and to basic legal principles in the tradition of Justice Felix Frank furter. He will steer clear of politics. For one thing is clear. Cix believes in the sacredness of law and its inviolability. He has been known variously as the solicitor general who couldn't see beyond the law and the best solicitor in history, an office which included Wil-

liam Howard Taft, Charles Evans Hughes, Francis Biddle, Robert Jackson and Sanley Reed. His belief in the sacredness of law forces Cox to bend over backward to be fair to his opponents. On one occasion he argued both side of a case simultaneously before the Supreme Court and defeated the side he personally favored. Yet paradoxically, when he does become convinced completely on a point of law, he finds it difficult to understand how anyone could be unconvinced by

Cox firmly believes the end does not justify the means. On occasion he refused to participate in some major government integration cases in whose justice he passionately believed because he left the arguments were not legally sound. He is convinced it is not the job of the courts to legislate morality, And, as Victor Navasky has reported, balks at doing anything that will mislead a court into doing something that might look right now, but wrong a hundred years lence.

Cox is not a man other lawyers describe mildly.
