CECIL A. TUCKER, II
Livestock owners in Seminole County who wish to move their animals to pastures outside the recently established screwworm quarantine area of Florida, may arrange for inspection of their stock and any necessary treatment by contacting the County Agricultural Agent's office, Court House, FA 2-3223, or Cecil A. Tucker Sr., who is livestock inspector for this county. The livestock inspector can be reached at Christmas, Phone No. 4.

The quarantine, which the Florida Livestock Board ordered into effect May 1, 1958, involves 28 counties and embraces all of that portion of the state lying within the city limits of Ocala.

Any livestock or other animals subject to screwworm infestation may be moved out of the quarantine area if accompanied by a certificate of inspection and necessary treatment by a duly authorized representative of the Livestock Board. Otherwise, all shipments must be routed through a central quarantine station at Ocala where they will be inspected and treated if necessary before being allowed to proceed into unquarantined territory.

The quarantine is one phase of the combined State-Federal Screwworm Eradication Program, and is designed to hold any of the

over-wintering pests to the southern part of the state until the program gets into full operation about mid-summer.

In the meantime, livestock owners in every Florida county are being urged to continue their vigilance in spotting, treating, and quickly reporting any suspected screwworm cases to their county agent or livestock inspector.

Strongly urged, also, are preventive measures by prompt treatment of all wounds or cuts with application of approved remedies, such as EQ-335 or Smeaz 62, and keeping animals under observation until wounds are healed.

Suspected screwworm eggs or maggots should NOT be destroyed, but should be carefully collected and held for the inspector to pick up and report to the proper authorities. Egg masses should be placed in a closed container, such as a pint fruit jar, on a piece of damp paper, and maggots should be placed in a similar jar half full of clean tap water. Both jars should be kept in a cool place until the inspector calls for them.

This is the time of year that hordes of insect pests begin to advance on your rose plantings, so prepare now to repulse these invaders.

From Dr. Stratton H. Kerr, entomologist with the Florida Agricultural Experiment Stations, comes an identification of this enemy horde. He says the important insects of roses are flower thrips, mites (red spider), scale insects, aphids, caterpillars, flower beetles and leaf beetles.

Spring and fall months bring the largest numbers of mites, or red spiders. In spraying for them it is important to do a thorough job, especially on undersides of leaves.

Some effective wettable powder mixtures which can be used are: 25 percent Kelthane, 1 1/4 tablespoons in a gallon of water; 15 percent Aramite, 2 tablespoons to a gallon; and 50 percent Ovatran, 3 tablespoons to a gallon of water.

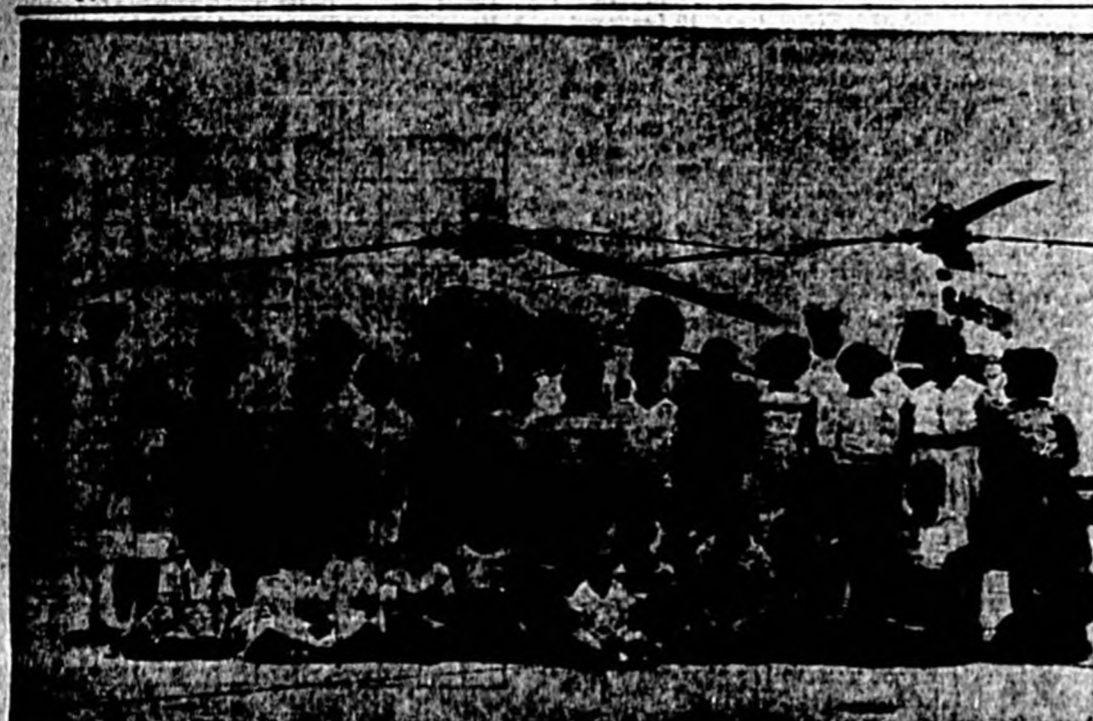
For control of flower thrips, it is recommended that you apply 4 or 5 percent malathion dust directly to the flowers. A spray of 4 tablespoons of 25 percent malathion wettable powder to a gallon of water can be used instead of either dust.

Aphids, most common in early spring, will succumb to sprays made of 3 teaspoons of 50 to 57 percent malathion emulsion concentrate or 4 tablespoons of 25 percent malathion wettable powder to a gallon of water. If you prefer a dust for use directly on the plant, use 4 or 5 percent malathion dust. Another effective liquid

spray is 40 percent malathion concentrate at the rate of 1 teaspoonful plus a teaspoon of soap flakes to a gallon of water.

Caterpillars can be hand-picked if only a few are seen. But if you prefer dust you can use a five percent DDT dust. Apply this directly to the plants. Sprays for caterpillar control can be made as follows: 25 percent DDT emulsion concentrate, 4 teaspoons to a gallon; 30 percent DDT wettable powder, 3 tablespoons to a gallon; 50 to 57 percent malathion emulsion concentrate, 3 teaspoons to a gallon; or 4 tablespoons of 25 percent malathion wettable powder to a gallon of water.

Flower beetles and leaf beetles, most frequently found from March to May, can be controlled with 5 percent DDT or 5 percent chlordane dust applied directly to the plants. For a spray, use 3 tablespoons of 25 percent DDT wettable powder or 40 percent chlordane wettable powder to a gallon of water.

Scale insects, of which there are 15 species recorded on roses in Florida, are best controlled with a spray of 2 teaspoons of 50 to 57

MIAMI BEACH (UPI)—Police really caught Willie "Beer Bottle" Harris with the goods Monday—some \$25,000 worth of clothing stolen from an exclusive men's shop.

Sheriff's deputies who raided Harris' home found 170 fancy suits and sport coats that had been stolen recently from Eddie Albert's Men's World. Another 100 suits stolen at the time were missing.

The raid followed a tip from the FBI that Harris had been seen carrying in a large amount of clothing in the early hours Monday morning. The FBI agents had been staking out his house "for another reason," they said.

Harris, who has a long record of arrests for burglary and jewel thefts with few convictions, was booked on charges of receiving and concealing stolen property. He was released on \$5,000 bond.

Stepped-Up Military Spending Program OK'd

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Appropriations Committee approved most of President Eisenhower's stepped-up military spending program today. It tossed in extra funds for rockets and four more nuclear-powered submarines.

The committee recommended a \$28,810,711,000 defense appropriation for the fiscal year starting July 1.

The total was nearly 4 billion dollars higher than the committee voted for the current fiscal year. The increase would not be reflected directly in actual defense

spending, however, as the Defense Department operates to a large extent on funds carried over from previous years. Actual spending this fiscal year will be about \$9 billion dollars.

Although the committee passed the President's proposals here and there, it boosted the overall total by \$18,814,000. Largest increase was a \$638,043,000 hike to build four more nuclear-powered sub-

marines to fire the Polaris 1,500-mile ballistic missile.

The committee also voted to add 100 million for work on the Hound Dog, a supersonic missile to be fired from B52 bombers at ground targets, and on the Minuteman system—an Air Force project to develop a 3,000-mile solid fuel missile.

Also tacked on were an extra \$81,918,000 to maintain the Army

National Guard and reserve at their present strength, and \$60,300,000 to forestall a \$2,000-man cut in the Marine Corps.

The committee's bill contained \$17,317,775,000 for the Air Force, \$11,042,310,000 for the Navy, and \$6,417,636,000 for the Army. It also provides \$798,900,000 for certain inter-service activities, and \$350,050,000 for the office of the secretary of defense.

Lions Club Starts Plans To Construct Own Meeting Place

The Sanford Lions Club yesterday began initial plans to construct their own building to be used as a meeting place.

W. Hugh Duncan appointed a building committee which includes M. A. Yelvington, Volie A. Williams Jr., Grady Duncan, and H. W. "Buddy" Rawls.

Delegates to the annual Lions Convention held in Sarasota earlier this month made their official report to the club at yesterday's noon luncheon meeting held at the Yacht Club.

W. Hugh Duncan, president and H. W. "Buddy" Rawls, president-elect told the Sanford Lions Club that 2000 attended the annual convention season. There were 1000 voting delegates.

The delegates, representing the Sanford Club, said there are now 200 Lions Clubs in Florida with a membership of 14,000. During the past year a total of \$220,000 was raised from which \$20,000 has already been spent to aid various charities, mainly sight conservation and aid to the blind in Florida.

The convention voted to establish two additional districts in Florida, the delegates said, making a total of seven.

Speeding Car Rams Into Truck; Man Hurt

A Chevrolet sedan, traveling at what officers say was "a high rate of speed," skidded 192 feet this morning, turned on its side, and crashed into the back end of a Therm-O-Tone Gas and Appliance Co. pickup truck.

The accident, shortly before 8 o'clock this morning, was 1 1/4 miles west of Lake Monroe on Orange Blvd.

Oble "Georgia Boy" Braswell, whom officers said is about 22 years old, was thrown out of the automobile and under the bumper of the car as it came to a stop in a deep ditch.

Driver of the truck, C. L. Griffith, 43, said that Braswell had a bad concussion on the back of his head and was cut badly over

his right eye. He was brought to Seminole Memorial Hospital.

Wreckage was scattered over the scene of the accident. The back end of the automobile had skidded around and struck the truck. It immediately bounced back onto the side of the highway, tearing up the shoulders of the road before stopping.

Griffith was uninjured and the truck he was driving only slightly damaged.

From the skidmarks, investigators determined that Braswell had swerved his automobile to the right in an attempt to avoid crashing into the truck which had pulled out of a driveway and onto the road.

Constable J. Q. "Slim" Galloway said "I had warned him about speeding last night on Sanford Ave."

The automobile was declared to be a total loss.

Investigating officers included Florida Highway Patrolman Olin Brewster, and Constable Galloway.

Violence Causes 16 Deaths This Week In Cuba

HAVANA (UPI)—The worst outbreak of violence in eastern Cuba since government forces crushed rebel leader Fidel Castro's "all-out war" last month has caused at least 16 deaths this week, it was reported today.

Rebel raiders killed four soldiers in Guantanamo, near the U. S. Navy's big south-coast base, and a newspaperman in the provincial capital of Santiago. The bodies of at least 11 unidentified persons were found in the streets of the two cities.

"Heavy skirmishing" between loyal troops and rebel bands was reported in the Segua de Tuame area and in the Matanzas Mountains, where Castro has been hiding out for a year and a half. There was no mention of casualties.

Ten armed rebel soldiers broke into a Santiago warehouse owned by the Cuban Electric Company, an affiliate of American and foreign power, and set a fire that caused \$100,000 damage.

Another band of raiders forced its way into the offices of the government organ Liberated in Santiago, killing one employe and wounding another.

In Guantanamo, gunmen firing from ambush killed all four members of an army patrol.

Program Started To Push School Bond Election

First organized steps looking toward the passage of the School Bond Election on Sept. 9 got underway last night at Pinecrest School at a meeting of school principals and P-TA committees.

A "Planned Program" was presented to the group of principals and committee members in order that a systematic campaign "working for the bond election" could be emphasized.

Superintendent of Public Instruction R. T. Milwee explained in detail the purpose of the School Bond Election, stating that "The school population of Seminole County is increasing at a greater rate from year to year, and in order to provide for the children of the county it would be necessary that the bond election be passed."

Milwee emphasized the reasoning behind the choosing of the date, Sept. 9, for holding the election. He also explained the reason that the Board of Public Instruction did not call for a registration of all the freeholders of Seminole County.

W. A. Tague, Administrative Assistant to the Superintendent of Public Instruction, emphasized that "plans for the passage of the School Bond Election should call for a mass meeting of the interested citizens of Seminole County for the purpose of forming a

'Citizens Committee' to work for the passage of the bond election."

Principals of the various Seminole County Schools are to work with the members of the P-TA organizations in getting the "Planned Program" before the citizens of the county throughout the summer months.

Tague said those attending the meeting that a "Freeholder who fails to register as such will be able to vote on Sept. 9 with a sworn affidavit, which will be issued by the clerk of the precinct."

4-Cent Stamp Goes Into Effect Aug. 1

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The four-cent stamp for local and out-of-town letters definitely goes into effect Aug. 1.

President Eisenhower signed a bill Tuesday which raises both postal rates and wages. First class letters will be increased from 3 to 4 cents. Air Mail will be hiked from 7 to 7 cents. It will be the first increase in first-class mail rates since 1932.

The President said the bill's "public interest" features outweighed its objectionable provisions. But he said several provisions caused him "grave concern," including one which would assess the treasury for an "excessive amount of postal services costs" instead of levying them against users of the mails.

He said these postal services would cost about 100 million dollars a year and "logically and equitably" should have been financed through proper rates of postage.

Other presidential objections were "failure of the Congress to provide sufficient revenues to meet the full cost of operating the postal service," and a salary structure for postal workers which raises pay of lower salaried workers whereas some top bracket employees got no increase at all.

Jacksonville Firm Gets NAS Job

A construction contract has been awarded to the H. B. McCormick Construction Company of Jacksonville Beach for the extension of runway and taxiway, nine to seven east-west, to the west by 2200 feet.

Junior Colleges Might Be The Placid Preventative Measure

The latest phase of the University of Florida should bring to mind the efforts of Florida in solving a large part of the problem of the education of a lot of young persons who have no business at an institution of higher learning.

A "beer riot" has no part in the curriculum of young people whose sole purpose at the University of Florida should be the quest for an education.

If the participation in a "beer riot" is indicative of these "wild men than teenagers" instead of getting a sound education, then some of them should be away from home where they could be helping their parents with a living and learning to be practical citizens.

A strong hand should be the answer dealt out by University of Florida authorities since the stigma of a most regrettable and unbecomable fiasco has resulted in widespread attention brought on both the school and the state as a whole.

Incidents, such as the "beer riot", emphasize the folly and foolishness of sending children and young people away to college before they know what it's all about, or who would rather have a good time doing nothing worthwhile at the expense of their parents and taxpayers instead of utilizing their time and opportunities to prepare for the responsibilities of men and women.

One thing pointed up by this unfortunate

incident is the necessity for community junior colleges. Such facilities would allow young men and women fresh out of high school another two years at home readying themselves for college under the tutelage of both professors and parents.

Successful graduates of hometown junior colleges would think twice before participating in such silly and shameful carrying-on as beer riots and party raids. More important things to do are before the young men and women who are anxious to complete their educations after becoming familiar with the complications of life.

Scores of children are going to college before they know what it's all about—before they learn the very concept of education, their sense of obligation to their parents, and to the institution they are attending.

Maybe the State of Florida is pouring too many millions of dollars into the huge centers of education where control is at a minimum.

The possibility of junior colleges would become "answered dreams" with funds derived from a cutback. It's the responsibility of mature citizens and taxpayers to let those in authority know that college chants of "We Want Beer" should be replaced with the citizens' chant of "We Want Junior Colleges."

Health Care For Senior Citizens

One of our newest organizations is called the "Joint Council to Improve the Health Care of the Aged"—and it is an organization with an enormous achievement potential.

The members are the American Dental Association, American Hospital Association, American Medical Association, and the American Nursing Home Association. The Council has three broad objectives—to identify and analyze the health needs of the aged; to appraise available health resources for the aging, and to develop programs to foster the best possible health care for them regardless of economic status.

In order to reach these goals, the Council has laid down a detailed and positive program of action. Research will produce needed information that is not now available, on such matters as the incomes and resources of the aging and the utilization of health services and facilities by the aging. Improvement and expansion of health care facilities for these senior citizens will be encouraged in a number of ways—the establishment of standards for nursing homes, better and

broader methods of governmental assistance where needed, and so on. Stress will be laid on the development of community health work, such as organized home care and visiting nurse services. Education, research and action programs concerned with the health problems of the aging will be intensified at all levels—national, state and local. Improved diagnostic and treatment methods will be sought.

Another facet of the Council's program will be to increase the availability of improved voluntary health insurance coverage for older people. In this, it will work with Blue Cross, Blue Shield and the insurance industry, along with other interested groups.

Close to 15 million people constitute our senior population. The Council's program is designed to do everything possible to make life happier and fuller for them all.

Russia's 'Aeroflot' Is Awkward Giant

 WASHINGTON (UPI)—Russia's commercial air fleet is an awkward giant that is top-heavy in the jet age and the other in an aviation era of 25 years ago.

That is the verdict of American observers whose views on Soviet commercial aviation were reported in a memorandum issued by the Air Transport Association (ATA), representing U. S. scheduled airlines.

It said Russia's single airline,

"Aeroflot," is run for prestige and propaganda, not for profit—which explains why it is an operation of startling contrast. Russia literally is standing with one foot in the jet age and the other in an aviation era of 25 years ago.

For example, Aeroflot operates the world's largest fleet of jet transport planes. Yet most of its conventional, propeller-driven airliners are unpressurized and are forced to fly at the same altitudes as America's ancient and obsolete DC 3's.

Aeroflot has been flying jet air-

liners since 1955; the United States won't begin scheduled jet service until next winter. But Russia achieved this two-year jump by the simple process of modifying a jet bomber into a civil transport.

The American experts quoted in the memorandum agreed that the Soviet Union has made surprising advances in commercial aviation. But they also pointed out that Russia has much to learn in the way of service, passenger comfort and economical operation.

The show piece of Russia's civil air fleet is the TU 104, an all-jet airliner that has been flying all over the world, including a trip to the United States, for the past two years. Aeroflot is said to be operating about 40 such aircraft.

Dust Off Courtesy Sign

One of the rare niceties brought about by the current "talked about" recession is the gratifying respect commanded once again by the customer. Service with a smile, an adage forgotten by many clerks following World War II, has again become the vogue.

If you've invested in a showpiece lately or ordered a cup of coffee at the drugstore, you've probably recognized that your trade seems to be appreciated more. Or perhaps your automobile has received deluxe treatment at the service station. Almost everywhere you turn, competition has become keen, exhorting all to bring out the courtesy sign from some dusty shelf.

Economists that we listen to predict an upswing shortly. Presumably, business will then continue on its prosperous course. We hope that one effect of the so-called "down trend"—courtesy—will remain. It costs so little and means so much.

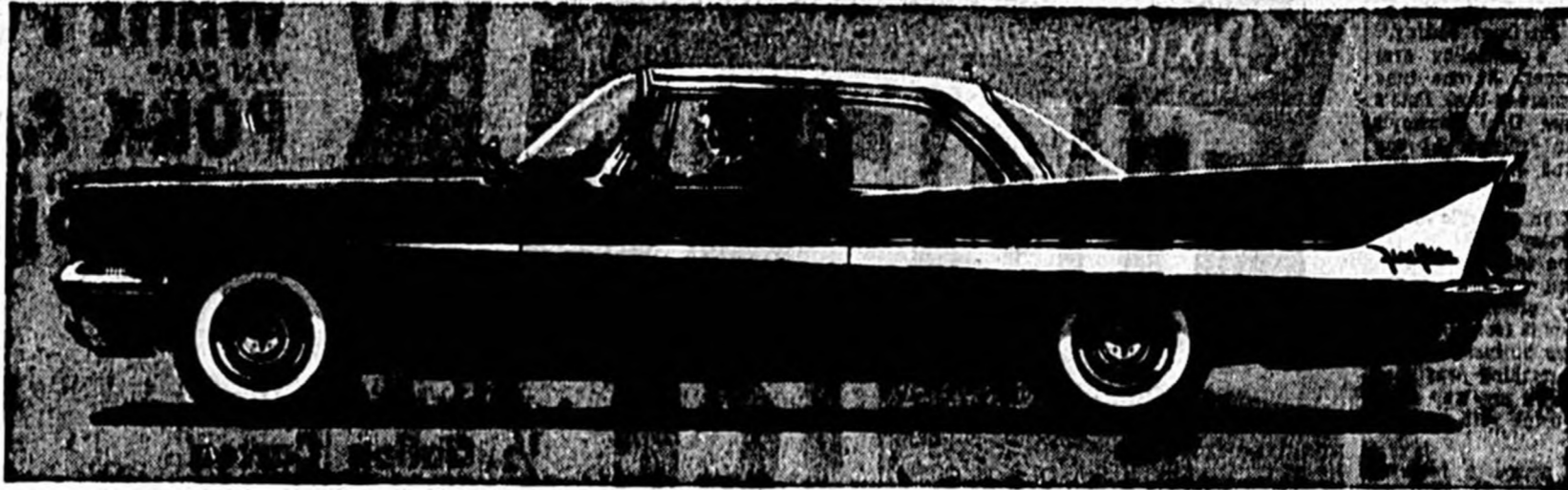


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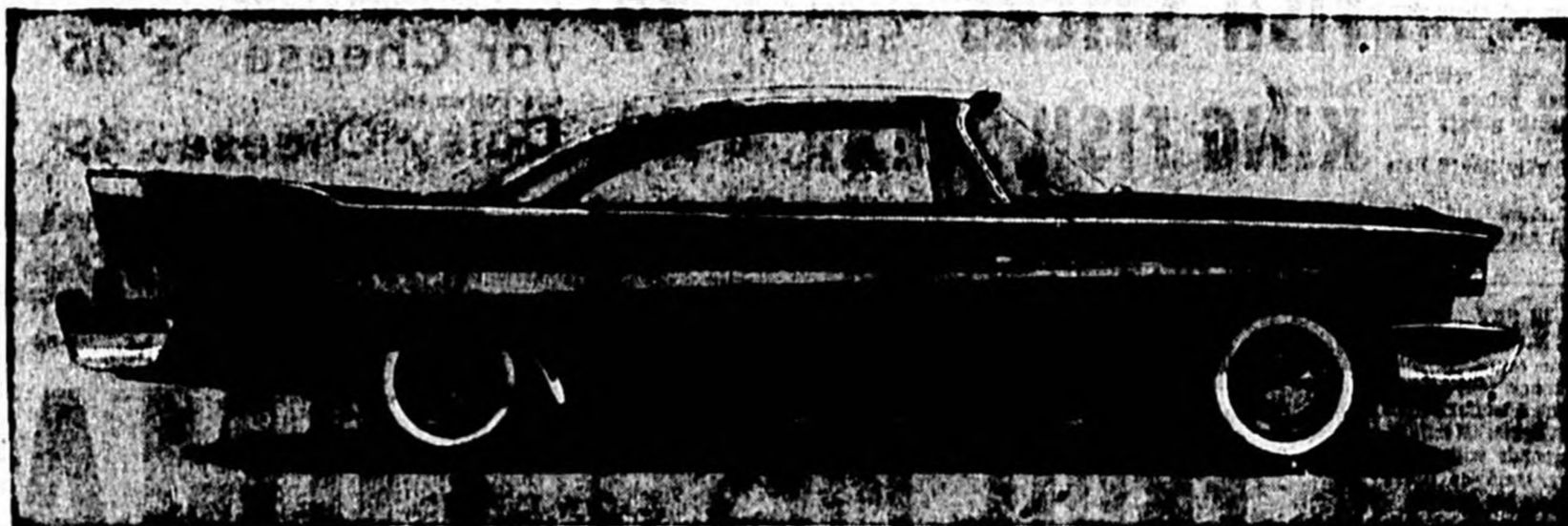
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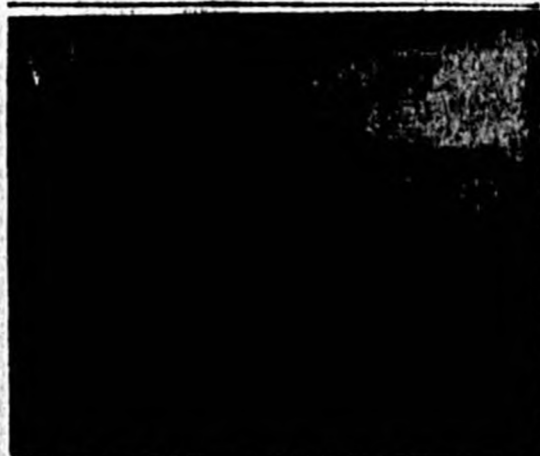

Animal acts, tumbling, and other feats of skill will go on continuously in the main ring. The prices are tiny, and all children, parents and friends are welcome.

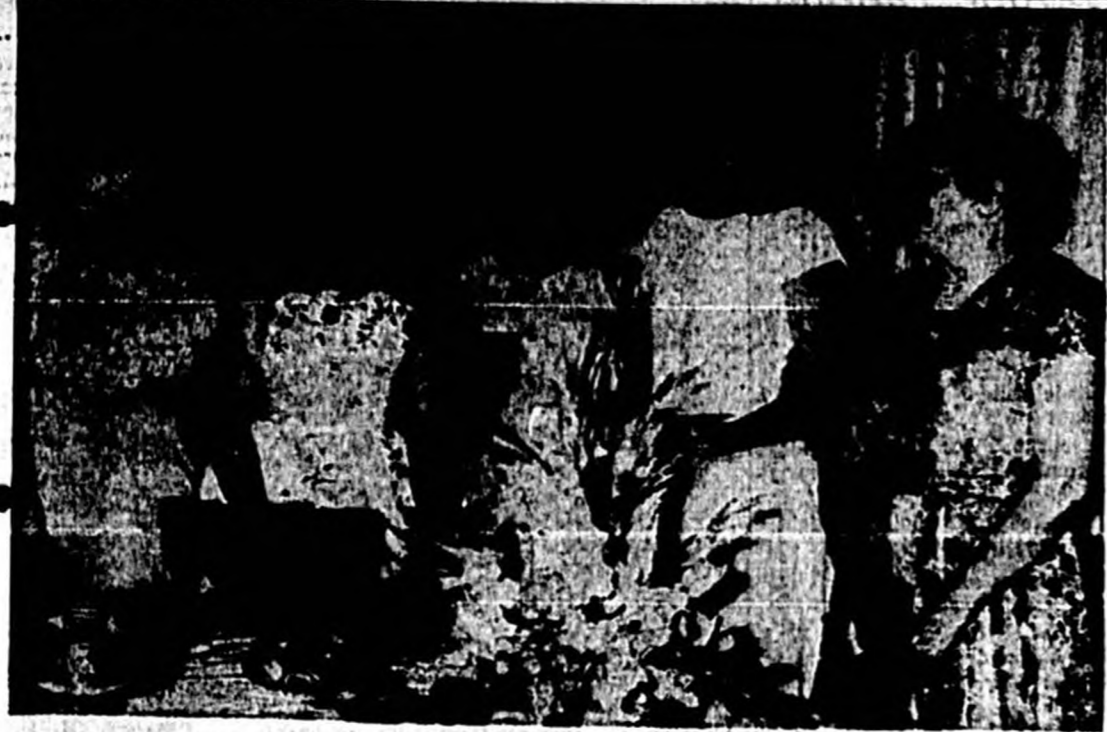

HOW TO HANG A CAKE
Recipes for sponge-type cakes (angel food, chiffon and sponge) say to invert the pan as soon as the cake has finished baking. Literally, that means you should "hang" the cake upside down to keep it from resting back in the cake pan and shrinking. It is easy to hang a cake baked in a tube pan as the tube fits over the neck of a salad oil or wine bottle. EPICUREAN POACHED EGGS
Chicken broth, milk, tomato juice, cream, wine, meat stock, consommé and thin soup may be used for poaching eggs in place of water. Allow 1 quart of liquid for 4 eggs. Bring the liquid to a fast boil over a high gas flame. Drop the eggs into the bubbling liquid and turn the flame to simmer. Cover the sauce pan and cook the eggs 3 to 5 minutes or until the whites are firm. Use a perforated ladle or spoon for removing the eggs, and trim off ragged edges. The poaching liquid may be thickened with a little cornstarch or flour and served over the eggs.

REAMS: Narrow or loosely stitched seams pull out easily with wear or washing. Strengthen by machine-stitching a seam about 1/16 inch deeper than the original seam. Set machine for 12 or 15 stitches per inch. If fabric frays, another row of stitching near the edge helps hold it. Or you can do some rapid overcasting by hand.

A sizing attachment or an over-caster for the sewing machine can help reinforce edges against fraying or pulling out.

Underarm seams of ragland or kimono sleeves get extra strain. These you can reinforce with tape. Open the seam, press out flat, paste 1/4-inch tape on top, and tack along the seam line with tiny stitches. Tape fastened this way won't show, but will keep the seam from tearing out.

Stylish slim skirts may pull out at the seam if they are too slim for the wearer's stride. Baste these seams by stitching about 4 inches of tape flat against the hem on the under side of the skirt.

Dangling threads: Fasten threads by pulling to the inside and tying securely. Or run them through a needle and fasten with a few over-and-over stitches. This will save ravelling and later re-stitching.

Plaquetas: Strengthen the ends of plaquetas with extra stitches, or even with a tape sewed on the end of the under side. Overcast or stitch down any loose or fraying edges that might catch in a zipper.

Pocket corners: Any pocket that is for use rather than decoration is likely to pull out at the corners. Pockets in children's clothing especially need to be strong. Reinforce with narrow tape stitched on the under side of the garment in line with the pocket top.

Fastenings: Obviously, it doesn't pay to wait until loose buttons fall off or buttonholes pull out. It takes only a minute to tighten buttons with strong thread secured by a final over-and-over stitch on the under side.

If buttonholes look frayed or weak, reworking prevents them from pulling out.

Sometimes all a buttonhole needs is a few extra stitches at each end. Check snags, hooks and eyes, too, so that they can be secured by a few stitches before they drop off.

Safety Makes Family Boating More Attractive

Recreational boating, America's fastest-growing family activity, is inherently safe, but one in which common sense should always prevail for all hands.

Always vitally interested in safety afloat, the Evinrude Boating Foundation continually sends out safety tips to new boating families and reminders to those who are old hands at the sport.

Start with boarding your boat. Step aboard as neatly at the center as possible, with lines taut and someone steadying the boat. Never jump aboard or step on a slippery gunwale.

Fill your gasoline tank carefully with a minimum of splashing and spilling and never smoke while filling the tank.

A first precaution, especially where children or non-swimmers are concerned, is proper life-preserving equipment. Lifejackets should be considered essential and they should be worn. Simply never take a chance.

Learn the basic signs of impending bad weather and never ignore them. If caught on the water by an approaching storm, head for shelter at the first sign of high winds or rain. Keep your boat headed into the waves and don't run before them.

Cross the wake of a large boat at a safe angle if you can't avoid it completely and slow down or stop before changing position in a small boat.

Slow down and use caution in approaching docks and harbors, respect the property of others by refraining from being a "cowboy" at any time. Don't take your boat too close to swimmers or

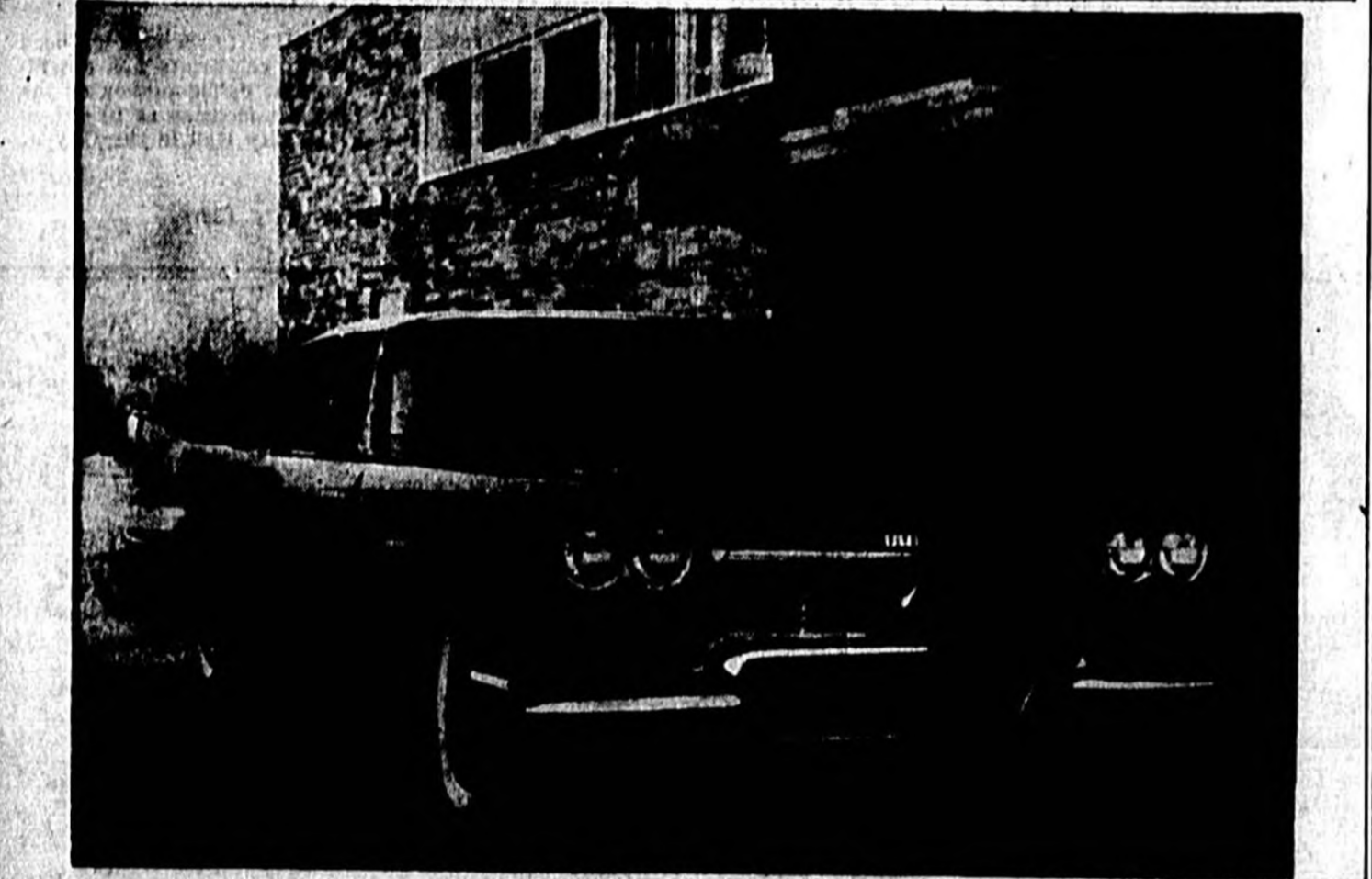

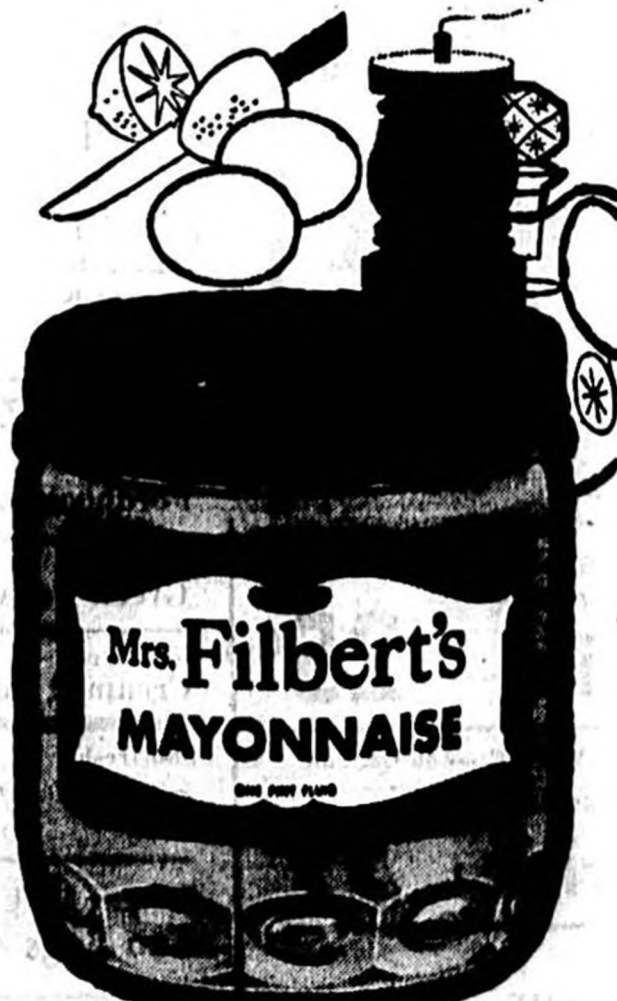

Paris (UPI) — President Rene Coty announced today he is calling in Gen. Charles de Gaulle to discuss setting up a government of public safety, thus virtually scrapping the Fourth Republic.

Coty said France is on the verge of civil war. The 76-year-old Coty indicated he would resign if the bitterly divided and temperamental assembly failed to go along with him. Coty said he also was asking De Gaulle to see what can be done toward a thorough reform of the Constitution, which in the last 13 years has enabled the assembly to overthrow 25 French governments. Coty made his stunning announcement in an unprecedented message to emergency meetings of both houses of the French parliament. Hopefully Divided Assembly It came against a background of open revolt in Algeria and Corsica and an assembly so hopelessly divided against itself that

de Gaulle seemed the only solution short of a military dictatorship or a communist-controlled "popular front."

Coty said that if his solution proved the wrong one he could only hand over his powers under the constitution to the National Assembly president. Committees of public safety first were formed immediately after the Revolution of 1789 which led to the guillotining of King Louis XVI. The first was followed by a second which came to exercise virtual dictatorial powers under Robespierre. It fell of its own excesses. Coty said he is calling in De Gaulle "to examine... what in the framework of republican legality is immediately necessary for a government of national safety."

Unprecedented Move His move — unprecedented in peacetime — followed a thinly veiled warning from Algeria's restive generals that further delay in bringing de Gaulle to power might set off open intervention by the military.

The De Gaulle government, Coty said, would see what could be done "in a short or long time, to carry out a profound reform of our institutions."

Two Cars Collide At Intersection; \$700 Damage Seen

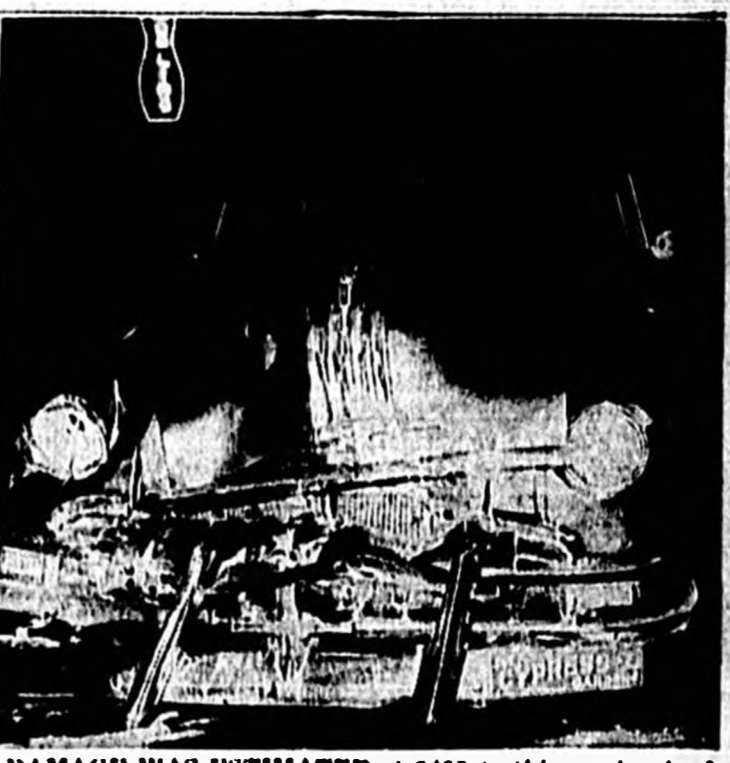
