

Franc Strengthened; Germans Trade Marks For Dollars

PARIS (AP) — The franc strengthened today as European exchange markets reopened, and in West Germany speculators rushed to exchange stocks of marks for U.S. dollars.

West German commercial banks maintained their restrictive policy on the franc, accepting only 500 marks worth at a rate of 50 marks per 100 francs. But within half an hour after trading opened, the central Deutsche Bundesbank had lost an estimated \$200 million of the vast dollar balances it accumulated during the week that speculators had been buying marks with francs.

Ellyer gave the 200 fans on hand quite a treat with his jumping antics as he pulled down rebound after rebound and gave the South Florida offense very rough road to box with his outstanding defense form.

Bruce Beallie was the only light for the visiting South Florida squad as he dumped in 17 points and pulled down 12 rebounds.

Pumpkin Pie Off Range Top

 BEAR COUNTRY: My mother cooked her pumpkin pie filling on top of the stove and turned it into a baked pie shell. I want to make that kind of pumpkin pie but unfortunately I've lost her recipe. Do you have one?
 NORTHEAST BRANCH: WEAR: MONTAGUE: READ: DR: Here's a recipe for the kind of pumpkin pie you want. The filling, thickened with cornstarch, is cooked on top of the stove and then it is turned into a baked pie shell. You'll find that this pie has heavy pumpkin flavor. It's not overly sweet and overly spiced.

TOP OF RANGE PUMPKIN PIE
 1/2 cup sugar
 3 tablespoons cornstarch
 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
 1/4 teaspoon ginger
 1/4 teaspoon cloves
 2 large eggs, slightly beaten
 1 can (1 pound) pumpkin (2 cups)
 1 cup milk
 Baked 8-inch pastry shell
 Sweetened whipped cream
 Pecans for garnish, if desired
 In a two-quart saucepan, thoroughly stir together the sugar, cornstarch, cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger and cloves. Stir in eggs and pumpkin. Gradually stir in milk. Stirring constantly, cook over medium heat until mixture comes to boil and boils two minutes. Cool to room temperature. Pour into baked shell. Chill at least two hours. Garnish with whipped cream and pecans.

Here then is a recipe from the book—an oatmeal cookie that we found delicious enough to serve to company.

DOBOTHY RODGERS' OATMEAL COOKIES
 1/2 cup sifted flour
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/4 pound (1 stick) butter
 1/2 cup sugar
 1/4 cup light cream
 1/4 cup dark corn syrup
 1 1/2 cups old-fashioned rolled oats
 1 teaspoon vanilla

On wax paper all together the flour, baking powder and salt. In a medium mixing bowl cream butter and sugar. Gradually stir in the flour mixture. Add the light cream and corn syrup; mix well. Add oats and vanilla; mix. Drop by level tablespoons about two inches apart on well-greased cookie sheets. Bake in a preheated 40 degree oven until golden brown—8 to 10 minutes. Makes about three dozen.

Braised Beef a la Broiler

 The French have a wonderful way of braising beef with red wine, brandy, vegetables, herbs and other seasonings.
 Recently we tried an American adaptation of this dish with delightful results. We used heavy-duty foil and cooked all the ingredients in a tightly closed foil package in the oven. And you don't even have to get out a skillet or sauteuse for browning the beef. You do the browning, utilizing the foil, on the broiler. Then the package is tightly closed and goes in the oven. By the time the meat is cooked, you collect a lot of good juice right in the foil package.

All you have to do then is to strain the liquid and thicken it slightly on top of the range. When we tried this recipe, we had a couple of cups of liquid—just the right amount for the meat. If by some chance there isn't enough liquid you can increase it by adding beef broth and also if you like, a little wine and brandy.

FRENCH-STYLE OPEN-BELLIED SHEEP
 4 to 5-pound boneless chuck or round beef roast
 1 medium onion, peeled and thinly sliced
 1 carrot, pared and thinly sliced
 1 rib celery, cut into thin rounds
 1/4 teaspoon pepper
 1 teaspoon paprika
 1 cup dry red wine
 1/4 cup brandy
 1 tablespoon tomato paste
 3 sprigs parsley
 1 clove garlic, peeled and minced
 1 teaspoon dried crushed thyme
 2 bay leaves
 2 whole cloves
 Cornstarch

Tear off a piece of heavy-duty foil large enough to completely wrap the roast and other ingredients. Place the foil in a shallow roasting pan and arrange meat in the center; fill up edge of foil leaving space to add onion, carrot and celery. Place the pan under the broiler and brown the meat fairly well, turning several times from side to side. When meat is about half-browned, add onion, carrot and celery so that they will brown lightly. Remove pan from oven. Set over thermostat at 300 degrees.
 Sprinkle meat with salt and pepper. Stir together the wine, brandy and tomato paste; add parsley, garlic, thyme, bay leaves and cloves; pour over meat.
 Seal foil with a drugstore fold; bring the two long ends of foil up over beef and vegetables to edges; meet; fold these edges together twice. Seal ends of foil by turning up and folding over twice.
 Roasters sealed package in the roasting pan to the 300-degree oven. Bake until on tender as you like—4 to 6 hours.
 Open foil and remove beef to a warm platter; keep warm in low oven.
 Place a fine-mesh strainer over a quart measure and strain juices into measure. Do not force vegetable through. Strain off fat. For each 1/4 cup of liquid, mix 1 tablespoon cornstarch with 1 tablespoon water until smooth. Pour liquid and cornstarch mixture into a saucepan. Over moderate heat, stirring constantly, cook 2 to 3 minutes until thickened, clear and boiling. Taste and add salt and pepper if needed. Makes 10 to 12 servings.

NOTE
 If you want to prepare this dish in advance, refrigerate the cooked meat; and the strained liquid separately. When ready to use, remove hardened fat for most of it; heat top of liquid. Measure liquid and make sauce as directed above; slice meat fairly thin and reheat in the sauce.

Knowles To Try Again

 Sanford City Commission in an action last night authorized Knowles to make another trip to Washington in an expanded effort to pry the Sanford Naval Air Station from the seemingly unflinching grip of the General Services Administration (GSA) — the governmental agency which now wants \$100 for the "meaty" part of the phased-out Navy facility.

Knowles indicated he would meet with GSA officials as well as Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) "big wigs" with a counter proposal made by City Commission after that group had learned of the GSA plans to "suck it to the city" by way of the pocketbook for 150 acres of the base which contains 99 per cent of the buildings.

Knowles returned Friday afternoon from a Miami conference with FAA regional leaders, who indicated support for the city's efforts to acquire the entire base including the airport for a reported \$1, after GSA offered only the airport and related buildings to the city.

FAA interest is primarily centered on the establishment of an airport which would, in time, serve as a major Central Florida terminal for private aircraft, now using the overburdened facilities at Orlando Herndon Field.

In another discussion regarding the lack of dressing room facilities at the Sanford Civic Center, Dr. Vann Parker and Vernon Mize members of the Sanford Mutual Concert Association, came before the group to ask approval of a design made by a local construction firm which sought to add on to the Civic Center the needed facilities at an estimated \$7,000 which could be passed on to renters of the auditorium.

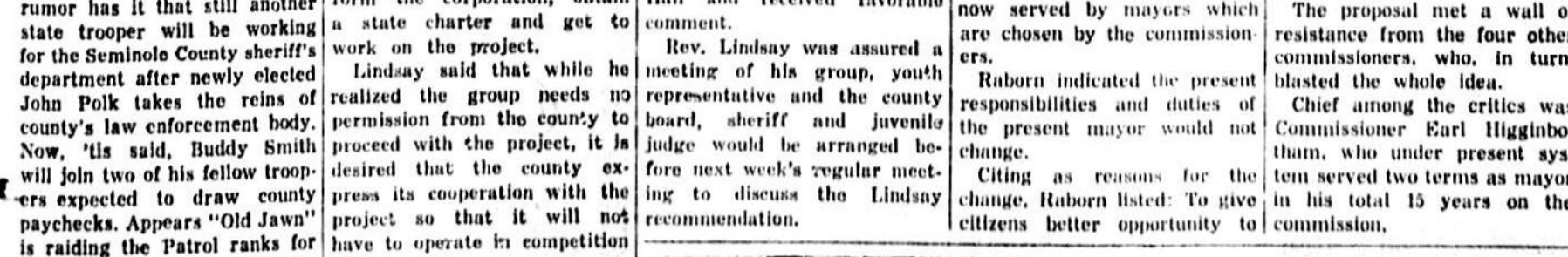
Holiday Schedule
