SID TERRIS AND MCGRAW CLASH TONIGHT IN N. Y.

Terris Rules As Favorite In Third Of Colorful Series Of Lightweight Title Bout

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—Once more the intense rivalry between Sid Terris and Phil McGraw breaks out in a rash of gloves tonight at Madison Square Garden.

Terris rules a strong favorite for the third number of this colorful lightweight series because of the fact that at that time he fouled McGraw in their second encounter he was away out in front and apparently had the Detroit florist headed toward a fall.

On the face of things, the series is an even break. To be sure, McGraw's victory was a negative one as he finished on the floor and Terris was disqualified for a low punch. On the other hand, McGraw gave an excellent account of himself in the first clash.

Terris got up from the floor that time to win but to this day there is a decided difference of opinion on that decision. The venerable Paddy Mullins, who manages McGraw, still glowers at boxing writers who agreed with the official verdict and Paddy was never given to making squawks. He generally takes the breaks philosophically but he contends that McGraw was the victim of a horrible miscarriage of Queensberry justice that night in Brooklyn.

In the old days when Terris was a skinny jumping-jack, he was not a crowd pleaser. Nowadays he pulls plenty of patronage because he fights more, dances less and seldom goes through a bout without hitting the canvas.

Income Tax Forms For 1928 Not To Be Distributed Jan. 1

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Dec. 23.—Peter H. Miller, collector of internal revenue, has just received advice from the Bureau of Internal Revenue at Washington that the blank income tax forms for the year 1928 are to be released on January 1, as has been done in the past.

A release date has not yet been decided upon, but will be duly announced in the newspapers.

All taxpayers, including individuals, partnerships, and corporations, who filed income tax returns for 1927 as soon as forms were released by the Bureau of Internal Revenue. The collector's office at Jacksonville has already prepared the forms for mailing and only awaits instructions for mailing them out.

The taxpayers who filed returns in Florida for the year 1926 are requested not to write to the office of the collector for blank forms, but may rest assured that their forms will be received as soon as permission is obtained to mail them. However, if blank forms are not received within a reasonable time after the release date is announced request should be made for them from the collector.

Taxpayers who are filing their first income tax return and those who filed returns in other districts for 1926 should also make request for forms. All requests should be addressed to the collector of Internal Revenue, Jacksonville, Florida.

Annual Road Show And Convention To Be Held Next Year

CLEVELAND, O., Dec. 23.—The twenty-first annual convention and road show of the American Road Builders' Association, scheduled to open in public hall here on January 9, promises to eclipse all its predecessors.

The meeting which will last five days will see more than 25,000 representatives from all parts of the two Americas present. Three hundred carloads of road building and maintenance equipment will be on exhibit at the hall.

The convention and show will be formally opened January 9, Manufacturers' day, by C. M. Babcock, president of the association.

Governor Donahy, of Ohio, will be honorary chairman January 10, which has been designated as Governor's day.

Pan-American day, January 11, will be given over to the development of closer relations with the Pan-American countries, especially in regard to their highway problems. Dr. Gil Borges, of the Pan-American union will preside.

The last day will be devoted to the road show for the benefit of contractors, officials and engineers.

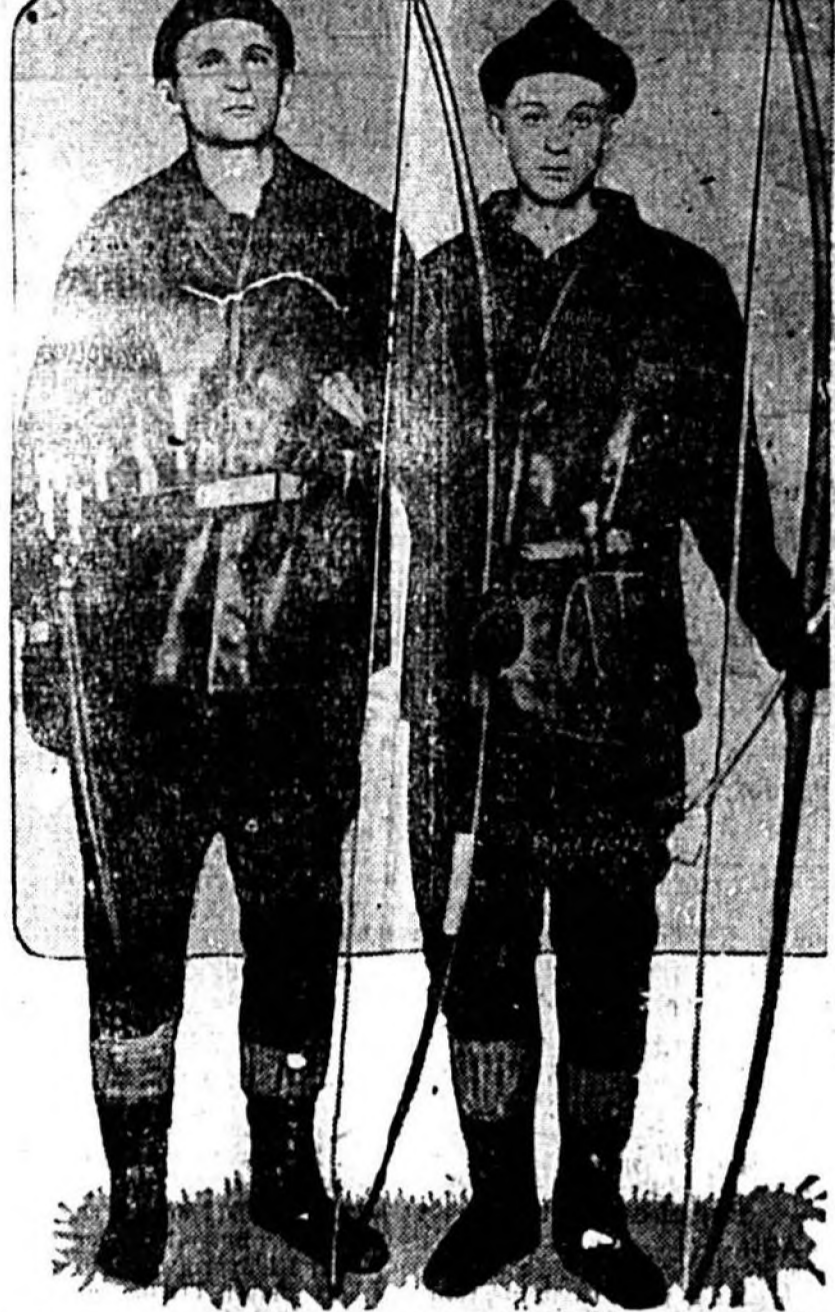

Outlook For Good Railway Transportation Appears To Be Good States Expert

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—(INS)—The problems of the railroads—if any, are not self-imposed, but consist for the most part of conditions which those outside the railroad ranks are seeking to impose on them.

This is the opinion of E. E. Loomis, the president of Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, who told International News Service today that if the railroads are permitted to proceed along present lines concentrating their whole effort upon the effectiveness of their service to the public, there is nothing in the situation to be faced in 1928, calculated to give the slightest concern to those interested in, and dependent upon, good transportation.

Loomis believes that the rates charged by the American railroads have no relation whatever to the so-called farmers' problem.

"In my opinion," he said, "even if the railroads should carry agricultural products for nothing, after a short while, what was previously paid for transportation would be completely absorbed, through the middleman between

the farmer and the consumer, and thus the farmer would find himself no better off than he is today.

A confident position on railroad prospects is also taken by Carl R. Gray, the president of the Union Pacific Railroad System. This is due in large measure to the favorable crop yields in the territory served by this road, and the large volume of railroad traffic created by abundant harvests.

TAX CUT BILL BY MARCH AIM OF DEMOCRATS

Party Heads Intend To Fight For Legislation In Face Of Plan To Delay Action

President Fears Treasury Deficit Democrats Angle For Support Of Republicans From The West

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24.—(INS)—A Democratic drive to put tax reduction legislation on the statute books before March 1 was announced today in the face of an administration plan to postpone action on the \$289,000,000 tax relief bill until after congress acts on all bills involving major appropriations.

The administration's plan to "pigeon-hole" the tax bill in the senate finance committee will meet with sharp Democratic opposition. Hopeful of drawing aid from midwestern Republicans, the Democrats will seek to force senate action on the measure by February 1 and its final enactment in time to be applicable on the income tax payments due next March 15.

Fear of a treasury deficit was said to be behind the administration plan to delay action on the bill. This postponement was reported to have the approval of both President Coolidge and Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, in a speech at the house exceeded by \$400,000,000 the maximum reduced fixed by the administration. The Democrats however threaten to force the bill out of committee and before the senate by January 25 at the latest. This would enable the senate to pass it by February 10 and its enactment into law before the end of February.

Senator Simmons (D) of North Carolina, minority tax leader, was said to feel the same way. The insurgents, who called the "balance of power," were non-committal. The insurgent platform has been against tax reduction, except where discriminations existed, in the belief that all treasury surpluses should be applied to reduction of the national debt instead of taxes.

Southern Will Keep Offices At Capital

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24.—(INS)—Headquarters of the Southern Railway will be maintained in Washington, despite campaigns launched by several southern cities to obtain a transfer, it was reported today. Atlanta, Richmond and Charlotte have been angling for the Southern to move.

Wark May Get New Western Dry Job

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24.—(INS)—W. H. Wark, former state prohibition director for Kansas, is under consideration for appointment as administrator for the newly created district comprising Nebraska, Kansas and Oklahoma, it was learned today.

YULE GREETINGS ARE OFFERED BY LOCAL MINISTERS

Pastors Of Several Churches In Short Statements Give Significance Of Christmas Offer People Well Wishes

Christmas messages to the people of Sanford from the ministers of this city were today gathered by The Herald in accordance with a custom inaugurated several years ago. The significance of the Yuletide season, the joy of giving and the typical Christmas spirit were among the topics discussed by the clergy.

The messages are as follows: FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH Dr. F. D. King

An indefinable spirit pervades our country today. In every passenger car; on every farm and in every factory; in every store and in every office; up with the flying machine, and down in the submarine; wherever Christianity has gone, the atmosphere is strikingly different. It is twenty-fourth of December.

The weather man tells us that the temperature is about the same as that of the average winter day. It is not a question of latitude or longitude. In one section of the country the hills are covered with snow, and in another section the flowers are sending out their fragrance on every breeze. In one home the children shiver with cold, and in another they are being destroyed by luxury. But in every home the day is different—strikingly different—from any other season of the year.

In other days One came to Earth quite unlike any other that the world has known. Around the homes in which He lives the flowers—refreshing flowers—bloom every day in the year, and in the homes virtues glow both by day and night. In the cities where the name of this One is honored, and where His will is the law of the majority, manufacturing, city building, and trading are matters of importance, but minor importance, and the fostering of imperishable ideals and immortal principles are matters of chief concern.

OFFERS ROTARY BILL

PRIVATE SALE BRINGS CITY 95 ON BOND ISSUE

Wright, Warlow & Company Of Orlando and Pruden Company of New York Acquire \$510,000 Issue For \$484,500

Part Of Issue Bears 6 Per Cent Interest Rate On \$210,000 Will Be Five And Half; Officials Satisfied With Purchase

The sale of \$510,000 worth of Sanford refunding bonds has been negotiated by the City Commission with the bond houses of Wright, Warlow and Company of Orlando and Pruden Company of New York, according to action taken by the officials at a private sale held on Thursday afternoon.

The securities were sold at 95, bringing \$484,500 for the whole issue. The purchasers agreed to pay accrued interest on the bonds between the date of their issuance and their delivery. It is believed that it will be about Jan. 15 or 20 before the securities will be ready for transfer to the bond houses.

The price was one of the lowest ever brought by Sanford securities but under the circumstances was considered by city officials as being exceptionally good.

WEATHER OUTLOOK GIVEN

Sinclair Contempt Trial Recesses For Christmas; Legal Tangle Is Imminent

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24.—The criminal trial of Harry F. Sinclair, millionaire oil operator, William J. Burns, the detective, and four of their associates, stood adjourned over the holidays today with every evidence that before a conclusion has been reached it will have become one of the most involved legal tangles in American jurisprudence.

Analysis of his testimony, the greater part of which was conflicting, has developed little which could be construed as evidence of coercion or intimidation. The witness has admitted he came voluntarily to the district attorney's office and asked permission to make his statements, and further, that although O'Leary phrased and wrote the affidavit in dispute, he, Kidwell, had read them personally before signing and swearing to them.

No Substitute For Christ Jesus

About the same time that Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, there was born a Tyana, in Capadocia, a child who grew to be a man of considerable importance in the ancient world. His name was Apollonius. He studied medicine in the temple of Aesculapius and attended all the various philosophical schools of his day. He traveled far and wide, in Egypt, Parthia and India, acquainting himself with wisdom, mysticism and sorcery of those countries. Upon his return, developing great activities as a moral reformer of Greece, Italy and Spain, he gathered to himself many followers and organized them into congregations very much like our Christian churches.

An attempt was made, through the use of the story of Apollonius, to discredit Christianity in the time of Emperor-Septimius Severus, late in the second century. At the instance of the wife of Septimius Severus, one Philostratus wrote and published a life of Apollonius. He recited incidents in the experience of Apollonius very similar to those recited about Jesus in the gospels. A chorus of swans were said to have sung together at his birth. He was reputed to have cast out devils, raised the dead, healed the sick and mysteriously disappeared and reappeared. Sacred voices were said to have been heard out of the heavens approving him as a great teacher. There is no doubt about the fact that Apollonius was a remarkable character, and that he performed a great many marvelous deeds and taught an exalted philosophy of life.

The life of Apollonius only serves to emphasize that element in the religion of Jesus Christ which is its distinctive feature. Had Jesus been a man like Apollonius, and only a man, the world would have heard nothing more of Jesus than it has heard of Apollonius. But it has been far different. Jesus is more potent in the world today than he has ever been and exercises a great influence over the lives and activities of men. He is still the great saving power, working in the hearts of mankind, to deliver men and women from the thrall-dom of sin. The hope of mankind rests upon Jesus rather than upon Apollonius, because Jesus is the spiritual power through which mankind realize their spiritual aspirations and hopes. It is because, Jesus today, quite as much as in the days when he walked among men, enables those who believe in him to put off the old man, which has waxed corrupt through sin, and to put on the new man which, through God, has been renewed in righteousness, that he retains his place in the esteem and affections of mankind. As long as humanity needs a savior from sin, just so long will the gospel of Jesus Christ, which is the power of God unto salvation, retain its place of pre-eminence in the world. Only a man like Apollonius only serves to emphasize the distinctive element of the religion of Jesus Christ, namely, its power to save. Jesus Christ succeeds because he saves into the utmost all who draw near unto God through him.

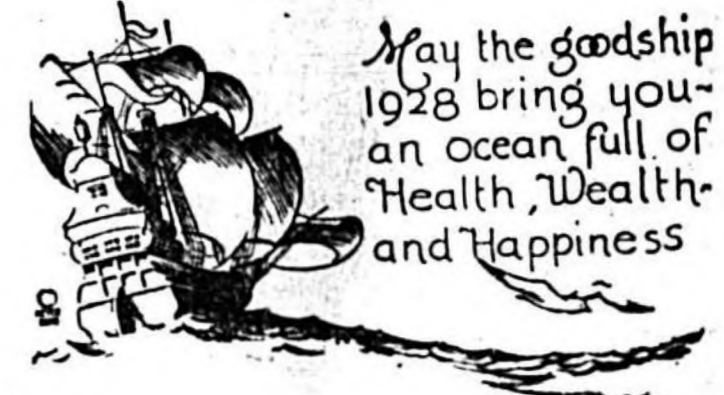

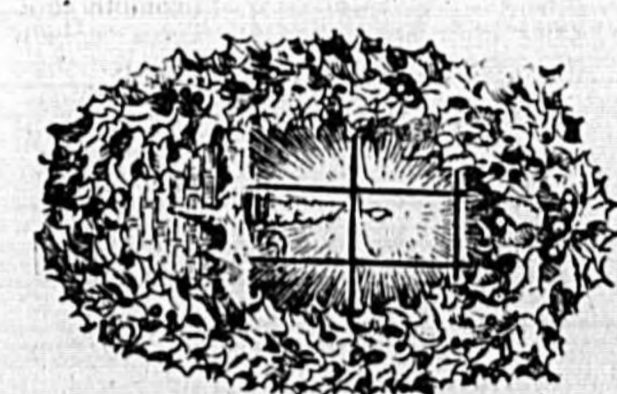

Scarface Al Capone Flings Challenge At Officers As He Paces Joliet Cell For Carrying Concealed Weapons

CHICAGO, Dec. 24.—(INS)—"Scarface" Al Capone paced up and down his cell. He had been picked up in Joliet, Ill., upon his return to Chicago from Los Angeles and confined to a cell upon the charge of carrying concealed weapons.

"I'm mad!" he shouted in such a loud tone that jailers came running with shotguns. Capone turned to them and sneered:

"Law and order! Protectors of the common people! The great police! Law and order—hell. They are hounding me to death. I'm through with all police. They can go to hell and be damned!"

Capone resumed his pacing while his interviewer waited until the great gang chieftain's rage subsided. Finally he sank to the hard creaking bench—bench and bed—and sighed.

"I'm going back to Chicago. It's my home. I pay taxes there. My friends are there. I've done nothing—nothing at all—that should make me leave Chicago. I've lived there for ten years. It's 'home' to me," Capone said.

Afraid of Police
"They call me a great gang chieftain—a gang leader. I'm not. Why do I carry guns—why do I have machine guns? In fear of gang assassination? Hell, no. Because of the police."

"They drag me into jail on every excuse. They tell the world I'm a killer, a bad man, the terror of the world. Naturally I get a reputation. They arrest me if a man is murdered. Capone gangsters did it," they tell everybody. Then when they have nothing on me, they look me for disorderly conducts and the judge discharges me for lack of evidence."

"A man gets tired of that in the end. It's the end for me now. I'm mad and I'm going to fight these protectors of law and order."

Two scars, one on the forehead, the other on the left cheek, became crimson as blood rushed into his face. He rose from the bench and resumed his pacing of the narrow cell.

Capone is short of stature. He is about 34 years old but looks 45.

Here Ten Years
Ten years ago Capone was a different man. He dressed like a laborer and, in fact, was a laborer, an immigrant from the shores of Sicily. He came to Chicago and worked first in saloons and vice houses. Patterning his dress after the gaudy regalia of his only companions, panderers, he was known as the "sheik" type.

When national prohibition came it opened up a new field to the managers of vice resorts. Bootlegging came in the fields. Capone had worked industriously for his bosses. He never "mused-in" or "other man's field." In time he became a close associate of Johnny Torrio, now reported in hiding in New York.

Capone was soon promoted to first lieutenant of Torrio, who owned a vast syndicate in Chicago. Torrio, ran afoul of the prohibition law and was sentenced to serve a nine months sentence in a jail at Waukegan.

Capone headed the syndicate in Torrio's absence and when the latter term was up, Capone politely said: "Get out." Torrio, much wiser than many gangsters, now dead, got out. That's why he's alive today.

Capone moved into Cicero, outlying town in the western boundaries of Chicago and set up his feet at the Hawthorne Inn.

Gangsters came and challenged Capone's supremacy. Some of them were Earl "Hymie" Weiss, Dion O'Bannon, Big Pal Moran, the many O'Donnel brothers, and countless others. Only the coro-

ner's office now has the details of their demise.

Things got too hot for "Scarface" in Cicero. When a machine gun battalion drew abreast of the Hawthorne Inn and riddled it with bullets, Capone knew the town was getting too hot. He then moved to the Metropole Hotel, in the heart of the former "Red-light" district in Twenty-second street in Chicago.

That's where he now lives. He is reported to have two floors, a private elevator, private barber and his lieutenants swarm the hotel. When Capone "goes to market" with him goes two car-loads of friends. When Capone visits the City Hall or the Congress Hotel, so do twelve "companions."

When Capone recently visited Los Angeles, so did two trusty lieutenants. But Capone got off the train in Joliet and police frisked him and found weapons. With his companions and two car-loads of men awaiting him, Capone was lodged in jail.

It was then Capone issued his dictum.

PALM BEACH, Fla., Dec. 24.—(INS)—This quaint little playground of society and wealth has staged its customary Rip Van Winkle act and another season is on.

And the multi-millionaire manufacturer, who is so bustling and crisp by ordinary? He is in his dressing gown and slippers; for last night he stayed up past midnight, leading a group of children on a hunt for Santa Claus.

In other words, these men and all the rest of us have, today, declared a moratorium on workaday seriousness and dignity. We have ceased to pretend that we are important grown-ups, filling positions of responsibility and trust, and have lapsed back into the state we enjoy most—that of carefree, boy-

It would be fine for all of us if we could wear the purposive earnestness of working hours like a garment, to be dropped when working hours are over. We need to get down on our knees and

with trains often, to romp with children—even, irresponsibly and gaily, to kiss charming female callers, perhaps.

For these things lead to laughter and a cherry disposition and make life seem less grim and forbidding. And that is what we need.

Long live the Christmas spirit!

Beveridge Book Of Lincoln's Life To Be Published Shortly

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Dec. 24. Fears that the masterpiece of the Senator Albert J. Beveridge would be lost to the world have been allayed with word here from friends that his biography of Abraham Lincoln will be published in July or August of next year.

When Beveridge died suddenly several months ago he was in the midst of his historical labors which were expected by scholars to produce a greater work than his famous "Life of John Marshall."

Assembling of the Lincoln manuscripts of her husband has been entrusted by Mrs. Beveridge to Worthington C. Ford, Secretary of the Massachusetts Historical Society, who has obtained a leave off absence to work at Beverly Farms, Mass., where the former senator had a home.

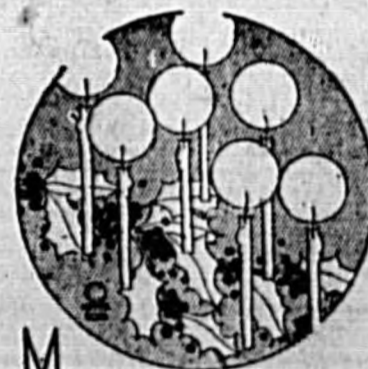

To begin with in the modern art it seems to be largely a matter of perspective. That sounds like the wisest bromide,—but it isn't. A low perspective especially characterizes the modern things. One is expected to sit on a cushion,—or low stool, or at the very highest on a bench lower than the average chair, which is eighteen inches from the floor.

For this purpose there are lovely gay cushions to sit on,—and a tray along side of an unusual shape with a mirror top and feet, that bring it the least bit higher than the cushions.

A gift of a table to fit in with the low perspective might be much appreciated. There are several kinds. One was composed of three circular glass shelves graduated in size, the smallest at the top. These had a center rod surmounted with a cut crystal handle, and the base of this rod was a silver star. Another table was of a most amusingly odd shape, painted orange

with queer little spots and nooks, holes, etc.

Breakers And Flower Bowls
If she has such a table you may want to give her something for it; and there are many new things on which to choose. There are delightfully weird grotesques from Austria. Some of these have no more serious purpose in this world than to be laughed at. Others are ash trays or incense burners. Chinese elephants, with their fine device of modeling fit in beautifully with the modern art.

Bowls for flowers come in never ending varieties. The year low ones of odd shapes are especially designed to hold cactus plants, surely one would not feel tempted to sit on one of these low tables if a warning in the way of many spined cactus sat on top of it.

A New Thing In Light
If your friend likes flowers, she may enjoy a new wrought in iron stand that holds three pots at different heights. The shape suggests a husky and vigorous sunflower, but is painted red and green.

Bottles filled with colored water are made into lamps and have bright leaved shades, fit very well with the modern effect.

A very new and lovely thing in the way of a light was held by a kneeling figure in pottery on an onyx base. The clouded glass she held upright reminded you of a calla lily. In its center was a flame-shaped electric globe. The effect was at once dignified and most unusual.

Nice Things In Glass
If you have friends who like glass you will find some very excellent things awaiting your selections. For the hostess there is a punch bowl with glasses to match. The punch bowl is high and has a dome shaped lid. At one side is a notch for the handle of the ladle to project. The bowl and glasses are painted with sprays of flowers. A handsome tray completes the set. For one who enjoys the sun room or porch, there are several kinds of lemonade sets. A basket tray holds the pitcher with glasses set around it and has a high handle over all, so that it may be carried easily. These sets come in different colors, rose amber, green and soon. In the same part of the store, intricate arrangements of glass beads are made for gifts,—peacocks and pheasants and birds,—such odd birds that never were.

New And Old In Jewelry
Selecting of beads; if one is able to give jewelry for one's gift, there are things that make one catch one's breath at some of the jewelry shops. Here again the ancient

and modern are sharply contrasted. If the jeweler has collected, cares for old things, you will find.

If the one to whom you are giving some of these for you. Little sets are available, for instance a necklace, a pair of earrings and a brooch, that match, and were made for the little of 1880. Sometimes a pair of bracelets are included.

"Just What I Wanted"
Jewelry for personal adornment has been influenced strongly by called for greater variety in hat ornaments. Wide bracelets are worn. Pins are used for the shoulders or hip, where formerly bar pins were used for the open collar of shirtwaists. Pearls fit in with so many kinds of costumes that they have had great popularity.

Consider the one on whom you are about to inflict your gift. (Alas some gifts are an infliction, aren't they. It makes one perfectly glib to have to say "thank you" for them). To give that very thing is the most fun of all. May you succeed in pleasing each of your friends is our parting good wish for you.

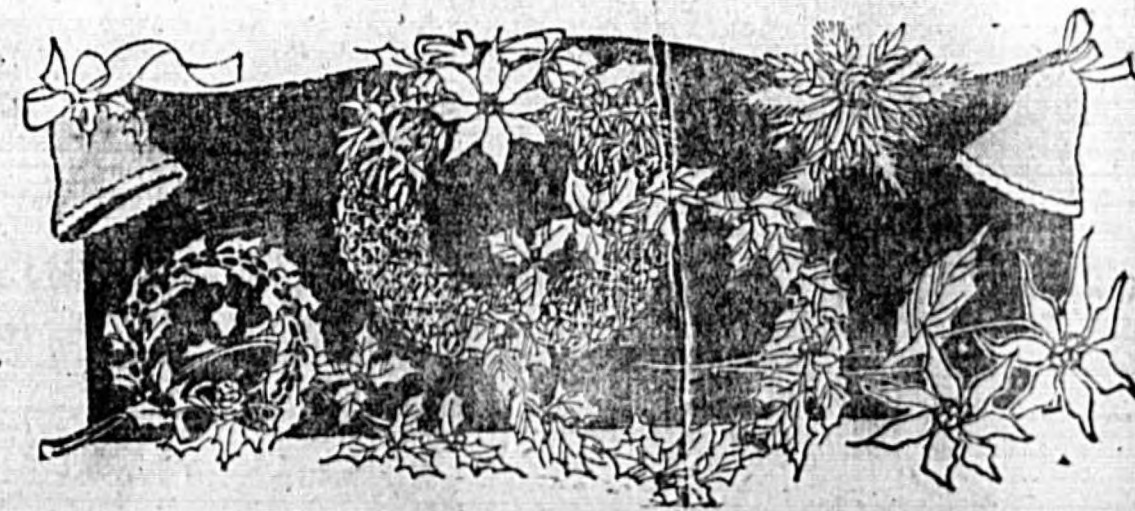

CIVIL WAR KEEPS CHINA IN MENIAL PLACE AS NATION

Chinese Civil War Has Caused American Editors To Use More Rough Language Than In Any Story Of Year

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—(INS)—The Chinese civil war during 1927 caused American editors to use more asterisks and rough language than any other story of the year, it was front page news through a large part of the year, for the first time since the various scrapping among themselves back in 1911.

This was not because of any new war or fresh outbreak there. The war lords are still fighting the same old war which had its beginning with the founding of the Chinese Republic. But this year, Chinese war news was of vital interest to the American public.

The reason was that during the early months of 1927 the very studies of American and European influence in China—Shanghai, Hankow, Tientsin, Canton, Canton, Peking, and a dozen other important commercial cities where thousands of American and other foreigners lived, were engulfed in the fighting, and the foreign empire in China was seriously threatened with utter extinction.

In January riots broke out at the borders of the British concession at Hankow, which the British finally turned over to the Nationalist for policing, rather than to use bloodshed by maintaining British authority there with British guns.

Nationalist Victories

The opening of the year witnessed the beginning of the brilliant series of victories for the Nationalists in their great northward sweep. The military forces of the Kuomintang, or Nationalist, Revolutionary party of Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the Chinese George Washington, were commanded by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek, a brilliant strategist, while the civilian government was presided over by the equally brilliant Eugene Chen, foreign minister. Behind the Nationalist regime hovered the shadow of Soviet Russia, in the form of Michael Borodin noted Soviet diplomat and a corps of Russian technical advisors, including the great military strategist, General Stalin.

Northward Chiang Kai-shek and his cohorts swept from the southern provinces, crushing General Chuan-fang, military governor of the Yangtze provinces in

nut-cracker movement. Shanghai was threatened and the foreign residents, fearing the Communist elements in the Kuomintang and the mob forces in any Chinese army, were gravely alarmed. Britain, the United States and

Japan hurriedly despatched large armed forces to protect their interests there.

On March 21 Shanghai fell to Chiang Kai-shek, following the defection of General Li Pao-yi, garrison commander at Shanghai,

who sold out to Chiang. After two days of pandemonium the Nationalists established order in Shanghai and swept on up the Yangtze, capturing Nanking two days later.

With Christmas but a few days ahead, Fire Chief M. N. Cleveland wishes, for the safety and happiness of every resident in Sanford, to issue a few precautionary do's and don'ts, as follows:

- "If you must have a candle in the window on Christmas Eve, make it an electric one—that is safe.
- "If a Christmas tree is used, make sure that it is securely set up so that it will not topple over, and keep it away from heating and lighting fixtures.
- "Use metal tinsel, flake asbestos and powdered mica for snow effects in stead of the highly dangerous paper clippings and cotton.
- "Do not illuminate the tree with candles. Colored electric light assemblies are more ornamental and, if used with care are safer. A spot-light focused upon the tree is, however, the safest method of all, and gives a pleasing effect.
- "Smokers should exercise great care with their matches and smoking materials while near trees and decorations. Keep matches out of the reach of small children.
- "Toys requiring alcohol, gasoline, or kerosene should be avoided, as should the flimsy toy motion-picture machines using inflammable film.
- "Cheap electrical playthings should be forbidden, as they are often defectively wired and have insecure, dangerous connections. Such electrical apparatus has caused serious burns and fires.
- "If it is felt that Santa Claus must be present at the celebration, he should be persuaded to avoid long cotton whiskers, and should keep away from open lights and fires. As an additional precaution, his costume should be made partially fireproof by spraying upon it a solution of water glass, obtainable at any drug store.
- "If anyone's clothing does catch on fire, the victim should be promptly rolled in a rug or woolen cloth in order to smother the flames, which should be kept on hand.
- "Mechants should keep their places of business free from rubbish and paper accumulations, and should insist that employes keep clean and clear all exits.
- "A most important safeguard is to remove all evergreens immediately after Christmas. Aside from the tradition of bad luck attached to the keeping of evergreens in the house after New Year's Day, they represent, as they dry out, an increasingly dangerously hazzard.
- "Never leave an electric iron connected to a Light socket, or resting on any inflammable material or object.—Always disconnect and place on some fire-proof article for that purpose.

CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH

"And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth."

"In the first three gospels we have portrayed the story about Jesus. In the gospel of John and the Epistles of Paul it is possible that we have more nearly, not the thoughts about Jesus, but the thoughts of Jesus. The Greek 'Logos' which is translated 'Word' signifies something more embracing than the English 'Word,' something which is indeed very close to the English 'Idea.' And so we may read, 'And the Idea of God was made flesh, and dwelt among us, full of grace and truth.'"

"Interesting have been the theological controversies that have been waged through the years concerning the nature of Jesus, yet it might be hard to convince the average man that these represent a Heavenly Father's loving 'Idea' clothed in the intimacy of the human flesh.

You have to believe in Christmas cards to enjoy them. If you believe in them you enjoy them. If they are a cold to you, you miss all the fun. One can picture perfectly the sort of card you'd send. There would be one single bit of stereotyped holly at the top, neat engraving below, and that is all. The person receiving your card will give it one glance, and say, "Oh, the 'old-fashioned,'" and toss it in a box of others just like it and pass it on to one more interesting and original.

The Note of Warmth
The point of which is—don't feel please, don't feel it your solemn duty to send Christmas cards, because the card will always show it. The friend who receives it will feel as if a dash of cold water had struck him in the face and a clammy hand had been laid in his. That feeling is somewhat lacking in the proper Christmas spirit, oh, ever so slightly, you know.


A Variety of Good Cards
With all the perfectly delightful designs in cards arranged for you by the several publishers, there is really no excuse for frigid and meaningless ones. In your favorite bookshop you will find a goodly array from which to choose. The stationery department of a big store is usually equally well supplied. You can find an excellent assortment from which to pick yours, as early as September. And early choice in your cards as well as in your other shopping will save much disappointment and vexation. In the shop there there are seen books with cards and envelopes, matted, and prices below. The price usually includes the printing or engraving, of your name in the space left specially for it.

Making Your Own
Artists always have the advantage over others in that they can design their own Christmas cards. Sometimes they cut the blocks necessary and print them as well. The charm of these has become so apparent that many of the commercial cards imitate the hand-cut block with the effect of original work.

Some of the methods of printing are most interesting. A silver deer springing blithely over a snow laden landscape on a grey paper graced one card found in the shops. Reindeer seem especially popular this year. Last year the cards all seemed to show jolly stage coaches laden with holiday merry makers. Santa and his swift sleigh is to have the limelight this year.

Gay Tints in Cards
Gay tints of papers are characteristic of this year's Christmas messages. Silver stars are scattered over some envelope and card. One especially vigorous in color wore brilliant stripes in green, red and silver on a black ground. A greeting was printed on the cover and inside a white insert was tied. One side had a picture of men singing Christmas carols, the other message of good will.

The Christmas Card Fever
It is suggested for children's cards that they do not tackle too intricate a design. It is far easier to draw than to cut a design. The cutting of the lettering will cause the most trouble. A holly wreath with open spaces left for hand coloring is a good subject. Candles, sticks, pine boughs and cones, and Christmas trees lend themselves to the somewhat stiff treatment involved in cutting blocks. Correspondence cards are excellent for use in printing because the envelopes are made to match. Once a person becomes interested in printing his own Christmas cards he is forever lost. For from then on he will not only send forth his own humble efforts from year to year, but will take great delight in collecting the efforts of others, smitten with a peculiar sort of fever, that of hand wrought Christmas Cards.
