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Homebuilders, Lake Mary To Meet On Fees

The postponed showdown between builders and Lake Mary's city government over impact fees is again set. In other action, the commission will make a decision at their next meeting on whether to allow the city's garbage collection service to provide selfinsurance for \$500,000 as part of their \$1 million liability insurance plan, and will decide whether to grant waivers for nstruction of an office building.

June 11 is the new date for the impact fee-building moratorium meeting, at which city commissioners will discuss adopting a voluntary impact fee/building moratorium ordinance. Representatives of the Home Builders Association of Mid-Floida are expected to attend the session. Commissioners set the date during Thursday night's regular meeting.

The meeting was postponed from late May, when City Attorney Robert Petree indicated to commissioners that he needed more time to develop the ordinance.

The ordinance is to replace an impact fee resolution, adopted May 15. The resolution was rescinded later, after the home builders threatened to sue the city. Home builders President Ken Levitt claimed the resolution was illegal, and demanded the legislation. Petree told the commission the resolution was not defendable in court.

The ordinance Petree is producing says builders must pay interim impact fees which will be held in an escrow account, while permanant fees are developed. Those who do not pay the interim fees will be subject to a building moratorium.

The home builder's association claims that impact fees must be adopted by ordinance, dacked by extensive study The city has a growth fee committee working on the development of a fee schedule, and plans to hire a professional consultant to work on the project as well.

Commissioners denied requests for two of four variences requested for the construction of an office building at 370 West Lake Mary Blvd. Denied were requests for a waiver of a six-foot brick wall or a four-foot earthen berm, substituted with a wooden fence, and a variance of the 35-foot buffer zone between a parking lot and residential property to the north, replaced by a 25 foot buffer. Property owner Robert Cushman filed the requests. Other variences for the property, to be considered at the commission's June 19 meeting, include a mulch parking area instead of paving, and postponement of providing sidewalks until Lake Mary Blvd. is widened, as well as cross access to neighboring properties. Commissioner Russ Megonegal praised the planning and zoning board for their extensive work on the project.

P&Z Board chairman Jim Talmadge, who owns residential property neighboring the Cushman land, said present ordinances "preclude granting waivers" requested for the project. "It is my opinion that you don't have the authority to grant those waivers," Talmadge said. Petree will review the issue, and report to the commission.

A final decision on permitting the city's new garbage collection agency to be self-insured for the first \$500,000 of a claim was also delayed until the next regular meeting.

Western Waste Industries, Orlando, was awarded the exclusive garbage collection franshise starting May 1, under a five year pact. The franchise agreement calls for the company to provide \$1 million in liability insurance. However, the company has claimed to be self-insured for the first half of such an award, and the city has taken exception.

Power Outage

Electricity was off to about 2.200 Florida Power and Light customers in Sanford Thursday after one of 16 feeder lines to the city disconnected.

Power went out around 6:30 p.m. in an area from 25th Street to 27th Street, west of U.S. Highway 17-92, and south along Park Drive. It was restored around 9:15 p.m.

Cause of the failure was a burned connector between lines, according to Bruce Stephenson of FP&L.

He said the connector, called a stirrup, burnt up probably because of corrosion and disconnected the feeder line. He said when stirrups corrode it can develop "hot spots" and then burn.

Gas Tax Distribution Formula To Get Another Go-Round By Sarah Fischer Herald Staff Writer

Seminole County and its seven cities will make another attempt to settle their long-standing dispute over the distribution of the local option gas tax. This time, they hope to come to an agreement before the Florida Cabinet deals with the issue July 1.

Members of the Council of Local Governments (CALNO) voted Wednesday to take back to their commissions a proposal which would divvy up the six-cent levy through a five-year revolving formula based on transportation

expenditures

City officials said they want to put an end to the matter and begin receiving needed gas tax revenues to solve their road problems.

Three of the cities, Altamonte Springs, Sanford and Lake Mary voiced support for the plan, however the county said all the municipalities must approve an interlocal agreement to change the formula.

CALNO, which is comprised of representatives from the county, cities and school board, agreed in January that the county should receive 63.6 percent of

the revenues and the cities, 36.4 percent. Only three of the seven cities, Altamonte Springs, Sanford and Winter Springs, however, voted for the five-year revolving formula.

The formula the county has adopted freezes the amount of gas tax revenues received for 30 years according to a two-tlered formula. The first four cents is distributed based on transportation expenditures five years prior to 1983 and the two cents is based on pre-1985 transportation expenditures, under that formula.

Altamonte appealed the county's

formula to the governor and Cabinet, who sit as the Administration Commission, saying the floating formula based on the most recent transportation expenditures is more equitable and addresses current transportation needs.

Although its legal counsel has rejected the Altamonte appeal in a recommendation to the Cabinet, the Administration Commission has sent the county and cities back several times to try and work out a local agreement, thus delaying a final decision on the appeal.



\$9 Million In Contributions **Collected For Chernobyl Victims**

MOSCOW (UPI) - The Politburo, faced with thousands of people who cannot return home, set a deadline of October for rehousing the evacuces from the Chernobyl nuclear disaster.

Radio Moscow said today voluntary contributions to government account 904, the special relief fund for Chernobyl victims, has reached \$9 million.

Events organized to aid the fund have included a rock music concert and a dog show in Moscow and a soccer match in Kiev, the Ukrainian capital.

The decision to set a deadline to rehouse the evacuces made during the Thursday Politburo meeting came as Soviet officials raised the death toll in the April 26 accident from 25 to 26. They said 187 people still were hospitalized with radiation sickness.

Soviet figures listed 92,000 evacuees from the 19-mile zone around the Ukrainian reactor but officials have since reported other evacuations.

Group Denies Evidence Buy Try

The director of the World Jewish Congress angrily denied an Austrian magazine report that the group resorted to bribery in its campaign to implicate former U.N. Secretary-General Kurt Waldheim in Nazi war crimes.

Waldheim, an independent presidential candidate backed by the Austrian Peoples Party, is favored to win Sunday's presidential runoff election in Austria.

The World Jewish Congress has said Waldheim, a German army officer in World War II, participated in brutal campaigns against Grick and Yugoslav partisan fighters and knew of the deportations of tens of thousands of Greek Jews to Nazi death camps in Poland. Waldheim has repeatedly denied the allegations.

The weekly magazine Wochenpresse quoted a former Greek partisan fighter - Sokratis Chatzisvangelis - as saying a representative of the World Jewish Congress offered him \$150,000 two weeks ago to obtain testimony against Waldheim.

Tutu Will Defy Government Ban

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI) - Anglican Bishop Desmond Tutu put himself and his church on a collision course with the government, vowing to mark the 10th anniversary of the Soweto riots with church services June 16 despite a government ban.

"I will instruct my clergy to organize church services on June 16 and I will certainly participate in such services," the black churchman and Nobel Peace Prize winner said Thursday,

Bloody riots that erupted on June 16, 1976, in the sprawling Soweto black township outside Johannesburg sparked a 10-month, nationwide black uprising in which some 600 blacks were killed. Blacks have marked the anniversary each year with marches and services.

Shuttle Report Goes To White House

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The 250-page report of the Rogers Commission is being sent to the White House today, climaxing a four-month investigation that found the Challenger explosion was triggered by rocket failure and fated by NASA management flaws.

Policies And Politics Play On Saudi Vote

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Presi- was working to block the arms dent Reagan's leadership, Middle East peace and Israel's political influence all collided in the dramatic Senate vote to permit a \$256 million weapons sale to Saudi Arabia.

Reagan won Thursday by the slimmest margin - one vote but critics said it was a hollow endorsement of his policies and a warning to Saudi Arabia to do more with regard to the Middle East peace process.

Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., said his colleagues were under pressure "of other countries to persuade us to vote against our commander in chief and our president. I think it is wrong."

"When we came to this chamber we put our hands on the Bible and promised to defend the Constitution of the United States, not the constitution of Israel or the constitution of Arizona or the constitution of California," he said.

Goldwater's sting was directed at Israel - which denied that it challenged the opponents.

Hospital Recants LOS ANGELES (UPI) - A rare and risky surgery. hospital that initially refused to perform a heart transplant on 'Baby Jesse," the dying infant of a young, unwed mother, has reversed its decision and announced it is searching for a

donor organ. "I haven't had the chance to talk to the mother." family spokeswoman Susan Carpenter McMillan said Thursday. "but Jesse's father is still in shock. There's a lot of hugging and kissing. It hasn't set in - this time last week they were getting ready for the funeral."

The Loma Linda University Medical Center had previously denied the infant a heart transplant because doctors believed his parents could not properly care for the child.

But in a meeting Thursday with a Loma Linda psychiatrist, the grandparents of 13-day-old Baby Jesse offered to assume custody of the child, and hospital officials announced several hours later they would go ahead with the

"Responsibility for continuing care of the baby has been transferred from his parents to his paternal grandparents," hospital spokesman Richard Weismeyer said.

With this assurance of reliable care for the baby, the (transplant) committee has recommended that the baby be considered for cardiac transplantation. The process for searching for a donor heart has begun."

The grandparents, who are Hispanic Roman Catholics, have raised seven children. including the baby's father. who is 26 and still lives at home. The mother turned 17 this week.

The families and their lawyers were scheduled to appear in Pasadena Superior Court today for a hearing to make the custody change official said McMillan, vice president of the Right to Life League of Southern California.

FLORIDA IN BRIEF

Senate Passes Teacher Career Ladder And Other Legislation

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - With only one day remaining in the 1986 session, the Senate tried to do some last-minute repair work on Florida's often-criticized master teacher program.

The Senate voted 34-0 Thursday to dismantle the troubled master teacher program and replace it with a voluntary, four-rung career ladder system. Teachers who have already qualified for pay bonuses under the master teacher plan would get their money.

The bill (SB 442) next goes to the House.

In other legislative action:

-The House voted to cool down Florida's often-infamous spring breaks by allowing hotel owners to hold revelers who are endangering their lives until police arrive. The bill was drafted because students die in falls from hotel balconies during spring break.

-The House passed a bill calling for elections of 10 new circuit and county judges. The bill (CS-HB 1296) originally called for gubernatorial appointment of the new judges, but was amended after a heated challenge from legislators who felt judges should be selected locally.

-The House amended a state-fund investment bill to discourage Florida from investing in companies that support South Africa's policy of racial segregation. The bill could eventually result in the Cabinet voting to withdraw investments in a company that supports apartheid.

-The House passed an omnibus corrections bill that would make it more difficult for countles to hire private firms to run their jails.

Court Upholds 3 Death Sentences

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - The Supreme Court upheld three men's death sentences, including one who killed his daughter's adoptive mother and her boyfriend.

William Christopher was convicted in 1978 of killing Bertha Skillin and her boyfriend George Ahern, whom he and his daughter lived with in Naples. According to court records. Ahern had sexually abused Christopher's 14-year-old daughter and tried to molest her friends.

Enrique Garcia, who was allegedly the trigger man in the murder of two elderly farm market owners near Palmetto in October 1982, was also denied relief by the court.

According to records, Garcia and three other men robbed a farm market and killed the owners. Willie West, 69, and his wife Martha, 65.

Robert Lewis Buford's appeal was also denied by the court. Buford was sentenced to die after he was convicted of molesting and murdering a 7-year-old girl in 1977.

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Teamsters Union Needs Monitoring

The International Brotherhood of Teamsters is one of the nation's largest and most politically sophisticated labor unions. The Teamsters also have the dubious distinction of being one of the nation's most corrupt labor unions.

Labor Secretary William Brock ventilated that sordid distinction in an unusually tough speech before the recent Teamsters convention in Las Vegas. Brock's blast, which came just four days after the indictment of union president Jackie Presser, put the Teamsters on notice that continued failure to rid the corruption from its ranks would prompt further federal probes into the union's activities.

Secretary Brock was right on target. A housecleaning of the 1.6 million-member union is long overdue.

Teamster ties to organized crime go back to the early 1930s, when the union's strong-arm boys extorted protection money from vulnerable shippers. Such criminal activity has grown over the years as a succession of Teamster presidents have betrayed the union's rank-and-file.

During the 1950s. Dave Beck misappropriated \$370,000 in union dues for his personal use. Convicted of larceny and income-tax evasion, he served 30 months in prison. His successor, Jimmy Hoffa, so abused the Teamster pension fund that new laws were enacted to safeguard such funds. Convicted of jury tampering, he did time and then disappeared in 1975, presumed murdered by the mob. Hoffa's designated stand-in, Frank Fitzsimmons, was indicted for accepting payoffs from employers, but plea-bargained his way out of a prison term. Roy Williams was convicted in 1983 of trying to bribe a U.S. senator and is currently serving a 10-year sentence.

Which brings us back to Presser, who stands accused of skimming \$700,000 from his Cleveland local in a payroll-padding scheme. If convicted of federal racketeering and embezzlement charges, he faces up to 51 years imprisonment. Undaunted, the convention delegates re-elected Presser overwhelmingly to another five-year term.

Reagan Administration Waffles On Arms Race

The Reagan administration is playing games with the most serious issue of our age - the control of nuclear weapons.

From the beginning there has been an aggressive faction within the administration that has opposed any form of genuine arms control with the Soviet Union. This faction, typified by Assistant Secretary of Defense Richard Perle, despises the whole concept of arms control. Indeed, they are opposed to serious negotiations of any kind with the Russians.

Perle and his school believe the shrewdest course for the United States is not mutual restraint on arms spending, but an all-out arms race. The Perle view is that the United States is so much richer than the Soviet Union that we can bankrupt them and destroy their system in an unchecked arms-spending competition.

That is why there is no conceivable weapons system from the MX to Star Wars that Perle does not support. As long as a weapon costs a great deal of money and is capable of terrifying the Russians, the Perle faction will support it as a means of bankrupting the Soviets in their effort to match us.

This formula also has the advantage of keeping the weapons manufacturers happy. They can cheerfully watch the taxpayers squirm and the deficit multiply while they count their increased profits, all the while consoled by the knowledge that all of this is hurting the Russians even more than it hurts Americans.

Another advantage of this arms competition is that it convinces many Americans that all of this spending - and the deficits and debts that go along with it - is making us stronger and more secure. In the Reagan scheme, the way to bring America back so that we can stand tall is to cut taxes, cut back such programs as environmental protection and open up the floodgates on arms spending.

The only trouble with all of this is that it won't work.

There is no evidence that the Soviet economy is suffering any more dramatically from the arms spending competition than the American economy.

Neither is there any evidence that the Soviets will permit us to leave them in the dust in the arms race.

What there is evidence to support is that neither side is getting relatively safer as the nuclear arms competition continues. Each side is in greater danger of annihilation as the weapons stockpiles accumulate. The only answer that makes any sense is a mutual, verifiable agreement to halt this mindless nuclear race and begin reducing the arsenals on ; each side.

Mr. Reagan has just indicated that he is about ; to put aside the nuclear weapons ceilings negotiated in SALT II unless the Soviets end violations of the treaty and agree to cutbacks in : nuclear arsenals.

Apparently it is true that the Soviets are in violation of some aspects of SALT II. but it is; also true that they have for the most part kept weapons levels within the treaty limits.

What is also true is that the Soviets signed the nuclear treaty more than a decade ago while we ; have refused to ratify the agreement.

There is of course a certain amount of a lockeving for propaganda purposes on both sides. But the record of the Reagan administration to date is longer on waffling and hypocrisy than any previous administration of either party since the Atomic Age began more than 40 years ago.

SALT 2 Posture Has Risks

Reagan is taking a calculated risk in threatening to tear up the Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty, commonly called SALT 2. arousing consternation among the allies, the Soviets and arms control advocates.

Once the treaty is scrapped, the genie will be out of the bottle and will lead to the inevitable renunciation of other pacts, such as the 1972 anti-ballistic missile treaty.

In some ways, Reagan has come full circle. During the 1980 presidential campaign, he described the U.S.-Soviet accord as "fatally flawed." He has always taken a dim view of any agreement with the Kremlin, saying the Soviets "cheat ... and lie."

They traded stories — about the woman who asked that her mother's surgery be delayed so she could make a business meeting and about a company that prohibits employees from wearing blue shirts and loafers.

And they compared corporate cultures, such as the ones where employees voluntarily work late and ones where employees back their cars into parking spaces so they can leave as quickly as possible at the end of the work day.

"There are as many types of cultures as there are corporations." said Huddleston. "There are some things that are universal, but overall each firm is unique."

The anthropologists differentiated between 'creative' companies where employees worked on a project from start to finish and 'assembly line' companies where employees worked on only a piece of an overall project.

The former companies usually have more of a social aspect in their cultures, especially those with company health clubs, happy hours and sports teams, they said. Workers for these companies may strike up friendships, have affairs and even marry co-workers.

But all corporate cultures are alike in that they have hierarchies. said Manning Nash, professor of anthropology at the University of Chicago.

Nash, who used to study Mayan Indians in Guatamala, said how people within the hierarchy treat each other is a learned behavior employees pass on to each other.

rent liability insurance crisis — in which premiums for medical and hospital liability insurance are skyrocketing - the West Virginia legislature passed a new law that attempted to bring some reforms to the state's liability insurance market.

The liability insurance carriers had been crying that they were losing bundles of money because of increasing jury awards to injured plaintiffs. So the West Virginia legislature decided to limit future awards to no more than \$1 million. no matter how grave the injury. But it also wanted to give the state's doctors and hospitals some relief. So it included some new rules that insurance companies writing liability policies in the state would have to follow.

It required all insurers to give policyholders at least 60-days' notice before canceling any liability policy. It required insurers to submit more detailed financial reports to the state so that its insurance regulators could more determine whether huge rate increases were justified. Under the bill, insurers, on a rotating basis, would have had to write policies on high-risk cases in much the same way some states now require auto insurance companies to rotate coverage on high-risk drivers.

The West Virginia legislature thought it had fashioned a rather evenhanded piece of legislation. It gave the insurance companies something they badly wanted - a cap on liability awards - and gave doctors and hospitals something they needed - warning if their insurance was about to be canceled

were heard. The industry claimed that it faced financial disaster if it was forced to comply with the 60-day notice provision and write high-risk policies. It also complained that the financial information they would be forced to supply could lead to lawyers obtaining data they then could use to win higher awards for their clients.

They demanded that Republican Gov. Arch Moore veto the bill. When he refused to do so, the three largest liability carriers in the state - who between them insured 95 percent of the state's doctors and hospitals sent out cancellation notices on all existing policies effective the day the new law was to go into effect.

The outery from West Virginia doctors and hospitals was immediate. They said that if their insurance was canceled, doctors would have to stop practicing and hospitals would have to close their doors. They said they were caught in the middle. If the insurance companies made good on their threat, all medical care in the state would cease.

In that case. Moore responded. those companies refusing to write medical and hospital malpractice would be barred from doing business of any kind in the state and the state itself would start an insurance. fund to issue its own malpractice and liability policies to physicians, hospitals and clinics.

In the end the legislature ran up the white flag and surrendered to the insurers. They rejected Moore's self-insurance plan and rewrote the March legislation removing those sections the insurers objected to.

House, Reagan learned about midway in his campaign that his anti-arms control stance and push for weapons superiority was failing like a lead balloon.

Faced with those facts, he switched gears to regain lost ground and delivered a televised address in which he spoke of parity of arms with the Soviet Union.

When he came into office he pledged that he would abide by the unratified SALT 2 agreement if the Soviets did not undercut it. Under the treaty, Reagan bought time and spent over a trillion dollars to build up the nation's military establishment.

Last November, although his summit meeting with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev was basically a get-acquainted session, there were hopes of moving the arms talks off dead center, and both leaders spoke of a 50 percent reduction in nuclear weaponry.

Throughout his presidency, Reagan has accused the Soviets of violating the treaty. He deployed Pershing 2 and cruise missiles in Europe to counter the powerful Soviet SS-20s aimed at European capitals, and is convinced that the deployment made Moscow deal more realistically.

Now Reagan is faced with selfimposed deadlines on modernization of U.S. missiles, submarines and bombers to equip them with more firepower. To meet those deadlines, some requiring exceeding limits in SALT 2, he has threatened to break out of the treaty.

JACK ANDERSON **Space Frontier Holds Much Promise**

WASHINGTON - Five centuries after Columbus sought to explore the unknown, the same objections are being heard again: The risk is too great. The cost is too high. The dream is too impractical.

The voyage of Columbus was turned down, first by the king of Portugal, then by a Spanish blueribbon commission. But in the end, Columbus opened up new continents and new vistas of knowledge that made his critics look foolish. He also made possible the most successful anti-poverty program in history: the great migration of destitute peoples to the Americas.

Today Columbus has been superseded by astronauts cager to explore the space frontier, to lead mankind to other worlds. They believe untold knowledge and hidden resources await them - the raw materials of space that will

enhance life on Earth.

And

They expect to assemble in space

solar-powered satellites that can capture the sun's inexhaustible energy and transmit it to earth. They will mine valuable minerals up there, not only to supplement dwindling resources on Earth but to build and sustain society in space. They also hope to transfer industrial activities from Earth to space. This will improve old products, create new products and, at the same time. protect the Earth's fragile biosphere.

Even as the space program opens up future worlds, it will continue to advance science and enrich our everyday lives in the here and now. The Apollo program, which transported men to the moon, created many times more wealth than it cost - new jobs, new products and new industries.

This becomes increasingly true as the old sources of jobs and prosperity - the raw-materials in-

dustries and the smoke-stacks plants - falter and decline. The new businesses - data processing. electronics, telecommunications, robotics, automation, services of many kinds - are based heavily upon information.

In the Information Economy of today, the primary raw material is information, and that is what the space program pre-eminently produces. The space program gave the United States the lead in sciences that affect the health, environment and economy of the people. The nation that leads in space will assuredly lead in these other vital fields.

Yet there are those who belittle space exploration, who see only the dollars in front of them and not the riches that lie beyond the horizon. The federal funding required for the space program is covered for things of Earth - boondoggles for the rich and appropriations for pork-barrel projects.

We have spoken with many astronauts - men like Alan Shepard, the first American in space; Edwin Aldrin, who made the first landing on the moon; Thomas Stafford, who rendezvoused in space with Soviet cosmonauts: Eugene Cernan, the last man to walk on the moon.

They are united in their enthusiasm about the opportunities that await mankind in space. But space must be explored by living, breathing people - not by unthinking robots, the astronauts emphasize. They insist there is no substitute for human eyes, cars and hands out there.

The curve of the earth, the swirling eddles, the patterns of clouds marbling the surface above the brilllant blue of the water and the blue-green of the land - this is a sight that must be personally witnessed to be appreciated, the astronauts tell us.

Model Thankful 'To Be Alive' After Face Slashing Attack

NEW YORK (UPI) - A blonde model - her face ravaged by gashes inflicted by accused hired thugs - smilled bravely despite 150 stitches to mend her wounds and said she was "happy to be alive."

"I was afraid to look in the mirror last night." Marla Hanson, a 5-foot-4, angel-faced beauty said Thursday from her bed at St. Vincent's Hospital in an interview with WNBC-TV. "I expected to look a lot worse."

Police arrested Hanson's former landlord. Steven Roth. 28, and the two men the makeup artist is accused of hiring to slash her face in a dispute over a \$850 security deposit he wanted to withhold from her, authorities said.

Doctors said scars across Hanson's face would be unavoidable and it would take at least six months before plastic surgeons could try to repair some of the damage. It was unknown whether Hanson would be able to resume her budding modeling career.

The gashes, inflicted with a paint-scraper razor, took 150 stitches to close, doctors said. The longest wound begins at the left side of the 21-year-old model's forchead and curves down around her hazel eyes to the tip of her nose.

"I'm happy to be alive," said Hanson, a Kansas native who came to New York from Dallas last August and quickly began to make a name for herself in the city's highly competitive modeling trade.

Unemployment Rate Jumps

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Unemployment jumped twotenths of a percentage point to 7.3 percent in May, with the loss of another 40,000 manufacturing jobs in a single month, the Labor Department reported Friday.

In addition, 30,000 oil and gas jobs disappeared in May, the government said.

The May jobless rate of 7.3 percent compared to the 7.1 percent figure in April.

A companion index, counting members of the military among the employed, also rose two-tenths of a percentage point, to 7.2 percent. It was 7 percent in April and mirrors shifts in the civilian jobless rate.

In May, the number of Americans without a job rose by 210,000 -- to a total of almost 8.6 million unemployed. Significant unemployment occurred among adult men, the government figures showed.

In May, the jobless rate for adult men leaped from 6 percent to 6.4 percent. In comparison, the unemployment rate for adult men had averaged 6 percent since mid-1985.

The May unemployment rates for other categories of workers remained essentially stable in May.

The jobless rate for adult women was 6.5 percent. It was 19 percent for teenagers, 6.2 percent for whites, 14.8 percent for blacks, and 11 percent for Hispanics.

Groups Hail Sessions' Rejection

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Civil rights groups claimed victory following the Senate Judiciary Committee's rejection of a judicial nominee accused of making racist remarks and wrongly prosecuting a voter-fraud case. The panel, voting 10-8, refused Thursday to recommend that the Senate confirm Jefferson Sessions III to be a district judge in southern Alabama. It also rejected, on a 9-9 vote, a motion to send his name to the Senate without a recommendation on how senators should vote.

Neighbors Fight City Hall As Well As Army Of Roaches

ROSEVILLE. Mich. (UPI) -Residents of a two-block area inundated with hundreds of thousands of cockroaches that are vowing to deduct crawled from the sewer system are fighting more than the pesty bugs.

Homeowners in the treelined neighborhood northeast of Detroit are angry because they are being held responsible for exterminating the pests, which they say crawled out of a nearby sewer during the weekend and marched into their homes like an invading army.

The city has given them until June 15 to take initial steps to eradicate the roaches or face fines.

"Why should we be forced to pay?" asked Sharon LaVere, a homeowner who is leading the attack against both the roaches and city hall.

"We're not a dirty neighborhood. These are the city's roaches breeding in the city's sewers. We didn't order

them and they're not coming from our homes.

Many of the homeowners extermination costs from their water-sewerage bills if the city refuses to pay.

Two pest control firms hired by the homeowners began work Thursday. City officials hired a third pest control company to get rid of roaches on city property.

Residents say they have found the roaches inside their homes, on furniture and near drains. One man said he woke up Saturday morning and wondered why it was still dark outside - only to discover to his shock that roaches had covered his bedroom window.

City officials are at a loss to explain the infestation.

The owner of one of the pest control firms said it will take at least three treatments over the next three to six months to control the roaches.



Sampson's Ejection Ignites Rockets Past Celtics

HOUSTON (UPI) - The Houston Rockets, playing with a fury that matched their desperation, turned the loss of Ralph Sampson into a victory in Game 5 of the NBA Finals.

Houston rallied from the secondquarter ejection of Sampson to post a 111-96 victory over the Boston Celtics and draw within 3.2 in the best-ofseven series.

"They went fishing and caught themselves a barracuda." a pleased Robert Reid said. "We were something out there. When we lost Ralph, we had to reach down deep and play like we had never played before." added Reid. who had 15 points and a career-high 17 assists. "We played like there was no tomorrow."

Akcem Olajuwon made up for the absence of his fellow big man by scoring 32 points, grabbing 14 re-bounds and blocking 8 shots, tying the single-game mark set nine years ago by Bill Walton.

Houston out-rebounded Boston 56-37 and limited the Celtics to 41 percent shooting from the floor.

No team ever has recovered from a 3-1 deficit in the championship series. Game 6 will be played Sunday afternoon at Boston Garden, where the Celtics have won their last 37 straight games.

In what triggered a bench-clearing brawl. Sampson was thrown out at 9:40 of the second quarter for punching Boston guards Jerry Sichting and Dennis Johnson. The 7-foot-4 forward, who scored 12 points in his 14 minutes of action, said the fistfight. started by shoving between him and

Sichting, was unavoidable.

"I did what I had to do." he explained, then said his teammates "played a hell of a game without me."

The Celtics agreed with this assessment, saving they failed to match Houston's post-Sampson effort. "We lost our intensity after he left."

Sichting said. "We kind of relaxed. It (the fight) fired up the crowd which definitely helped them."

With the shouts of the sellout crowd of 16.016 at The Summit creating a deafening din. Houston expanded a 34-33 lead at Sampson's ejection into a 58-47 halftime lead.

The Rockets responded to the fight with their best sustained play of the series. On defense, they held the Celtics scoreless for 3:02 and established their transition game. completing an 11-point run. 7 coming after Sampson's ejection. to take a 41-33 advantage at 7:56 on an 8-foot jumper by Olajuwon.

A 7-2 Rockets spurt provided a 54-41 lead with 2:42 left in the half on Mitchell Wiggins' 10-foot bank shot.

Boston retaliated with a 6-0 spurt based on 5 points by Danny Ainge. including a technical foul on Olajuwon, but was outscored 32-19 in the second quarter.

Boston shot just 29 percent in the pivotal quarter, missing 15 of 21 from the floor. Houton out-rebounded Boston 17-10 in the quarter and 32-19 in the half.

"Psychologically, we went down after the fight and they seemed to turn it up," said Kevin McHale, who finished with a game-high 33 points.

In a rough-and-tumble third quarter, Houston's lead wavered between 11 and 16 points for most of the quarter as the rebounding was physical and both teams went aggressively after every loose ball.

The Rockets used a combination of outside shooting and Olajuwon's inside power moves to take a 79-65 lead. After Olajuwon twice hit 1 of 2 free-throw attempts. Allen Leavell connected on a three-pointer with 2 seconds left for an 84-65 lead.

Houston's advantage peaked at 25 points early in the fourth quarter, at 90-65.



TV Offer Rejected By USFL

NEW YORK (UPI) - Testimony shows USFL executives turned down a \$175 million television contract from ABC. which would refute the league's claim that NFL pressure on the networks shut the USFL out of national television markets.

James Spence, former senior vice president of ABC Sports. Thursday described his 1984 negotiations with USFL representatives under crossexamination at the antitrust trial in U.S. District Court in Manhattan.

The USFL's antitrust suit is for \$1.5 billion and the network shutout is one of the league's main claims. Spence said the proposal - offered to then-USFL **Commissioner Chet Simmons** and club owners John Bassett and Edward Einhorn - included over-the-air, or the ABC network broadcasts, and ESPN telecasts on cable. ESPN is a subsidiary of ABC.

Spence said he initially offered \$150 million for the combined rights to televise USFL games in the spring for 1985 through 1988, with two years guaranteed and options for the last two vears.


He later increased it to \$175 million. Spence said. When that proposal was not accepted. Spence offered to guarantee the third year.

The USFL representatives "felt it was not a sufficient number of dollars," Spence said, and the negotiations ended.

ABC, which had broadcast USFL games from its first 1983 season, had an existing four-year contract worth \$52.4 million at the time. ESPN had televised the league's first two seasons and had just matched the Turner Broadcast System's offer for a three-year contract, thus winning the right to televise the games for \$63 million in 1985-1987.

USFL attorney Harvey Myerson presented the USFL's argument for rejecting the proposal in his later questioning of Spence. Myerson pointed out the \$150 million offer averaged \$37.5 million a year; the new cable contract averaged about \$22 million a year, meaning ABC's offer for the USFL's over-the-air or network rights was about \$15.5 million a year. Carrying Myerson's example through for the \$175 million offer, the average network rights at \$21.75 million a year would almost equal the average for what had been negotiated for the cable rights "The arithmetic speaks for itself." Spence said after Myerson went through the example. "I think ESPN made an imprudent business decision (when they matched Turner's offer.)"



Gardening With The Storm Season Upon Us Tree Repair May Be A Necessity In The Near Future

appears, but I'm not certain, that the summer have finally arrived. Showers are spotty. I keep hoping a little cloud will appear over home. We can really use the moisture after extended drouth.

e're coming into the storm season now and fully we won't get it all at once. From now Il late autumn, along with these summer rms, we can expect some damage to our dscape plants. After every heavy storm, you uld go out and take a look to see if there is mage. If you find some, you'll have to decide at can be done to salvage trees and shrubs, or ether or not to remove them.

Obviously, if a damaged or fallen tree threatens man life or may increase property damage. mediate drastic pruning or complete removal is cessary. If the situation doesn't call for nergency action, you probably can wait a while to get the job done. However, the quicker the sh tree wounds are cleaned and shaped, the less chance for insects and decay organisms to enter the damaged wood.

You may discover that your prized shade tree which looked sound before the storm is actually retten and partly hollow. In such cases, as much as you hate to do it, you'll probably have to remove the tree entirely.



Healthy trees that have sustained only moderate damage usually can be saved by proper pruning. Try to get this done as soon as possible. Broken branches should be cut back to the next lower crotch. If it is a very large limb, you may want to cut it back in manageable pieces to sound wood in the middle of the branch. Start by undercutting the branch. This involves sawing about a third of the way through the limb from the underside between healthy wood and the broken limb--preferably a foot or so from the trunk or a good branch. Then, move a couple of inches out and cut down from the top until the limb is severed cleanly. This reduces the chance of tearing the bark or splitting the undamaged wood. Finally, trim off the stub close to the healthy branch or trunk. Smaller branches can be cut on a 45-degree slant just above a vigorous

bud or shoot.

Occasionally, you can repair storm damaged plants without pruning. Split crotches and limbs can be mended by artifically bracing with bolts and cables. It is a complicated job and requires special knowledge and equipment. Best leave these projects to the experts.

If a tree top is blown out or twisted, you must decide whether to try to save what's left or have the tree completely removed. Usually, you can save a hardwood tree, such as an oak. If it still has a sound trunk and plenty of lower branches. With some careful trimming and shaping, new growth will almost hide the storm damage within a few vears

Large pines are something else. Even damaged pines with a number of good branches remaining are often killed quickly by bark beetles. Usually it isn't worthwhile trying to save a big pine. If you're determined to make the effort, you'll need to apply a "borer" spray to help control the bark beetles. These products are available at garden supply stores and nurseries.

Another common type of storm damage is the partial uprooting of trees. If this happens, you'll probably need professional advice and cost estimates before making the big decision. If a tree is to be saved, an exposed, broken roots must be

trimmed and kept moist until the tree is set upright again. It may be necessary to prune off some of the large limbs to balance the loss of roots. And, some braces may be needed to keep it in place.

After repair, all injured trees should be inspected frequently for at least a year. Keep such trees in the best possible condition by watering during dry weather and feeding them once or twice a year.

Trees often are injured by high winds because they're already weakened by something else, such as nearby construction, trampling over the root zone, or parking cars near the trunk. Diseases, such as heart rot or root rot, also shorten tree life. Keeping your trees healthy and sturdy will certainly help them to withstand high winds.


Remember, tree repair work involves some hazards. Don't try to save money by tackling a pruning or removal operation that's too big for you to handle. Never climb a tree without the right equipment, and stay out of old or weakened trees altogether. And, never try to prune or remove a tree that has a power line running through or close to it -- it may be fatal! Leave such jobs to the professionals. Happy Gardening!

A passion for paper is in the cards for a Casselberry artist who creates her own greeting cards. It's a love she passes along to students in a Seminole Community College Leisure Time class, as well as at community and artistic gatherings.

No place is more enchanting to Jane Harrington than a paper shop where she can pick and chose the simple materials she will transform into greeting cards.

In her Leisure Time class she specializes in teaching the art of making mini-watercolor cards, usually of Florida scenes. The scenes are mounted on a folded paper, which can carry a message and which also serves as a frame for the art.

Mrs. Harrington also creates cards that are elegantly embossed with monograms or other designs. This multi-talented artist might add a message written in calligraphy, but she usually leaves the message to the hands of the one who becomes the sender of her creations.

Touches of color may also be added to her work with Inked-rubber stamps. The rubber stamps are her own idea and create designs of leaves and flowers, the results of cuts she has made into the tops of a pencil erasers. BEVERLY HILLS (NEA) -Marilyn Monroe would have been 60 years old on June 1, and to celebrate her birthday (and to make lots of money), more than 40 companies plan to the Monroe name and image to hustle their products.

An electronically animated photo of the star will be seen munching on a Hershey's bar on TV commercials. Monroe's face will grace the cover of mail-order catalogs. Women will be able to slip into bathing suits adorned with pictures of the actress's face. There are also Marilyn Monroe dolls (a limited edition of 300 at \$6,500 apiece is already sold out), pens, calendars, greeting cards, dresses and coat hangers.

Roger Richman, the exclusive licensing agent of the Monroe estate, spends much of his time keeping unauthorized Monroe merchandise off the market.

An attorney and former film producer, Richman sees himself as both a licensing agent and a quality-control aesthete. Unauthorized merchandise not only cheats the Monroe estate out of royalty rights, but is invariably tacky.

In his Beverly Hills suite adorned with both tasteful and grotesque Monroe memorabilla, Richman, 42, holds court. "I'm charged with



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

The key to these creations, she said, is simplicity in both materials and design. But it's a simplicity that produces dramatic results.

Her first students, she said, "didn't have the concentration or the ability to do large paintings. I needed some kind of project for them, so I developed this little watercolor, which with very specific instructions they could come up with something they could be proud of.

"It's simple and I try to keep it that way. People who have had watercolors before want to bring in all of their colors. I really encourage them to bring only three and to look at this as a very simple impressionistic painting.

'People who have never painted before, who have never had a brush in their hand, who know nothing about color, can still come up with something.

"I have broken it down into steps. First, 90 pound watercolor paper is mounted with concealed masking tape to a folded card. She uses only three colors, red, yellow and blue as her color mix," Mrs.

Harrington said.

When she's ready to paint she puts a piece of masking tape where the horizon will be in the scene. "Then you mix the blue for your water and you paint. I encourge them to paint only two strokes across the paper. That's your water.

"Then you remove the tape and dilute that same paint and make the sky with just two strokes. You take the sky color that was left. over and add a little bit more color to make a beach color. You put one stroke down for the beach.

"If I can keep them (students) from wanting to put in a little boat, a bird and a bather, it stays pretty simple.

'When I'm teaching how to paint the sunrise or sunset they follow the same steps, but I'm not opposed to using anything that will help." Mrs. Harrington confessed that she carries a container of tiny paper circles, the residue left from a paper punch, which she hands out to students who glue them to their scenes to serve as suns.

"Usually when I teach this class I have the same people come back until they get it. It's a good way to discipline themselves to get time to paint. When I have a lot of people who have repeated the class I try to do something different. t

flowers."

Bypassing her on fast watercolor technique, in a flash Mrs. Harrington can also turn out a bemboo adorned card, with the design sketched with artist's pens. A technique she also passes along to students.

Beyond her watercolor cards is Mrs. Harrington's embossing, which can add raised names, Intials, or designs to plain paper. Embossing too is a simple skill that produces charming results.

Mrs. Harrington works on a glass surface and first draws and cuts a pattern into a paper sheet, using a hobby knife.

A paper card with a cutout center is used as a frame to lift from the surface of the glass the paper that will be embossed. Mrs. Harrington's pattern is placed in reverse over the card paper and using a sharpened half of a springed clothes pin she presses the design into the paper, creating a raised design on the reversed side of the card paper.

Her techniques are quick and easy. Creating your own greeting cards, it seems, can be easier than weeding through rack after rack of commercially produced cards to pick the one that has that special


