Bacteria Knocks Cancer For Loop In Some Cases

NEW YORK (UPI) — Sneaking bacteria, while making a "host" person very, very sick, will sometimes knock for a loop a cancer to which that person also is playing "host."
It's an astounding phenomenon. If science understood the why and how of it, it might be a usable and highly useful weapon.
Hence, there is keen scientific interest in experiments of Drs. Russell T. Jordan, A. P. Heston, Jr. and Howard R. Bierman. They put bacterial infections on top of cancers in experimental mice and found that most of the mice which weren't killed by infection or cancer or both, were cured of their cancers.
Through nose
To put one on top of the other was no small technical feat. They did it by first instilling leukemic cells through noses of the mice so the cells collected in the lymph nodes beneath the jaw and in the neck and formed into liquid and highly malignant tumors.
Forty-eight to 72 hours later, they instilled streptococci bacteria into the same nodes by the same route.
Of 100 mice infected with them 48 hours after getting cancer cells, 40 died of either infection, cancer or pneumonia within 21 days. Of the remainder, 48 survived a mysterious chemical battle between bacteria and cancer cells inside the lymph nodes and at the end all 48 were found to be free of cancer.

100 Ships Tied Up As Officers Strike

NEW YORK (UPI) — A strike by dock workers tied up more than 100 passenger and dry cargo ships today, threatening one of the most serious strikes to hit the maritime industry in many years.
Negotiations between the American Maritime Union Institute, an association representing the ship owners, and the International Organization of Masters, Mates and Pilots were suspended indefinitely Wednesday and there were indications of a standoff. The strike actually had begun in effect New York City where many thousands of jobs are dependent on shipping.
Ships tied in New York Harbor included the lines United States, America and Santa Rosa.
The strike eventually will affect about 300 ships if it is not settled soon.
Ralph Casey, president of the Institute, charged the walkout resulted from an inter-union battle and said it was "completely unjustified." He said the Institute was "so convinced of the merit of our position" that officials had offered to accept AFL-CIO president George Meany as mediator.
Neither side would disclose the areas of dispute but variations were reported to be among the key issues. Pay increases were not involved.

Tax On Cigarets Over \$2 Million

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Beverage Director H. C. Cochran Jr. reported today that money available for distribution from cigarette taxes collected for August totaled \$2,162,922.
Of that amount, he said, \$569,421 will go to the state general fund and \$1,693,497 will be distributed to incorporated communities.
The city of Miami gets the biggest chunk of the distribution, \$244,616, and Little Indian Creek Village gets the least, \$1.38.

Savoy Is Closed; No More Stompin'

NEW YORK (UPI) — The stompin' at the Savoy has come to an end.
The cavernous Savoy ballroom, where jazz came of age at dance music, was shuttered today, ready for the wreckers. The site will be included in a new Harlem housing project.
The ballroom fixtures were auctioned Tuesday while Charles Buchanan, manager since the opening in 1926, looked on sadly. A Steinway piano that had been used by Duke Ellington and Count Basie was knocked down for \$40.
"One time we took in 4,000 people to hear Glenn Miller at 20 cents a head," Buchanan recalled. "Those were the days."

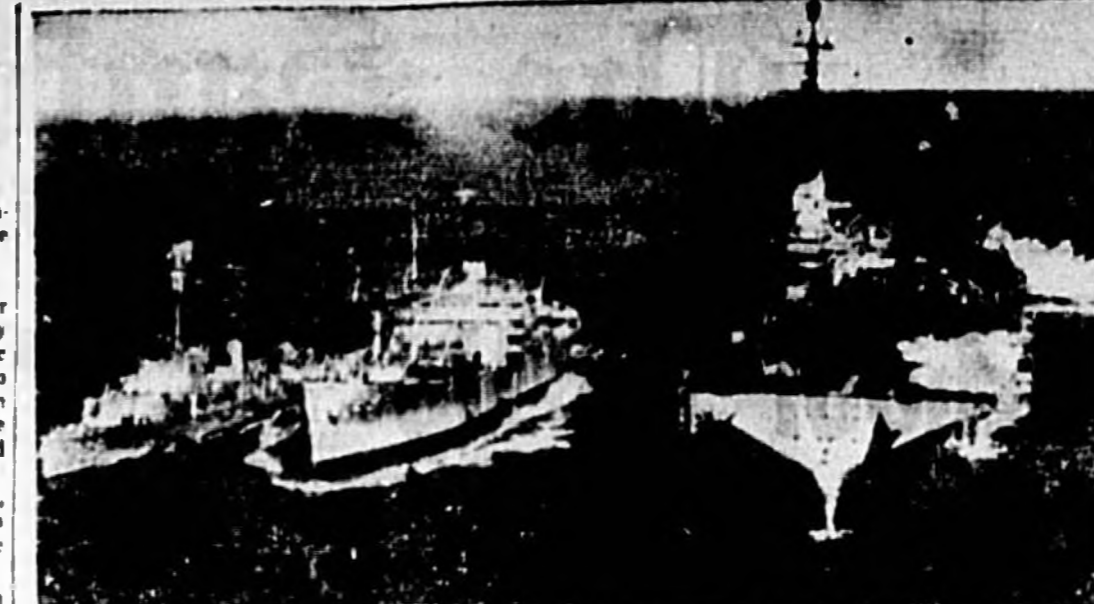
Williams Family Holding Reunion

Stranger In His Grave, Kalabany Ask Removal

WESTPORT, Conn. (UPI)—A stranger is buried in Henry Kalabany's family cemetery plot and Kalabany is looking for a way to get him out of there.

So far the prospect doesn't look very good. Authorities say they can't have the body Kalabany and his sons found two weeks ago exhumed because there is no evidence he died by violence, hence no indication of crime. It was nearly dark by then, but the men nervously tried off the lid. They gasped to find inside the body of a man none of them had seen before.

The body was laid out in a neatly pressed dark blue suit. "There was no shirt, no tie and no collar on the man," Kalabany said.

As they began covering the coffin again, Kalabany and his sons found a nameplate from the coffin that bore the letters A.K.

Kalabany called police and was told the records mentioned the five persons Kalabany knew to be in the plot but made no mention of a sixth body. Undertaker Charles Lewis assured Kalabany he hadn't buried any stranger in the plot.

Kalabany said he sure hoped whoever buried the stranger in his plot will step forward and get things straightened out.

It was the first of the balls, debuts, and charity events that will put an estimated 10 million dollars in circulation in the next eight months.

The hoops were passed out to Rockefellers, Whitneys, Chryslers, Dukes, Mellons, Du Ponts and Biddles at the climax of the Astor Ball, an event marking the reopening of the 34-year-old hotel's ballroom to the New York carriage trade after years of social oblivion due to its West Side location. Almost everyone except Elsa Maxwell gave the hoop the whirl. "I won't make an exhibition of myself," said Elsa as she slipped out early for an appearance on a television show.

The international set, including Generalissimo Francisco Franco's daughter, Marques de Villaverde, handled the hoops timidly at first. Then Eleanor Whitney, divorced wife of Cornelius Vanderbilt Whitney, broke the ice by lassoing Aly Khan in her hoop for a whirl around the ballroom.

Merle Oberon, Jane Pickens, Carol Bruce, Magda Gabor and Gypsy Rose Lee followed suit and it soon looked like a school playground at recess. Sideline dowagers such as Mrs. Wendell Wilkie and the Duchess of Talleyrand carried off hoops by the half-dozen — for their grandchildren, they said. The hoops looked incongruous over their diamond-braceleted arms.

The ball was the idea of former White Russian Prince Serge Obolensky, who had the good fortune to marry an Astor heiress and become a hotel executive in the recently organized Zeckendorf hotel chain. Editorials

If Schools Open, Integration Ordered

The U. S. Supreme Court, as expected, has struck down the Arkansas plan for transfer of public schools to a private corporation and their subsequent reopening as segregated, private institutions.

In effect, the Supreme Court has told the South that it must have integration if it has schools. The only schools excluded are those which are privately-endowed, which do not receive one cent of support from public funds.

Even these schools aren't "home free" if a Pennsylvania ruling is overturned. In Pennsylvania the NAACP has attacked the constitutionality of a trust fund established years ago to educate "poor white boys" in a private school. In the lower court, the NAACP lost. But an appeal has been taken.

In its Monday opinion, the Supreme Court said that state legislatures may not, directly or indirectly, prevent the carrying out of the 1954 school desegregation decision. A Court of Appeals ruling on the same day halted a transfer of Little Rock high schools to the private corporation.

By order of the U. S. yesterday, Little Rock high schools remained closed. Gov. Orval Faubus said yesterday afternoon that he was "investigating other possibilities" which might lead to reopening of the schools on a segregated basis. He did not elaborate.

Little Rock voters last Saturday overwhelmingly approved segregated schools. Faced with the decision to integrate or permanently close the schools, it is impossible to predict what Little Rock will do next. Gov. Faubus has said he "hasn't surrendered, isn't surrendering and am not going to surrender."

There is a possibility that the U. S. government might order the schools reopened, but this appears unlikely. Based on its decisions to date, the court has said the schools, if they exist, must be integrated. It isn't probable that the court would tell Arkansas that it must provide schools for its children.

The next move is up to Arkansas. When that move is made, many people will be unhappy. There appears to be no happy solution to this problem which began more than 100 years ago and will be a problem 100 years in the future.

Railroads Need Help

The romance of the rails is more than a sentimental phrase; it has a deep meaning for Americans. Through the haunting notes of the steam whistle have been replaced by the blast of the diesel horn, trains still occupy a special niche in memory.

But the railroads have fallen on hard times. This is especially true as it affects passenger traffic. Motor car and airline traffic have pushed the pullman and chair car into the background. Railroads all over the country are making schedule revisions and cuts that sound as heretical as a denunciation of Buffalo Bill.

Sleeping car service is to be abandoned on the Penny between New York and Florida and to all points in the deep South. Paducah, Ky., is now entirely shorn of rail passenger service. Coach porters are disappearing on many lines. Deserted depots can be spotted on many a right-of-way. Other changes are taking place.

Attempting to turn back the clock doesn't seem to be successful in any field of human activity. To recapture for the railroad its all-important place formerly occupied in the field of passenger transportation is probably impossible. It may not even be desirable. But the railroad coach, complete with conductor, candy butcher and all the rest, will not easily pass from happy memory.

Hearing Scheduled On Dempsey's Plea For Casino Gaming

MIAMI (UPI) — A plan for legalized casino gambling, presented the Metropolitan Commission Tuesday by former heavy-weight boxing champion Jack Dempsey, will be discussed Oct. 23 at a public hearing.

The commission passed an ordinance Tuesday on a 3-2 vote that would legalize a maximum of four gambling casinos and slot machines in the county. Each casino would pay an annual license fee of \$150,000. The county would also take a percentage of the wagers, estimated at 25 million dollars a year in revenue.

Dean Alfonse, Dempsey's attorney and an unsuccessful candidate for governor of New York in 1942, presented the plan in the commission. Alfonse said Dempsey was prepared to take out the first license and build a plush, two million dollar casino.

But the county's attorney said such an ordinance is illegal. He said action would have to be approved by the state Legislature.

The commission then scheduled the public hearing. Upon hearing of the proposal, Gov. LeRoy Collins said the plan was "ridiculous and preposterous."

At Tallahassee he said "Dade County can no more license casino gambling than it can legalize other criminal acts, and I

Florida Is Third In Road Building

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Road Chairman Joe Fitzgerald says Florida now ranks third in the nation in construction of highways with new federal emergency funds.

Florida has used all of its allotment to date, some \$192,712 to resurface roads, completing 39 miles of projects since approval of the Federal Aid Highway Act last April. The act released 400 million dollars to the 49 states.

Only Virginia with 87 miles and Texas with 39.3 miles outdistanced Florida in the emergency program.

A total of 12.6 miles of roadway are now under construction in Florida under the program. Federal funds will finance \$3,218,333 of total costs of \$4,823,000.

Trainees Beaten, Court-Martial Set

FT. JACKSON, S. C. (UPI) — Army authorities have set next Monday for the general court-martial of an officer and two sergeants charged with mistreating trainees at this sprawling infantry training center.

The three soldiers, all with the 1st Training Regiment, were 1st Lt. Gerald L. Wheatley, 24; Bridgeman, N. J.; M. Sgt. George R. Sova, 30, Ogdensburg, N. Y.; and Sfc. Charles L. Moman, 26, Empire, Ala.

Capt. Paul I. Cook, post public information officer, said the two sergeants were accused of kicking trainees on the shins and punishing five young soldiers by making them hold footballs over their heads for 15 to 20 minutes.

First Lt. Henry L. Brown, Great Falls, S. C., defense counsel for the three, said the Army had decided to hold the court-martial next Monday and that he would not ask for a delay.

Cook said Moman allegedly hit a trainee in the face with his hands and kicked him in the shins, and also shook a trainee and hit him in the jaw with his fist.

Sova, who is charged with kicking trainees in the shins and in connection with the footballer incident, is a veteran of World War II and the Korean conflict.

Animals Eat Better Meals Than Humans

ATLANTA—Strange as it seems, diet-conscious Americans run a poor second to cattle, sheep, poultry and pigs when it comes to eating healthy, balanced meals, an expert in the field of nutrition says.

There are several reasons for the difference, asserts Dr. Sterling Brackett, director of Animal Industry Development for American Cyanamid Co. In an interview, Dr. Brackett pointed out that animals have little choice of menus, but science has determined the exact amounts of proteins, vitamins and other ingredients required to make animals grow efficiently. Moreover, to prepare animal rations, feed manufacturers have devised elaborate facilities for weighing and blending these ingredients into formula feeds.

Even though much is known about human nutritional requirements, he added, such a procedure is not practical for them. To this may be added the fact that humans like to indulge their whims for tasty delicacies which don't add up to a balanced diet.

That's only part of the story, Dr. Brackett said. The growing tendency among farmers to add antibiotics to poultry and livestock rations is giving farm animals an even greater advantage over humans in the matter of healthy eating.

"One of the major reasons behind this trend," he declared, "is that apparently there is no such thing as a completely healthy farm animal. Even those which look healthy have visible disease bacteria within their systems, and unless these are killed or controlled, the animals waste feed, grow more slowly and are not as healthy as nature intended. The solution in the case of farm animals is to add small amounts of an antibiotic, such as Aureomycin chlorotetracycline to feed rations. This is effective against a great many of these invisible germs and leads to a higher level of health in animals."

The story doesn't end there, the expert said. The scientific approach to feeding farm animals is affecting the food we eat.

"The use of improved animal rations containing the proper amounts of minerals, proteins, carbohydrates and other ingredients," he added, "is helping the grower produce better meat, eggs and other products. Thus, we humans are actually eating better today even though our meals are not as properly balanced or as carefully planned as those prepared for farm animals."

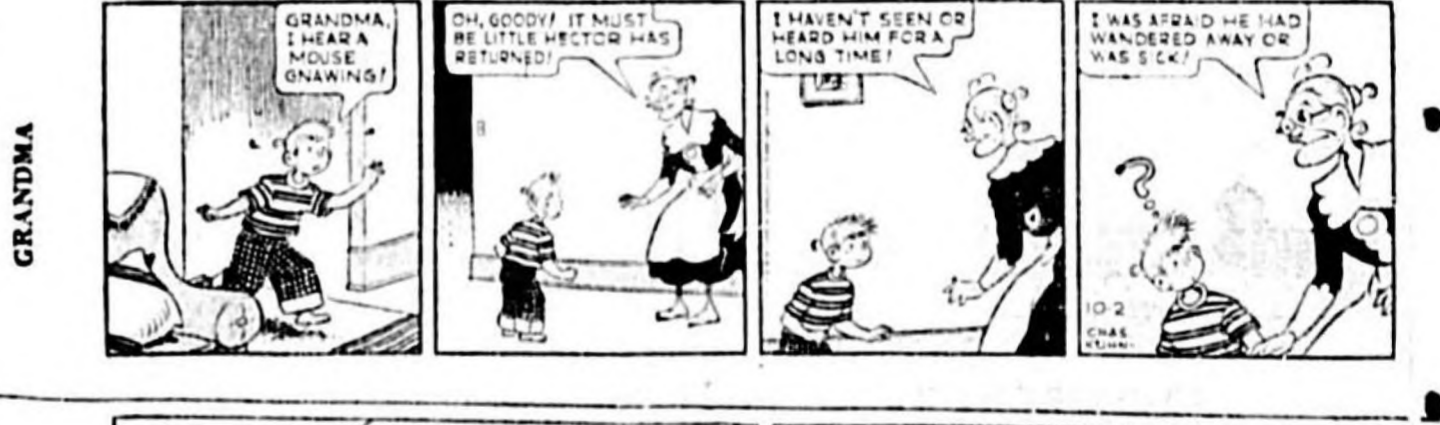
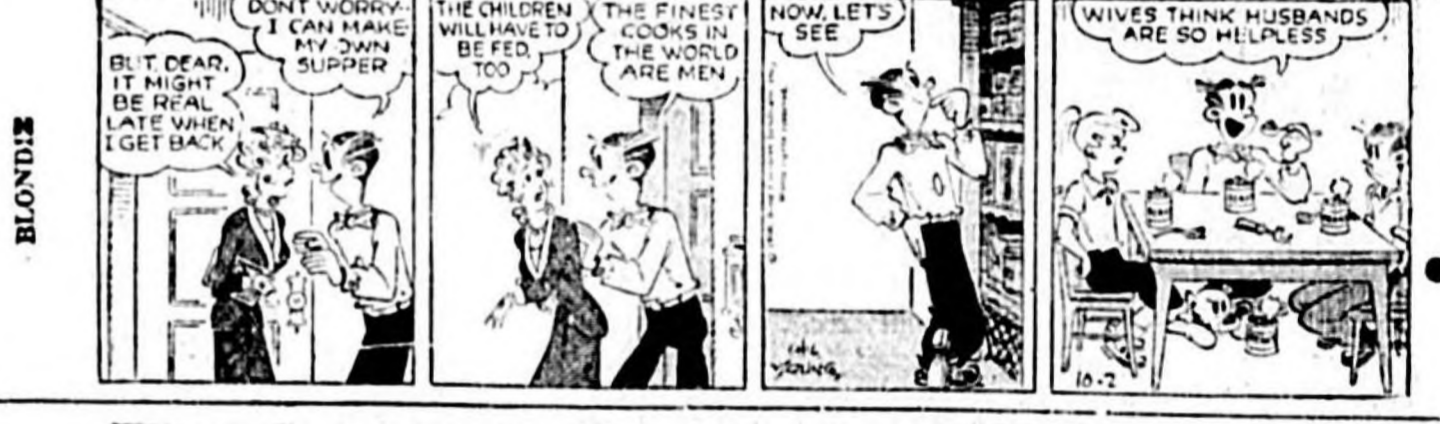
