

Bomb Kills Two In Israel Jordan Vetoes Israel West Bank Proposals

Jordan vetoed Israel's proposals for the occupied West Bank of the Jordan river. The Soviet Union denounced the Israeli-Egyptian peace negotiations as brightening tension in the Middle East.

The Jordanian rejection was announced as Sadat said Egypt definitely cannot accept Israel's insistence on keeping troops in the occupied West Bank. President Carter in a television interview Wednesday night sided with Israel. He said he opposes creation of a "radical" Palestinian nation in the heart of the Middle East.

In Israel, a powerful bomb apparently set by Palestinian guerrillas exploded near an open-air market in the Mediterranean coastal town of Netanya, killing two persons and wounding five others, one of them critically.

It was the fifth such blast in Israel since Egyptian President Anwar Sadat made his historic visit to Israel last month. Jordan's cabinet met for several hours late Wednesday to review the proposals announced Wednesday in the Israeli parliament by Prime Minister Menachem Begin. The Begin plan offers autonomy to the West Bank and the Gaza strip, but stresses that "public order will be the responsibility of the Israeli authorities."

Begin said an Israeli military presence on the West Bank and the Gaza strip were "an un-negotiable part of Israel's peace plan."

The Jordanian cabinet, summing up its deliberations, announced today, "There is nothing in the plan which differs from the Israeli position of the last 10 years."

Jordan rejects, and will not cooperate with Israel in any peace offer under which we are called upon to hand over Arab land to them," a cabinet statement said.

In Moscow the Soviet Union said the Egyptian-Israeli negotiations were dividing the Arab world and were tightening the knot of Middle East tension. Two official Soviet newspapers, Pravda and Izvestia, said the Israeli-Egyptian negotiations served only to give Israel an upper hand and delay a settlement.

"Cairo hoped much for Israeli concessions which would show that direct separate talks of Israel with each of the countries it had attacked could lead to positive results," Pravda said in an editorial. "The results proved to be negative," Pravda said. "Opening talks with Israel without consultations with the Arab countries, Egypt had weakened its position at the talks."

Begin met today with representatives of Jewish settlements on the Gulf of Aqaba coast of the Sinai and told them Israel would protect them with a defense force and maintain its economic support.

Sadat and Begin reached an apparent impasse Wednesday in their public statements over the Palestinian issue, only days after their historic summit in Amman.

\$14,500 Subsidy Sought Funding Dispute Threatens County Ambulance Service

Idus Willis, president and owner of Herndon Ambulance Service, says he will be at the Seminole County courthouse today looking for some answers.

And, if the answers are not to his liking, he said he may be cutting local service immediately.

Clerk of the Circuit Court Arthur H. Beckwith Jr. said today the county's \$14,500 annual subsidy to Herndon was discontinued as of Oct. 1 because no contract exists providing for the subsidy to be paid. The old contract expired on Sept. 30.

Willis said, however, that the county in the past during the 10 years he has held exclusive franchises to operate ambulance service locally has continued paying subsidies for as long as six months without a new contract, while negotiations were underway.

"When the first monthly check did not arrive in October, I called the courthouse and was told that the matter would be straightened out," said Willis.

"If the county had warned me that the subsidy was being cut off, we would have taken steps to cut expenses somewhere," he said.

Willis said the suggestion of county Public Safety Director Gary Kaiser has been that Herndon be permitted to raise its rates above the current \$35 for non-emergency calls and \$40 for emergency calls to provide an additional charge of \$1.50 per mile for transporting patients to the hospital.

Willis said Kaiser wants the county to expend the money he had been granting to Herndon in an annual subsidy to provide heart-monitoring equipment in the Altamonte Springs based and Sanford based ambulances. He said the firm already has the expensive heart-monitoring equipment in its Casselberry based ambulance.

Willis said two of the ambulances used in the Orlando area have such equipment provided by a federal grant, but that Seminole has not been able to obtain federal and state money for similar equipment.

Kaiser said today, however, that the problem existing for Herndon is not completed.

Last year as an example, Kaiser said, the contract with Herndon was negotiated in December and was made by the county commission retroactive to the first of October. "That decision rests with the board of county commissioners," Kaiser said.

The public safety director said that Herb Perry, public relations and general manager of Herndon, discussed with him the possibilities of eliminating the subsidy, described by Kaiser as a controversial matter locally for several years.

Kaiser said in his discussions with Perry, the Herndon official told him that last week the ambulance firm began charging \$1.50 per patient mile as an additional fee to \$35 for non-emergencies and \$40 emergency calls in Orange County.

Kaiser said this information opened a new dimension for consideration and the two agreed that the increase in fees would bring Seminole County in line with neighboring Orange.

He said that he and Perry ran through some preliminary figures agreeing if only half of Herndon's 6,000 annual calls were considered as a basis for estimating revenues, that the per-patient mileage charge would bring in an additional \$18,000 annually to Herndon.

In addition, Kaiser said if the \$5 per call discount Herndon permits for payment within 10 days were eliminated another \$12,000 in revenue would be earned by the firm. And, Kaiser pointed out the discount does not exist in Orange County.

Kaiser said with the two new revenues plugged in, even using Herndon's figures of losses, the firm should have a profit margin in Seminole County.

Of Willis' claim that his firm provides monthly financial statements to the county of its activity and collection data, Kaiser said only one such report has been received by the county over the past year.

Willis said earlier that the firm has realized revenues of \$130,000 to \$135,000 in its Seminole County operation over the past year, losing \$10,000.

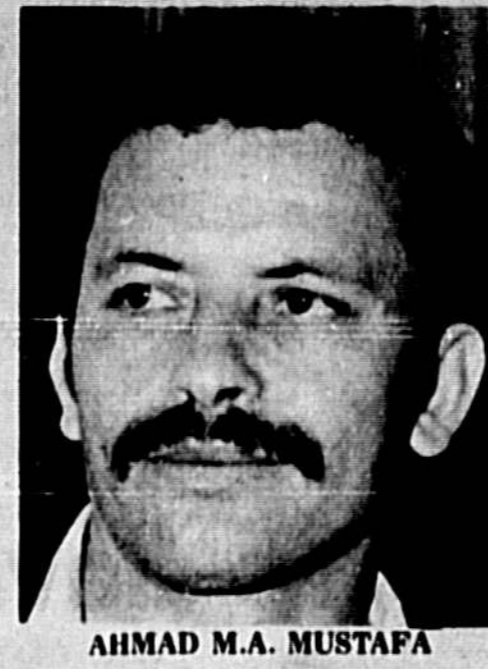
"We cannot continue operating at a loss," Willis said. He said separate bank accounts and records are kept on the Seminole County operation.

Kaiser said, "We have repeatedly asked for the monthly reports, but receive only one. While I want to work with Herndon, which has provided good service in the past, my responsibility is to look out for the county's welfare." —DONNA ESTES

He has been studying law for the past four months



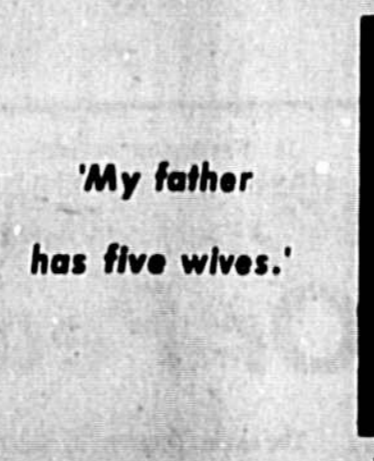

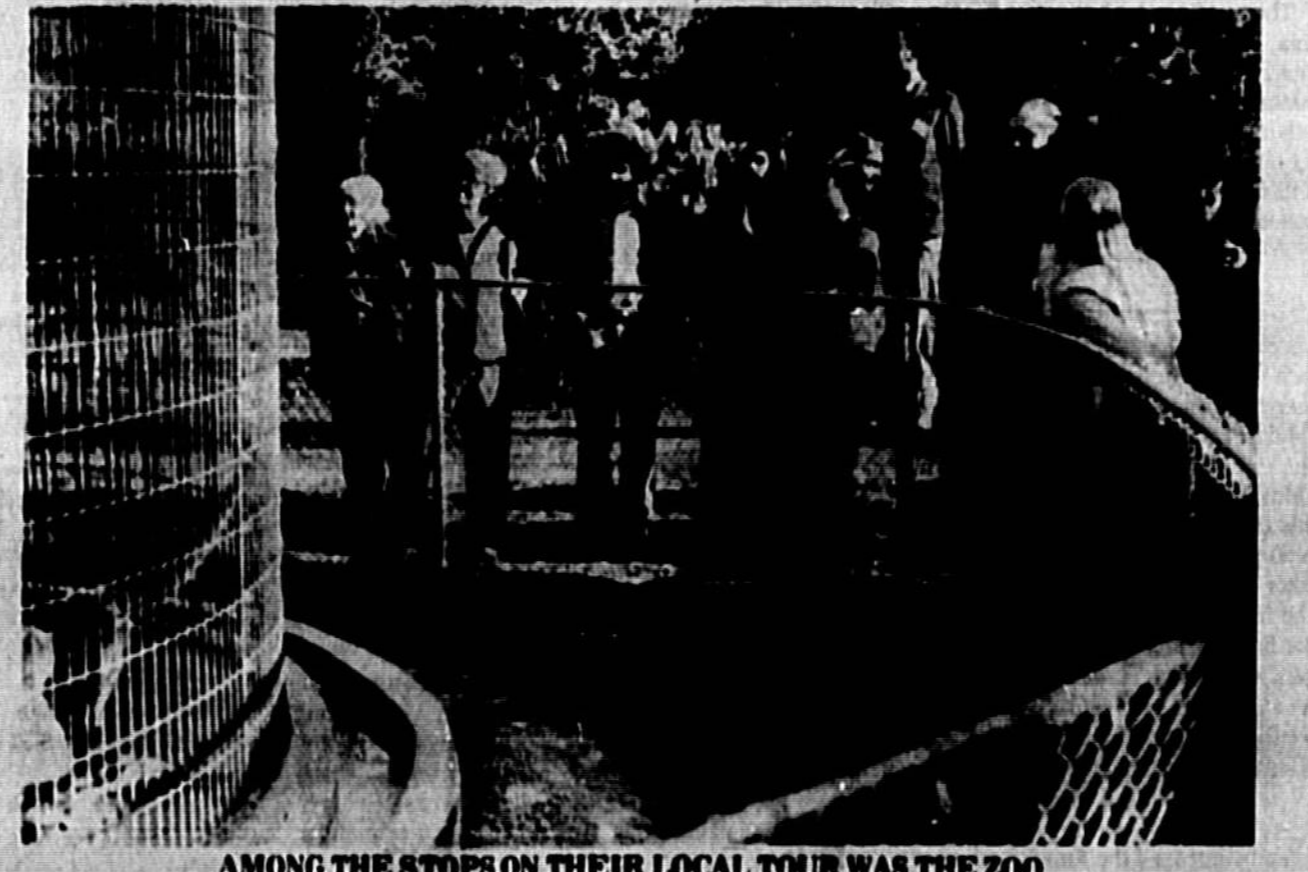

Carter Sides With Israel On Palestinian Question

By United Press International President Carter is taking sides with Israel in his disagreement with Egypt over the creation of a "radical" new nation in the heart of the Middle East.

Israeli Prime Minister Menahem Begin and Egyptian President Anwar Sadat reached an apparent impasse Wednesday in their public statements over the Palestinian issue, only days after their historic summit in Ismailia.

Begin, who won his parliament's overwhelming backing for his peace proposals, said there was "no chance" Israel would withdraw from the Gaza Strip and the West Bank of Jordan. Sadat urged Israel to "re-evaluate" its position if it wants peace.

GUATEMALA CITY, Guatemala (UPI) — The former director of Interpol in Guatemala, Jorge David Garcia, missing since last Thursday, was found dead by police in Sumpango, 29 miles west of the capital.

The police said they identified Garcia Tuesday, a day after they found his body. His kidnapers remain unknown.

Tongson Park To Testify

SEOUL, South Korea (UPI) — The United States and Korea have reached a final agreement on the return of alleged intelligence peddler Tongson Park to Washington to testify in the "Koreagate" scandal, government sources said today.

A joint announcement on the case will be made tomorrow (Friday) in both Seoul and Washington, one Foreign Ministry source said.

The president indicated on the eve of his nine-day "goodwill" journey the trip was a prelude to action on the energy proposal that he put forth last April, and which the House of Representatives passed in August, that would hang over the

President Carter's First Stop Poland: Closest To Soviets And U.S.

By WESLEY G. PIPHER WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Carter's trip to Poland will take him to the Soviet Union's strongest European ally at a time of the best Polish relations with the United States since World War II.

Carter's visit today through Saturday to Warsaw will be the first stop on a nine-day, six-nation trip abroad. He plans a news conference on Dec. 30 in Warsaw.

By the time of his position as the principal associate of the Soviet Union in that part of the world, the Poles are important in the East-West relationship, "a high administration source said today.

He cited the Poles' "reasonable" by good record "in the area of human rights, the keystone of

the Carter foreign policy, and their "on the whole, a useful role" in the Belgrade conference assessing the European performance in human rights.

"Therefore, talking to the Poles on these subjects is a contribution to developing what we want, namely, a more comprehensive, wider détente," the source said.

The U.S. source also said the talks between Carter and Edward Gierok, the former resistance fighter and who has been first secretary of the Polish United Workers Party since 1976, will cover:

— American-Polish economic cooperation, following up Commerce Secretary Junius Krug's visit earlier in December. The sharp determination and leadership qualities of our country.

"So I am disappointed about that," he added.

Administration officials describe the trip, the president's most ambitious overseas journey, as recognition that the world now consists of many independent nations and their individual freedoms.

— Iran: "A very close military ally of ours, a strong trade partner with whom we share political responsibilities."

— Belgium: "We'll discuss our relationship with the European countries and NATO."

Poland reports indicate the United States has 193,000 combat and support troops in Poland but 230,000 combat troops in East Germany.

A Polish diplomatic source said that his country's relations with the United States are "very, very good — the best since World War II."

The source sought to dispel what he regarded as misconceptions about communism in Poland, saying the nation has more churches and priests now than at the close of World War II and its disidents are few in number.

He cited Poland's economy, at the level of Greece and Portugal before World War II, has

grown to the size of Italy's. Polish unemployment is 4.6 percent less than in the United States.

About 85 percent of Poland's farmland still is privately owned. As farmers turn over their land to the state in exchange for lifetime pensions.

During his visit to Warsaw, a city of 1.3 million, Carter will visit the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and two monuments that provoke powerful emotions.

One is the Nike Monument, the Greek goddess of endurance and victory symbolizing Warsaw's courage in World War II. The other is the Ghetto Monument, memorializing the 500,000 Jews who were partitioned off into a section of the city during World War II and mostly killed during an uprising against the Nazis.

At a result about 500,000 acres of land are unused, the source said. If this land were in production, Poland would be able to export rather than import grain, he said.

Mideast 1978: Facing War Or Peace?

By United Press International Egyptian President Anwar Sadat altered the course of Middle East history when he went to Israel in November, 1977. But whether the path he chose leads to war or peace will be determined in 1978.

To the consternation of many of his Arab allies, the Egyptian leader extended de facto recognition to the Jewish state and professedly used the ground rules of 30 years of Arab-Israeli confrontation.

As a result, the stakes are higher now.

The two-day Christmas summit between Sadat and Israeli Premier Menachem Begin in Ismailia ended without any agreement on the major issues — particularly creation of a Palestinian state — but both pledged to press efforts toward peace.

Comprehensive Middle East settlement. The step-by-step approach of the two previous administrations was abandoned. At year's end, the sudden flourishing of the Egypt-Israel dialogue had nearly uprooted the Americans, and Soviet influence was on the rise as a result of Arab hostility, notably that of Syria, to Sadat's initiative.

In 1975 and 1976, slowly made the change from war to peace but there were pessimists that Lebanon would remain a desperate factor of instability in the Middle East for some time to come.

Notre Dame 21, Texas 14

The biggest game of the bowl season with Notre Dame having a shot at the national title if they can score an impressive victory over the undefeated, high-scoring Longhorns.

The field will be covered with the stars of major college football starting with Texas' Earl Campbell, winner of the Heisman Trophy and the national leading rusher for 1977. Aiding and abetting Campbell will be All-American tackle Brad Shaver, a senior who checks in at 6 feet 4 and 265 pounds.

Notre Dame can counter with such authentic All-Americans as Ken McAfee and Ross Browner, voted the country's outstanding offensive and defensive linemen respectively. Other N.D. All-Americans include Lather Bradley, Willie Fry, Bob Golie and Ernie Hughes. Jove, what a colonial display!

Rated a toss-up, the statistics show the reason. Texas has limited 11 opponents to 91.1 yards per game rushing; the Irish have held their 11 foes to only 88.1 yards per game on the ground. On offense, Texas has amassed an average of 68.8 yards per game, while Notre Dame has clicked for 460 yards per contest in running their record for the year to 10-1.

After digesting all pertinent information the Hoopie Computer gives the edge to Notre Dame by a narrow seven-point margin — providing the Irish play four quarters of solid football. Cowins Calls It 'Playful'

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (UPI) — University of Arkansas running back Ben Cowins has testified he was in an athletic dormitory room where a girl was partially disrobed, but he called it a "playful act" and not justly harrasing him and two teammates from playing in the Orange Bowl.

Cowins and two other black players — running back Michael Foreast and wide receiver Doony Bobo — have used the University of Arkansas, seeking reinstatement to the team in time for Monday's bowl game in Miami against Oklahoma.

The hearing on their suit against Wednesday in federal court and was recessed until today with Cowins, an All-Southwest Conference back, scheduled for further testimony.

John W. Walker of Little Rock, a leading Arkansas civil rights lawyer, filed a class-action suit on behalf of the players, who also charged the university with discrimination against black athletes.

"Some of the girl's clothes were removed, by whom I don't know," Cowins told U.S. District Court Judge Terry Shell. "It was a playful act. The incident was completely under my control. It was understood by all parties what was going on."

Cowins' testimony offered some of the first details of the incident in the athletic dormitory in Fayetteville, Ark. Arkansas Coach Lou Holtz has refused to discuss what led him to suspend the three.

On Dec. 20 about 6:30 p.m. the campus security police reported an attempted rape on campus in Fayetteville city dormitory, about "an incident" on campus. At 9:30 p.m., campus police told city authorities they had located the three.

No charges have been filed against the three suspended players.

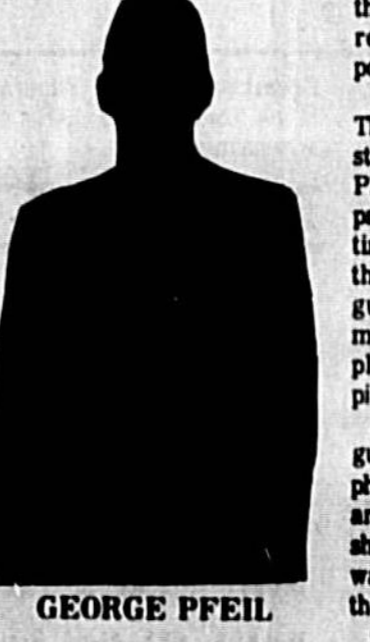
