

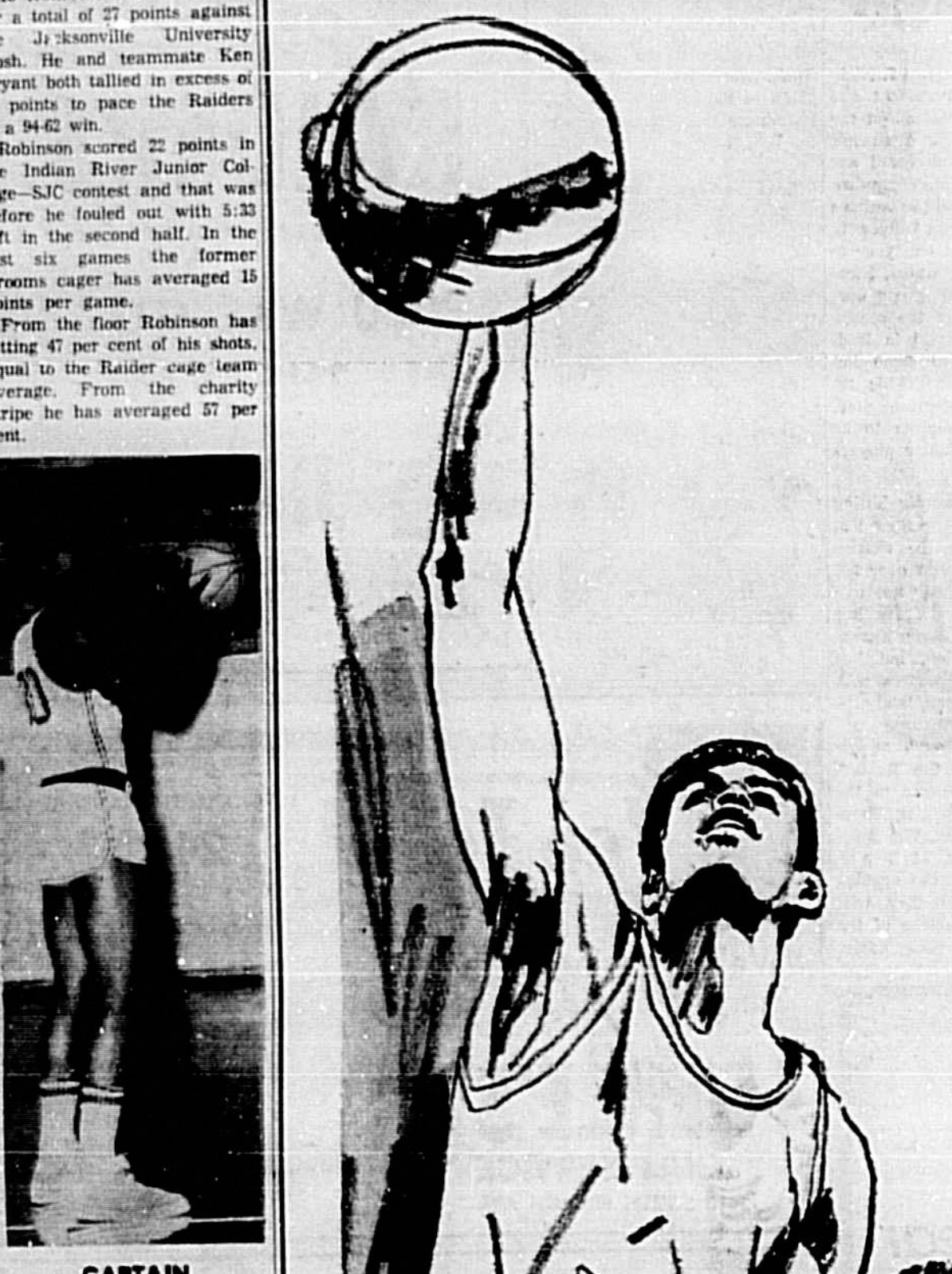
Robinson Named Raider Captain

Greg Robinson came to Seminole Junior College two years ago after completing his prep career at Crooms High School. Robinson was a relative unknown but worked hard and obtained a starting position on last year's SJC cage team. This year Robinson was named captain of the 1970-71 Raiders.

As of 26 games Robinson totaled 207 points this season for a season average of slightly more than 11 points per game for the 6-foot guard. His high game for the year was when he netted eight field goals and 11-13 from the free throw line in the Jacksonville University game. He and teammate Ken Bryant both tallied in excess of 25 points to pace the Raiders to a 94-62 win.

Robinson scored 22 points in the Indian River Junior College-SJC contest and that was before he fouled out with 5:33 left in the second half. In the last six games the former Crooms cager has averaged 15 points per game.

From the floor Robinson has hitting 47 per cent of his shots, equal to the Raider cage team average. From the charity stripe he has averaged 57 per cent.

Parents Held Liable For Vandalism Caused To Public School Property

Parents of children who commit acts of vandalism against the Seminole County school system may soon find themselves in a court suit brought by the school system to recoup property losses caused by the destructive offerings.

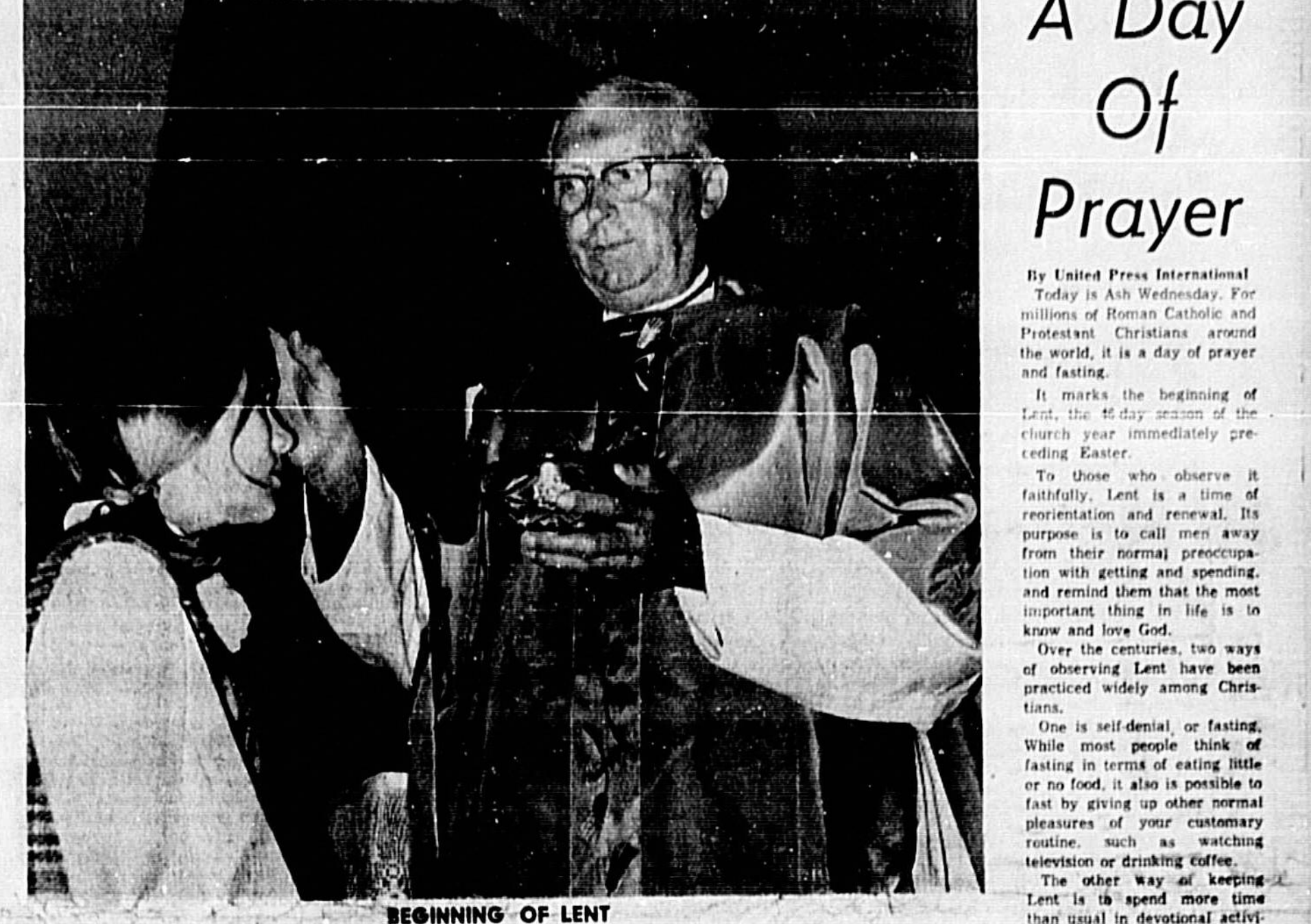
School Board at a Tuesday night meeting at Lyman High School, voted to seek restitution from parents for the sins of their erring youngsters and instructed Douglas Stenstrom, school attorney, and principals of schools where acts of vandalism occur, to inventory all damages and seek through court suits judgments which will bring about the recovery of damage losses amounting to \$1,000 and above.

The board took the action after a rash of vandalism at various county schools but mostly at the Sanford Southside Elementary School where eight juveniles, five from one family, methodically went from room to room smashing equipment and furnishings.

Stenstrom told the board if principals of offended schools would furnish information relative to the losses, he would bring the incidents before the court, forcing parents to make restitution. The attorney said he also would talk with parents to determine what they owned and bring suit against their property.

Stenstrom said the state holds parents responsible for the children's acts of vandalism. He also suggested that all school parents be notified by a letter from the schools of the board policy making them liable for damage costs.

On a motion by Stuart Colquhoun, the board moved to prosecute parents in all cases where (Continued on Page 2A, Col. 6)

Commission OKs Private Offices

Karl Gutman, of the firm of Gutman, Dragash and Matz, architects for the new court house, has reported to the County Commission relative to the clerk of the court and County Commission offices change order.

Gutman said that, following consultation with county representatives and the interior designer, the firm recommended approval of revised floor plans on the second and third floors of the north wing. County Planner David Farr made a study of the site, at the request of the Commission, to determine the existing facilities. Farr told the board yesterday that there are stand arid sewer lines at the site, and that an agreement could be negotiated with the City of Sanford for sewer services.

Commissioner Al Davis offered the suggestion of allocating 15 acres of the property for expansion of the juvenile facility. However, Farr noted that a projection had been given as 16 units for each three acres,

Bombs Wasted On Laos "Trail"?

By BRUCE BLOSSAT WASHINGTON (NEA) — Never in history has so much airborne firepower been delivered against a stretch of tangled jungle as U.S. planes and helicopter gunships have been unloading on the celebrated Ho Chi Minh trail in Laos.

One officer, for instance, says it is likely no more than 20 per cent of North Vietnam's trail tonnage makes it into Cambodia and South Vietnam.

The U.S. Air Force is very sensitive on this point. It does not like the occasional utterances here and in Saigon which declare the trail bombing largely ineffective.

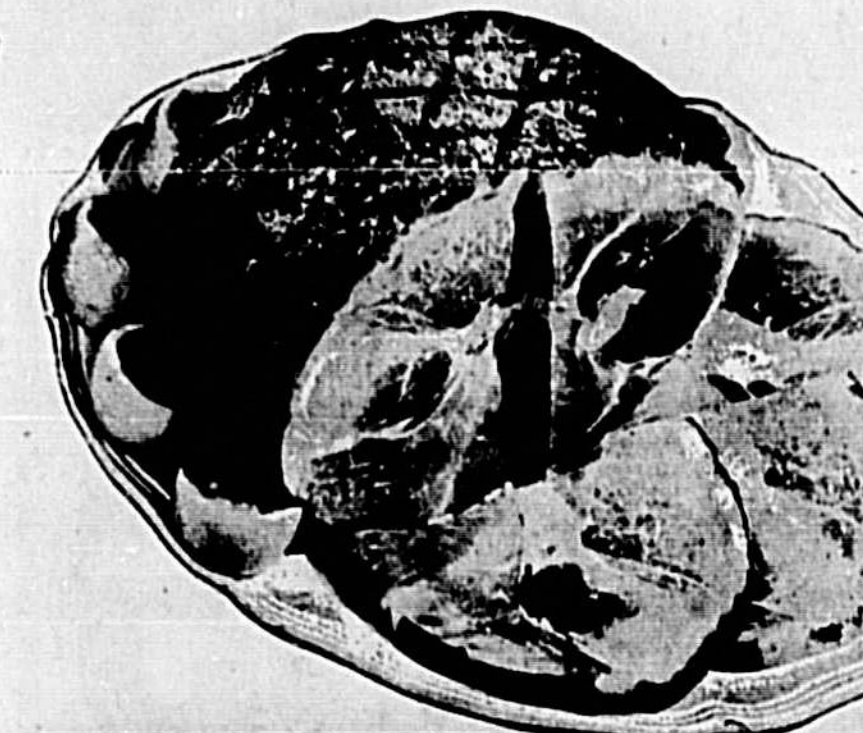

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'Fool' Dish Popular With Arabs

CAIRO (AP) — Fool, the noun, means to English-speaking people lack of prudence. In the Arab East it means a favorite dish, especially popular among the very poor.

Fool, known in the west as horse beans, has no connection with the English word. Here, fool is a protein-rich, tasty dish. The dish tells a lot about cooking styles in various eastern countries. It also reflects political and economic fortune and misfortune among the lower classes in Egypt.

A fool dish can be extremely cheap, costing no more than two cents. And it can be relatively expensive if cooked with ground meat, eggs, tomatoes or the like. The very poor cherish it for breakfast, lunch and supper. The rich like it for breakfast.

Swank restaurants in Cairo, Beirut and other Arab capitals specialize in fool, and fool alone. But it's done in Egypt one way and in Beirut another. Housewives in Upper Egypt cook it boiled in water and mixed with lentils. In Cairo, fool is a more sophisticated business.

Peddlers of fool roam streets and alleys hawking their wares, contained in oriental clay or brass jars. A medium-size jar is sufficient to feed a whole street.

The interesting, national dish generally is very simple to prepare. A handful of horse beans—preferably skinned out—is mixed with two grams of lentils and subjected to a very gentle fire for no less than 12 hours to produce the dish in raw shape. Oil or grease is added, plus salt and pepper, and the dish is ready for the table. Sometimes Egyptians add a few drops of fresh lemon to sharpen the taste. That is the simple fool dish.

Lebanese restaurants prepare the fool dish with art and style. They use nearly a dozen ingredients, including tomatoes, eggs and ground meat. But the dish in Beirut is a lot more expensive than in Cairo.

Ten centuries ago, when Egypt was under the yoke of tyrannical domination, the wheat crop often was seized and exported to enrich the profiteering rulers. The poor classes had to look for another kind of staple food. Fool for food was a heaven-sent commodity.

Into a large saucepan turn the hambones, water, onion, carrots, celery, parsley and bay leaf; bring to a boil; cover and simmer for 2 1/2 hours. Strain broth, reserving hambones, carrots and celery. Refrigerate broth overnight.

Dice meat on hambones; slice carrots and celery and mix with ham; refrigerate separately from broth.

Remove fat from top of broth—there should be about 5 cups. Turn broth into saucepan; add lentils; bring to a boil; cover and simmer until lentils are tender—about 30 minutes.

Add ham and vegetable mixture with salt and pepper; re-heat. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

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Artichokes, Veal Piccata For Change

Myths about certain foods led many to be out-of-favor in one era and in great demand in another. For example, the globe artichoke, with its edible petals and heart, was put down by the philosopher Plato who couldn't grasp why people would pay good money for a vegetable. But in the 17th century the French gave the artichoke a reputation as an aphrodisiac and it has been growing in popularity since. It thrives in the tropics and in the Arctic but its major U.S. source is California, where the growing seasons make this almost a year-round item.

As a change of pace dish why not try artichokes and veal piccata? Veal usually is more expensive. Save money on your veal piccata by buying a four- or five-pound veal roast. If your butcher will not offer off-moist veal, pay your money, do this at home and put each piece of veal between sheets of wax paper and pound them flat with a mallet.

Many women know the technique of pounding meat with the edge of a sturdy saucer. Either technique serves the purpose of breaking the meat fibers for added tenderness. Make very, very thin cutlets from veal chops, shoulder or boneless rump.

ARTICHOKE AND VEAL PICCATA

6 artichokes
Boiling salted water
1/4 cup flour
Salt and pepper
1 1/2 pounds thinly sliced veal cutlets
1 cup butter or margarine
1/4 cup finely chopped onion
1 cup chopped parsley
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1/4 cup chopped parsley
1/2 teaspoon marjoram leaves
1 cup hot water

Remove 2 or 3 outer layers of artichoke leaves. Cut off stem and top half of each artichoke. Cut in quarters. Cook artichokes in 2 to 3 inches of boiling salted water in deep saucepan for 15 to 20 minutes or until tender. Drain and remove chokes (fuzzy portions).

Place flour, 1/4-teaspoon salt and 1/2-teaspoon pepper in large paper bag; add a few raw slices at a time and shake until coated. Melt 1/4-cup of the butter in large skillet or Dutch oven over medium heat. Add as many veal slices as will fit in pan and saute until browned on both sides. Repeat procedure until all veal is sauteed. Set veal aside. In same skillet, melt remaining 1/4-cup butter. Add onion and celery; saute about 3 minutes. Stir in juice, parsley, marjoram leaves, water and 1/2-teaspoon salt. Add artichoke quarters and veal slices; spoon some of butter sauce in skillet over both. Cover skillet and simmer 30 minutes, basting occasionally. Makes 6 servings.

This dessert is laced with ginger-snap crumbs and diced almonds.

1 can (1 pound, 13 ounces) apricot preserves
1 envelope unflavored gelatin
1/4 cup sugar
3 tablespoons salt
1 cup ginger-snap crumbs
1/2 cup diced, roasted almonds
1/2 cup heavy cream
Drain apricots, saving 1 cup syrup; coarsely chop fruit. Combine syrup and gelatin in saucepan; heat gently, stirring, until dissolved. Stir in sugar and salt until dissolved. Add apricots and chill until mixture begins to thicken. Meanwhile melt butter; mix in crumbs and almonds. Press two-thirds of crumb mixture into bottom of 8-inch square cake pan. Whip cream until stiff; fold into thickened gelatin mixture. Turn half into pan over crumbs, sprinkle with remaining apricot mixture over top. Chill at least 1 hour. To serve, cut into squares and remove with a wide spatula. Makes 8 servings.

Deviled Crepes Ratatouille Are Filling

The thought of making crepes puts off many a cook. But any man or woman who can flap a fluffy pancake can make a light, edible crepe. A hearty stuffing of such vegetables as green pepper, zucchini and eggplant plus canned deviled ham make a meal treat to serve with a flourish. Many will find Deviled Crepes Ratatouille (rats-TWEE) a filling dish, even served with only a salad. Men may want potatoes

and a dessert, too.

DEVILED CREPES RATATOUILLE

1/2 cup all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup water
1 teaspoon oil
Oil for frying

Combine flour and salt. Beat together egg, milk, water and oil. Make a well in the flour-salt mixture and add egg mixture. Beat until smooth. Light-

ly oil a 7- or 8-inch skillet, heat on high heat. Pour 4 tablespoons batter into skillet. When crepe is set, turn over to cook other side (about half-minute to each side). For each additional crepe, lightly oil skillet and repeat as above. Stack cooked crepes on a plate and cover with foil.

FILLING:
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1 cup chopped zucchini
1 cup chopped eggplant
2 tablespoons butter
1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
2 4 1/2-ounce cans deviled ham
Sauté onion, green pepper, zucchini, and eggplant in butter and garlic powder. Remove from heat and combine with deviled ham. Fill center of each crepe with 2 tablespoons deviled ham and vegetable mixture. Roll up crepes. Place in single layer, close together, in an oblong baking dish. Pour sauce (ingredients below) over crepes, sprinkle with cheese, and bake at 40 degrees for 15 minutes. Makes 3 to 4 servings.

Sauce:
1 6-ounce can tomato paste
1/2 cup water
3 tablespoons sherry (optional)
2 tablespoons Parmesan cheese

Combine tomato paste, water, sherry (if desired) and pour over crepes. Sprinkle cheese over sauce. Bake as directed above.

'The Emperor's Crown' Is Top Recipe Of French Chef

Somber portraits of a dozen Caesars gaze down upon the diner as he browses through a profligate menu headed with this greeting from Cato: "You will dine well at my table."

And well you should, considering that you are consuming food prepared under the watchful eye of Chef Claude Richer, a master of haute cuisine who has been running the kitchen of the

Forum of the Twelve Caesars in New York City for the past two years.

The dishes created by Richer and his staff are eye-catching to say the least. The menu leads off with the like of wild boar pate and beef marrow on toast. Then comes a dazzling range of dishes such as Wild Fowl of Saumon, cooked in sherry, tomatoes or Ringnecked Pheasant baked in clay; a speciality of the house.

"I started at the age of 14 in

cooking school in my homeland," recalled Richer, a 41-year-old Frenchman from Tours, "and after three years I began my profession."

Since then, Richer has cooked in some of the world's most distinguished kitchens, from the Belgian embassy in Paris, to the Ritz in Lisbon.

The Forum has served food fanciers from all walks of life, including football star Joe Namath, but it caters mainly to leaders of the business and publishing world.

"We have one banker who comes here almost every day when he is in town," said Richer. "We always held Table 66 for him and his party. And yet he really is not a gourmet. He usually starts off with cottage cheese and onions and goes on to Salmon."

Asked what he considered the most difficult dish to prepare, Richer said "souffle."

"I know some chefs say it is easy," he remarked, "but re-

member, to be perfect, souffle must be made in just the right mixture, cooked at just the right heat and removed from the stove at just the right moment."

Richer's own favorite meal is a cassoulet of duck or goose, but he says veal is the best meat for a creative chef to work with.

"It is the most versatile of meats with its bland taste and there are hundreds of ways you can prepare veal although they don't seem to go in for many of them in this country."

One of Richer's best known recipes is not veal, but a lamb roast he calls "The Emperor's Crown." Here's his recipe for it:

3 half racks of lamb prepared by butcher as a crown
Rosemary
3 lamb bones from rack of lamb
1/2 medium onion
1 celery stalk
1 carrot

1 Bay leaf
3 cloves
8 oz white wine and 1 pt. beef stock

Have butcher set aside for you lamb bones and meat trimmings after he has fashioned the crown roast. Wrap the end bones in aluminum foil to prevent burning. Sprinkle liberally with Rosemary.

Roast in preheated oven at 375 degrees (with the lamb bones) for 90 minutes or until done to personal taste. Baste with natural juices. Remove crown. Add meat trimmings from the lamb and add 1 onion roughly cut celery stalk and carrot. Cut up. Add 1 bay leaf and 3 cloves. Cook until vegetables are done. Strain. To liquid, add 8 oz. white wine. Reduce to half heat. Add 1 pt. beef stock, salt and pepper to taste, bring to boil and cook three or four minutes.

Serves six guests, and is good with a robust red Burgundy.

Better Program For Youth Urged

Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce committee on youth is expected to make requests of the city regarding the use of city-owned and operated facilities. Headed by Dr. Luis Perez, one of the persons instrumental in the founding of Half-Way House, a youth facility on First Street, the committee outlined the following:

Open the city swimming pools with life-guards and set up times separately for different age groups; allow a street dance each month with concessions sales to fund the costs of providing a band; open the youth wing at Civic Center and provide proper supervision for different age groups at separate times; form volleyball leagues for boys and girls; help in the formation of a Boys Club; utilize the former USO building as a "coffee house" for youth; set up a youth advisory recreation committee to work with city.

The chairman said he would give his committee's recommendation this evening at the meeting of chamber committee chairman to be held at the House of Steak.

"The city shouldn't be in the marina business."

Why not? After all, it is in the airport business! What is the basic difference on why there's no hesitation at all on assuming those innumerable problems connected with running an airport, but completely refuse to even consider providing a marina program?

The time has long since passed in trying to find out which side is at fault regarding the sunken docks. Eventually this will be resolved. But the more immediate question is who is going to get the marina back into operation such as it should be? And then, how soon?
