TERRY DRUGGAN FAILS TO ESCAPE PRISON SENTENCE

CHICAGO, Jan. 15 (AP)—Terry Druggan, erstwhile millionaire beer peddler, was sentenced to jail yesterday—and honored right out again.

Municipal Judge John H. Lyle sentenced the Boss Brummed boot-luger to jail for a year on a contempt charge, refused bail pending an appeal and ordered him locked up at once. Druggan's attorney immediately secured a writ of habeas corpus from Judge Joseph Burke, who ruled that Druggan was entitled to bail.

Druggan was little sympathetic after Judge Lyle. A few moments after sentencing, the crowd of reporters, photographers and photographers gathered in the courtroom.

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DIRT IS SPILED ON CLARA BOW BY SECRETARY

Unsavoury Intimacies Of Famed Film Star Told In Confession Read Before Court

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 15 (AP)—Clara Bow, the "it" girl of the movies, was described as "being drunk, very drunk," in an unsavoury confession of Daisy DeBoe, secretary to the film actress, read here yesterday in the latter's trial for grand theft.

The DeBoe statement also told how the former secretary, before her discharge, destroyed love letters written by the actress by Harry Richman, an actor, Dr. East Pierson of Dallas and Gary Cooper, also an actor.

"I carried love letters because I wouldn't have them lying around the house. That is how Clara gets into trouble, so I took the liberty of burning them," the alleged statement said.

Miss Bow was not in court during the reading of the confession by Miss Dorothy Adams, a stenographer.

Miss DeBoe also appeared on the stand to testify Blaney Matthews, district attorney's investigator, had threatened to prosecute her on "40 or 50 counts if she did not come through with all the cash."

Testimony in the case in which Miss DeBoe is charged with theft of \$10,000 from her employer, continued to center about alleged activities of the "it" girl.

Intimate bits of Clara's doings were cut with camera clearness in sharp phrases from Daisy's confession.

"One more slam in the papers and Clara is through—she was just a girl," Matthews declared.

"I said unless Miss Bow found my way of thinking there might be trouble."

"Yes, I asked \$125,000 for things that I know I think I would be to her advantage to keep my mouth shut."

"Miss Bow was drunk. If I had gotten into an argument with her, she could have tried to kill me. She said and tried before."

"On Friday night," Miss DeBoe's confession continued, "she was drunk, very, very drunk. She wanted me to go with her. She had a bunch of strange people I don't know, and I said 'you go, I don't care for these people and I'll not go.'"

Miss DeBoe then told of Miss Bow's watch being lost at the beach and of a search which included sifting of the beach sands.

The insurance company was notified, she said and sent a \$750 check.

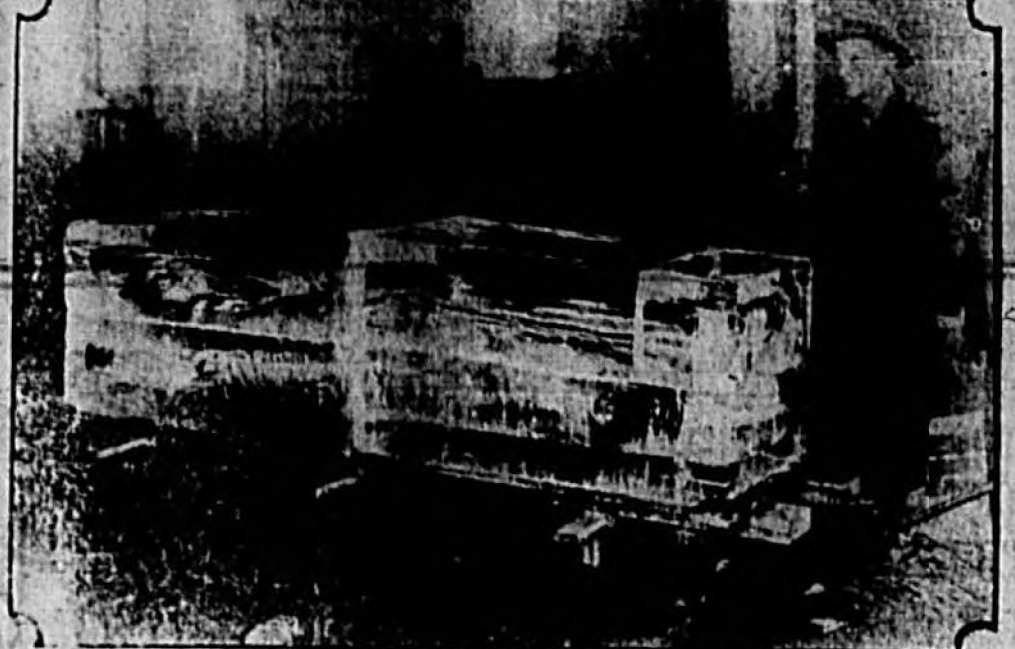
Two months later the watch was found under a cover of Miss Bow's bathroom perfume table.

Miss DeBoe said she told the actress the \$750 must be returned to the insurance company, and Clara said.

Miss DeBoe's alleged admission that she had embezzled around \$35,000 from the actress also was read into the trial record.

BENEFICIAL LIGHT RAYS TO BE SOLD IN TIN BUNDLES

Plans Are Adopted To Market Artificial Sunbeam Products

NEW YORK, Jan. 15 (AP)—A plan to market commercially the artificial sunbeam discoveries of the University of Cincinnati was announced here last night.

The Cincinnatians have learned how to strip light into thin bundles of closely similar rays which have certain specific effects on food, including making vitamin D.

The investigations are done in the basic science research laboratory of the university under direction of Prof. George Spertl.

Now a good sized institution with 30 workers, the laboratory started a few years ago in a garret without funds, a scientific dream of two men, President Schneider and Spertl, the latter then a student.

SOUTH GRIPPED BY SEVEREST COLD OF YEAR

Jacksonville Reports 28 Degrees With Ice Upon Ground And Its Water Pipes Frozen

ATLANTA, Jan. 15 (AP)—Biting cold weather gripped most of the South today.

The mercury dropped to 18 degrees in Atlanta while Memphis reported a reading of 20. Little Rock, Arkansas had 22, Nashville 15 and Birmingham 20.

In Jacksonville the reading was 24 by the official weather thermometer, and ice formed in the lowlands and on the streets. Many water pipes were frozen.

The day was the coldest of the winter in the North Florida city, the weather bureau said.

Pensacola and Gainesville also had 24 degrees. Because of the lack of heating facilities a minimum of 28 in Miami chilled the buildings that school was not held.

The Florida Citrus Exchange at Tampa said no damage had been done to groves and only slight harm was visited on tender growing crops. Lakeland reported a minimum of 32 but high winds prevented frost. Strawberries were slightly damaged in the lowlands.

Growers and truckers breathed a sigh of relief as weather reports said the high pressure area responsible for the cold wave had moved northward over Tennessee dispelling any danger of tonight. The forecast was for increasing cloudiness in Florida with warmer weather. A few South Florida points reported freezing temperatures, although Tampa had 31 and Sanibel 32.

House Committee To Probe Practice Of Federal Agents

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15 (AP)—The House expenditures committee decided today to investigate telephone and telegraph wire tapping by prohibition bureau agents. A motion to that effect by Representative Schafer of Wisconsin, prohibition opponent, to provide a "through examination of the prohibition bureau practice of tapping telephone and telegraph wires," was adopted.

Chairman Williamson said he expected the investigation to start Jan. 20. Schafer said that Attorney General Mitchell promised that the wires could be tapped for lawful purposes only. At the last hearings on appropriations for the bureau, Prohibition Director Woodcock testified that wire tapping had been permitted since the Supreme Court held it lawful.

The Supreme Court Decision was returned on a five to four vote and was not on the legality of wire tapping but admissibility of evidence obtained in that manner, Schafer said.

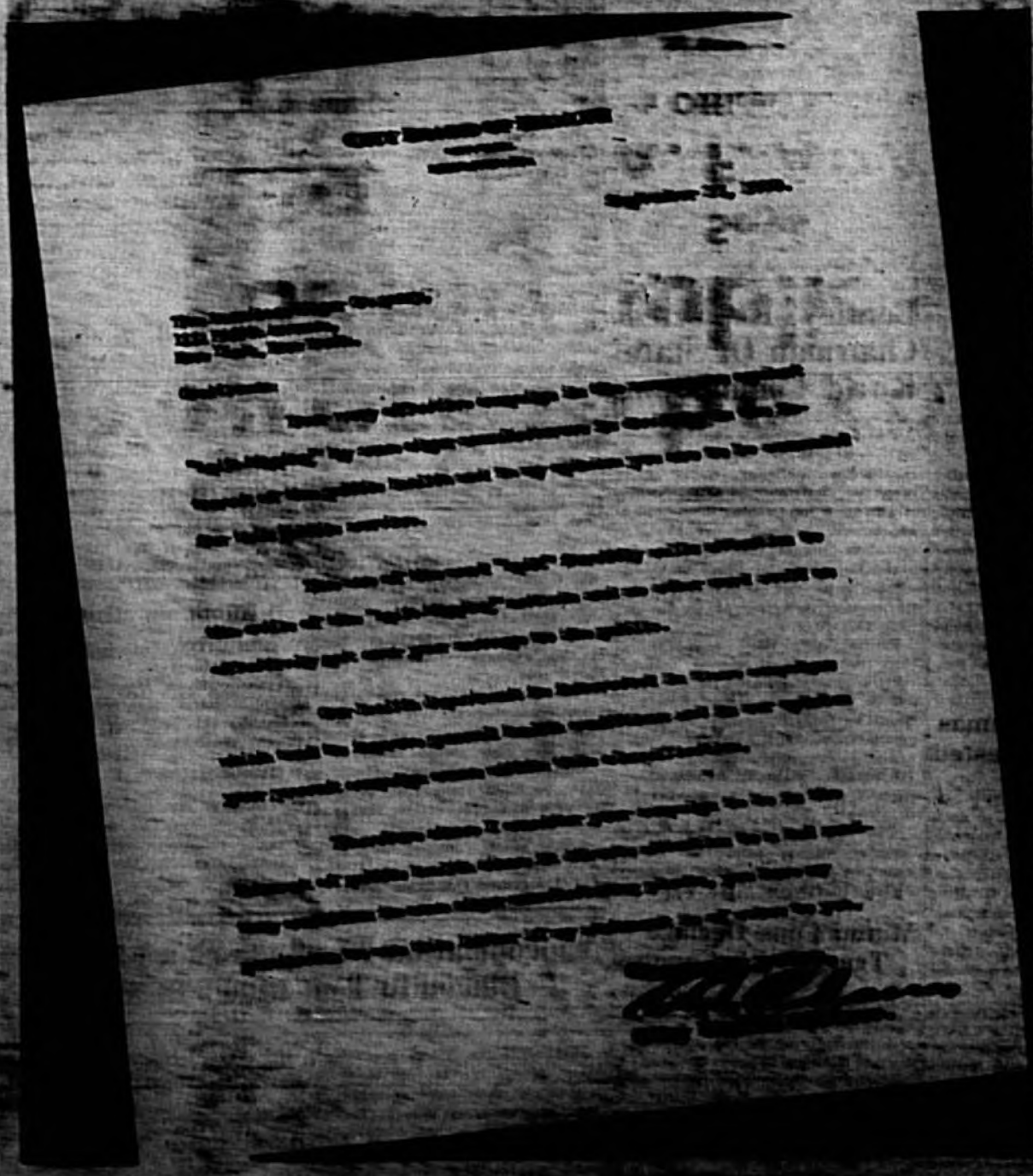
