








Some Names Are Peculiar

Scandinavian names are common to foreigners. War news always seems to read or to hear about some Scandinavian are being sent to us, and most of them are different from pronunciation.

Let me tell you our radio, we hear H. V. Kaltenborn, and other such "horror" names as Rutherford, Simony-Rydz, the Ryd, Coll, and many others. Such a tremendous task is the correct pronunciation of names that most Americans would rather say "he is either Germany's foreign minister, or their premier."

Such names as baseball, football and basketball, and names like Lundberg, Odeberg, Gustaf, and any number of others. We must realize that the names Jones and Smith are just as popular to foreigners as their names are to us. The so-called All-American football teams find such "stumblers" as Wojeleski, Helkken, Sarkanen, Sig-

gar, and many others. Are any of these of American origin?

Let me guess at the dictators who are called "strong men" names. Hitler's name was Hitler, Mussolini's name was Mussolini.

Let's hear you pronounce that! Scandinavian names are among the most difficult to pronounce.

Examples are the names of Myrdal, Paasikivi, Svennberg, Erkko. These are the names of important Scandinavians men. The name of Germany's army commander-in-chief, Walter Brauchitsch, is another long one and hard to pronounce. The name of the island, Ingria, Paasikivi, has a short name that stumps many a person.

Remember that it doesn't take long words that are practically unpronounceable to stump up a foreigner. It takes simple words that are easily understood by the average person, but they must express exactly what you wish to say.

In this age when everyone is striving for perfection in every imaginable phase of life, not enough thought is given toward our choice of words. For your own good, won't you try to enlarge on and generally improve your vocabulary?

Students Advised On How To Acquire Sound Vocabulary

How's your vocabulary? Is it really all it ought to be? Can you honestly say that you don't over-work your words just to keep from using your mind (in collaboration with a dictionary) little more than you absolutely have to?

Words, like any thing else, eventually wear out; and words are often overused (and words are many, most treasured possessions) the way in which a word is used has a great deal to do with the length of its life.

If you're an average person you've probably used the word "cute" so much that it's as distasteful to your ear as an out moded dress or suit is to your eye. And do you ever go to a party or movie that isn't "perfectly grand"? Well, what are you going to do about it? Why not find one shelf in a small corner of your mind with more interesting and appropriate adjectives, and reserve "cute" for its more correct meaning—skewdoo? Can't parties be beautiful, exciting, different, or any number of things other than "grand"? These are only two of many over-worked expressions.

Of course you want to enlarge your vocabulary, but before you can really call a word your own, there are certain things you must know about it.

First you must know the exact meaning of the word. It's knowing that slight shade of difference in the meaning of synonymous that makes a person's conversation exciting and interesting.

You must know how to pronounce a word because if you can't pronounce it you can't use it, and what earthly good is a word you can't use?

Next you must be able to spell it, for a word which you can't write isn't much help to you, because fully a fourth of your conversation is carried on in writing.

There's still one more obstacle to overcome before you can really call a word your own—knowing when to use it. There's nothing more obnoxious to a person than to have to listen to someone using words miles long when a shorter word would be more appropriate and he could be sure of its meaning, pronunciation, and general suitability.

Remember that it doesn't take long words that are practically unpronounceable to stump up a foreigner. It takes simple words that are easily understood by the average person, but they must express exactly what you wish to say.

Nutley High To Play Live Oak Team At University Stadium

Nutley High of Nutley, New Jersey, and Suwannee High of Live Oak will pit outstanding 1934 records in their inter-sectional clash to be played on Florida Field in Gainesville the night of Friday, Dec. 15. Neither has been defeated this season, although the northern boys have an early score to charged against them. Each played nine games during the regular season.
