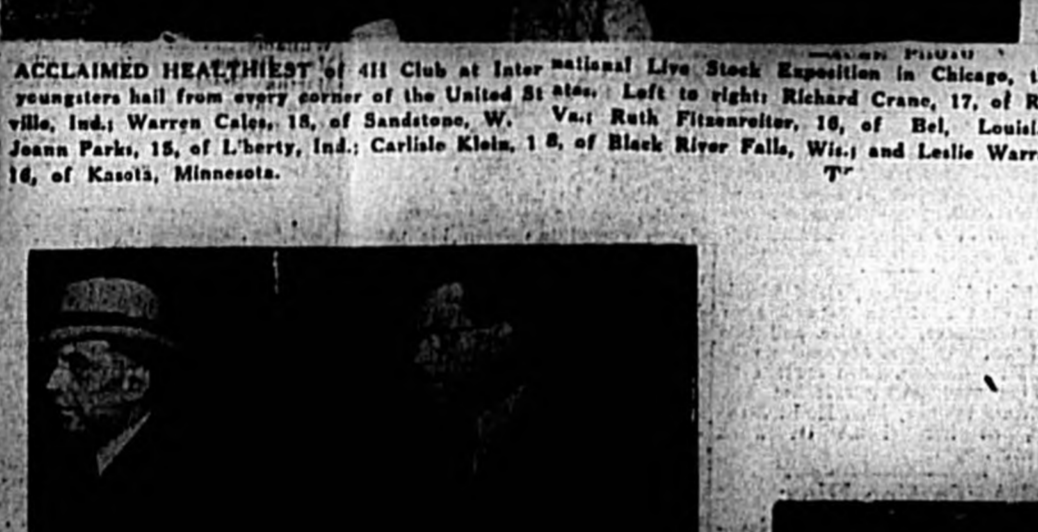

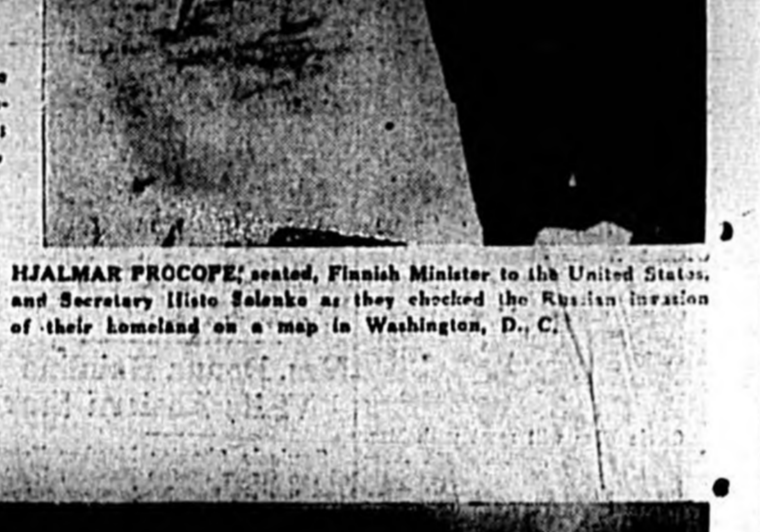

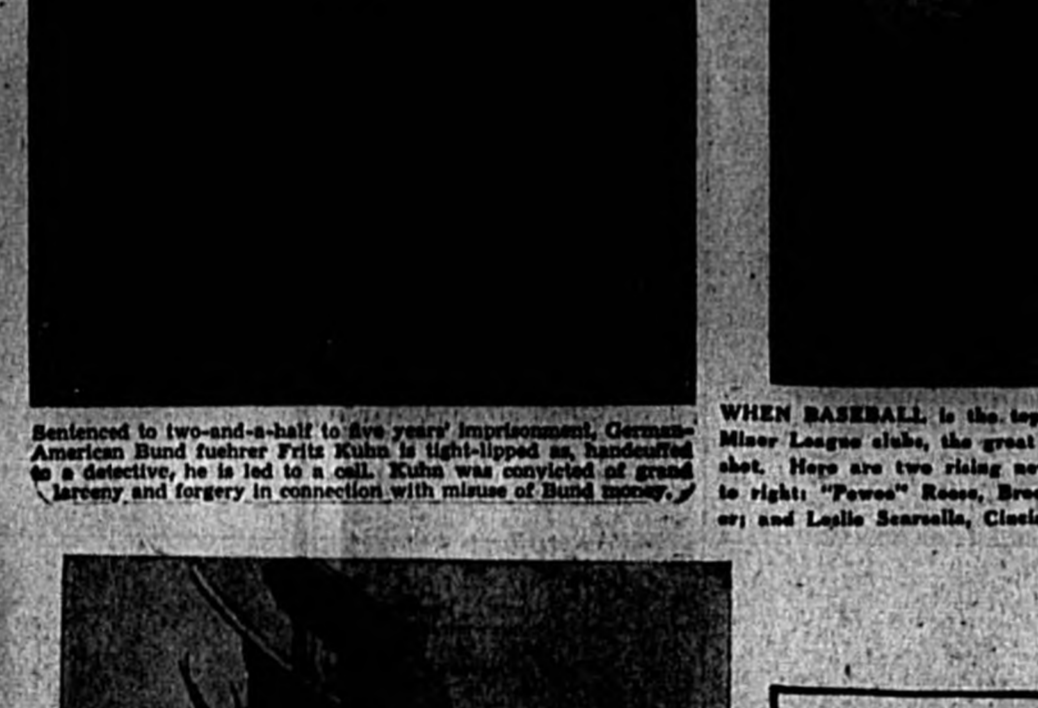

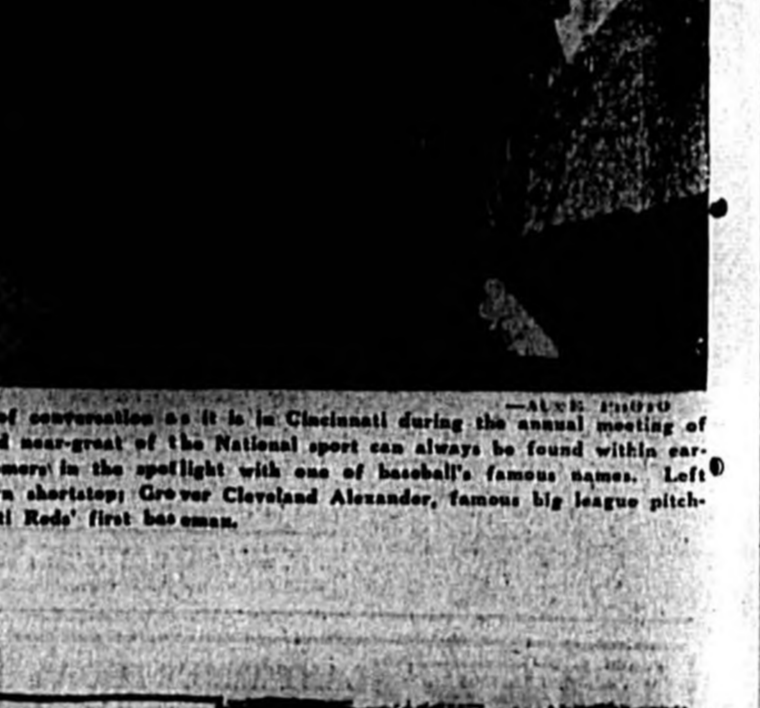

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## Children's Home Feeds Charges At Seven Cents A Day

**Plant City Truck Operators Jailed For Violation Of Law**

One of the first and probably the largest and most successful groves of papayas in Seminole county is the one owned by Mr. R. L. Garrison at his home on Richmond Avenue.

Mr. and Mrs. Garrison have half an acre grove of bearing trees at their farm east of Sanford and despite the fact that the plants are particularly susceptible to cold, there are in this grove trees which stand 12 feet high, bearing a cluster of fruit weighing an estimated 200 pounds. 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## WPA Projects For Cleveland Are Approved

**President Okays Work Costing \$1,248,991 To Relieve Acute Relief Situation**

**\$1,000,000 Bond Issue Is Planned**

**Roosevelt Accused Of 'Playing Politics' By Ohio's Governor**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today approved the expenditure of \$1,248,991 for three WPA projects in the Cleveland area.

John Carmody, Federal Works Administrator, advised the President the projects, with the Administration's policy of caring for employables, while observing to the states the responsibility of providing relief for needy persons unable to work.

The President said Friday that the bond issue is to be authorized to take care of needy unemployed workers. The request, stated a controversy with Governor Hefner of Ohio, who said the President had made a political attack on a Republican administration.

In Cleveland, Mayor Hefner announced the city plan to extend full credit for 65,000 work projects if the city could authorize toward the issuance of \$1,000,000 tax delinquency bonds. He said the city would be able to pay for the projects, but that the city would be unable to pay for the projects.

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
