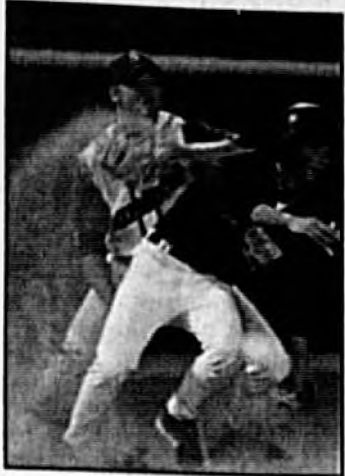

City outlines 1st Street details at July 29 meeting

A town meeting will be held 7 p.m. Thursday July 29, at the Sanford Civic Center to discuss the scope of the 1st Street Streetscape Project.

Representatives from the city and the general contractor, Gomez Construction of Winter Park, will attend the meeting to answer questions and receive input from merchants and other interested parties.

Among the topics to be discussed are the schedule, progression, parking, maintenance of business and pedestrian access, and informational signage.

A ground-breaking ceremony for the \$2.2 million renovation of 1st Street is scheduled for Monday, Aug. 2. The five-month project is expected to be completed by Dec. 31.

The First Street Streetscape project will extend from Oak Avenue to Sanford Avenue. The Community Redevelopment Agency provided funding for the project.

The project will include complete street amenities, new underground storm drainage system, irrigation, street lighting and electrical utilities.

The timing of the construction will allow for pedestrian traffic to stores and restaurants at all times. Construction and traffic signs will be posted and traffic controls will be provided.

Van Gaale brought back

Split commission overturns city manager

SANFORD — In an unprecedented move, the city commission bypassed normal personnel procedures and reversed the city manager's decision to fire the deputy city manager.

As the overflow crowd of more than 175 people sat down following the Pledge of Allegiance at Monday's commission meeting, Mayor Brady Lessard deviated from the agenda and presented commissioners with a resolution that called the dismissal of Andrew Van Gaale unwarranted. The resolution also directed City Manager Al Grieshaber to consider some

other discipline.

The vote wasn't unanimous. Commissioners Kevin Hipes and Art Woodruff voted against a resolution.

"When something is thrown at you all of a sudden, it's always difficult," Woodruff said, "especially when you're being asked to stray from standard policy."

Grieshaber fired Van Gaale on July 23 following a two-week investigation into Van Gaale's use of a city-leased golf cart during the city's July 4 celebration.

Normal procedure would call for Van Gaale to appeal the termination to the city's civil service board, which would make a nonbinding recommendation to Gries-

haber. The city manager could accept or reject the board's recommendation. If Grieshaber rejected the board's

findings — and because the disciplinary action was termination — Van Gaale could appeal to the city commission.

Lessard offered his resolution after "hours and hours of

SANFORD — Seminole YMCA, a winner in two categories of the Best of Seminole contest from *The Herald*, will finish major renovations in August.

The facility won Best Recreational Facility and Best Health and Fitness Center in a reader contest (See special section inside).

A \$2.1 million expansion and renovation project is underway at the Seminole YMCA Family Center located at 685 Longwood-Lake Mary Road in Lake Mary. Construction began in December 2003 with completion of Phase I expected in late August.

The Phase I renovation includes the creation of a new wellness wing which will add 5,000 square feet to the existing wellness area. A newly designed member reception area and increased handicapped parking spaces will be added near the front entry. This phase will also include the relocation of the children's playground.

Reading essential for high school success

SANFORD — Too many young people are arriving in high school without proper reading skills, so Seminole County Public Schools Superintendent Bill Vogel has written to the state for help and to offer some suggestions.

In a letter to Florida Department of Education Chancellor Jim Warford, Vogel said the district is concerned with the number of high school students who did not achieve an annual learning gain in reading on the FCAT.

That fact alone dropped Lake Brantley High School to a "C" grade and Seminole High School to a "D."

"The current classes of ninth and tenth grade students have not had the benefit of the latest research and subsequent new methods to successfully teach reading to students," Vogel wrote July 1.

Most high schools have not offered reading as part of a regular curriculum, Vogel said in a later interview.

"It's not that they can't read," said Deputy Superintendent Dianne Kramer.

Comprehension of what they read and especially

Family finds horse in a hurry

SANFORD — For more than a week, hundreds of volunteers, people with dogs, expert trackers, and even the Seminole County Sheriff's Office couldn't find a missing horse.

It took the Carter family literally a couple of minutes.

Scott Carter said his family found out about the missing horse Saturday, July 24. The bay gelding named Madeo had been missing since July 15, but Carter said they hadn't noticed that or he may not have started looking.

Tammi Carter, Scott's wife, figured

the horse must be down by Lake Jesup. The animal bucked its rider while exercising on a trail near the lake.

The Carter family, including son Don, drove slowly down the ramp of State Road 417. Peering into the woods, Tammi spotted the horse's tail wagging. She climbed into the woods, and scaled a barbed-wire fence that separates the park from the highway.

The Carters forgot the flier with the phone numbers.

They called neighbors and soon dozens of people were on the scene, including Anne Britton of Crooked Creek Farm, where Madeo is boarded.

The horse still wore its saddle,

which hung upside down under his belly.

"The worst of the injuries was the abrasion from the saddle girth rubbing on his back," Britton said. Scott Carter said Madeo lost about 100 pounds.

"The horse was only 300 yards from the road," Scott Carter said. "We ride mountain bikes in there all the time, so we had an idea where he might be."

A reward was offered, but Carter said it was an insult. The family did not look for the horse to pocket the reward.

"Our reward are the phenomenal new friends we made," he said.

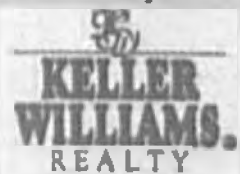

County honors first black fire chief at July 23 event

At a landmark ceremony for Seminole County, the family of the first black fire chief was presented July 23 with an honorary fire chief's helmet.

Family members of the late Joseph Jackson Sr., were unable to attend a ceremony by the Fire Chief's Association in Key West the preceding weekend. Instead, Seminole County Fire Chief Terry Schenk accepted the helmet on behalf of the family. He presented the helmet to the family at the Seminole County Public Safety Building, 150 Bush Blvd., in Sanford.

Jackson served the community of Midway just outside of Sanford. He and a few others started what was known as the Midway-Canaan Volunteer Fire Department in 1960. He remained fire chief until 1974, when the department became Seminole County Fire Department.

Midway-Canaan Volunteer Fire Department was well-known for providing community service by participating in parades, collecting money for the less fortunate and rebuilding the Midway neighborhood.

More than two and one-half centuries ago, America's first fire chief, Benjamin Franklin, wrote an essay titled: "Brave Men at Fires."

It read: "Neither cold, nor darkness will deter good people from hastening to the dreadful place to quench the flame. They do it not for the sake of reward or fame; but they have a reward for themselves, and they love one another."

County Fire Department spokesman Alan Harris said in a news release that Jackson was a man who found a reward in firefighting, who loved his community and his family.

"He hastened to the dreadful place to save others," Harris said. "Fire Chief Jackson will always be known as a pioneer in Seminole County."

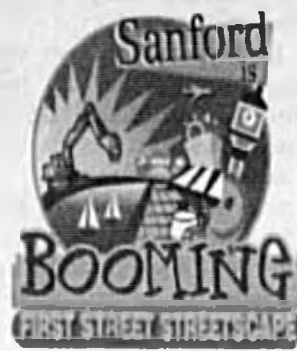



problems with vocabulary make higher level or analysis questions difficult for these students, she explained.

Some could be laziness, Vogel said, but when these skills are not developed, an apathetic attitude can develop because it is very difficult.

"It is essential that students learn to read for understanding," he said, adding that vocabulary building is important as well.

Vogel requested technical and financial help from the state to meet the challenge of improving reading levels among level one and level two high school students.

He offered a few suggestions as well, including identifying what the best practices are to help students.

He also suggested that funding be provided as well as training for reading coaches at each high school based on the percentage of level one and level two ninth graders.

Reading could become a credit course, he wrote to the chancellor. He also asked for funding for summer reading camps for students at this lower level. More funding for reading teachers at high schools would also help, he said.

"We are willing to participate in the development of a high school reading pilot program for statewide replication," he wrote.

Vogel also met with all the high school principals in Seminole County. Each school is developing a read-

ing plan, he said in an interview.

In a subsequent letter to the high school principals, he called the county's high school grades a "call to action."

He said there is a sense of urgency among the schools and the district.

Goal A in the district's strategic plan is increasing all students' reading levels and scores.

"The high school reading issue is a major challenge for school-based and district personnel for the 2004-05 school year and beyond," Vogel told the high school principals.

"You have our support for continuing to seek strategies to address the needs of these students."

Competition good for reading

OVIEDO — Fourth and fifth-grade students from Stenstrom Elementary School here are battling it out — for books that is.

Thanks to The Foundation for Seminole County Public Schools' "Grants for Great Ideas" program, the students will have some 300 copies of award-winning books to share.

"Media Specialist Pamela Carlson's grant application was timely," said Tina Calderone, executive director of The Foundation for Seminole County Public Schools.

"Results from the 2004 FCAT, released by the Florida Department of Education, showed that more than 25 percent of Seminole County's fourth and fifth-grade students read below

grade level."

Carlson will set up a year-long contest between the fourth- and fifth-grade students to encourage more reading. The grant will fund 30 copies of 10 different Sunshine State Young Readers Award books, selected each year by the Florida Association for Media Education.

Each student will read between five and 15 of these books, take comprehension quizzes and write at least one book report.

Then in the spring, each class will select a well-read representative to compete in the "Battle of the Books." The competition, resembling a spelling bee, will determine the school-wide winner. This school year, the foun-

dation has awarded more than \$100,000 to classroom teachers with innovative classroom programs and competitive academic teams.

The foundation's "Grants for Great Ideas" program invites teachers to apply for grants to improve their classrooms. Grants are issued for innovative academic supplements that the foundation feels will inspire learners and increase understanding of the curriculum.

dealing with this issue that has troubled me personally." The resolution, which was vetted by the city attorney, proposed bypassing the civil service board and allowing city commissioners to take up the issue immediately.

Lessard's rationale for bypassing the civil service board was two-fold. First, he said the issue was damaging the image of the city. Second, Lessard argued that the present situation was an "anomaly." Since the city manager originally terminated Van Gaale, Lessard reasoned that there was little chance Grieshaber would reverse his decision based on the civil service board findings.

"I believe we can speed up this process in a manner that does not impede the city charter," Lessard said.

City Attorney Bill Colbert echoed Lessard's comments and noted that the city's human resource policy "does not contemplate original action by the city manager."

However, Colbert warned commissioners that their jurisdiction was limited.

"The city commission can not determine what disciplinary action is appropriate," Colbert said. "Termination is the only thing commissioners can consider."

Commissioner Velma Williams made the motion to adopt Lessard's resolution

and spoke passionately about the need to "end this saga."

"I view it as being in quicksand slowly, slowly sinking," Williams said. "I don't think the city of Sanford should be subjected to that. We've worked to hard over the last 12 years to change our image."

Commissioner Hipes agreed that Sanford's image was important, but he said commissioners should allow the process to proceed.

"I want what's best for the city, too," Hipes said. "I realize time is a factor, and I certainly don't want to prolong this. But, I think we need to follow our own policies."

Following the 3-2 vote approving the resolution, Grieshaber read from a prepared statement.

"I fully understand that Andrew is very popular in Sanford, and that the affection has led to quite an outcry from his friends," Grieshaber said. "As business leaders yourselves, I am sure you understand that popularity cannot be the deciding factor when rules are broken and ethics are compromised by a high-ranking employee."

"The course of conduct exhibited by the Deputy City Manager — solicitation of a gift, knowing personal use of city property, and failure to

be at his appointed place of duty — (is) incompatible with our obligations as fiduciaries of the public trust," Grieshaber added. "A greater level of accountability is required from those holding high positions in government, as they are examples to all who serve. Leadership demands honesty and responsibility, and I believe Andrew has compromised his ability to lead and manage employees of the city of Sanford."

Grieshaber has made other blistering comments regarding Van Gaale's continued employment as deputy city manager.

"I told the mayor that I was not about to have Andrew back on the second deck," Grieshaber wrote in a July 14 memo, "and that his presence would effectively render my leadership a nullity."

In the same memo, Grieshaber said the Van Gaale's employment would be "detrimental to the organization."

Following the city commission's decision to nullify Van Gaale's termination, Grieshaber refused to comment on whether he believed he had the support of the commission or what his future status with the city might be.

"I'll let my statement speak for itself," Grieshaber said.

Van Gaale was pleased with the commission's decision and said he was anxious to get back to work.

"I want to thank the mayor and city commission for taking action and being proactive," Van Gaale said. "I have to wait and see what (Grieshaber's) decision is (regarding punishment). I'm hoping for a favorable decision."

"I'm looking forward to getting back to work," he added.

"I can work with the city manager. I'm not worried about that. I can work with him."

"Don't take it on yourself to take the product off your car," he said. "You can move away from it or move around it to be polite and respectful to everyone involved." But he added that if drivers don't act nice, he'll act. "If that doesn't happen, we'll be forced to deal with it," he said.

Clean victory

No boos for Busch as Roush driver wins at New Hampshire

Loudon, N.H. The controversies and hard feelings that have been distractions in recent NASCAR races took a back seat to steady performances and sportsmanship in Sunday's Siemens 300 at New Hampshire International Speedway.

No official decisions were questioned, no crews scuffled on pit road, and Tony Stewart, who has had his share of spats this year, steered clear of any possible problems and even was given kudos by Matt Kenseth for clean driving.

When it was all over, Kurt Busch, who has been involved in a ruckus or two through the years, had driven a virtually flawless race to claim his second win of the season, the 10th of his career and a three-spot jump in the standings.

As a bonus, fans got to see a green-flag finish despite a late-race crash, and a big percentage of them gave Busch, who has received his share of boos in the past, a much appreciated congratulatory cheer.

"Wins like today help the fans gain more knowledge about our sponsor and the driver who was able to win on a short track or a banked track or a flat track and have some fun," he said.

It sure didn't start that way. A poor qualifying run had the eventual winner mired in 32nd position for the initial drop of the green flag, but he worked his way to the front steadily and took the lead for the first time on Lap 171. He gave up the top spot for a time but reclaimed it for good from Ryan Newman on Lap 233. Then he held off Jeff Gordon, who hustled to the front from his 24th starting spot, in a race-ending, three-lap shootout.

Pole-sitter Newman, who started on the pole and led the first 170 laps, finished third ahead of Kenseth and Stewart.

Busch moved from ninth to sixth in the Cup standings with seven races to go before the Chase to the Championship, but he's still only 48 points ahead of 10th place Newman. Only the top 10 in points after the Sept. 11 race at Richmond will compete

allotted tests for the tracks where the final 10 races will be run.

"We're prepared for that final 10," he said, "but now we've got to make sure we can get into it."

Jimmie Johnson, the Cup series points leader, was never a contender for victory. He finished 11th but boosted his points lead from 105 to 165 over runner-up Dale Earnhardt Jr.

Earnhardt, recovering from burns suffered a week ago in a sports car crash, started his No. 8 Chevrolet to get credit for the points it earned, but he turned the car over to relief driver Martin Truex Jr. during the race's first caution period.

Truex, making his Cup debut, finished 31st after spinning the car into the wall on Lap 112 after contact with Ken Schrader.

Earnhardt, who started in the rear because Truex qualified the car, drove it to 29th position before yielding the wheel. He exited the car to a roar from the grandstand.

"The fans have been great," he said. "Aside from the injuries, I wouldn't change anything. I've learned a lot of things through it, and I'll be a better race driver once I'm back to 100 percent."

Earnhardt still hurting, might again seek relief

Loudon, N.H. Dale Earnhardt Jr., still suffering from burns sustained in a sports car crash at Sonoma, Calif., ran 60 laps in his No. 8 Chevrolet at New Hampshire before turning over the wheel to understudy Martin Truex Jr.

Earnhardt said he might have to seek relief again Sunday at Pocono.

"We'll just have to wait and see," Earnhardt said. "That's what we did [at New Hampshire]."

"We just didn't know, and we won't know."

His Dale Earnhardt Inc. teammate John Andretti, who has run a limited schedule this year, is the likely fill-in for Pocono because Truex, the Busch Series points leader, will be racing in Colorado this coming weekend.

Earnhardt, who performed admirably while in the car, didn't try to hide the fact that he's hurting from the burns on his chin and legs.

"It just hurts," he said. "I mean, it hurts all the time. That's all it does."

"But sitting down is a whole lot better than standing up."

There were whispers in the garage area before Sunday's race that the pace car driver might give Earnhardt a break by running a little slower on the lap that he and Truex made the switch.

When the change was made on Lap 64, pace car driver Brett Bodine circled the track in approximately 1 minute, 12 seconds — just a little over 52 mph. That speed was virtually identical to the other pace laps in the Busch and Cup races at New Hampshire.

Clogging the track?

Rookie Brian Vickers struggled to a 34th-place finish after spending most of the last half of the Siemens 300 trying to nurse along the Chevy he'd crashed earlier.

Two drivers trying to get by him were knocked into the wall by oncoming cars. Ricky Rudd wiped out his No. 21 Ford after he and Mark Martin ran up behind Vickers and Ted Christopher, who also was running well off the pace. Martin hit Rudd, knocking him into the Turn 3 wall.

Rudd said the cars of Vickers, who had been in an earlier crash and was slow through the turns, and Christopher, who had been off the pace all day, should have been parked for running too slow.

"I'm surprised NASCAR didn't black-flag them," Rudd said.

With five laps to go, Rusty Wallace was knocked into the Turn 4 wall by Dale Jarrett as the two veterans tried to pass Vickers and the lapped car of Truex.

Kenseth avoids mayhem for Busch win

Loudon, N.H. Matt Kenseth borrowed a page from the playbook that Ryan Newman used successfully in Nextel Cup last season and led the final 50 laps to win a crash-plagued Siemens 200 Busch Series race Saturday at New Hampshire International Speedway.

Kenseth started 21st and wasn't really a factor early in the race, but he took a chance and made his final pit stop before most of the leaders stopped. He took it easy for a few laps to save gas, then passed Casey Mears for the top spot. Once out front, he cruised while those who pitted later were battling traffic on the tight, almost flat oval.

His strategy worked because he was able to save fuel during the 10 caution periods that consumed 49 laps.

"If it had gone green to the end, we would have run out of gas," he said.

Tim Fedewa finished second in his

best run of the season. Jason Leffler was third ahead of Kasey Kahne and Kevin Harvick.

The Busch garage looked like the back lot of an auto body shop after the race, with even some of the top-finishing cars damaged.

Points leader Martin Truex Jr. and runner-up Kyle Busch were involved in crashes, and Busch received a one-lap penalty from NASCAR for spinning Jason Keller from the fourth spot on a restart.

Busch said the penalty was unfair and inconsistent with recent

NASCAR decisions. "We're getting held for a lap, and Tony Stewart can wreck every car in the [Cup] field while he's on probation and nothing happens," he told his crew as he sat on pit road.

Keller agreed the penalty on Busch wasn't appropriate, but for a different reason.

"He's too young and dumb for a little one-lap penalty to set him back," Keller said.

NASCAR spokesman Mike Zizzo said the penalty for aggressive driving was warranted.

"We had a clear overhead shot that showed it," he said.

Busch, who also ran into Jamie McMurray, said he simply made a mistake.

"Basically, I was anticipating, and I guess I anticipated wrong," he said.

Keller, who wound up 26th and dropped from third to sixth in the standings, said Busch shouldn't have been so eager.

"The top four cars had been pulling away from him every restart," Keller said. "Where was he going to go?"

We played with this school for another hour and found them to be very pretentious and not very hungry. I decided to leave and try them later. We leave the flat and head to the trout hole and find tons of bait. We managed a few small trout using the Rip Tide 3 inch mullet. We head back to the school of reds and found them daisy chaining but still not hungry.

It is now about 11:40 a.m. and our day is almost over

FWC DIRECTOR HONORED

Ken Haddad, executive director of the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) captured a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Regional Director Conservation Award for 2003.

The federal agency commended Haddad for improving communication and coordination between state and federal wildlife officials.

"His hands-on approach and landscape-level vision have brought the Service and the Commission much closer, to complement each other's conservation efforts," the federal agency said in a prepared statement.

The statement said (Haddad) has worked tirelessly with stakeholders, the Governor's Office, the Florida Legislature and the Service to find common ground. It lauded Haddad's approachability, willingness to tackle tough issues and superb communication and facilitation skills.

LOBSTER SPORT SEASON IS JULY 28-29
July 28-29 is this year's crawfish (spiny lobster) sport season — also known as the "mini-season." For two days, recreational lobster hunters will have the state's waters all to themselves before the commercial season opens Aug. 6.

Participants will need to purchase a saltwater fishing license and a lobster permit before getting started. Licenses cost \$14 for residents and \$7 — \$37 (depending on length of license period) for non-residents. Lobster permits cost \$2.50. Licenses and permits are available from county tax collectors' offices, license agents who sell hunting and fishing equipment, online at MyFWC.com/license/ or by calling 1-888-FISH FLORIDA.

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) urges lobster hunters to obtain licenses and permits well in advance to avoid long lines and unnecessary waiting time for online or telephone purchases.

Lobster divers must have a carapace-measuring device in the water and may not take lobsters with a carapace less than 3 inches long.

It is illegal to gig or spear lobsters, and lobsters must remain in whole condition until brought ashore.

Also, the FWC urges lobster hunters to protect

coral and seagrass beds. Human activity can place extreme stress on these important living resources.

The bag limit during the sport season is six per person per day in Monroe County and Biscayne National Park and 12 per person per day elsewhere in Florida. In Monroe County and Biscayne National Park, lobster hunters may possess the two-day bag limit of 12 lobsters only after leaving state waters, on or after the second day. The two-day bag limit elsewhere in Florida is 24 per person after leaving state waters on or after the second day.

Other restrictions also apply in Monroe County and nearby waters, and lobster hunters should visit MyFWC.com to become thoroughly familiar with regulations before entering the water.

BROTHERS COLLIDE IN DELTONA

On July 4, FWC Officer Jeff Gier responded to a boating accident in the Deltona Lakes area.

Two brothers, an 18-year old personal watercraft (PWC) operator and a 12-year old outboard boat operator, collided head on. The primary cause was the failure of the PWC operator to take appropriate action to avoid a collision.

Neither operator had the required boater education ID card. Both operators received non-life-threatening injuries and were treated and released from the hospital. The PWC operator was cited for careless operation. Both operators were issued warnings for operating a vessel without a boater ID card.

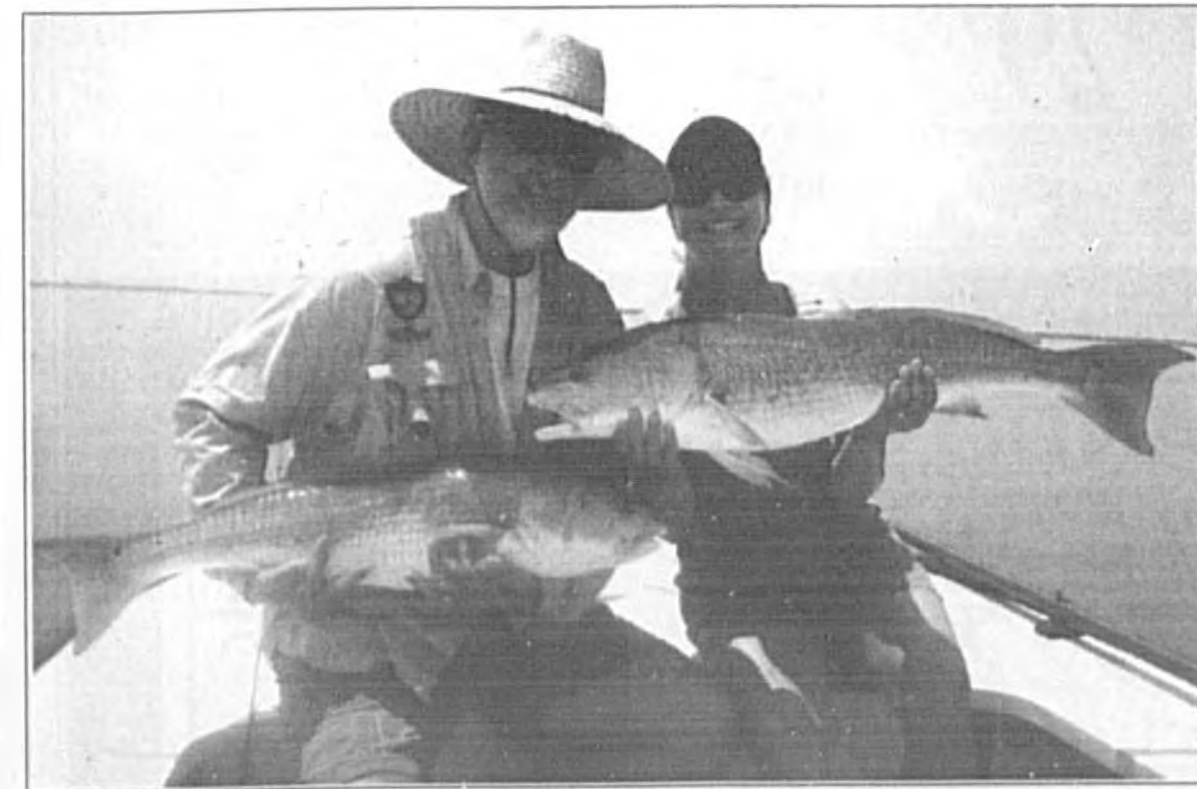

Missing man case becomes homicide

APOPKA — The body of a Sanford business owner missing since June 24 was discovered in a wooded area in Apopka July 27.

The Orange County Medical Examiner's office identified the body as Vincenzo Reali, said Kim

Walsh, Apopka police spokeswoman.

Walsh said it appears to be a homicide, but that the cause of death will not be released at this time.

The Apopka police will be the lead investigators working in conjunction the Seminole County Sheriff's Office and the Winter Garden Police Department.

A local resident was checking out a bad smell in a wooded lot off South Alabama Avenue, Walsh said. The man apparently did not know Reali, she added.

One of the questions investigators have is whether Reali was killed in Apopka or whether his body was left

Mother gets 15 years in prison

SANFORD — A Longwood mother received 15 years in prison four years after a single-car crash killed two teenage girls, including her daughter, and injured a teenage boy.

The BMW Mary Hill drove Aug. 7, 2000, skidded off Markham Woods Road and slammed sideways into a tree. Amanda Hill, 13, was killed as was her friend Carrie Brown, 14. Zak Rockwell, now 17, also rode in the car and was in a coma for three days following the wreck.

Judge O.H. Eaton Jr. told those in the courtroom Friday that the Florida Legislature passed a law that gives various offenses a number to determine what a sentence should be. The law also gives circumstances that could allow a lesser sentence, he said.

Hill's defense attorney Timothy Berry argued that his client should forego prison to continue treatment at Shand's Hospital in Gainesville. He said she suffered from substance abuse and depression, but was making progress.

Prosecuting attorney Pat Whitaker fought for a 21-year sentence, the minimum prison time allowed by the state.

Whitaker called the depression treatment a last-minute act by the defense to avoid prison.

"The defendant has done little to help herself up until her conviction," he told the judge.

Eaton acknowledged the impatience some have expressed with him. He had delayed sentencing twice. He allowed Hill, 53, to enter treatment in Gainesville, saying she was entitled to due process.

"In fact I bent over backwards," he said in allowing her the time.

He said the full measure of the sentence was not warranted, but substantial prison time was.

Hill was sentenced to 15 years each to run concurrently for manslaughter in the deaths of the two young women. Hill also received five years probation after her prison time. She will not be allowed to drive during the five years.

Hill must also pay a \$10,000 fine and court costs.

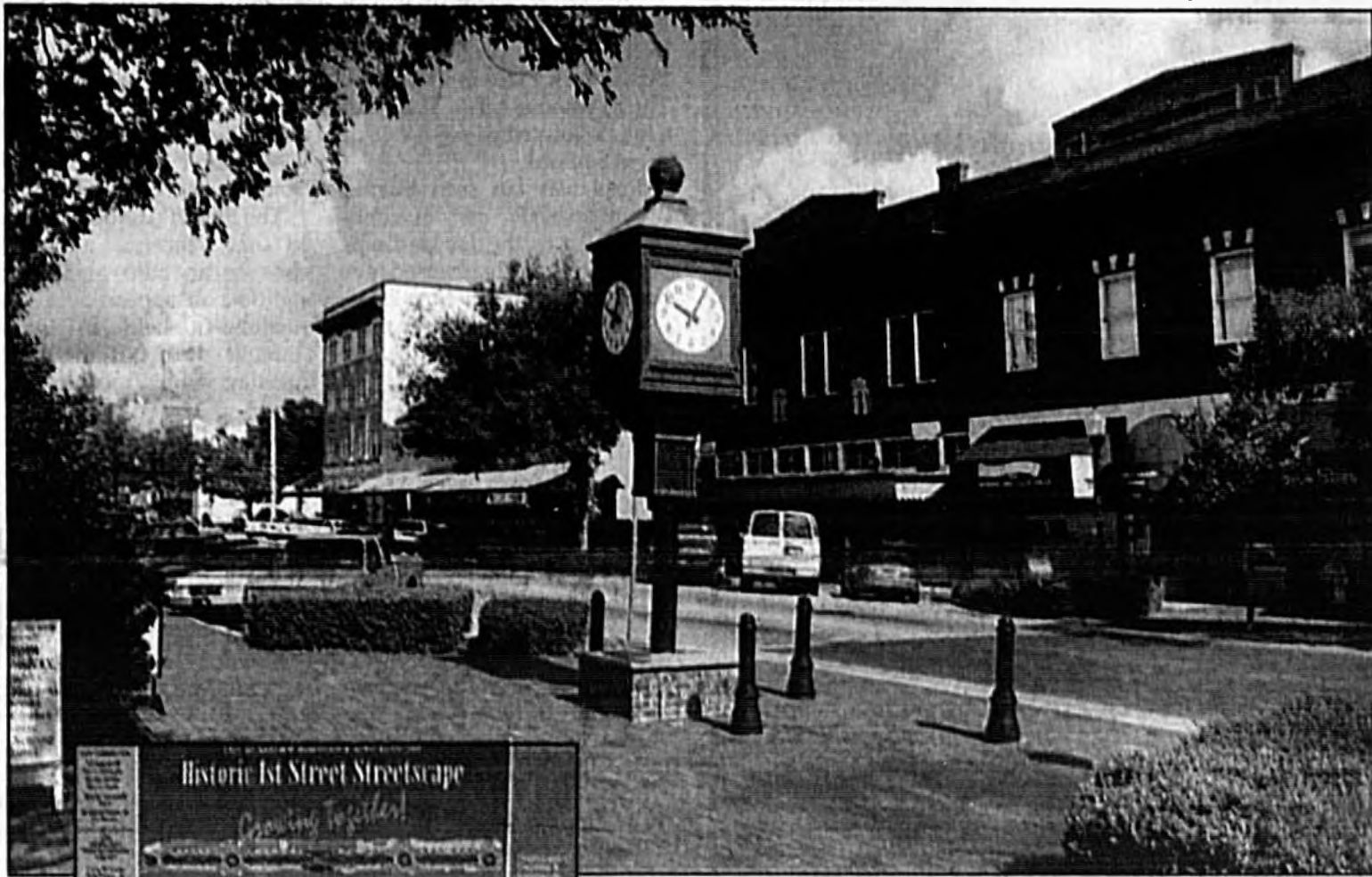
Hill showed no outward emotion as she was handcuffed following the sentencing.

Official groundbreaking ceremonies for the \$2.2 million Sanford First Street

Revitalization Project will be held Monday, Aug. 2 at 10:30 a.m. at the Magnolia Square clock tower on 1st Street.

It took months of debate and planning, but the City of Sanford is finally ready to put bulldozers to work. Sanford officials and residents will mark the beginning of the project Monday. As the ground is broken for the first time with a jackhammer, representatives of local Sanford businesses will be presented with a historic brick dug out of the street. They will be asked to return with

the bricks at the project's completion.

The First Street Streetscape improvements include a two-lane brick road, parallel parking, wider sidewalks with landscape planters, new underground storm drainage system, irrigation, street lighting and electrical utilities.

The city assures that First Street business will be able to remain open throughout the construction process. Pedestrian sidewalks will also be accessible during the renovation, with shops and restaurants to remain open during the renovation.

L. Mary residents arrested for fraud

TALLAHASSEE — Attorney General Charlie Crist today announced that following an 18-month investigation by the Office of Financial Regulation, Howard Dale Snipes and his wife Candy Snipes were arrested in Seminole County for participating in a securities fraud scheme that cost over a dozen investors more than \$200,000.

"These defendants are accused of cheating unsus-

pecting citizens out of their hard-earned money," said Crist. "It is unbelievable that anyone would take advantage of others in this way. I commend the Office of Financial Regulation for their efforts in this investigation."

The investigation uncovered that Mr. and Ms. Snipes allegedly sold stock certificates that were not legally reg-

No gas tax during August

Florida motorists will save an estimated \$59.7 million in gas taxes during August as the state gears up for its first-ever gas tax cut at 12:01 a.m. Sunday, August 1.

Enacted by lawmakers to provide relief for Florida drivers from this year's sharp spike in gasoline prices, the gas tax cut will cut state and required local gasoline taxes by 8 cents per gallon for the month of August. Florida gasoline prices have risen from a low of slightly

above \$1.50 per gallon for self-serve regular unleaded gasoline in late 2003 to a peak of more than \$2 per gallon for the same grade of gas in June 2004.

The tax cut does not apply to diesel fuel.

"This gas tax holiday is a great opportunity for Floridians and our visitors to get a break on what seems to be the ever-increasing cost of gasoline," said Attorney General Charlie Crist. "The Legislature should be commended for recognizing that consumer budgets have been

stretched by the recent record high prices."

State law requires that gasoline terminal suppliers, wholesalers, and retailers pass the full benefit of the gas tax cut along to consumers. State law provides that Crist may prosecute violations. Such a violation is a third-degree felony, punishable by up to \$5,000 in fines and up to five years in prison.

The tax cut represents a return of about one-third of affected state and local gaso-
