# Officer Finds Treasure At End Of Chase

The city of Sanford or its police department stand to be declared nearly \$11,000 richer as the result of police apprehension of a fleeing suspect Wednesday.

Sanford police officer Tino Fontana found a brown vinyl bag containing \$10,000 in an alley and \$894 buried nearby in three inches of dirt shortly after arresting a Sanford man on Elm Avenue. The find came at the conclusion of a two block foot chase that took both men through the

The chase began behind police headquarters, at the intersection of Ninth Street and Laurel Avenue, when the suspect reportedly fled from his car after it was involved in an accident at 8:20

Fontana was reportedly pulling his partol car into the police department parking lot when he heard the crash and saw the suspect run from the

The suspect was reportedly alone at the time and no injuries were reported to occupants of the other vehicle.

The money, in \$100, \$20. \$10 and \$7 denominations, may be connected to a case the police department is investigating, although not at liberty to discuss. Sanford Police Chief Steve Harriett said.

Harriett also declined to tie the suspect to the money, although he dld say two witnesses indicated the man was carrying a brown bag during the incident. Fontana did not note

whether the suspect was holding anything during the chase, Harriett said.

The Sanford police department will file a claim for the money if it is determined to have been involved in a criminal activity, Harriett said.

The city would move for receipt of the money if investigation fails to connect it to criminal activity and no one comes forward to claim it, he

The police department would place the money in its law enforcement trust fund, while the city would place the money in its general fund. Harriett said.

The suspect. Keith Lee Scheuring, 30, 509 Vihlen Road, has been charged in connection with the accident and is also wanted in See CHASE, page 14A

# Carli Out, Remain In Chamber **Prexy Race**

Brent Carll will withdraw his name from consideration as president of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce due to pressures of starting his third area business next year.

Carll, 30, a member of the Sanford Planning and Zoning Board, also said he will not pursue his goal of seeking election to the Sanford City Commission.

"I want to continue my involvement with Chamber activities and other civic affairs but the timing right now is not right." he said. "I feel that it is not in my best interests, and that of the community, for me to pursue the chamber position even though through education and experience I feel I am well qualified.

The withdrawal leaves 11 people on the list of aspirants to be head of the chamber, a position which opened with the retirement of Jack Horner effective June 30.

Withdrawing from the city commission race "really hurts,"he said.

"I've wanted to be a politician since I was a junior in high school. Unfortunately, time restrictions now prevent my doing anything about that ambition, he added.

Carll said that he will take course work during the next four months in preparation for his additional business venture and expects to have preparation complete and start operations by the first of next year.

"I'll have to put aside many of my present outside duties but my responsibilities to my family, church and businesses must come first. I'm definitely staying in the area, and will work to make it a better place.

#### De La Madrid Promises 'New Stage Of Cooperation'

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Mexican President Miguel de la Madrid has wound up his Washington visit with hope for a "new stage of cooperation" between the two countries but showing some testiness over recent American criticism.

"Mexicans, like Americans, guard their sovereignty and their independence," the president said when questioned by reporters about criticism in Washington of last month's elections in the Chihuahua state.

De la Madrid warned that "an atmosphere of pressure and tensions" is not the way to go about improving cooperation between the two governments on such controversial issues as drug trafficking.

His appearance before the National Press Club Thursday capped a 48-hour official visit that included a White House meeting with President Reagan. Mexican officials said the meeting did much to alleviate tension over the recent spate of American criticism of Mexico.

In attendance was Goodyear Tire executive Charles Pilliod Jr., who the White House announced is Reagan's choice as the new ambassador to Mexico Thursday. replacing former actor John Gavin.

#### **Senate Sanctions Vote Nears**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Senate ignored stern warnings from President Reagan and moved today toward a final vote on a sanctions package that Republican leaders said would hurt but not destroy the economy of white-ruled South Africa.

Senators brushed aside a one-word Reagan warning against sanctions - "Don't" - and defeated what GOP leaders called a "scorched earth policy" by Democrats wanting stronger sanctions to produce a sanctions bill scheduled for a final vote today.

But the outcome, after 15 1/2 hours of debate on amendments Thursday and early today, differed little from the original Senate Foreign Relations Committee bill and remains milder than a House version. Any differences between the two measures will have to be reconciled by a conference committee.

Senators are trying to force the South African government to abandon its racial separation policy, or apartheid. over presidential objections, though Reagan has not openly threatened a veto.

#### **Debt Bill Threatens Vacations**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Senate Republican leader Robert Dole is urging the Senate to follow the House's lead and pass a "clean" increase in the federal debt ceiling to \$2.15 trillion, which would allow Congress to recess on schedule.

But supporters of a Gramm-Rudman repair plan pressed to attach it to the debt ceiling bill, and the probable House-Senate dispute over the balanced budget law correction threatened to delay the start of the three-week summer break.

The House voted, 216-199, Thursday to hike the current debt limit by \$73.3 billion, about enough to keep the government running during Congress' three-week recess. scheduled to begin tonight.

Senate supporters of the Gramm-Rudman budget-cutting law want to repair the part found unconstitutional by the Supreme Court and re-invent the act's automatic budget cutting procedure by putting the president's budget director in charge of the cuts. Opponents, especially House Democratic leaders, argue that gives too much power to the

#### Impeachment Panel Chosen

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A committee of 12 senators has been designated to receive evidence in the impeachment trial of jailed federal Judge Harry Claiborne, the first time a panel, not the Senate Itself, has presided in such a

The Senate was sworn in to sit as the impeachment court. The committee will begin hearing testimony Sept. 15 and prepare a record the full Senate will take up Sept.

It will be the first time a committee has heard evidence in an impeachment trial and the first time since 1936 that the Senate has formed an impeachment court to remove a federal judge, who are appointed for life and can only be ousted by Congress.

Claiborne and his lawyer, Oscar Goodman, object to having a committee hear evidence, arguing the full Senate should hear from witnesses to evaluate their credibility.

#### Shuttle Announcement Expected

WASHINGTON (UPI) · After months of administration indecision. NASA appears close to winning formal approval for a replacement for the destroyed space shuttle

The authoritative aerospace magazine Aviation Week and Space Technology reports President Reagan already has approved a plan to start construction of a fourth shuttle at a reduced pace to minimize funding requirements for the next fiscal year.

Administration officials said a White House announcement on a decision in the matter was imminent.

President Reagan, who has said publicly he favors the idea of a new fourth shuttle, was asked about his decision Thursday night at an evening congressional picnic at the White House.

TUSTIN, Calif. (UPI) - A 13-year old girl who had pleaded with her mother and father to stop using drugs. brought nearly \$3,000 worth of cocalne she found stashed in their home to a police station and had them arrested, police say.

Deanna Young, whose action won praise from first lady Nancy Reagan, told authorities she was motivated by a drug abuse lecture she attended at a church, Police Chief James Thayer sald Thursday.

Deanna's parents, Bobby Dale Young, 49, and his wife, Judith Ann. 37, were charged with possession of cocaine. If convicted, they would be eligible for a drug rehabilitation

program rather than serving a jail term.

The couple was arrested Wednesday after their daughter carried a plastic trash bug containing an ounce of cocaine - valued at \$2,800 - and a small amount of marijuana and pills into the police station and said it belonged to her



# Don't Ignore Us, Lake Mary Tells County

The city of Lake Mary doesn't want its proposed plans for design of Lake Mary Boulevard widening to be ignored by Seminole County. The boulevard, a county road, is slated to be widened to at least four

Lake Mary city commission representative Paul Tremel put the county commission on notice at a Tuesday afternoon worksession that the city wants the county to use the city's transportation plan as a guideline for the portion of the road in the city limits.

The plan, adopted the city commission earlier this year, designates land uses as well as median and curb cuts on the boulevard to regulate traffic flow through the city.

Widening work will start in 1988, but preliminary engineering has already been done, and a final design should be de-

termined in three weeks, County Engineer Jerry McCullom said.

Construction will be done in two segments. The portion of widening to begin in 1988 is from Markham Woods Road to Country Club Road, and is expected to cost between \$8 million and \$9 million. Mc-Cullom said. At the same time, the state Department of Transportation will begin expanding the Interstate 4-Lake Mary Blvd. interchange, which is expected to cost the state about \$15 million, McCullom said.

# Fourth **Dimension**

It's doubtful that anyone will ever visit the fourth dimension.

But there are few who understand it better than mathematician Michael Freedman, who recently won the most prestigious award in his profession — the Fields Medal.

Dr. Freedman is a specialist in topology, the study of shapes. He received the medal, which is given only once every four years, for resolving the Poincare conjecture.

At the core of this scientific riddle is the esoteric world of math, where, in Dr. Freedman's captivating words, "imagination is unfettered by reality.

The fourth dimension is time, which along with the ordinary spatial coordinates of length, width and depth, defines a position in a space-time continuum.

In 1900, French mathematician Henri Poincare proposed that a fourth dimensional surface is actually a sphere — which could be proven if one could mathematically "shrink" closed lines on its surface to points.

Granted this is extremely complex stuff. Indeed, the conjecture cluded and

exhausted mathematicians for more than eight decades.

Enter Dr. Freedman, who approached the problem from such a radically obscure angle that many of his colleagues thought he was foolish. He resolved the conjecture after seven years of sleuthing and soon recognition began flowing to the young man.

In 1984 he won a MacArthur Fellowship. was named California Scientist of the Year and elected to the National Academy of Sciences. Last year, he became the first Charles Lee Powell Professor of Math at UCSD. And earlier this year, he received the American Mathematical Society's Veblen Prize, which is awarded only once every five

Dr. Freedman's research into the fourth dimension will ultimately help scientists find answers to how galaxies and the universe were formed. But in the meantime, it's refreshing to hear Dr. Freedman assert that one of his responsibilities is "Ultimately ... to move society in the direction where elementary-school children grow up liking mathematics instead of hating it."

Dr. Freedman's honors bring new renown to UCSD and particularly to its math department.

His new-ideas approach in solving mathphysics conundrums is an ideal example of why the young, vigorous department is recognized as one of the most distinguished in the world.

Dr. Freedman's success, for example, echoes that of another UCSD mathematician. Shing-Tung Yau, who, beginning in 1982. was also awarded a Fields Medal, the Veblen Prize, and a MacArthur Fellowship.

A boyish-looking rock climber who wears sandals to class. Dr. Freedman belies the public image of an academician.

In addition to being a pioneering researcher, we sense that he's a good teacher. Anyone who can explain the complications of fourth-dimensional space as "just four numbers written in a row; it's as simple as that, with commas in between" is bound to invite students into an adventurous realm of learning.

## Americans Misled On Military Spending Need?

I have just finished reading a book by Tom Gervasi entitled "The Myth of Soviet Military Supremacy." Mr. Gervasi is director of the Center for Military Research and Analysis in New York.

If there is any one recent book that I wish the American public would read and comprehend above all others, it is this one.

Mr. Gervasi's thesis is that for most of the time since World War II. American policy makers have misled the people into believing we had to increase military spending to "catch up" with the Soviets. The reverse is also true: Soviet policy makers have used the same ploy in beefing up arms expenditures to offset American superiority.

Using a compilation of the most reliable available studies and analyses of comparative military strength. Gervasi convincingly documents the superiority of the United States in strategic nuclear capability as well as in such other areas as naval and air power.

The author gives special attention to the Reagan administration, which has carried military spending to record heights based on the false claim that all of this is necessary to end alleged Soviet military supremacy.

'We have a strong defense today, and we had one five years ago, when a new administration gained office chiefly by claiming we did not, and by promising to rearm America. To that end, it has imposed needless and incalculable costs upon the American people." writes Gervasi.

I have believed with increasing conviction since first coming to the Senate in 1963 that "the military-industrial complex." of which we were warned by the late President Eisenhower. has sold the American people a bill of goods ever since World War II. Hungering for ever greater profits and power, the militarists have time after time invented scares based on alleged Soviet moves that required new American weapons systems and greater military appropriations.

In the 1950s we were told in frightening language that the Russians were confronting us with a "bomber gap." In the early 1960s we were supposedly faced with a calamitous "missile gap." Both of these gaps were fictitious. or "lies" to quote Gervasi.

The Reagan administration has for the past five years been riding on another "lie" — the "window of vulnerability." This mythical invention rests on the argument that the Soviets are destroying American nuclear deterrence by threatening our land-based missiles. Actually, most of our nuclear deterrence is not based on land, but on submarines and in bombers. With the Soviets just the reverse is true: their missiles are largely land-based. Thus, if land-based missiles are becoming more vulnerable, it is the Soviets who have the "window of vulnerability."

not the United States. Of course the reality is that both the Soviet Union and the United States have far more than they need to deter the other from a nuclear attack. Each side has known for the past 30 years that it could not attack the other without inviting a calamitous nuclear retaliation. Since deterrence is the only practical function of nuclear weapons, most of the vast sums spent by Washington and Moscow on piling up more and more nuclear overkill beyond any reasonable requirement for deterrence is an investment in paranoia, waste and weakening deficits.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - President Reagan indicates he cannot understand what all the commotion is about when he goes to the hospital for a medical checkup or why White House secrecy causes undue con-

But if he is really interested, all he has to do is read the transcripts of two news briefings for reporters last Friday.

In the first briefing at 9:15 a.m. EDT. deputy press secretary Peter Roussel was under wraps not to say that Reagan was going to Bethesda Naval Hospital the following day for a urinary tract checkup.

But the fact that Reagan had canceled his weekend at Camp David evoked questions from the press and through their persistence in quizzing Roussel reporters deduced that the president had a health problem.

They reached that conclusion when Roussel told reporters that "I am not aware of any procedure or test" but refused to rule out a medical examination. Later it turned out that the White House was splitting hairs and playing for

As a result, reporters wrote stories indicating that Reagan apparently would undergo a checkup. Since he has had a bout with cancer, the question of a problem in that area naturally arose.

It was not until four hours later that deputy press secretary Larry Speakes took the podium and issued a statement saying that Reagan would undergo a urological examination the following day.

Speakes, who had been out of town, told reporters he ordered the announcement held up until he could return and make it himself. As a consequence, there was suspicion, widespread and unnecessary speculation, and a drop in the stock

At no point did Speakes describe the examination as routine, and since then he has refused to divulge the symptoms that sent Reagan to the hospital for a thorough bladder examination.

On April 1, 1982, Reagan underwent a similar checkup after suffering from a urinary infection that was treated with antiblotics.

As Reagan was leaving for the hospital he chided reporters: "I feel just great. I'm sorry to disappoint you; this is just a routine check."

# Japan, Soviet Buildup

TOKYO - As every reader of cornerstones of our own protection. American newspapers knows, Soviet Premier Gorbachev is eager to limit nuclear arms, and it's Ronald Reagan who is the hardnose. Congressional doves like Teddy Kennedy are teaming up with such Third World figures as India's Rajiv Gandhi and Sweden's Ingvar Carlsson to try to knock a little sense into our saber-rattling president.

But if so, why did a worrled Western military observer here recently describe the increase in Soviet air power in northeast Asia as "astronomical"? That nice Mr. Gorbachev has built Soviet fighter strength in this region up to nearly a thousand aircraft, with the late-model Fulcrums yet to come but expected soon. Add to that 350 bombers, 80 of them Backfires, which practice low-altitude attacks. And don't forget the 165 Soviet SS-20 IRBM's installed in the Far East.

Keep an eye on naval developments, too. The Soviet Pacific Fleet is the best and largest of the Soviet Union's four, with somewhere between a third and a half of all the Red Navy's vessels. Boasting 840 ships, including two aircraft carriers, it regularly plies the waters between Vladivostok and its base at Vietnam's Cam Ranh Bay perhaps the best harbor in the Far East. And recently Soviet diplomats have been seeking "fishing rights" from the mini-states of the central Pacific (Vanuatu has already signed a contract), so the hammer and sickle will henceforth be seen much more often all over that mighty occan.

Even if you can afford to forget these things, President Reagan can't. He has sworn to defend this nation, and our mutual defense treaty with Japan is one of the Even now, U.S. Ambassador to Japan Mike Mansfield warns that "the mission of the U.S. Seventh Fleet out here is too big for its capabilities." Yet Congress snipes merrily away at the Pentagon budget, bragging that it has amputated \$30 or \$40 billion from Mr. Reagan's request - money that politicians such as Senator Kennedy naturally have no intention of returning to the taxpayers, but which they will now slosh liberally over the usual recipients of their

But is Japan itself doing enough in its own defense? Much more than you may think, says Ambassador Manssteld. That famous one-percent-of-GNP limit on defense expenditures doesn't include (as our own defense budget does) such costly items as military pensions: if it did, defense would account for 1.6 percent of Japan's GNP today. Moreover, Japan contributes more than a billion dollars a year toward the upkeep of the 55,000 U.S. military personnel in these islands – nearly five times, per capita, what West Germany contributed to maintain our forces there in 1982 (the last year for which figures are available).

What, then, about trade? Our current \$50-billion trade deficit with Japan is "intolerable," Mansfield agrees. But how much of this is Japan's fault? When the average GM car costs \$13,500, can Americans be blamed for looking elsewhere? Or can the Japanese be criticized for meeting the demand?

Another thing: Look at the East Asian nations (Japan included) that are winning the competitive battle for American markets, and you will see people who concentrate on working together for a common

# Volcanoes Killed Off Dinosaurs?

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (UPI) -Gases from Hawaii's Kilauca volcano have given a group of scientists fuel for their theory that volcanic eruptions instead of an asteroid wiped out the dinosaurs 65 million years ago.

Hollywood movies have depicted the huge reptiles perishing during violent volcanic eruptions, but little scientific evidence had been avail-

able to support such an idea.
In 1979. Dr. Luis Alvarez of the University of California at Berkeley unveiled a theory that the extinction of dinosaurs was triggered when an asterold collided with Earth, creating a global dust cloud that blocked out the sun for months.

The asteroid impact theory has been supported by the high concentration of the element iridium in sediments dating back to the time the dinosaurs died. Iridium is 1,000 times more

abundant in extraterrestrial material than on Earth, suggesting the extra iridium came from debris strewn about by the Impact of an asterold. Some scientists question the

theory, however, saying the asteroid theory fails to explain how the iridium was distributed so evenly around Earth, according to Dr. Ilham Olmez, a research scientist at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Recent analysis of samples of gases taken from air vents on the Kilauca volcano in 1983 found high concentrations of iridium for the first time in the discharges of volcanoes, Olmez said.

Olmez, who worked with researchers from the University of Maryland and the University of Washington, believes sunlight was blocked by dust and ash from massive volcanic eruptions.

The eruptions might have been triggered by an asterold, but the primary event that led to the extinction of the dinosaurs was probably the volcanoes, said Olmez.

To analyze the concentrations of elements found in the Kilauea samples. Olmez used a technique known as neutron activation analysis. He found more than 100,000 times the concentration of Iridium normally found in volcanic rock.

"This is strong enough to show that volcanic eruptions could have been the cause," said Olmez.

# Congress' Own 'Mike Deavers'

WASHINGTON - Few things in this town are more amusing than the speciacle of Congress mounting its white horse and charging forth on a lofty moral crusade - only to discover that the target of its outrage is actually a mirror.

That's what happened when the lawmakers decided something should be done to curb the growing number of high-level officials who leave federal service and cash in on their connections by becoming Washington representatives of

foreign governments. It turned out that almost half of the 76 former public servants who recently registered as foreign agents came from the halls of Congress

itself. Rep. Howard Wolpe. D-Mich., Introduced a dracontan bill last November that would stop the revolving door with a nose-banging

crash. It would prohibit former federal officials from advising or representing foreign interests for 10 years after leaving the government. Members of Congress were not

Wolpe always intended to include Congress and its senior staff, but he's been around Capitol Hill awhile. "We didn't want to prejudice the possibility of getting an initial hearing on the bill." he explained to our reporter Jim Lynch.

Even then the bill didn't draw much interest in what a Wolpe aide called the "pre-Deaver days." It initially had only four co-sponsors. but after the foreign consulting fees of former White House deputy chief of staff Michael Deaver began making headlines. Wolpe's bill began to pick up support. By February, it had 50 co-sponsors, and by May it had more than 120 in time for its

Wolpe requested a General Ac-

counting Office study of former high officials who had recently made the career change to foreign agent. And he asked that former members of Congress and senior staff aides be included. When the results came in. Wolpe's bill was rewritten to include congressional job switchers as well as former agency officials. He also cut the prohibition period from 10 years to four.

The GAO's list - which it stressed was not conclusive, because of loopholes in the registration law - included 32 former members of Congress and staff, 18 White House and 22 other executive agency officials and four generals.

Massey's government service was

Former Rep. Thomas Evans Jr., R-Del., is a partner in a law firm that represents Jamaica and Cyprus. Asked for comment. Evans said of the Wolpe bill's four-year restriction: "That's a long wait." He said he thought the legislation would be "a deterrent for people ... serving in government, because of the limitations afterward."

# Oldest Commissioned Officer Retires From Navy

BOSTON (UPI) — Rear Adm. Grace Murray Hopper, the feisty mathematician who prodded the Navy to remain at the forefront of the computer age, retired Thursday at age 79 as the oldest commissioned officer on active

"I've loved every minute of it." the frail-looking Hopper told ceremonies attended by 250 people, including Navy Secretary John Lehman, aboard the Navy's oldest commissioned warship, the 188-year-old USS Constitution.

The majestic vessel was nicknamed "Old Ironsides" for its durability in the face of British cannonballs during The War of 1812.

Called "the grandmother" of math doctorate at the Bureau of at Harvard University. The project devised the Mark I, the first of Defense's top award. large-scale digital computer.

# Dispute Chills Other Aspects Of U.S.-New Zealand Relations

WELLINGTON, New Zealand (UPI) -After dropping New Zealand from its security umbrella because of a dispute over nuclear ships, Washington will review trade and other aspects of its relationship with Wellington, the U.S.

ambassador said Thursday. The United States on Tuesday announced it was suspending security guarantees for New Zealand under the 34-year-old ANZUS alliance because of Wellington's refusal to allow U.S. nuclear-armed or nuclear-powered warships to visit its ports. ANZUS also Includes Australia.

Paul Cleveland, the U.S. ambassador to New Zealand, told government-run

Radio New Zealand the dispute over nuclear ships could affect other areas. such as trade.

"We will probably review other aspects of the relationship at sometime in the future," Cleveland said. ""We have done a great deal in the past to protect New Zealand's overseas markets. We'll no longer be able to do those things for obvious political reasons.

"You can't go up to a congressman to help New Zealand as a special ally and friend when we're at a stage such as we are right now," he said.

Cleveland also disclosed the United States was angry because it believed Prime Minister David Lange's government compromised a 1984 U.S. Air Force defense exercise in New Zealand by issuing a statement that none of the aircraft were nuclear-armed.

"That statement constituted, in our view, a violation of our neither confirm nor deny policy and we informed your government of that at the time," Cleveland said.

He said "it's a matter of concern" that New Zealand also would prohibit nuclear-armed aircraft.

But Lange said late Thursday that New Zealand's proposed anti-nuclear legislation, while banning nuclear ships, would give "blanket" clearance to aircraft.

The prime minister said this was done so as not to compromise the continued operation by the United States of its large air base in the southern New Zealand city of Christchurch, used to service its Antarctic Research program.

"By raising the question of aircraft, the United States ambassador to New Zealand is creating a problem where one didn't exist," Lange said.

The United States said New Zealand had effectively withdrawn from the ANZUS defense pact with Australia and the United States by refusing access to nuclear-powered ships.

MIAMI (UPI) — The Cleveland Browns will be too busy working on their new offense and looking at new players in their exhibition game with Miami Friday night to be concerned with avenging a 24-21 playoff loss to the Dolphins. Coach Mary Schottenheimer says.

Tonight's game will be televised locally by Orlando's WFTV-9 at 8 p.m.

The Browns certainly did not put the first-round playoff lose Jan. 4 to the Dolphins out of their minds, but may be saving that motivational force for their regular season meeting Nov. 10 in Cleveland.

"We have no revenge motive whatsoever." said Schottenhelmer, whose Browns are 1-0 in the exhibition season with a win over Buffalo. "Frankly, we have a lot of young players we have to evaluate. "Everybody knows this is the rematch of the team we faced in the first round of the playoffs last year." Shula said. "I'm very impressed with Cleveland. They've always had a solid

defensive football team, and now they've got a good ball-control offense to go along with that outstanding defense."

Miami quarterback Dan Marino will get his first action of the season, and Cleveland quarterback Bernie Kosar will get his first extended playing time of the year. Marino sat out last week's 30-16 loss to Minnesota with sore knees, and Kosar threw just four passes in two series against Buffalo.

Miami will start roookie John Offerdahl from Western Michigan at inside linebacker, the second consecutive start for Offerdahl. Other new starters on the Miami defense will be free agent nose tackle Tony Chickillo, rookie desensive end T.J. Turner, and free safety Lyle Blackwood, starting for the in-Jured Bud Brown.

Offensively, the Dolphins start a patchwork offensive line with recently signed free agent Greg Koch and Cleveland Green at the tackles. Ronnie Lee and Roy Foster at guard, and Dwight Stephenson at center.



#### Controversy **Envelopes** International

CASTLE ROCK, Colo. (UPI) -Between lightning bolts. hailstorms, complaints, heroic late-round birdies and a controversy involving the current U.S. Open champion, the inaugural international tournament had its share of excitement Thursday.

A computer, however, was needed to follow it all.

After two days of play in the unusual tournament it has become clear that most of the entertainment is found among those fighting to make the cut as they come down to the final holes.

On Thursday that group included two of the tournament's top attractions - Jack Nicklaus and PGA champion Bob Tway.

They both survived into today's second round, thanks to birdies near the end of the day and will join such notables as Tom Watson, Raymond Floyd, Tom Kite and Hal Sutton among the 78 players remaining in the \$1 million tournament.

The field will be whittled to 39 players after today's round and then will be cut to 12 for Sunday's final trip around the Nicklaus-designed Castle Pines course. Those dozen players will the competing for \$700,000.

The international features a scoring system which awards two points for birdles and five for eagles. One point is taken away for a bogey and three for a double-bogey or worse.

That format drew both praise and criticism Thursday and touched off a squabble because it allowed Floyd, the reigning U.S. Open champion, to skip the final hole and still make the cut.

Heavy rains and lightning forced two suspensions in play and as the first one was being ordered Floyd - who was standing on the 18th tee - decided to walk to the clubhouse and not

play the last hole. Since he had acquired 14 points through 17 holes he had more than enough to make the cut and since those points do not carry over to the next round he

did not need to play the 18th. "I would have played if we had not had the delay," said Floyd. "But I think this format is fun. It reminds me of the old Monday qualifying. I think it's going to be a significant event. I'm fond

A few hours later PGA commissioner Deane Beman said that from the second round on, all players would have to finish their round or be disqualified.

While all that was going on. the drama was building involving Nicklaus and Tway - both of whom were on the verge of missing the cut as the day wound down.

It took two points to survive the cut without a playoff and that is the figure which Nicklaus and Tway finally reached.

#### Sheehan's 67 Leads Women



Driesell has been a key figure in this phase of the inquiry. It is suspected that he instructed Terrapins players not to cooperate with police investigating Bias's death.

Robert Wagner, Bias's high school coach, is also a target of the grand jury's investigation in light of allegations that he told players to clear Bias's dormitory room of incriminating evidence, but it is not known whether he will appear before the investigative panel.

Testifying before the grand jury Thursday was the the mother of Brian Tribble, the man accused of supplying the cocaine that killed Bias.

Loretta Tribble told reporters after the proceedings that she testified for about 45 minutes, and her attorney, Thomas Morrow said the grand jury asked Tribble about areas concerning her son Brian "about which she had no knowledge."



# Proper Watering And Mulching May Be Your Most Valuable Practice

One of the secrets to successful gardening is knowing when and how to water. Most gardening techniques do have easy-to-learn rules to follow. For example, fertilizing, controlling pests, and pruning. The one technique that has no specific rules to follow is watering. When to water and how much depends upon the kinds of plants you're growing, your type of soil, the time of the year, and weather conditions. If you think your watering problems are different from your neighbors, you're probably right.

To improve your watering efficiency, closely study your lawn or garden. First, you need to determine how deep the water penetrates after a rain or irrigation. You can do this with a fancy soil coring device or simply use a spade to see how far down the moisture penetrated.

Next, check the amount of water supplied by your sprinklers. Place several coffee cans at intervals around your lawn. When you have run your sprinklers for an hour, see how much water is collected in each can. The amount should be about the same in each can if your sprinkler is delivering water uniformly.

For most of our sandy soils, the top six to 12 inches should be moistened at each irrigation. You need to determine how long and how much water is required to wet your soil to this depth.

To provide proper distribution and to avoid wasting water, operate the sprinklers at a rate only as fast as the soil will take it in. Runoff from too rapid watering does your plants no good and costs you money. Check several areas around your lawn by this method. This will give you a guideline to use for the length of time needed for irrigationin each area. Frequency of watering depends upon the rate of water loss for your particular soil type, it's depth, weather conditions, and rate of water uptake by the plants.

Water is lost chiefly by evaporation and transpiration by plants. Experience is your best guide for how often to water. Look at the soil to see how fast it dries out and watch your plants to see how quickly they wilt. With a little practice.

you can quickly discover how often you need to water, how much, and how long to replenish the

Using a mulch around your trees and plants can greatly reduce the amount of water needed, as well as reducing the time you spend mowing and weeding. A mulch consists of any kind of material applied to the soil surface to control weeds, conserve moisture, and moderate soil temperatures.

Mulch materials may be organic, such as compost, bark, wood chips, or similar material. Or, you can use an inert material, such as gravel. pebbles, or the new plastic mulching fabric. In most instances, avoid the use of polyethylene plastic film. Perhaps it's a matter of personal preference, but I've found organic materials are

Mulches have many beneficial effects upon the soil and plants. They prevent evaporation of moisture from the soil. Moisture moves by capillary action to the surface and there it evaporates if not covered by a mulch. Mulches prevent crusting of the soil surface, too, thus improving absorption and percolation of water into the soil, and eliminating erosion.

If weeds are a problem in your garden, the

solution is a mulch deep enough to stop weed germination and smother existing smaller weeds. Sure, an occasional weed may poke through the mulch, but it can be pulled out easily.

Mulches add to the beauty of the landscape by providing a cover of uniform color and interesting texture to an otherwise drab surface. Darkcolored mulches will give plantings a more attractive appearance.

For best results, apply your mulch at least two to four inches deep over the whole area. Avoid covering the crowns of low-growing plants. though. Keeping the layer deep enough to do the job is important. This means that more mulch should be added to the older layers at least once a year to get the maximum benefit.

One added benefit of mulches is that they reduce the leaching of fertilizer and other nutrients from the root zone of the plants. Thus, smaller amounts of fertilizer are required to keep the plant healthy.

Proper watering and mulching may be your most valuable gardening practices. You'll certainly reduce the amount of personal effort needed in clutivating, weeding, and watering. And, increase your chances of growing a healthy and vigorous landscape. Happy Gardening!



At that level, the radon would be blamed for between 13 and 50 lung cancer deaths for every 1,000 people exposed to the sub-

A picocurie is onetrillionth of a curie, the unit commonly used to measure radiation.

"There isn't any question that indoor radon is a major health issue," said A. James Barnes, EPA deputy administrator, who announced the agency's publication of two brochures to tell homeowners how to cope with radon.

Radon is produced from the natural breakdown of uranium and is found in high concentrations in certain soils and rocks.

The EPA said the most effective methods of reducing indoor radon levels are to prevent the gas from entering the home. usually by scaling entry routes, and to ventilate certain parts of the house.

# Karpov In Uphill Chess Battle

LONDON (UPI) -Chess, like any sport, is a game of mistakes. Because he made one too many, Anatoly Karpov found himself today in an increasingly uphill battle to regain the world crown from Gary Kasparov.

A pawn blunder in the seventh game forced Karpov to settle for an agreed draw with the 23-year-old champion Thursday. leaving the two Soviets on even points, at 3 1/2, with 17 matches left to play in the fight for the title.

But problems loom for the challenger. He needs one more victory than Kasparov in the remaining games five in London, the rest in Leningrad — to win back the championship he lost only last November after a 10-year

Karpov's troubles were immediate. starting with the scheduled eighth game today. Kasparov was playing the white pieces — a slim advantage in any chess game, but even more telling for a player renowned for his prowess in attack.

The prospect of facing a Kasparovian onslaught on the heels of a draw that must have come as a surprise to the champion suggested to some chess experts that Karpov might call a time-out for a long weekend to think things over.

Each player is entitled to three postponements during the marathon competition. Before the eighth game, the only one

But, as Robert Neyland, a football coach at the University of Tennessee, once said. "Competitive games are all decided by mistakes - the one who makes the fewest. wins." In chess, rescuing a draw from impending defeat is considered a victory.

In the seventh game, Karpov made the mistake, a too-obvious pawn shift on the 26th move. And Kasparov did the rescuing, spotting a flaw in the exchampion's queenside and capitalizing on it with previously thwarted counterplay.

Psychological edge. almost as much as board play, counts in the cerebral world of chess. That margin was held by Kasparov through the first four games - three draws and his own victory. Karpov's fifth game win and a well-earned draw in No. 6 shifted



#### Tutu Repeats Call For Sanctions As South Africa's Last Chance

PEKING (UPI) - South African Bishop Desmond Tutu. declaring that China will "provide a very good model for developing countries," today warned his country is "on the verge of catastrophe."

At the end of a weeklong visit to China, the Nobel laureate repeated his call for economic sanctions against Pretoria as "the last chance we have" to end apartheld. South Africa's policy of racial segregation.

Tutu told reporters at Peking's Capital Airport before leaving with his wife for Jamaica the communist nation "will provide a very good model for developing countries" and that he longs for Pretoria to adopt "the caring, the compassion which seem to be coming in this society."

Commenting on South African Manpower Minister Pietle Du Plessis' warning Thursday that his call for punitive sanctions "borders on treason," Tutu said, "I have done so because ... we want to change that system (of apartheid) and we want to change it as reasonably peacefully as

#### Vice Premier Calls For Reforms

PEKING (UPI) - Vice Premier Wan Li, making one of the strongest calls yet for more democracy in China, said in a major speech published today that China must reduce the unchallenged decision-making powers of individual lead-

Wan warned, however, that the freedom to air differing views would "on no account mean breaking away from the ideological guidance of Marxism."

Wan criticized the "personal preference and emotional coloring" that has marked the nation's political system for

more than three decades. The full, 12,000-word text of Wan's address, one of the strongest calls yet for democratic reforms in China, was published for the first time in several Chinese papers today. Wan said an important aspect of political reform is to

#### **Gandhi: Destroy The Extremists**

develop policy through democratic means.

NEW DELHI, India (UPI) - Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi. heavily guarded against possible Sikh radical attacks on the 39th anniversary of India's independence, promised today his government would "destroy the extremists."

Gandhi made the pledge during a 40-minute speech broadcast over national television and radio and delivered from behind a three-sided, bullet-proof glass screen on the ramparts of the 17th century Red Fort in Old Deihi.

"The government will not spare any effort to destroy the extremists." he said to the applause of some 10,000 people gathered before the majestic fortress. "If force has to be used, we will use more force.

He said officials would "increase the momentum" of a crackdown on Sikh separatists in northern Punjab state, an effort which he said has resulted in the death and capture of "many extremists." But he warned the public to expect more violence.

#### Magazine Predicts KSC Layoffs, **Company Denies Knowledge**

CAPE CANAVERAL (UPI) - More than 1,000 workers at the Kennedy Space Center will be laid off by Oct. 31 as part of a work reduction prompted by the Challenger disaster, Aviation Week & Space Technology magazine reported

The acrospace magazine says in its Aug. 18 issue that Lockheed Space Operations Co., which holds the major shuttle processing contract, will lay off some 985 employees, "which is about 25 percent of its nonengineering roster.

Grumman Technical Services Co., which handles shuttle processing software and computer maintenance under subcontract to Lockheed will reduce its force by 132 people from 660 down to 528," the magazine said. "Morton Thiokol will lay off 53 workers, reducing its workforce to

"I have no information as to any reports about layoffs." said John Williams, chief of public relations for Lockheed in Titusville, Fla. "We're sort of in a mode of standing by waiting to get definitive direction from NASA on what the future will be with respect to man hours and ...

Aviation Week said notices of the layoffs will be sent out beginning Sept. 1.

#### Citrus Deal Disappoints Officials

LAFELAND (UPI) - Florida citrus industry officials are not happy with an agreement worked out last week by negotiators from the United States and the European Economic Community in a citrus trade dispute.

Opposition to the agreement was voiced Thursday in a letter sent to U.S. Trade Representative Clayton Yeutter and signed by Bobby F. McKown, executive vice president of Florida Citrus Mutual, Dan Gunter, executive director of the Florida Department of Citrus, and Doug Bournique. executive director of the Indian River Citrus League.

McKown said Mutual was notified last weekend that negotiators had agreed to slightly reduced tariffs on U.S. citrus exports entering Europe in exchange for this country agreeing not to contest preferential treatment by the EEC to Mediterranean citrus exporting nations.

In Washington, two Florida Republican congressmen met with representatives of Yeutter's office, the White House and State Department, and afterward termed the

agreement "blatantly unfair" to the U.S. citrus industry. Reps. Andy Ireland and Tom Lewis said they were disappointed in the meeting they had with administration officials to discuss the agreement.

#### **UF,Others To Develop Crystals**

GAINESVILLE (UPI) - The University of Florida and four other schools will begin work soon on new techniques to develop crystals that can be manufactured in space and used in future electronics application.

Over a five-year period. UF, Clarkson University, in Potsdam, N.Y.; Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, in Troy, N.Y.: Worcester Polytechnic Institute, in Worcester, Mass.; and Alabama A&M University will design and test initial crystal manufacturing processes on the ground, and then redesign them for experimental work in space when the

shuttle flies again. The five schools were the recipients of a \$25.8 million grant from NASA and electronics manufacturers to develop the near-perfect crystals.

And many heart-wrenching things have occurred. During the two months the program operated last year. Patsy and Brenendette performed many unexpected deeds.

They helped some girls get emergency food. They questioned girls who showed obvious signs of being child abused. They contacted HRS, accompanied a few girls to the delivery room during a couple of false labors. They listened, they counseled, and they sympathized.

"Sometimes when I drive home at night." said Brenendette. "I take the long route

and turn on 108-you know, that easy-listening radio station-just to wind down." "The girls will sometimes call you at home at night," added Patsy. "Sometimes

> talk to." "One little girl. i4. was just dropped off at the hospital and left there when she went into labor." Brenendette said.

When the program first started last year, there were moments when I thought. 'I can't handle this.' My laundry would be piling up at home and I felt I just didn't have a life of my own. Then I would think back to something one of the girls had said during the course of the day and I would be ready to come back and do it all over again."

Rosalie Bouley is the full-time nursery attendant who monitored three newborns last year. Rosalie proudly displayed the "family" photo album, pictures of last year's girls with their babies. Fondly known as "The Pampering Room," the nursery is situated adjacent to the classroom where the girls work on academics via individualized programs and com-

puter terminals. "This year, we're expecting about twice as many bables, we're the only one they have to Rosalle said. "so the school board might have to hire

another aide. "It's like coming home with your new baby." said Brenendette about the welcoming girls receive when they return to

school after delivery. "Imagine having this large. extended family," said Rosalie, "and everybody wants to hold

the baby and look at it and coo.

That's what it's like here." Both teachers and aide have children of their own, so they realize the importance of showing impeccable concern for all the students and their babics.

"Over the summer." Rosalle said. "we wondered-"What has happened to our bables?

With school scheduled to reopen in just two weeks, this dedicated team will soon have a chance to find out.

# Reach Out And Touch Someone

E.T. needed one to phone home.

Men make false promises to use them.

Women wait for them to ring.
Teenagers can't be pried away from
them.

And since the break up of AT&T we've gotten a chance to express our personality through our choice:

The Telephone.
We can communicate with the aid of Mickey Mouse, Snoopy, or a complete cast of characterized instruments. But when selecting a telephone many opt for nostalgia and pick the phone that was in their childhood home.

Holly Hill's Brian Bishop, who converts antique and collectible telephones to modern use, said the most popular and most valuable of the old phones are the wooden box, wall phones and the candlesticks. The candlesticks, with the same beli-shaped style ear piece as the earlier wooden box phones, date from the 1920s and '30, he said.

Both of these popular styles also have cone-shaped mouth pieces, which are separate from the ear piece. The old box-style telephones were considered so ugly in their era that in well-to-do homes they were carefully camouflaged.

Not so today. Today's owner of one of

Not so today. Today's owner of one of these antiques proudly puts it in the limelight.

The candlestick evokes memories of the Elliot Ness character in the "Untouchables," television series of the 1960s. Those as well as other 1930s telephones are favored by the Baby Bromers, Bishop said.

Older persons favor the old wooden, crank-style, wall phones, while some just want a phone that blends with their decor, he said

decor, he said.

Forty-two-year-old Bishop, who has about 2,000 phones, some of which are for sale at a Central Florida flea market, has about 60 in his personal collection. His favorite rings in his Victorian home. It's the original 1892 Swedish-American, double box, wooden, wall phone that was in that same home in an earlier era. He bought it from the Lake Helen Telephone Company and put it back in its place.

Except for that phone, and "a few odd ball" phones, Bishop in his personal collection has only Western Electric gear, made by the company he worked for for nine years.

He's had to narrow his interest, he said, because

there were 260 different brands of telephones made before 1960 in the U.S. and within those brands there were "as many models as you can Imagine."

That's not taking into consideration the ornate European telephones, many of which have made their way to America.

Sanford's Nancy Engebretsen knew when she walked into an antiques

store and saw the old wooden box phone that was In use there that it was the phone for her.

Mrs. Engebretsen told the dealer, "I want your phone." He told her she was crazy, but then unhooked it and handed it over for \$325. "I walked out there with it and everybody looked at me like I had lost my mind," she said.

Although callers have a

hard time hearing Mrs. Engebretsen over her phone, she sald, "I like it because it's old and mainly because it's mine."

She also sald it has another advantage. Her 14-year-old son has to stand to use it and that, she said, curbs his time on the phone.

"I wanted that style phone for a long time," she said. "I had an imitation from 1969, but it wasn't on the wall." Her son, Mrs. Engebretsen said,

"destroyed it by pulling the cord around the corner so he could talk in secret to his girlfriends." With her new old phone, "The cord won't move. It stays in one place," and she likes that.

"I'm very, very careful not to destroy the antiquity of the original phone," when converting one to modern use, Bishop said.

"I drill no holes in the old wall phones and take no parts out. I change and add some parts, but don't take any out. Everything I put In can be taken back out in about 30 seconds," he sald.

If the old phone has no dial, he may add one to the inside of the box. That's the option that another telephone converter used when revamping Mrs. Engebretsen's phone.

Some people use the candlestick styles from the '20s, which don't have dials, strictly as extension answer phones, or the dial may be put on a side box, Bishop said. The candlesticks from the 1930s have dials.

The base cost of a conversion is about \$60, he said. But the cost can vary depending on the style of phone and the need for further restoration.

Contemporary, American-made character phones are very collectible, Bishop said. A used Mickey Mouse, Winnle the Pooh, Snoopy or Kermit the Frog. found for sale for about \$40

should be snapped up if it's in reasonable condition.

These phones, because they are American made, have replacement parts available, and can be reconditioned if necessary. That's not true of phones imported from the Orient, which Bishop said were meant to be used and then trashed when they fail.

Unusual colors, such as pink or purple can also increase the collectible value of modern plastic telephones.

The most expensive telephone that has passed through Bishop's hands is a 1909, automatic, electric candlestick, with an 11 digit dial. He sold that one for \$1,000.

He has also sold for \$600 a partial phone, which was an American Electric, "special purpose" wooden box with three dials on the front. That was his second most valuable find.

One of the more unusual telephones, he said, is a jukebox phone, which in the 1920s and '30s was installed in restaurants and bowling alleys. Patrons could use this entertanment device by picking up the receiver and telling an operator what tune they wanted to hear played through the phone.

This rocket-shaped phone was very modern for its time, Bishop said.

In addition to home-style phone, Bishop said, collectors also line up to buy old pay phones and even telephone booths, while others are called to collect telephone booth signs and Intercom systems.

Alexander Graham Bell's creation has moved beyond function to the artistic, emotion-evoking and expensive.






