## City checks fuel leak at Farmers' Market

City officials are eyeing property located directly behind the Farmers' Market as the site for a future public safety complex, but environmental issues may cause a re-direction.

The 7.9-acre, located at the corner of 13th Street and Lake Avenue in Sanford, is the former site of two gas stations that closed their doors in the 1960s and 70s.

Since going out of business, the gas tanks were removed from the site and the contaminated soil was

extracted. However, when city staff began researching the property as the possible location of the public safety complex, a prior environmental study showing contamination as a result of fuel was discovered.

In fact, Seminole County refused the property in 1992 because of the contamination. This discovery left city officials wondering if — more than a decade later — the prob-

lem has been corrected.

"We want some insurance so we can judge the risk," said Al Grieshaber, Sanford city manager.

Currently, the 7.9-acre is owned by the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services (FDACS). The state agency is willing to donate the majority of the property, worth an estimated \$390,000, and the city would need to

purchase a remaining four out-parcels at an estimated \$134,000.

In order to confirm the property is environmentally sound, a Level 1 environmental assessment is needed at an estimated cost of \$4,500. Since the complex will be primarily used by the Sanford police and fire departments, the two groups are willing to fund the testing and have allocated the necessary funds.

However, according to Grieshaber, the city could spend upward of \$30,000 conducting Level 1 and 2

### Internet-arranged blind date ends badly for woman

A south Seminole County man is under arrest, and in jail, for allegedly attacking a female, whom he met over the Internet.

The attack was reported to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office Wednesday at about 9:30 p.m. The victim had allegedly gone to the suspect's home at 5471 Bracken Court, Winter Park, for an arranged meeting that was set-up via the Internet. The victim alleges that the suspect, who is identified as 22-year-old Lester Joseph Nunez III would not let her leave and attacked her with a hammer when she turned down his advances. She alleges Nunez also attempted to sexually batter her. The victim says she managed to break away from Nunez, run out of the house and solicit help from a neighbor.

Deputies responded and Nunez was detained at the scene. He alleges the victim fell to the floor on her own, started screaming, and that he was holding her, trying to get her to calm down. Nunez was arrested. He is accused of aggravated battery, false imprisonment and sexual assault with a weapon.

The victim declined treatment of her injuries at the scene, but later reportedly sought treatment at a hospital in Volusia County.

Deputies will be serving a warrant to recover computer equipment at Nunez's residence, according to authorities.

### Crooms students experience 'real life' voting process

Employees of the Supervisor of Elections Office were on hand during student council elections at Crooms Academy of Information Technology Wednesday.

## Lake Mary residents see 10 percent tax increase

Lake Mary commissioners approved a hike in the city's property taxes for the first time in more than a decade Thursday.

The millage rate, which determines the tax rate, will rise to an all-time high of 3.998 mills. This is an increase from last year's 3.768 mills and the first rate hike in 15 years. Under Florida law this constitutes a 10.42 percent tax increase, as stated in a direct mail piece to Lake Mary residents in August.

"Our rates are low, relative to our sister cities," said Commissioner Michael McLean.

In fact, for the third consecutive year, residents of Lake Mary are blessed with the lowest millage rate in Seminole County.

The 2004 tax increase was spurred solely by the city's need for a fire substation in Downtown Lake Mary.

"The citizens have demanded a first-class fire and rescue,"

Editor's note: Staff Sgt. Charlie C. Carlson III, son of Sanford historian Charlie C. Carlson II, is deployed in Baghdad as part of the 549th Military Police Company. He is providing the Herald with a journal of his experiences.

13 Aug 2003 I don't know anything more about that shooting incident of that Iraqi stealing wire at the compound that we observed from the towers. They are investigating it, but so much of these things happen that it gets difficult to check each one out.

I know that many innocent people get caught up in this mess. We have no choice but to try to take care of ourselves first, like when I thwarted a recent ambush then went back looking for the attackers. If we let them

get away they will just hit us again or some other patrol. But it is too easy for them to disappear into the crowds or buildings.

As a squad leader, I do not roll my patrol through the streets of Baghdad and let someone shoot at us! I have to do something. Now we recite a phrase before we go out, "Yea though I walk through the Valley of the Shadow of Death, I shall fear no evil because we are the meanest SOB's in this valley." I know it sounds crude, but you have to get a little psyched up to do this work. My feeling is, if you

## From a cluttered yard to a jail cell

To symbolize his fight with neighbors, Alan Davis attached a statue of his rear end on the back of his mini-van. That fight has now come to an end.

Since as early as 1998, Davis has led a battle against Seminole County, his neighbors, the sheriff's office and

about anyone else who objects to his Alpine Street property, located near the of Altamonte Spring's city limits.

Sitting on his property is a home, but passerbys may not see it as a mound of assorted metal parts, artwork and other items clutter its view. His neighbors refer to it as 'trash' and six jury members in Circuit Judge Gene Stephenson's courtroom agreed.

The weeklong criminal trial wrapped up Thursday with closing arguments presented at about 10:30 a.m. With time still to spare before lunch, the jury returned with its verdict of guilty on all five charges of maintenance of nuisance, creation of nuisance, nuisance injurious to health, maintenance of a public nuisance and the third-degree felony of illegal dumping of litter.

Davis' next day in court will be Nov. 5 when Stephenson will

hand out a sentence, which could be as long as five years in prison. It may be until then that when Davis actually spends his next day of freedom as he was ordered held in the Seminole County Jail

without bond. The judge compared the situation to a loaded gun sitting in a fire.

**Comparisons:** Redneck comedian Jeff Foxworthy does a bit recalling the outlandish deeds of various family members. No matter what dumb stunt his family may pull, however, Foxworthy says a trip to a state fair quickly reminds him that there's a whole world of people more screwed up than his next of kin.

**Around the Clock**  
 My hometown, Knoxville, Tenn., is kind of like that state fair. No town I've ever lived in can match the dysfunction of Knoxville, though Sanford at times gives K-town a run for its money. Knoxville is the city, after all, where the mayor, Cas Walker, gained international fame in the 1950s by getting in a fist fight with another councilman during a city meeting. A picture of that fight graced (or disgraced, depending on your point of view) the cover of Life magazine. Oh! Cas also blocked the city from putting fluoride in the city's drinking water because he claimed it was a communist conspiracy. Just how dysfunctional is Knoxville? Consider the conference center. Sanford has bounced the idea around for about seven years now. There have been several proposals, with each new one offering a better solution than the previous either in location or business plan. Currently, the project is mothballed — maybe for good, maybe not — because commissioners made the prudent decision to wait until the economics are stronger. There may be yet another proposal coming down the pipeline that could be meet the all the city's criteria.

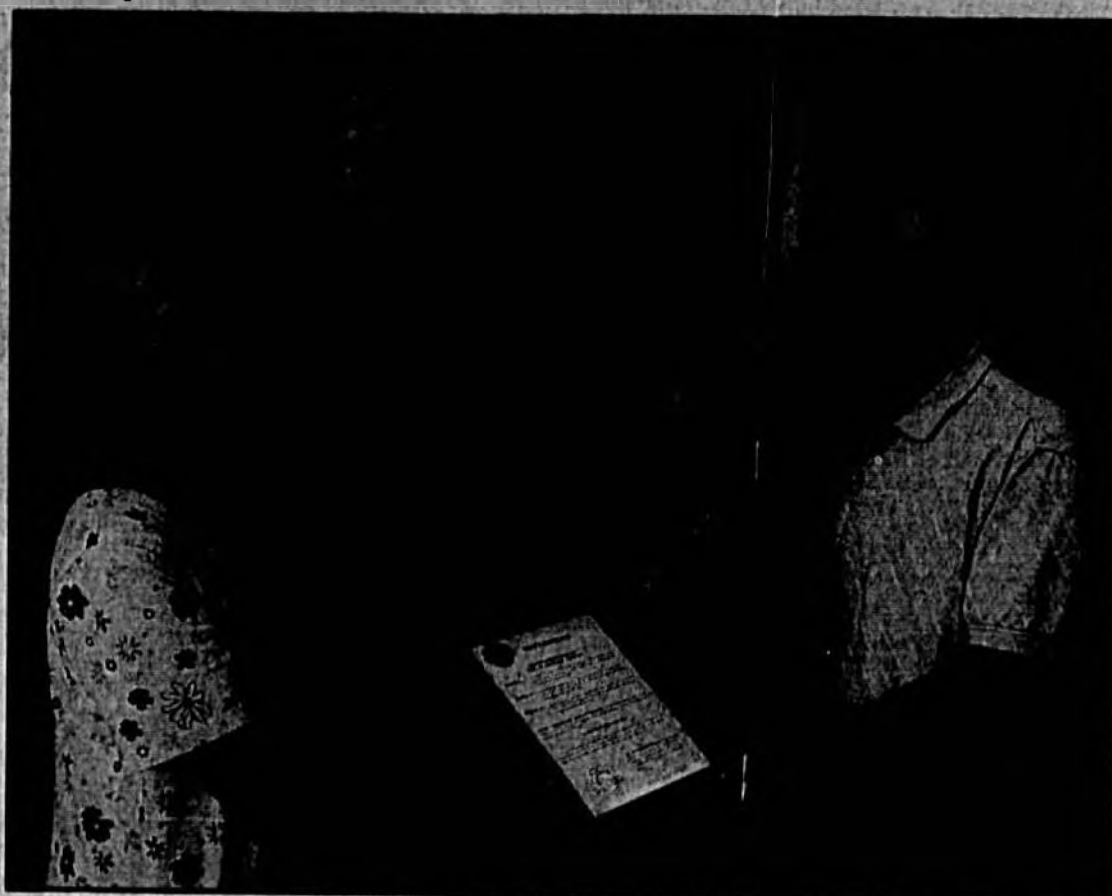
Knoxville's conference center experience, on the other hand, has produced nothing but acrimony. Since the World's Fair closed in 1982, city planners have wondered how to redevelop the site that attracted travelers from across the globe. Believing that lightning can strike twice, city leaders five years ago decided Knoxville was destined to be the next tourist hot-spot and began laying plans for a \$160 million conference center, or about eight times what Sanford considered spending. For their money, Knoxville taxpayers got a fancy new meeting hall that has yet to meet projections for attendance. To boost attendance, Knoxville leaders are proposing the city subsidize a private hotel. They've hired Don Hunter (anybody in Sanford remember that name?) to perform a two-part contract, determining whether the Knoxville conference center needs a hotel, and if so, find developers to build it. Guess what? Dandy Don determined Knoxville did in fact need a new hotel and trotted out a list of hoteliers (again several familiar names pop up on that list) willing to take tax money to build a shiny new facility. Big deal, you say. Hunter did the same thing here and even concocted a fancy funding scheme to pay for the hotel. The difference is Knoxville already has a multi-story Holiday Inn adjacent to its conference center. It was built 20 years ago prior to the World's Fair.

Why doesn't the Holiday Inn renovate and become the official hotel? Because the hotel's owner can't add rooms without city approval because part of the Holiday Inn is on city property. And Knoxville being Knoxville, that's no easy deal. The current mayor, Victor Ashe, and the hotel owner, Franklin Haney are longtime adversaries. Ashe would run over his own mother before he capitulates to a sworn enemy, and Haney's not about to sell his property to the city for less than three times the national debt. (Because of his numerous political dust-ups, Ashe was referred to by one Knoxville columnist as the "perennial pugilist," so the city's mayoral tradition of bloodying opponents' noses — literally and figuratively — continues in grand style.)

What does any of this have to do with Sanford? Well, nothing I suppose, except to serve as a comparison. This was an issue the city needed to debate, and Sanford is better for the experience regardless of whether the center is built or not. The process hasn't always been pretty and there have been plenty of harsh words from those who support the project and those that don't. Still, our city leaders have been prudent in their decisions on the conference center, unlike leaders in Knoxville. And, our mayor doesn't believe a swift punch in the nose is a proper debating technique.

### Reader: Airport's proposed runway will 'screw' county

Dear Congressman Feeney, I believe the entire letter I gave you at the Homeland Security meeting at UCF is still relevant and spot on. I hope you saw the piece on shipping containers on an ABC special report (on Sept. 11, 2003). There is no security! It is a joke; a sick, sorry, bad joke. The only reason this issue is being pursued is for the government to have control over the citizens of this country. After ABC News showed what a joke "Homeland Security" is, the feds went after them for doing the story rather than addressing the problem.

In regards to Larry Dale and his Good Ol' Boys having control over the Sanford airport, that airport is in the wrong place to be used for anything other than general aviation. ## Clark's candidacy changes campaign's calculus

What happens to President Bush's pseudo-machismo now that a general has entered the race?

For months now, the prospect of running against Gen. Wesley Clark has been gnawing at GOP strategists, haunting their otherwise pleasant reveries about a roll-over-with-a-bulldozer re-election campaign. They know it took a marketing genius like Karl Rove to sell President Bush as a commanding military leader. Without Rove's Madison Avenue strategy (and the cooperation of a fawning press), Bush, who neglected his fighter-pilot duty when he was in the National Guard, would be less Top Gun and more Stupid Run!

Already, Bush's borrowed flight suit has been sullied by the increasingly hazardous situation in Iraq. Now, he'll find himself compared to a West Point graduate who not only was decorated in Vietnam, but who also led a successful military campaign in Kosovo with the cooperation of international allies. When Clark announced his candidacy on Wednesday, the calculus of the presidential campaign changed instantly.

No matter how many phony Top Gun photo-ops Rove gins up, Bush can no longer count on easily persuading voters that he is the right man for these dangerous times. Clark brings much better military credentials to the campaign. While Bush's gin-nick has been to continually remind audiences of 9/11, his heroic hour, Clark's staff has an answer to that: They always refer to their guy as "the general," constantly reminding voters of his lifetime of mili-

tary service.

Clark could yet turn out to be a poor presidential candidate. He is good-looking, accomplished and razor-sharp. But he has a reputation as arrogant and aloof. If he comes across that way on the campaign trail, he'll sink like an old shoe. Bush won, after all, not because of his accomplishments (they were thin) or his policies (voters rejected most of them) but because of his personality. People liked him.

And, to advance against the platoon of veteran legislators already in the Democratic field, Clark will have to hone his resume on domestic issues, with which he has little or no experience. His political instincts put him squarely in the mainstream of the Democratic Party: He says he is pro-choice on abortion; he favors affirmative action; he supports environmental protections.

His greatest challenge on the domestic front, however, will be persuading voters that he has a plan to create jobs. (On that subject, though, the president presents no great challenge. Bush has presided over the loss of 2.5 million jobs, a record that rivals Herbert Hoover.)

Still, a Clark campaign — even if it is short-lived — comes at a propitious time because it cuts against the stereotype of Democrats as wimps. Though it's hard to say just how that notion took hold — a host of well-known Democrats, including Al Gore, John Kerry, Bob Kerrey and Max Cleland, served in Vietnam — it has hard-

ened as conventional wisdom.

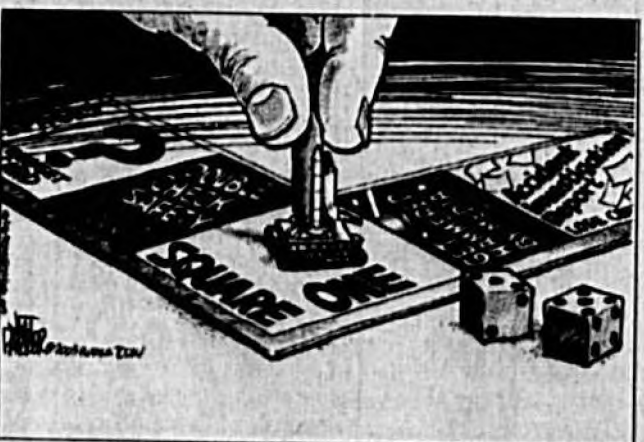
(Perhaps some enterprising academic will write an essay explaining how stereotype so easily overwhelms substance on this subject. Cleland, a former U.S. senator, lost three limbs to a grenade in Vietnam; yet he was defeated by Saxby Chambliss, a draft dodger who labeled Cleland unpatriotic. Chambliss claims a bad knee kept him out of Vietnam.)

(Similarly, the elder President Bush is a bona fide war hero, a torpedo bomber pilot who was shot down in the Pacific in 1944. Yet hard-right Republicans dismiss the elder Bush as a gutless wonder and hail Junior, who never got within 5,000 miles of the enemy, as a daring flyboy. Go figure.)

That may help explain why thoughtful Democrats in the Senate — notably, John Kerry — failed last winter to articulate a rational objection to President Bush's rush to invade Iraq. As a decorated Vietnam vet, Kerry had the credentials to point out the flaws in Bush's reckless crusade to remake the Middle East. Instead — perhaps fearing a backlash — he voted to support the war. So now he seems the hypocrite when he tries to criticize Bush's occupation.

Clark doesn't have Kerry's problem: no pesky pro-war vote to explain. Nor does he have Bush's problem: When he goes to a campaign photo-op, he doesn't have to borrow a uniform.

As part of the realistic process, student council candidates were required to fill out nominating petitions and the student body registered for the right to vote. The freshman, sophomores and seniors were then divided into precincts. With 243 registered voters, an 89.3 percent turnout was recorded in the precincts on Election Day.

Current student council members were trained by the Supervisor of Elections staff to serve as poll inspectors during the election, welcoming voters at the "precinct" entrance and insuring the ballots were properly inserted into the optical scanner.

"If you have never voted before, the first time at a poll can make you a little nervous," said Goard. "By having events such as this, it increases the individuals comfort level. The students will know how easy it is to vote and how important it is. So, they will be more likely to become registered voters."

Once the voting process was complete, the students received "I voted" stickers, a flag, pre-registration voting information and literature to take home to parents in an effort to get them involved in the voting process as well.

The use of optical scanners, made it possible for results to be tallied within five minutes of the polls closing. An analytical breakdown of voters was also provided to students by the elections office.

"This event is important because it teaches civic responsibility," said Dr. Connie Collins, principal of Croome. "It's a real life experience for our students. More important-



ly, they had an opportunity to interact with the supervisor of elections."

"Next year, we're hoping for 100 percent participation," she added. "This year the majority of students were registered, but we want to improve on that because this is such a good opportunity."

Goard said she was pleased with the results of the pilot program and plans to incorporate this event into other schools next year.

"The turnout has been wonderful and the students are doing a great job," she said. "In fact, they've done so well I might recruit some to work the polls when they get older."

said Mayor Thomas Greene. "It's expensive to do that."

The funds generated from the tax increase will be used to hire additional personnel to man the substation in hopes of enhancing the fire and emergency medical services in Lake Mary.

City officials plan to open the substation next year with seven full-time firefighter/paramedics on hand to staff the new rescue unit. In addition, 11 full-time employees will be hired in 2005 when a second fire engine goes into service, making the substation fully operational.

This scenario will allow the Lake Mary Fire Department to be the "first-in" to nearly all of the city's residents and businesses instead of the current plan in which Seminole County handles the southeast portion of the city.

According to City Manager John Litton, a total of 18 full-time employees will be hired to provide around-the-clock coverage at the substation, which will be built at an undetermined location near city hall. The money from the tax increase will not, however, fund the construction of the building. These funds will be allocated through budget surpluses of recent years.

According to Litton, city officials researched other possibilities including turning the responsibilities of the city's fire department over to Seminole County through a merger.

"People constantly want to have control over their own environment," said Commissioner George Duryea, who announced his re-election through an uncontested race Thursday. "That is why the city started because of a fear of another city taking over control. We have demonstrated year after year that we would rather have control then give it over to someone else. There is a cost involved with that."

"I know, personally, I would rather depend on someone I know, and that I know how was trained, the equipment being used and what their capabilities are," he added. "Even if it costs a little more than to wait for the county to come a week from Tuesday."

According to Litton, not only would a merger have relinquished city officials' rights regarding the new fire substation, but it would have cost taxpayers more money in the long run.

Along with the millage rate, commissioners also approved the city's 2004 budget of approximately \$15 million. Among other items, the budget has allocated funds for two motorcycles for the Lake Mary Police Department, the replacement of several vehicles in the city's fleet, and plans for sidewalk and beautification projects.

According to Litton, the city should see a 7.2 percent increase in revenues in 2004 due to a rise in ad valorem taxes and franchise fees. However, this will be offset by low interest rates and a slowdown in new construction projects.

As with other cities throughout Seminole County, Lake Mary officials

have struggled to provide quality, cost-efficient health insurance.

In 2004, the city will see a 25 percent increase in health and life insurance costs, adding to the personnel costs which ring in at 80 percent of the city's bottom line.

All things considered, "we are financial sound in all respects," said Litton.

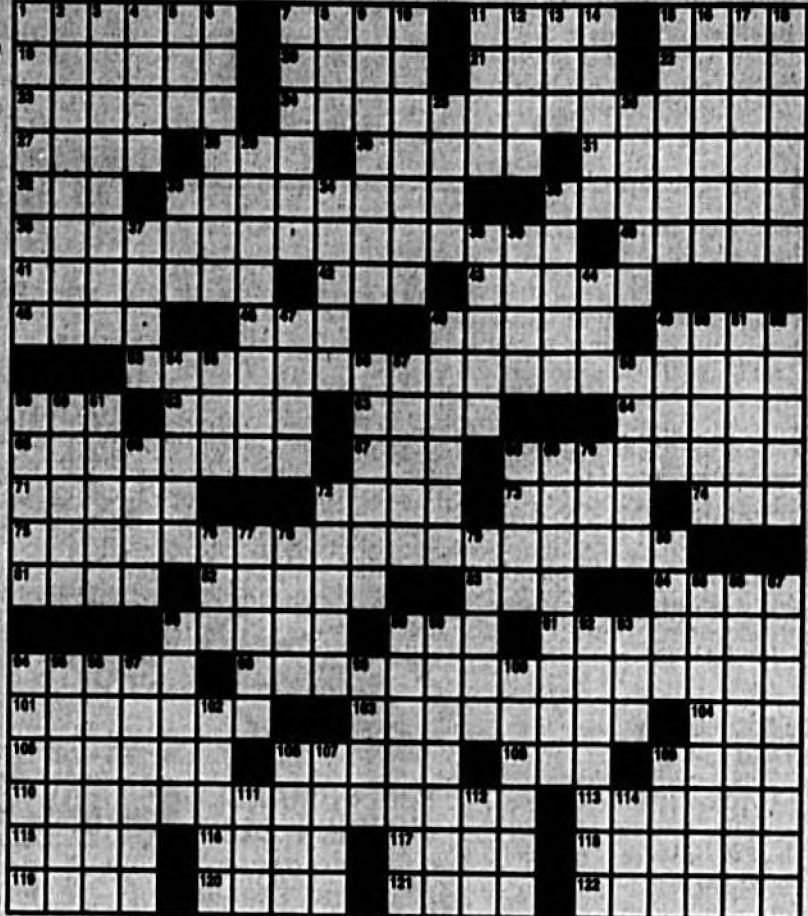

ambush our patrol we will move through your area and sneak up behind you and catch you off guard. We will get you some how, even if somebody gets hurt, which could include a bystander.

As for those ambassadors that we want looking for, we captured only four of them and took them into custody. We did it with no shots fired and no casualties on either side. That was a good day, nobody got hurt.

14 Aug. 2004 We are still living in that cigarette factory, Camp Marlboro, but a few things are better. We now have a Quartermaster laundry, which is free, and our supply sergeant takes our bags there for us. But some of our clothes come back dirtier than when we sent them.

Brown and Root, part of Halliburton's contract, was contracted to get a laundry up and running, also to feed us, but we are still waiting on them to do something. We have some small washing machines that run on

electricity, of course, since electric is always out. You have to add five gallons of water to each machine to use it and water isn't that plentiful. We can also pay \$2 to send our laundry to an Iraqi cleaners, but we are limited as to what we can send.

We still eat mainly T-rations because good food is still very scarce to come by. We pay \$4 an hour for Internet service which is run by two Iraqi nationals, one named Dani, who lives and sleeps here with us and runs the Internet service. He is a pretty good guy. Always offers me a cigarette and I always have to tell him I don't smoke.

Last night, I had to threaten an Iraqi male that was trespassing at a power plant, and I caught myself blaming him for me being stuck here. I think that's a problem with a lot of the troops, they take their frustrations out on Iraqis. Although it is usual verbal, it's not right, and I guess we all are looking for a scapegoat to

throw our anger at. I have to keep reminding myself that the Iraqis did not invite us here so I can't really blame them.

The Iraqi police that we try so hard to train, are slow about doing things and often remind me of the Keystone Kops. One of them left all the keys to the police vehicles at his house. I guess it is the culture, but it is hard to get any initiative out of them. It takes them almost an hour to get ready to roll out to a crime in progress. They fumble around, lose track of who is going, about 10 of them pile into a single van, then realize that keys have been left at someone's house. Then about half of them get out of the van and a whole new bunch gets in and we go through the same routine again.

Once we do get going, we get half-way down the road and they have to stop to ask for directions or, in some instances, return to the police station to look at a map. Then we are off again with

half as many packed into the van. I ran out of rubber clown noses or I would issue one to each of them. Then when we get to the crime scene, if there is the slightest gun fire, they will jump in the nearest cab or car and either go home or back to the station and leave us M.P.s stranded.

You can't conduct police business on the street here because a billion kids start crowding around you giving thumbs up signs. I'm sick of thumbs up signs. We've been here since May and they still see us as either novelties or occupiers. Then you have the ones that steal wire from the power plant and sell it, then complain that we haven't restored the electricity. Half claim to love America while the other half are in the process of blowing us up while giving us the thumbs up sign.

What a crazy place.

The question is not whether the gun will actually explode, the question is when," he said.

The same could be said of an appeal of last week's ruling. It's not a matter of if, but when, according to his wife Alleen Davis. Davis' attorney has 30 days to appeal the "ludicrous" decision, she added.

"It was real evident that the judge had determined that he was already guilty," she said Thursday evening.

The judge did hint that there may be some leniency granted at Davis' sentencing if the property was cleaned

up, however, that might not occur.

"I believe that is an alternative," Alleen Davis said, "but I will tell you this much that also means all my neighbors that have (code) violations damn well better clean up all their violations."

"I'm talking about the boats, the (abandoned) cars and properties that have vegetation (growing) up to 24 inches."

Although, her husband is in jail, she said she doesn't fear him losing his job.

"There are very few people in the country that can work on WWII airplanes," she said.

environmental assessments. If contamination is found, and the city owns the property, they would be responsible for a full contamination assessment report and a remedial action plan.

"It could eat up any saving we would see on this property," said Grieshaber.

Earlier this month, Sanford commissioners directed Grieshaber to request that the state partner with the city to determine the level of contamination on the site, if in fact there is contamination, and assist with funding the tests.

According to Grieshaber, a

letter was e-mailed to the state earlier this week regarding this matter. The e-mail was followed by a hard-copy letter.

"We have to know the level of risk or the level of potential liability that we may incur by accepting the property," said Grieshaber. "We certainly don't want to sound like we are ungrateful when they offer to donate, or convey, a piece of property that has a lot of value."

According to Grieshaber, the city is looking at building the public safety complex as soon as possible.

The planning process is

intense and right now we are just in the start of it, looking for a parcel," he said. "Once we get the parcel, then we can start the planning process because the size of the parcel has a lot to do with it."

The city has also considered two other parcels as a possible site of the complex, including a location on Holly Street and a parcel across from Sanford Middle School. The city's first choice, however, remains the Farmer's Market location.

"What is important about this site is that it is a viable part of our community and

we would like to see it stay a part of our community and we will do whatever we can in partnership, we hope, with the state government to eradicate any contamination on the site if it exists," he said. "It's for the good of the community. Certainly, we don't want any contaminated property within our community and here is an opportunity, where working together, we have a chance to make a transition from what is now an unused piece of property to a very viable part of our community with a new public safety complex."

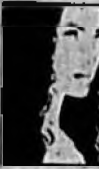

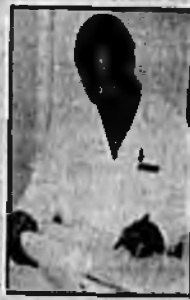

## The Way We Were: A peek at an early 'Sally'

Dorothy Gatchel recently presented a copy of the 1911 Salmagundi to the Sanford Museum; this is only the second issue to this Sanford (later Seminole) High School yearbook.

These early books are different from today's Sallys. There are very few pictures but lots of text. The pictures that are there are not identified. The information included is really more like a newspaper than what we know as a yearbook. I'll give you some of the information included in two columns.

The book was issued by the Irving Literary Society of Sanford High School and cost 15 cents. Officers of the Society were Carrie Lovell, editor-in-chief (remember that it was she who named the book "Salmagundi"); Ernest Betts, business manager; and Ernest Housholder, assistant business manager. Ruth Stewart and Essie Purdon were associate editors.

The students had moved from the school on West Seventh Street to the handsome new building on Palmetto Avenue at Ninth Street on Monday, Nov. 14, 1910. This new building was up-to-date in all respects with all the modern conveniences.

The students were proud of their school. An essay entitled "School Spirit" elaborates on this.

Recently purchased were 100 new books using funds raised from the previous month's entertainment.

Purchased from the proceeds from the art exhibit were four beautiful pictures, which decorated the walls of the school. The Wednesday Club had presented the school a set of Guizot's France and Thomas J. Miller and son had donated a completed set of John Fenimore Cooper's works.

The senior class gave as their farewell gift to the school a slab representing a part of the northern frieze of the Parthenon. It was a beautiful piece of work and if the succeeding classes followed the seniors in leaving such mementos, the school would be decorated with works of art.

There is a group picture of the class of 1911 seated on the steps of the school, but they are not identified. Some of the later Salmagundis list the alumni along with what they were doing at the present. This is what I found in the 1922 Salmagundi about the class of 1911, 11 years later: Ruth Mettinger, nurse, Philadelphia; Saidee Williams, deceased; Carrie Lovell, Mrs. P.C. Marlow, Sanford; Martha Fox, at home, Sanford; Eugenia Pope, stenographer, Jacksonville; Mabel Cowan, Mrs. R.H. Monroe, Sanford; Gussie Tillis, Mrs. Ray Maxwell, Alexandria, Va.; Mary Chappell, Mrs. William Coulborn, Charlotte, N.C.; Willie Singletary, Mrs. Mimms, Mims, Fla.; Ernest Housholder, Seminole County judge, Sanford; Ernest Betts, farmer, Sanford; Harry Carlson, aviator, Pensacola; Abbie Kanner, lawyer, Jacksonville; Vail Lovell, consulting engineer, New York.

## Three quarters of a million and still loving

Weddings, engagement proposals an every cruise occurrence for Sanford's 'love boat'

Love comes in many shapes and sizes, but in Sanford it's exactly 97 feet long and 37 feet wide.

Marking its 750,000th passenger last weekend, the Rivership Romance crew celebrated with a couple not-so-unfamiliar occasions: a wedding and a proposal for marriage. Cruise after cruise, passengers aboard the ship find more than just alligators and manatees floating along the St. Johns River, but often hope that their special partner will say 'yes' to a lifelong commitment.

Even a young, strapping boy who came wandering off the north end of Palmetto Avenue to Sanford's Marina Island in 1983 found his true love via the 'love boat.' That seafaring lad, of course, was none other than Capt. Shawn McLain.

In search of a deckhand job, McLain met Robin on the gangway and the rest is history as the couple has been happily married for 12 years.

"I fell in love right there, honest to God," he said pointing to the docked ship on Monroe Harbor.

It's now McLain and his first mate wife, Robin, that play matchmakers. Ask McLain how many weddings he's officiated, and it's a tough call because it is "at

least a couple thousand. "This weekend I'm doing three," he said.

Last Saturday was no different for McLain as Lynda Shays and Rick Barnes, of Orlando, tied the knot in a sunset ceremony at the bow of the ship. It was about the same spot that Lynda said 'yes' when Rick popped the question aboard the Rivership Romance last spring.

"I didn't know where we were going — it was all a surprise," Shays said about the magical April evening.

While McLain performs the weddings, it's often cruise director Jean Barfield who is asked to set the mood for nerve-wrecked gentlemen that use the quaint setting of the Rivership Romance to present an engagement ring to their special ladies.

"I'll start crying I know I will. Every time someone proposes I do," she said anticipating a private engagement proposal Saturday night.

The bad thing for her tear ducts are proposals "happen a lot," she admits.

Started in 1982, the Rivership Romance company has been a mainstay of historic downtown Sanford.

Through a series of different vessels, including the Star of Sanford, the Romance Catamaran and the Grand Romance, the company, now



owned by Bob Hopkins, may have saved the best for last.

The Rivership Romance can carry about 400 passengers and offers live entertainment, a lounge, fine dining and some of the most spectacular views of the St. Johns River and Lake Monroe from its shaded outdoor decks. The ship sets sail daily with three-hour luncheon cruises on Wednesday, Saturday and Sunday from 11 a.m.-2 p.m.; four-hour luncheon cruises on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 11 a.m.-3 p.m.; and the moonlight and dancing cruises on Friday and Saturday from 7:30-11 p.m.

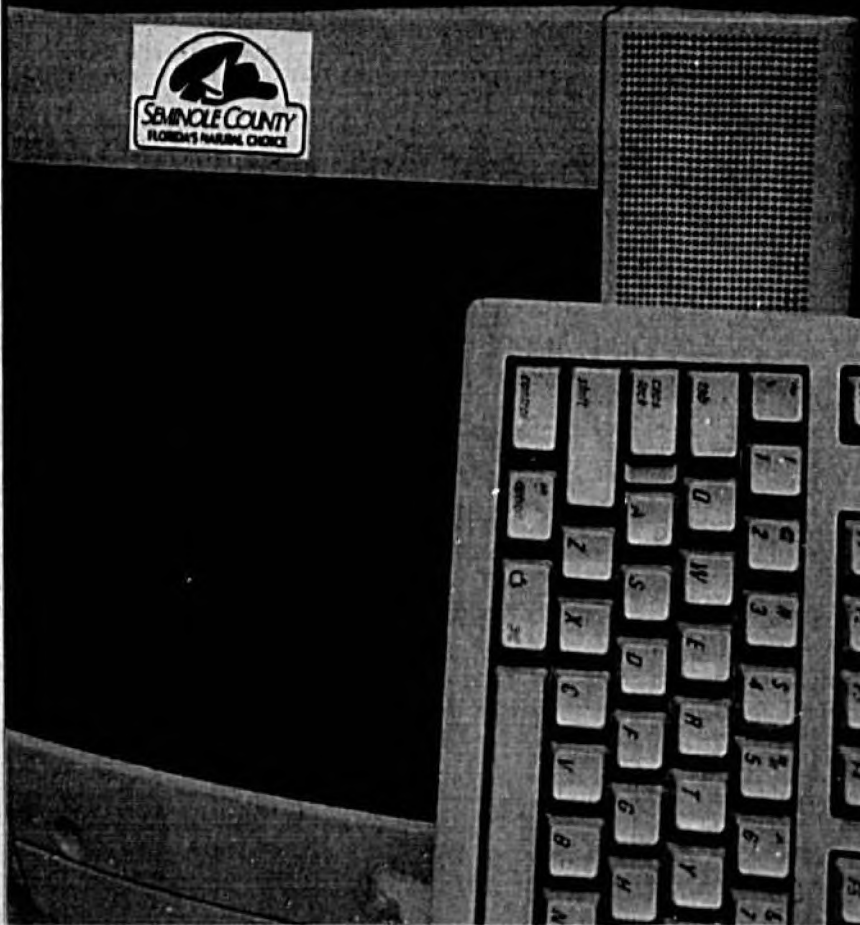

### Lyman wins first three games for first times since 1994

Who are these guys? The Lyman football team continues to prove that the week one upset of Lake Mary may not have been such an upset after all.

Friday night at the Carlton D. Henley Sports Complex, the Greyhounds improved to 3-0 with a 17-14 victory over Oak Ridge in the district opener for both teams.

The trio of C.J. Williams, J.J. Bass and Kyle Harris did the damage

again, combining to rush for 324 yards.

Williams carried the ball 17 times for 160 yards and Bass ran for another 112. Harris only had 52 yards rushing, but he scored both of Lyman's touchdowns.

### Oviedo hangs onto big district victory

OVIEDO — Oviedo High School quarterback Lee Sloan's game is taking on a new dimension.

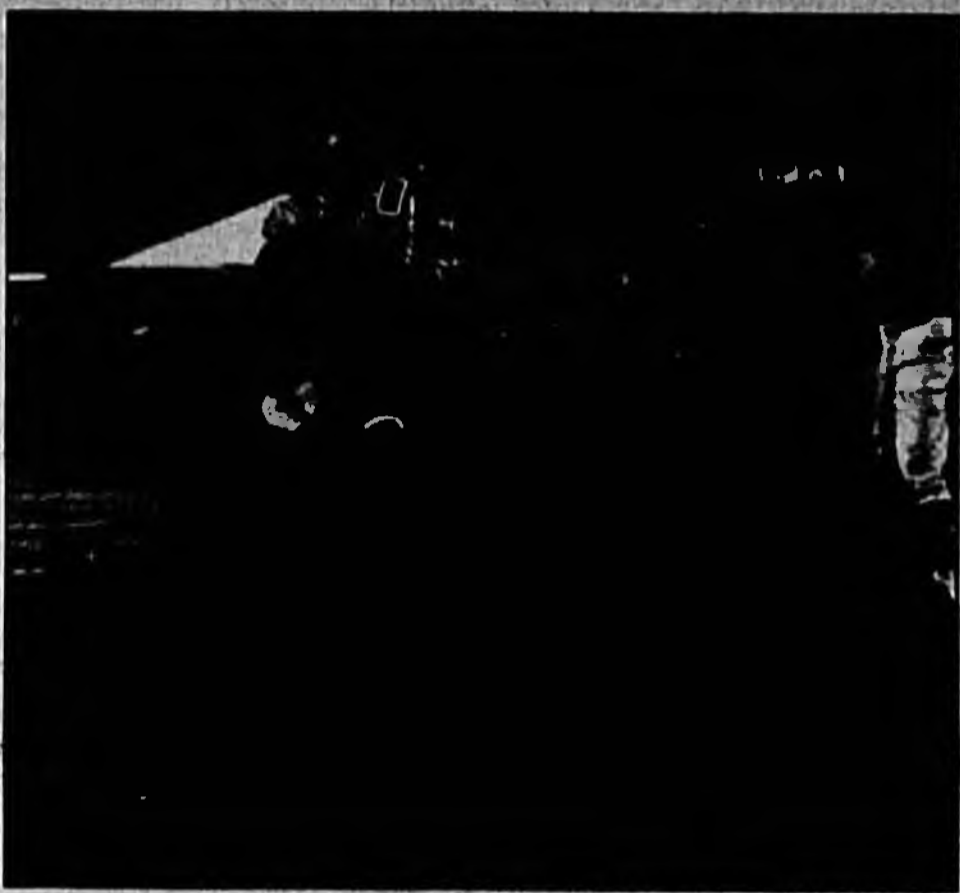
In his third year as the starting signal caller for the Lions, Sloan has developed a reputation of being a strong passer when the situation calls for it as well as having uncanny instincts for checking off plays and calling audibles.

If head coach Greg Register has his way, Sloan will be just as dangerous with his feet as well as his arm and mind this season.

"I told him I wanted him to rush for 500 yards this season," said Register. "We want him to add another dimension to his game."

On Friday night against Lake Mary, Sloan took the first few dozen steps toward that 500-yard goal when he turned a possible sack into a 26-yard run to keep alive a drive. Two plays later, he connected with Will Harrison on a 25-yard touchdown pass play that broke a 21-21 tie and boosted Oviedo to a 33-27 win over the visiting Rams.

## Jacks are wild

If you want to have a wild time, try some Jack Crevalle on for size.

These fish will break your wrists if you catch several. There are times when you will see schools the size of a football field. Jacks will violently crash bait pods and just about anything you cast their way.

When you are having a slow day with redfish and trout, Jacks can save the day. Usually the schools in the river are fish that weigh between four and 10 pounds. When you are rigged with light tackle it is a blast. Top water plugs are destroyed when tossed into a school of Jacks. Just about any bait will do when they are schooling. These fish are tremendous fighters and will definitely bend your rod.

They are not hard to find when they are schooling. All one has to do is follow the violent splashing and watch for the bait running away.

If you are interested in catching some really big Jacks, just go out of Port Canaveral and look for them crashing mullet pods. These Jacks are what many call "Hour Jacks", because they can take an hour to land. These fish can reach the 30 lb. mark. If you choose to go for "Hour Jacks" make sure you use heavier gear. A tarpon rig is better suited for these bruisers.

Although Jacks are not good to eat, they are well worth the fight. If you want to have a blast, play "Jacks" See Outdoors, Page 3B

## Patriots' perfect half tames Tribe

SANFORD — A near perfect first half proved to be more than enough as visiting Lake Brantley downed Seminole, 21-3, in a Class 6A-District 2 football game on Thomas E. Whigham Stadium at the Tim Raines Athletic Park.

Behind the running of quarterback Brett Smith and fullback Deon Casey and the daring play-calling of head coach George Clayton, the Patriots scored on three straight possessions over the end of the first quarter and start of the second period and a stifling defense kept Seminole out of the end zone all night as Lake Brantley won its second straight Seminole Athletic Conference game after a

season-opening loss to Apopka.

The game did start a little slow as both teams went three-and-out on their first possessions and then the teams traded turnovers.

The Fighting Seminoles' turnover, an interception and 10 yard return by Lammar Guy off a Mike McKenzie pass, turned the game around as it gave Lake Brantley a first and goal at the Seminole four after a face mask penalty.

After a three-yard run by Casey, who led the Tribe in rushing last year before transferring back to Lake Brantley for his senior season, Smith dove in from the one and after the extra point by Miguel Santos, the Patriots led 7-0 with 2:42 remaining in the first quarter.

## Brewers recall Weeks

It's been quite a ride for Altamonte Springs' Rickie Weeks since he signed his contract in early August.

The Milwaukee Brewers recalled the second baseman from Class A Beloit and he joined the club in San Francisco last week.

The announcement was made by Executive Vice President and General Manager, Doug Melvin.

Weeks, who celebrated his 21st birthday on September 13th, was the second choice overall in the June First-Year Player Draft from Southern University. This season, he played with Class A Beloit of the Midwest League and the Brewers rookie league team in the Arizona Rookie League, combining to hit .358 with one home run and 20 RBI in 21 games. With Beloit, he batted .349 with a .556 slugging percentage and a .449 on base percentage.

He helped lead Beloit into the Midwest League finals, where the Snappers were swept by the Lansing Lugnuts, a Chicago Cubs affiliate, three games to none.

All three of the games were close, however, as Lansing won 7-6, 4-2 and 4-2.

Weeks was 3-for-11 (.273) with a run scored and an RBI in the three games. He was also hit by a pitch twice, walked once and stole two bases in three attempts in the series.

Since the draft, Weeks has earned numerous accolades including the prestigious Golden Spikes Award as the best amateur player in the United States. He was also named the Baseball America College Player of the Year and earned the Dick Howser Trophy from the National Collegiate Baseball Writers Association.

In their rankings of the top 100 draft prospects, Baseball America ranked him first among college players as the best athlete, best five-tool talent and best pure hitter, and he ranked second as the best power hitter and fastest baserunner.

"Since Rickie is on the 40-man roster and possibly may play in the Arizona Fall League, we wanted to get him to stay in baseball shape with the big club and receive the instruction and experience at this level," said

Melvin. "He has a very bright future and we believe that this opportunity will be invaluable for him in his development as a player."

Weeks led all college hitters with a .479 average in 2003 for Southern University in Louisiana. It was the second consecutive season that he led the country in hitting. Weeks added 16 home runs and 66 RBI. He set a NCAA Division I mark with a career .473 average. The two-time All-American second baseman was successful in all 31 of his stolen base attempts this season and was 68-for-69 in his career.

He was named the Southwestern Athletic Conference's (SWAC) Most Outstanding Hitter and was the unanimous selection for the conference Player of the Year for the second consecutive season.

Weeks is wearing uniform number 23 for the Brewers and is the first position player from this year's draft to make it to the Major Leagues.

As might be expected, the Lake Brantley graduate has been a little behind Major League pitching, going 0-for-3 with two strike outs in three games against the St. Louis Cardinals this week.

But his defense has been perfect, getting an assist and a put out in two chances in four innings of play.

## UCF set to face Syracuse

After an exciting 33-29 win against in-state foe Florida Atlantic, the Golden Knights travel to Syracuse today (Saturday) to take on the Orangemen. Game time is scheduled for noon.

Coverage will be provided by the UCF ISP Sports Network starting with the pre-game show at 10 a.m. In Orlando, the game can be heard on 740 - The Team (WQTM), with Marc Daniels, Garry Parris and Jerry O'Neill calling the action.

The matchup will also be televised. Locally, the game will appear on Sunshine Network (in the Orlando area only) and on ESPN+ and ESPN Game Plan.

UCF (1-1) faces its second BIG EAST team of the season when meet Syracuse (1-1) in the Carrier Dome. The Golden Knights opened the season with a 49-28 defeat at the hands of then-No. 9 Virginia Tech.

The strength of the Orangemen resides on offense.

Head coach Paul Pasqualoni has many weapons, beginning with senior wide out Johnnie Morant. Morant leads the nation in all-purpose yards per game (265.0) and ranks second in the country in receiving yards per game

(150.5). Adding to the talent on offense is junior tailback Walter Reyes, who is tenth in the nation in rushing with 139.0 yards per game. Experienced quarterback R.J. Anderson directs Syracuse's offense, which is 12th in the nation in total offense at 482.0 yards per game.

Through two games, the Orangemen defense has struggled. Syracuse allowed 47 points in a triple overtime win against North Carolina, and surrendered 30 points in a loss to Louisville. Senior defensive tackle Louis Gachelin anchors an experienced defensive line that boasts three seniors. Linebacker Rich Scanlon has recorded 31 tackles in two games and free safety Diamond Ferri has added 18 tackles from his position in the secondary. Expect a young secondary to be tested by the UCF passing attack.

Quarterback Ryan Schneider leads head coach Mike Kruczek's nationally-ranked offense.

The senior signal caller set four UCF records in last week's win over FAU: total passing yards (497), yards gained passing and rushing (501), completions (37) and consecutive games with a touchdown pass (23).

Helping Schneider shatter the records were wide

receivers Brandon Marshall, the former Lake Howell star, and Mike Walker. Sophomore Marshall (5 rec., 104 yards, 1 TD) and true freshman Walker (4 rec., 104 yards) set career-bests in yardage and receptions in the victory. Adding to the deep and talented wide receiver corps are Tavaris Capers and Luther Huggins.

The Golden Knights will also look to run the ball with tailback Alex Haynes, who has 145 yards and two touchdowns on the year.

After surrendering 49 points and 29 points in their first two games of the season, the young UCF defense must step up and limit Syracuse's offensive chances. Veteran linebacker Stanford Rhule will return to the starting lineup after sitting out the first game of the 2003 season due to injury and appearing in a reserve role last week against FAU.

The strength of the Golden Knight defense lies in the secondary. Safeties Atari Bigby and Peter Sands pace a talented squad that covers receivers and steps up to defend the run.

Additionally, defensive linemen Paul Carrington and Larry Brown will attempt to limit Syracuse's ground game. Look for the Orangemen to bring a balanced attack at the UCF

# Can Vols drain Swamp?

As No. 12 Tennessee enters the Swamp for its annual grudge match against the Gators, the Vols are the higher-ranked team, and the team with its national title aspirations still intact. Florida (No. 17) will attempt to play the role of rude host and ruin Tennessee's title hopes, just as Miami did to the Gators a few weeks ago.

Florida has won seven of the last eight at home against the Vols, but the last time they squared off in the Swamp in 2001, the Vols came out on top. Florida's players remember Vols quarterback Casey Clausen leading the Tennessee band in a rendition of "Rocky Top" after the victory, and this year they vow to keep Clausen silent.

If the Gators can jump on the Vols in the first half as they did against Miami, it will be a rocky road for Tennessee. Although they have Clausen and James Banks, the Vols don't want the balance of this game to depend on their ability to throw the ball. The Gators' secondary hasn't allowed a passing touchdown at home in 12 quarters, and the Gators' best athlete (Keiwan Ratliff) can intercept and take it the other way as fast as anyone in the country.

The Vols rely on a ground game to grind teams to a pulp. Senior Cedric Houston will try to find the end zone, something he hasn't done yet this season, although he is averaging 160 yards a game. And that could be the difference since 11 of the last 13 meetings between the two have gone to the team that piled up the most rushing yards. Of course, the Gators gained only 94 yards in Knoxville last season and still walked away with a 30-3 victory.

**Key for Georgia:** Find someone other than Reggie Brown to throw to. With top option Fred Gibson out with a pulled hamstring, Brown will be getting double-teamed. That should leave someone else wide open.

**Key for LSU:** Use bookends Marcus Spears and Marquise Hill to batter Bulldogs quarterback David Greene. When they're not sacking him, they'll be swatting passes and pancaking running backs.

#### Kentucky at Indiana

■ **Records:** Kentucky 1-2 (0-1 SEC); Indiana 1-2 (0-0 Big 10).  
 ■ **Series:** Kentucky leads 17-15-1. ■ **Coaches:** Kentucky's Rich Brooks (92-111-4); Indiana's Gerry DiNardo (55-50-1).  
 ■ **TV:** None.

**Key for Kentucky:** The Wildcats have to go deep and stretch the field. They can't continue to settle for short passes, because when they do that leaves the middle of the field congested and tends to thwart their running game.

**Key for Indiana:** Run, run and then run some more. The Hoosiers, who managed only 195 yards combined against Connecticut and Washington, broke out last week with more than 200 yards on the ground. Unfortunately, it was against I-AA Indiana State.

#### Alabama-Birmingham at South Carolina

■ **Records:** UAB 2-1 (0-1 C-USA); South Carolina 2-1 (0-1 SEC).  
 ■ **Series:** First meeting. ■ **Coaches:** UAB's Watson Brown (76-123-1); South Carolina's Lou Holtz (240-121-7).  
 ■ **TV:** None.

**Key for Alabama-Birmingham:** Stop giving the game away. Last week the Blazers committed four turnovers in a tough

loss to Southern Miss, and two of those led to touchdowns.  
**Key for South Carolina:** Stop the stop. The Blazers are far from a pushover, and if the Gamecocks have a repeat performance of last week's game (three interceptions, a penalty to wipe out a touchdown, and a botched field goal) they'll find themselves staring at .500.

#### Vanderbilt at Texas Christian

■ **Records:** Vanderbilt 1-2 (0-2 SEC); Texas Christian 2-0 (1-0 C-USA). ■ **Series:** TCU leads 2-1. ■ **Coaches:** Vanderbilt's Bobby Johnson (63-48); Texas Christian's Gary Patterson (18-8). ■ **TV:** None.

**Key for TCU:** Get Lonta Hobbs to pick up where Ricky Madison, who tore a ligament in his knee against Navy, left off. Hobbs might have been the backup, but he does have four touchdowns this season.

**Key for Vanderbilt:** Move the ball. Last week, the Commodores managed only two first downs — 55 yards of offense — in the first half. Their trio of running backs was limited to 76 yards on 21 carries.

#### Northern Illinois at Alabama

■ **Records:** Northern Illinois 2-0 (0-0 MAC); Alabama 2-1 (1-0 SEC). ■ **Series:** First meeting. ■ **Coaches:** Northern Illinois' Joe Novak (30-50); Alabama's Mike Shula (2-1). ■ **TV:** None.

**Key for Northern Illinois:** Shore up the defense. If it looks anything like it did in the last game, allowing 445 yards of offense to I-AA Tennessee Tech, the Huskies will fall to 0-9 against SEC teams.

**Key for Alabama:** Continue to win the battles on the line of scrimmage. Getting down and dirty has paid off for a team that can punch holes in opposing lines on either side of the ball.

#### North Texas at Arkansas

■ **Records:** North Texas 1-2 (0-0 Sun Belt); Arkansas 2-0 (0-0 SEC). ■ **Series:** Arkansas leads 7-0. ■ **Coaches:** North Texas' Darrell Dickey (22-39); Arkansas' Houston Nutt (77-45).  
 ■ **TV:** None.

**Key for North Texas:** Get leading rusher Patrick Cobbs (bruised thigh) healthy in a hurry. Last week, Kevin Moore filled in poorly, gaining only 33 yards on 14 carries.

**Key for Arkansas:** Don't fall for a fake punt. The Razorbacks have been the victims of fake punts in each of their first two games. Texas and Tulsa both used the ruse to pick up first downs after stalling on their opening drives.

## 2-MINUTE

### DRILL

**ALABAMA** The Crimson Tide are finally getting the kind of publicity they need. After Alabama beat up Kentucky and jumped back into the Top 25 at No. 21, tailback Shaun Williams began attracting attention for the Heisman Trophy. The 5-foot-8, 189-pounder ripped off 177 yards and three touchdowns in the victory over the Wildcats and now has 363 yards and five touchdowns on 75 carries in three games. "That guy should be in the Heisman race, seriously," said quarterback Brodie Croyle.

**KANSAS** You think the Razorbacks defense decided to show up against the Longhorns last week? The fact that 22 defenders turned up on the stat sheet speaks volumes about the depth on the defensive side of the ball. The defensive line, which forced Texas to take it to the air, had eight players tally 13 tackles, three defensed passes and two fumble recoveries.

**AUBURN** The Tigers, who had no reason to be confident after the first two weeks, finally found something to be proud of in the victory over Vanderbilt. The offense got going, the defense returned to form, and Auburn knows the SEC title is still within reach. The Tigers might have turned things around for the time being, but you should probably stop short of calling the win a miracle. "We were dead the first two weeks," Auburn linebacker Karlos Danaby said. "We rose on the third game."

**GEORGIA** With freshman running back DeShawn Wynn coming off a breakout performance, it would appear that the Gators' running game is peaking for the grudge match with Tennessee. The Gators will also get back anchors on the offensive line in Jonathan Colon and Anthony Guerrero, who have been out with knee injuries.

**MISSISSIPPI** Wide receiver Reggie Brown's sudden re-emergence couldn't come at a better time with fellow wideout Fred Gibson slowed by a sore hamstring. Brown was a top recruit out of high school and has been through some tough times — first breaking his leg as a senior in high school, then tearing an ACL in his sophomore season at Georgia. Brown will probably top last year's numbers (23 catches, 296 yards) in the fourth game of the season.

**MISSISSIPPI** Matt Mauck mania is spreading. The Tigers' quarterback is now 8-1 in his brief career as a starter, and he set career highs last week with 305 yards passing and four touchdowns. He also has the Tigers off to their first 3-0 start since 1998.

**MISSISSIPPI** The Rebels must be feeling better after they finally developed a running game — even if it was only against Louisiana-Monroe. And quarterback Eli Manning showed the type of short-term memory every great signal-caller must possess. After a shaky game against Memphis, he threw for three touchdowns and ran for three more to roll up 621 yards and an offense.

**CAROLINA** Gamecocks coach Lou Holtz is re-evaluating the quarterback position after Dondrial Pinkins' 12-of-30 effort with two interceptions. Backups Mike Natho and Bennett Swygert both got in the game, and Swygert led South Carolina to its only touchdown in the final minute. But Holtz is also going to take a long look at true freshman Blake Mitchell, who runs the scout team. "He (Mitchell) is accurate and I like his poise and demeanor," Holtz said.

**TENNESSEE** The Volunteers need linebacker Kevin Simon to continue to tackle everything that comes his way when they face the offense-minded Gators this week. Simon has recorded at least 10 tackles in each of the first two games and leads the team with 22 stops. The super sophomore also leads Tennessee in sacks with 3.5 and tackles for loss with four.

**VANDERBILT** Even with the top-sided loss to Auburn, the Commodores got some good news at the end of the game. Senior tight end Dan Murphy returned to the field after being taken away on a stretcher in the second quarter. He was blocking on a kickoff return and suffered a severe concussion. But after undergoing tests at the Vanderbilt Medical Center, he was released, although his status for this week remains uncertain.
