New Industrial Firm Begins Construction

Sanford October Permits Top \$1 Million

Sanford reported 163 separate building permits with values totaling \$1.1 million in new construction, additions and improvements to property and buildings, and mechanical installations were issued during October. The city received fees totaling \$7,948.

The city issued one permit for a new industrial building, valued at \$190,000, to Electronic Fasteners, Inc. for a warehouse and office. The company makes electronic components and hardware. Wayne Mason, president of Electronic Fasteners, Inc., said the warehouse and office will be located in the Sanford Central Park complex on Upwala Road.

Mobile homes accounted for the highest number of new structure permits in the city.

Five permits were issued for mobile homes. Since January the city has issued 24 permits for mobile homes. Last year, the figure for mobile home permits from January to October was 23.

The city gave four permits for accessory buildings in the residential category in October totaling \$3,200. In that same category, the city issued three permits for single family residences, with a value of \$93,500. Since January, the city has issued 114 permits for single family homes, with a value of \$3.7 million. Last year, 141 permits were issued for single family residences from January through October, with a value of \$5 million.

Twenty-six permits were issued for additions, structural alterations, improvements and repairs, valued at \$162,277. Under the

category of additions and structural alterations, seven permits were issued for housekeeping units and three permits were issued for commercial units. The number of permits issued for repairs and improvements for housekeeping units was 13, while three permits were given to commercial units in that same category.

Under mechanical installations, the city issued 112 permits, valued at \$672,514. In this category, two permits were issued for swimming pools, one permit for a stockade fence, one permit for a tent, and one permit for a fire sprinkler system. The remainder of the permits in this category were issued for electrical, plumbing, and mechanical installations.

September figures showed the city issued 147 permits totalling \$1.2 million.

High Court To Rule On Sex Counseling

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Supreme Court agreed today to decide whether an act of Congress providing religious groups money to counsel teenagers on sex and pregnancy violates the First Amendment ban on entangling church and state.

The court will hear arguments this term in the case that should decide the constitutionality of the 1981 Adolescent Family Life Act, a portion of which was found unconstitutional by a federal court.

At issue in the case is the constitutionality of the law, popularly referred to as the "Chastity Act," that allows religious organizations to use government funds for the counseling and teaching of adolescents on matters related to premarital sexual relations and teenage pregnancy.

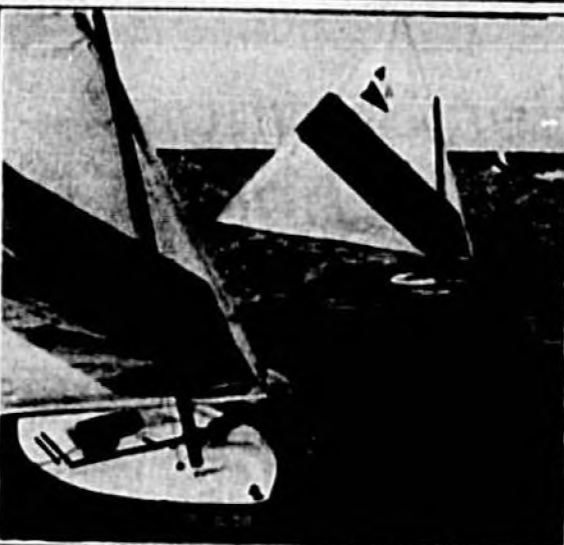
The act, which is in line with President Reagan's anti-abortion, pro-religion social agenda, was designed to deal with the problem of teenage pregnancy, not with birth control and abortion, by trying to teach teenagers discipline. In other words, talking them out of having sex.

The act was also born out of the frustration of conservative senators with the 1970 Public Health Service Act that provides the vast majority of federal funding for family planning services, which they believed did not address teenage pregnancy, and of conservative dissatisfaction with a 1978 teenage pregnancy law that allowed teenagers to be told about abortion.

The amended act differed from the original in four key ways: It requires the active involvement of religious groups; prohibits funding to any organization involved in abortions, whether it be actually performing them or simply advising about the option; instructs the groups to advise pregnant teenagers to choose adoption; requires the values of premarital abstinence be emphasized.

In terms of federal government spending, only a small amount of tax dollars has gone into the program. Estimates by those involved in the case say the amount of funding has been under \$10 million.

However, the money has gone directly to religious groups such as Catholic and Lutheran groups in such areas as the District of Columbia, St. Cloud, Minn., Arlington, Va., Amarillo, Texas, Wayne County, Mich., and Ohio.

Horse Comes To Aid Of Buckskin Queen

Jennifer Conaway, a Seminole High School junior, has been riding horses since she was four years old. After both feet were seriously injured last year when she was hit by a car, she wondered if she would be able to walk normally, much less ride properly.

However, her doctor said riding would be good therapy, helping to strengthen her legs and her heel, which was torn off in the accident and replaced with a muscle from her back.

Jennifer's riding not only proved to be therapeutic. She soon began to excel in competition throughout central and northern Florida and slightly more than a year after she was injured, Jennifer was named queen of the North Florida Buckskin Association and will compete for the national title in Indianapolis next year.

Jennifer, daughter of Craig and Carol Conaway, 7330 Canal Drive, Sanford, was a pedestrian on Celery Avenue on

Aug. 29, 1986, when a car smashed into her. Although investigators aren't sure how she received such serious injuries to her feet, they think both feet were scraped across the street. Her right heel was torn off, and the top of her left foot severely injured.

After grafting a muscle from her back to her foot to replace the lost heel, and numerous skin grafts, Jennifer came home to recuperate last October. Although she had stopped riding in competition a few years before, her doctor's advice about riding led her back into it.

Jennifer developed her interest in horses through her parents. Mrs. Conaway's father owned a stable near Apopka and the Conaway family kept their horses there. Jennifer spent much of her early life at horse shows, and at age four, was riding competitively. But when the Apopka stable was sold, the Conaways dropped out of horse training and showing.

When Jennifer came home from the hospital though, a search was begun for a

well-trained and gentle horse for her.

"Jennifer could ride anything," her mother says. "When my father bought horses, Jennifer used to ride them first to see how gentle they were and make sure anyone else could ride them. But with her injuries, I wanted to make sure she would be riding a horse that she wouldn't get thrown from and injure her feet."

Last May the Conaways found such a horse, a seven-year-old mare with double registry as a quarter horse and a buckskin. (Buckskin registration depends on the horse's color—a dun color with black mane and tail.)

The mare, named Sassafras Hy Lassy, has since been ridden in shows throughout central and northern Florida, and Jennifer has won her class in over 90 percent of the shows she's ridden in. Mrs. Conaway says.

Two weeks ago at the Florida Futurities Show in Ocala, Jennifer was named buckskin queen. She has applied for the competition by submitting a

Panel Unable To Reach Agreement On 13 Other Counts

Jury Finds Man Guilty On One Count In Sex Case

After deliberating for nearly six hours Saturday, a Seminole Circuit Court jury convicted a Longwood man of contributing to the delinquency of a child, but was unable to reach agreement on verdicts for 13 other counts of sexual assault and lewd behavior.

Earl Casperson Meggison Sr., 44, was jailed without bond by Judge S. Joseph Davis. The verdict came after the close of a five-day trial.

Meggison faces up to a year in jail and a \$1,000 fine on the charge, and will be retried on the other 13 counts, according to Bob Fisher, Seminole-Brevard assistant state attorney.

Fisher said the delinquency charge involved Meggison's supplying alcohol and Valium to a girl when she was 12 and 13 years of age to make her submit to his sexual advances. The abuse took place between June, 1985 and November, 1986, according to testimony.

Judge Davis is expected to set a date for a new trial on the other 13 counts this week, and Meggison could face up to life in prison if convicted.

Meggison pleaded guilty in April to two lewd and lascivious acts charges, two delinquency charges and a charge of illegally taping telephone conversations with the victim. In exchange for the plea, prosecutors agreed to drop seven other assault charges. However, Meggison withdrew his guilty plea in July.

Man Reportedly Raises Cain At Bar, Hospital, Police Station

A Deltona man's refusal to leave a bar turned into an extended wrangle with police and a trip to the Seminole County Jail.

Police reported going to Kelsey's Pub in Townhall Plaza, State Road 434, Longwood, in reference to a man who would not leave the bar. The incident occurred around 1:26 a.m. Saturday.

Police told the man he had to leave, but he refused. Police reported he began yelling and laughing and continued to refuse to leave the bar. He was placed under arrest and handcuffed. When told to walk to the patrol car, he refused and had to be walked to the vehicle.

At the Longwood police station, the man reportedly was profane, yelled, threatened the officers, constantly spit and went to the bathroom on the floor. He then reportedly laid down on the wet floor and complained that his back ached. Fire rescue was called, and he was transported to South Seminole Community Hospital in Longwood where he also reportedly was unruly refused to cooperate with hospital personnel, ruined several forms, and refused to walk out of the hospital. He had to be carried.

Charged with resisting arrested with violence, disorderly intoxication, and criminal mischief was Michael A. Glaspy, 24, of 2576 Academy Ave. He was being held Saturday in lieu of 1,000 bond.

Drug Charges Added To Others

A man who was being arrested on a warrant charging petty theft and aggravated assault had more charges logged against him when officers reportedly found drugs in his possession.

When the man was arrested on the warrant, lawmen found a small tin canister in his boot. The canister contained 13 small sealed baggies reportedly containing cocaine. Officers also reported finding more than 20 grams of marijuana and codeine.

Charged around noon Friday with petty theft, aggravated assault, and possession of cocaine with intent to deliver, possession of marijuana and codeine was Phillip Edward Person, 31, of 238 Mosawood Circle. Bail was set at \$3,000 and he was released on bond.

Accident Probe Interfered With

A Longwood man was arrested Friday after he apparently interfered with officers investigating an accident.

A Longwood officer reported that the accident occurred around 6 p.m. at State Road 434 and Palm Springs Drive. He said that he was talking to one of the drivers involved in the accident, Hydee Jo Schraw, 20, of 1441 S. Grant St. Longwood, a man approached them.

"I heard someone hollering and when I looked in that direction he appeared to be hollering at Ms. Schraw," the officer reported. The man told the woman she was in trouble and he was going to beat her. The officer told the man to be quiet and that he was not going to hurt anyone. The man said something and struck the officer in the chest, according to the report.

The officer grabbed the man by the arm to restrain him and keep him from striking the officer on the scene. The man resisted, and the officer and two other officers grabbed the man and they were all three falling together to the pavement. The man also resisted being put in the patrol car.

Arrested and charged with battery on a law enforcement officer, resisting arrest without violence and criminal mischief was Timothy William Schraw, 22, of the same address. He was released on \$1,000 bond. The relation, if any, between Ms. Schraw and Schraw was not mentioned in the report.

Sexual Assault In 'Cult' Accused

The Seminole County sheriff's department is investigating a report of an 18-year-old man accused of sexually assaulting and creating a cult out of underage female run-aways.

The accusations surfaced after the father of a 14-year-old runaway returned to her Longwood home Thursday. She told her father that the 18-year-old helped her run away around Oct. 28 and helped her get a motel room in the Orlando area. She said the man had sex with her often during her time at the motel. Further, she said he also had sex with the 15-year-old girl who ran away with her.

The father reported that other parents of runaway girls are saying the man is called "dad" by the girls and appears to have considerable control over them.

Woman Jumps From Ship

MIAMI (UPI) — The Coast Guard abandoned its search Sunday for a young woman identified as a Jamaican stowaway who jumped from a Caribbean-bound cruise ship shortly after leaving Miami.

By Sunday afternoon, rescue crews had found no sign of Sherry Brown, 21, and called off its search. Coast Guard Petty Officer Dave Kayfus said. Witnesses reported that Brown jumped off the Song of Norway at 6:07 p.m. Saturday about 3 miles east of Key Biscayne in 5- to 7-foot seas.

Rich Steck, spokesman for Royal Caribbean Cruise Lines, which operates the vessel, said Brown apparently had boarded the vessel last Wednesday in Ocho Rios, Jamaica.

Crew discovered she was a stowaway a day after the vessel had left the island, and confined her to a cabin until she could be turned over to authorities in Miami, Steck said.

U.S. immigration officials ordered that Brown be deported, and gave the cruise line the choice of booking her on a commercial flight to Jamaica or bringing her back aboard the Song of Norway, Steck said.

"If you bring an illegal alien in, you are responsible for bringing them out," he said. "We decided to keep her on board because the ship was going (to Jamaica) anyway."

About an hour after the vessel left the Port of Miami, Brown bolted from crew members who were eating dinner with her, ran onto the deck and leapt 60 feet into the water below, he said.

Crew members threw a lighted raft to Brown, then stopped the ship and dropped small launches

to look for her. The Coast Guard searched with a 41-foot patrol boat and a helicopter while an Air Force plane dropped illuminated flares over the rough seas.

On Sunday, the Coast Guard searched unsuccessfully along the shoreline of Elliott Key and other small islands east of Miami, at the northern tip of the Florida Keys.

"The currents would have brought her to these areas," said Kayfus of the Coast Guard.

The vessel continued its 7-day cruise to Mexico and the western Caribbean.

Although they found no sign of Brown, searchers did rescue a

man and his 8-year-old son whose sailboat capsized near Key Biscayne Saturday. The boat owner, who was aboard with the pair, swam ashore and alerted the Coast Guard, Kayfus said.

Specially trained Air Force Reserve paramedics jumped out of a small plane to help them.

"They located the other two clinging to each other. Three of them jumped into the water and helped them into the basket and hoisted them up into the helicopter," Kayfus said.

The man and boy were treated for exposure at a hospital and released.

Utah Firm Will Test Shuttle Seal Joints

BRIGHAM CITY, Utah (UPI) — The company that made the O-ring joints that caused the shuttle Challenger disaster said tests of deliberately flawed booster rocket joints should show how "fault tolerant" the seals are.

Morton Thiokol Inc. engineers said the test planned today would be the sixth in a series of tests on booster hardware.

The test assembly contains two field joints, placed on the boosters after assembly at Cape Canaveral, Fla., and a third O-ring seal added for extra protection against leaks.

Thiokol spokesman Rocky Raab said engineers will focus on defects allowing a leak path to the O-rings. It was a flaw in the seals on Challenger, com-

bined with abnormally cold temperatures at launch time Jan. 28, 1986, that allowed hot gases to leak from one of the two solid-fuel boosters and ignite the shuttle's external tank. All seven crewmembers died in the explosion.

"We have to demonstrate sooner or later that the primary O-ring will seal under pressure, or is already sealed under pressure, and the only way to do that is to get pressure to it," Raab said.

"The second reason for putting the leak path to the O-ring is to demonstrate that the joint is extremely fault tolerant, that even if you have leaks ... to this point, it's still going to seal," he said.

Toyota Spins, Slides, Flips

An auto accident involving a single vehicle amounted to estimated damage of \$10,000 as reported by Lake Mary police.

A 1985 Toyota, traveling north on State Road 400 at 1:30 a.m. Oct. 25, exited from the highway onto Exit 50 when it veered left off of the ramp pavement, according to a police report. The driver tried to get the car back on the road, causing the vehicle to turn 180 degrees and slide across to the right shoulder, police reported. The car then rolled side over side several times, coming to rest on its wheels, the report said.

Police reported that the driver attempted to flag down passing motorists for help, to no avail. He left the area, reported to Florida South Hospital for treatment for a muscle strain to his left hip and was released, the police report said. He then reported the accident to Lake Mary police.

Robert Joseph June, 30, of 112 Crystal View E., Sanford, was charged with careless driving and failure to report a traffic accident.

The police report estimated damage at \$10,000.

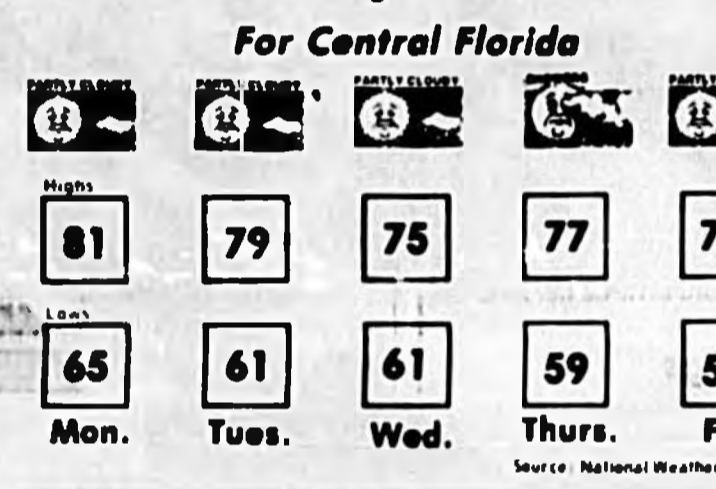

Weather Strange? Wait, It'll Change

These days are strictly the ones that if you don't like the weather right now, a wait an hour - it'll change. For example, as you are reading this look outside, or up as the case may be. How's the weather. Good? Bad? Sunny? Rain? All of the above?

Temperatures will stay in the range which we can call balmy. Typical of Seminole County most of the year. Highs should be in the high-70s to low-80s, and the lows will range from the mid-60s to 70. Or thereabouts. Rain? Oh sure. Cloudy? Yea, that too. Mornings clear; early morning patches of fog; afternoons cloudy; rain at any time. You know the cycle.

Our concerns about tropical storms are about over. Nothing poking around down in the tropics and even if there was something, the ocean temperatures is now dipping below 70 degrees.

But while our concerns are for storms, our brethren out west are constantly concerned about earthquakes. They want to know more, and in their efforts to learn, scared a bunch of folks.

Researchers hoping to learn more about the earthquake that shook Southern California Oct. 1 detonated an underground explosion stronger than expected, upsetting jittery residents and tripping burglar alarms miles away.

Although geologists had said the explosion would not be felt by anyone more than 100 yards from the site in the Whittier Narrows Recreation Area, people reported feeling a jolt as far away as 5 miles from the site of the 4:10 a.m. Sunday blast.

Radio stations and police departments were flooded with calls from residents who thought another earthquake

TV Producers Are Flocking To Story Of Stripper, Mother

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (UPI) — TV producers are seeking the rights to the story of Theresa Jackson, who was convicted of child abuse in the suicide of her stripper daughter, but her lawyer may have to fight the state for the money.

Jackson's defense lawyer, Kenneth Whitman, claims she owes him \$150,000 in legal fees, and he hopes to sell the rights to her story for at least that amount.

Florida is one of 41 states with a so-called "Son-of-Sam" law, named for the 1977 New York statute adopted to prevent serial killer David Berkowitz from making money from his story.

Florida's law, enacted the same year, requires that 25 percent of a convicted felon's movie and book proceeds be paid to the felon's dependents and 2 percent to the victims of the crime and their dependents. The remaining 50 percent can be tapped by the state to pay court and prison costs.

Drunk Driving Campaign Falters

MIAMI (UPI) — The campaign against drunken driving is faltering in Florida, hampered by crowded court dockets, fading media attention, decreasing federal funds, and a horde of lawyers who specialize in fighting DUI charges.

The weakening campaign has resulted in rising numbers of alcohol-related traffic deaths and decreasing arrests for drunken driving, The Miami Herald reported Sunday.

The fight against drunken driving picked up momentum at the beginning of the 1980's with the formation of local chapters of Mothers Against Drunk Driving, or MADD, tougher laws against driving under the influence of alcohol, and the establishment of DUI task forces in larger police departments and prosecutors' offices.

Bosch Wants To Go To Miami

MIAMI (UPI) — Undeterred by a federal arrest warrant for a parole violation, anti-Castro militant Orlando Bosch hopes to return soon to his family in Miami, relatives said.

Bosch spent 11 years in prison in Venezuela, despite two acquittals on terrorism charges in the 1976 bombing of a Cuban airliner that killed 73 people. He has been out of prison since Aug. 7, waiting for the result of a prosecutor's final appeal in the case.

He became free to leave Venezuela last week when the chief prosecutor failed to file the appeal before that country's Supreme Court.

Baby Boomers Planning Leisurely Twilight

Most baby boomers plan to retire before the age of 60 and will rely less on social security and pensions and more on investments and home equity than their parents, according to pollsters for a major adult housing developer.

As baby boomers approach retirement age, the number of senior citizens in the United States is expected to increase, and the retirement housing industry is preparing now for what it hopes is going to be an onslaught of new retirees seeking housing.

The number of U.S. citizens over 50 is expected to increase 60 percent over the next quarter century as baby boomers reach retirement age.

The Del Webb Corp. of Phoenix, one of the nation's largest retirement housing developers, has been surveying Californians over the past few weeks to determine the

retirement plans and attitudes of today's working middle-age population.

The survey was conducted at shopping malls in Los Angeles and Hayward and is scheduled to be repeated next weekend in Huntington Beach and the following weekend in Merced. Del Webb spokesman Ken Pionaki said the company hopes to expand the survey nationwide.

"We found that baby boomers intend to retire at a younger age than their predecessors," Pionaki said. "Sixty-five percent at Los Angeles said they plan to retire before the age of 60." At Hayward, the figure was 72 percent.

In Los Angeles, 130 baby boomers, almost half of whom were between the ages of 37 and 42, were questioned during the first phase of the survey. Another 59 retirees were surveyed for comparison purposes.

At Hayward, 219 people were questioned, 153 of them still working with an average

age of 40.

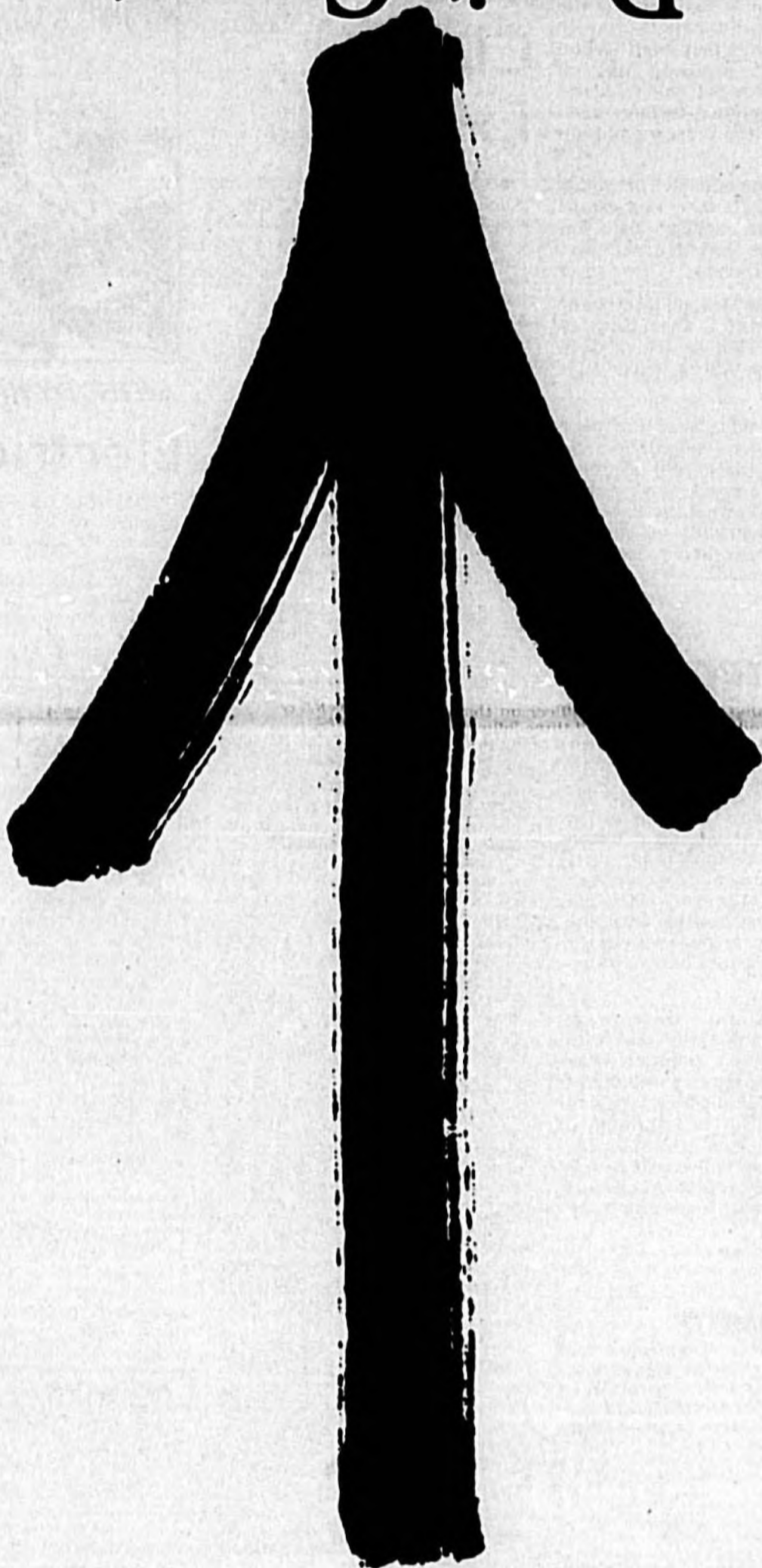
"We have worked with the retired market for a long time, but this is the first time we have talked to baby boomers about their plans," Pionaki said.

"We are surveying a number of issues, including medical plans, financial, housing, when they plan to retire and if they perceive retirement as being better or worse than that of their parents," Pionaki said.

He said the majority of retirees who were questioned said Social Security and pension checks are their largest sources of income, while the baby boomers indicated they would depend on investments and home equity by a 2-1 ratio over Social Security and pensions.

"They're just going to be better off financially," sociologist Rita Ricardo-Campbell said of baby boomers.

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Sick, Racist Talk In Washington

Former Education Secretary T.H. Bell never has seemed to be the kind of person to make things up. We see no reason to doubt his assertion that he heard slurs and racial put-downs from people he called "mid-level right-wing staffers" in the Reagan administration when he was a member of the Cabinet.

That is not to accuse White House spokesmen of dissembling when they denied Bell's assertion. It's possible that some of the slurs Bell wrote about in his new book were uttered in his presence when high White House officials weren't around. And no wonder. Some of the things Bell said he heard were too vicious, too ignorant to have been tossed about casually in the presence of high White House officials.

The people who used the offensive language apparently didn't care whether Bell heard them. He said he was looked down on because the Education Department was unpopular in the administration.

One of the worst things Bell said he heard was a reference to Martin Luther King as "Martin Lucifer Coon." That is sick. It does not belong. No circumstances exist that justify it.

Unfortunately, such talk has not been eliminated from the general population. No one should be surprised that it still occurs in private conversations among government employees. But people like Bell, by exposing such talk for the vile thing that it is, can help hasten the day when decent people rise up in revulsion whenever it is heard.

Nessie Uncaught

If scientists drained Loch Ness and failed to find its famous, mythical monster, people still would believe in "Nessie." In the recently concluded "Operation Deep-scan," a British-American team spent \$1.6 million conducting sonar sweeps with an armada of boats in Scotland's largest lake, but detected only an "unusual object" thought to be either debris or a large fish. The Loch Ness Monster also has eluded several other elaborate expeditions during the last decade, retaining a mystique that, arguably, is greater than the Abominable Snowman, Bigfoot and extraterrestrials combined.

It is incredible that any creature of monstrous proportions, especially one with plesiosaur-type dimensions popularly attributed to Nessie — could survive millions of years undiscovered in a 23-mile-long lake that is only linked to the North Sea through a canal. The more scientists look in vain for the monster, however, the more adherents Nessie attracts. The big fish that gets away always lures anglers. But it's usually a sad day if the fish is caught.

Many of the visitors, some with knapsacks, some with letters, all would like to see the president. Of course, that is impossible. A lot of patience is required of the White House policemen and they seem to have it, treating those Americans with respect.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater is still puzzling somewhat over his meeting with Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze — well, maybe not.

When national security adviser Frank Carlucci introduced Fitzwater to Shevardnadze on the Soviet top diplomat's recent visit to Washington, Shevardnadze shook hands with Fitzwater and said: "I know the name."

Perhaps he was remembering a couple of weeks ago when Soviet leader Mikhail

Gorbachev reneged on holding a summit meeting (later he flip-flopped and the summit is on). Fitzwater caustically commented that the Soviets were getting "cold feet on peace."

When the summit meeting, set for Dec. 7 between President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, was announced, the president was asked whether he was disappointed that Gorbachev had limited his visit to about three days and decided not take a U.S. cross-country tour.

The president replied: "Well, maybe there could be another meeting, that he would come purely for that purpose and I would still like to do that. Just as I know when we discussed these two meetings in Geneva, he suggested that there might be things in the Soviet Union that he would like to show me."

"Like the Gulag," a reporter quipped.

Actually, Reagan had hoped to show off a bit, taking the Kremlin leader to a model Iowa farm.

to a factory and to show them all those "swimming pools" in the backyards of ordinary folks.

He also wanted to invite Gorbachev to his mountaintop ranch near Santa Barbara, Calif., to impress on him the simplicity of his own little five-room adobe house that is heated with two fireplaces.

Mostly, Reagan had hoped that Gorbachev would make a good comparison between the socialistic system and the capitalistic system.

When the president visited China he saw the trends toward capitalism and he was on the right track.

When he goes to Moscow next spring perhaps, he may not see such trends as pronounced as on mainland China, but he will see Gorbachev trying to move a stagnant economy by permitting more enterprise, or so it appears from the Soviet leader's speech on the 70th anniversary of the Bolshevik Revolution.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — However much I hate to disagree with a member of Congress, sitting, standing, reclining or in some other posture of servitude, my favorite congressional practitioner of the interlocking, or overlapping, cliché was Rep. Tom Steed.

It was the Oklahoma Democrat who once said, "The chickens come home to roost when you get down to the meat of the coconut."

Hear! Hear! If that's not telling it like it is, I don't know what bromide fusion does quality.

So much for Rep. Morris Udall, D-Ariz., and his new book, "Too Funny To Be President."

Admittedly, I haven't read the whole thing, but in the published excerpts I saw there was no mention of Steed.

How Udall could have overlooked him in any discussion of political malapropisms is beyond me.

Steed certainly served in Congress long enough to overlap Udall a bit. As to whether his political service was of the cliché variety, I leave to others to determine.

A couple of colleagues I told of Steed's "malapropism," both recalled how talkative he was. Clearly, he could not have maintained that pace without rubbing two or more clichés together occasionally.

Not only did Udall fail to cite that quote in the printed excerpts of his book, he likewise made no reference to Richard Sheridan, the Irish playwright who gave us the term "malapropism."

Sheridan did this in a 1775 play titled "The Rivals," one of whose characters was a Mrs. Malaprop. That she became famous for her humorous misapplications of clichés and other phrases is the sort of stuff of which stage history is made.

Electric Power Imports

HISMARCK, N.D.—The export of Canadian electric power to the northern tier states threatens their economies.

Coal mining is one of the pillars of North Dakota's economy, together with agriculture and oil production. Farming and the oil business are depressed these days. Therefore, coal mining is vital; the coal is used as fuel by electric power plants.

Power production here would be a flourishing activity but for the fact that the Canadians are offering to sell their power—much of it generated in government-owned plants—below the cost of production in the United States. As a consequence, the coal industry in North Dakota is suffering.

This is a trade problem that's little appreciated outside the coal and utility industries. North Dakotans regard the dumping of Canadian power in the U.S. as an unfair trade practice.

Canada is pressing the United States very hard to spend billions of dollars because of an alleged problem with acid rain, which it says is caused by American power plants. However, Gov. George Sinner of North Dakota charges that Canadian demands are hypocritical, as Canada exports large amounts of electric power and "not a single coal-fired stack in Canada has scrubbers."

This fact hasn't been presented in the U.S. media. The governor termed free trade a "euphemism" in a world market where American business is burdened with taxes, social responsibilities and environmental regulations that do not affect their competitors.

One North Dakota business leader cited the extreme difficulty involved in getting the permits for a hydroelectric plant whereas, he said, Canadian electric power organizations can get the necessary approval

in their country without delay.

As Gov. Sinner said, "I want free trade with Canada. They are good people, and they understand more about us than most people in the world. But we cannot let the euphemisms and wishes of free trade replace the realism of fair trade. We have had enough."

The unfair nature of the Canadian electric power competition is clear from the subsidy Manitoba Hydro, a large Canadian utility organization, receives from the provincial government. Its annual report lists a \$65 million provincial government appropriation for Manitoba Hydro.

The problem of foreign energy imports isn't simply an academic question in North Dakota; it is a harsh reality that must be addressed by the federal government. The economic well-being of the people of North Dakota is at stake. Unfortunately, the Executive Branch hasn't responded to the economic realities faced by North Dakota and other Northern Plains states with resource-based economies. There are many resource-based economies from Idaho to New Mexico, geographically extensive states with light population density. Though they aren't powerful in Congress, they are of vital importance to the nation. The food, oil and minerals they produce are America's industrial strength. These states should be better appreciated. Their central importance to the U.S. economy now and in the future ought to be given greater attention.

Gov. Sinner summed up the situation, saying "I sound the alarm that the quality of life in America and all the things we have worked for these past 200 years are threatened. Not because of our generosity, but because of our foolishness, shortsightedness, belief in a euphemism called free trade and a failure to face reality."

Getting Bad Backs To Work

CHICAGO (UPI) — Americans missed about 1.3 million workdays last year because their backs hurt. The cost, in terms of lost productivity and medical bills, was more than \$16 billion.

This is not a little problem caused by a few malingers. An estimated four out of five U.S. workers experience low back pain severe enough to stay out of work at some time during their careers, and 12 percent of those are chronic sufferers.

So it's a big problem — one that big business has done very little about until recently.

"About 1 percent of the workforce is on permanent disability because of back injury," says Holly Mayer, a registered nurse and physical therapist. "Their company is paying them and may never see another day at work."

"It makes sense that it would be worth quite a bit to make them a working member of society again." The Productive Rehabilitation Institute of Dallas for Ergonomics, where Mayer is on faculty, they are charging \$7,000 to \$10,000 to do just that.

Through a comprehensive three-week, 171-hour program, the institute evaluates the functional deficits of the injured worker and implements a program to restore them. The regimen of exercise, training, education and work simulation is followed by several weeks of tests and monitoring to ensure the worker can do his work.

Even at the hefty price, at least a few insurance companies and businesses are beginning to realize comprehensive back rehabilitation is a bargain.

"The bottom line is they would end up paying out more in worker's comp and medical bills otherwise," Mayer says. "And we get them back to work."

In a recent Journal of the American Medical Association, Mayer and researchers from the University of Texas Health Science Center compared 116 patients treated at the institute with 72 patients who were similar in all respects except that their insurance company refused to cover the program.

"These were all bad cases," Mayer says. A third of both groups had had back surgery. In many cases multiple surgeries. On average, their injuries had kept them out of work for 1.2 years. Two-thirds suffered from clinical depression.

Reagan Ordered Tests Violating Treaty

WASHINGTON — Late last year President Reagan ordered work to begin on a chemical laser weapons program even though he believed — according to his own statements at a secret Oval Office meeting — that it would violate the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty with the Soviet Union.

Dale Van Atta has spent more than six months confirming this story with knowledgeable, though reluctant, officials in the White House, the Pentagon and the intelligence community.

The president ordered Lt. Gen. James Abrahamson, head of the Strategic Defense Initiative Organization, to proceed with the secret program, code-named Zenith Star, despite its treaty-breaking implications. His decision has enormous significance for the current arms-control negotiations with the Soviets, and for the future of Reagan's four-year-old SDI (Star Wars) program.

The first phase of the laser project was a five-month study that began

last January. The contractors were Lockheed Missiles and Space Co., Martin Marietta and Rockwell International.

The second, current phase is a three-month, \$10.8-million effort to design a fully integrated space-based laser weapon for testing. An Oct. 5 contract made Martin Marietta Denver Aerospace the primary contractor, with sub-contracts to Lockheed and TRW of Redondo Beach, Calif. The true nature and intent of the Zenith Star project have been disguised in official acknowledgements of its various components.

In fact, the program's intent was the most sensitive topic of discussion in the Oval Office meeting last Dec. 17, according to our sources. Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger arrived for a meeting at 11 a.m.; Abrahamson accompanied him to give a special SDI briefing.

While a variety of SDI programs were discussed, accounts of the secret meeting indicate that the key question was whether to move ahead with the alpha hydrogen-

fluoride laser, under development by TRW since 1980 and now part of the Zenith Star project.

At the meeting, Weinberger said the chemical laser was the most mature "directed energy" program under development, and said Zenith Star was the best bet for an early demonstration of such exotic weapons. The president agreed with Weinberger.

But Reagan noted that Zenith Star would violate the 1972 ABM Treaty as he understood it. Article V of the treaty states that neither signatory will "develop, test or deploy ABM systems or components which are sea-based, air-based, space-based or mobile land-based."

Despite his stated view that Zenith Star would violate the treaty, Reagan said it was imperative to go ahead with the program anyway.

At this point, according to sources, Abrahamson urged the president, in effect, to give the Soviets the six-months' notice required by the treaty if either side intends to abandon it. Reagan tabled the suggestion for later high-level discussion.

The sources said Abrahamson argued that Zenith Star "should be done openly." The president disagreed. He explained that the political price he'd have to pay, with Congress already at his heels over the Iran/Contra scandal, "would be too high." Reagan then ordered that Zenith Star be a "black" program, meaning that Congress would not be fully informed of its purpose and progress.

Attempts by Van Atta to meet with the president and/or chief of staff Howard Baker to discuss the story have been rebuffed for months. Neither Reagan, Baker nor communications director Tom Griscorn responded to Van Atta's most recent letters, hand-delivered to the White House on Oct. 22.

In an Aug. 14 on-the-record interview with Van Atta, Abrahamson called his discussions with the president "a privileged area." He explicitly denied what our sources told us: that Reagan had ordered him to go ahead with the program after expressing his belief that it would violate the ABM Treaty.

Teenage Killer's Case Will Be Argued At Supreme Court

WASHINGTON (UPI) — If Wayne Thompson wins the case called before the Supreme Court for arguments today, the condemned risoner could save himself and 30 others facing execution for murders committed before their 18th birthdays.

Thompson's lawyers want the Supreme Court to decide that sentencing juveniles to die violates constitutional, moral and international standards of justice.

Indeed, the United States finds itself among only a handful of countries that condone the practice, sharing equal billing with nations such as Iran. Groups ranging from the American Bar Association to the Catholic Church have voiced outrage at the fact that 25 states still permit such executions.

Therefore, Thompson's case potentially carries weight far beyond his personal stake, focusing attention on a practice that ended in the United States in 1964 but began anew with the 1985 execution of Charles Rumbaugh in Texas.

Reason For Train Crash Sought

KEMMERER, Wyo. (UPI) — A Union Pacific Railroad official said there was heavy fog in the area where two freight trains driven by brothers collided head-on, but it was uncertain if the weather contributed to the accident that killed a crewman.

Union Pacific and National Transportation Safety Board investigators were working to determine the cause of the collision Sunday that killed Ned E. Hanson, of Pocatello, Idaho, and resulted in minor injuries to six other crewmen also based in Pocatello.

"There was dense fog in the area, but we don't know if that played a part in the accident or not," Union Pacific spokesman John Bromley said Sunday.

The collision occurred on the railroad's main line in western Wyoming, about 10 miles west of Kemmerer, before dawn Sunday.

Tabatha Headed For Recovery

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Doctors said 3-year-old Tabatha Foster appeared "headed for a straight, strong recovery" but that it was still too early to make long-term predictions about the longest-surviving five-organ transplant patient.

Tabatha remained in critical but stable condition today in the intensive care unit at Children's Hospital, where doctors said she apparently had suffered no complications from a 2 1/2-hour operation Friday to close two tiny intestinal suture openings that failed to heal after her Nov. 1 transplant surgery.

Roy and Sandra Foster of Madisonville, Ky., visited their daughter Sunday as Tabatha clutched a rag doll and half a dozen bluebirds on a mobile circled above her bed for good luck, hospital spokesman Dick Riebling said.

WORLD IN BRIEF

Abu Nidal Terrorist Group Says It Holds Eight Hostages

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — A Palestinian terrorist group led by the notorious Abu Nidal warns that any retaliation for its capture of a boat carrying six Israeli adults and two children could lead to the deaths of the hostages.

In a statement released in Moslem west Beirut, the Fatah Revolutionary Council boasted Sunday that the operation by one of its "naval units" represented a "slap" against Jordan's King Hussein, who is hosting the Arab League summit that opened Sunday in Amman. The summit is trying to forge a unified stance against Iran in the 7-year-old Persian Gulf war.

"We warn against taking decisions that could grant the Zionist king (Hussein) the right to represent us in any negotiations concerning the West Bank," the statement said.

Abu Nidal, or Sabri Al Banna, founded the 300-member Fatah faction in 1974 after policy differences with Palestine Liberation Organization leader Yasser Arafat. The PLO had sentenced Abu Nidal to death in absentia, accusing him of plotting to assassinate Arafat.

Five Catholic Youths Shot

ENNISKILLEN, Northern Ireland (UPI) — Five Roman Catholic youths in Belfast were shot and wounded in possible retaliation for the bombing deaths of at least 11 people gathered for a ceremony honoring Britain's war dead, police said.

Police said 55 people were injured in the suspected Irish Republic Army bomb attack Sunday, believed the worst in Northern Ireland in 15 years.

The explosion occurred at 10:45 a.m. inside an old stone-walled building, causing it to collapse on some of an estimated 500 people gathered around a war memorial 20 yards away for a wreath-laying ceremony that was to begin within five minutes.

No Contra Talks In Nicaragua

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (UPI) — Government leaders have ruled out the possibility that cease-fire talks with the U.S.-backed Contra rebels will be held in Nicaragua.

Cardinal Miguel Obando y Bravo, who was asked Friday by President Daniel Ortega to serve as an intermediary for talks with the U.S.-backed rebels, said Sunday, "I would like that contact, if possible, to take place in Nicaragua."

"Why? Because it would be quicker to communicate with the parties," Obando y Bravo, the Roman Catholic archbishop of Managua, said after delivering his traditional Sunday homily.

But Vice President Sergio Ramirez said Saturday the indirect negotiations with the Contras "could not take place in Managua."

Guerrillas Threaten Servicemen

MANILA, Philippines (UPI) — Communist guerrillas are threatening to kill U.S. servicemen unless the United States stops security patrols outside its military bases in the Philippines, which began after three Americans were killed last month, news reports said today.

Manila newspapers gave accounts of a clandestine news conference Sunday at a village near Clark Air Base in which a spokesman for the Central Luzon command of the communist New People's Army, or NPA, demanded that American forces to halt the off-base patrols.

The newspapers quoted a rebel statement as saying the guerrillas will "undertake assassination missions, sabotage and other tactical offensives unless U.S. troops stop security operations outside Clark and other military bases."

Wellness Epidemic Spreads

NEW YORK (UPI) — A "wellness epidemic" that broke in the American workplace a decade or so ago has spread dramatically — and that's good for health, said a report issued last week.

"Worksite wellness activities, once thought of as fads or frivolous employee benefits, are now found in almost two-thirds of the nation's worksites with 50 or more employees," the report, "Worksite Wellness Research Update 1987," said.

"In addition, several major companies report that those who participate in these activities are more likely to be healthy and have lower health care costs."

"At Johnson & Johnson, a five-year study of the company's pilot health promotion program found that, if offered to all J&J employees, it could save at least \$1 million annually through health improvements, reduced absenteeism, and a projected annual reduction in health care costs," the report said.

Unlike an epidemic that sends sickness, this one spreads chances of wellness, according to Ruth Behrens, director of the Prevention Leadership Forum that issued the report.

The Forum Behrens heads has been tracking the worksite wellness trend since the late 1970s. It is a cooperative effort of the Washington Business Group on Health and the Office of Disease Prevention and Health Promotion, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

She said worksite health projects include such things as drug, alcohol and smoking control; exercise and physical fitness activities; back care and other treatment; off-the-job accident prevention instruction; weight control; screening for high blood pressure and other health problems; health risk appraisal.

"Some companies, mainly small ones, have only one activity," she said, "but among the big firms there is a wide range."

Pioneering "wellness" projects first were launched by multibillion-dollar corporations with thousands of workers. They included gyms at corporate headquarters to spark physical fitness and executive dining rooms that never served high fat, highly salted or junk foods.

Early programs included stress reduction rooms where harried executives could practice the trance-like relaxation response pioneered by Harvard's Dr. Herbert Benson.

Wildfires Burn Over Woods

(UPI) — Weary firefighters and beleaguered farmers prayed for rain to douse wildfires that burned 250,000 acres of Southern woodlands, parched pastures, prompted an emergency livestock feed program and spread smoke far up the Eastern Seaboard.

The fires killed two people over the weekend — a Kentucky firefighter who died of heart failure while battling a blaze in Laurel County and a 12-year-old boy who was killed in a bus-truck accident on the smoke-shrouded West Virginia Turnpike near Beckley.

The National Weather Service reported Sunday that smoke from fires raging out of control in Kentucky, West Virginia, Tennessee, Alabama, Georgia, and the Carolinas cast a pall as far north as New York City, causing poor visibility at airports and aggravating respiratory problems.

Forecasters were predicting rain today in several parched southern states, where federal agriculture officials plan to begin

an emergency feed assistance program to help farmers buy supplemental grain. A similar program was activated in the summer drought of 1986.

NWS officials say the South is suffering from an agricultural drought — meaning the top 12 inches of the soil is dry — and is on the brink of a hydrologic drought, which means lakes and rivers are dangerously low.

The water level in north Georgia's Lake Lanier, the headwaters of the Chattahoochee River which supplies drinking water to much of the Atlanta area, is nearly 7 feet below normal for this time of year, officials said Sunday.

Firefighters in Kentucky were faced Sunday with tornado-like "firestorms," which officials said were sudden, violent and uncontrollable fires that fed by high winds.

"They are unpredictable and pop up anywhere you have fire and wind," said Kentucky forestry official Richard Green. "They are totally out of control and they last a few minutes and then they're gone."

In West Virginia alone, more than 142,000 acres of woodlands have burned in recent days, causing more than \$40.5 million in damage, state forestry director Bill Gillespie said Sunday.

"Let's hope the good Lord takes pity on us and gives us a 10-inch snowstorm," Gillespie said.

West Virginia Air Pollution Control Commission Director Carl Beard termed the air "filthy," and officials in Pennsylvania reported smoke from the forest fires had spread across its borders.

The APCC recorded more than 800 micrograms of particulates per cubic meter Sunday, and Beard said, "This type of air pollution affects everybody. This covers the widest geographic area with the highest particulate matter we've ever seen."

"If we don't get some rain we

are in trouble," lamented Wesley Wells, the chief of forest protection in Georgia, where 15,000 acres have burned in recent weeks, including an out-of-control blaze in the Chattahoochee National Forest and on famous Lookout Mountain.

Georgia imposed an outdoor burning ban in northern counties and the U.S. Forest Service imported firefighters from New Mexico and Arizona to help battle a wildfire in the Chattahoochee National Forest.

In Alabama, where 41,600 acres of woodlands have burned this month, National Forest Service spokeswoman Joy Patty said officials were requesting 300 more firefighters from Western states.

"We can't take the chance of it not raining. We can't really depend on the rain coming in," Patty said. "That's the only thing that's going to stop this — a good rain."

In Mississippi, where fires this month have burned 44,000 acres of woodlands, state Forestry Commission spokesman Bill Colvin said residents of the rural Standing Pine community used farm tractors and shovels to build fire lines to protect their homes from a wildfire.

Reagan Will Be Cautious Picking Next Court Nominee

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Back-to-back embarrassments, blamed by some on failures at the top levels of the administration, have led President Reagan to exercise an extra measure of caution in choosing his next Supreme Court nominee. With at least one top candidate waiting in the wings, Reagan returned Sunday from a weekend at Camp David, Md., to face the same challenge he did two weeks ago: mounting another attempt to put a strict conservative on the high court.

ANALYSIS

Judge Douglas Ginsburg, Reagan appeared intent to avoid a rush to judgment that could lead to yet another disappointment or defeat. The official line was that only after careful thought and close scrutiny would Reagan announce a new nominee to replace Ginsburg, 41, the federal appeals judge who bowed out Saturday after an admission of past marijuana usage darkened the cloud already over his nomination.

Kennedy, 51, loomed as the leading candidate. Regarded as conservative but not as doctrinaire and therefore less controversial than Reagan's last two nominees, he was passed over at the urging of Attorney General Edwin Meese and Senate arch-conservatives in the Oct. 29 selection of Ginsburg to replace Judge Robert Bork, whose nomination the Senate rejected Oct. 23.

Judge William Wilkins Jr. of the 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals also was mentioned as a possibility, in part to placate Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., who earlier pushed the South Carolinian as a candidate for FBI director. In any event, White House officials promised pains would be taken to ensure no hidden liabilities in Reagan's third nominee. Sen. Howell Heflin, D-Ala., suggested that senators who must pass judgment on the new nominee have the same intention, even if it means a delay in filling a vacancy that has left the Supreme Court one justice short of full strength since the start of its fall term Oct. 5.

"I want to be certain about this," Heflin said Sunday. "I think speed is desirable, but nevertheless there is another and more important factor: that we have had a comprehensive background (check) and we don't have any faux pas like this to come up again." Heflin, interviewed with Specter on ABC's "This Week with David Brinkley," said the Senate, urged by Reagan to expedite confirmation proceedings for Ginsburg, should exercise "deliberate speed" even if the process drags into next year.

Ginsburg's damaging disclosure Friday dealt another embarrassing setback to the president's attempt to place a strict constructionist conservative on the Supreme Court, giving it a rightward orientation for years to come.

But even before the marijuana issue surfaced, the nomination had encountered rough political

3,000 Callers Phone AIDS Switchboard

OAKLAND, Calif. (UPI) — Nearly 3,000 worried callers have deluged the switchboards of the huge Kaiser Foundation Health Plan after officials said they would urge the plan's 30,000 members to take AIDS tests.

"The people who call range from those seeking more information to those who say, 'I feel anxious. I want the test right now,'" Kaiser spokeswoman Susan Pleper said during the weekend. Kaiser, the nation's largest prepaid health-care organization, revealed last week it planned to notify all patients who received blood transfusions between 1977 and March 1985 at its hospitals in San Francisco, San Rafael and Vallejo that they should take the test.

During that period, Kaiser said, the hospitals used blood supplied by Irwin Memorial Blood Bank of San Francisco, where officials recently said up to 1 out of every 100 units of blood issued from 1981 to 1983 was infected with the AIDS virus.

Sixty-nine people are known to have contracted acquired immune deficiency syndrome from Irwin blood, and the blood bank faces at least 15 lawsuits.

waters because of other personal matters — including the forthrightness of statements about his legal experience — that Ginsburg had caused his judicial qualifications to be "drowned out in the clamor." A senior White House official said Saturday that in contrast to the attacks on liberal interest groups following Bork's defeat, "The president blames no one for this. We have no blame to pass around." In private, however, Meese came under fire for pushing so hard for Ginsburg. So too did White House chief of staff Howard Baker seem targeted for criticism for failing to persuade Reagan to choose a candidate more easily confirmable, even though all involved called the marijuana issue an unfortunate oversight.

At least one of Ginsburg's conservative Republican backers, Sen. Orrin Hatch of Utah, was anything but forgiving. Having criticized the White House for a premature "cut and run" reaction to Ginsburg's admission, Hatch said Sunday that the presidential aides responsible should have "voluntarily resigned." Hatch said on the ABC "Good Morning America" program today, "I don't care who it is, you're going to find something wrong with a person's background." "If you're going to cut and run everytime you have some little... difficulty, my gosh, what kind of a White House is that and what kind of leadership is that and when you have people undermining the president right off the bat then, my gosh, I think the president ought to get rid of some of those people and revamp his staff down there and get some people to stand up for what he believes.

"They're not doing it and I'm getting mad about it and so are a lot of other conservatives," Hatch said.

Asked if he could support Kennedy, Hatch said he could support Kennedy, but he would not be his first choice, adding that Kennedy "has waffled on a number of issues. He's also been very strong on a number of issues."

"My problem with Kennedy is he was a lobbyist in California," Hatch said. "If they had problems with Ginsburg, I wonder what they're going to have with Kennedy."

Knights Douse Liberty's Flame

ORLANDO — The University of Central Florida football team has had a penchant for blowing out its opponents this season. UCF's "Air Supply" offense has taken most of its opponent's defense hostage.

On Saturday night before a crowd of 11,081 fans at the Florida Citrus Bowl, the Knights made Liberty (Va.) University their next victim, dousing the Flames, 42-21.

UCF played one of its most conservative games of the season and still chalked up 440 total yards.

The Knights were without the services of wide receiver Bernard Ford, the leading receiver in the country. Ford sustained an ankle injury in last week's win over Grand Valley State. He is expected to play, however, next

week.

The victory, UCF's fifth in a row improves the Knights to 7-2. This is the first time in school history that UCF has won seven games in one season. The five-game winning streak also tied a school record. UCF won five consecutive games from the end of the 1985 season to the start of the 1986 season. Liberty, meanwhile, has dropped to 2-7.

UCF is desperately trying to make the Div. II playoffs for the first time in school history. If the 7th-ranked Knights win their remaining two games, they will earn their first-ever post-season bid.

The Knights will hit the road next week for only the second time this season as they will

travel to Tallahassee to take on Div. I-AA foe, Florida A & M. UCF's two losses this season have both come to I-AA teams (Eastern Kentucky and Georgia Southern) early in the season.

If UCF can get by the Rattlers, it should sew up a playoff berth since the Knight's final game is against Div. II weaklings Morningstar (Iowa) on Nov. 21. The Chiefs were just 1-10 a year ago. The NCAA gives the top eight teams in the country playoff bids.

"I'm sure that we will move up in the poll after this game," McDowell said. "But to tell you the truth, I wouldn't mind staying right where we are, because we would be the underdogs in the first playoff game."

"I still think that we are going to have to play a lot better next week," McDowell continued. "We can play a lot better than

we did tonight, and we are going to have to next week."

McDowell went on to say that he feels his team has a good chance of hosting its first playoff game. "The NCAA takes bids as far as hosting playoff games go," McDowell said. "I think that we have an excellent chance of hosting a game, and I think it would be a good thing for the school and for Orlando."

Marino, Dolphins Upend Cincinnati

CINCINNATI (UPI) — Dan Marino enjoyed his usual fine passing day and received an unusual assist from a surprisingly tough Miami defense in the Dolphins' 20-14 conquest of the Cincinnati Bengals Sunday.

Marino passed for 262 yards, including a 30-yard touchdown pass to Mark Clayton — the 28th straight game in which Marino has thrown at least one TD pass, tying him with Seattle's Dave Krieg for the second-longest streak in the NFL. Johnny Unitas holds the record with 47. Marino has thrown for touchdowns in 59 of his last 62 games.

"I don't think I had the greatest game. I just did things when I had to," said Marino. "But our defense played great for us. They came up with the big plays in pressure situations for us."

"Last year, we weren't coming up with the big plays. I think we've turned it around this year. This was a big win for us because it keeps us in position for the playoffs. We've become the type of team that can run off a winning streak and we may be ready to start one."

The Miami defense, one of the worst in the NFL a year ago, permitted the explosive Cincinnati offense only one touchdown early in the game and one TD late in the contest — and blanked the Bengals for a stretch of more than 45 minutes in between.

"Our defense really did a good job for us," said Miami Coach Don Shula. "It helped us pick up an important win in a must-win situation."

The victory evened Miami's record at 4-4 and kept the Dolphins in the thick of the logjammed AFC Eastern division race.

Miami got a 1-yard touchdown run from Troy Stradford and field goals of 47 and 34 yards by Fuad Revelz. Marino completed 26 of 41 passes.

Cincinnati, 2-6, lost its fourth straight game and has an 0-5 home record this season. The Bengals are alone in the cellar of the AFC Central division, three games behind co-leaders Houston, Cleveland and Pittsburgh.

The Bengals had a desperation shot at winning the game on the final play. At the Miami 43 with two seconds left, Bonner Elason lofted a pass into the end zone, where four Bengals and a half-dozen Dolphins battled for the ball, which was tipped twice before falling to the ground as time ran out.

"I thought I had it," said Cincinnati's Mike Martin. "I had both hands on the ball, but someone knocked it out of my hands."

"I got one hand on it and then I was able to kick it," said the Bengals' Eddie Brown. "Eddie almost caught it," said Tim McGee. "I saw it touch his hand and I was getting ready to celebrate. Then I saw it hit the ground."

"It was just a matter of inches, but that's the way things have been going for us," said Cincinnati Coach Sam Wyche. "It's been an upsetting year."

Cincinnati scored on Elason's 17-yard TD pass to Eric Kattus and on Bill Johnson's 8-yard TD run. Elason finished with 18 of 37 passes for 228 yards.

Cincinnati running back James Brooks suffered a severely sprained ankle in the first quarter and didn't return to the game. Miami wide receiver Mark Duper suffered a cracked rib on a head-over-heels flip after a hard tackle in the second period and did not return.

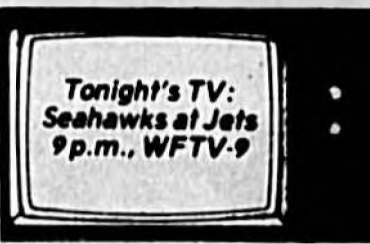
A seething Walton made a major change in the starting lineup in hopes of sparking his club's emotions for tonight's game at Giants Stadium against the Seattle Seahawks.

"We're only one game out of first place," Walton said. "The key to our season whether this week or whenever is if we are going to get back to playing hard and with enthusiasm and together. Once that starts, we'll be in every game."

Walton said his team has lacked fire in its two post-strike losses, 17-16 to Washington and 19-14 to Indianapolis. Regardless of how bad the situation was in the past, Walton almost always credited his team with enthusiastic play.

"We're not a multi-talented team that the so-called experts think we are," Walton said. "We have made the playoffs the last two years because we play hard, play with enthusiasm and play

One of those talented people, halfback Freeman McNeil, is being replaced in the starting lineup by Johnny Hector. McNeil's play has been superb since the strike ended, but his benching could be more of message a from Walton than anything else.

"I don't think we have been as enthusiastic as in the past," Jets quarterback Ken O'Brien said. "But I don't think we can use that as an excuse either. The reason we have lost the last two games is because we have made too many mistakes."

And the Jets will be facing a team in Seattle with a reputation of forcing mistakes. The Seahawks are plus-4 in turnover-ratio. Since 1983, Seattle is 33-8 in games they have forced more turnovers, 8-3 when turnovers are even and 8-18 when they have created fewer turnovers.

St. Louis Scores 28 In 4th To Beat Tampa

ST. LOUIS (UPI) — The St. Louis Cardinals, rumored to be leaving town at the end of this season, found a home in the end zone.

Neil Lomax threw three touchdown passes and Niko Noga returned a fumble for a score Sunday to spark St. Louis to 28 fourth-quarter points and a 31-28 victory over the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. No team in NFL history has ever come from so large a deficit in the fourth quarter to win.

"If you talk about all-time comebacks, this is it," Lomax said. "We've come back from big deficits before but never 28-3 in the fourth quarter."

"This is by far the best. We had to do it every series - we couldn't mess up. We had to score and had to score a touchdown. I'm proud of the offense. They never gave up on me."

The Cardinals entered the fourth quarter trailing 28-3, but Lomax rallied St. Louis before a crowd of only 22,449 at Busch Stadium. The attendance has fallen with Cardinals owner Bill Bidwell threatening to move the team from the city.

J.T. Smith hauled in a 17-yard touchdown strike from Lomax with 2:01 left to push the Cardinals ahead 31-28. Lomax drove the Cardinals 80 yards in

Buccaneers, 4-4. Lomax was 25 of 36 for 314 yards. St. Louis moved into Tampa territory on all nine of their possessions.

The Buccaneers turned an interception and a fumble recovery into a 14-3 halftime lead.

Rod Jones intercepted a Lomax pass that slipped through running back Earl Ferrell's hands and returned 7 yards to the Cardinals 49. A 32-yard pass in Wilder coupled with a 5-yard face-mask penalty moved the ball to the St. Louis 4. DeBerg then found Mark Carrier on a slant-in pattern at the goal line with 22 seconds left in the first quarter for a 7-0 lead.

The Buccaneers moved in front 14-0 by marching 92 yards in 15 plays. Mitchell fumbled at the Tampa Bay 8 with the Buccaneers' Ervin Randle reverting. The Buccaneers used 6:18 and scored when DeBerg hit Gerald Carter on a 3-yard touchdown pass with 5:10 left in the half.

Pam Shriver, the No. 2 seed at the \$250,000 Virginia Slims of New England, played perfect serve-and-volley tennis Sunday to upset the 33-year-old Evert, 6-4, 4-6, 6-0 and take home the \$50,000 winner's purse.

"I certainly felt my age today," said top-seeded Evert, a 16-year-veteran. "Pam had me running around out there."

The 6-foot Shriver, currently No. 5 in the world, dominated the net and forced Evert, ranked third, to attempt difficult passing shots and low percentage lobs.

"For me, at 25, I can go one of two ways," said Shriver, who has been ranked in the top 10 for the past eight years but has never won a Grand Slam singles.

"I can get discouraged and lose a little heart, or I can kick myself in the rear end and get motivated," she said.

Shriver has now defeated Evert in their last two meetings after losing the previous 19.

"I'm a much better player now," said Shriver. "It's just basic maturity."

"I've been hurt 19 times," she added. "Sooner or later you better learn something."

Shriver did not lose a set advancing to the finals, while Evert was pushed to three sets in the quarter finals by No. 7 Barbara Potter, and needed a second set tie-breaker to defeat semi-finalist Gabriela Sabatini.

"I never had any easy matches," said Evert. "I never had any relief out there."

Evert, a renowned baseliner, came to net much more than she had against the topspin groundstrokes of Sabatini, but could not find a weapon to combat Shriver's volley attack.

"I'm not invincible, I'm human," said Evert, who holds 18 Grand Slam singles titles, the most among active courtiers.

In the opening set, both players stayed on serve until the ninth game, when Shriver hit a half-volley drop shot at deuce, and then a forehand pass down the line to break Evert.

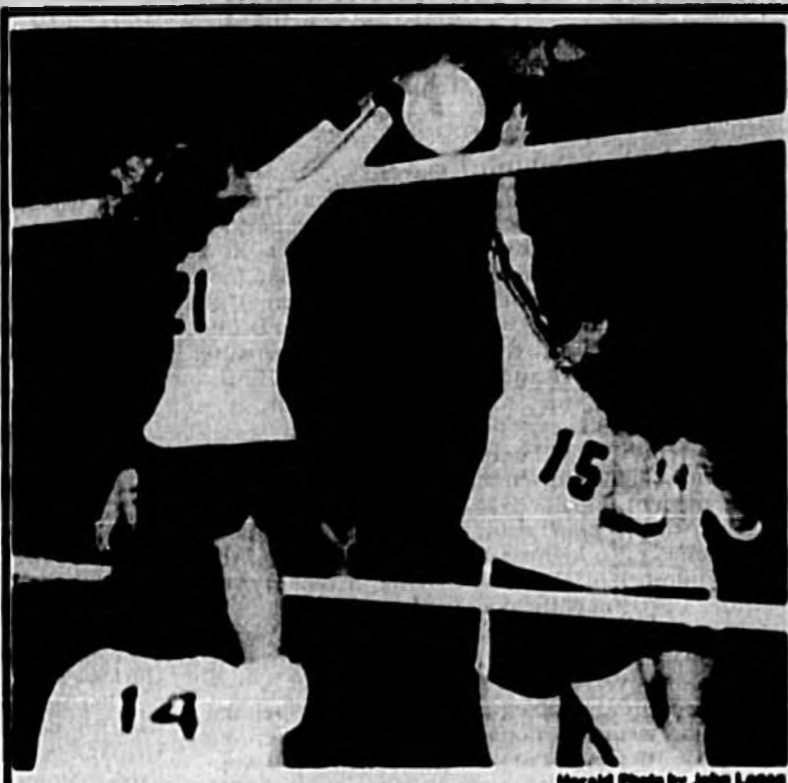

NEW YORK (UPI) — Prices opened lower Monday in moderate trading of New York Stock Exchange issues with the return of program trading increasing nervousness among market participants.

The Dow Jones industrial average, which fell 34.48 last week, was down 26.53 to 1932.52 shortly after the market opened.

Declines led advances 913-248 among the 1,498 issues crossing the New York Stock Exchange tape.

Early turnover amounted to about 14,797,000 shares.

Before the close of trading on Friday, the New York Stock Exchange announced that it would permit computerized program trading to resume on Monday.

Analysts said program trading, a technique in which investors attempt to profit from differences in stock index prices in the futures market and actual stock prices, has contributed to the market's recent volatility.

The use of program trading was curtailed Oct. 20, the day after the 508-point plunge in the Dow industrial average.

Dollar Goes Lower, Gold Goes Higher

The dollar hit a record postwar low against the yen in Tokyo as the U.S. currency opened mostly lower on major world money markets Monday despite optimism over a scheduled meeting of central bankers in Switzerland.

Gold and silver moved higher. Currency traders said they were hopeful that a meeting of central bankers in Basel, Switzerland, will inject stability into the U.S. currency.

Earlier in the Far East, the dollar continued its fall against the Japanese yen, closing at a new postwar low of 135 yen. Friday's close of 137.50 yen was the previous record.

In Europe, the dollar opened

lower in Frankfurt at 1.67 West German marks, down from 1.6785 last Friday.

In Paris, the dollar began the day at 5.6492 French francs, down from 5.69.

The dollar opened in Zurich at an all-time historic low against the Swiss franc at 1.3755. The previous low had been Friday's close of 1.3772.

In Milan, the dollar opened at 1.229 lire, down from 1.237.49, and in Brussels, the dollar opened at its lowest level since March 20, 1981, at 35.12 Belgian francs, down from 35.325.

The dollar opened in Amsterdam at 1.8805 Dutch guilders, down from 1.886.

Bankers Discuss Dollar Drop

BASEL, Switzerland (UPI) — Governors of the western world's central banks held private talks Monday on the current turmoil on currency markets caused by the plunge in the U.S. dollar.

The dollar's fall was the main topic at the regular monthly meeting of the Bank for International Settlements, the main clearing house for dealings between central banks.

BIS officials said the talks were private as always and it was not known if the central bankers would issue any statement.

Official sources close to the meeting, however, said others repeated previous charges by their governments that the U.S. budget deficit was the main cause of world stock market plunges and the subsequent decline in the dollar.

The bankers and their aides

refused to give any details on the talks to reporters.

Hispanics At All-Time High

Overall Poverty Rate Declines

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The U.S. poverty rate in 1985 registered an overall decline but the poverty rate for America's 18 million Hispanics is at a historic high, the Census Bureau said Sunday.

In the government's latest study on U.S. poverty, "Characteristics of the Population Below the Poverty Level," the bureau said there were 33.1 million Americans living in poverty in 1985.

The poverty line, for a family of four, was \$10,999 in 1985.

The report said the 1985 poverty rate was 14 percent, slightly lower than the 1984 estimate of 14.4 percent.

But the report said the number of poor Hispanics hit a historic high — 16 percent of the total number of Americans living in poverty, up from 11 percent of the poor in 1979.

In 1985, the Hispanic poverty rate was 29 percent, with some 5.3 million Hispanics living below the poverty level.

"Although the black and other-races populations are disproportionately represented among the poor, 69 percent of poor persons in 1985 were white," up "slightly" from 66 percent in 1979, the report said.

It added that "whites accounted for 81 percent of the net increase in the poverty population between 1979 and 1985."

But the report said part of the recent rise "in the proportion of the poverty population that is white may be attributable to an increase in the proportion of the poor who are Hispanic."

Within the Hispanic community, the report said, "there is considerable variation in poverty rates."

In 1985, the report said, the poverty rate for

those Hispanics describing themselves as Puerto Rican was 43.3 percent; it was 28.8 percent for those of Mexican origin; and 22.1 percent for other Hispanics, including Cubans and Central and South Americans.

"If present trends continue, Hispanic poverty will exceed black poverty," said Rafael Valdivieso, vice president for research for the Hispanic Policy Development Project in Washington.

The 8.9 million poor blacks in 1985 represented 27 percent of the poverty population, down from the 31 percent they represented in 1979 — nonetheless a disproportionate level, the report said.

"Loss of manufacturing jobs and other blue-collar jobs has affected Puerto Ricans more than other groups, especially Puerto Ricans, because they are located in the Northeast where many of the loss in jobs occurred," Valdivieso said.

"Hispanics who work have the lowest (average) salaries per week of any working group, and Hispanic women are at the bottom," said Emily Ganitz McKay, executive vice president of the National Council of La Raza in Washington.

"As a result Hispanics are more likely to be working poor," she said.

McKay said that a high dropout rate among Hispanic students in public schools makes the outlook worse.

"This means there are going to be more people who are less educated, and more people who are going to be poorer," she said. "And it's going to get worse because Hispanics are disproportionately represented in low-paying service jobs."

Israel Denies Boat Occupants Are Israeli

Earlier Story, SA

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI) — Israel today denied claims by a Palestinian terrorist group led by the notorious Abu Nidal that it captured a boat carrying six Israeli adults and two children.

Israel said today a check of the names of those reported kidnapped from a yacht off the Israeli coast by the Fatah Revolutionary Council showed they were not Israeli citizens and the boat was registered in Belgium.

The group claimed Sunday that one of its "naval units" captured the boat as a "slap" at Jordan's King Hussein, who is hosting the Arab League summit that opened in Amman. Summit participants want to forge a unified stance against Iraq in its 7-year-old Persian Gulf war against Iraq and Hussein is pushing for an international peace conference to settle Israeli-Arab disputes.

"We warn against making decisions that could grant the Zionist king (Hussein) the right to represent us in any negotiations concerning the West Bank," the statement said.

Sources said a Fatah Revolutionary Council official, Walid Khaled, held a surprise news

conference at the seaside Carlton Hotel in Syrian-controlled west Beirut and read a statement reporting the kidnapping. He refused to answer questions and disappeared after the news conference.

"One of our naval units, while it was withdrawing from the beach of the city of Gaza after accomplishing some missions aboard one of our boats, confronted a ship flying the Israeli and Belgium flags," the statement said.

"Our forces seized the ship and towed it to one of our naval bases ... We warn the Zionist enemy against attacking our refugee camps in retaliation," said the group, which has claimed a series of terrorist actions worldwide.

Radio Free Lebanon, monitored in Nicosia, quoted a spokesman as saying the group "took over a pleasure boat cruising off Gaza," then took the passengers to a "Palestinian base." The spokesman did not say where the base was.

But in Jerusalem, an Israeli Foreign Ministry spokesman said a check of names released by the group showed no Israeli citizens and he said the Jewish community in Belgium could not identify any as Jews from that country.

"There is no verification as the facts given by the spokesman in Beirut," the spokesman said. "As a start, we have to assume that something has happened and needs to be verified."

Police said a resident of 2423 S. Orange Ave. was sitting in his car, which was parked in the driveway, Friday at 8:35 p.m. when four shots were fired at the car. According to police, two of the shots hit the car. The resident, who said he saw no one in the area, was not injured.

Sri Lankan Bomb Kills 50

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka (UPI) — A massive bomb exploded near a railway station today and police said at least 50 people were feared dead.

Police said the blast occurred at 5:40 p.m. during rush hour in the Maradana district of the city near the railway station.

Police said they feared at least 50 people had been killed in the explosion but gave no further details.
