## **SRD** Cites **Road Needs**

The County Commission today agreed to study the possibility of four-laning State Road 436 from Altamonte Springs past U. S. 17-92 and to finance the project out of surplus gasoline tax funds. In a letter to the board, State Road Department officials said that a recent traffic count on the road showed some 3,000 cers pass there daily compared to 665 in 1854.

Chairman John Krider enfled the road the worst primary road in the county, "As a matter of fact it's even worse than any secondary road," he added.

Commissioner Vernon Duna told the board that in places the road is "breaking up and deteriorating because of heavy travel and construction trucks weing th road

Krider said that if the County Commission could get the money, the SRD has informed him that they could get the work done out of this year's budget.





## The Hospital Planned For Its Expansion

Anytime a public facility announces a large expansion, but says that it will not require any additional funds, it is

but says that it will not require any additional funds, it is bound to get special notice. This happened when Seminole Memorial Hospital amounced that it would make a half-million addition. The bospital board revealed that its application for federal funds under the Hül-Burton Act was approved and said that it could match the government money without a bond issue, fund drive or other appeal for financing. The reason the hospital can do this is an simple that the beard didn't make particular mention as to where it got more thes \$250,000 in matching funds. Administrator Harry Weir sums it up in a hurry: "It was planned from the day the hospital opened its doers four years ago in February." Weir said that hospitals in recent years have not been able to handle current demands for services, much less af-ferd expansions, without continuing planning as part of its

Vision alone does not buy steel and concrete, of course. Weir has another simple explanation of how money was put aside for the addition.

the present building, facilities and staff with strict budgeting, he explains.

Costs have gone up right along with everything else. but have been controlled as closely as possible. Every staff member and employe has been indoctrinated with the idea of skillful and conservative use of supplies and equipment. A recent survey showed that the Seminole Memorial

costs per day for the patient is well below the average for

Florida hospitals, Weir said. So, it would seem we are getting a double benefit from the management of the hospital-fair rates and a needed expansion without resort to use of tax money or public subscription of any kind.
