Freed Hostage Suffering From Multiple Sclerosis

WIESBADEN, West Germany (UPI) - Freed American hostage Richard Queen is suffering from multiple sclerosis, a creeping disease that paralyzes parts of the body; his doctors said today. Dr. Jerome Korcak, a State Department physician who examined Queen in Zurich and flew with him to the

Air Force hospital in Wiesbaden, said American diagnosis followed Iranian doctors suspicions Queen had the disease. Symptoms of the illness are lack of motor coordination, loss of feeling in limbs, hands and feet, and

some difficulty in normal eyeball movement, Korcak He said Queen had shown all these symptoms while being treated in Iran. Doctors there feared the 28-yearold diplomat had suffered a brain lesion, which prompted them to urge Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini to order his release last Friday, he said.

Shah's Temperature Rises

CAIRO, Egypt (UPI) - The deposed shah of Iran has taken a turn for the worse, with his temperature shooting up to 102.2 degrees as the result of a new leg infection, medical sources said.

The sources predicted the former monarch might have to undergo another operation - at least his fourth in Egypt and sixth since he was driven from the

Hostage Code Name Alleged

One of the American hostages, accused of being a CIA agent, has admitted to his Moslem militant captors that he worked under the code name "Penguin' with sources in Iran, the Tehran newspaper Azadegan

"Penguin," in turn, had his own contacts, known as "rotor," "Probe," "tramp" and "Genius 13." the newspaper said in giving the first reports of any known interrogation of the hostages on grounds that they were

The newspaper published the text of an interview between the militant students and a hostage believed to be Thomas Ahern, 47, of McLean, Va., described as the American embassy's narcotics control coordinator, one of the three hostages being held at the Foreign Ministry. Ahern was sent to Tehran in June 1979.

Autopsy May Lead To Murder Charge

An autopsy today will decide whether a 57-year-old Sanford man accused of shooting his stepfather last week will face murder charges, police said this morning.

Jacob Dinah, 80, of 1605 W. 17th St., died Sunday morning at Seminole Memorial Hospital, one week after he was shot in the

Arthur Hayes, 57, of 1603 W. 17th St., was arrested less than an hour after the 8:12 a.m. July 6 shooting by Sanford police. Lt. Charly Parker said Hayes shot Dinah inside his stepfather's home during an argument. Parker says the autopsy will determine whether Dinah's leath was caused by the gunshot wound and whether a murder

charge will be added to the aggravated battery charge brought gainst Haves. Hayes was released Monday after posting \$2,625 bond.

A man held by an Altamonte Springs supermarket assistant manager for shoplifting has filed a \$400,000 suit against the store, charging false imprisonment and malicious prosecution. William Harrison, 23, of 8613 Elba Way, Orlando, has filed suit against Publix Supermarkets Inc., in Seminole Circuit Court asking at least \$200,000 in damages for himself and another \$200,000 for his wife, Daisy.

William A. Carter Reveals Libyan Gifts

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Settling a government complaint that accused him of failing to register as a Libyan agent, Billy Carter has revealed the job brought him gifts, free travel and \$220,000 in loans. The Justice Department filed suit Monday after the presi-



Florida Power Holds Breath CRYSTAL RIVER, Fla. (UPI) - Florida Power Corp.,

dangerously close to the point where demand outstrips production, is about to restart its 825-megawatt nuclear generating unit which has been out of service since Feb. 26. Spokesman William Johnson said the "critical" point in the restarting procedure - the start of the nuclear chain reaction - should be reached Wednesday or Thursday.

From that point, it will take 5-to-8 days to bring the unit up to full capacity if all goes as scheduled. "Certainly we are going to be very deliberate in checking ev-

erything out as we go along;" Johnson said. The heat wave has pushed utilization to the point where the utility had to cut off service to its "interruptable customers," such as the phosphate industry and other large industrial users Monday afternoon in hopes of getting through the peak late afternoon period without outages.

The industrial users can expect daily cutoffs until Florida Power can get its production back to peak capacity, about 4,965

Johnson said every other Florida Power unit was running at near peak capacity, including one fossil unit at the Crystal River plant which was to have been shut down July 12. He said the Environmental Protection Agency gave the utility permission to continue its operation under existing conditions. "We're hanging by our thumbs today," Johnson said "We've got everything running and any rubber band tha







The excruciating death that overtook 13 aliens, most of them Salvadorans, in the blazingly hot Arizona desert recently calls for corrective reform by the United States and Mexico as well as for punishment of those responsible.

Fourteen others - 13 Salvadorans and one Mexican — were near death when rescued and three Salvadorans and one Mexican are unac-

The first belief that the Salvadorans were robbed and abandoned to die by smugglers in the desert is yielding to evidence that this tragedy resulted from a bungled operation. The four Mexican nationals among the dead, the missing, and the survivors are said to be smuggler

The early reports that "coyotes" who customarily prey on undocumented immigrants slipping into the United States deliberately brought about the Arizona horror were all too believable because cruelty and exploitation are their stock in trade. But, whether these human from Arizona. Moreover, border gangs that rob

Appropriately, leadership for improving border safety is coming from Arizona's Governor Bruce Babbitt, who has asked Attorney General Benjamin Civiletti to seek an agreement with Mexico for prosecution of alien smugglers.



Lord Killanin, the outgoing president of the International Olympic Committee, took his final bow before the leaders of the world's amateur sports Monday with a resounding warning administrators and politicians are increasingly strangling the Olympic movement. "Politics and sports should not mix" was the familiar message of Killanin's last speech to a packed audience of sports officials at the opening of the IOC's session in the ornate red and gold setting of Moscow's

And that precisely was the argument used by Soviet TV censors who banned a West German film on the flood of Soviet propaganda that has surrounded the

boycott-stricken Olympics. Klaus Bednarz, Moscow correspondent of the West German network ARD, said Soviet television officials refused to transmit a four-minute feature titled

'Olympics and Propaganda" because "it was not a Bednarz said ARD would protest the censorship

Meanwhile, the network flew the film out to West Germany and showed it as scheduled. Killanin, 65, an Irish peer who has headed the IOC since the ill-fated Munich Olympics of 1972, told his audience the repercussions of the Olympic boycott "both nationally and internationally, on the Olympic

movement and the Games and also all non-professional sport, will be felt for year's to come, the more so if politicians continue to make sport for their own ends. "I believe the athlete is frequently the victim of the sports administrators and the politicians," he said. adding the IOC had hoped to undermine the boycott by allowing athletes to enter for the Games as individuals and not only as team members, as the rules stipulate.

"Many of us would have liked to have found a way of making direct entries for these current Games, and we have received pathetic pleas from individuals and teams asking for help, but the (IOC) executive decided this was impractical and would further undermine the complex situation of the National Olympic Com-

Killanin's successor is to be elected by IOC members Wednesday and will take over his duties at the end of the Games in August.

But Monday's appearance was Killanin's last scheduled major speech as IOC president and was effectively his swan song.

The Russians, anxious to divert attention from their continuing occupation of neighboring Afghanistan which prompted President Carter to call for the Olympic boycott in the first place, appeared to be heeding Killanin's call to "depoliticize" the Games. Soviet Sports Minister Sergei Pavlov, and Vasily Kuznetsov, the first deputy vice-president of the Soviet Union, made low-key speeches at the IOC congress's opening ceremony.

Effort To Grow

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The National Cancer Institute is increasing its "quit smoking" efforts and phasing out the 12-year project to develop a less hazardous cigarette for those who refuse to give up the habit.

"I think people can quit," said Dr. Vincent T. DeVita, new director of the institute that runs the nation's war on cancer

At a wide-ranging news conference Monday, DeVita also cited improvements in the nation's cancer cure rate and predicted it could reach 50 percent within a few years.

The cancer institute has spent \$57.5 million so far on research to find a less hazardous cigarette. The program this year is spending \$3.96 million for studies of the smoking history of lung cancer patients, animal studies with cigarettes with high and low tar and nicotine, and an analysis of all constituents of cigarette smoke.

The institute's total budget this year is \$1 billion. A spokesman said results from tobacco, filter and cigarette structure research since 1969 have made major contributions to the production of cigarettes with less tar and nicotine. "We have made major contributions in that area but I thin

that's about it," DeVita said. He said he believes money can be better spent on behavioral studies of smokers - particularly teen-agers - to find ways to discourage them from smoking.

"If cigarette manufacturers want to make a better product, and there is research to be done to make a better product, they can do it," DeVita said. "We would rather do the other kinds of research that will help us understand why people smoke so they can stop smoking."

The goal of the less hazardous cigarette project was to find ways to make a "socially acceptable" cigarette, but this effort was criticized by health authorities who believe there can be no such thing as a safe cigarette. In addition to causing cancer. cigarettes figure in a variety of other health problems, they

DeVita, appointed to his new post last week by President Carter, said the institute also plans to continue major support of a wide variety of research projects aimed at understanding the causes of cancer and developing better ways to treat the

He said anti-cancer drugs developed in the 1960s, along with surgery and radiation therapy, are responsible for an increase in the cure rate for serious cancers in the United States from 33 percent in 1955 to 41 percent today

DeVita predicted studies now under way on drug therapy for the common cancers of older people — of the breast, colonrectum, stomach and even lung — will pay off by the mid-1980s by increasing the cure rate to 50 percent.

In response to a question, he also said the anti-viral agent interferon "is an exciting area and we're continuing to pursue it." DeVita said in the past six or eight months, scientists have determined without question interferon does have an antitumor effect.
