Think about a watch. Imagine one of the larger watches which has an hour hand, a minute hand, and a second hand. Then, think about this watch as though you were someone who had never seen a watch before and knew only that it told time without knowing how it did it. Finally, figure out which of these hands is the most important.

Yet which of these hands is truly the important one? Most of us who can tell time ignore the second hand completely. We could get along without the minute hand if we had to. The important hand of a time piece is the one which indicates the hours. There is a clock on one of the towers of Westminster Abbey which has only an hour hand. It looks sort of odd at first glance, but one can tell the time pretty accurately with a second good look. If we had but one hand on our watches, we would quickly learn to calculate the time reasonably accurately by the way that one hand pointed.

All of this is a parable. The second hand is like the nervous and busy folk, who can never keep still, don't know how to relax, and seem to think that being on the jump is a sign of importance. The minute hand probably represents most of us. It moves rather ponderously to indicate something which is not important (unless you happen to be an astronomer in flight). Its motion is nice, but not too terribly vital.

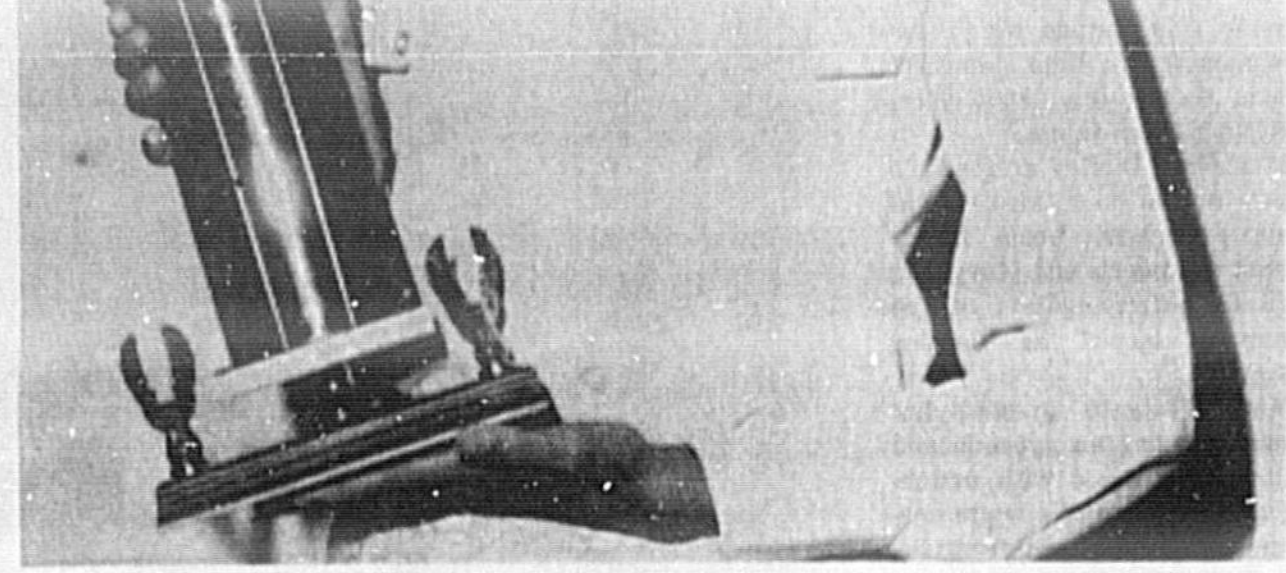

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Pick Angry... Even On Vacation

NEW YORK (AP) — As usual, Dr. Frank Pick is angry, even though he has removed himself from the scene of battle for a few days to vacation on the southern shore of Long Island.

Even at rest, the 72-year-old "debaser of currency" cannot forget that the value of all the world's money is being diluted. And he won't forgive the federal government, the United States included, which permits value to deteriorate.

Pick doesn't believe that currency is simply erode; that's too passive, and it suggests a trend over which humans have no control. Not so, Pick maintains. "Government reports on purchasing power, he points out, are based on 1958 equaling 100. The year is arbitrary; you could choose any year for the base, call it 100, and measure purchasing power from that date.

"That's what upsets Pick. Why 1958? He asks. Why not 1940, which he claims was the end of stability and the beginning of a financial spiral.

Based on 1958, the dollar was worth 73.5 cents in July, 1961, based on 1949, the dollar was worth only 25.3 cents. In other words, the choosing of 1958 disguises about half the purchasing power lost since 1949.

The International Monetary Fund also is criticized. That organization, he argues, "threw an even wider veil of oblivion over monetary appropriations by deciding that 1963 should be the basic year for measuring worldwide increases in the cost of living for more than a hundred countries."

Nevertheless, he must deal with debasers. The 103 currencies he monitors as consultant to foreign central banks and United States and foreign companies are continually being debased. He is particularly upset about the dollar, and he has railed against U.S. policies. As a result, says his assistant, "The Treasury wouldn't give him the time of day; not 1940, it's contained in a recent copy of Pick's World Currency Report, called "The Constant Dollar," an ironic title because the contents are devoted to showing the fickleness of American money. Government reports on purchasing power, he points out, are based on 1958 equaling 100. 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Germans Investigate Dumped Gas

KIEL, Germany (UPI)—Poison gas dumped in the Baltic Sea during World War I still distresses 25 years later, fishermen, tourists and West German authorities.

Prompted by the discovery of mishaps involving the deadly gas, the government recently ordered an investigation of suspected areas to prevent further accidents.

Danish and West German fishermen have been advised to avoid specific areas along their boats. Some resorts on the popular north German coast have reported a drop in summer bookings.

Experts say 200,000 tons of chemical weapons manufactured for Hitler's armies were dumped into the Baltic Sea in 1918.

The largest dumping site was southeast of a Danish island called Bornholm, where Russian soldiers sank 10,000 canisters filled with German mustard gas in 300 feet of water.

Of greater concern were three disposal areas of the Danish-German border where German riggers unloaded more than 11,000 tons of gas-filled canisters into water only 100 to 150 feet deep.

Years in the salty sea water corroded the canisters and set some containers free to bubble to the surface—often with serious results.

In April, fishermen Max Metzelt was blinded for three days after he hauled up a mustard gas bomb while fishing near the dump area.

Bonn announced the defense ministry would send divers to inspect the unexploded dumps and remove them.

A Kiel scientist has predicted a government-owned research that gas canisters from areas near the dump area might be burned by a mysterious substance, but it appears the burns came from mustard gas.

Wall Street Chatter

Though the uptick registered by sensitive indicators does not mean that the economy is already out of the woods, it does signal that the slump upward has begun, according to Argus Research Corp. Of even more significance to the investment community, however, is the first official estimate of second quarter corporate earnings. It says, Earnings declined in most manufacturing and in non-manufacturing industries, but a rebound in autos and electrical machinery profits slightly above the first quarter rate, the firm adds. The second quarter profit should prove to have been the low point of the corporate profit cycle, it says.

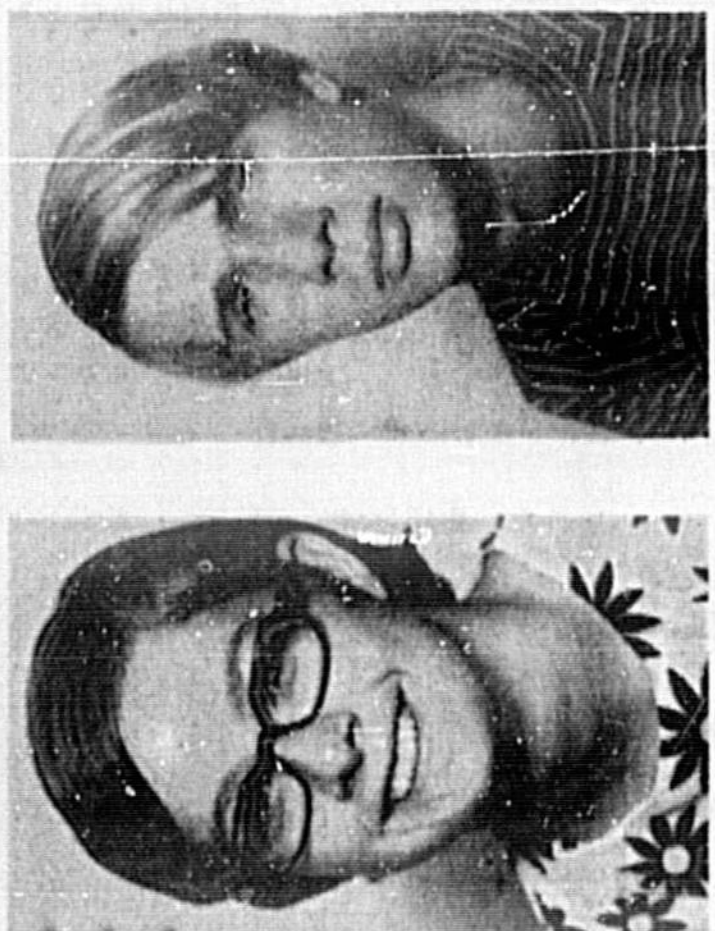

Burglaries Are A Serious Problem

Burglaries are becoming more and more of a Sanford-Seminole County problem as was evident in the rash of reported entry incidents during the past weekend.

A wall safe containing \$500 and many valuable papers including insurance certificates and wills was removed from the wall in a Saturday investigation by Seminole County authorities.

Deputy William Robbins reported the safe was pried from the wall at the home of Carlton and Thelma Exum, 6007 Linnel Beach Drive, Bear Lake.

The robbery was discovered by Debbie Exum, a daughter, who found the theft upon arrival home following a beach outing.

Robbins reported the safe was located inside a closet and was not in plain sight.

Two .22 caliber rifles and the contents of a jewelry box belonging to Mrs. Exum were also taken from other parts of the house, Robbins stated.

Sanford Police today are working on preliminary reports that W. First Street offices of Dr. Armand Israel and Bill Real Estate were also entered during the weekend.

The adjacent offices were being checked at press time by city detectives and no report on amount of loss, if any, had been completed.

In other reports, there were two incidents reported of men exposing themselves.

James Davis, 1900 W. 16th Street, was charged with indecent exposure after he was arrested on Country Club Road by Deputy Edward Pagen. The man was also charged with public intoxication.

City police listed a telephone report by a woman, who claimed a man came into her house and exposed himself to her and escaped in a blue Chevrolet.

Rev. Froelich of the Maitland Bible Presbyterian Church was introduced by Wilfrid C. Nelson, president for Citizens for Moral Education, before the "services" began at the

Marathon Session Seen For Commission Meeting

County Commissioners face a marathon session at tomorrow's meeting . . . in addition to the public hearings on adoption of the 1970-71 county budget and port authority budget, several other items are scheduled on the agenda.

County Engineer William Bush will give reports on old SR 441 and upon Alpine, Hillcrest and Ridge-wood Avenues.

L. A. Zelnin, Jr. will appear before the board regarding modular homes permits. Zelnig Director Robert Brown will give a report regarding R-3 zoning for R. L. Pardue.

County Planner David Farr will report regarding the Orlando sewage treatment plant. Farr recently attended a meeting of the Tri-County Planning Commission in which a site in South Seminole County was considered for the treatment plant. The Orlando board also agreed to consider allowing this county to bid rates for sewage treatment for all or parts of the county. This was one of the principal dissenting points of the County Commission in its discussion of the matter. Farr has stated that the plan meets with the approval of the Tri-County Planning Board's Technical Committee; however, no definite site has been proposed or set for the location of the South Seminole site. Under discussion has been an east location over the Orlando area. The Seminole County Commission has also agreed that the treatment plant be built in conformity with the Tri-County's 1970 sewer plans.

For County's Schools Opening Postponed

Seminole County School Board at a Friday afternoon meeting voted to delay the opening of school by one week until Sept. 8 to allow more planning time for teachers and school administrative personnel.

The action to open schools on the Tuesday after Labor Day came after Supr. John Angel recommended the board allow more time for teaching transfers and other planning including the planning for a totally desegregated school system as ordered by the U. S. District at Orlando.

In addition to the above reasons, Angel revealed that ordered school buses, which were to be utilized in the many student transfers due to the elimination of several formerly all-black schools, have not arrived.

These reasons coupled with the fact that certain schools and additions expected to have been ready by opening date, Aug. 31 are still not ready for occupancy thus at least another week may be needed. The board did not indicate this was a problem since A. F. Keith, board member, said he would vote against the delay if contractors would interpret this to mean a weakening of the board's legal position of collecting liquidated damage clauses due the schools not being ready in time.

According to Walter Cowan's report to the board, the following schools, LaVieville Middle School addition will be ready on Aug. 30. Oviedo Addition on Aug. 27 and Ivyville Elementary on Sept. 1.

The school delay will mean a slight change in the 1970-71 school calendar and the following revisions were made to conform with giving students the required number of days of instruction.

Two in-service days for teachers were eliminated for regular workdays on Jan. 22 and Feb. 19; also students will attend on Dec. 21-22 instead of receiving these days as part of the Christmas-New Year holiday period.

The fifth day will be picked up from Spring Vacation or the Monday following Easter Sunday, which is usually called Good Monday after Good Friday.

Schools will end on their regular day June 4, according to Stewart Gatchell, administrative aide.

Verbal Fireworks Likely Over Taxes
