They literally buried Seminole County's Freedom of **Choice School plan yesterday!**

A group of dissident school parents led by William Foster, chairman of Pinecrest Freedom of Choice Committee for Neighborhood Schools, held a burial service complete with a casket bearing the message "Here lies Freedom of Choice" at the Seminole County Board of Education office on Commercial Street in Sanford before joining other dissident groups in Orange County for a funeral at the Federal Court building in Orlando.

There, a minister, Rev. A.thur Froelich "preached the funeral" of the dying "choice" plan after federal courts struck down school plans over the state that used the concept for desegregation of schools.

Rev. Froelich of the Maitland Bible Presbyterian Church was introduced by Wilfrid C. Meloon, president for Citizens for Moral Education, before the "services" began at the




