**French Invasion Selected Hottest Story During 1944**

**History's Greatest Operation Went According to Plan**

The *French Invasion* was the greatest story of 1944, in the opinion of 176 American newspaper editors who participated in the AP Newsfeatures year end poll.

The first "break" in the year's biggest story came early in the morning of June 6, when Germans broadcast that Le Havre was being shelled and the Atlantic was being bombed.

The story was quickly confirmed in London. An armada of 3,200 transports and landing craft guarded by 800 warships, swept across the narrow turbulent channel under an umbrella of 11,000 aircraft.

**It Followed Plan**

It was history's greatest amphibious operation and it was carried out according to plan. The Allies fed guns, tanks and men ashore in unprecedented quantities—1,000,000 men in the first 28 days. A prefabricated port was towed across the channel and put into operation, protected by a corridor of ships sunk to form a breakwater.

Gaining a firm foothold, the troops turned west and in three weeks captured Cherbourg. Stalemated for a time within the Normandy area, MacArthur's forces gained the upper hand. By the middle of October, the Allies had broken through the German lines and were steadily moving toward Paris.

**MacArthur's Return**

The third most important story was the return of MacArthur. The 12th and other Americans seriously wounded in the Pacific campaign were brought home to the United States, while others seriously wounded in Europe became a threat to the Japanese.

In one week off France and Normandy, the Allies had taken 15,000 prisoners, driven 150,000 Germans from their positions, destroyed 1,000 tanks, 1,000 planes and 1,000 pieces of heavy equipment.

**Superfights Make News**

The B-29 raids on Japan (fourth greatest story of the year) began July 7. Sixty-four B-29s made their first missions from China supplied by air transport over the Hump, but the Navy raiding bombers through the Pacific now have become available on Saipan and other coral flattops.

**Navy Releases Many Privately Owned Boats**

**WASHINGTON.** — The Navy has announced that it was granting "honorable discharges" to many of the craft that made up its "valiant converted fleet" of patrol vessels—former yachts, cabin cruisers and fishing boats which were hastily mustered into service and sent against the menace of enemy submarines early in 1942.


The changing aspects of the war together with the availability of specially built wooden and steel vessels now make it possible, the Navy disclosed, to return to their owners a great majority of these craft.

These vessels, from the most luxurious yachts down to humble power-driven fishing boats, performed a vitally needed task when no other crafts were available to the Navy Department at that time. The lightly armored vessels, all former pleasure craft, served as mine sweepers, patrol and escort boats, picket boats and coastal-convoy escorts.

They searched our enemy's marines lurking off the Atlantic Coast with "armament" consisting in many instances of a two-way radio, a flare gun and "cannister" containing the parts of their "passenger."

Wherever possible, light-weight depth charges and .30 caliber guns were mounted.

While the Navy did not list the individual craft to be decommissioned, it was learned that such luxurious yachts as the U. S. S. Siren, formerly the Lotusland, and the U. S. S. Aracer were included. The Lotusland, owned by E. K. Dose, of Dayton, Ohio, and the Siren, the name of the National Cash Register Company, was one of the most pain-tail yachts afloat before the





From Bougainville and Rabaul, New Britain, to the still unconquered Celebes, Japs are pinned in hill country and jungles where they have long faced starvation and disease. These by-passed forces have struggled to grow gardens to feed themselves. In New Guinea, where the Japs have been forced to the very tip, garden areas were discovered and soon destroyed by planes scattering poison. 

Stamp No. 40 good for five pounds canning sugar until February 28, 1945. Apply to local boards for supplemental rations.

**SHOES**

Airplane stamps No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3 (Book 3) valid indefinitely.

Shoes containing small quantities of leather to reinforce fabric uppers, manufactured or imported before November 6, have been made ration-free by the Office of Price Administration.

The actions affecting mostly men's and boy's toe shoes such as rubber-soled gymnasium shoes was taken to enable shoe dealers to move current stocks, OPA said.

Period 4 and 5 fuel oil coupons, scheduled to expire September 30, and all definite value coupons left over from the past year's ration may be used in exchange for fuel oil throughout the coming heating year.

Period 2 and Period 3 fuel oil rationing coupons may now be used throughout Florida. Exchange for 10 gallons of fuel oil, District OPA Director Chauncy Butler said today. Period 1 coupons also remain valid for 10 gallons each. Butler said the announcement that rations of fuel oil remain unchanged at 10 gallons per unit emphasizes the need for careful conservation. Unusually heavy military needs and transportation uncertainties prohibited any increases in the rations, OPA said.

**FIREWOOD**

The Board has established rates as follows on all firewood: 16 inch or less \$2. a cord. 24 inch \$18.50 a cord. 48 inch \$16.50 a cord.

**AMMUNITION**

In revoking the 26 per cent premium previously allowed for "single" sales of civilian ammunition, OPA said prices now must be computed in proportion to the full box price. When the premium on less than a box for sales was allowed, OPA said small sales constituted only a small portion of total sales in the nation. However, many retailers last year used the provision to evade ceiling prices, making all buyers purchase their ammunition in broken box lots.

**CIGARETTES**

Initial complaints of alleged illegal sales of cigarettes prompted District OPA Director Chauncy W. Butler to caution smokers today that they also hold the key to whether a full-fledged black market develops from the present acute shortage.

"The shortage," he said, "is being aggravated by smokers buying in advance of personal supplies. Some are apparently willing to pay more than legal prices and are thereby sowing the seed for a black market which will eventually only deprive them further of the cigarettes they cherish."

Under existing regulations, all cigarette retailers are required to post ceiling prices in plain view and are prohibited from exceeding the legal prices by such evasive methods as "steer-in" sales. Individuals are urged to report any suspected violations to their local

**FLORIDA'S RURAL BOYS AND GIRLS ARE DOING MUTH FOR WAR PROGRAM**

Florida may well be proud of the way in which its young people have responded to the war food production program. Indeed, had it not been for the sturdy and patriotic efforts of Florida's rural boys and girls, this state would not have been able to meet the production goals that have been assigned to it for the past three years.

Go into the country districts and talk with the farmers and farm women on the matter, and they will convince you in no uncertain manner of the invaluable aid these youngsters have rendered in increasing the big field and vegetable crops, the great milk producing quantities of milk and cream, and the great numbers of hog and cattle to help meet the greatly expanded needs of the Nation at war.

Florida's 4-H club members and other farm youngsters have had their own private programs for food production their own projects which, incidentally, have been no mean factor in overall results, and they also have outdone all their past efforts in helping their parents with the main farm crop.

Boys and girls have worked long hours in the fields, plowing, hoeing, and harvesting, in groves help to harvest the big fruit crops and in vegetable fields, planting and harvesting such important crops as beans, potatoes, tomatoes, strawberries, peppers, and cabbage. Many a youngster under 16 has taken over a "man's size" job on the farm during the past three years and has filled the gap left by someone who has gone into the armed forces or into war industrial plants.



## Saipan-Based Bombers Hit Jap Factories

### Fighter Planes Now Operating From Air Fields On Mindoro, 1/2 Hour From Manila

A hundred Saipan-based superfortresses bombed aircraft plants at Nagoya on Japan's main island—the fourth B-29 strike of this week. Tokyo claimed 10 superforts were shot down.

American fighter planes in the Philippines began operating from Mindoro, only a half hour from Manila, as ground troops closed the nutcracker on Leyte island's shattered Yamashita line.

Deadly American fighter planes are flying against the Japanese from a newly constructed air-drome on Mindoro Island, less than 150 miles from Manila, Gen. Douglas MacArthur reported.

The announcement that the new field hacked out on Mindoro's southwest coast is in use marked attainment of the primary objective in the landing on the island a day ago today.

Its importance, both to the Americans and the Japanese, was demonstrated as the enemy was demonstrating against installations there. Wednesday, five of the raiders were found in forced aerial combat with American Lightnings and Thunderbolts. One American fighter plane was lost.

Nutcracker Move.

The communiqué also announced that the Tenth and Twenty-Fourth Army Corps in a nutcracker move have formed a junction in the Ormoc Corridor.

The Japanese, particularly on the east side of the road, were driving desperately to keep a gap open so they could all through to the west in the direction of Palompon, their remaining escape port.

But the Japanese were well scattered. While there is still some fighting ahead by isolated pockets, their destruction continues. An additional 2,032 enemy dead were counted in the Ormoc Corridor Wednesday.

Philip Bach has just installed on his farm the first fast freezing unit in Seminole County. The unit was installed by Bill Harvey, local commercial refrigeration serviceman, and C. D. Bates, District Representative of the Florida Power and Light Co. of Daytona Beach, Fla.

Mr. Harvey said that in the near future other farms will be installing similar units in Seminole County. Food and meat can be put in the type of unit over a long period of time and still hold its freshness and quality, he added.

This type freezer will help the farmer keep these products which have been lost in the past by rain, storm, cold weather and bad market condition, Mr. Harvey said.

### Russians Said To Have Begun New Offensive

### Long Dormant Northern Front Flares Up Anew As Reds Move 27 Divisions

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22 (AP)—Russia has promised to meet the rising Allied demand for Red army action by hurling some three army groups against the Germans' eastern front. The United States and Britain have been informed of the offensive's starting date, Washington, Soviet sources reported today.

Berlin announced today the Russians have launched a great new attack in the long-dormant northern sector of the eastern front hurling 27 divisions against the Nazis on a 22-mile front south of Fraenzenburg in East Prussia.

The Reds hammered to within 14 miles of Losone, citadel in Southern Slovakia. Farther to the south, two Russian armies struck out to seal off Budapest from the west.

More than 100,000 Russian troops renewed a great offensive to encircle Budapest, Berlin said, while Moscow reported that Soviet forces had cut two important supply routes for Nazi troops in the impregnable technoblock rail center of Losone (Ljubljana).

Berlin said that the Soviet high command had hurled hundreds of tanks and planes into the attempt to break through the 21-mile Sieckescher Gap southwest of Budapest and also had resumed a great pincer movement on both sides of Pest, eastern half of the besieged Hungarian capital.

It was reported that "major Soviet formations" also were preparing to cross 48-mile long Lake Balaton opposite the Thamy Peninsula where the five-mile wide lake narrows to three-fourths of a mile.

### Area Under Control Of British Is Reported Extended

Athens, Dec. 22 (UPI)—The evacuation of 3,000 ELAS prisoners by sea to an undisclosed destination was reported by the British today as Major M. Scobie's troops moved up the port of Piraeus. British troops were reported extending the area under their control in southern Athens against light resistance.
