German Attack Is Seen As Crucial Battle Of This War

(Continued From Page One)
 German defense systems in the eastern Czechoslovakian mountains. Vanguard units were reported within artillery range of the city of 84,000.

In Italy the Eight Army and Polish and Indian troops virtually cleared all enemy forces from the area south of the Senio River and west of the Bologna-Rimini highway.

Late yesterday an emergency call brought a big force of U. S. Flying Fortress and British Lancasters from British fields to spread 2,000 tons of fragmentation and high explosive bombs on rail and road junctions immediately behind the attacking Nazi forces.

They were forced to bomb through thick ground-clinging clouds and fog which shrouded the battlefield. The planes dived the hard-pressed doughboys the invaluable support of fighters and fighter-bombers.

Nazi Claim Break-through
 As Field Marshall Gerd von Rundstedt's battered army smashed into the deeply-dented American line south of Aachen, Allied leaders were guarded only by the information that "the attack is continuing." This curtain of silence appeared to indicate that the enemy's forward momentum had not been halted. The German attack was making the roads with equipment and men.

(The German High Command declared that Nazi tank forces "have broken through, smashed and dispersed units of the American First Army deep into the enemy rear." Like the Allies, however, the Germans dealt only in generalities.)

Up to tonight the only specific clue as to the extent of the German penetration was the report that British typhoons had attacked a score of enemy armored vehicles "west of Stavelot, a town 22 miles by road from the Reich frontier. Stavelot is 4 1/2 miles southwest of Malmedy and 24 miles from the fortress city of Liege."

In one of the few fighter-bomber operations carried out today, 24 Thunderbolts sprayed two long enemy convoys of tanks and guns near Zolpich and Monchau, damaging at least four tanks and a U. S. Ninth Air Force figure claimed 112 German tanks, half-tracks and other vehicles destroyed or damaged Monday.

Nazi Airmen Land Punched
 As weather permitted the German air force, continued to hit back hard in support of the counter-offensive, and it was estimated the enemy was dipping into his gasoline reserves at the rate of 630,000 gallons a week. An RAF officer indicated the enemy's fuel shortage was becoming acute.

Despite the terrific enemy pressure against its right, the First Army sustained its pressure along the Roer River east of Aachen, sending patrols across the stream into the Nazi stronghold of Duren, 20 miles from Cologne.

Fog rolled like grey surf along the Ninth Army front just to the north, while ever-increasing floods in Holland limited the British and Canadians to patrolling. Clouds clung to the treetops.

German resistance stiffened markedly all along the Siegfried Line from Luxembourg to Switzerland and it was plain that the Allied Winter offensive had been fought to a temporary standstill.

Leut. Gen. George S. Patton's Third Army lines remained practically unchanged—his gains dwindled to almost nothing after 41 days of steady advances. Yesterday's prisoner count on the entire Saar front was only 63, by far the lowest since November 8.

Boys In Pacific Use Milk to Shave In

STARKE, Dec. 20. (FNS)—In a special dispatch to the Bradford County Telegraph, T/Sgt. A. W. Anderson, Jr., former member of the Telegraph staff, gives an interesting account of life in the Netherlands East Indies as experienced by our boys stationed there.

"The ingenuity of the overseas soldier is endless," he states, "when we invaded this island we couldn't even find enough water to drink, much less for washing and shaving. That didn't stop G. I. Joe, we shaved in coconut milk, which gave us water and lotion in one."

"Bamboo is raised in commercial quantities on this isle, not small stuff like you see around Starke, but hogg bamboo as thick as eight inches and up to 70 feet in height."

Anderson tells how Private James Scott of Tampa conceived the idea of using bamboo stocks as receptacles for liquid refreshment by converting them into ersatz Thermos bottles.

Scott, with a long slender stick broke out the thin partitions that seal each bamboo joint into an individual compartment, except for the bottom partition. This made the interior of the bamboo pole into a receptacle of several quart capacity. A wooden plug fits into the top of the stalk to keep out bugs and trash, while a small hole in the base serves as a spigot when the plug is removed. Designed originally for drinking water, Scott found that by adding sugar and currants he had a very palatable wine in a week's time. Other GIs took up the fad and now when visitors drop in they make with the hospitality by serving a Lily cup of home-brew or bedstead wine.

French Invasion Selected Hottest Story During 1944

History's Greatest Operation Went Acording to Plan

The "break" in the year's biggest story came early in the morning of June 6, when German planes broadcast that Le Harve was being shelled and the Atlantic Wall being assaulted.

The story was quickly confirmed in London. An armada of 3,200 transports and landing craft, guarded by 800 warships, swept across the narrow turbulent channel under an umbrella of 11,000 aircraft.

It Followed Plan

It was history's greatest amphibious operation and it was carried out according to plan. The Allies led tanks, tanks and more tanks in unprecedented quantities—1,600,000 men in the first 28 days. A prefabricated port was towed across the channel and put into operation, protected by a cordon of ships sunk to form a breakwater.

Gaining a firm foothold, the troops turned west and in three weeks captured Cherbourg. WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 25 (Special)—Despite the big gains of the war in China, the full strength of the Japanese army has not yet reached, according to the Office of War Information.

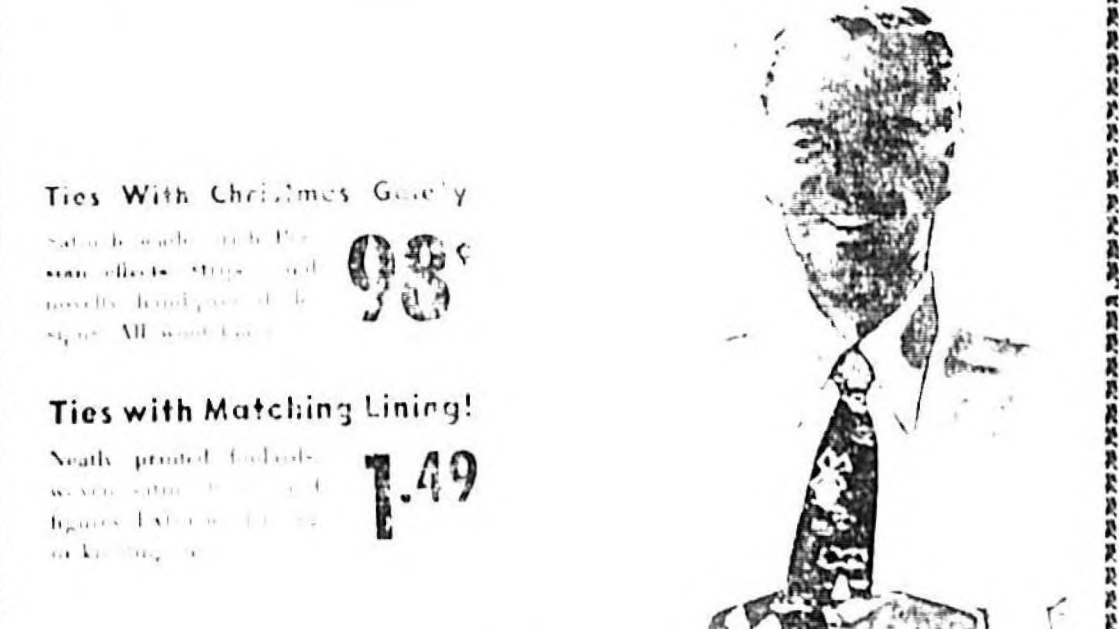

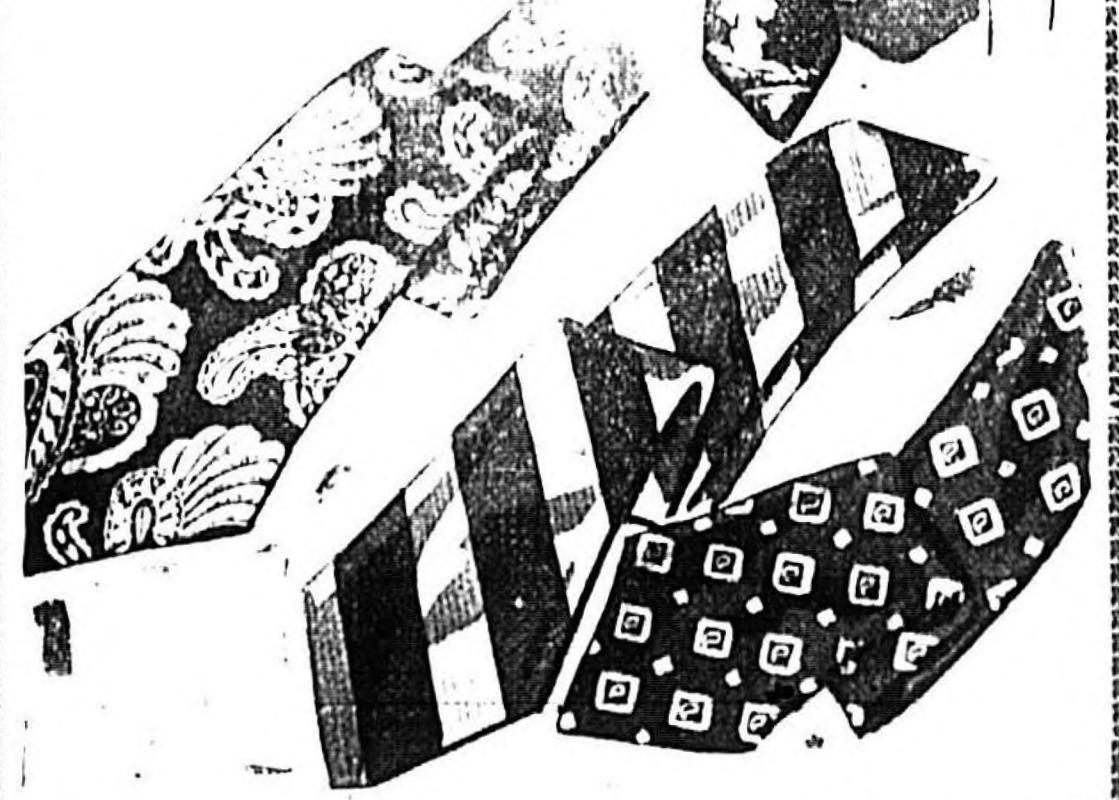

Navy Releases Many Privately Owned Boats

WASHINGTON, — The Navy has announced that it was granting "honorable discharges" to many of the craft that made up its "valiant converted fleet" of patrol vessels—former yachts, cabin cruisers and fishing boats, which were hastily mustered into service and sent against the menace of enemy submarines early in 1942.

The changing aspects of the war together with the availability of specially built wooden and steel vessels now make it possible, the Navy disclosed, to return to their owners a great majority of these craft.

These vessels, from the most luxurious yachts down to humble power-driven fishing boats, performed a vitally needed task when no other craft were available. The Navy Department said. The lightly armed vessels, all former pleasure craft, served as mine sweepers, patrol and escort boats, picket boats and coastal-convoy escorts.

They searched for enemy submarines lurking off the Atlantic Coast with "armament" consisting in many instances of a two-way radio, a flare gun and "abundant courage on the part of their personnel." Wherever possible, light-weight depth charges and 30 caliber guns were mounted.

While the Navy did not list the individual craft to be decommissioned, it was learned that such luxurious yachts as the U. S. S. Siron, formerly the Lotusland, and the U. S. S. Aracer were included. The Lotusland, owned by E. K. Gossett, of Oyster, Ohio, chairman of the board of the National Coast Lineer Company, was one of the most valuable yachts afloat before the

1/2 cup soft bread crumbs
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons melted margarine
3 tablespoons chopped dill pickle

1 tablespoon chopped parsley
1/2 tablespoon chopped capers
1/2 tablespoon chopped celery

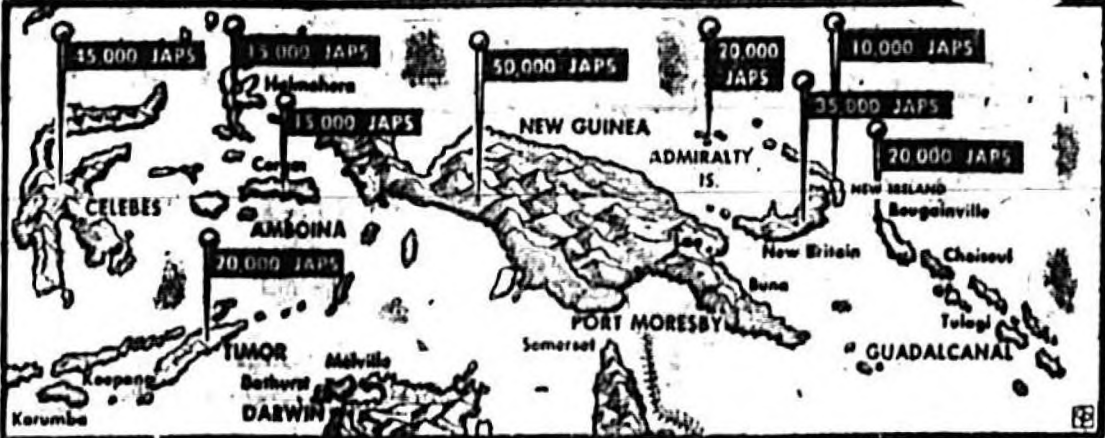

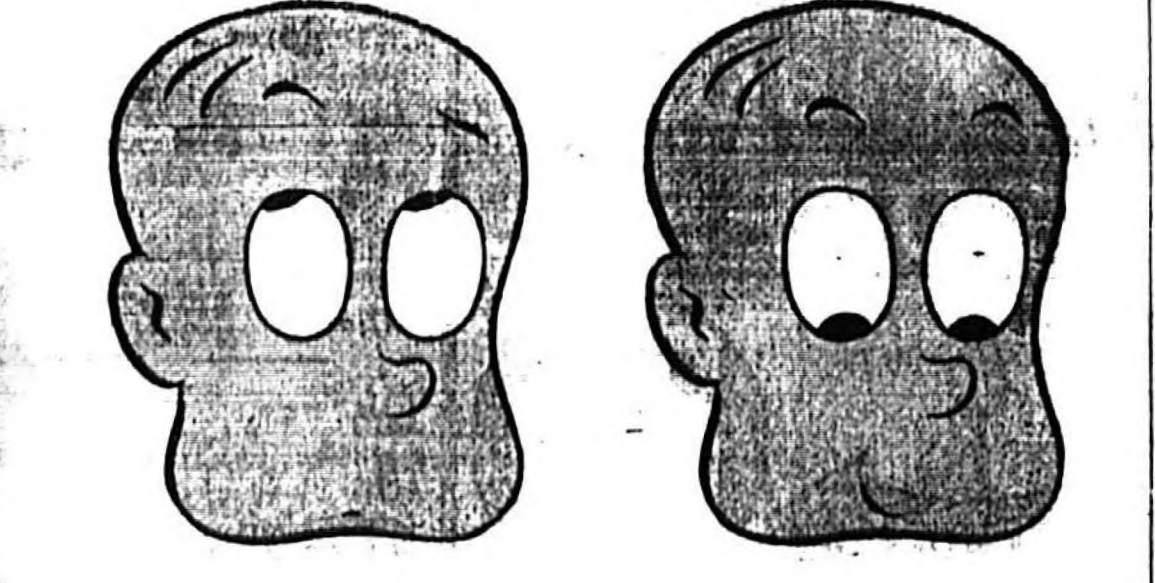

RATIONING CALENDAR

PROCESSED FOODS
Blue A8 through B2 (Book 4) good indefinitely.

MEATS AND FATS
Red A8 through S5 (Book 4) now valid as 10 points each for use with tokens. Both good indefinitely.

The ration value of creamery butter has been increased to 20 red points per pound.

SUGAR
Sugar stamps No. 30, No. 31, No. 32, No. 33 and No. 34 now good for five pounds each indefinitely.

CANNING SUGAR
Stamp No. 40 good for five pounds canning sugar until February 28, 1946. Apply to local boards for supplemental rations.

SHOES
Airplane stamps No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3 (Book 3) valid indefinitely.

Shops containing small quantities of leather to recondition fabric uppers, manufactured or imported before November 6, have been made ration-free by the Office of Price Administration.

The action, affecting mostly men's and boys' type shoes such as rubber-soled gymnasium shoes, was taken to enable shoe dealers to move current stocks, OPA said.

GASOLINE
A-13 coupons valid through December 21. On Dec. 22, A-14 coupons become valid through March 21. Rationing rules now require that every car owner write his license number and state on each gasoline coupon in his possession as soon as they are issued him by the rationing board.

FUEL OIL
Period 4 and 5 coupons from last year and Period 1 coupons

for this season now valid, (Alabama, Tennessee, Mississippi, not affected.)

Period 4 and 5 fuel oil coupons, scheduled to expire September 30, and all definite value coupons left over from the past year's ration, may be used in exchange for fuel oil throughout the coming heating year.

Period 2 and Period 3 fuel oil rationing coupons may now be used throughout Florida in exchange for 10 gallons of fuel oil, District OPA Director Chauncey Butler said today. Period 1 coupons also remain valid for 10 gallons each. Butler said the announcement that rations of fuel oil remain unchanged at 10 gallons per unit emphasizes the need for careful conservation. Unusually heavy military needs and transportation uncertainties prohibited any increases in the rations, OPA said.

FIREWOOD
The Board has established prices as follows on all firewood: 16 inch or less \$21 a cord, 24 inch \$18.50 a cord, 48 inch \$16.50 a cord.

AMMUNITION
In revoking the 25 per cent premium previously allowed for "single" sales of civilian ammunition, OPA said prices now must be computed in proportion to the full box price. When the premium on less than box lot sales was allowed, OPA said, such sales constituted only a small portion of total sales in the nation. However, many retailers last year used the provision to evade ceiling prices, making all buyers purchase their ammunition in broken box lots.

CIGARETTES
Initial complaint of alleged illicit sales of cigarettes prompted District OPA Director Chauncey W. Butler to caution smokers today that they also hold the key to whether a full-fledged black market develops from the present acute shortage.

"The shortage," he said, "is obviously aggravated by smokers buying in advance of normal needs to build up personal supplies. Some are apparently willing to pay more than legal prices and are thereby sowing the seed for a black market which will eventually only deprive them further of the cigarettes they cherish."

Under existing regulations, all cigarette retailers are required to post ceiling prices in plain view and are prohibited from exceeding the legal price by such evasive methods as "tie-in" sales. In districts are urged to report any suspected violations to their local

FLORIDA'S RURAL BOYS AND GIRLS ARE DOING MUCH FOR WAR PROGRAM

Florida may well be proud of the way in which its farm youth have responded to the war food production program. Indeed, had it not been for the sturdy and patriotic efforts of Florida's rural boys and girls, this state would not have been able to meet the production goals that have been assigned to it for the past three years.

Go into the country districts and talk with the farmers and farm women on the matter, and they will convince you in no uncertain manner of the invaluable aid these youngsters have rendered in producing the big field and vegetable crops, the record-breaking quantities of milk and eggs, and the great numbers of hog and cattle to help meet the greatly expanded needs of the Nation at war.

Florida's 4-H club members and other farm youngsters have had their own private programs for food production, their own projects which, incidentally, have been no mean factor in overall results, and they also have outdone all their past efforts in helping their parents with the main farm crops.

Boys and girls have worked long hours in the fields, plowing, hoeing, and harvesting, in groves help to harvest the big fruit crops and in vegetable fields, planting and harvesting such important crops as beans, potatoes, tomatoes, strawberries, peaches, and cabbage. Many a youngster under 15 has taken over a "man's size" job on the farm during the past three years and has filled the gap left by someone who has gone into the armed forces or into war industrial plants.
