Tucker Plans Talk, Program In North Orlando

The North Orlando Garden Club will sponsor a speech and program by Cecil Tucker, Seminole County agent, at the Village Recreation Center at 1:30 p.m. Thursday.

This first of a series of such programs planned for various communities in the county will bring the opportunity to residents of learning care of lawns and gardens.

Tucker's talk on grasses and their care will include choosing the variety, building a new lawn and maintenance of the lawn and will be followed by a question and answer period.

At this point, a 15-minute intermission will be provided in order that residents may get samples from their individual locations for soil analyses.

The second part of the program, entitled "Yardening and Gardening," will include a film on visual illustrations and a clinic on diseased plants.

For this, the county agent advises it will be sufficient to bring a leaf from a diseased plant for diagnosis. If grass samples are brought, he asks that the plug and with some dead and some live roots be provided. The runner should be at least one foot long and the plug three or four inches wide.

Tucker is presenting this program to help residents beautify their lawns and to establish successful gardens.

North Orlando Garden Club members urge all residents to join them in expressing their gratitude for the public service by attending the Thursday program.

U. S., Russia Set Talks On Space Effort

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI)—The United States and Russia, acting quickly on the agreement between President Kennedy and Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, today planned talks next week on their joint exploration of space.

Dr. Hugh L. Dryden, deputy director of the U. S. National Aeronautics and Space Agency (NASA), and Soviet academician A. A. Blagonravov will begin negotiations in New York next Tuesday, it was announced.

Khrushchev early Wednesday accepted the President's offer of space collaboration, making it dependent "in some degree" upon a disarmament agreement.

Both leaders instructed their delegates to the UN Committee on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space to arrange a meeting on details.

Avery criticized opponents of the directive and said if the people of the county "do not accept this opportunity to boost public health they are rendering themselves a grave injustice."

Geneva Talks In 'Complete Stalemate'

GENEVA (UPI)—The Soviet Union and the Western powers declared themselves hopelessly deadlocked on the question of a nuclear test ban today and decided to report their failure to the 17-nation disarmament conference Friday.

"There is a complete stalemate," Soviet delegate Semyon K. Tsarapkin told newsmen after the nuclear subcommittee of the conference broke up following a marathon two hour and 40 minute session.

"There was no advance of any kind and no change of position," the Soviet delegate said.

The long session took place amid reports the Western powers might suggest an all-neutral inspection system to police a nuclear test ban.

But such a suggestion would be dependent on Soviet acceptance of a treaty embodying the principle of international inspection and control.

Tsarapkin made it quite clear after today's session that the Russians had not budged from their refusal to accept such a principle. A British spokesman said no new plans of any kind were discussed.

Official sources said the idea of a neutral inspection system would be to overcome Russian objection to Western inspectors on Soviet territory.

BEDFORD VILLAGE, N. Y. (UPI)—Mrs. June Swenson faced a horrifying decision which no mother should have to make—which of her young daughters should live.

The 28-year-old mother was at her household chores Wednesday while Jean, 3, and Susan, 5, played in the back yard of their Westchester County home.

Mrs. Swenson looked back and saw that Jean was motionless. The horror of the decision could not have lasted more than a split second. The mother decided to save the child she could see.

She applied artificial respiration and Jean began to breathe. She carried the child quickly to the house and telephoned for help.

Within minutes the Katonah rescue squad arrived and recovered Susan's lifeless body.

Castro Praises 'Peaceful' Bomb

MIAMI (UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro, a proud recipient of the Lenin (formerly Stalin) Peace prize, praised Russia Wednesday night for its contribution "to the cause of peace."

In a 68-minute speech broadcast by Radio Havana, Castro said Russia's massive atomic nuclear bombs are different from those tested by the West.

"The imperialists explode bombs to frighten and blackmail people," Castro said, "the Soviets do it to let the imperialists know that anyone who touches them may unleash a war."

Floods Hit Eastern Seaboard

A storm center off Virginia brought high tides and flooding as far north as Connecticut today. Rising rivers forced some Midwesterners from their homes.

Thunderstorms from the Ohio Valley to the North Carolina coast dropped 1.47 inches of rain at Charleston, W. Va. Cincinnati, Ohio, had 1.98 inches of rain and Indianapolis, Ind., reported 1.96 inches. Half inch rains washed the coasts of Washington and Oregon early today. Burns, Ore., had a 2-inch snowfall.

Forty-five-mile wind gusts at Peoria, Ill., sent 24 barges crumpling against two bridges, causing \$200,000 damage Wednesday.

The temperature climbed to 86 degrees Wednesday at Mobile, Ala., a record for the date.

Two dozen families living along the Des Moines River near the Chicago suburb of Libertyville were forced from their homes by the flooding stream and two dozen more were planning to leave.

Water flowed nearly a foot deep through streets in the Libertyville area.

Police ordered 18 families to evacuate homes at West Des Moines, Iowa, when an ice jam sent the Racoon River spilling out of its banks. The Des Moines River was out of its banks at Ottumwa, Eddyville and Triary, Iowa, flooding lowlands. The Skunk River was flooding at Sigourney, Iowa.

A flood threat on the Kawassia River north of Bay City, Mich., ended Wednesday when an ice jam broke up. However, high water closed roads north and south of Grand Rapids, Mich., where the Grand River continued its rise.

Tides 3 feet above normal washed the Atlantic Coast from Virginia to Connecticut early today. However, the high tides failed to flood the homes of 50 persons who were evacuated from Strathmere in New Jersey's Cape May County.

Syrians Again Fire On Israel

JERUSALEM, Israel (UPI)—Syrian border troops opened fire Wednesday night and again today on Israeli settlements in upper Galilee.

Jerusalem radio said the Syrians shot today at the Kfar Soud settlement with machine guns, but there were no casualties and fire was not returned.

Israel lodged a complaint with the mixed armistice commission, the radio said.

This followed another protest charging the Syrians opened fire on an upper Galilee settlement Wednesday night. Israeli authorities said the Syrians continued to fire for 20 minutes with small arms and machine guns, but no one was injured.

Pressure Put On Dixie Bloc

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield threatened the Senate today with night and Saturday sessions in an effort to wear down a Southern talkathon against anti-poll tax legislation.

As the Senate met at 9 a.m.—three hours earlier than customary—Mansfield served notice he would press for a final showdown on the proposed constitutional amendment to abolish the poll tax as a voting requirement.

He announced the Senate probably would be kept in session tonight until perhaps midnight and resume Friday at 9 a.m. It was quite likely there would be a Saturday session, the Montana Democrat said.

His announcement was endorsed by acting Republican Leader Thomas H. Kuchel, Calif., who promised there will be "no obstruction" from his side of the aisle.

LAHOIE, Pakistan (UPI)—Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy went to a horse show today and was presented a prize by gelding to add to an earlier gift of two Indian tiger cubs. America's first lady and her host, Pakistan President Mohammed Ayub Khan, rode to the show in a black and gold-trimmed carriage pulled by six fine horses.

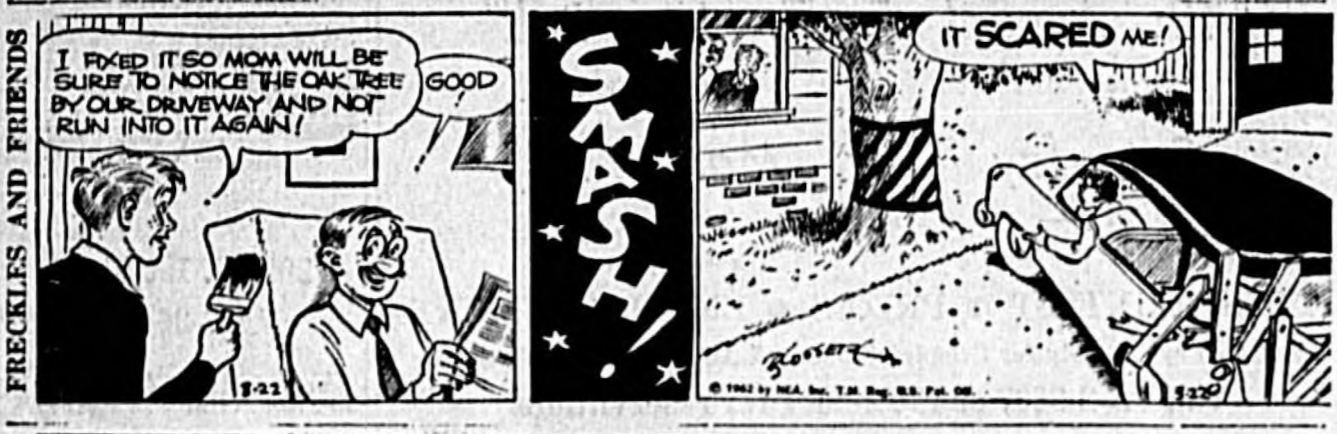
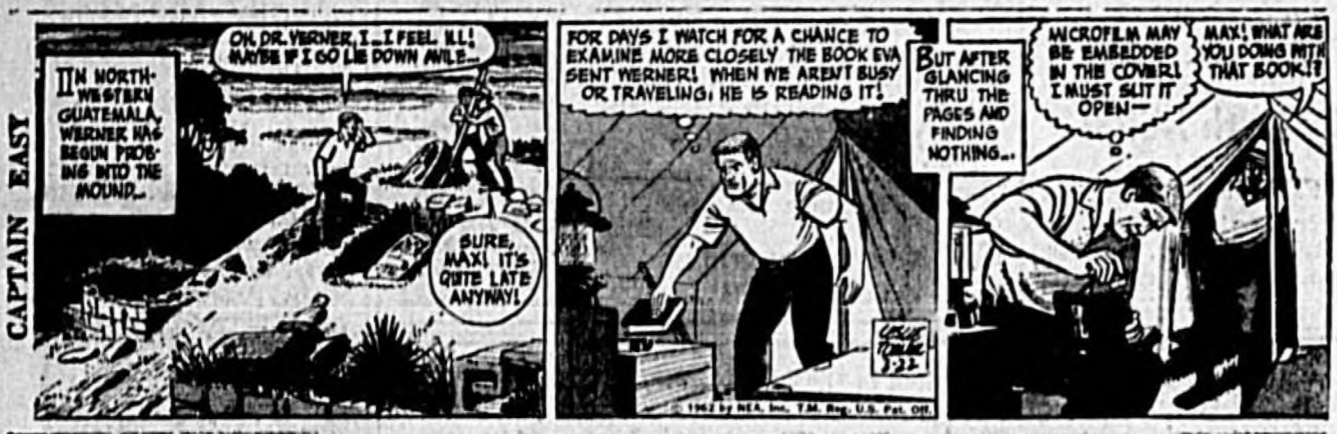
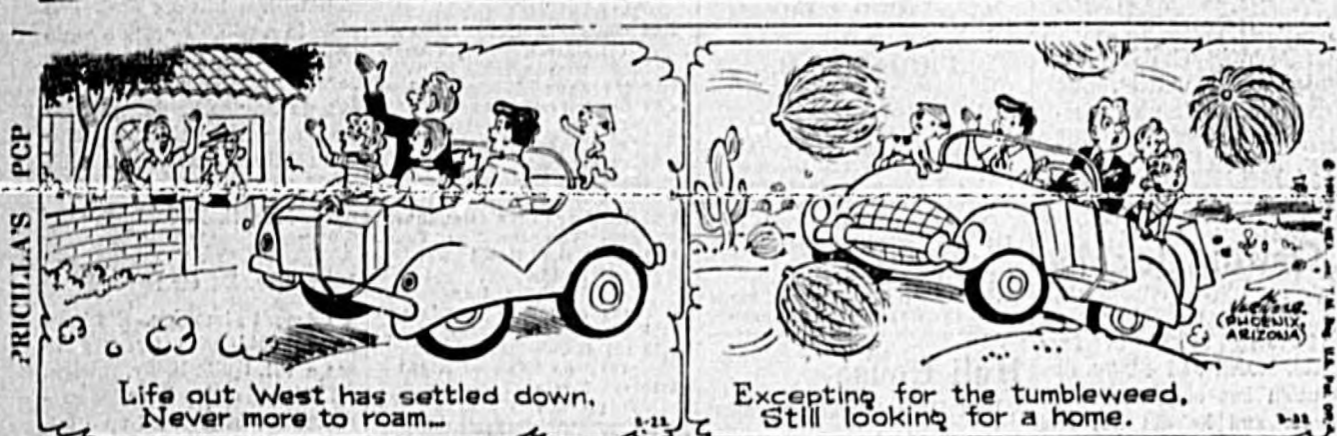
