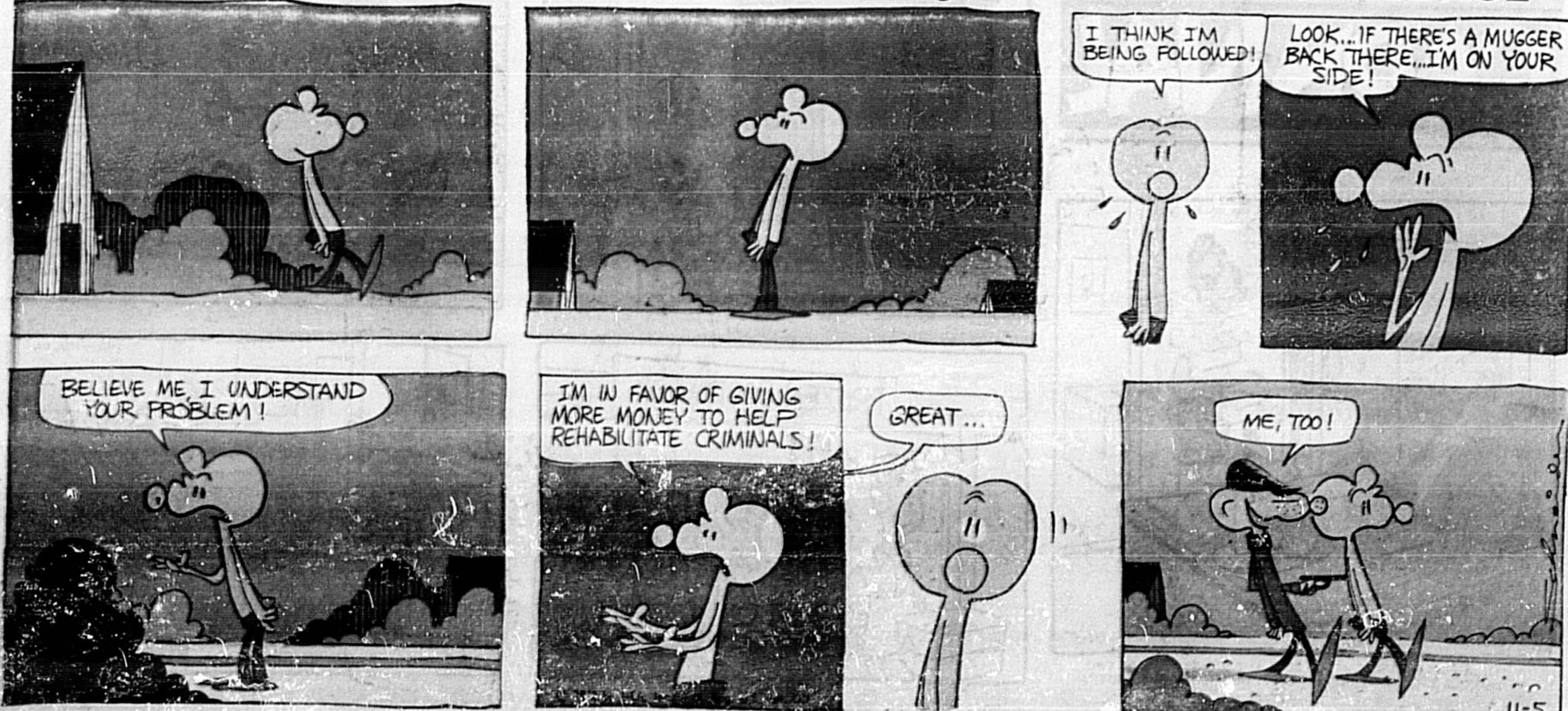

# Campaigns In Homestretch

Democratic challenger George McGovern sweeps from New York to Los Angeles today to climax his uphill presidential drive while President Nixon speaks from his San Clemente, Calif., home in an election-eve windup that typifies the 1972 campaign.

Democratic vice-presidential nominee Sargent Shriver also scheduled a long day of campaigning, from Pittsburgh to Houston, Tex., and Vice President Spiro T. Agnew planned last-day appearances in Philadelphia and Richmond, Va.

Independent polls continued to forecast a Nixon-Agnew landslide in Tuesday's balloting, that is expected to draw a record total of more than 80 million to the nation's voting booths.

Democrats remain favored to retain House and Senate control, plus a majority of governorships.

In a day that took him from St. Louis to Moline, Ill., to New York City Sunday, McGovern continued to accuse President Nixon of deceiving the nation about Vietnam peace prospects and said Nixon has been ruling the country like "a Roman emperor" without regard for congressional powers.

In a nationwide television speech from New York Sunday night, he said peace is not at hand, as claimed by the Nixon administration. "It is not even in sight." He said the remaining issues in the agreement to be worked out with Hanoi are the "central issues of the war. And Mr. Nixon knows it."

McGovern said the administration's "deception" about prospects for peace "is the ultimate utilization of the technique that has become known as 'the big lie.'"

Nixon, meanwhile, spent much of the day relaxing at his oceanfront San Clemente home while declaring in a paid radio speech that the choice in Tuesday's election "is clear-cut and unambiguous."

He said the balloting could be "one of our finest hours" and listed 10 goals, ranging from "a secure and prosperous America" to "a great and good America," which he said could be achieved "no matter who wins in the next two days."

Shriver, winding up an East Coast swing from New Hampshire to Baltimore, said the North Vietnamese now have confirmed the statement with which he started off the campaign—that Nixon "blew" a chance to end the war four years ago.

# PUD Zoning Requests Before Commission

Two controversial PUD developments, both of which were voted by the county Planning and Zoning Board are among the agenda items for tomorrow's session of the County Commission.

At a workshop meeting commencing at 9 a.m., at 11:45 a.m. representatives of Runnymede Corporation will be on hand to discuss their development with the commissioners.

The Planning and Zoning Board acted this, at their Oct. 11 meeting.

The development encompasses 1,600 acres north of SR 434, including the Mid-Florida Country Club. Plans include condominiums, cluster homes and detached houses as well as an 18-hole golf course.

Developer Alan Dayton agreed to donate a 15 acre school site, and \$75,000 for school construction. When building permits reached 2,000, he said, he would donate another 15 acre site or \$150,000 and at 4,000 building permits another 15 acre site or another \$150,000. Houses would be in the \$25,000-\$35,000 range.

# Courts To Review Church School \$\$

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court today agreed to review a New York law that provided \$28 million a year in state funds for parochial schools until it was declared unconstitutional.

The justices acted on appeals from the ruling by a three-judge panel in New York City last April. The case will be heard early next year and a final state Senate and three Roman Catholic and two Jewish parochial schools.

A 19-year-old Orlando woman was driven to Seminole County and raped at gunpoint this morning by two county males after one of them jumped into her car while it was stopped for the traffic light at Mills and Robinson in Orlando.

The first subject, who jumped into the car, instructed the girl to drive to Carter Street, where the second suspect entered the car and the first took over the driving. According to Deputy Mike McClung, who investigated the incident, the girl was taken to an orange grove off Orlando Road just inside Seminole County, where they both assaulted her.

The first subject then drove the car back to Carter Street and let the other man out. He then proceeded to drive around

for awhile before stopping the car and escaping on foot.

The girl drove home and was later taken to Orange Memorial Hospital where she was examined by the county medical examiner.

## Info 'Stolen' From Computer

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP)—An electronics whiz has pleaded guilty to pirating information by telephone from a rival company's computer. The industrial cloak and dagger episode involves Hugh Jeffrey Ward, 36, of Palo Alto, his employer, University Computing Co. of Palo Alto, its competitor, Information Systems Design, Inc., of Oakland, and a computer program worth about \$15,000.

Ward reversed his previous innocent plea Friday when Alameda County Deputy Dist. Atty. Charles Herbert agreed to drop a second count of grand theft "in the interests of justice."

Ward, free on \$7,500 bail, was ordered to appear for sentencing in Superior Court on Nov. 27. He faces a possible 1-10 year state prison term or one year in county jail and a \$5,000 fine. Court records divulged details of the episode: A caller used an identification code number belonging to an ISD customer to feed ISD's multimillion-dollar Univac 1190 computer here into releasing alleged trade secrets on Jan. 19, 1971.

ISD suspected it had been duped when the victimized computer began spewing out data cards for no apparent reason and two weeks later one of its customers reported receipt of 515 undecoded computer punch cards. Subsequent investigation by ISD revealed the cards contained the computer programs devised to print readouts for Aerojet General Corp. of Folsom, Calif., a firm that used ISD as its main supplier of computer services and UUC as a backup source.

ISD said the hijacked program fed data into the computer's memory bank over a telephone and the diagram, chart or graph responding to the data will be plotted at the customer's site.

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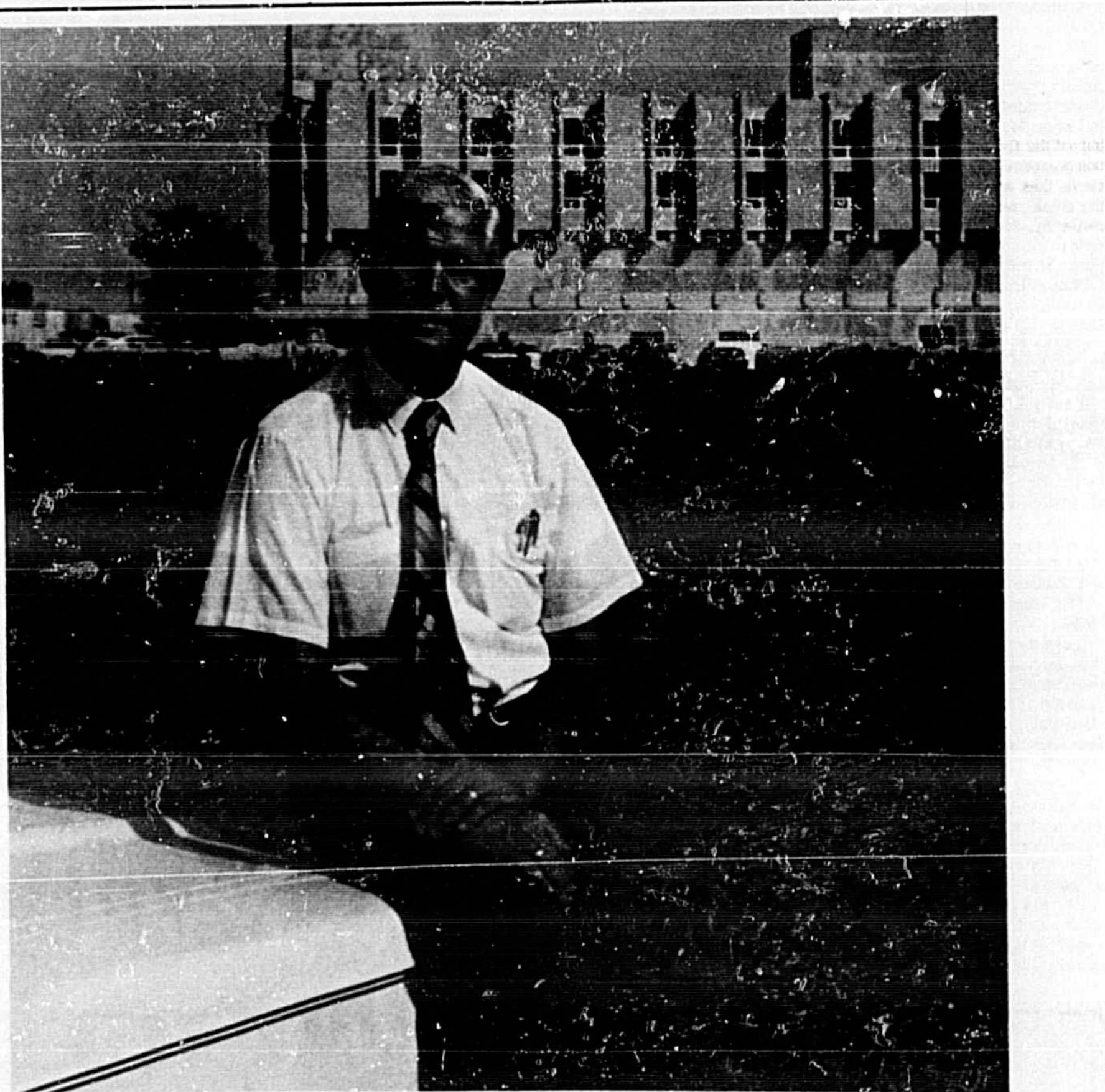

## By Florida Scientists 'Friendly' Insect Is Sought

By JERE MOORE JR. TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Scientists, working under strict security, will soon begin searching for a friendly insect to free the state of insects like the pesky love bug or dreaded screwworm.

A \$37,000 laboratory is being built at the University of Florida as a first major step toward substituting biological controls for chemicals.

Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Conner says the aim is to protect the environment while "getting the job done in providing a food supply."

The laboratory will be operated by the university, the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the state Agriculture Department's Plant Industry Division.

Conner would not venture a guess as to what agents the laboratory might discover to launch an attack on aquatic weeds, love bugs, fire ants, mosquitoes, fruit flies or screwworms.

The same technique was used this fall when two widely separated cases of screwworm larvae were found.

More than five million sterile flies were dropped in the Sebring area after larvae were found in late September on a ranch, and three million were dropped in the Oxford area Friday, a week after larvae were found near there.

Conner said his department did not think the two cases were connected and did not know how the flies got into Florida.

Texas had a very heavy summer and some flies have spread to Southeastern states.

## Some Have Jumped Into Their Rafts

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Democratic candidates throughout the state have been building life rafts so they can row away if the McGovern presidential ship sinks Tuesday. Some have jumped overboard already.

Republicans are hoping that a tidal wave of votes for President Nixon in his race with Democratic Sen. George McGovern will wash some of their candidates to the victory shore. But most Republican officials concede this is likely to play a role only in close contests, and Democrats point to the Florida tradition of ballot splitting on presidential and state offices.

Florida is regarded as certain to vote for Nixon, the size of his margin being the main point of conjecture.

Republican State Chairman L. E. "Tommy" Thomas predicts a million-vote margin, but most observers say about half that is more likely.

The smaller forecast still would be a record. The biggest presidential margin ever was 163,000 for Dwight D. Eisenhower over Adlai E. Stevenson in 1956.

Nixon carried the state by 110,000 votes in 1968 receiving 66,894 to 678,794 for Democrat Hubert H. Humphrey and 624,307 for American party candidate George C. Wallace.

Secretary of State Richard Stone has predicted 70 to 75 percent of the state's 3.5 million voters will cast ballots Tuesday.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The ballots in some areas will make it less convenient to vote a straight party ticket because candidates for an office are lined up side by side, rather than one placed on top of the other.

They claimed the government scheduled their hearing the day before the national election to prevent them from campaigning.

Foss, 25, of Hialeah, Fla.; Donald P. Perdue, 23, of Hollywood, Fla., and Stanley K. Michelson, 23, of Gainesville. Nonmember John Briggs, 20, of Gainesville is the eighth defendant.

Michelson was added to the list as an accessory and Briggs as a co-conspirator in a new indictment returned by a grand jury at Tallahassee, Fla., last month.

At the original arraignment in August, held the morning after the GOP Convention ended at Miami Beach, the six defendants pleaded innocent to the charges but guilty to offenses against Vietnamese civilians. Their pleas followed VVAW policy of admitting killings and other actions while serving with U.S. military forces in Vietnam.

At the August hearing, VVAW members staged a march from the University of Florida campus to the downtown federal building and sent as many of their number inside as the small courtroom would seat.

"We are going to pack the courtroom again," said a spokesman for the group, "but of course there won't be as many of us here this time."

Several VVAW members from around the nation stopped here for the occasion en route home from demonstrating at the Miami Beach convention.

Although there were hundreds of arrests during street disturbances on the final night of the GOP convention, no VVAW members were among them.

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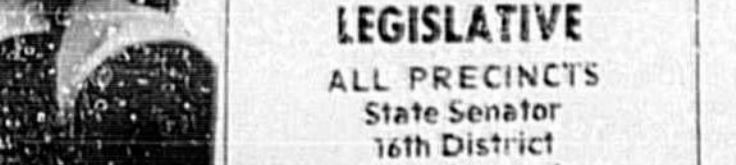

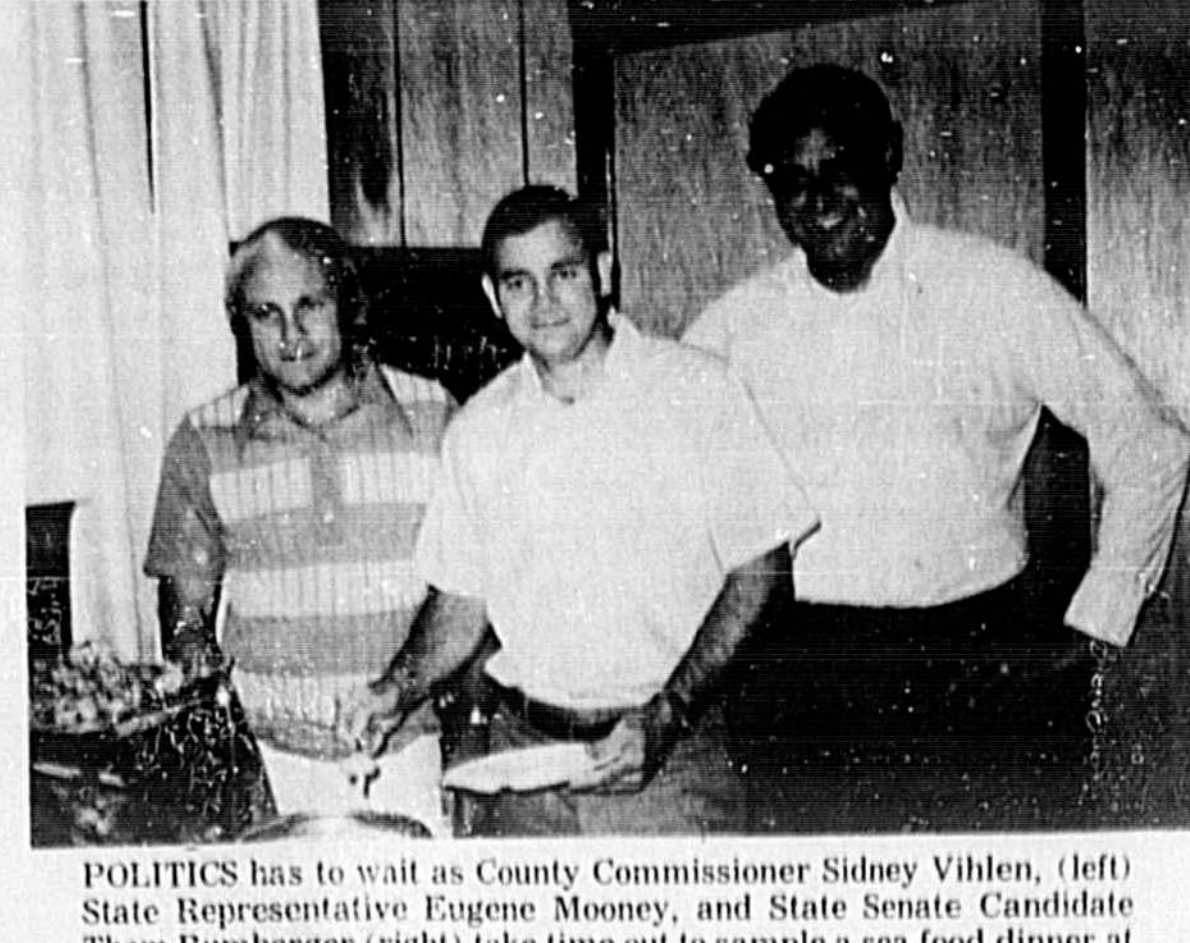

# Communist Gunners Hit U.S. Choppers

SAIGON (AP) — Communist forces shot down three U.S. helicopters within 14 miles of Da Nang Sunday, killing two Americans and wounding three, the U.S. Command announced today.  
An Army AH1 Cobra gunship was hit by small arms fire and crashed in flames 14 miles south of Da Nang, killing one crewman and wounding the second.  
An OH6 light observation helicopter was shot down as it attempted to recover the casualties, and one of its crew was wounded. A second OH6 then went in and picked up the dead and wounded, and a relief pilot flew out the damaged OH6. The Cobra gunship was destroyed.  
About eight hours later, another OH6 was shot down by small arms fire six miles to the north. The U.S. Command said one crewman was killed, the second was wounded and the helicopter was destroyed.  
The losses raised to 8,488 the total number of U.S. aircraft reported lost to all causes in the war. This includes 4,851 helicopters.  
U.S. B52 bombers swept to within 56 miles of the 20th parallel today in their deepest raids against North Vietnam since the resumption of full-scale bombing last April. The raids 34 miles north of Vinh were part of a concerted effort to blunt a Communist buildup of troops and supplies in all four countries of Indochina in anticipation of a cease-fire, U.S. military sources said.

# Vogt, Lori Wilson Favored In Brevard

COCOA — County Commission Chairman Lori Wilson apparently has built up a steady lead in Brevard in the four-way race for State Senate Seat 16. That is the result of a voter survey taken in Brevard this week by Market Opinion Research of Detroit, which has done extensive political polling nationally.  
According to the survey, Lori Wilson, an independent candidate, leads the field. Democrat Tom Dolan is second, Republican Hugh Evans third, and independent Barbara Morehead a distant fourth. The percentages in the countywide survey are: Lori Wilson, 33.1; Tom Dolan, 22.2; Hugh Evans, 21.5; Barbara Morehead, 4.4; Undecided, 18.8.  
All four candidates are from Brevard, but they also will be on the ballot in Seminole county, since Senate district 16 includes Seminole, Brevard, Osceola and part of northwest Orange County.  
The senate seat 16 race has especially high interest Tuesday because it is a four-way contest. The candidate getting the highest number of votes will win, whether or not he has a majority. There will be no runoff.  
If Mrs. Wilson should win the senate seat, she would become the first candidate in Florida ever to win a major elective office without political affiliation. The survey which shows Mrs. Wilson's strong following in Brevard is based on a cross-section of 53 registered voters, in a poll similar to the national Gallup polls.  
The same survey asked voters their preferences in Senate district 17, which also includes Seminole, Osceola, Brevard and a portion of northwest Orange county.  
Those Brevard county results were: John Vogt (D), 39.8; Thom Rumberger (R), 32.2; Undecided, 28.0.

# Political Dirty Work Charges Levelled Locally

William Schaffner, chairman of the Seminole Republican Executive Committee, has advised The Herald that he is contacting the office of the state attorney to report a violation of the election law against Al Davis, incumbent County Commissioner seeking reelection to the District 3 seat.  
Schaffner alleged that on Sunday morning he noticed "yard signs" placed at vantage points throughout South Seminole County along right-of-way. These, Schaffner said, were bumper stickers below the photo and above the name of Davis.  
The stickers read, according to Schaffner, "Nixon-Agnew" and "Nixon now." While Schaffner did not accuse Davis of the act, he said it was peculiar that each was placed at exactly the same angle.  
Commissioner Al Davis, apprised of the allegations, came into The Herald office at press time, and categorically denied all of the charges. Davis maintains he has no idea who could be responsible for the acts alleged by Schaffner. However, often it has been pointed out by political observers, it is a normal political maneuver which has occurred on numerous political elections upon other occasions.  
Davis stated, "I want to tell the voting public that Al Davis is running upon his merits and as a Democrat, and his merits alone. I will continue to be responsive to the needs of all of Seminole County and its citizens."  
At press time Jack Fulenwider, investigator for the state attorney office was contacted by The Herald.  
Fulenwider said that Schaffner had filed the complaint against Davis, but that he advised him that there is nothing the office of the state attorney can do at this point. The only recourse, Fulenwider said if someone observed the person placing the stickers upon Davis' signs, and this individual would sign an affidavit to this effect.  
"It is futile to investigate the matter," Fulenwider said, "we have nothing to go on. It might well have been a Nixon worker."

# Shevin's Proposals Hit Discrimination

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—The director of the state's Human Relations Commission says sweeping civil rights proposals by Atty. Gen. Robert Shevin will "bring Florida into the modern age of human rights."

Robert R. Rackleff said legislation proposed by Shevin could give his agency the power to effectively crack down on discriminatory practices throughout the state.

Shevin Friday unveiled a legislative proposal that would give Florida a comprehensive state civil rights law and beef up the human relations commission to enforce it.

Shevin's bill spells out for the first time in Florida law exactly what constitutes illegal discrimination in public accommodations, housing, real estate, employment and education.

It also gives the commission, which is now authorized only to seek voluntary compliance with its recommendations, the power to "issue orders and obtain injunctive relief from circuit courts."

"Because of the lack of a comprehensive antidiscrimination law in Florida, individuals often have found they have had nowhere to go with their complaints," said Rackleff.

"Usually the only agencies with any power were the federal ones, but it might take a person with a housing complaint three years to get relief from the federal government — if any."

Shevin's proposal permits a person who feels he's been discriminated against to file a complaint directly with the commission. The commission would then have the power to subpoena the parties involved and, if necessary, back up its orders with court action.

Deputy Atty. Gen. Barry Richard, the principal author of the bill, says if adopted it would be the most comprehensive civil rights act in the country.

He said it goes into many areas not covered by federal laws — including a prohibition against discrimination in the sale of private homes, where an employer has as few as one employee, or discrimination involving the handicapped.

The proposed legislation would also reduce the size of the commission: From 18 non-salaried members to nine members with pay.

"We felt the size of the commission was too unwieldy," said Richard.

"Right now we're looking for someone to sponsor the bill," he added.

Here are some of the major elements of Shevin's proposal: —Public accommodations. The bill prohibits the printing or communication of any statement which even indirectly expresses discrimination. Restaurants and school dormitories are exempted from the anti-sex discrimination provision.

—Housing and real estate. Those selling either housing or real estate are prohibited from

asking the race, color, sex, religion or national origin of the prospective buyer, or from asserting that property values in the area might change if a certain type of resident moved in. Discrimination is also prohibited involving financing of real estate or housing.

—Employment. Prohibits

"help wanted female" or "help wanted male" ads in newspapers unless the nature of the job itself—for instance a model for female clothes—requires a particular sex. Employers would be banned from advertising on a discriminatory basis or asking the sex, race, color, religion or national origin of an applicant.

—Education. Quota systems for student enrollment would be prohibited and school would not be permitted to keep records concerning race, color, religion or national origin of applicants.

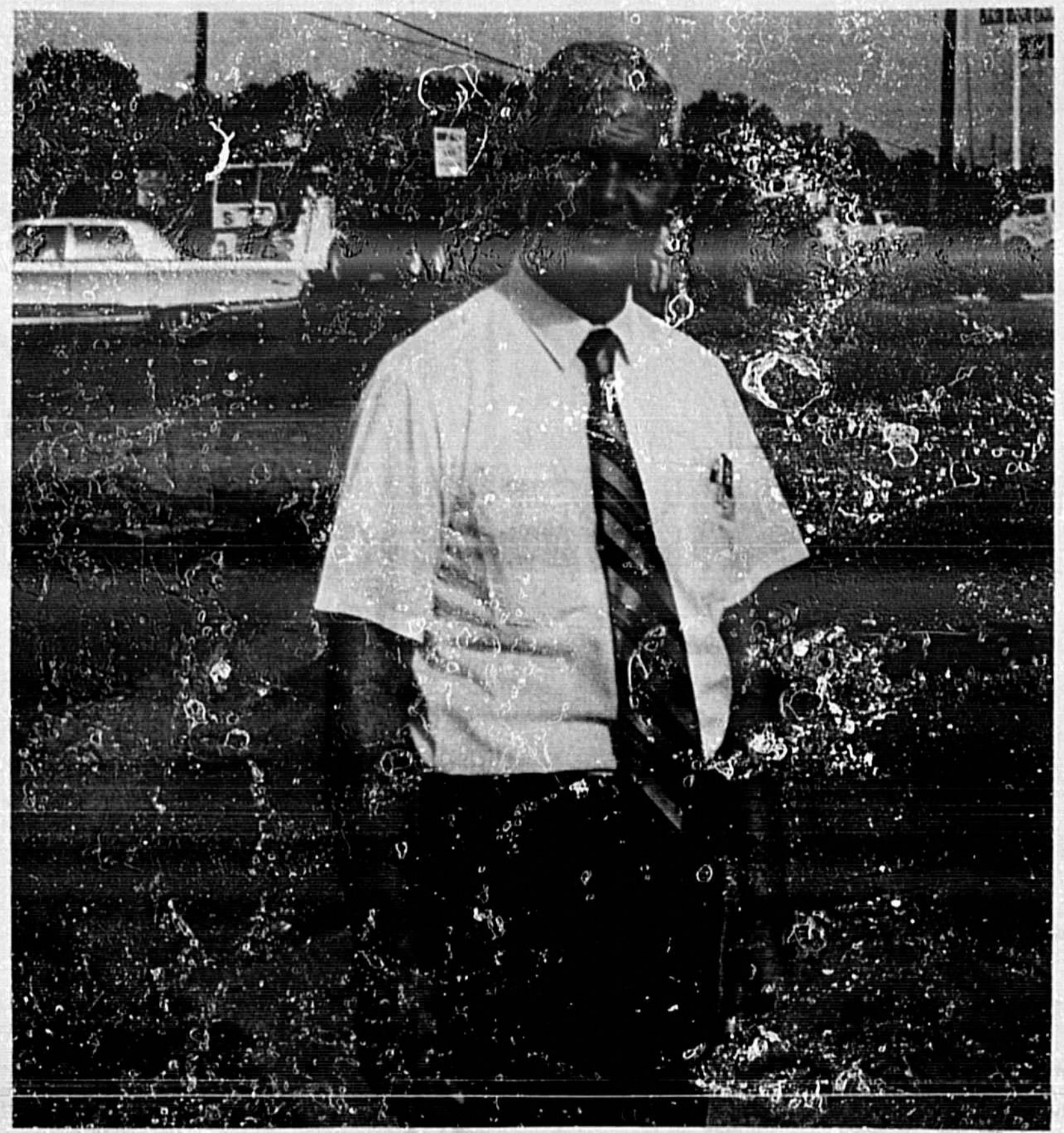
However, private elementary or secondary schools could limit enrollment to students of one sex.

## Peace Delay, The Issue 'Typical' Demo Undecided

 WASHINGTON (AP) — For months, Richard J. Johnson, a leftist Democrat who was the subject of a study into the voting habits of a typical "middle

But he said that won't affect his vote and that "I am going to decide on which is best for my own interests."

## McGovern With Last Try Today

 NEW YORK (AP) — Sen. George McGovern, his eyes laden with fatigue, makes one last span of the nation today before laying his two-year quest to "bring America home" in the hands of the electorate.

In a nationwide television address from New York, McGovern drew some of the loudest cheers of his campaign as he accused President Nixon of playing "fact and loose" on the Vietnam issue.

After drawing large crowds in Illinois and New York Sunday, McGovern was to board the Dakota Queen II to pay his farewells in Philadelphia and Los Angeles en route to a day of waiting in his native South Dakota.

In a nationwide television address from New York, McGovern characterized as "the big lie" the administration's claim that a peace settlement is near.

It was nearly three decades ago, when the first Dakota Queen was ripped by enemy fire over Europe, that young pilot McGovern told his crew: "Resume your stations; we're going to bring this plane home."

"Peace is not at hand," said McGovern. "It is not even in sight."

And, on the eve of a more awesome moment of truth, George Stanley McGovern appears gripped by the hope—perhaps even the conviction—that he can do it again.

McGovern was joined in the broadcast—later at a rally in the Bronx—by Preston Thomas, Lafayette, Calif., whose son, Timothy, was one of 22 Americans killed in Vietnam Nov. 1, just one day after, according to Hanoi, the United States was supposed to sign a cease-fire agreement.

"We're going to win," he told an interviewer before embarking on his coast-to-coast finale. "It is a kind of coming together on the part of the American public, a realization that there has been too much deception both here at home and now even in the issue of war and peace itself."

"Timothy wrote several letters to me," said Thomas. "He talked of his girl he left behind ... his future. He felt the war was also over, and of course when we were told that it was to be over on the 31st we were very happy and Tim said 'I'll be home by Christmas.' Tim won't be home and not on Christmas ... My boy was killed needlessly."

"The American people," he said, "were reluctant to think that their president was playing politics with the issue of war. Now, suddenly ... that is be-

ginning to dawn on people." In stops Sunday at St. Louis, Moline, Ill., and New York, McGovern drew some of the loudest cheers of his campaign as he accused President Nixon of playing "fact and loose" on the Vietnam issue.

**Both Offer Help For 'Little Man'**

MIAMI (AP) — A state senator calling himself the champion of the little man and a Miami businesswoman promising relief for the little man's bill-paying wife both are waging strong consumer-oriented campaigns for a seat on the Public Service Commission.

But neither candidate in the only statewide race Tuesday is making any solid promises that consumers' rates will go down if they're elected to the PSC.

Democratic candidate Sen. Gerald Lewis of Miami said, "I'm not going to make any absolutely unqualified promises that utility bills will go down if I'm elected. I can say that I will see which expenses can be cut out of the rate base and thereby cut down skyrocketing increases."

His opponent, Republican National Committeewoman Paula Hawkins replied, "Nope, I sure can't," when asked if she could pledge a reduction in monthly utility bills.

"But I'm certainly going to see the utility companies' books, and I'm sure there's room for trimming," Mrs. Hawkins added.

Gov. Reubin Askew and the two present PSC members have their own ideas on whether the outcome of the statewide race would affect the consumer's pocketbook.

Askew said fellow Democrat Lewis "has a good chance to make a difference" in Florida's future utility bills. But PSC members William Bevis and William Mayo, both Democrats, say the results of Tuesday's election for a third commissioner won't change PSC policies.

PSC Chairman Bevis said it would be more up to the Legislature to change the commission's policies.

Mayo, first elected to the commission in 1964, added, "We are guided by the current economic conditions of the country and the new member, whoever he or she may be, will find the Florida Public Service Commission cannot change current economic conditions of the country. We have to live with them."

Mrs. Hawkins says, "Although I can't promise the rates will go down, I'm going to try my very hardest to make sure that the service goes up."

She said during her campaign swings through Florida, in a borrowed mobile home she has discovered that people want to talk about the quality of services almost as much as the high cost of living.

"For example, many people, especially on the West Coast, are very upset over the quality of their water," said Mrs. Hawkins, an attractive brunette who's never held public office.

"In other areas they talk about not having delivery services of any kind, or not being able to get the telephone to work."

Lewis has proposed that the PSC order telephone companies to improve service within a specified time and take action against them if they fail.

"The telephone company should be informed that no new rate increases will be granted until their service is improved," said the six-year legislative veteran. "If all else fails, then the PSC should investigate the possibility of revoking the franchises of these telephone companies and granting these franchises to some other telephone company that has demonstrated their ability to provide adequate service at a reasonable price."

Askew said last week the winner of the PSC race would be disqualified from voting on a \$3.7 million Gulf Power Corporation hike case, but both Mrs. Hawkins and Lewis said they would refuse to do so. Like the governor, both PSC candidates want to force utility companies to pay the corporate income tax out of profits rather than pass it on to the consumer.

**Refugees Favor Nixon**

By IKE FLORES MIAMI (AP) — Because of Sen. George McGovern's call for a "reassessment" of U.S. relations with Fidel Castro, exile leaders predict that 80 per cent of the Cuban refugee vote will go to President Nixon.

But observers add that the 300,000 Cuban exiles in the Miami area will have little impact when an estimated 2 million

Floridians help elect a president, fill 15 congressional seats and staff a state legislature next Tuesday.

The most optimistic estimate of Cuban voter-strength in the state is 35,000-out of a total electorate of almost 3 1/2 million. Cuban refugees who do go to the polls are more likely to vote for Nixon partly because of his more conservative policies. But exile leaders base their predictions more on refugees' opposition to McGovern's stand on Communist Cuba.

The Democratic presidential nominee wants a "reassessment" of U.S. relations with Castro, McGovern has said he sees no reason why normal relations between Washington and Castro's Cuba should not be resumed.

The "Cuban vote" is by no means a united bloc of voters. But leading refugees, political observers and media commentators agree there is an overwhelming percentage of negative sentiment against the South Dakota senator.

A recent survey by the University of Miami placed exile registrations at 65 per cent Republican. Other estimates put them at about 50-50 between the two major parties.

But acridities of voting precincts in this year's two primary elections showed that Cuban voters in the Miami area do not vote as a group except when there is strong name recognition. And they prefer their politicians on the conservative side.

Evelio S. Estrella, 45, a Miami businessman and land developer who has been an American citizen eight years, is running for the U.S. House of Representatives as a Republican against Democratic incumbent Claude Pepper, 72.

Pepper has been in the House since 1962 and was previously in the U.S. Senate. Estrella, who lost a race for state representative in 1970 while receiving 69,753 votes, is given little chance of upsetting the popular incumbent.

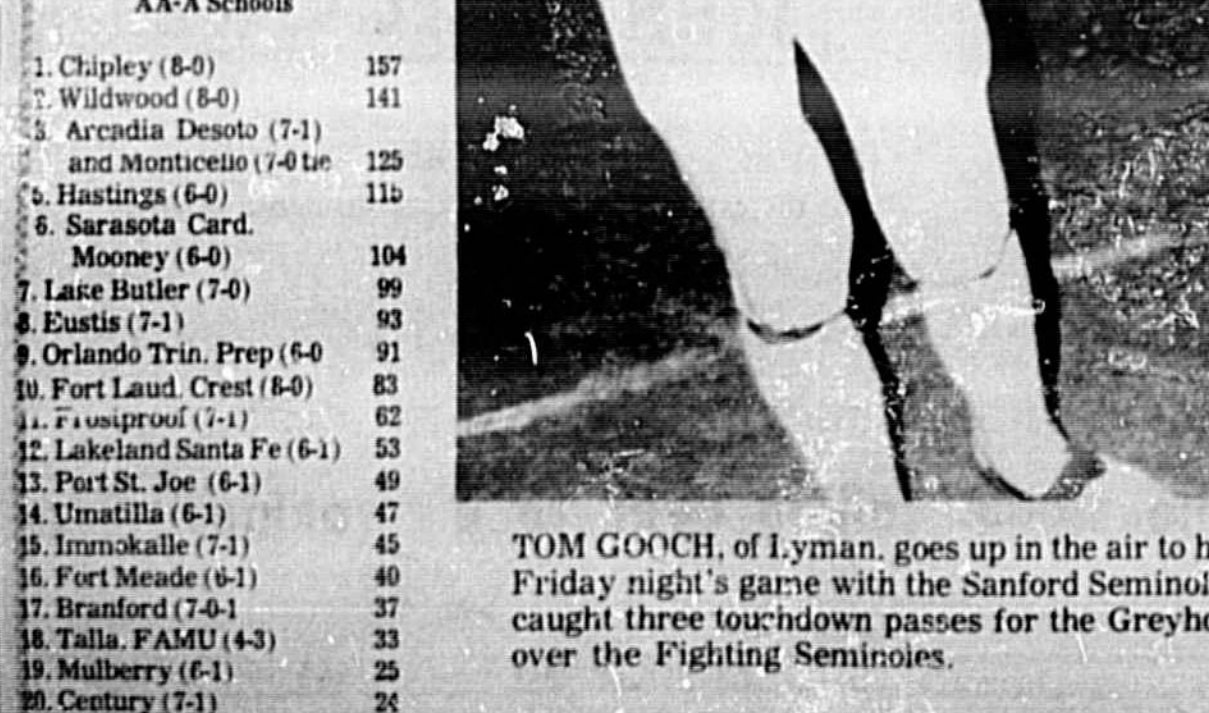

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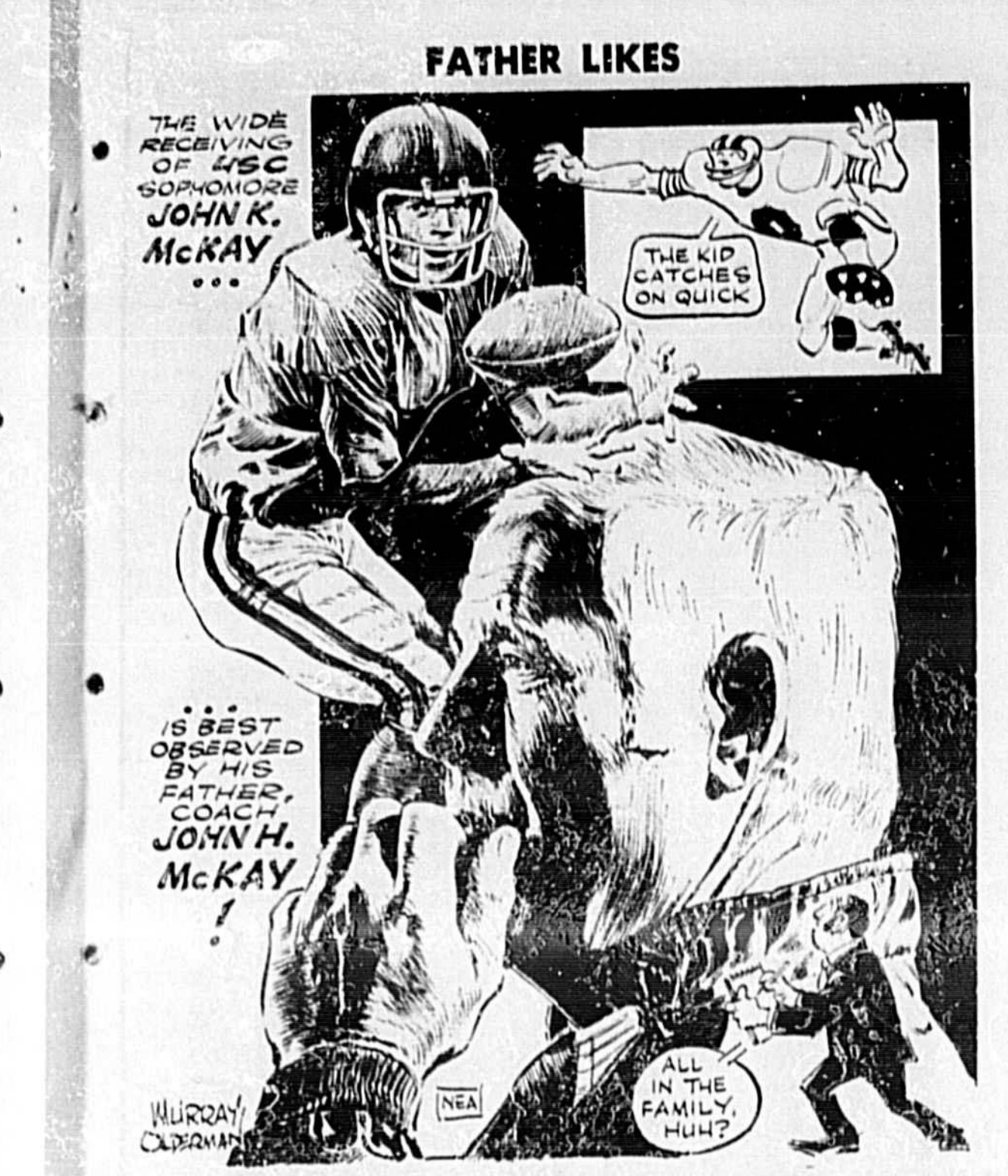
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# Last Second Catch Saves LSU 17-16

It paid off handsomely. Gabriel threw only 11 passes and completed eight of them for 93 yards. And he used his head by sticking to a relentless search for the Bengals 40-17 and Philadelphia and St. Louis struggled to a 6-6 tie.

On Monday night's nationally televised game, the Baltimore Colts play the Patriots in New England. Steelers rookie Franco Harris led a 230-yard Pittsburgh ground assault with 101 yards of his own, including a twoyard touchdown sprint, while Terry Bradshaw completed half of his 28 passes for 190 yards.

Len Dawson also threw for three touchdowns for Kansas City while the Chiefs limited Oakland's running game to 73 yards, frustrating Chiefs Coach Hank Stram to call it "the best game of the year. Dawson played a great game.

Against the Bills this time, Mercury Morris scampered for 106 yards and a pair of touchdowns, Earl Morrill had Mary Fleming with a seven yard scoring pass and Gary Yepremian booted three field goals.

Another three-touchdown quarterback was Washington's Billy Kilmer who connected on scoring passes of 45 yards to Roy Jefferson, 70 yards to Charley Taylor and 89 yards to Larry Brown as the Redskins returned their one-game lead over Dallas in the NFC East.

The Cowboys' lone touchdown in their 31-0 lead against the Chargers, then had to withstand a furious

second-half rally in which John Hadl fired four touchdowns passes. "They did a pretty good job of playing catch-up," Dallas Coach Tom Landry under-estimated.

North Carolina State beat Wake Forest, Miami of Florida, and Clemson last season while losing eight times.

Southern Conference showdown against equally unbalanced Alabama.

Jones marched the Tigers 80 yards in 13 plays in the final three minutes to remove the goat horns. Underdog Mississippi took a 3-0 lead in the first period following a Jones

fumble and turned an interception into another field goal in the final quarter for a 16-10 spread.

LSU's last-second victory made it a clean sweep for the Top Ten college football teams in The Associated Press ratings.

Top-ranked Southern California trimmed Washington State 44-3, runner-up Alabama walloped Mississippi State 58-14 and third-ranked Nebraska whipped No. 15 Colorado 33-10. Elsewhere, it wasn't quite that easy.

Fourth-ranked Michigan turned two Indiana fumbles and a bad center snap into touchdowns in a 21-7 triumph and No. 5 Ohio State had to come from behind for a defeat-loupy Minnesota 27-19 as Harold Henson powered for 131 yards and his 14th and 15th touchdowns of the season.

# Indian War Is Declared In Capitol

WASHINGTON (AP)—Hundreds of tense, tired Indian demonstrators prepared today for what they expected to be a battle with police to defend their illegal occupancy of the federal building they seized last Thursday.

The government indicated it, too, anticipated a confrontation to end the unprecedented four-day takeover of a government bureau.

The government said it would ask a court for permission to forcibly evict the Indians soon after 8 a.m., the deadline federal regulators gave the Indians Sunday night for evacuating the Bureau of Indian Affairs building.

"We have now declared war on the United States of America—seek your stations," said Vernon Bellencourt, director of the American Indian Movement which has dominated the demonstration.

Another leader of the Trail of Broken Treaties caravan, Russell Means, predicted any fight between police and the well-armed Indians might resemble the massacre at Wounded Knee.

The Indians took over the building last Thursday as they came to the capital to protest their treatment at the hands of government.

In contrast to last Friday night and early Saturday, however, when the Indians prepared to confront police with an emotional fervor that verged on jubilation, the mood early today was sober and brooding.

While there was unanimity in vowing to stay and fight rather than accept the government's last offer of housing at a nearby auditorium—this time with portable showers being added to the bargain—the Indians were hushed and stoic while Bellencourt explained the situation.

They shouted "no" to the offer but there was no weapon-waving or chanting, only a rush

to start putting in place the barricades removed early last Saturday.

Statistics of the number of Indians in the building ranged from 400 to 2,000.

S. flag was shown. One of her students became so distraught over this fact that he brought a miniature flag, (bottom) to class, which is all the class presently has to give the pledge of allegiance to our country.

# Safety Workshop First Ever At FTU

FTU—A National Transportation Safety Workshop, the first ever of its kind, will be held at Florida Tech University the week of Nov. 13, co-sponsored by FTU, the Florida Department of Transportation, and the U. S. Department of Transportation.

The announcement was made jointly by Dr. Robert D. Kersten, FTU Dean of Engineering, and Gen. Benjamin G. Davis, Jr., Assistant Secretary for Safety and Consumer Affairs, U.S. DOT.

The workshop is being hosted by FTU's Transportation Systems Institute, which is under the direction of Dr. George Schrader, chairman of Industrial Engineering at the University.

The workshop will bring together approximately 50 representatives from such groups as the FAA, Urban Mass Transportation Administration, U. S. DOT, National Science Foundation, American Transit Association, U. S. Department of Labor, Federal Railroad Administration, Federal High-

way Administration and education and training programs in transportation safety throughout the country.

Philip Bolger, Director of Safety Program Coordinator for the U. S. Department of Transportation and Edward A. Mueller, Engineering Advisor for the Florida Department of Transportation are co-chairmen for the workshop. A number of faculty from the College of Engineering at FTU will participate in the workshop sessions along with representatives from other universities throughout the nation.

While the day-long campus sessions will be restricted to participating officials, there will be an open session at 10 a.m. Nov. 17, when William S. Hefflefinger, Assistant Secretary for Administration, U. S. DOT, will speak on the "Future in Transportation Safety in the U. S." That particular meeting will be held in the Assembly Room of the FTU Village Center.

Dr. Schrader stated that the workshop will provide an opportunity for the exchange of information among transportation managers, modal representatives in government, representatives of safety organizations, and educators concerning safety problems, solutions, particularly in rampover training areas. He indicated that this workshop will provide the basic guidelines for the development

Now the 48-year-old Deeb is organizing a national campaign for a constitutional convention on the controversial issue.

Deeb, Republican floor leader in the Senate, maintains the outcome of Tuesday's race will be a clear indication of voter choice on busing.

Sen. Lynnwood Arnold has already tried, unsuccessfully picturing himself as the hometown candidate with experience against a Johnny-come-lately.

Smathers polished off Arnold in a runoff after Sen. William Beaufort was eliminated in the first primary.

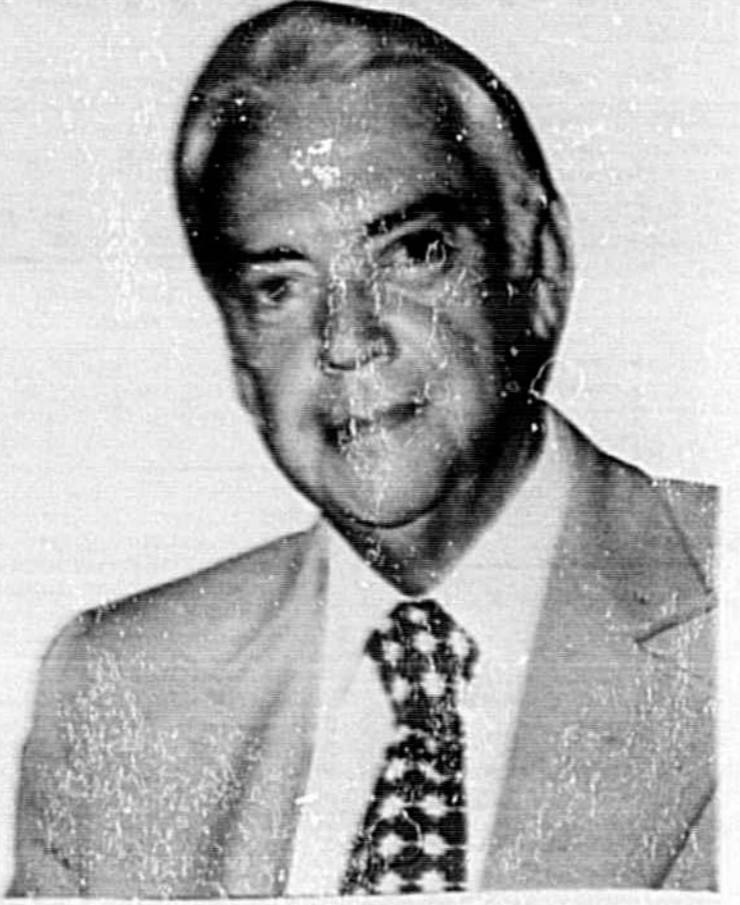
