

Here the Americans, having won the day, pitched camp and inter exected a small fort which they called Fort Mel-los in honor of their fallen leader. This fort survived for many years and after the war was over became the com-ter of a thriving little trading community known at Selbrought supplies for all central Florida to this little town, and reloading with fruits and vegetables returned to Jacksonville.

It was not until General Sanford came here nearly fifty years later that the center of the town shifted from the foot of Mellonville Avenue to the approximate location of the old Sanford House, and the name of the town was changed to Sanford.
