

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The United States, in a note to Russia, urged today that efforts be "redoubled" to find a formula for world disarmament.

The note was a formal reply to Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushehev's disarmament plan call-ing for immediate scrapping of nuclear weapons delivery eyatems and elimination of foreign

This government promised to give "most careful and serious study" to the Khrushchev plan. It expressed hope Russia would give equal "constructive attention" to Western disarmament proposals.
