

Mooseheart Graduation Expected To Draw Some 30,000 Persons

One high school graduation on June 12 this year is expected to have 30,000 people in attendance to see 54 students get their diplomas.

It will be at Mooseheart High School, at Mooseheart, Ill., a school sponsored by the Loyal Order of Moose, and will be one of the highlights of the 72nd annual Moose convention.

There are 29 boys and 25 girls in this year's graduating class.

They came to Mooseheart from 16 states and Canada and are an average age of 18 years and two months at graduation time.

Heading the Class of 1960 academically are Raymond Salois, sponsored at Mooseheart by Dearborn, Mich., Lodge No. 1620, who will serve as the valedictorian, and Doris Sandiford from Joliet, Ill., Lodge No. 300, who will be the salutatorian.

Judge Louis K. Thaler of Itasca, N. Y., Supreme Governor of the Moose Fraternity, will deliver the commencement address and will also distribute diplomas to the seniors. In addition to the usual diplomas, each senior will receive a vocational training certificate.

Members of the class have qualified for certificates in 14 different occupations. They are: Commercial, 14; homemaking, 7; machine shop, 4; electronics, 2; ornamental concrete, 1; drafting, 4; sheet metal, 2; shoe repair, 1; beauty culture, 6; printing, 3; garage mechanics, 1; painting, 1; cafeteria management, 1; and barbering, 4.

Each graduate has spent an average of eight years and 11 months at the Child City.

Actors Hopeful Of Settlement

NEW YORK (UPI)—A new compromise pension plan for actors raised hopes today for early settlement of the labor dispute that has blacked out all Broadway theaters.

Spokesmen for Actors Equity and the League of New York Theaters said that the plan—proposed by theatrical entrepreneur John Shubert—could be a major breakthrough in the deadlocked negotiations which resumes today after a weekend recess.

A further note of optimism was sounded by Actors Equity President Ralph Bellamy who said he was convinced the Broadway blackout would not be prolonged after he held talks with producers Sunday.

Bellamy, who arrived from Hollywood, indicated that some major financial supporters of Broadway shows—"angels"—had put pressure on the producers for a swift settlement of the dispute.

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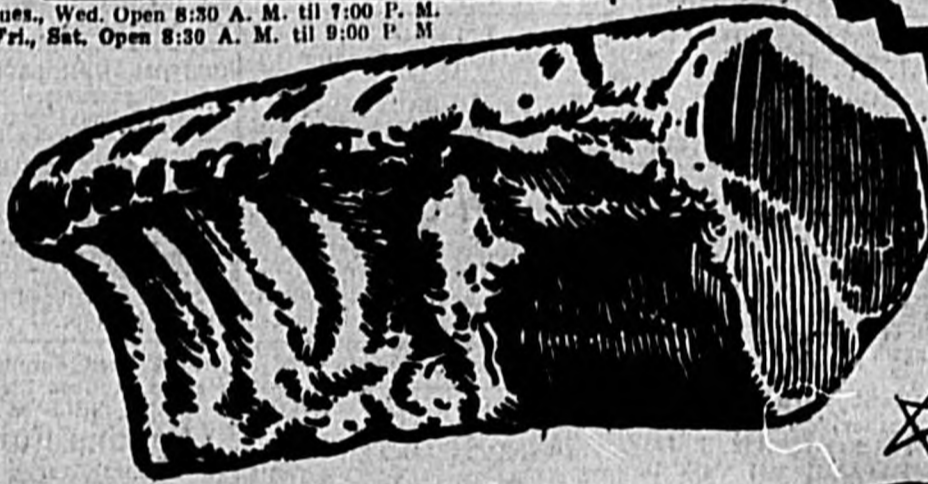

U.S. Studies Soviet Offer To Disarm

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States, in a note to Russia, urged today that efforts be "redoubled" to find a formula for world disarmament.

The note was a formal reply to Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's disarmament plan calling for immediate scrapping of nuclear weapons delivery systems and elimination of foreign bases.

This government promised to give "most careful and serious study" to the Khrushchev plan. It expressed hope Russia would give equal "constructive attention" to Western disarmament proposals.

However, the note said the "proper place" to discuss both plans is in the 10-nation disarmament conference now going on in Geneva.

The Soviet Union formally presented its newest arms-elimination plan today as a "basis for discussion" at the 10-nation disarmament conference at Geneva.

But Soviet Delegate Valerian A. Zorin told reporters at a news conference following the formal meeting with the U. S. and British delegates that American plane flights over the Soviet Union and similar actions by "aggressive forces" will not contribute to any agreement.

"If leaders talk war, that won't contribute to agreement either," he said.

But he sidestepped a question as to whether insulting remarks by a head of one state against the head of another would increase tension. This obviously was a reference to Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's violent personal attacks against President Eisenhower and other American leaders.

"That," Zorin said with a frosty grin, "is a matter for the leaders themselves, or their attitude toward each other."

Zorin tried to seize the initiative at the formal conference when he announced after a five-week recess by immediately presenting the Soviet plan which had been informally unveiled by Khrushchev five days ago in Moscow.

The Soviet proposal calls for the destruction within 12 or 18 months of all means of delivering atomic weapons and total disarmament within four years.

While insisting that the West accept a strict time limit for the whole process of disarmament, Zorin said the Soviet Union was "willing to negotiate."

A drive to help the American Red Cross collect items for Chilean earthquake victims is being spearheaded by the Woman's Society of Christian Services division of the DeBary Methodist Church.

In response to an appeal by the Red Cross, the society will collect clothing, bedding and needed accessories for the injured and homeless in Chile.

The nations of the free world have opened their hearts and their pocketbooks in a great outpouring of help to the victims of Chile's earthquake and tidal wave disaster.

Mercy planes from all over the globe have carried millions of dollars in cash, food, clothing, medical supplies and building materials to the stricken Chileans, already shivering in the onset of the South American winter.

Osceola Strip Use As Airport Denied

The Federal Aviation Agency has informed the County Commission that the Osceola auxiliary air base in northeast Seminole County is not suitable for airport purposes.

Commissioner Chairman John Krider and County Attorney Mack Cleveland Jr. reported to the board today on the results of a series of conferences in Washington last week on obtaining the abandoned field.

Cleveland said that FAA officials said the field is in a rundown condition. Officials also said that the base might conflict with the heavy flight traffic at the Sanford Naval Air Station.

The county had planned to develop the field runways and to use the base for emergency landings by NAS crews.

The board had been negotiating with the General Services Administration for nearly a year for the title to the abandoned strip near Lake Harney.

However, the board agreed to try to purchase the 1,100-acre tract and possibly use it for an industrial and recreation area.

The board authorized Cleveland to write to GSA regional officials in Atlanta for information on the sale of the property and to have it appraised.

New York Shrinks
NEW YORK (UPI) — New York — the nation's largest city — is about 200,000 persons smaller than it was in 1950, a census report showed today. Arthur F. Young, federal statistical administrator for the New York metropolitan region, said the city's present population is about 7,650,000, a drop of three percent from 1950.

Census figures released Monday showed Broward has become Florida's fifth largest county with a population of 329,431. The 1954 population was 83,933.

Search Pressed
JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — The Coast Guard today pressed a search around Cumberland Island, Ga., for one of two jet training planes which collided in the air off Fernandina Beach, Monday night. The pilot of one of the planes, Lt. Charles Bumpsted, parachuted to safety before his craft went down in flames. The fate of the other pilot, said to be a close friend of Bumpsted, was unknown.

Bonuses Called Fund Misuse

County Commissioner J. H. Van Hoy today urged the board to request salary and bonus schedules of all offices in the courthouse and declared that paying bonuses out of excess fees is a "misuse of public money."

Chairman John Krider agreed with Van Hoy's request by saying "I have always objected to paying bonuses to employees in fee offices."

The board agreed on the need for more uniformity of salary schedules in the courthouse after

Van Hoy, recently appointed to the board, said that departments are competing for employees. Van Hoy had been authorized by the board at an earlier meeting to study job salary scheduling in the courthouse as the first step in setting up a job classification study for all county employees.

In other business during the meeting the board appointed Dan Sreeney as a fulltime storekeeper at the county shop at a salary of \$300 per month. The board earlier authorized

County Engineer Robert Davis to get a storekeeper to lighten controls on maintenance materials at the shop.

Sreeney was asked to take over the post immediately. The board also agreed to purchase a new dragline machine

for \$13,738. Low bid on the machine was from the Florida Equipment Company of Orlando.

The board also agreed to vacate Whitefield St. in the Sandlake Springs area and received a petition from residents of South St. that the board remove a stop sign at South St. and Prairie Lake Drive.

Commissioner Vernon Dunn told the board that the stop sign was important to protect children playing in the area and the board denied the request.

Fanatics Vow To 'Punish' Ike On Japan Visit

TOKYO (UPI) — The fanatic leftist student federation Zengakuren vowed today to "struggle with all its might" against President Eisenhower's visit and to physically "punish" the president and Emperor Hirohito if necessary.

"If Eisenhower forces his way in spite of our warning he will be forced to tremble before the hostile demonstrators," the federation declared in a written statement issued at a press conference for foreign newsmen.

Zengakuren Acting Chairman Tokuo Onda said the students would stage several tune-up demonstrations prior to the big one when the president arrives June 18.

The first will be June 11 "to fight" White House News Secretary James Magarity when he arrives to make arrangements for the president's visit.

"Magarity can then tell Eisenhower to stay out of Japan," Onda said.

Earlier Zengakuren said it would stage a sit-down demonstration at Tokyo airport in an effort to prevent Eisenhower's plane from landing.

The organization tried to do that when Premier Nobusuke Kishi left for Washington several months ago but never got farther than the airport restaurant, which students wrecked.

Zengakuren, together with the opposition Socialist party and the giant Sokyo labor union confederation, is determined to bring down Kishi's government and halt rail-traffic in the country.

A new student organization has sprung up in Japan with an "Ike Ike" label. It is called Zengakuren but is translated into "federation of good behaving student's associations."

Tsuyuki Kishi, a close associate of Kishi, organized the new group. He said it contained 100,000 members "thankful for the generosity of the American government."

New Yorkers Trapped By Subway Fire

NEW YORK (UPI)—Hundreds of subway riders were trapped today in trains near Grand Central Terminal by a fire that filled eight blocks of tunnel and two subway stations with choking smoke.

Police reported scores of persons overcome by the smoke which filled the Lexington Ave. tunnel rapidly after signal cables caught fire at 41st St., one block south of the giant railroad terminal.

The fire broke out around 8:30 a. m. toward the end of the morning rush hour, when trains are filled with "executive suite" passengers.

Every available police emergency squad in Manhattan, a score of ambulances and disaster units from two hospitals were dispatched to both the Grand Central and 34th Street stations on the four-track Interborough Rapid Transit line.

Within half an hour, police had led between 500 and 600 persons to safety at Grand Central. Sidewalks were crowded with smoke-affected commuters, many sitting or lying on the sidewalk awaiting oxygen treatment.

The subway ventilating system carried the dense smoke seven blocks south to the 34th Street subway station, near the Meyer Vanderbilt Hotel, and west to subway exits at Fifth Ave. and 42nd St. on a cross-tunnel line.

Passengers arriving from Times Square on the shuttle train were panicked to find Grand Central enveloped in smoke.

"Everyone was yelling, 'Get out! Get out!'" said Paul Germaine, 22, of Fairview, N. J., a shuttle passenger.

"If it wasn't for one cop we would all have been in trouble. The cop led us out and even tried to break a lock on a door that would have given us more room to get out."

Hospitals began to receive smoke cases removed from the Grand Central and 34th Street stations.

\$20 Million Circus Family Suit Over

SARASOTA (UPI) — Dismissal of a \$20 million law suit against circus president John Ringling North restored harmony today among the owners of Ringling Bros., Barnum & Bailey Circus.

The suit, charging North with mismanagement, had been filed in 1957 by Mrs. Hester Ringling North and her son, Stuart Lancaster.

North, a nephew of the late John Ringling, one of the founders, owns 51 percent of the circus stock. Mrs. Sanford and her son own a large portion of the remaining 49 percent.

The so-called "49ers" objected principally to North turning the circus into a streamlined show that played only in large arenas. North and New York attorney Dan Gordon, judge, spokesman and trustee for the "49ers" announced dismissal of the suit in a joint announcement saying the family was "now firmly reunited in carrying on operation of the Greatest Show On Earth."

Utility Control Discussed

The County Commission today discussed the possibility of establishing a county utility commission to insure that the section of the county is without complete services, including emergency water supply equipment.

Commissioner Lawrence Swoford said control is needed to prevent occurrences such as one during the weekend when a faulty well pump caused 60 Loch Arbor homes to be without water more than 30 hours.

Commissioner Homer Little said "I had calls all Saturday night from residents in that area complaining that there was no water."

"My hands were tied as there was nothing I could do about it," Little said.

The board authorized County Attorney Mack Cleveland Jr. to study the situation to see if new legislation is needed to give the commission local control over subdivisions to make sure that emergency water supply pumps are installed.

Sanitarian Val Robbins also urged the commission to take some action on the problem "because it could get critical and create a health hazard."

The board agreed that one method of control was the setting up of a utility commission.

Unified Telephone Service Is Urged

The County Commission today urged the unification of telephone service in the county.

The request was made by the County Zoning Commission in a letter to the board saying that the "county is practically split in two by the fact that there are two telephone companies operating in the county and the fact that calls in the county are frequently long distance transactions."

The letter stated that to unify telephone service would be "one of the greatest services the commission could render to the county."

Zoning Director Robert Brown, who read the letter, said that the problem should be of great concern to the board.

Chairman John Krider told Brown that he has met with representatives of the two companies, Southern Bell and the Winter Park Telephone Co., and that plans are underway for a survey of this problem.

Chuluota Club To Hold Fishathon

The Chuluota Sportsman's Club will sponsor a Fishathon for the youngsters of Chuluota Saturday.

The affair is for all children 15 years-of-age and younger with children six years of age and under to be accompanied by a parent.

The Fishathon will be held from 9 to 12 a. m. at Lake Katherine. A prize will be given for the heaviest fish and judges will be members of the Sportsman Club. Any type tackle and bait can be used which must be furnished by the contestant.

Post Office Station Up For Approval

A post office sub-station will be established on Forest City Road at the Mobile Homes development, Chester Nelson, Longwood postmaster, said today.

The post office will be located at the project's shopping center, upon final approval of the Post Office Dept. in Atlanta, Nelson said.

DeBary Begins New Planting Program

Probers Off Track, Says Showgirl After Hearing

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Showgirl La Renny, called before a federal grand jury investigating the Tancors of her one-time boyfriend, ex-hoodlum Mickey Cohen, indignantly declared Monday night: "All they asked me about was my sex life!"

Still under a three-year probation term imposed last year when she admitted perjuring herself before a similar grand jury, she reportedly closed the session this way:

"They threw the names of at least 100 men at me. They asked me if I had been intimate with so-and-so."

"I didn't tell 'em" La said. She reported she indignantly claimed her sex life was none of the probers' business.

Asked about her relations with a Beverly Hills psychiatrist, La said she laughed. "I laughed right in their faces. Why all he ever gave me was a box of crackers."

The red haired showgirl said she now was an aspiring author, and left the manuscript of her near finished autobiography with the grand jury to be copied.

It's tentatively titled "The Lake of Fire," La said.

"This is taken from the Book of Revelations which contains this passage: 'All have their part in the lake of fire.'"

Three Youths Admit Numerous Thefts

Three Orange County youths were charged today with breaking and entering when they admitted to numerous thefts in Orange and Seminole Counties, the Sanford Police Dept. reported.

The youths, Frank Matthew Harrington, 20, Taft Roy David Bostic, 20, and James G. McCallister, 18, both of Orlando, were arrested following their break-in attempt at the Park and Wash Laundry, 2330 Park Dr.

The union leader faces a maximum jail sentence of five years and a fine of up to \$5,000. Preece, testifying for himself, denied bearing the gifts or concealing the gift list.

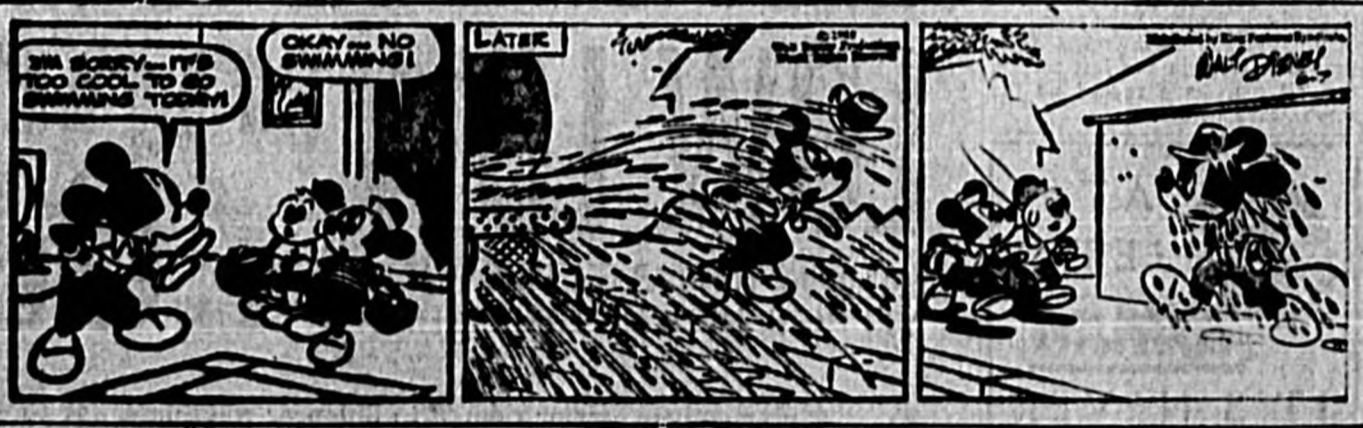
Sanford Out-Hits Indians But Loses Contest, 11-8

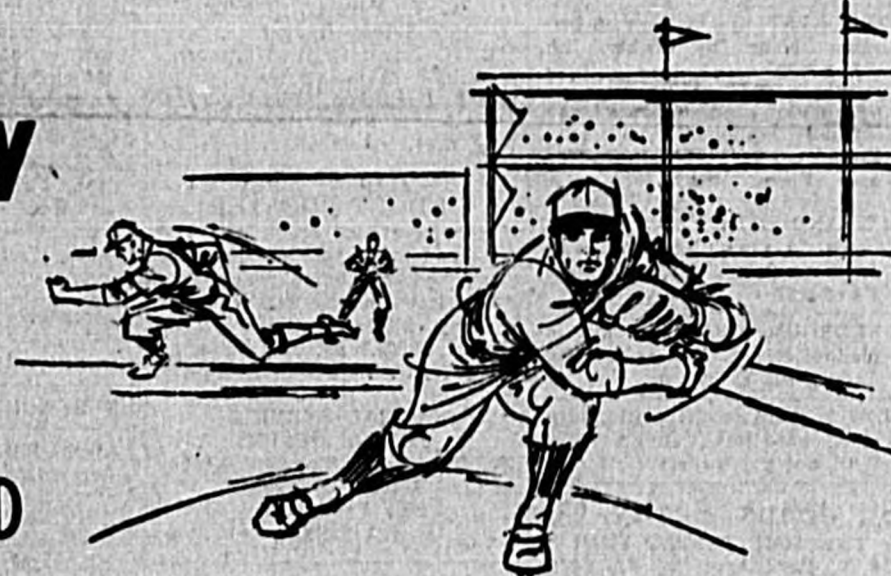

Neo-Fascists Vow To Protect Like To The Death On Jap Tour

TOKYO (UPI) — Neo-fascists vowed today to "fight to the death" to protect President Eisenhower from leftist demonstrators in Japan. The pledge made it almost certain there would be a battle at Tokyo International Airport when Eisenhower arrives June 10.

Police officials, already deep in plans on how to deal with the overwhelming numbers of leftists from the airport to the palace, were faced with the possibility they feared most. Clashes between leftists and rightists would be much harder to control than one-sided demonstrations.

Bin Akao, leader of the "Great Japan Patriotic Party" and an admirer of Hitler, said he would mobilize 2,000 members to greet the President, and other tough

rightist groups promised to help. "I want to assure Eisenhower that the patriotic Japanese will fight to the death in order to protect the great leader," he said.

Akao, who caused an incident on the arrival of West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer by waving a swastika flag, did not say how his forces hoped to deal with the overwhelming numbers of leftists. The fanatical Zengakuren student organization has threatened to call out 60,000 demonstrators at the airport. Its members have threatened physical violence against the president and Emperor Hirohito during their 12-mile ride from the airport to the palace.

The 330,000-member Sohyo labor union confederation plans to stage an anti-Eisenhower demon-

Phone Survey Results Aired

North Orlando residents jeered Tuesday that it would be more expensive to transfer from a Fairfax telephone exchange to a Winter Park Midway exchange system.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The Supreme Court today threw out a city of Sarasota ordinance which prohibited the use of standard size billboard in certain locations.

The high court ruled the ordinance was "unreasonable and thus unconstitutional."

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—Four-lane widening of about seven miles of U. S. Highway 1 in Brevard County will be finished in August, the State Road Department says. The department said the \$1,306,633 project is now 55 per cent complete. The portion runs from the south city limits of Rockledge to the north city limits of Cocoa.

Red Spy Flights?

TOKYO (UPI)—A British embassy publication said today that the Soviet Union has been making high altitude flights over the United States for some time. British Opinion, which is compiled from British press reports, said that "evidence of espionage by Soviet agents over the world around as voluminous as it is multi-form."

Clemency Appeals

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The State Pardon Board is to hear 44 clemency appeals a week from today—including one from convicted rapist Donald Ray Askew that his death sentence be lifted. Askew, 25, of Gainesville, raped a 16-year-old girl while her two brothers watched in fear July 27, 1958. Askew had been drinking heavily in the time leading up to the attack.

Bill Nears Okay

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A bill to prevent the scheduled July 1 reductions in taxes on automobiles, cigarettes, telephone calls, liquor, airline, train and bus tickets and corporation profits was expected to be approved today by the House. The measure would grant President Eisenhower's request that these levies be extended at present rates for another year. The government would lose four billion dollars a year in revenue if the tax rates were allowed to drop.

Pay Hike

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A presidential fact-finding board today recommended a five-cent an hour wage increase and improved health and welfare benefits for about 600,000 non-operating railroad workers.

Nixon Best Bet For Nomination, Rockefeller Says

WASHINGTON (UPI)—New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller said after a breakfast conference with President Eisenhower today he thought that, as things now stand, the chances were that Vice President Richard M. Nixon would win the Republican presidential nomination.

Rockefeller, who spent an hour and a half with the President at the special meeting requested by the Air Force, also issued two statements on the question of whether the strike forced postponement of two Atlas missile test launches.

He told reporters he was rushing back to New York for a hastily called meeting of the State Republican Executive Committee. Rockefeller said he expected to make a statement following the meeting.

The governor said he discussed politics, international affairs and Eisenhower's forthcoming trip to the Far East. He said the President still was determined to go to Japan, and he admitted his courage.

Rockefeller spent about 30 minutes talking with reporters but did not add substantially to what they already knew about his political position. He was reluctant to discuss any phase of his conversation with the President concerning domestic politics.

The governor said he still was available for convention draft for the presidential nomination as he announced May 25. He remained resolutely opposed to accepting the vice presidential nomination, saying he believed he could exercise greater influence on national affairs, including domestic politics, in the "stand-by" position of governor.

Asked what he thought would happen at the GOP convention, he said, "I think the chances are pretty good as things stand now that the vice president will win the nomination."

No explanation was given. Last January Jackson had resigned after criticism from league director George Pfister

but changed his mind when Pfister apologized.

Earlier this week, R. L. Weaver, Daytona Beach league director since 1937, resigned as vice president of a club which has been in the league cellar for weeks and whose attendance is the worst in club history.

Cape Strike Break Dims

There was little hope today of an early settlement in the machinists' strike against Convar installations at four key Atlas missile bases and selected plants.

Other strikes began in the nation's aircraft-missile industry. Negotiations broke down Tuesday night between the International Association of Machinists and Convar division of General Dynamics.

It was the first meeting between the groups since the strike's start Monday and its failure left negotiators with no new date scheduled to resume talks.

At Cape Canaveral the Air Force reversed itself and left the strike of Convar machinists where it started—three pickets on each gate and no Atlas missiles tested since they took up position.

The union had agreed to an "urgent request" from Maj. Gen. Leighton I. Davis, commander of the Atlantic missile test range, to move the pickets inside the gates, so that employees of other contractors could report to work.

Davis announced at a subsequent press conference that an administrative decision had been made in Washington that the agreement was not an acceptable solution to the work stoppage.

The Air Force also issued two statements on the question of whether the strike forced postponement of two Atlas missile test launches.

The United Aircraft Corp. was hit today by a wave of strikes which spread to all its seven Connecticut plants involved in contract disputes.

A total of 31,000 production workers are employed in the plants. A company spokesman said it was impossible to estimate immediately how many walked out, and that there was "some abusive and uncontrolled picketing."

Four Killed As Navy Jet Slams Into Helicopter

FATUXENT, Md. (UPI)—Four servicemen were killed Tuesday when a Navy jet plowed into an Air Force helicopter following an air rescue after another plane accident.

The dead included two Air Force men aboard the helicopter and two Navy men who were standing near the crash scene. Two other Navy men were injured.

The victims aboard the helicopter were 1st Lt. Frank A. Williams of Hampton, Va., and 5th Sgt. Clyde A. Chatham of Poquoson, Va.

The Navy personnel killed were hospitalman Lawrence H. Priest of Downer's Grove, Ill., and aviation boatswain's mate Flavio G. Arnold of East Greenwich, R. I.

The injured were identified as Capt. Francis M. Parson of Euclid, Ohio, and machinist's mate Robert Traub of Richboro, Pa.

The helicopter had been flown to Patuxent from Langley Air Force Base in Virginia to assist in the rescue of two Federal Aviation Agency men who had bailed out of a crippled B-57 jet.

The crash at Patuxent occurred just after the Crusader jet was launched from a steam catapult. Witnesses said it went off with one wing low, and hit the helicopter, which was preparing to take off.

The B-70, with North American Aviation as prime contractor, is planned as a supersonic bomber for the Strategic Air Command.

Like the B-57, it could ultimately become the model for a new generation of commercial airliners and, perhaps, become the prototype for the first nuclear-powered aircraft.

Earlier this year, the administration cut back the B-70 program to a \$75 million dollar development effort for the coming year. The scaled-down program would have produced only two prototype B-70 planes at a later date than previously scheduled and without the weapons and flight components to make them fully operational.

Senate Committee OK's Development Of B-70 Bomber

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate military appropriations subcommittee voted today in the face of increased world tensions, to provide for full development of the Air Force's 2,000-mile-an-hour B-70 bomber.

The subcommittee voted to add 285 million dollars to the giant defense money bill for the B-70 system. That total is about 800 million. The total increase made the subcommittee under the spur of the U-2 incident and the subsequent summit collapse.

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Kennedy Plans Florida Visit

MIAMI (UPI)—One of Sen. John Kennedy's principal political supporters said Tuesday night the senator plans to fly to Florida this month to make an in-person pitch to Florida's 29-vote Democratic national convention delegation.

Miami realtor Grant Stockdale said Kennedy plans the visit for the weekend of June 24th.

Stockdale added that Kennedy is sending his brother Robert to represent him Sunday at a delegation pow-wow in Orlando. A television commitment will prevent an appearance by John Stockdale said.

Kennedy, as well as other presidential aspirants Stuart Symington and Lyndon Johnson, had been invited to the meeting. Symington has accepted.

The Florida delegation is pledged to the first ballot to Sen. George Smathers as a favorite son.

Former Police Officer Ends Tour

John Wolf Jr., former assistant chief of police for Altamonte Springs, renewed home late Thursday following a recent tour of duty in the U.S. Army.

Wolf, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Wolf, was a member of the Florida Highway Patrol before entering the service and will resume his duties as a patrolman today.

The 23-year-old veteran's father was the fireman injured during the fire that raged the school here last February.

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Warhead Blast Causes Little Panic

MCQUIRE AIR FORCE BASE, N. J. (UPI)—The explosion and fire in a Bomarc interceptor missile shed here and reports of atomic radiation danger caused less panic Tuesday than a supposed Martian invasion 20 years ago.

The 47-foot Bomarc caught fire on its launching pad at a missile site east of this base Tuesday and an explosion occurred in the concrete shelter that housed the missile. Despite false reports that an atomic warhead exploded there was little panic in the New York area.

In contrast, thousands of terror-stricken residents fled their homes on the night of Oct. 30, 1958, when Orson Wells described a Martian landing at Grover's Mill, N. J. in a radio adaptation of H. G. Wells' "War of the Worlds."

The panicked populace flooded police, radio and news media switchboards with calls despite an announcement at the program's beginning that the "invasion" was fiction.

The Bomarc 90-A, a ground to air missile, caught fire inside a closed concrete shelter and spread a small amount of radiation in a limited area of the military base. No casualties were reported.

The Air Force emphasized that a nuclear explosion had not occurred and that there was no radiation danger to the public and no significant health hazard from contamination.

The fire was confined to the shelter and was extinguished 45 minutes later with water, but extensive precautions had been taken.

Military personnel were evacuated from the area immediately. State police and soldiers blocked off both ends of the Plehurst-New Egypt Road for 10 miles on either side of the missile base.

The 54-missile pad base, in isolated pine barrens east of McGuire, is 50 miles southwest of New York, southeast of Trenton and Philadelphia, northeast of Wilmington, Del., and northwest of Atlantic City.

Capt. John A. Loster, maintenance officer of the 48th Air Defense Missile Squadron, which mans the site, said the radiation was caused when theriated magnesium, a radioactive metal which is part of the missile, burned.

The Air Force said the pad was "10 million to one" against a nuclear explosion in the missile's nuclear warhead.

Emergency Chile Quake Aid Urged

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Key lawmakers in both parties called today for a stepped-up program of emergency aid for earthquake-torn Chile with special emphasis on housing.

They urged President Eisenhower to take all possible steps to back up the recent airlift of medical personnel and supplies with additional aid programs.

Sen. John F. Sparkman (D-Ala.), a member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said he could not "think of a better use" for President Eisenhower's foreign aid contingency fund than aiding Chile to rehouse its homeless quake victims.

"Rebuilding after the earthquake would be a wonderful opportunity to demonstrate what can be done," Sparkman said in an interview.

Supervised Arms Need Stressed

GENEVA (UPI)—Britain declared today that unsupervised nuclear disarmament, even if sincerely carried out, would be a "false illusion" which could lead to war within a year.

British Minister of State David Ormsby-Gore declared at the 10-nation disarmament conference that the destruction of nuclear weapons would not destroy the knowledge needed to make them.

Ormsby-Gore said mere agreement to destroy nuclear weapons and the means of delivering them, as proposed by Russia, would "build false hopes and give false illusions."

"War could start within a year if someone could make a nuclear bomb," he said.

Before Ormsby-Gore spoke, Poland's Marian Nazskowski had endorsed Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's new disarmament plan.

Nazskowski emphasized Khrushchev's insistence that nuclear powers should not pass on their knowledge to other countries.

Publix Sells 30 Acre Tract

A 30 acre tract of land was purchased on Hwy. 17-82 near SR 436 by the Eastern Shopping Centers Inc., from Publix Super Markets chain for \$315,000.

The large tract, purchased last week, had been originally purchased by the Publix chain in April from Frank Russell.

Sources disclosed a huge shopping center would be constructed on the land, but no time or details were released.

The tract of land has already been zoned for commercial use.
