Grave New Reverses Threaten Singapore; Jap Planes Are Hit

Hard-Pressed British Troops Fall Back Before Jap March On Malayan Front

Defenders Yield On Both Flanks

Chinese Try To Wipe Out 40,000 Nipponese Caught In Trap

On the Malayan front, grave new reverses marked the British stand today against the Japanese drive toward Singapore. The British acknowledged their hard-pressed defenders yielded further ground at both ends and the front under attacks by land and air.

A Chungking military spokesman said today 40,000 Japanese troops are caught in a trap on the plains northeast of Singapore. The spokesman said the Japanese forces of 100,000 troops to Yachow, 100 miles to the north.

Most hearing to Singapore's people of all developments were the quick progress made in consolidation of forces after the appointment of General Sir Archibald F. Wavell as supreme Allied commander in the Far East, and consequent indications that the Japanese tank might be soon at the front.

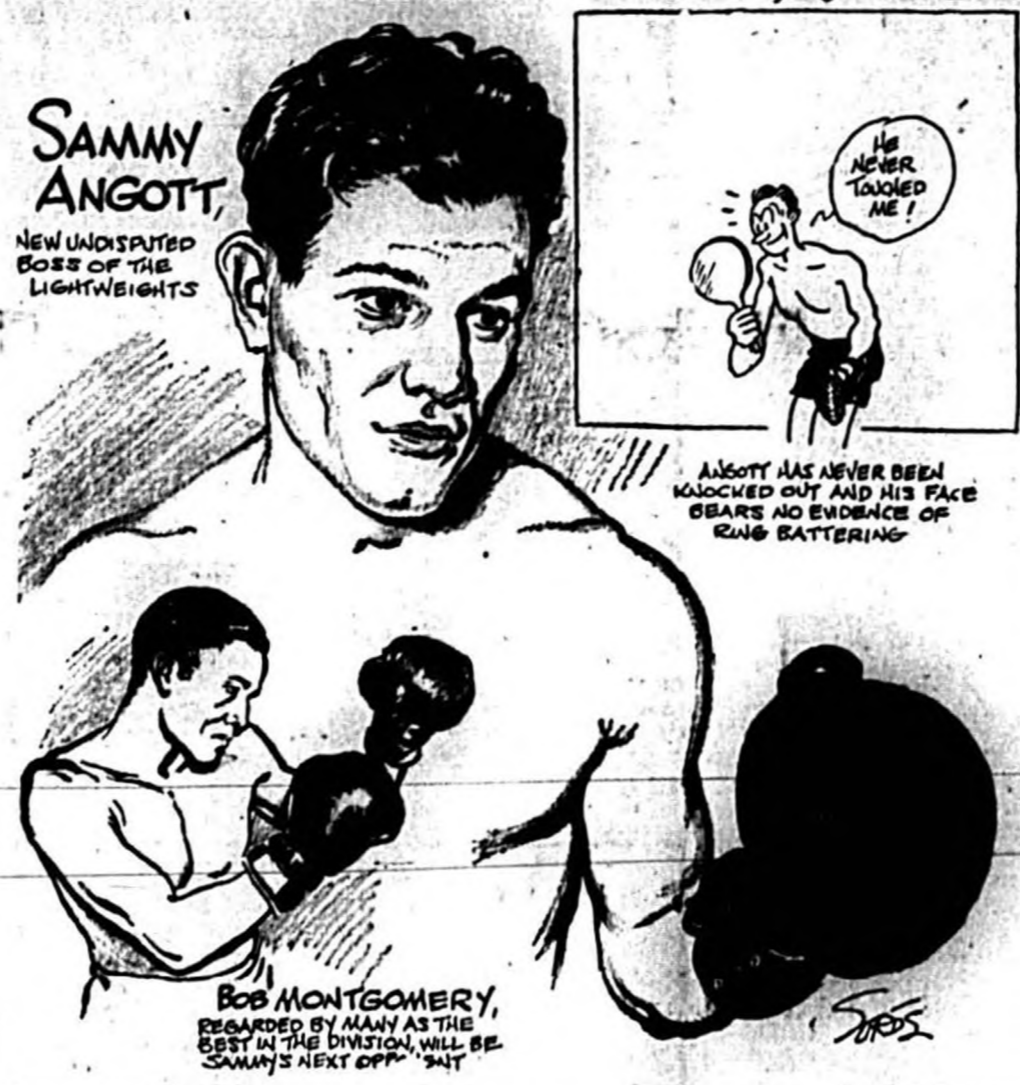
Enemy Sub Rumors Not To Be Printed

Carnera Was Biggest Heavyweight Champ

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—(AP)—William Muldoon, the strong solid man of boxing's early days, used to refer to the particularly big and heavy heavyweights as dreadnaughts to distinguish them from the regular heavies who ran 175 to around 220 pounds.

Boxing has had comparatively few of these dreadnaughts and only a half dozen or so have actually challenged for the championship. Buddy Baer, who gets his second shot at the title against Louis on Jan. 9, is one of the biggest. He weighed 237½ for his first fight and expects to weigh around 244 for his second.

The biggest fighter to fight for the title—and also to win it—was Primo Carnera. He weighed 260 in fighting trim. Carnera, the Ambling Alp from Italy, won the title in 1933 by knocking out Jack Sharkey in 6 rounds. He lost it to Max Baer in 1934, being kayoed in 11 rounds.

Two other big men held the title. Jim Jeffries, who won it in 1889, weighed around 230. Jess Willard, who won from Jack Johnson in 1915, weighed around 46. Perhaps the second largest man to fight for the title was Abe Simon, 254, who was knocked out in 13 rounds by Louis in 1941.
