WORLD IN BRIEF

South African Troops Invade Angola; 200 Die

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (UPI) - South African troops invaded Angola in the nation's biggest military operation since World War II, killing more than 200 guerrillas and destroying their main base camp in a week-long invasion, the government an-

The South African Broadcasting Corp. Friday showed graphic films of the lightning invasion aimed at wiping out the Angolan sanctuary of guerillas from Namibia, calling the push South Africa's biggest single

military operation since World War II. South Africa has administered South-West Africa, called Namibia by the United Nations, since the end of World War I. The area's main guerrilla group, the South West African People's Organization, or SWAPO, has waged a low-key guerrilla campaign for 14 years trying to wrest control of the mineral-rich territory from South Africa.

Many Hurt In Iran Riot

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) - Several people injured in a mass protest near the U.S. Embassy in Tehran blamed revolutionary guards for inciting the bloodiest rioting since the former shah was overthrown.

The official organ of the Islamic fundamentalist group accused an underground guerrilla cell that helped topple the former monarch of provoking the riot Thursday to help gain control of the government.

Carter Out Of Ideas

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The White House has refused to rule out further military action against Iran, but President Carter says a peaceful approach through diplomatic and economic channels is the best way to free the 53 U.S. hostages held since last November. Carter acknowledged in an interview released Friday he has no new ideas on how to free the hostages.

PLO May Join Peace Talks

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The door has been left open for future participation by the Palestine Liberation Organization in the Mideast peace talks, but the PLO won't be allowed to enter until it renounces its commitment to destroy Israel, says Secretary of State

"The ball is in the PLO's court," Muskie said Friday statement calling for a PLO role.

Germany To Stay Ally

WASHINGTON (UPI) - West German Chanceller Helmut Schmidt has assured the United States it can "depend on the bloody Germans." The high-level diplomatic assurance West Germany will not break with the allies on Afghanistan or European disarmament was relayed to Secretary of State Edmund Muskie Friday by Sen. Joseph Biden, D-Del, who was invited to meet Schmidt Wednesday in

The commission, which usually holds its budget workshops in late July or August, agreed to the earlier time after hearing a report from City Manager Warren Knowles. ployees. After the decision is made on the percentage of salary increases to be given nployees, the lengthy plan must be retyped. He estimated it will take 4 to 5 weeks for city

Knowles said Friday the tax laws passed by the Legislature during the session which ended this week were not as detrimental to local government as expected.

One of the laws places a limitation of sorts on the amount of property taxes a city can levy. The limitation is 8 percent more than the The law in effect last year required local government to receive approval from the

to vote in favor of increasing property taxes by more than 8 percent, without a referen-

The Legislature also passed laws calling for increased homestead exemptions to property owners, if certain conditions exist. Knowles said the new law provides for homeowners to be given a \$15,000 homestead exemption the first year (rather than \$5,000) if property is being appraised for tax purposes at 100 percent of fair market value; at \$20,000 the second year, contingent upon the same condition, and at \$25,000 the third year, based

In counties like Seminole, which the state considers to be appraising property at 65 percent of market value, the homestead exemption will remain at \$5,000 for general

In other business, the commission: Instructed City Attorney Vernon Mize to prepare an ordinance abandoning rights of way for portions of Water Street, Fulton Street, Commercial Street, N. Jessamine Avenue and Oleander Avenue lying between Mangoustine Avenue and between West First Street and Seminole Boulevard. The Hospital Corp. of America (HCA), which plans to build a new 226-bed hospital on the 171/2-acre site surrounding the rights of way, requested the

A spokesman for HCA said the firm has options on the properties and will exercise those options within the next few months. Commissioner John Morris stated his concern about the city abandoning the rights of way before HCA actually acquires the property. The commissioners agreed to pass the ordinance of abandonment on first reading at its next meeting, but to withhold final passage until the firm actually acquires the property. Mayor Lee P. Moore emphasized that the city commission has no more than 5 percent. The new law permits saying the city action is only a precautionary

Third Volcanic Eruption

Not The Last, Scientists Say

VANCOUVER, Wash. (UPI) - Mount Welens gave the Pacific Northwest an ominous Friday the 13th message: the volcano is far from dead.

The mountain's third major eruption in less than a month shot ash and pumice over 4,500 square miles of northwestern Oregon and parts of southwest Washington Thursday night, making Friday unlucky for residents hampered by heavy deposits of the messy

And scientists said Friday there is every chance the volcano will explode again,

The eruption occurred a few hours before the moon's gravitational pull on the earth was at its greatest strength since May 17, the day before the volcano's cataclysmic eruption that blew a cubic mile off its top, flooded rivers, sent huge ash clouds across the nation and claimed as many as 70 lives.

Financier Gets Maximum

NEW YORK (UPI)- Italian financier M Sindoma has been sentenced to 25 years in prison and fined the maximum \$207,000 for committing the "extordinarily serious" crimes that led to the biggest bank failure in U. S. history.

The penalties, imposed Friday, were perhaps the most severe ever given for a white collar crime. He will still face charges in Italy of embezzling funds from two Milan banks he owned.

Judge Convicted On 2 Counts

AKRON, Ohio (UPI)- Retired Judge George McMonagle has convicted Summit County Probate Court Judge James Barbuto of two sex-related offenses but says he had to clear him of a more serious attempted rape charge even though he was convinced Barbuto committed the crime.

No date was set for sentencing, but he could get a maximum 1-10 years on the intimidation conviction and six months to five years on the sexual imposition

The survey shows Reagan beating President Carter badly in the West, and narrowly in industrial states and parts of Carter's native South.

Fish Kill Danger In Area Receding

Herald Staff Writer

The threat of new fish kills along the St. Johns River and its main lakes was reduced over the weekend, a local biologist

The problems caused by the dead fish were also eased for families in the hardest-hit area when Game and Freshwater Fish Commission employees worked Saturday to dredge five truckloads of dead fish from Cypress Cove.

The amount of algae in lakes Jessup and Harney and in spots being watched by commission crews dropped this weekend. biologist Harold Moody said today. On Friday Moody had warned the two lakes and other sec-

tions of the river were on the verge of following the series of events which obliterated the fish population along a six-mile stretch of the St. Johns near Lemon Bluff last Wednesday. But good weekend weather allowed the algae bloom to start "running its course" Moody said, explaining continued good weather would allow the algae to use up excess nutrients slowly and gradually die back without killing fish.

next few days should not create enough cloud cover to kill off all the algae at once, conditions which would lead to more massive kills, Moody said. Moody has also revised his estimate of the number of fish

The isolated thunderstorms predicted for the area over the

killed last week to 10 million from the 100,000 originally believed to have died. A sudden algae death last Tuesday and Wednesday reduced oxygen levels in the water to near zero along a six-mile stretch of river, suffocating almost all life in the water.

About 90 percent of the fish killed were shad, mostly small threadfins, Moody said. But the kill also wiped out all game fish along the stretch of river including many large bass, he The fish kill is not over. Fish will continue to die for the next


