U.S. officer killed in Manila

MANILA. Philippines - Suspected communist guerrillas armed with assault rifles shot and tilled an American Vietnam War hero Friday in his car two blocks from his office at U.S. military

headquarters in the capital, authorities said. Col. James (Nick) Rowe, 51, Joint U.S. Military Advisory Group (JUSMAG) ground forces director, was hit by a single bullet in the back of the head and died at the Philippine armed forces medical center about an hour later, police said.

Rowe's driver, Josquin Benoys, was wounded but was able to drive two blocks to the heavily guarded cream and brown JUSMAO offices in suburban Quezon City.

North jury begins deliberations

WASHINGTON - Oliver North's jury, opening deliberations Friday, must consider whether the ex-White House aide ever had clear and direct orders from his superiors to commit crimes arising from the Iran-Contra scandal.

But U.S. District Judge Gerhard Gesell, in legal instructions delivered Thursday, told the jurors, "Neither the president nor any of (North's) superiors had the legal authority to order anyone to violate the law."

Four Florida men among casualties on USS lowa

At least four Florida sailors were among the 47 crewmen killed in a gun turret explosion aboard the USS lows, the Navy said Thurs-

They were identified as Robert Kenneth Morrison, 34, legalman 1st class, Jacksonville; Ramon Jerel Bradshaw Jr., seaman recruit, Tampa; Scott Alan Holt, seaman apprentice, Fort Myers; and Harold

Earl Romine Jr., seaman recruit, Bradenton. Bradshaw, 19, graduated from King High School in Tampa and had been in the Navy less than a year.

"I was informed that he was presumably dead." his mother Elizabeth said. "They said that when they had their muster count that he never came up and that they had several counts and he was never accounted for and that, you know, he was presumably dead at this point."

Bradshaw worked in the gun turret and his mother said when he was home on leave two weeks ago he told some relatives there were problems on the lowa, but did not elaborate.

"He told me there had been some problems, and that they were supposed to have it repaired and they were having inspection the first of the month." she said. When asked if he was worried about the

problems, she said. "No, it was something he thought would be fixed." When asked if it involved problems in the turret, she said, "He didn't say where.'

Romine, who joined the Navy eight months ago, also was 19. His mother, Dellar Romine, said she was asleep when a Navy official knocked on the door of her Bradenton home.

"And about the time I woke up this knock came at the door, and I remember that my son said that he had been told we wouldn't know anything probably unless we had a knock at the door. And I just knew that that was it," she said.

She said her son had told her the ship was repaired several months ago, but he had not mentioned any problems with it since then.

"He was in good spirits when I talked to him last," she said. "And he always told me numerous times that if anything ever hap-pened to him for me to remember that he loved me."

Morrison's regular job was preparing legal papers on disciplinary actions. Morrison's father, Robert, said he thought his son's battle station must have been the turret.

Murder suspect returns to U.S.

SANTA ROSA, Calif. - Ramon Salcido, the fugitive winery worker who conferred to killing his wife and six others in a jealous rage, was jailed on murder charges today after being returned to California from Mexico.

Sonoma County Sheriff's Capt. Phil Groat said Salcido, 28, was placed under close watch in the county jail, where the mass-mulder suspect was "housed alone" and was under the "highest security." "He can't be mixed with other inmates." Groat said. "We want to ensure we eliminate unnecessary movement."

Court expands hospitals' liability

TALLAHASSEE — The Florids Supreme Court ruled Thursday that hospitals can be held liable for malpractice committed by doctors using their facilities, even if the negligent doctor is not a staff doctor.

The unanimous ruling adopts the legal doctrine of corporate negligence, meaning non-iter own patients an independent duty to supervise and monitor the performance of doctors who work within their halls. Hospitals have long been liable for malpractice by staff doctors, The ruling extends that responsibility to private doctors permitted to use a hospital' shellities. "Hospitals are in the best position to protect their patients and consequently, have an independent duty to select and retain competent independent physicians seeking staff privileges." wrote Justice Ben Overton. The ruling covers doctors conduct only while they are treating patients within a hospital. It does not cover their behavior in their private offices. The ruling means the Humans-Blockyne Hospital in North Miami must defend itself against a negligence suit brought by the family of Midred Insings, a 68-year-old woman who died after being admitted to the facility in 1981. Bite was admitted to the facility in 1981. Bite was admitted under the care of a man identifying himself as Dr. Michelle LaBella. His real name was Morton Canton. He was a fugitive under indictment in Canada for selling and manufacturing illegal drugs.

State to deny dredge permit

TALLAHASSEE — Florida officials said Thursday they will deny the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers a 25-year permit to dredge the environmentally sensitive Apalachicols River to benefit Georgis and Alabams shippers. Dale Twachtmann. secretary of the Department of Environmental Regulation, said he could not certify the project would meet state water quality standards. He also said the corps could not show it would dispose of dredging spoils in an environmentally safe manner. Twachtmann said he consulted with Gov. Bob Martines on the matter. "The governor concurs in the decision and will

the matter. "The governor concurs in the decision and will support it fully." he said.

Shipping interests along the Flint and Chattahoochee rivers in Alabama and Georgia have been feuding for years with Florida officials over dredging the Apalachicola to boost barge

Florida has been allowing some dredging, but the river has been closed to barge traffic several months each year because of drought conditions. The current permit expires in February 1990.

Florida officials have been reluctant to risk permanent damage to the river and fear losing control of the river if the 25-year permit is imued. Dredging over a long period of time could also damage the rich oyster beds in Apalachicola Bay, according to marine biologists.

TALLAHASSEE - The state Supreme Court extended Thursday the stay of execution given to a man convicted of shooting two women and llien culting their throats when he realized the gunshots failed to kill them.

Also on Thursday, the high court struck down the death penalty of a man convicted of shooting to death another man in Broward County. Roy Allen Harich was sentenced to death

Koy Allen Hanch was sentenced to death for the 1981 murder of Carlene Gayle Kelley near Daytona Beach. According to court records. Harich picked up Kelley and a sociand woman as they were hitchhiking. Harich took the women to a wooded area, pulled a gun and raped Kelley. He then shot

both women in the head. Neither of the women were killed by the gunahots, so Harich took a knife and cut both their throats.

Harich left the two for dead, but the second woman lived and managed to crawl to a nearby road and obtain help. Harich had been scheduled to die March

30, but was given an indefinite stay of execution by the Supreme Court when his attorneys showed that Harich's trial lawyer had served as a special deputy sheriff in an adjacent county. Harich, who had not been told of his lawyer's deputy status, claimed his lawyer's status was a clear conflict of interest.

On Thursday, the court ordered a special evidentiary hearing to determine whether the lawyer's ties to law enforcement had affected his ability to adequately defend Harich. The court said that the stay of execution will remain in effect indefinitely.

John O'Callaghan was sentenced to death for the 1980 murder of Geraid Vick in Broward County.

According to court records, O'Callaghan and co-defendants Walter Tucker and Anthony Cox took Vick into the kitchen of a bar and beat him uniti he was unconscious. They then drove Vick to a secluded area where he was shot and killed by O'Calladhan,

In his appeal, O'Callaghan successfully argued that the judge in his trial had made a serious mistake when he instructed the jury on what mitigating factors it could take into consideration in deciding whether to order the death penalty.

Plan says taxpayers to pay **Insurance** for AIDS patients

TALLAHASSEE - Florida taxpayers would pay group health insurance premiums for some AIDS sufferers too sick to work and pay their own insur-ance costs under a plan dised Thursday by a Senate budget subcommittee.

Members of the subcommittee on social services worried about the consequences for small businesses already beset by premium hikes of up to 500 percent. They said some are already closing their doors because of the increased costs for illnesses completely un-related to acquired immune deficiency syndrome

Chairman William "Doc" Myers, R-Hobe Sound, said the plan could save the taxpayers money in the long run, despite money in the long run, despite the potential for further large increases in group insurance contributions by employers and healthy workers.

No one could estimate what the plan would cost statewide. The subcommittee agreed informally to select a single county for a test run to see if the plan would be cost effective.

The 350-member headquarters that commands U.S. troops in Central and South troops in Central and South America must leave Panama by the end of 1999 under the Panama Canal Treaty, and a study team is evaluating bases as possible relocation sites. Army spokesman Lt. Col. Dick Bridges told The Tampa Tribune the study team visited MacDill and Patrick Air Force Base in Brevard County last week, and is

Brevard County last week, and is in San Antonio, Texas, this week looking at Fort Sam Houston and Brooks Air Force Base. He said three Louisiana installations - England Air Force Base, Fort Polk and Naval Air Station New Orleans - also are under consideration. Bridges said Homestead Air

Command moving to MacDill has sparked plans by the U.S. Special Operations Command the U.S. Central Command to try to move their headquarters. elsewhere.

The U.S. Special Operations Command is lobbying to relocate to Fort Bragg, N.C., home of commando units as the counter-terrorist Delta Force and Army Green Berets that fall under its control.

"Two-thirds of our forces are located there. It's the logical place to go," said command spokesman Col. Thomas Jones.

The Central Command, which has responsibility for the Middle East and the Persian Gulf area, is looking at relocating at least part of its headquarters in an unidentified Middle East nation, according to spokesman Lt. Col. Chuck Manker. But he said the

The Pentagon will announce its choice in July.

"MacDill is the ideal location as far as distance (from Latin America) is concerned." said hometown Rep. Sam Gibbons, D-Fia. "It's got the communication equipment. It's got two excellent headquarters buildings and facilities for any kind of staff you'd need."

"The main thing would be that MacDill is in a transportation hub convenient to Miami," Col. Ronald Conyers of the Southern Command told The Tribune. "That's the only port to this part of the world."

Command is just a small part of mands.

With a staff of only 350 people, the Southern Command wouldn't be a huge economic boom to Tampa, Gibbons said, but as the link between Pentagon leadership and troops in the sensitive region, it commands high visibility and a disproportionate number of high-ranking officers.



Who would be the last public man in America to be described as a) wishy washy. b) media-manipulated, c) defeatist? Answer: Pat Buchanan,

Over the years, as both a private commentator and a public figure, Buchanan has been the crystalline, hard-line conservative. Agree with him or not, he has been consistent, coherent and clear-headed. Above all, he takes a position. Hamiet He ain't.

But consider Buchanan's views now on Israel. Over the years his position has been staunchly "pro-larael." He has generally maintained that lamel is pro-Western, pro-American, and that the Arab radical states, and the PLO, have been pro-Soviet and pro-terrorist.



The real fountain of ambition

WASHINGTON - Of all the forces that shape our politics, the most basic is probably ambition. It's ambition that powers campaigns and provides competition for public office. Inside government, conflicting ambitions un-derlie many of policy battle and most bureaucratic struggles. For a matter of such fundamental im-

portance, ambition has received surprisingly little ecrious attention from journalists or scholars. As reporters, we sometimes note stunning examples of ambition, as with Rep. Newi Gingrich's (R-Ga.) instant decision to go after the House minority whip's job vacated by the appointment of Dick Cheney as secretary of defense. And sometimes we puzzle briefly over the seeming lack of presidential ambition among men like Gov. Mario M. Cuomo, Sen. Bill Bradley and Sen. Sam Nunn. But 1 had not seen anything that examined

seriously the way in which that basic motivation shapes our system of government. until the mails recently brought a yale University Press book called "Policical Ambi-tion: Who Decides to Run for Congress." The authors are Linda L. Fowier and Robert D. McClure, both on the faculty at Syracuse University.

It's a case study of what happened in upstate New York's 30th Distirct in the first two election after its veteran and venerated congressman, Barber B. Conable, Jr., decided to retire in 1984.

Conable (now president of the World Bank) was one of the most influential moderate Republicans in Congress. In 1984, his seat went to a staunch conservative named Fred Eckert, a man well to the right of Conable. But two years later, the voters of the 30th replaced Eckert with a populist/liberal woman Demo-crat. Rep. Louise Slaughter, who holds the scat today

On the face of it, it looks as if the voters had become a bit schizo after Conable stepped down, veering first to one extreme and then coming far back in the other direction. That's the way the story would normally be told. But Fowler and McClure convincingly argue

that most of the explanation for the seeminly erratic course of events in the 30th lies elsewhere: in the highly personal decisions of a dozen or so potential candidates in both parties whether to indulge their ambitions for a House seat, delay them or deny them.

"In every congressional district in the United States," they write. "there are (dozens of) people who could run for Congress but who choose not to when the opportunity arrives." Officeholders, community leaders, political operatives - these "unseen candidates" are usually well known to each other, identifiable to anyone active in the civic life of that area. Whether they number five or 50, they always

outnumber the actual candidates and often they dwarf them in their abilities and potentials.

"Political Ambition" tells, in narrative fash-ion, why and how the "unseen candidates" in

the 30th made their individual decisions to run or not run in 1984 and 1986.

All of them, unsurprisingly. calculated their chances of winning. but some had far more accurate perceptions of the political makeup of the district than others. That information gap may have been crucial in some declaions to duck the race. Several state legislators were too comfortable or secure politically to risk a congressional campaign.

For others, the opening came at an inopportune time for

their families or business or professional careers. Others' ambition was blunted by the reactions of party leaders at the local, state and national levels. For some, it was a question of money: for others, a question of where they wanted to live and work.

All of them,

unsurprisingly, calculated

their chances of winning

Eckert hardly paused to consider these questions. His ambition for Congress was an instant spur to action, even when stuck in a most inconveniently out-of-way location as the Reagan administration's ambassador to Fijl. Others, like Slaughter, said no. despite great encouragement, in 1984, but thought again and said yes in 1986. It was this complex web of personal decision-making, far more than the makeup of the district or the will of its voters. which shaped the seemingly erratic political course of the 30th.

Fowler and McClure were smart to focus their study of ambition on a House contest: The quality of competition in House races is a matter of concern, as re-election rates for incumbents top 98 percent year after year.

One implication I drew from the book (but not stated explicitly) is that, given the variety of personal and political factors that blunt ambitions for Congress, a national effort (such as Republicans are now planning) to recruit better House candidates can affect these decisions only marginally.

cohesive investigation. After the crash, family members had to pry information about their loved ones' remains from Scottish police. They slamped death certificates and gave the families a State department phone number to call for more information. The number was always busy.

At a recent Senate hearing, Bert Am-merman, spokesman for the victims' families, offered to give the State Department free leasons on human relations. Collins' subcommittee tackled the in-

vestigation with gusto, despite reluctance from Pan Am and the FAA to release documents. The FAA refused even to give Congress its aviation security guidelines. Hershow was well on the way to getting some answers when she was yanked off the case.

A spokeswoman for Collins told our associate Jim Lynch that the congresswoman didn't want to discuss "personnel matters." She said the subcommittee work is marching ahead and Collins is planning a hearing, although she didn't know when it would take place.

Lee Kreindler, an attorney for 65 of the surviving families, told us firing Hershow was a mistake. "She's a crackerjack," he said.



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

EPA urges schools to test for radon

WASHINGTON - The Environmental Protection Agency urged all schools to test for radon, saying half of 130 schools checked nationwide had at least one room with elevated levels of the radioactive gas.

In a speech at the National Press Club, EPA Administrator William Reilly said Thursday his agency found 19 percent of the 3,000 schoolrooms tested in 16 states had radon levels above 4 picocuries per liter of air - the "action level" at which the EPA recommends corrective action.

Nuclear plant receives license

WASHINGTON - The Nuclear Regulatory Commission granted a full-power operating license for the Shoreham nuclear plant after 13 years of controversy, challenging an unprecedented agreement to close the New York facility.

By a vote of 4-0 Thursday, the NRC approved the license application initially filed by Shoreham's owner, the Long Island Lighting Co., in January 1976.

"We want to ensure we eliminate unnecessary movement."

Sheriff Dick Michaelsen was clearly relieved yet reticent as Salcido was finally escorted into the jall after being flown from Mexico late Thursday

aboard a Lear jet owned by "Peanuts" cartoonist Charles Schulz, a longtime Santa Rosa resident. "What's there to say," Michaelsen said of the

case that has shocked and saddened the community.

Salcido, who faces the death penalty, was to be arraigned either today or Monday. In the meantime, he will undergo medical and pyschological tests designed to "separate the prey from the predator," Groat said.

Salcido was jeered by about 100 angry, sign-waving people who showed up at the Sonoma County Jail and shouted "Kill him! Kill him!" when the suspect arrived in a sheriff's car shortly before midnight Thursday.

He had arrived a few minutes earlier at a nearby airport on the flight from Mexico.



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

The other half of Sunday's concert will feature compositions and arrangements by Arena and others.





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

Rich traded it all for God

SANFORD - The Rev. Dave Rich, former country-music singer from Kentucky, has chosen Sanford as the final stop

to build his ministry. Rich, 53, who calls the likes of Willie Nelson, Johnny Cash, Hank Williams Sr. and Jr., and Merle Haggard friends, left fame and fortune to become a fulltime minister. For the past 33 years Rich, 53, has traveled all over the world conducting spiritual revivals.

Rich, who refers to himself as a "pioneer evangelist," said he has been praying for four years to find a place to settle.

"I knew the time was coming when I should establish something," Rich said. He said he knew Central Florida was the place to settle after a particularly charged all-night revival in Ocala In 1983.

"The services went on until 6 a.m. It just exploded," Rich said.

Since the beginning of the year, Rich has been leading revivals under a tent for his church, the House of David Word Center in Sanford near Flea World. His associate pastor, Don Neal, who is also his cousin, said they just finished 106 nights of non-stop revivals for about 40 to 50 people from the area. Rich, who speaks in the pleasant, cooing drawl of Ken-tucky, said he is preparing to build a church on the five acres of land off Hester Avenue which he expects will accomodate 200 to 400 people.

Rich, who was one of seven children, was raised in an environment of religion and music in Central City, Kentucky, 90 miles from Nashville, Tenn.

Colson spoke at the 22nd annual Mayors' Prayer Breakfast, attended by various elected officials and an audience of nearly 2.000.

Colson, who attracted widespead noterity for his involvement in the Watergate scandal, now challenges listeners with the story of how he was transformed from a prisoner of his own lusts to founder of the **Prison Fellowship Ministries.**

"Back then the whole world mocked my decision, and I would have done the same thing had I been in their shoes," Colson said. "I realized that my Christian faith was more on trial than I was for Watergate. But today, I'm more convinced of the reality of Jesus Christ than my own reality."

It wasn't long ago that Colson was looking out of the windows of the White House. This honor graduate of Brown University and renowned lawyer had an office next to President Richard M. Nixon, whom he served as special counsel from 1969-73. He was living the "American dream." Power, pomp and prestige were at his beck and call. He never felt emptier in his entire life.

One night in Phillips' driveway, tears streamed down the face of this ex-Marine captain and political hatchet man as he committed his life to Christ.

The next stop was prison. Colson pleaded guilty to disseminating derogatory information to the press about Daniel Elisberg, who was awaiting trial for theft and publication of classified documents. Colson spent a total of seven months in two federal prisons for his crime.

It was in the cold confines of a place that offered little, if any, consolation that Colson found what he calls the paradox of life.

"Real security and meaning only come through a personal relationship with Christ," Colson said. "The object of life isn't prosperity but the maturing of the soul. Pascal, the French philospher, once said, "There's a God-shaped vacumn in the heart of every person that can only be filled by Jesus Christ."

"The greatest threat to humanity isn't a nuclear holocaust or the greenhouse effect. It's fundamentally a spiritual crisis, a character crisis."

Sincerity was the one aspect of Colson's address that impressed Sanford Mayor Bettye Smith the most.

'I've been somewhat skeptical of him (Colson) or anyone who found religion when they got in trouble." Smith said. "But I was truly inspired. He kept things very simple, but Christianity is simple. We're required to sacrifice our selfishness."

"My only desire is that everybody has a chance to watch him again when he appears on cable television Friday and Sunday," said Lake Mary Mayor Richard Pess, echoeing many of Smith's sentiments.

"He probably learned how to keep things simple when he was in prison, but he basically spoke of the need for fulfillment and how to experience the basic joy needed for happiness."

Being legal doesn't make offending others right

It is one thing to protest the death sentence "imposed" on Salman Rushdie. It is another thing to defend his writing of 'The Satanic Verses."

Robert Runcie, the archbishop of Canterbury and spiritual head of the worldwide Anglican communion, said, "Only the utterly insensitive can fail to see that the publication of this book deeply offended Moslems."

An editorial in the official publication of the Episcopal Church in the Diocese of Southern Ohio points out the similarities between the movie. "The Last Temptation of Christ," and "The Satanic Verses."

"In both cases." says the editorial. "the most objectionable material dealt with fantasies of religious prophets. The fantasics of both were sexual. Both were fiction. While we cannot condone the violence unleashed in these events, we also cannot condone the abuse of poetic license which caused the furor." Perhaps the strongest of the Christian condemnations of Rushdie appeared in the Christian Science Monitor in an article written by Christopher Taylor, a student of Islamic history at Princeton University.

Referring to "the insulting depiction of Mohammed in a



dream sequence which can hardly be anything but deeply offensive to a true believer." Taylor says this "raises serious issues of Rushdie's responsibility and sensitivity as a writer.

"In searching for our own truths, how much can we destructively trample on and degrade the faith of others?" asks Taylor.

That was largely the question raised by those who objected to The Last Temptation of Christ." It was not only bornagain Christian fundamentalists who found the film blasphemous. An Anglican divine, Rev. William Oddie, a fellow at Oxford University, in a review written for the London Telegraph, called the movie bad beyond belief.

"This Jesus is not even meant to be a divine Savior," he wrote. "He is shown as being himself deeply perverse. He forgives no-

body. On the contrary, he asks a half-naked Mary Magdalene (whom he has just been voyeuristically watching having sex with a customer at her place of work) for forgiveness.

"He is violent and uncontrolled. He changes his mind. He is confused throughout. Why anyone would want to follow him is hard to imagine."

Like Rushdie's book, this movie insensitively tramples on the plety of others. It is like watching somebody walk all over the flowers in your garden. It is an act of vandalism. Certainly the Jesus in "The Last Templation of Christ" is not the Jesus we sing about in "What A Friend We Have in Jesus" or "Precious Lord, Take My Hand."

To the movie's defenders who say the film is intended to show the human Jesus, Oddie replies. "The point of Christ's humanity is not to show that he is human as we are. He came to show what God intended humanity to be."

As their supporters were at great pains to point out, Rushdie and Martin Scorsese, who directed "The Last Temptation of Christ," were within their legal and constitutional rights to do what they did. No laws were broken. Nothing was done that anybody could go to jail for

(except in Iran). But the lesson our age must learn is that having a right to do something does not necessarily mean it is right to do.

We have become a nation of laws and lawyers taught to think, "If it's not illegal it's OK." instead of "is it legal (or constitutional?" a better question to ask would be, is it right? Would your mother - or your kindergarten teacher - be proud of what you've done? Does it hurt anybody who doesn't deserve to be hurt?

l year of age. The origin is unknown. Some experts believe that infants who die from SIDS suffocate because their immature nervous systems do not appropriately trigger res-piration, especially when the child is asleep at night. Other pediatricians believe that SIDS children have ab-

normalities in their airways or hearts. Treatment is difficult because many SIDS victims die unexpectedly, without warning. Because this bizarre syndrome tends to run in families (10 times

greater incidence among siblings), high-risk children can be monitored at home with a device that signals the parents when the child becomes apneic (ceases breathing).





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
