By late summer, these skeletal structures will be part of a 156-unit condominium complex on the 2500 block of Howell Branch Road in south Seminole County. Construction is underway as scheduled on the two and three-bedroom single story units and two-story townhomes. Meanwhile, a site on the north shore of Lake Monroe in the Deltona-Enterprise area is being readied for the start of construction of 550 condominiums.

## Condo Construction Booms In Deltona, South Seminole

Five hundred fifty new condominium units will soon be lining a portion of the north shore of Lake Monroe in the Deltona-Enterprise area. If construction progresses as scheduled, 240 of the units will be ready for occupancy by the first quarter of 1981.

Most of the first 240 units have already been sold, according to Ralph Candeto, director of sales for the builder, the Deltona Corp.

In another area, construction is underway on a 156-unit condominium complex to be located in south Seminole County west of State Road 436 on Howell Branch Road.

Construction will begin for the Deltona-Enterprise development as soon as central sewer installation is completed, Candeto said.

The first phase of the project will be called Lakeside Condominiums and will involve construction of 240 two-bedroom, two-bath units that will have an approximate total selling price of \$18.8 million, Candeto said.

Although the first phase is very nearly sold out, Candeto said units in the next phase or phases are still available.

He explained the Deltona Corp. makes use of worldwide branch offices for selling and the first units were "mostly all sold as soon as they were released."

The complex will be built of masonry (cement block) on the lower level and wood frame on the second level.

Each unit will be of the same 932 square-foot floor plan, but location or view and level (first or second story) will determine the purchase price between \$43,450 and \$47,200, he said.

The units will all be centrally heated and cooled and have a balcony or terrace.

The first phase will be built in 20 three-building clusters. Each building will contain four units, two lower level and two upper level. Each cluster will contain 12 units. The complex will have a swimming pool, all-weather tennis courts and one and a half parking spaces per unit.

Candeto said he did not know if the complex would be part of Deltona or the town of Enterprise. It will be located, he said, off Enterprise Road near Doyle Road.

Total estimated cost of the project is \$24 million. The south Seminole project, known as Eastwood Village, will be located in the 2500 block of Howell Branch Road.

The project will contain single story units and two-level townhomes of stucco and cedar. No unit will be above or below another. The units will have from 1182 to 1634 liveable square feet and will be priced between

\$46,900 and \$63,000. The two and three bedroom units will have a minimum of two bathrooms. Models will be available in the late summer, according to sales representative Debra Sochacki.

Ms. Sochacki said each unit will include a number of energy saving devices such as a high efficiency heating and cooling system, R-22 insulation, a unit to utilize hot water from the air cooling system in the heating system, and an energy saving dishwasher.

Unit options, she said, include fireplaces, appliances, screened porches and a cedar vaulted ceiling.

Each purchaser, she added, will have the opportunity to customize his unit with choices of cabinets, carpeting, light fixtures and tile.

"The complex will have a clubhouse, pool and tennis courts, she said and is "quite unique for the area" because the builder has been environmentally conscious in attempts to preserve the natural surroundings.

In addition, she said, the units will be protected by a 10-year National Home Owners Warranty. They will have a Winter Park address. The builder is Harkins Construction of Lake Mary.

## Condition Critical Jordan Shot In Indiana

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (UPI) — Civil rights leader Vernon Jordan was shot in the back and seriously wounded early today in a motel parking lot. Police said they had no suspect or motive for the attack.

Jordan, 44, director of the National Urban League, underwent 4½ hours of surgery at Parkview Memorial Hospital and was listed in critical condition. Doctors said he was struck in the middle of the back by at least one bullet, which apparently fragmented on impact.

The shooting, which occurred at 2:05 a.m. EST, was the first attack on a prominent civil rights leader since the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. April 4, 1968 in Memphis, Tenn.

Robert Williams, executive director of the Fort Wayne Urban League, said he was convinced the shooting was not racially motivated and had nothing to do with speech Jordan made criticizing a swing to the right in U.S. politics.

Dr. Jeff Towles said Jordan was taken from surgery about 9 a.m. and said he was optimistic about the civil rights leader's condition.

He said Jordan was technically listed in critical condition because of the nature of the wound, but he was in satisfactory condition considering the amount of time he was in surgery.

Towles said he and Dr. Charles Schoenals found the main injury was internal bleeding and there was no fear of spinal injury.

The doctors could not determine how many times Jordan was shot because bullet or bullets fragmented. Towles said Jordan was shot in the back between the chest and pelvis.

Jordan spoke to about 450 people at an Urban League dinner Wednesday night at the Marriott Inn in Fort Wayne, attended a reception afterward, then left the motel and returned about 2 hours later.

Police spokesman Dan Gibson said a woman accompanying Jordan told investigators he parked his car about 50 feet from his room, got out and walked toward the rear of the auto.

Police said Martha Coleman, 36, a local Urban League director escorting Jordan back to his hotel, told investigators she heard a shot and Jordan fell to the ground.

Motel spokesman John Mann said Mrs. Coleman went to the front desk of the hotel and asked for an ambulance. He said motel security officer Bill Smith rushed out to Jordan.

"I understand he (Jordan) did point in the direction he felt the bullet came from," Mann said. "He said he was going to pass out, but he was conscious when they got to him, I'm told."

In Washington, FBI director William H. Webster ordered his special agent in Indiana to Ft. Wayne to investigate the shooting.

"If there is any indication of a violation of federal (civil rights) laws, we will devote whatever resources are necessary to bring this investigation to a successful and just conclusion," Webster said.

Jordan was shot in a city that has had relative racial calm for several years. There was a Ku Klux Klan march last fall, but it was orderly.

In the summers of both 1976 and 1977 there were outbreaks in the inner city, with mass gatherings and rock-throwing, but there was no rioting or burning, and the disturbances petered out after about a week.

In his speech Wednesday night, Jordan criticized the "blind enthusiasm of the country's apparent move to the right." He urged all blacks to vote in the 1980 presidential election, saying their vote could be decisive.

## Jordan Shooting Stuns National Black Leaders

By United Press International National black leaders expressed shock today at the shooting of Vernon Jordan, director of the National Urban League, and were at a loss to explain why the highly respected civil rights leader was gunned down.

Dr. Joseph Lowery of Atlanta, president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, said, "I'm stunned by it and I'm praying for his recovery. It's a crazy, violent world."

"But without knowing any further details, I'm just at a loss to understand why or what happened."

Lowery heads the organization founded by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who was assassinated in Memphis, Tenn. on April 4, 1968.

Jordan, 44, was shot twice in the abdomen outside a motel parking lot early today in Fort Wayne, Ind. Police said they had no motive or suspects in the shooting.

The Rev. Jesse Jackson of Chicago, president of Operation PUSH, said he was shocked by the shooting and, "I just don't know what it means."

Jackson said he would go to Fort Wayne today to join members of Jordan's family who were flying there.

Jordan's mother, Mary, who owns an Atlanta catering service, said she learned of the shooting about 6 a.m. and was too upset to talk. She said she would fly to Fort Wayne.

Lyndon Wade, executive director of the Atlanta Urban League chapter, said the shooting "was a tremendous shock and something that nobody gets prepared for. We still don't understand why it happened or what the motive was."

Atlanta civil rights activist John Lewis, who worked with Jordan in 1969, called the shooting "a tragedy for someone who has served the blacks and whites of this country as well as Vernon has and ends up hurt in this way. I just hope he can recover and continue to serve in the valuable way that he has in the past."

Dr. Ralph Abernathy, who succeeded King as head of the SCLC, called Jordan "one of the most articulate voices in the civil and human rights movement. He has the ability to cross racial barriers and work with blacks and whites and the Urban League is that type of organization."

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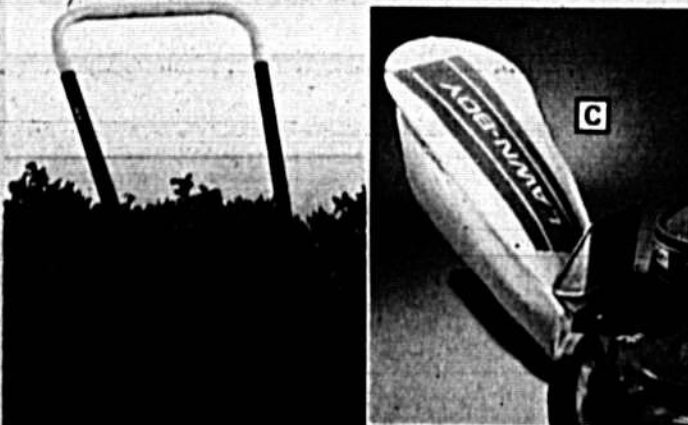
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## Legislature Clears Liquor License Bill

A bill limiting the number of liquor licenses to be available in Seminole County after the ocean is generated has passed both Houses of the Florida Legislature and is on the way to Gov. Bob Graham for signature. Sen. John Vogt, D-Cocoa Beach, reported today.

Vogt said the bill calls for one license to be issued for each 4,000 residents of the county. The old law permitted one license for each 2,500 residents.

The legislation does not affect motels, hotels, restaurants and private clubs.

Vogt sponsored the measure in the Senate while State Rep. Robert Hal-taway, D-Altamonte Springs, sponsored it in the House.

The legislation was requested by the Seminole League of Civic Associations. Representatives of the league said with the county's population having nearly doubled during the past decade it was expected under the old formula many new licenses would have been granted.

## Boy Who Lived In Bubble Dies

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Teddy DeVita, forced to live in a sterile environment inside a glass cubicle to protect him from germs his body could not fight, has died from complications caused by frequent blood transfusions.

The 17-year-old, who made medical history by surviving longer than any patient with aplastic anemia — a disease that cripples the body's germ defense system — died Tuesday at the National Institutes of Health in nearby Bethesda, Md.

DeVita developed the ailment in 1972 at the age of 9 and since then had lived behind glass barriers to protect him from germs.

The youngster lived in one of eight sterile isolation rooms set up by the institute for patients prone to infections, although he was sometimes permitted to make short excursions from the hospital, wearing a special space suit.

## Lake Mary To Ponder Project

The Lake Mary City Council and the city's Planning and Zoning Commission will meet in joint session at 6 p.m. today to consider the future of the proposed development by Sanford and Duluth, Minn. industrialist Jeno Paulucci of a 33-acre apartment and commercial section in the city.

The problem facing the planning and zoning commission is whether the city council wants it to adhere to the city's proposed land development plan or the one currently in force.

City Manager Phil Kulbes said the meeting was called at the request of the Planning and Zoning Commission "primarily to establish what policies the council wants planning and zoning to follow in adhering to the new comprehensive plan."

Paulucci is requesting permission to build apartments, townhouses and a small commercial section at the corner of Rantoul Lane and State Road 46A, Kulbes said.

Planning and zoning has tabled consideration of the proposal until after tonight's meeting. Kulbes said under the existing land use plan the parcel is designated for commercial and multi-family use but on the proposed plan, the parcel is designated for agricultural use.

The city council has not as yet adopted the new comprehensive plan. The plan has been sent to Seminole County officials and officials in nearby cities for comment.

UF Doctor Defends Physicians' Actions

A Sanford physician did everything right when treating a woman who died following surgery in September 1977, it was an unavoidable failure of the natural healing process which led to her death.

Florida medical school's Department of Surgery for more than 20 years, told the jury Dr. Franklin Clontz performed a perfectly proper operation on Judith Dowling Kelly on Aug. 31, 1977 at Seminole Memorial Hospital.

"No mechanism in biology is 100 percent reliable," he said in performing 12,000 similar operations, he has seen leaks in the tube develop this way twice, he added.

The three defendants, all of whom played roles in treating Mrs. Kelly for intestinal problems during the last three years of her life, are being sued by her parents, Rubin and Norma Greenfield, on behalf of the Greenfields and Mrs. Kelly's two children.

Drinking Age Bill Snags, Moves Back To House

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) — A bill raising the drinking age from 18 to 19 ran into further trouble today when the Senate voted to exempt active duty servicemen, a move forcing the bill back to the House.

The bill, raising from 18 to 19 the minimum age for purchase of beer, wine and liquor, has passed the full House and full Senate already but keeps getting bounced back and forth because of various amendments.

The Senate voted 26-12 for an amendment saying that active duty servicemen could continue to drink at age 18.

J.W. Hickman Loses Bid To Record Plat Of 21 Lots

The Seminole County Commission this week unanimously denied a request by J.W. Hickman that it record a plat of 21 lots on 185 acres of his Interstate-4 industrial park.

The commission denied the request because water and sewer service for the area has not been guaranteed.

Former County Commissioner Greg Drummond, representing Hickman, said the property is served by Lake Monroe Utilities, which is currently negotiating at the rate capacity allowed by the Department of Environmental Regulation. But he said the plat can handle much more and expects the DER to allow an increase. Hickman also owns Lake Monroe Utilities.

Drummond said a recorded plat now would make bankers angry willing to grant Hickman development financing.

Commission Chairman Bill Kirchhoff asked, however, if the bankers would be told there is no water or sewer available to the lots.

Mission To Build Home The New Tribes Mission will be allowed to build a home for retiring missionaries following a rezoning approval by the Seminole County Commission this week.

Wekiva Revision Denied Applause by about 30 county residents greeted the commission decision this week to deny a request for revising part of the Wekiva Hunt Club development's master plan.

Fike Denied Variance Bid The commission has denied the request of Robert Fike for a lot size variance to permit him to build two homes on property in Cooke Vista on Overseas Drive.

Angry Sea Skippers Consider Legal Fight

KEY WEST, Fla. (UPI) — Angry skippers who staged a noisy four-hour protest outside Key West's downtown federal building Wednesday say they may ask for a federal court injunction to regain custody of their fishing boats, seized for bringing Cuban refugees to the U.S.

They scheduled an afternoon meeting with Miami Attorney Ellis Rubin, legal counsel to Watergate burglars Frank Sturgis and E. Howard Hunt.

"He's coming down here just to see what we can work out," said David Trujillo, owner of Key West's T and R Seafood Co. and spokesman for the 550 captives. "We may get the injunction way to get the boats released and settle out of court later."

Customs inspectors have arrested two captains and seized nearly 700 boats for ferrying undocumented aliens across the Florida Straits since President Carter's order ending the so-called look effect May 15.

The seizure ended to a bare trickle early today. Two boats with 40 refugees reached Key West, bringing the total since April 21 to 47,469 refugees. To date, 27 boats have been seized.

"I'm entitled to make a profit. Any money I've made on this deal, I've lost because I have been able to go shrimp and I've had to live off something."

Senate Passes Spending Plan

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (UPI) — The Senate will vote out the rest of a \$950 million supplemental budget today and a conference committee will be called in to reconcile the plan with the House's \$676 million proposal.

The Senate passed a \$408.3 million general spending plan (SB 1183) 93-1 Wednesday. Sen. Don Chamberlin, D-S. Petersburg, sponsored. The Senate takes up a \$147 million education construction bill (SB 1184) today.

The House voted 107-6 for a supplemental general tax revenue appropriation (HB 1770) earlier Wednesday. That, together with a \$280 million schools construction bill (HB 1809) voted last week, gives it a total supplemental spending plan of \$676 million.

A conference committee is expected to begin work this weekend reconciling the two plans, a task which must be completed quickly if the Legislature is to adjourn June 6 as scheduled.

The big difference in the two proposals is that the House plan requires an \$87 million increase in property taxes for schools while the Senate plan does not.

The House budget gives local school boards the authority to boost taxes another \$50 million for general operations and to raise taxes another \$250 million for school construction. The Senate has rejected the general operations option, but it may go along with the school construction hike when a bill allowing that hits the floor later.

Senators voted to give members of the state Supreme Court a \$7,400 a year pay raise and give university faculty \$7 million more for salaries.

The House budget also raises Supreme Court justice and university faculty pay.

Jail Tunnel Found

POLK CITY, Fla. (UPI) — A well-planned, partially completed tunnel was discovered by guards at the Polk Correctional Institute Wednesday and about a dozen inmates were located up today pending further investigation.

Prison Superintendent James Tompkins said the inmates still were some 100 yards from any possible freedom when the tunnel was discovered.

"We received some information, some rather concrete information, Saturday that we had something going on but we didn't have a lead," Tompkins said today. "We located it on Tuesday in a classroom in an academic building under construction."

Tompkins said the inmates had devised a false bottom on a 3-foot-by-3-foot-by-3-foot metal chest and used it to hide the opening of the tunnel. He said the opening was discovered by guards drilling down through the bottom of the chest.

Eying Japan's Defense Debate

Prime Minister Masayoshi Ohira's government was defeated in a no-confidence vote in the Japanese House of Representatives recently by internal tensions in his Liberal Democratic Party. However, there are plenty of issues to fuel debate in the parliamentary elections that have now been set for June 22.

Japan is suffering rising inflation, there are serious charges of government corruption, and Prime Minister Ohira has gone further than any of his predecessors in urging an expansion of Japan's role in world affairs. Because the latter issue involves implementation of a five-year plan, to build up the Japan Self-Defense Force, some of the sharpest debate in the election campaign is likely to center upon military spending.

Ohira and his supporters have voiced well-founded concern in recent months over the decline of U.S. forces in the Western Pacific as elements of the 7th Fleet have been transferred to the Indian Ocean. At the same time, an alarming buildup of Soviet Far Eastern land, sea and air forces in the Far East goes on unabated. These serious developments have been matched by encouraging opinion polls showing public support for the Japan Self-Defense Force has risen to 68 percent. It is all the more unfortunate, therefore, that the Japanese defense budget seems unlikely at present to pass the benchmark of 1 percent of the gross national product. Even the currently projected 6.5 percent increase in the defense budget is controversial, because defense leaders regard it as inadequate. Nevertheless, some Japanese see the world in realistic terms, and one of Ohira's chief supporters in the business community has wisely urged re-establishing the military draft and increasing defense spending from the present .9 percent to 1.9 percent of the GNP.

Reagan: Heating Up

According to ABC and CBS, at least, Ronald Reagan won't though delegates in Michigan and Oregon to assure his nomination for president at the Republican National Convention in July.

Under the circumstances, the former California governor can be expected to look beyond George Bush, who now has dropped out of the GOP race; beyond the anti-climactic June 3 primaries, beyond the convention in Detroit, to the ultimate campaign this fall against Jimmy Carter, who also is on the verge of clinching the Democratic nomination.

Indeed, Reagan has been campaigning for several weeks against the incumbent president. But his words now will have greater impact. He will be one-on-one with the incumbent president on the issues. No longer will it be sufficient to condemn current White House policies, deplore the nation's leadership or emphasize vague philosophical differences. The challenger will have to explain in detail how he can do the job better — and defend his position. And he must embark against a tough competitor upon a more perilous campaign path where a slip can be fatal.

WILLIAM STEIF On How Customs Operates

It doesn't happen often, but it happens. An American citizen returns from overseas, starts to go through customs, and a suspicious customs agent takes the citizen aside and demands that he or she stop for a body search. A doctor or nurse does the actual searching, which can include body cavities. No warrant is required. Customs agents are empowered under U.S. law to conduct this rigorous kind of examination, and rightly so. Last year customs seized nearly \$3 billion worth of narcotics and other dangerous drugs.

You, of course, aren't going to be affected by the strip-and-search process. You wouldn't dream of bringing drugs into this country. But if you're leaving the United States this year — and millions of Americans are — you'll be coming back to one of the U.S. ports of entry, too, and you ought to think about that before you leave. In 1979 a total of 18.4 million passengers traveled by air across the North Atlantic, a 5.7 percent increase over 1978. Travel to the Far East and off-shore travel to the Caribbean are on the increase. Despite the recession, the U.S. Passport Office is getting more applications — in March there were 240,000 applications, up a percent over March 1979. Some travel industry leaders think 1982 could be "a record-breaker."

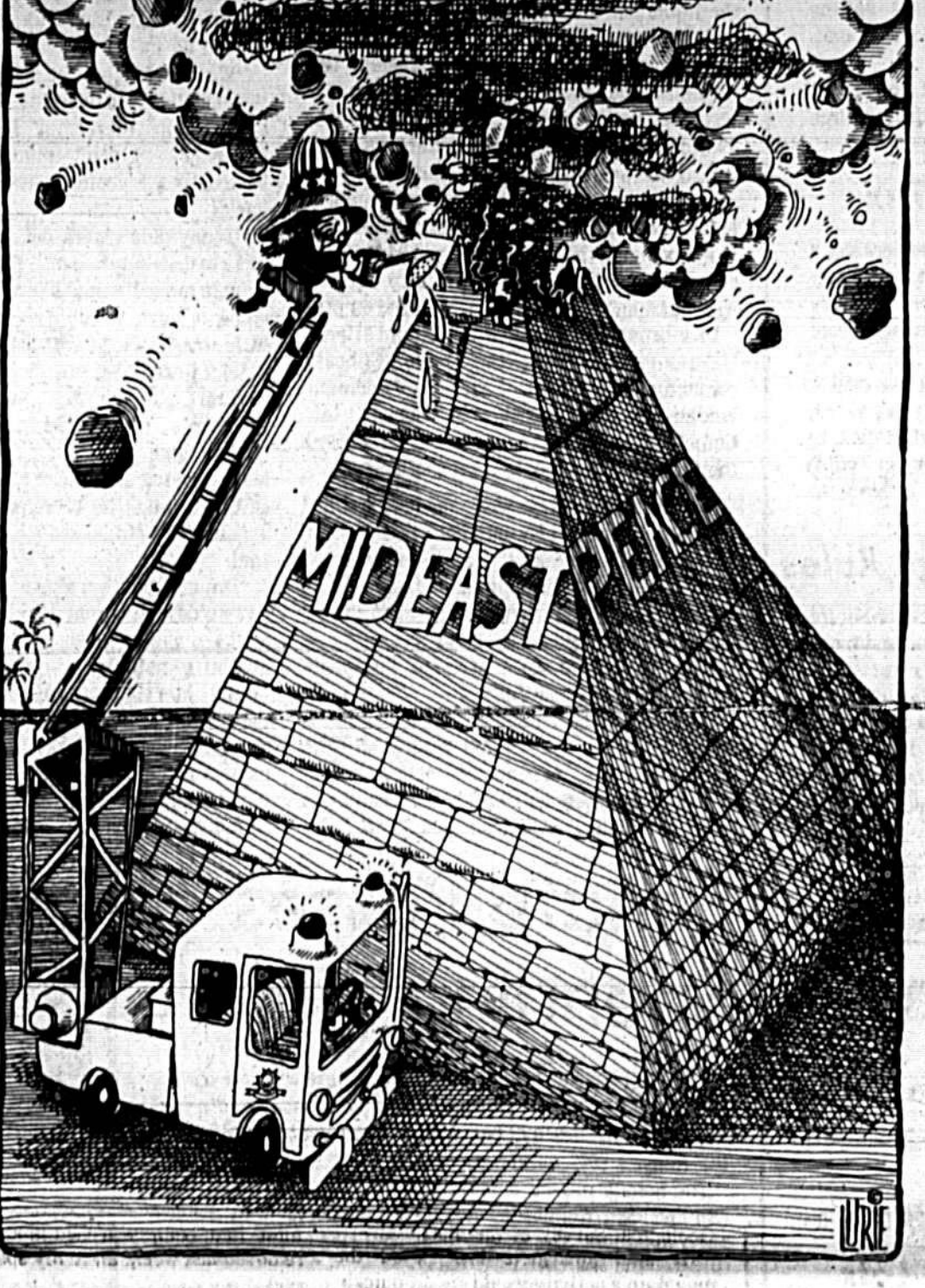
You'll probably want to bring something home from your trip. "Food and booze are the number one problems," says Charles Warren, who is the U.S. Customs Service's top public affairs officer, along with Michael Ingrasano Jr. "People spend money on alcoholic and Scotch and that have to surrender one (the sausage) and pay duty on the other. That's because they don't take the time and trouble to learn the rules beforehand."

Plants, animals and birds are problems, too. The Agriculture Department has strict rules about them to avoid importing epidemics. Warren and Ingrasano warn about the lure of foreign "duty-free stores." The goods they sell may seem cheap but, says Warren, "the goods are free of duty when you leave a country, not necessarily when you enter the United States."

More On 'Princess'

You may think you already have heard more than you want to about the television film "Death of a Princess."

It appears there may be more to come in the drama of the docudrama, made in Britain and shown in the United States, that has outraged official Saudi Arabia. Not exactly a sequel, but it follows-up in the format of a feature film on Britain's Princess Margaret.

A Pakistani film director is reported threatening to dramatize that somewhat messy royal life in retaliation for the televising of the fate of an adulterous Saudi princess that has been taken as an insult to the Islamic world.

Well, maybe it's a fair trade-off. But it's questionable how much of an audience the film would find among Britons and other Westerners, multitudes of whom have long since been bored to death by the escapades of the royal sister.

One thing would appear to be guaranteed well in advance about "Princess II," however. It will never play the palace. Considering the tough going the United States has experienced in persuading other countries to join its boycott of the Moscow Olympics in protest of the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, every little bit has to help.

SCIENCE WORLD Bird, Beast, Bloom

By ROBERT MUSEL LONDON (UPI) — The gay sparrow and these other items from the world of bird, beast and bloom, collected by the Fauna Preservation Society.

The population of the dusky seaside sparrow, rarest bird in the United States, is down 75 or fewer, all males. A reported female in the Titusville marshes in Florida turned out to be what the FPS delicately described as "a male exhibiting female behavior."

An Irish taxidermist saw the only American belted kingfisher ever to reach the Emerald Isle and promptly shot it dead. He was fined \$40. So many predators have been wiped out in Southern Africa that vultures, who feed on their kills, are starving. The Wildlife Study Group of Johannesburg is buying carcasses from farmers and putting them out for the vultures.

To make matters worse for vultures — those in Mysore, India for instance — natives are getting around the ban on hunting by stealing the kills of hunting dogs and other predators before the vultures can get to them. The Taiwan Provincial Assembly has been assured by the Chaiyi brewery that its tiger bone wine is from genuine tiger bones and not the bones of dogs and cats. The brewer produced documents to prove it annually import 2,400 pounds of bones — representing about 200 tigers — from Indonesia and Thailand. The wine is believed by its consumers to have medicinal value.

Migrating white storks have changed from day to night from over northern Algeria where they have found they can swoop effortlessly over the oil fields by gliding upwards on the warm air current of one flare and gliding the 3-mile interval towards the next flare. About 8,000 birds were seen doing this on a single night.

Another change in habit is being shown by the cheetahs of Namibia which used to pursue a solitary life style that made it more difficult for its predators to catch it. Now so many of the predators have been eliminated that the cheetahs have found it safe to become gregarious and travel about in packs. Since they are the fastest animals on earth, that's not a bad news for their victims, small deer and game.

The "yellow-billed" osprey bird of South Africa's Rhodes Marine National Park is among the gourmets of the avian world. It will eat its favorite ticks only from certain animals — for example from buffalo, rhino, zebra and giraffe but never from waterbuck, reedbuck, kudu deer and hippopotamus. The Tasmanian wolf is supposed to be extinct but people keep "sighting" it. The slunk is fighting back in Britain. Reduced by gamekeepers to a small area in central Wales, it is now writhing nose in the English border counties.

NATION IN BRIEF

2nd Congressman Indicted In Abscam Investigation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Raymond Lederer, D-Pa., the latest congressman indicted in the Abscam investigation, declared, "I want my integrity back," while campaigning this spring for re-election to a third term in the House.

Lederer, then implicated only by news leaks in the investigation, easily beat out six challengers and won the Democratic primary — but before the general election he likely will have to make good on his vow to regain his integrity.

A New York grand jury indicted the Philadelphia Democrat Wednesday on charges he took \$50,000 in bribes from FBI undercover agents on Sept. 11, 1979, while hidden cameras recorded the transaction in the bureau's Abscam investigation.

Lederer became the second congressman to be criminally charged for allegedly accepting money from FBI agents posing as Arab sheiks, or their associates, willing to pay bribes for political favors.

Budget Heads Rap Carter

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congressional budget leaders, who two months ago began their work in close alliance with the White House, have bitterly attacked President Carter for his opposition to the 1981 budget proposal.

Ohio To Greet Candidates

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Carter, his drive for the Democratic nomination virtually completed, today mounted his first purely political trip of 1980 — a trek into Ohio where Ronald Reagan is also campaigning.

Carter drew the curtains on his stay-at-home Rose Garden campaign, which never was officially acknowledged among White House staff, by scheduling appearances in Columbus and Cleveland.

Since early December, when Carter officially threw his hat into the ring and declared his intentions to seek a second term, the burden of campaigning rested with Vice President Walter Mondale and first lady Rosalynn Carter.

Other members of the Carter family, plus Cabinet officials also have been on the stump since the Iowa caucuses in January.

Dr. Frank J. Landy, a Pennsylvania State University professor of psychology, said Wednesday the average American worker's productivity is declining because most jobs are boring. "My father was a plumber," Landy said. "He didn't mind dragging around a handcart full of tools or walking two hours to get to his job because when he got there he did some incredibly interesting things. He learned something new every day. And he would do something other people couldn't do."

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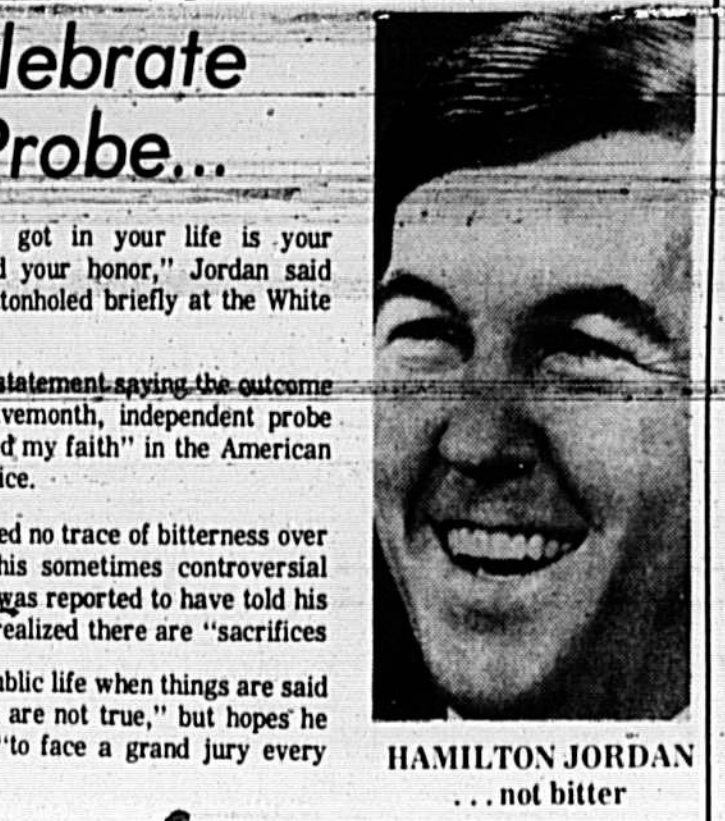

## Paulucci Project In Doubt

The plans of DuPont, Mum, and Sanford industrialist Jeno Paulucci to build a \$10 million apartment and commercial development on a 23-acre tract at Rantoul Lane and SH46A in Lake Mary may be all off.

Paulucci's assistant, Lee Van, told the Lake Mary City Council and the city's planning and zoning board at a joint meeting Thursday night that he intends to speak to Paulucci in the "negative" about investing money in Lake Mary.

"I have deferred from advising Mr. Paulucci," Vann said. "But I don't know if he ought to continue thoughts of investing money in this community," he said, adding the Paulucci interests have "five or six key pieces of property" in the city.

Vann requested the special joint meeting after the planning and zoning board earlier in the week tabled action on a Paulucci request for a change in zoning on the tract from agricultural to commercial and apartment zoning.

The tract was zoned agricultural even though it is designated on the city's land use plan for commercial development. Plans for development of the property call for construction of 80 apartments on 6.7 acres; 80 townhouses on 12.4 acres and a commercial center on 4.5 acres.

Vann told the two boards of his plans to advise Paulucci's against continued investment in Lake Mary after members of the planning and zoning board questioned whether the site is an appropriate place to build multi-family units. The board also advised that the tract is in a city's proposed new comprehensive plan designated to remain agricultural.

In addition, Planning and Zoning Board member Bill Durrenberger said a change in the zoning would be spot zoning. Ernest Southward and his attorney Bill Kirk, representing the Southward family, said the zoning was the first attack on a

## Cooks Lowers Heat, Risks Poisoning

DEAR DR. LAMB — My mother-in-law cooks with heat on low-warm at 140 degrees. She cooks everything all day this way. I think this may be breeding bacteria. She says that no one has ever gotten sick yet although they seem to get a 100 of headaches. I refuse to eat the poultry or

If the meat is cooked at a higher level, as you suggested, at first, then cooked slowly thereafter there will be no bacteria problem. However, the usual way to do this is to set the oven at least at 140 degrees. That's too low for adequate cooking of some forms of meat.

I hope your mother-in-law won't hate me for agreeing with you about this but one of the main purposes of cooking is to eliminate bacteria that could otherwise be harmful if they weren't destroyed by the process.

DEAR DR. LAMB — I would like to know if it is possible for my 20-year-old son to have a tattoo removed from his chest. If so, what would the procedure involve?

DEAR READER — Yes, sometimes a tattoo can be removed. Your son should see a dermatologist about this. There are different techniques employed but one is to use a saline preparation that literally induces a scab over the area, which sloughs off, taking with it some of the pigment. The proper choice of a technique depends on the size of the tattoo and location, so your son will need professional advice about this. How successful removal may be depends a lot on the nature of the tattoo itself.

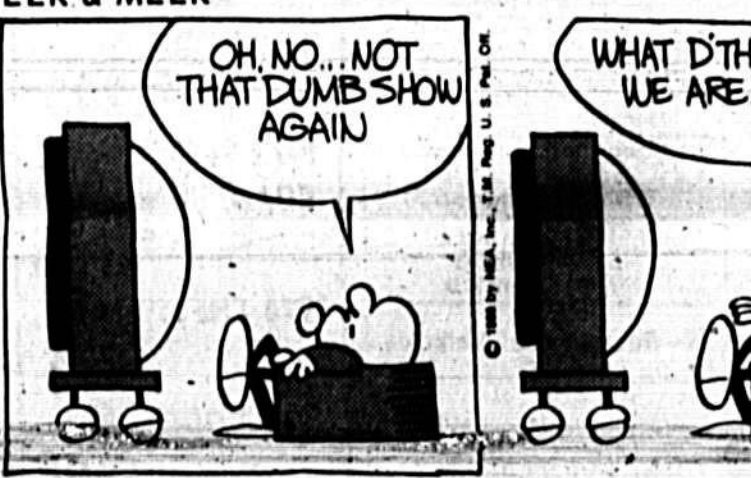

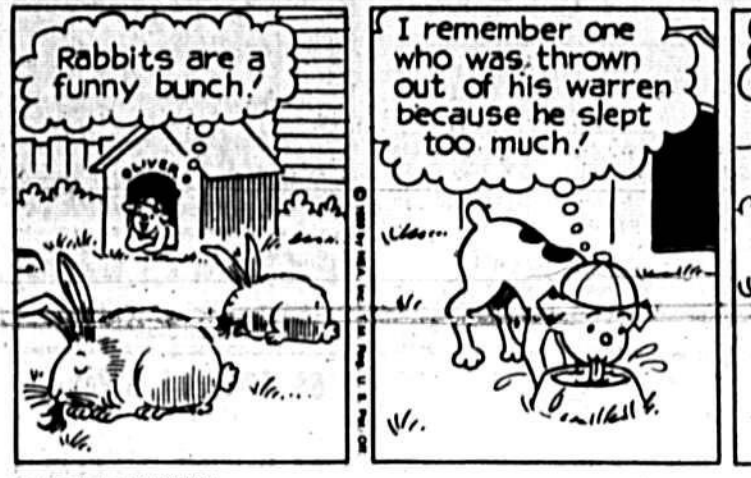
