They have a total of 11,285 pins rolled, making them 216 pins for each game. Wade's has 14 wins and 26 losses. Dot Teslo is high bowler on this team with 126 average.

Alberta Shaw had high single game Tuesday with 168, and Olga Martin had the handicap game with 122. She also had high scores scratch, 69, and handicap 549. Splits were picked up by Frances Cross, 810, and Marilyn Bailey made the same difficult one.

A. B. C. rolled the highest team scratch score, 1,426, and Roumillat & Anderson backed up the highest team scratch game with 693 pins. This week sees Roumillat & Anderson rolling on alley one against Wilson-Maler, Robson's and A. B. C. on alleys three and four, and Perfection and Wade's will meet on lanes five and six.

Duffy Daugherty Hanged In Effigy

EAST LANSING, Mich. (UPI)—Duffy Daugherty has joined football company. At 12:20 this morning, under a scoreboard in Spartan Stadium, the Michigan State football coach became the fourth Big Ten mentor to be hung in effigy this fall.

Daugherty's predecessors were Dennis Dauterban of Michigan, Murray Warmath of Minnesota, and Woody Hayes of Ohio State. A placard hung around the neck of the dummy read: "Good-bye Duffy, being back Biggie."

The reference was to Spartan Athletic Director Biggie Munn who moved up to the administrative post after the 1954 season. Since then, Daugherty's clubs have won 29, lost 14 and tied 1 and won one Rose Bowl crown.

But the Irish elf of the Red Cedar River has fallen on hard times this year with the Spartans sliding to the Big Ten cellar at breakneck speed. State is in ninth place. The Spartans tied Michigan in their conference opener and then lost the last four Big Ten games including shutouts at the hands of Illinois and Indiana.

MSU, ranked high in the preseason polls, has by a team only Pittsburgh and California this year. Ironically, both the Panthers and Golden Bears are prime contenders for bowl berths.

Prep Gridder Dies; Second This Week

LEBURN, Tex. (UPI)—Another high school football player has died during a game in Texas. Ronnie Kirkpatrick, 16, fullback for the Cleburne High School "C" team, collapsed after playing only on offense, at the end of the first quarter in a game here Thursday night.

Another high school player died earlier last week in a game at Phillips, Tex. Kirkpatrick returned to the bench on a platoon change, sat down, and suddenly slumped over. An ambulance was called, but the boy was dead on arrival at Johnson County Memorial Hospital.

Kirkpatrick carried the ball only once during the game and appeared to have taken no hard blows.

The boy was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Kirkpatrick. The father agreed in an autopsy to find out what caused the death of his son.

In the death at Phillips, an autopsy showed that the dead player collapsed from a ruptured spleen.

Ballymoss Getting Plenty Of Backing For Tuesday Race

LAUREL, Md. (UPI)—Ballymoss, undisputed champion of Europe, gained increasing support today for the \$100,000 Washington, D.C. International with the possibility that the colt will be transferred from his owner to the U.S.

Ballymoss' reputation as a runner had preceded him to this country and now that he has been here, on the track for three days, racing fans agree that the five-year-old colt has the appearance to go with his impressive record.

Ten horses from seven nations will run in the race with Mrs. Alice F. Rand's colt, three-time champion of Royal Lodge and Mrs. Herbert Herz's Pops. Dr. An Englishbred who has been racing in America for three years, defending the U.S.A.'s prestige in the mile and one-half race over a turf course.

Fast positions for the International, worth \$100,000 to the winner will be drawn today.

Ireland and Russia each will have two horses in the turf-class race. Sharp also carries Ireland's seven-year-old colt and Zanzibar, the first steed from the Soviet Union to race in America, representing the USSR.

Sharp is owned by Carlton H. Palmer of New York and is destined to remain in America as a stud. A Guide, Australia's hope

ful owned by A. C. Dobb and his son Keith.

Rounding out the field will be Baron Henry Thyssen's (originally from Germany) Dr. Erwin Wassermann's Rosovone from Argentina, and Alfredo Luchini's Exotic from Venezuela, the last horse entered in the race and the last horse to appear on the scene. He arrived by plane from Caracas Saturday.

The race will be broadcast on tape and shown by NBC-TV from 4:30 to 5 p. m.

Stretch-Runner Boros Wins Carling

ATLANTA (UPI)—His fellow pros aren't kidding when they call Julius Boros "the best stretch runner in golf."

The popular Connecticut Yankee, now playing out of Mid Pines, N.C., turned in another strong finish Sunday to walk off with the big share of the purse in the \$30,000 Carling Open tournament.

Boros sank a pair of birdies on the final two holes for a 2-over-par 74 and a 72-hole total of 284. That was good enough for a take home pay of \$8,500—\$1,500 first-place money and a \$5,000 bonus for repeating in the Carling which he won previously in 1954.

Boros needed those two birdies. Billy Casper of Apple Valley, Calif., two strokes behind after 34 holes, was only one back after Sunday's 16th hole. Casper also

birdied the short par-3 17th but Boros ended the threat on the final hole by placing his approach shot within three feet of the pin, then sinking the putt.

The victory raised Boros' winnings for his year past the \$35,000 mark and within \$7,000 of pace-setting Arnold Palmer, Masters champion, who made only \$30 in this tournament as he finished in strokes back at 24.

Boros was the leading money winner in 1952 (\$37,000) and 1953 (\$63,000).

Par golf was hard to come by Sunday over the rugged 7,004-

yard Cherokee course. The recently-completed course is still in poor condition in spots and a gusty wind didn't help matters. Only 6 of 71 golfers were able to better par-72 in the first round. The best mark was a 4-under-par 68 by Tom Neipert of Bronxville, N.Y. Neipert, who failed to match par in his first three rounds, ended up at 292.

Bill Collins, Baltimore, Md., and a 74-287 for third while Pete Cooper of Lakeland, Fla., who had a 70, and Fred Hawkins of El Paso, Tex., who had a 70, tied for fourth at 288.
