

Star Cookies For Christmas

If this crisp cookies, please your family and friends, here's a recipe you will like.

Although there's ginger, cinnamon and cloves in the cookies, the spice flavor is on the mild side. It's the delightful crisp texture that our tasters found outstanding.

CRISP COOKIE STARS
2 cups sifted flour
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
2/3 teaspoon ground ginger
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
3/4 teaspoon ground cloves
5 pound (1 1/2 sticks) butter
1/4 cup sugar

1 cup quick-cooking oats
Sifted blanched almonds
Extra Sugar

On wax paper sift together the flour, baking soda, ginger, cinnamon and cloves.

In large bowl of electric mixer, cream butter and the 1/4 cup sugar; thoroughly beat in egg. Add oats, stir and beat to blend. Stir in flour mixture, then oats, mix well. Cover and chill for several hours or overnight.

Makes time to ten dozen.

Note: If star-shaped cookie cutter is not on hand, you may of course use a cookie cutter of another design.

On a floured pastry cloth, with a floured stockinette-covered rolling pin, roll out portion of dough to 1/16-inch thickness. With a star-shaped cookie cutter (about 2 1/2 inches in diameter) cut out. Place on ungreased cookie sheets. Press an almond slice into the center of each cookie. Sprinkle with extra sugar. Bake in preheated 375-degree oven until browned—six to eight minutes. With a wide spatula remove to wire rack to cool. When cold, store in a slightly covered tin box.

Work with one-third of the dough at a time and keep remaining refrigerated; chill leftover scraps of dough before rolling.

2 cups sifted flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon cinnamon
3/4 teaspoon ground cloves
1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
12 ounces (1 1/2 cups) red glace cherries
4 ounces (1/2 cup) diced candied pineapple

1 1/2 cups seedless raisins
1/4 cups chopped dried figs
1/4 cups chopped dried figs
Stems clipped before chopping

1 1/2 cups coarsely chopped pecans
1/2 pound (2 sticks) butter
1 cup sugar
5 large eggs
1/4 cup dark molasses
1/4 cup brandy (or proof)

With clarified butter or solid white shortening grease a 9-inch angelfood cake pan with or without removable bottom. Line bottom and sides with fat grease foil.

Hepatitis Rises; No Alarm Here

While infectious hepatitis cases are on the increase throughout the United States, there is no cause for alarm in this area, Dr. Frank Leone, county health director, said today.

"The disease is on the increase in the county and in Florida, too," said Dr. Leone. "In comparison with previous years, it is a big increase. And surrounding counties report the same information, as does the State Health Department."

The health director said 14 cases have been reported in this county in recent days "but I am confident there are 2 1/2 times that many cases in the county which have not been reported. Most cases the condition is 'mild'."

Investigation has been conducted to determine if reported cases are in "clusters" or "hot spots," to assist in pinpointing the cause, but the cases are widespread throughout the county, Dr. Leone reported.

Pointing to an outbreak of diphtheria in the Miami area, Dr. Leone stated there have been no reports of the disease in this area. He added there are sufficient dosages of the diphtheria vaccine, DPT, on hand here for use, if needed.

Casselberry Police Chief Donald Brumley, remained mum today after being notified by Mayor Curtis Blum Tuesday that he would not be reappointed as police department head as of Jan. 1. The letter from Blum followed a Herald exclusive Tuesday carrying reports from other city officials that Brumley would not be reappointed.

Blum, who has called the possibility of immediate suspension as police chief, had no comment on the charges outlined in the letter but it was noted on the Casselberry police log that an inter-office memo from Blum, dated Dec. 3, advised all city heads, "Please be advised that there will not be any news disseminated from any of the departments administered by the Mayor except through the Mayor's office." In effect, if Brumley replied to the charges he could be suspended immediately for not following a direct order from the mayor.

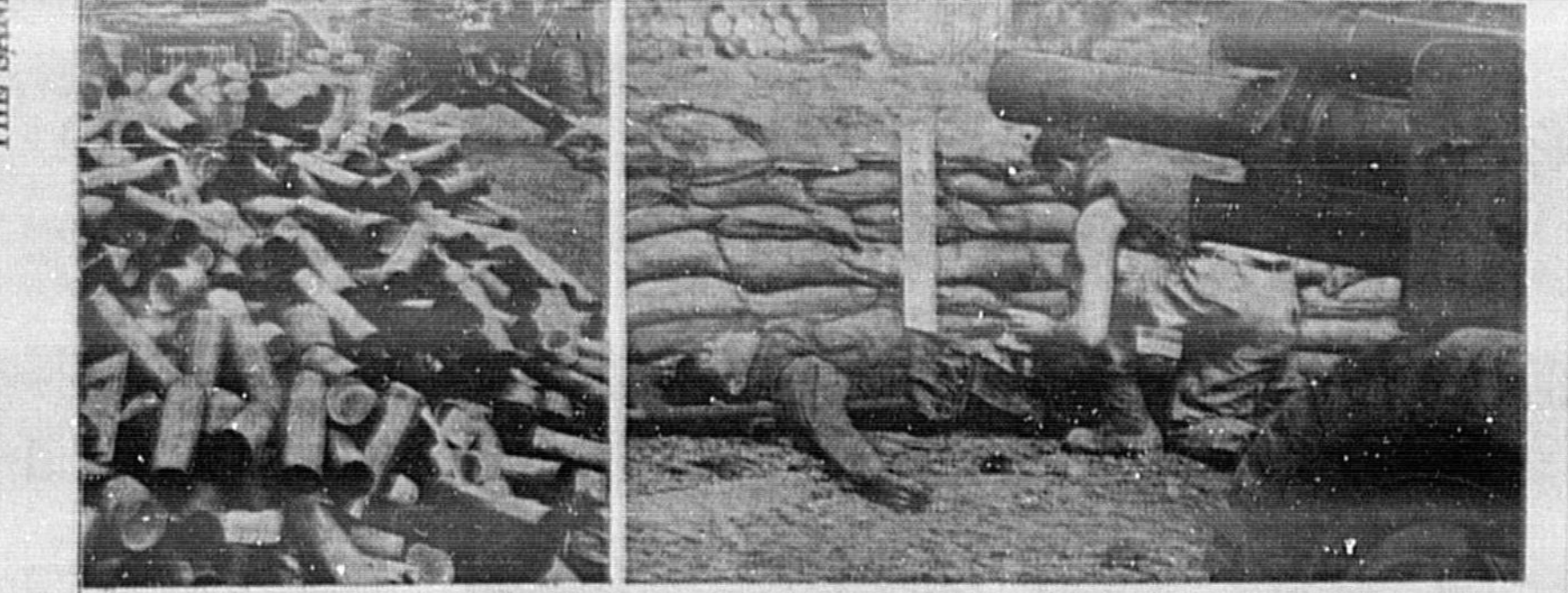

SAIGON (AP) — Battlefield casualties increased considerably on all sides in South Vietnam last week, the allied commands reported today, but the toll of 100 Americans killed in action was well below the weekly average of 137 for the year.
 The U.S. Command also announced the release of two U.S. helicopter crewmen after five weeks in enemy captivity. The men, WO Michael T. Peterson of Redmond, Wash., and Sgt.

'Economy In Delicate Balance' Federal Reserve Members Split

WASHINGTON (AP) — To the rising clamor over government measures designed to bank the fires of inflation gradually, a split within the Federal Reserve Board, among the White House economic corps, however, the Federal Reserve Board is in a state of delicate balance at the moment, he said.
 "Inappropriate actions at this time could tip the balance against us in our battle to curb inflation and could undo the progress toward stability that is now beginning to appear."
 Although he didn't spell it out, his argument followed the reasoning of a group of many other economists in basic agreement that "inflationary psychology" is at the root of the problem.
 One such economist is J. L. Robertson, vice chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, who warned Wednesday "this psychological state must be changed." He dubbed it a "psychosis."
 "People must be made to realize it is not by reason, but by tighter and more painful controls—that the Federal Reserve will not abandon the purpose for which it was created, that the fires of inflation will be quenched," he said in a speech.

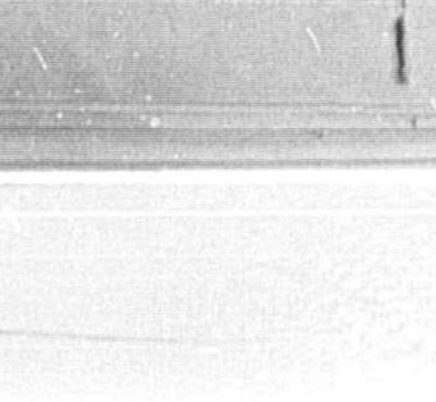
Two Suspects Held In Robberies

 Sheriff John E. Polk said employees and customers of Winn-Dixie Super Market on Highway 17-50 at Longwood would view John Martella, a 29-year-old California man arrested Wednesday morning by Florida Highway Troopers after an armed robbery of an Orlando service station.
 Martella also was charged by Orange County authorities with the Monday armed robbery of a Seven-Eleven store on Seminole Boulevard and is a suspect in the super market holdup.
 The man was apprehended by state troopers 1 1/2 hours after the Temeco Service Station at Conway Street and Conway Garden Road was robbed by a bandit who fled in a car west on I-4.
 Patrolman spotted car driven by Martella and gave chase before pulling the man over near the Orange Blossom Trail exit. The service station reported a \$200 loss and, according to authorities, approximately \$417 was found on Martella.

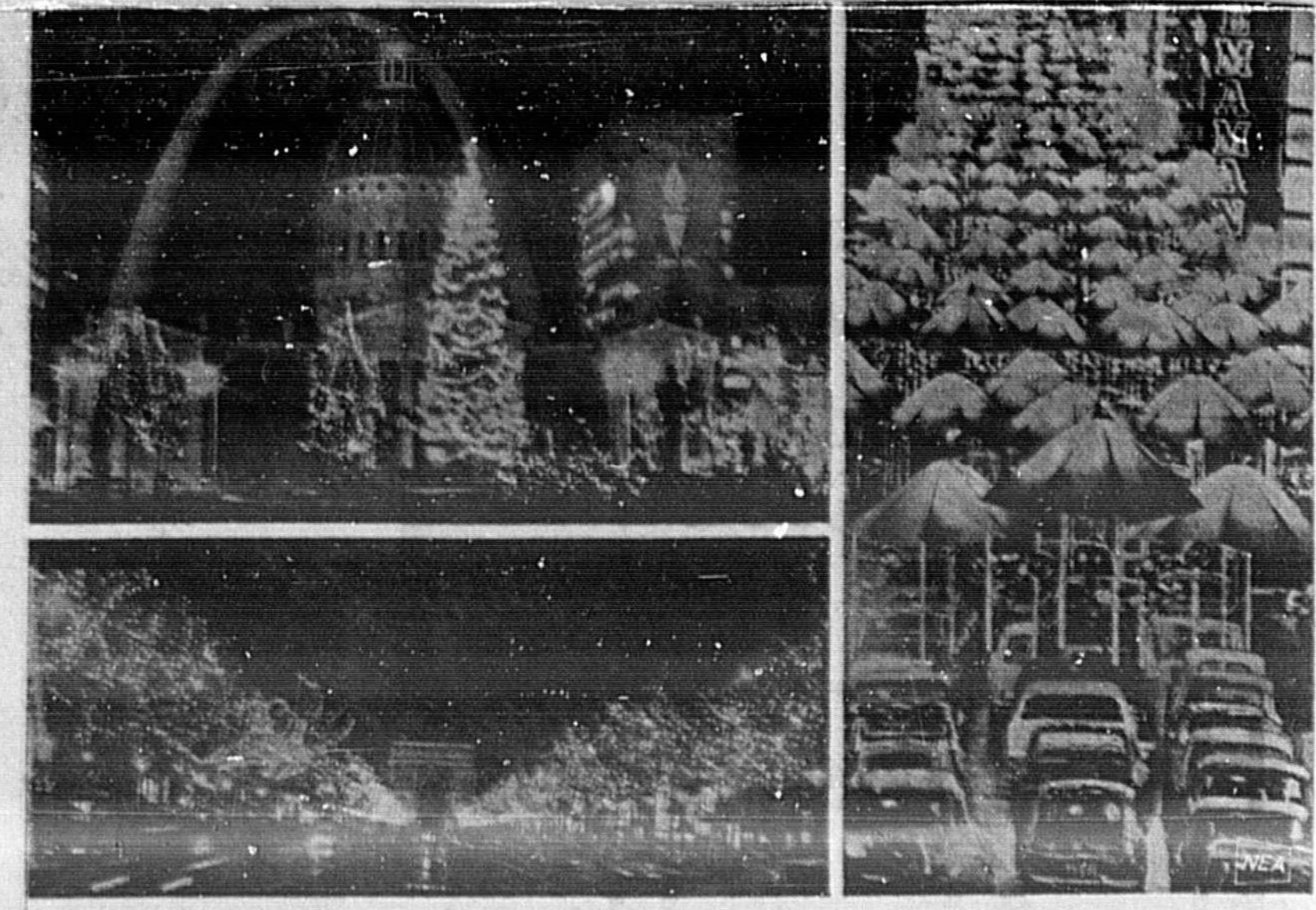

New Jersey Officials Facing Crime Probe

NEWARK N.J. (AP) — With U.S. Atty. Gen. John Mitchell predicting "massive indictments of public officials" in a federal crime probe, Mayor Hugh J. Addonizio was under court pressure today to answer a federal prosecutor's questions before a grand jury.
 In a speech in Boca Raton, Fla., Wednesday, Mitchell declared that the Cosa Nostra had gained control of a "large group" of internal revenue agents in a state later identified by an aide as New Jersey.
 Mitchell said that indictments forthcoming within 10 days would crush "the largest gang syndicate ever broken up in this country." He did not say whether or by what investigative body the indictments would be issued.
 The Newark grand jury investigation, which began as an Essex County operation, was taken over by federal authorities Wednesday a few hours before Mitchell addressed the Investment Bankers Association of America in the Florida resort city.
 On Tuesday, Addonizio had pleaded the protection of the Fifth Amendment, a guarantee against self-incrimination, in refusing to answer 24 questions.
 Appearing Wednesday before Judge Robert Shaw of U.S. District Court for a ruling on whether he had a constitutional right to refuse answers, Addonizio said he knew Anthony "Tony Boy" Bourdin, a reputed Cosa Nostra figure.
 A question about his acquaintance with Bourdin was one of those the mayor had declined to answer previously.
 Judge Shaw reserved decision on whether the mayor could still refuse to answer the other questions, but said: "I'm inclined, particularly where a major public official is involved, in order to disclose affairs involving public office." The mayor's lawyer said Addonizio would answer if necessary to avoid contempt of court proceedings.
 The Essex County grand jury had questioned 288 witnesses over a period of 19 months. Its investigation began after a commission which looked into causes of racial rioting in 1967 reported "a pervasive feeling of corruption" in Newark.
 The county panel's only indictment was against Police Director Dominick Spina, on a charge of failure to enforce gambling laws. He was acquitted in a subsequent trial.
 Federal indictments were returned recently against two Newark government "prebend" agents on bribery charges. The Evening News of Newark reported that "an informer with inside information about Newark government" provided the material which led to the federal takeover of the investigation.

Kirk Lambasts 'Petty Politicians'

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Voters should respond with wrath to the rejection of apportionment by the U.S. Supreme Court, Sen. Claude Kirk declared today.
 "Never before in Florida history has my Senate chamber been the scene of such crude and undignified remarks," he told a news conference. "Never before have I seen such a sickening display of calculated ruthlessness."
 The Senate voted 27-21 Tuesday in rejecting O'Neill, a rich Miami executive, as secretary of transportation, and voted overwhelmingly Wednesday against Donald Crane, the Board of Business Regulation. He was a former Road Board member.
 Kirk said the 27 senators "turned their backs on the people and slapped at me by rejecting" the two. He said it was a personal loss which saddened him deeply.
 "The floor of the Senate was used by a handful of petty politicians to methodically assassinate the character of two fine and honorable public servants who volunteered for duty," Kirk said.
 The rejections will make it "absolutely difficult" to get good new men in government, he said.
 "How can we expect anyone to volunteer for government service if he is subjected to the ridicule of a small band of petty politicians who have no respect even for the honor of the Senate?" Kirk asked.
 First, said the governor, such a person would have to be willing to be slandered.
 "There was no, one source of logic in the Senate's conduct, and in the instance of a few members, there was not even an ounce of decency."
 "What logic is there in rejecting Don Crane merely because he has been openly critical of the Legislature? It all adds up to just another petty slap at me, simply because I voted the pay raise and brought them here to act on your road problems."
 Kirk said he would apologize to the families and friends of O'Neill and Crane and tell them he was sorry the Senate "vented its anger at me on Mike and Don."

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Silver Bridge Memory

 KANAUGA, Ohio (AP) — Just before Christmas two years ago, the Silver Bridge collapsed and sent 46 persons to their deaths in the icy depths of the Ohio River.
 The cause? No certain cause has yet been advanced. Eyewitnesses said after the collapse that the bridge was overloaded with bumper-to-bumper cars carrying holiday shoppers and homeward bound workers and could not stand the strain.
 A report from the National Transportation Safety Board, however, said the 46-year-old bridge linking Point Pleasant, W. Va., and Kanawha, Ohio, was not overloaded.
 Whatever the cause, it is among the worst road bridge disasters in American history. Of the 46 who died, two have never been found. Nine others were injured.
 A new bridge has been built in the place of the old, but the event has not been forgotten. An estimated 25,000 persons are expected Dec. 15 at ceremonies opening the \$12-million replacement span to be called the Silver Memorial Bridge. West Virginia officials have announced that there still is minor work to be done on the new bridge and that it won't be open to traffic until after the ceremony.
 It was 10 days before Christmas, just before 5 p.m. when it began to happen.
 Drivers in the steel superstructure on the two-lane river crossing twisted in convulsive circles. Steel in the 2,350-foot suspension bridge clattered onto cars and trucks inching across the widely rippling bridge floor.
 When the U.S. 35 highway linkup fell it appeared to start on the Ohio side and then leaned up on the West Virginia bank.
 Most of the vehicles—exactly 37 cars and trucks—an investigation disclosed later—remained on the concrete roadway as they dropped 100 feet to the water.
 In less than 90 seconds the bridge disappeared into the brown Ohio river. Only the two concrete piers remained visible.
 Trucks, cars and humans were strung in what one rescue worker described as a "giant, grotesque bird cage of steel" 40 feet below the surface.
 The grim business of finding the bodies trapped under water was hazardous and difficult.
 Thirteen divers heaved the swift, murky waters for days cutting the metal apart with underwater blow torches. Cranes lifted the pieces onto barges.
 Pieces of the bridge were taken to a field near Henderson, W. Va., and the bridge was reconstructed to seek clues to what had happened.
 At least \$8 million in damage suits have been filed as a result of the collapse. None has yet been resolved.
 What caused the accident remains a mystery.
 The Silver Bridge, unlike most bridges which are suspended by cables, was suspended by side. A large pin passing feet long linked into a suspension chain in pairs with steel pins through eyes at each end.
 The Silver Bridge was suspended on two chains of eyebars. Each link of the chain was made up two eyebars side by side of flat steel bars 45 to 55 through the "eyes" at either end of the bar joined the links.
Ancient Cemetery Uncovered
 BONE — (AP) — Workers digging a foundation near oil millionaire J. Paul Getty's castle uncovered an underground cemetery dating back to the Roman Empire. Archaeologists said it may be the most important such find in the Rome area in years.
 The tombs are decorated with ornate columns, frescoes, weapons, jewels and mosaics. They are in several rooms connected by deep-dug corridors.
 The cemetery was found near the Odeonachi castle which was built in the 16th Century. Getty purchased it in 1966. It is 17 miles north of Rome on the Tyrrhenian Sea at Pale Laziale.

Baroness Damns The Pill

 LONDON (AP) — "Damn the Pill," said Baroness Summer-kill, and a dozen aristocratic eyebrows shot up in a tearroom at the House of Lords.
 Britain's best-known feminist, who happens also to be a physician, was expounding on one of her pet hates.
 "The Pill seems to control the future of so many people today because for some reason young girls feel that you have to be with it," she said.
 "Being 'with it' means that you have to have premarital sexual intercourse."
 "It seems that to be a virgin today is somehow to have missed the boat. Yet the male is as old-fashioned as ever. A recent survey in Britain showed the vast majority still want the girl they marry to be a virgin."
 "It may seem strange that one of the architects of Britain's national health scheme takes a stand against the oral contraceptive, but she says:
 "I've been against the Pill right from the beginning, on medical grounds."
 She argues that not enough is known about the drug's effects, on a woman's health, and points to recent deaths of young women attributed to it.
 "Every husband, if he loves his wife, would stop her from taking the Pill until it is proved 100 per cent safe," she declared in an interview. The baroness poured tea in the oak-lined room at Lords of the realm passed in and out from the Lords chamber. She was made a life peeress by Prime Minister Harold Wilson's government in 1961 and finds nothing strange about a Socialist being in the Lords.
 "I'm government spokesman on health matters here. It's an important job," she said.
 Edith Summerskill now 58, entered politics in 1938 as Labor parliamentarian for London's West Fulham area and became minister of national insurance in the 1960 government.
 She pioneered a campaign to make painless childbirth available to all mothers.
 She supported the idea of national health service offering free services and was largely responsible for founding the Specialist Medical Association which pressed through the creation of such a service.
 She has championed the right of married women to follow a career, challenged changes in Britain's new divorce laws which she called "a Casanova's charter," and stepped up her long-standing battle against professional boxing.

New Power Plant To Drive Car On Air

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A 250-mile-an-hour rapid transit vehicle with a revolutionary magnetic power plant—designed so it eventually will ride a cushion of air instead of wheels—begins trial runs next month.

The 55-foot-long surface carrier, created for 80 passengers but now filled with electronic equipment, was unveiled Tuesday in a Federal Aviation Administration test yard. Transportation Secretary James M. Beige said the prototype, if successful, could " herald a new generation of faster, more efficient ground vehicles, particularly in our crowded urban corridors."

"As the development of rocket propulsion enabled men to break loose from earth's gravity, so the linear induction motor promises to enable us, on the ground, to be freed from dependence on the wheel," he added.


The prototype test vehicle, which resembles an airplane fuselage straddling a high, blade-like center rail, was displayed in a Federal Aviation Administration hangar at Los Angeles International Airport.

"Next month it will be moved to a quarter-mile-long track nearby to be driven by a jet engine," the Garrett Corp. spokesman said. The vehicle will be propelled forward along the center rail by a magnet, which it is powerfully attracted to but which it can never touch.

Engineers said the wheels eventually will be removed and the vehicle will be equipped to hover just above the ground, supported on downward-blasting columns of air as it slides frictionlessly forward along the guiding center rail.

In the prototype, the motor gets current from a turbine generator but engineers said later models will draw power from track.

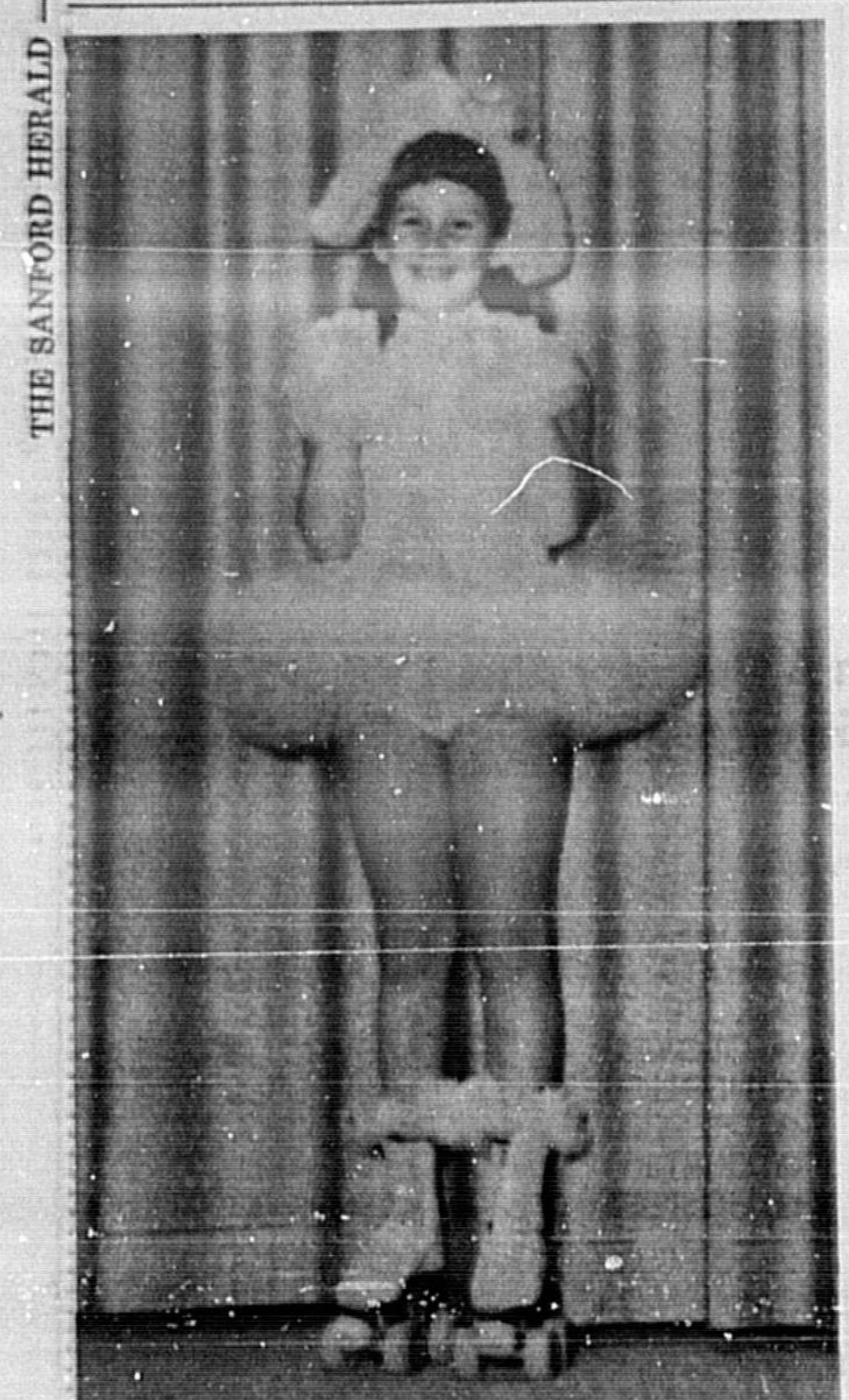

Medical Teams Battle Diphtheria At N. Miami

MIAMI (AP)—Jet-shot medical teams left lines of teary-eyed children behind them Wednesday as they stamped through inoculation clinics in schools, battling diphtheria with painless injections.

The disease that lurks in almost everybody's mouth with out causing a problem has been sneezed and coughed into an outbreak that has killed three youngsters in northwest Miami.

Doctors and nurses dispensing

An emergency shipment of vaccine used air-powered guns to squirt serum through the pores of youthful patients without breaking the skin. The operation is painless, but frightens tears pour by the pints.

The medical teams shot everybody in sight. Health officials estimated more than 8 per cent of the children in schools where clinics were put up got the vaccine on the first day of the program.

Even newsmen and photographers covering the preventive program were inoculated although diphtheria seldom strikes adults.

Three of the patients died. The latest victim, 8-year-old Gregory Miller, died at Jackson Memorial Hospital shortly before the emergency inoculation program began.

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Rock Festival Plans Go Despite Blocks

PORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP)—Promoters of the Miami-Hollywood rock festival are going ahead with plans to hold the event despite an emergency ordinance banning the festival and strict demands laid down by health officials.

Attacked on two fronts, promoter Norman Johnson says he will take legal action against the County Commission's ordinance while making concessions to meet demands by health authorities.

Johnson submitted a sanitation plan in accordance with a court order Wednesday obtained by the Broward County Sanitation Department. The plan reduces the crowd estimate from 30,000 to 25,000, and states there will be no overnight camping on the festival grounds, some nine miles northwest of Hollywood.

Department officials questioned the proposal, saying Johnson would not be able to bus the 25,000 persons in and out of the festival each during the three-day event planned for Dec. 27-30.

Health Department Sanitation William Galbreath said the sanitation plans were satisfactory for a daylight crowd of 35,000, but there was doubt the thousands of youthful rock fans could find adequate nighttime accommodations.

Johnson's attorney, Paul Anton, said he will challenge in federal court constitutionality of the County Commission ordinance passed earlier this week.

Meanwhile, Broward County Sheriff Ed Stack said he is still urging the commission to pass a stop-and-risk ordinance that would permit officers to search individuals for possession of drugs and alcohol at the festival.

Citrus Outlook Bright

LAKELAND, Fla. (AP)—Christmas looks brighter to Florida citrus growers. Wednesday the U.S. Department of Agriculture scaled down the orange production estimate to 140 million boxes, nine million boxes less than original estimates.

Robert Rutledge, executive vice president of Florida Citrus Mutual, said the drop of six percent in the estimate was unprecedented. It left growers with about 122 million gallons of concentrate to sell instead of the 130 million gallons expected earlier in the season.

A USDA offer Tuesday to buy concentrate for school lunch programs, coupled with an earlier USDA offer to buy canned orange juice, used in perfectly with the reduced estimate. Rutledge said. But it does not mean growers can sit back and wait for purchasers to beat a path to their door, he added.

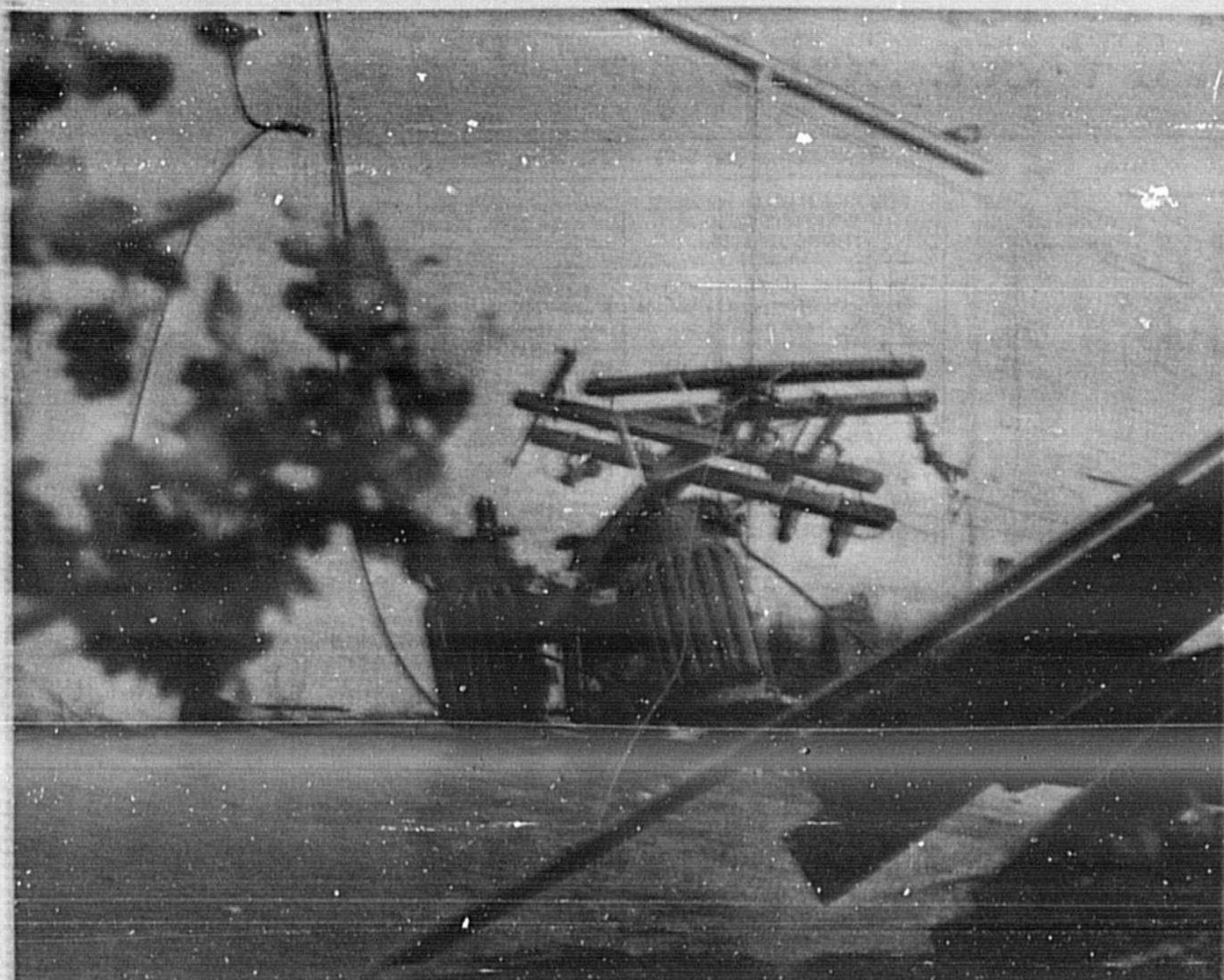

Peace Envoy Old Vietnam Hand

PARIS (AP) — Philip C. Habib, the man who is taking Henry Cabot Lodge's place as chief of the U.S. peace talks delegation, is the only American official who has been assigned to the Vietnam negotiations since they began May 11, 1968. But he's been a Vietnam hand without a break since 1965.

Of medium height, he'll look out from behind his spectacles and tell you, "I came over on the Mayflower"—referring to the start of the declassified talks. "Ever since he came to Paris he's been putting in a minimum 6 1/2 day week. During the last intense secret negotiations which led to the halt of U.S. bombing of North Vietnam on Nov. 1, 1968, his work week was seven days long. Nowadays he may come into his office in the evening."

He's not the kind of job you can leave at the office. If you're a good guy, you won't want to," he said between cigarettes. An acknowledged pro, Habib has the respect of his colleagues, both in and out of the delegation. "If there's anyone who knows Vietnam, it's Phil Habib," a senior U.S. diplomat here remarked. 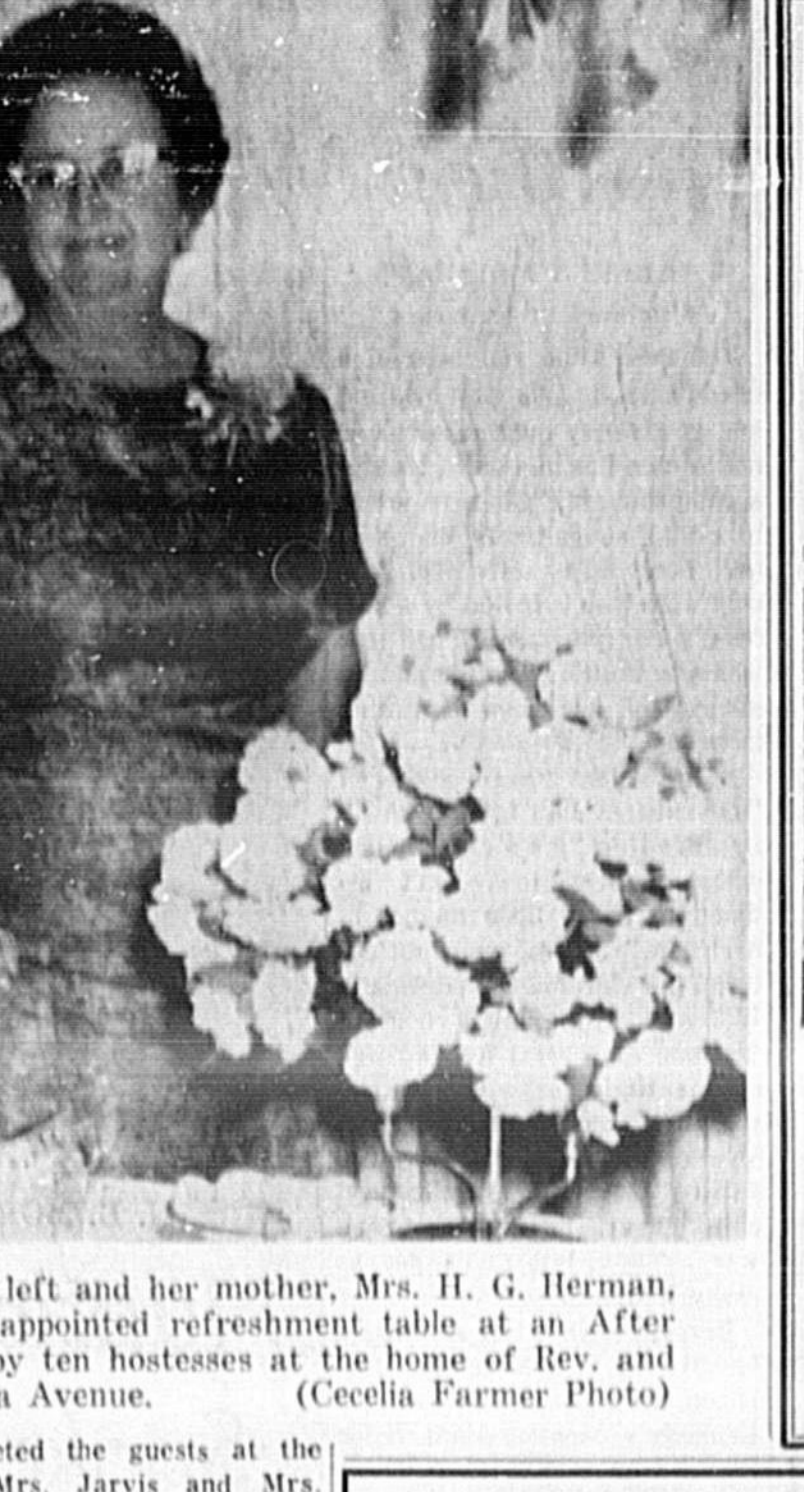

Men's Logical Minds No Match For Women's Psychic Powers

By ARLEEN ABRAHAM Associated Press Writer

The next time you hear of a friend's husband's philandering and you waver over whether or not to clue her in, don't give it a second thought. "Chances are 99 to 1 that she already knows of her husband's activities. The only wife who is fooled by a husband's carryings-on is one that would be her psychic power," always tell her when something is wrong.

So says Jess Stearn, author of "Adventures Into the Psychic." He adds that "it's a rare woman whose subconscious isn't attuned to every little nuance of her man's Stearn, who first entered the world of the psychic in 1951 and whose latest book is just one of several he's written on the topic believes that one reason "men are more jealous lovers than women is because, lacking this intuition, this psychic power, they have to be wary. They just don't get as many hunches."

Feeling off a list of America's leading clairvoyants—Jean Dixon, who predicted President Kennedy's assassination; Helen Stalla, who in 1963 at a dinner party for Stearn and some friends prophesied that Adlai Stevenson would die at a public place abroad shortly and that within two years Jacqueline Kennedy would marry a foreigner; and Anne Getman, who is often consulted by Florida police who are seeking clues to unsolved crimes—Stearn pointed out that "women outnumber men psychics 10 to 1. Edgar Cayce and a few others are clearly exceptions."

"I have no doubt that women are far more psychic than men," says the former New York City newspaper reporter. "It's been a woman's nature, at least until this generation, to rely primarily on feeling, intuition and second-sense. Men are the conscious thinkers; women function largely by using their intuitions and that's where the psychic lies."

A woman's entire life is affected by the planets, the moon and women are clearly conscious of this, he explains. "The man is the child bearer; she must understand the needs and wants of her child even before it is born." To back up his arguments, he cites incidents after incidents of women, who although occupied by a bride game or other pastime, received premonitions that their children were endangered, only to rush home and find their premonitions borne out. "And of course, we've all heard of women who instinctively knew that their sons were wounded or killed in war."

"Although more and more women recently have entered the business world and consequently have trained their conscious minds to function logically, it will take several generations before women lose their psychic advantage over men," Stearn believes. "And who knows, women might reveal and go back to the home before then," chuckles the graying six-footer.

Stearn admits that prior to 1932, he scoffed at any reference to the psychic world. "If a girl I was dating suggested going to a fortune teller, I'd stop seeing her," says the man who

\$20,000 Okayed For St. Johns Canal

Congress has appropriated \$20,000 to determine if the St. Johns River channel should be modified between Lakes Monroe and Harney, it was reported by telephone today by U. S. Rep. William Cramer from Washington. The item is part of an appropriations bill awaiting President Nixon's signature.

Cramer, senior Republican on the House public works committee, said a channel five feet deep and 100 feet wide within the reach of Lakes Monroe and Harney was authorized at the request of the St. Johns-Indian River Canal District but, he added, local interests sought a cut-off channel be constructed in lieu of the authorized channel.

The Senate public works committee called for a review to determine if the existing project should be modified with reference to a realignment in the reach of the two lakes, Cramer stated, adding that no funds for the study were made available.

“Now with this appropriation,” Cramer concluded, “we can move ahead on this badly needed survey.” Associated Press also reported today that an appropriation of \$20 million for the Central and Southern Florida Flood Control District through 1971 was approved by the Senate public works committee.

Cramer said he hopes the full House will approve next week this authorization measure — representing an increase of \$5.5 million over the 1969 fiscal appropriation.

Longwood Annexing 434

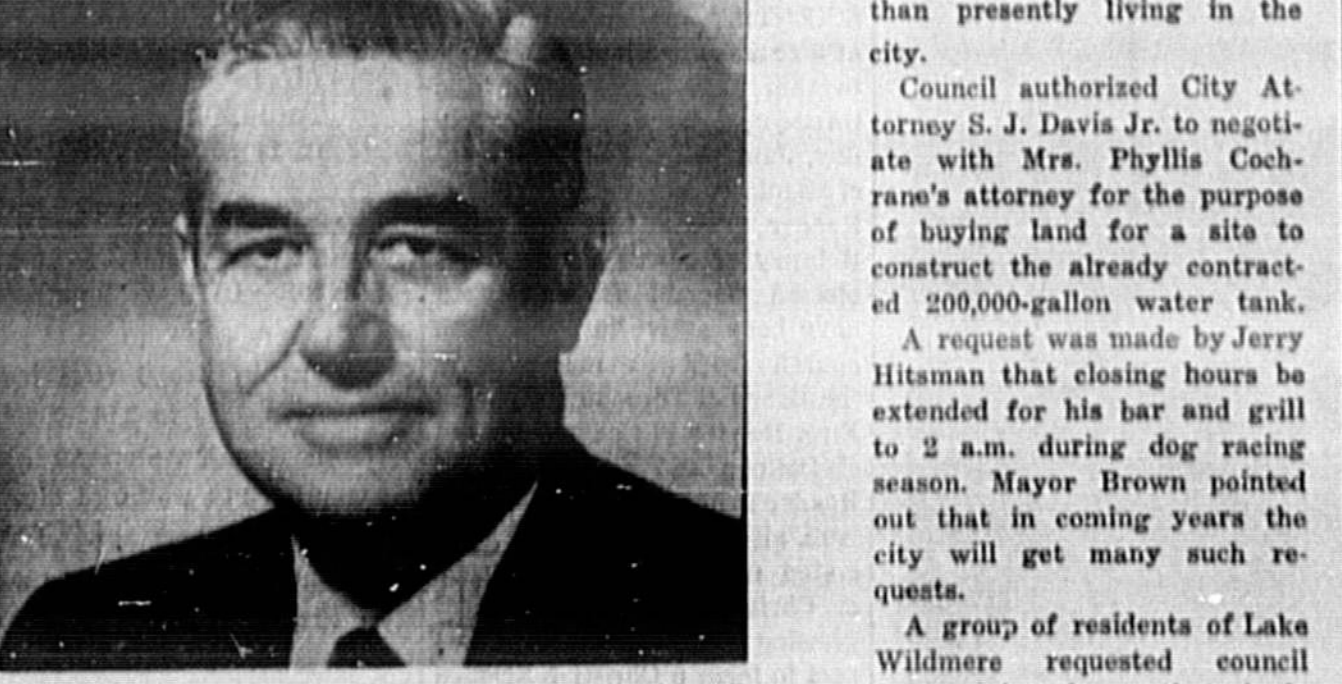
In a move to stymie future growth of neighboring communities in that direction, Longwood Council last night passed a motion to annex highway 434 from the city limits to I-4. The motion was adopted on the first reading, with Council Chairman E. E. Willmann casting a negative vote.

Major Ken Brown pointed out that planners predict Longwood's principal growth will be toward I-4 and that the area includes major new subdivisions such as Woodlands, which will accommodate more people than presently living in the city.

Council authorized City Attorney S. J. Davis Jr. to negotiate with Mrs. Phyllis Cochran's attorney for the purpose of buying land for a site to construct the already contracted \$100,000-gallon water tank. A request was made by Jerry Hittman that closing hours be extended for his bar and grill to 2 a.m. during dog racing season. Mayor Brown pointed out that in coming years the city will get many such requests.

A group of residents of Lake Wildmere requested council for a zoning change that single family dwellings only be allowed with restrictions preventing building an additional dwelling on lot in their area.
