

Senate Votes 9-1 Against Bill Hiking Tax On Dog Tracks

Measure Called For Two Millions More

TALLAHASSEE, April 29.—Senator Boyle, Sanford, Thursday introduced a bill which would give the Florida Highway Patrol director authority to finance and construct living quarters for members of the patrol.

TALLAHASSEE.—The Senate today defeated 9-1, a bill to reduce the inventory tax imposed on Florida merchants, after nearly two hours of debate on the principle of allowing tax reductions to special groups. The bill would have required that assessment of stock inventories be based on one-half the average inventory value of the previous year rather than on 100 per cent as is the present law.

TALLAHASSEE.—Only one vote was cast today in a Senate committee for a bill to have dog tracks pay more taxes. At the same time a horse sub-committee began redrafting the governor's dog track measure.

3 Persons Have Narrow Escape In Auto Collision

How three persons were able to escape without injury in a two car collision last night was still a mystery to State Trooper R. D. Harrison today.

Both vehicles turned completely over causing \$2500 damages and the driver of one car was thrown to the ground in the crash which occurred four miles south of Oviedo on State Road 430 about 10:00 o'clock last night.

ACL Access Roads Are Being Studied

K. H. Rush of Jacksonville, general superintendent of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad, was in Sanford today with other line officials to study the access roads to the new passenger station.

Accompanying Mr. Rush in his survey were LeRoy Anderson, present superintendent of the Jacksonville district of the railroad, and O. V. Horace, who was the former superintendent with offices in Sanford.

Representing the City were City Manager Tom Leman and Mayor Randall Chase.

The group discussed which streets are currently available, how much work would be necessary to get designated access roads into shape, and a general investigation of all roads leading into the site from every direction.

Real H-Bomb Is Hinted By AEC Director

Implication Is First Made About Device

WASHINGTON.—The Atomic Energy Commission implied today for the first time—that it has actual "devices" in the hydrogen bomb line presumably crude models, and that they release atomic energy on a "large scale."

Up to now, the commission has channeled its references to developments in hydrogen bomb research in scientific double-talk, saying only that certain atomic tests at Eisenhower's "thermonuclear research" were "thermonuclear devices" which would refer to H bombs.

But today Dr. Thomas H. Johnson, research director for the AEC, made a speech at the annual spring meeting of the American Physical Society. He was talking about the commission's interest in research machines such as cyclotrons, linear accelerators and Van de Graaf generators—or "atom-smashing machines," he said.

The interest of the AEC in research done with some of these machines is related to the fact that they produce under controlled conditions on a laboratory scale the same reactions that are involved in the large scale release of energy in fission and thermonuclear devices.

A "fusion" device is one that duplicates the reaction of an A-bomb which exploded as the result of a fission or spilling of atoms. A "thermonuclear device" on the other hand would involve the "fusion" or joining together of atoms to cause a release of atomic energy.

Eisenhower Reveals Plan To Whack Eight Billions Off Truman Budget

President Signs Bill Extending Rent Controls

WASHINGTON.—President Eisenhower today signed a bill extending rent controls on 5,500,000 housing units in 32 states until July 31. The controls had been due to expire at midnight tonight.

The measure passed by Congress last week was a compromise on his request for extension until Oct. 1. Even with the extension, only about a third will be left of the wartime imposed federal rent control program. At one time, 10 million units were under control.

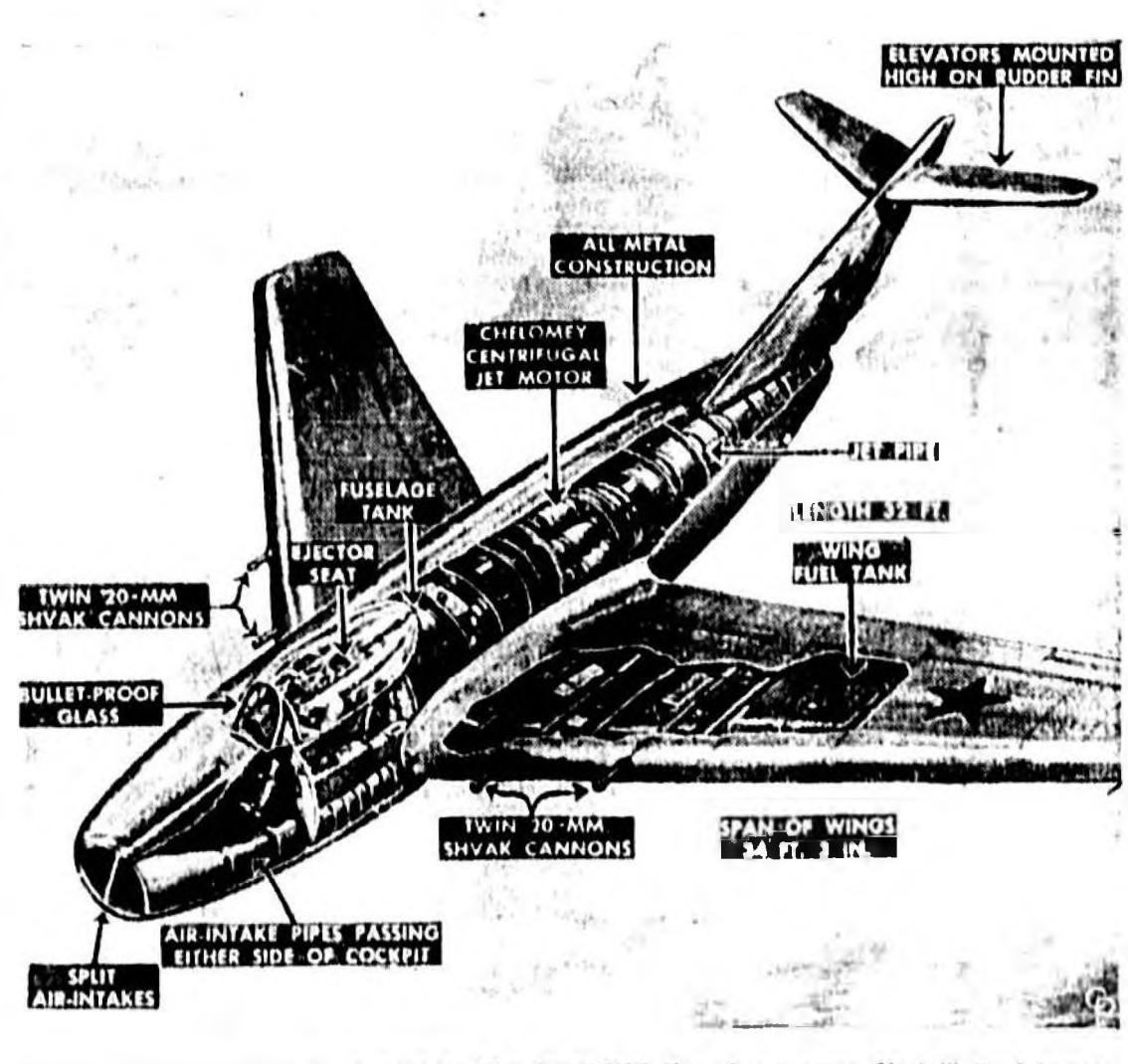
Under the new legislation, the Eisenhower administration must investigate and certify areas of critical defense housing area, for purposes of determining need for rent control. And a new definition includes only areas around government defense installations housing many areas around private industrial defense plants. Those areas that meet the new requirement are estimated 500,000 units.

Elsewhere in Washington Sen. Mundt (R-S.D.) disclosed today what he called a "highly accelerated" State Department effort to eliminate "members of the old Acheson team" from top policy positions.

His disclosure took at least some of the edge off this aspect of Secretary of State Dulles' quest for a closed session of a Senate appropriations subcommittee today.

Reporting to the nation over radio and television networks last night, Dulles compared the situation in Europe to the crutch a sick man uses until he gets well enough to throw it away.

"We believe that this is becoming increasingly possible," he commented in saying America's allies in Europe are getting strong enough to require no more outright grants. Nevertheless, he said, the U. S. will continue to support "substantial sums" with them.

Merl Young Gets Four Months For Lying To Senate About Activities

WASHINGTON.—E. Merl Young today was sentenced to serve from four months to two years in prison for lying to Senate subcommittee on his work for the White House and his financial activities.

Young, 38, asked for probation but U. S. District Judge Matthew F. McGuire turned down the plea. However, the judge expressed the hope authorities will feel the interests of justice have been served when Young completes four months in prison.

The judge replied that if Young had been convicted of an ordinary crime involving out of human frailty, he would have been inclined to grant him probation.

FLORIDA SOLDIER TALKS Released GI Tells How He Fared After Being Captured By Chinese

TOKYO.—A low-talking soldier from Florida said today American prisoners of war "knew pretty well what to write" in letters they sent home from North Korea.

He said the letters were opened by the Reds, and if the prisoners wanted them to get out they said only things they thought would please their captors.

MINK COAT CLIMAX

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5 Billions Would Be Cut From Military

WASHINGTON.—President Eisenhower reportedly laid before legislative leaders today preliminary proposals to whack approximately \$5 billion dollars off former President Truman's budget.

Lawmakers who sat in on the discussion at the White House said the tentative cuts would include a reduction of about five billion dollars in Truman's proposals for military spending.

Reductions of \$1,800,000,000 in foreign aid, \$1,200,000,000 in domestic spending and 250 million dollars in atomic projects also were discussed.

Eisenhower was said to have emphasized that the approximate \$5 billion cuts under the Truman budget would be phased in over the year beginning July 1 were only preliminary and would be reviewed later.

Lawmakers who attended the conference said they were impressed that the proposed \$5 billion dollar cuts would make it possible to balance the so-called "cash" budget in the next fiscal year.

This budget is based on what the Treasury actually pays out and takes in, including Social Security and similar receipts which go into trust funds.

The proposed cut, however, would leave the regular budget out of balance more than \$1 billion dollars, since tax revenues for the fiscal year were estimated at \$68,045,000,000 by Truman.
