







Base Stealing Brock Vets Can Lose Pay Heaps Cards' 11-2 Win

Brook continued his explosive base-stealing pace Monday while helping the St. Louis Cardinals beat the Chicago Cubs 11-2.

Brook, zeroing in on Maury Wills' record of 104, also moved up the all-time list into some exclusive company.

Steve Rogers, 10-13, took a three-hitter and a 3-2 lead into the eighth, but Jerry Goddard singled and Milner hit his 15th homer of the baseball season.

Dodgers 10, Braves 2 Jim Wynn knocked in four runs, including two with two down in the first and Gilbert hit his 10th of the year.

Giants 7, Astros 2 Ed Hallett scattered 10 hits to notch his first major league victory and Bobby Bonds sparked two three-run rallies with a single and triple to lead San Francisco over Houston.

Vets Can Lose Pay

MIAMI (AP) — Miami Dolphins' owner Joe Robbie says veterans risk losing their bonuses unless they report to training camp immediately.

In a rare visit to the Biscayne College camp Monday, Robbie urged veteran Dolphins who had received the bonuses to offer the strike called by the National Football League Players' Association.

Of 17 Dolphins who signed new or renegotiated contracts this year as an inducement to reject World Football League offers, nine are in camp.

"Our players are obligated to forfeit or return those bonuses if they don't come to camp," Robbie said. "Those bonuses were not volunteered. We do not intend to back a strike with them."

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Enigma: Turkish Premier

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) — Bulent Ecevit's wife describes him as a man of infinite compassion for all of God's living creatures.

A biographer called him "a humanist, a romantic, artistic and even mystical man."

He was once criticized in the Turkish parliament for praising the Turkish-Greek friendship in a poem with the line: "Warm sea, a blue magic, a warm sea, and on the shores our two nations, each more beautiful than the other."

But Ecevit, 47, a former Harvard student who now is premier of Turkey, ordered the bloody Turkish invasion of Cyprus on July 20 that brought Greece and Turkey to the brink of war.

And at the Geneva peace negotiations, he was the way he is living up tonight as his military forces won U.S. Secretary of State Joseph J. Sisco, in a last-minute attempt to ward off the future.

Ecevit is from an aristocratic family but sides with the poor and has a socialistic philosophy. He began his political career as a columnist for the newspaper of the Republican People's party.

He took a leave from his job to study at Harvard but returned home in 1957 to be one of his party's candidates for parliament.
