Titan Doesn't Go; Missile Is Saved

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI) — The Air Force attempted a firing of the Titan missile for the first time Saturday but a flaw in the first stage rocket prevented its launching.

A new automatic device cut off the engine, and saved the multi-million dollar missile from being destroyed.

Smoke and vapor belched from the stripped first stage, which was the only engine fired. But the 90-foot Titan, static and ground tested many times, was never released from its pad bollings.

Thick clouds billowed about the base, then cleared and the Titan stood motionless.

Trouble developed in the critical first five seconds. The Titan is kept bolted for five seconds after ignition, then released in flight if the firing check is perfect.

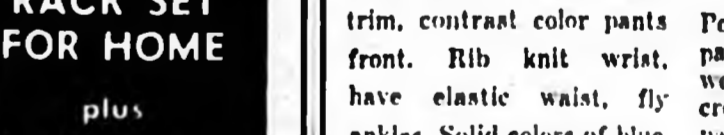

Demo 'Whip' Says House Should Seat Arkansas' Alford

WASHINGTON (UPI) — House Democratic Whip Carl Albert (D-Mo.) said Saturday that Dr. Dale Alford, segregationist elected to the House by vote in Little Rock, Ark. should be seated "unless there is clear evidence that he did not win the election."

Albert said he hoped House members would not be influenced — one way or the other — by Alford's segregationist views in voting whether to seat him when the new Congress convenes Jan. 7. "If we are moved in our votes to seat people on the basis of their views on controversial issues," Albert told a reporter, "then we would cease to be a democracy."

The special House Election Committee earlier this week recommended by a 3 to 2 vote that the House deny a seat to Alford pending an investigation into charges of election fraud.

When Independence Day rolled around, however, these pleasant (?) chores were delayed until Labor Day "for sure." Then came Thanksgiving and you had only a month to go, plenty of time yet to beat the rush.

Here it is Dec. 21, four days until Christmas Day, and that that still is just as long as ever. Each day slips by, and the point of no return is a little nearer. Time just isn't available, today's living pace being what it is.

By the time the average man completes his work day, the merchants have called it a day, too. The men, bless 'em, begin to get frantic about this time of the year. Their wives, with a little more time, start putting those gaily-wrapped packages under the tree.

This only serves to further confuse the issue. What, oh what can he get her? When is he going to have time to do that shopping? As the pile of packages is increased, the average male is seized by something closely akin to panic.

Washington See-Saw

(The Washington See-Saw is authored this week by Senator Spessard L. Holland while Win Pendleton is on a speaking tour.)

DISCUSSING FOR PENDLETON — So far as I know, this is the first time the Washington See-Saw has been written by anyone other than its creator, Win Pendleton, during the nearly six years of its existence—and this may be the last! However, I am glad to serve as "guest editor" while the author—who is becoming increasingly well-known as an after-dinner speaker—is away this week on a speaking tour. Incidentally, while on this trip Win will accomplish his 120th birthday in 1958 before civic, business and professional groups and conventions.

I first met Win back in 1949 when, as assistant finance chairman of the Democratic National Committee for Florida, he staged a successful Jefferson Jackson Day dinner in our state. Our paths have crossed many times since then, and this week I am happy to substitute this one time for this busy Florida.

1958 CONGRESS LOOMS AS BUSY AND IMPORTANT — I anticipate that the new Congress opening next month will have to deal with some of the most critical problems occurring during my years in the Senate. Battle lines have already been drawn between the proponents of Conservatism and Liberalism, and the opening shot will undoubtedly be fired over the question of whether the Senate is a continuing body, or whether it is subject to new sets of rules of procedure at the whims of Senators at the beginning of every Congress. This will be a key question in the fight to retain the right of filibuster, and I will of course be strongly aligned with the Southern Democrats who feel, as I do, that this is a rule which must be retained.

The coming session of Congress will present the Democratic Party with a golden opportunity to serve the nation effectively and patriotically by correcting or heading off some of the mistakes which have occurred during the past six years as the result of indecisive leadership within the Republican ranks. However, if this opportunity is to be consummated, it is imperative that we Democrats set our own house in order by ridding the Party of dissidents bred of opposing philosophies. Evidence of this dissension, as reflected in a number of recent public statements by some ranking Party officers, have disturbed me greatly; and it is my sincere hope that all Democrats will work together in good faith to reconcile all inter-Party differences as a defense against the "divide and conquer" technique which might be effective unless we can put forth a united effort in the important months ahead. I would make it clear, too, that I do not see the formation of a third Party as a workable solution for conservative Democrats.

DICTATORSHIP THREATENED BY SOME LABOR LEADERSHIP — In my opinion a serious threat to national security and our Democratic processes is posed by the actions and planning of Labor leaders of the Jimmy Hoffa variety. The Teamster chief's recently announced plans to organize municipal police and fire department employees, his offer of substantial financial aid to a striking airline union, and his statement that "We will not be stopped by the McClellan Committee, laws or the courts," all serve to emphasize the immediate need of protective legislation from such would-be dictators. Conceivably, the criminal and irresponsible elements controlling some segments of American labor could—if permitted to continue unchecked—cripple this nation as badly as could a foreign power waging atomic war.

Browns Seek Win To Extend String

NEW YORK (UPI)—Can the Cleveland Browns extend professional football's finest record against the upstart New York Giants?

Seventy thousand fans will jam Yankee Stadium Sunday and hundreds of thousands will tune in C. B. S. TV - radio broadcasts at 2 p. m. est. to learn the answer to that question.

Cleveland, having a master coach in Paul Brown and perhaps the game's finest runner in Jim Brown, will meet Coach Jim Lee Howell's unimpressive but spirited Giants in a playoff for the National Football League's eastern division title. The winner will entertain the Baltimore Colts, western division winners, in the league championship game Dec. 29.

The Giants, who defeated the Browns twice this season by a total of seven points, are slight favorites. If the score is tied at the end of the regulation game, the teams will go into "sudden death" overtime with victory going to the first to score in any fashion.

It is the first eastern division playoff since 1939, when the Giants also won both regular season contests with the Browns and then lost the playoff game at Cleveland on an icy field, 8-3.

The Giants, hampered by lack of speed and many injuries, trailed the Browns throughout the season until they caught them last Sunday at Yankee Stadium in a snow storm. Pat Summerall, swinging a right leg bruised and swollen from an injury, booted a 47-yard field goal with 127 seconds to play, giving the Giants a 13-10 victory and a tie for the eastern title. Each club completed a 9-3 regular season record.

The Giants scored a 21-17 victory at Cleveland earlier this year and now will try to frustrate Cleveland's bid for its eighth eastern crown in nine seasons. This domination of division honors is unprecedented since the N. F. L. was split into two divisions in 1953.

New York snapped Cleveland's streak of division titles at six by leading the east in 1954 but the Browns regained the title last year. If the Giants win Sunday, they will grab their second division crown in three years and perhaps indicate the end of Cleveland's amazing domination.

The weather forecast called for fair conditions with temperatures in the 30's.

Cleveland has tremendous speed on its offensive unit and could be helped by a dry field. Fullback Jim Brown and halfbacks Ray Renfro, Bob Mitchell and Leroy Bolden of the Browns are former track stars who can run 100 yards in less than 10 seconds.

Brown, a 228-pounder who set a league rushing record of 1,527 yards this season, showed his speed last Sunday. mention of foreign aid, for we all agree that it is impolite to continually remind someone of his indebtedness to us. When these briefings have been completed, the boats start running and the men take over.

While the squadron was in Morocco, I saw a large group of Arabs gathered around a parachute rigging who was giving Arab children a bubble gum demonstration. It wasn't long before the kids had the idea and were practicing on their own. From the looks of the parents who were watching, the sailors had made friends of the adults too.

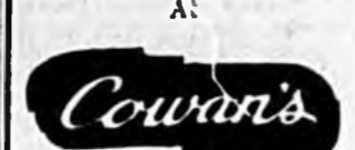
In Marseilles, France, I stepped onto a pier and noticed a sailor sitting in the small boat of an elderly French fisherman. I watched them for a while and though neither of them spoke the other's language, the sailor was soon invited to go fishing out in the harbor.

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Citrusmen Seeking Better Inspection

LAKELAND, Fla. (UPI) — The Florida Citrus Commission voted Saturday to set up a special field force to look into the inspection and enforcement of fruit regulations, and to recommend ways in which the citrus code might be tightened.

Under the plan, two special field men would be hired immediately with the understanding that later the force may be expanded to five if necessary.

One man would be an expert in processed food inspection and the other would be experienced in fresh fruit procedures.

Chairman J.R. Graves of Vero Beach said the field force would "check out rumors and allegations of violations" of the citrus code and regulations.

Not Police Force

But he said the commission's action was not to set up a police force or establish a "network of informers."

"We are not going into the policing or inspection business," Graves said. "We want to emphasize that the commission has the responsibility of making regulations, and that the policing and enforcement of these regulations are still the responsibility of the inspection service."

"We are interested in making

sure that everybody in the industry gets exactly the same kind of fair but firm inspection, and that nobody has any unfair advantage."

The field force was recommended by a special committee on inspection and enforcement, headed by Key Scales Jr. of Weirsdale. The committee proposed that the field men look first "into reports of persons operating as citrus fruit dealers without licenses or sufficient bond, reports of mixing of immature fruit, reports of illegal use of sugar, coloring matter, water, citric acid, etc."

Strict Rule Asked For Washed-Pulp

LAKELAND, Fla. (UPI) — The research and concentrate committees of the Florida Citrus Commission called Saturday for stricter rules in the use of the washed-pulp method in processing fruit for concentrate.

The two committees said they would recommend a regulation to prohibit pulp washings from single-strength orange juice going into frozen orange concentrate.

The regulation will come up at a public hearing before the entire Citrus Commission on Jan. 14.

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'Red Hunters' Plan Total Re-Grouping
 WASHINGTON (UPI) — House Communist hunters said Saturday they hope to get a jump on the Supreme Court by reorganizing their committee on Un-American Activities on the opening day of the new Congress.

A legal case challenging the committee's operating authority is awaiting a ruling from the high court. The decision could be handed down at the tribunal's next meeting Jan. 12, five days after Congress convenes.

The court, in a 1954 decision, criticized the committee's present name and charter as vague and "excessively broad."

The reorganization plan, aimed in part at meeting these objections, is expected to be presented in the House on Jan. 7 for approval.

The nine-man committee would be dissolved and a new 25-member committee created to take over its work and some tasks now performed by three other House committees.

The new group would be called the Committee on Internal Security, Immigration, and Nationality. It would take over immigration legislation from the Judiciary Committee, passport legislation, and handling partly by the Judiciary and partly by the Foreign Affairs Committee, and the Mexican farm labor program, now under the Agriculture Committee.

Work Will Resume At Site Of Strife
 RUSSELL, Fla. (UPI) — Trucking operations resume at Tropical Transport Inc. Monday after a 33-day Teamsters strike which was believed to have provoked the gangland-type slaying of two men and the wounding of two others.

Manager William O'Neill of the trucking concern said the pickets were withdrawn Friday night and that he and a union representative were working out a settlement of the dispute.

The Teamsters Union local began picketing the truck company offices outside the Lehigh Portland Cement Co. plant No. 17 in an apparent move to union recognition.

About four weeks later, George Jones, 31-year-old union man and former truck driver, and James Gilson, 27, were killed in a hail of gunfire at Jones' trailer home Dec. 5.

A grand jury was empaneled and met twice before recessing until Dec. 29 to obtain further testimony in the case.

Sidney McCraney and Jack Johnson, both of Russell, have been held on open charges at Flagler County Jail in the double slaying and wounding of Robert Drake, 24, Flagler Beach, and Alex Faircloth, 24, Ormond Beach.

Canaveral's Eclipse To Be Temporary

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The missile towers of Cape Canaveral, Fla., seem destined to go into temporary eclipse next year because of the more important satellite launchings scheduled at Vandenberg Air Force Base north of Los Angeles on the West Coast.

While Canaveral is trying to put up four of the ill-starred Vanguard earth satellites—20-inch, 21½-pound spheres—and is conducting another lunar probe or perhaps two, Vandenberg will be launching America's first big satellite, weighing anywhere from 800 pounds to five tons.

However, experts in the Pentagon's advanced research projects agency believe the spotlight is bound to swing back to Canaveral within two to three years, largely

Niece Of Karloff Charged In Death Of Her Two Sons

HASLEMERE, England (UPI)—A piece of horror movie actor Boris Karloff was arrested Saturday on a charge of murder in the death of her two sons whose throats were slashed in the family home where they had returned from school for the Christmas holidays.

Thomas Bromley, a civil service official attached to the Defense Ministry, found the bodies of his sons, Martin, 13, and Stephen, 10, Thursday night. He also found his wife, Diana, unconscious with a throat wound.

Mrs. Bromley, 39, was taken to a hospital but was released Saturday and brought before a magistrate in nearby Guildford where she was formally charged with murdering Martin. This is in line with normal English legal practice of charging a suspect with one slaying in multiple murders.

Detective Inspector George Conish told the court that his investigation had "affirmed" him that Mrs. Bromley "had caused his (Martin's) death."

Bromley told police the first thing he saw on his arrival home was a bloodstained cricket bat and the boys' football boots and clothing in the hall of his six-bedroom home.

He called out to the boys, he said, but received no answer and began to look for them. He said he found Martin dead in the garage and Stephen dead in the bathroom.

He found his wife in the drawing room unconscious and bleeding from a wound in the throat. He said she was brought in by two women neighbors who had found her wandering in tears around the garden.

Mrs. Bromley is the daughter of Sir John Thomas Pratt, brother of Boris Karloff, whose real name is William Henry Pratt.

Demos Considering 'Break' For GOP

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Senate Democrats Saturday were considering enlarging some Senate committees in the new Congress to make room for more Republicans than the GOP minority is entitled to.

This was advanced as the most likely solution of the committee representation problem created by big Democratic gains in the November elections. It could be an omen of political "good will" for 1959.

The ration decision will be a matter of negotiation between the Democratic and Republican leadership with Majority Leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas in the commanding position. But it appears Johnson will go out of his way to see that the Republicans get a fair break. Republicans have cooperated similarly in the past.

Most committees are expected to go from their present ratio of 8 Democrats and 7 Republicans to a heavy Democratic margin of 10 to 5. Democrats won 13 additional Senate seats at the polls, pushing the 1958 division to 64 Democrats and 34 Republicans.

With Alaska, the new Senate will have 98 instead of 96 members.



because it is best suited to the "man in space" program.

The Vandenberg launchings are designed to contribute information to the "man in space" program. But that is only during the early stages when the experiments can be coupled with the launching of weather and military reconnaissance satellites.

Best For Manned Flight

When the time actually comes for putting a man into orbit around the earth—and most experts believe this will be within considerably less than three years—Canaveral will hold all the trump cards for these reasons:

—For practical purposes, Vandenberg can launch satellites only due south. The launchings aim might be swung as much as 15 degrees either way from due South but this would hardly make any difference since the space vehicle would still be passing over desolate Arctic and Antarctic regions, and in time would rest until it was passing over the poles.

—The specifications for putting a man into space call for bringing him back to earth immediately if he becomes unconscious. Scientists are not at all certain, and probably won't be despite animal experiments, how long a human being can remain conscious in the "weightless" condition of an orbiting vehicle. The polar orbit therefore poses a possibility that the man might have to be brought down in a remote region where he could not be reached. Launched from Canaveral, the vehicle would pass only over habitable lands and known seas.

Consider Safety Factor

—A more compelling reason for using Canaveral, connected with both safety and "payload," is that the cape can fire eastward and take advantage of the rotation of the earth to speed the space vehicle on its mission. The

rotation amounts to 1,000 miles an hour at the Equator—the earth is just over 24,000 miles in circumference and completes a turn in 24 hours—and from the most favorable launching angle at the cape this boost still amounts to about 900 miles an hour.

—The safety factor crowds into the rotation picture because accuracy is better when the boost is employed. All satellites establish themselves in orbits fixed like the stars, ignoring the earth's movement and earth's geography. The Vandenberg launching platform therefore will always be moving sideways, again at nearly 1,000 miles an hour, with respect to any fixed point at which a satellite can be fired. The additional difficulty in aiming and guidance will be somewhat like the difference between shooting a sitting or a flying duck.

The U. S. already has more than a year's budget for the civilian space agency, invested in Cape Canaveral and its down-range tracking stations, staffed by 15,000 people. Vandenberg so far represents an investment of 175 million, but will equal Canaveral in cost if plans are carried out.

De Gaulle To Get 'Formal' Election

PARIS (UPI)—A group of 81,508 Frenchmen vote Sunday in a nationwide presidential election that was certain to name Gen. Charles de Gaulle as France's most powerful constitutional chief of state since Napoleon III.

The voters, known as "grand electors," are members of an electoral college that includes National Assembly deputies, senators, mayors, municipal councilors and special representatives chosen by small town councils.

De Gaulle, with the backing of all major parties but the Communists, was considered the automatic choice to become the first "strong man" president of the Fifth Republic for a seven-year term.

The general's only opponents are Communist Georges Marrane, 71-year-old mayor of the Paris "Red Belt" suburb of Ivry and Albert Chatelet, a 41-year-old Sorbonne science professor nominated by the "Union of Democratic Forces."

Contract Awarded For Tyndall Work

MOBILE, Ala. (UPI)—The Army Engineers Saturday awarded a \$411,304 contract to Valley Construction Co. of Columbus, Miss. for construction of a hangar at Tyndall Air Force Base, Panama City, Fla.

The contract calls for building a field maintenance hangar with an open floor area of about 180 feet by 150 feet, with adjoining shops on all sides, along with utilities, driveways and 4,150 square yards of concrete apron pavement.

Dist. Engineer Col. R. W. Love reported that the firm would begin work early next month and have it ready for use by next December.

Loot Is \$131,908 In Bank Burglary

SILVER CREEK, Miss. (UPI)—Authorities announced Saturday that burglars got \$131,908 in cash, negotiable stocks and bonds from the Silver Creek State Bank before dawn Friday.

Originally the loot had been announced at \$5,000 but Lawrence County Sheriff Troy Smith said an investigation showed that 400 pounds of silver money, \$15,538 in currency and 13 safety deposit boxes containing stocks and bonds were taken.

Officers said it apparently was the largest bank burglary in the history of Mississippi.

Smith called on the public to be on the lookout for the loot and to call him at Monticello, the FBI or the State Highway Patrol if any of it is spotted.

He said the money was taken away in bank bags with the lettering "Federal Reserve Bank of New Orleans" printed on them in red and black letters. The safety deposit boxes were black, 22 inches long, five inches wide and three inches deep with the word "Moser" on the underlid.

The silver consisted of 800 silver dollars, 1,000 half dollars, 1,500 quarters and 1,200 dimes.

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Sergeant Killed; Address Unknown

LOWNESBORO, Ala. (UPI)—Sgt. IC Stanley R. Montgomery, 30, stationed at Ft. Benning, Ga., was killed instantly in a head-on collision near here Friday night on Highway 80.

The Highway Patrol said no home address was available.

Patrolmen said Montgomery was driving on the wrong side of the road at the time of the collision.

The crash occurred seven miles west of here.
