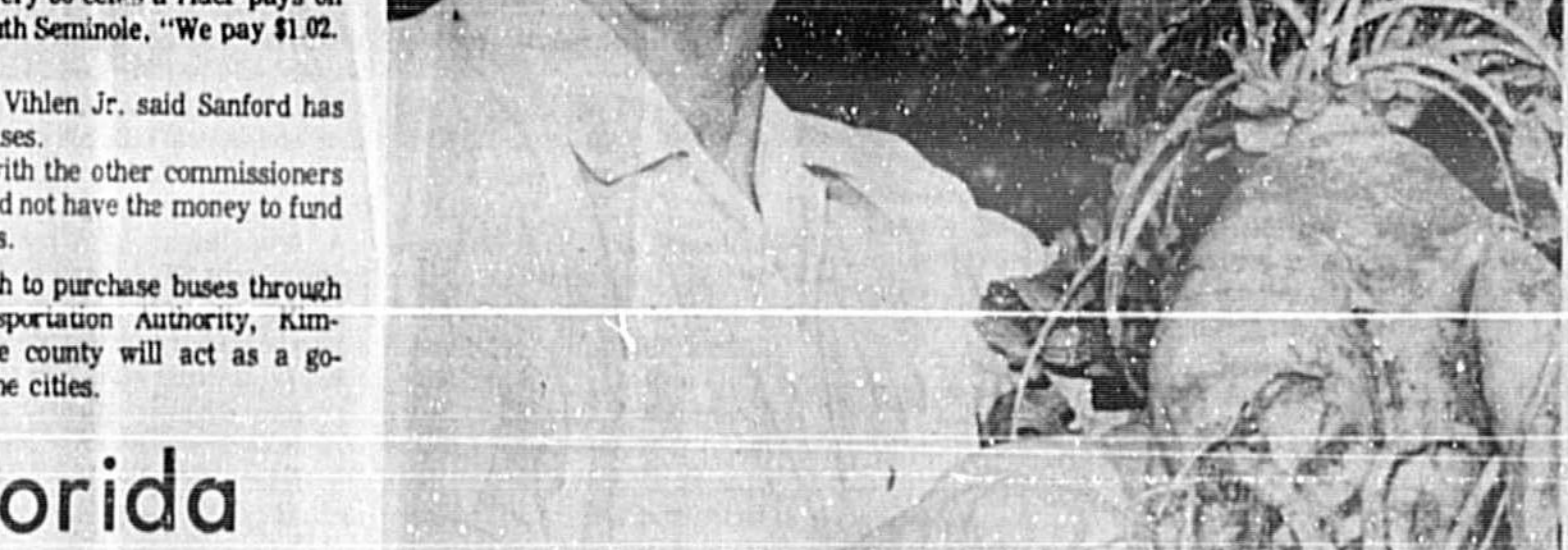

For Executive Assistant Applicant Names Finally Revealed

The executive assistant's position was recommended in a study by management consultant E.H. Underwood. The title executive assistant was chosen because some commissioners indicated the title, "county administrator," carried too much authority. The position will be the top one in county government. The salary range is from \$18,000 to \$25,000. Candidates were required to have a bachelor's or master's degree in public administration. Seven to nine years in government were also recommended. Some 250 applications were reviewed before candidates were narrowed to the remaining four. The question of releasing the names of applicants was raised by an attorney for the newspaper. But commissioners voted not to because they said it could jeopardize the hiring process. Commissioner Sid Vihlen Jr. asked the board on Tuesday to release the names. Commission Chairman Michael Hattaway sided with Vihlen, but Kwiatkowski and Richard Williams voted no. Commissioner John Kimbrough was not in attendance when the Tuesday vote was taken.

Geneva Residents Protest Rec Area Is Scrapped

About 100 Geneva residents turned up Tuesday night to hear county commissioners turn down a controversial plan for a recreation area on 1,700 acres east of Geneva on Lake Harney. Citizens complained installation of recreation facilities and the accompanying influx of new citizens would destroy the area's water supply. The request to rezone the land in question from agricultural to Planned Unit Development (PUD) was okayed by the Planning and Zoning Board. So, citizens took their case to the Board of County Commissioners. About 3,000 camp sites were planned for the area. In addition to water-related activities, motorcycling and other recreation was planned. David Farr, who said he represented investors in the project, asked that the decision be extended one week to allow time to meet with developers (Continued on Page 5-A)

Lake County Man Sues Sheriff, Two Deputies

A Lake County man has filed suit in circuit court seeking \$250,000 damages from Sheriff John Polk and two deputies in connection with an incident last April. Kenneth A. Becker, 27, alleges in the lawsuit, filed by Altamonte Springs attorney Lawrence H. Hornsby, that reserve deputy Jim Engelbreten and deputy James I. Smith arrested him on April 22, 1975 at Banana Lake Road by the deputies on a charge of carrying a concealed firearm. State Atty. Abbott Herring's office filed a formal charge in the case of improper exhibition of a firearm but dropped the charge on June 6, 1975. County Court Judge Wallace Hall ordered a .22 caliber pistol returned to Becker after the charge was dropped by Smith and Herring's office in the case stated that Becker rode a motorcycle into Smith's yard on Banana Lake Road and was followed by Engenbreten, who had observed Becker shooting a pistol into the Wekiva River. Smith's statement said a .22 caliber semi-automatic pistol was strapped to the seat of the motorcycle. The sworn statement alleged that Becker "made threats" before he was arrested on the weapons charge.

Sanford police said today that a 17-year-old juvenile boy has been arrested for possession of stolen property in connection with a pistol stolen in a January burglary at Seminole State Court in Sanford.

Eugene McCarthy



When asked to suggest names he would include in his cabinet if he were president, Eugene McCarthy has said he would like Golda Meir for defense and Indra Gandhi for agriculture. Such is McCarthy's nature, a mix of pragmatism and whimsy that has kept him on the edge but not in the center of American political power for three decades. An economist by education, a post-philosopher by temperament, McCarthy left a University of Minnesota teaching post in 1948 to take a seat in the House of Representatives. He moved to the Senate 11 years later where he established a wholly liberal record. He was among the first most vociferous opponents of U.S. involvement in Vietnam; he supported civil rights, anti-poverty and federal reform.

Lloyd Bentsen

Even Sen. Lloyd Bentsen's enemies admit that the Democratic presidential candidate has a brilliant, supple mind and that he uses it. The conservative Bentsen was elected to the U.S. Senate from Texas in 1970, bucking a tide of liberal Democratic victories in the state. Bentsen, a millionaire, ran a well-financed campaign that included film clips of the police riot outside the 1968 national convention which implied that somehow his opponent, liberal Sen. Ralph Yarborough, was responsible for it.

For the general election, Bentsen courted and won important liberal figures in the state as well as leaders of the state AFL-CIO. On major issues, the 55-year-old Bentsen has usually lined up with other Democrats on roll calls, even on issues such as the bombing of Cambodia (against) and on the oil crisis (for). He has demonstrated his political agility by voting to eliminate the allowance for the major oil producers, but at the same time introducing a successful amendment to retain it for minor producers. This effectively placed him in the public eye as opposing a major interest group, while still retaining the support of the oil industry.



He advocates greater government involvement in the economy, including wage-price controls, a cut in the defense budget, a foreign policy funded by the best American principles, and an end to the overconsumption and waste of natural resources. He believes it is time to redistribute the work load, by way of a four day week in order to reduce unemployment. Thereby also the cost of social welfare.

Milton Shapp

After becoming governor of Pennsylvania, Milton Shapp ordered the conversion of several rooms of the Executive Mansion into an education facility for brain damaged children and a Late Start program for senior citizens. Associates say the incident epitomizes Shapp's philosophy and motivations. At age 63 he hurries to do whatever he can for people "and formalities be damned."

He is campaigning on ideas he feels will "put America back to work." He wants to revitalize the nation's railroad system, create a federal agency to guarantee loans of all municipalities, restructure the government to achieve greater productivity and competence. He favors a U.S. takeover of all welfare programs. A short, gray, quiet man, Shapp is believed to be the only one ever to seriously run for the presidency. His chances are somewhat clouded by an ongoing investigation into allegations that he once accepted bribing and the licensing of handbags and abstained from the military appropriation bill.



While Rep. Morris Udall is not well-known nationally, the activist liberal Democratic presidential candidate has been elected by a not nearly so conservative district in Arizona ever since 1951. While he has never chaired any committees, Udall did challenge John McCormack for the Speaker's post in 1969 and ran a fairly strong second round in the late July runoff for the race for Majority Leader in 1971. These unsuccessful attempts showed his willingness to oppose the ancient seniority system of Congress. His legislative record shows an emphasis on electoral and congressional reform and environmental protection. He spearheaded the passage of strip mining bills in 1974 and 1975 through the House (both were vetoed by President Ford) and was the chief House sponsor of the complicated anti-strip mining bill that was scuttled by fellow Arizona, Sam Steiger, in 1974.

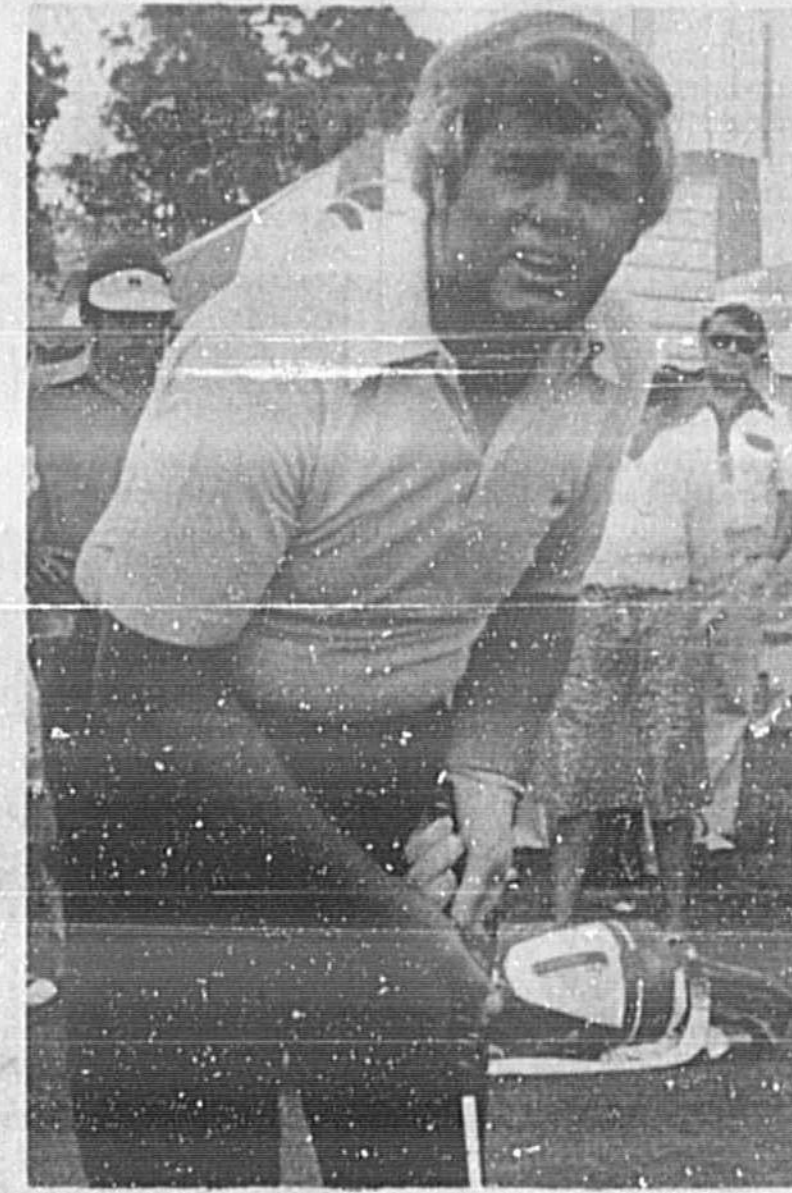

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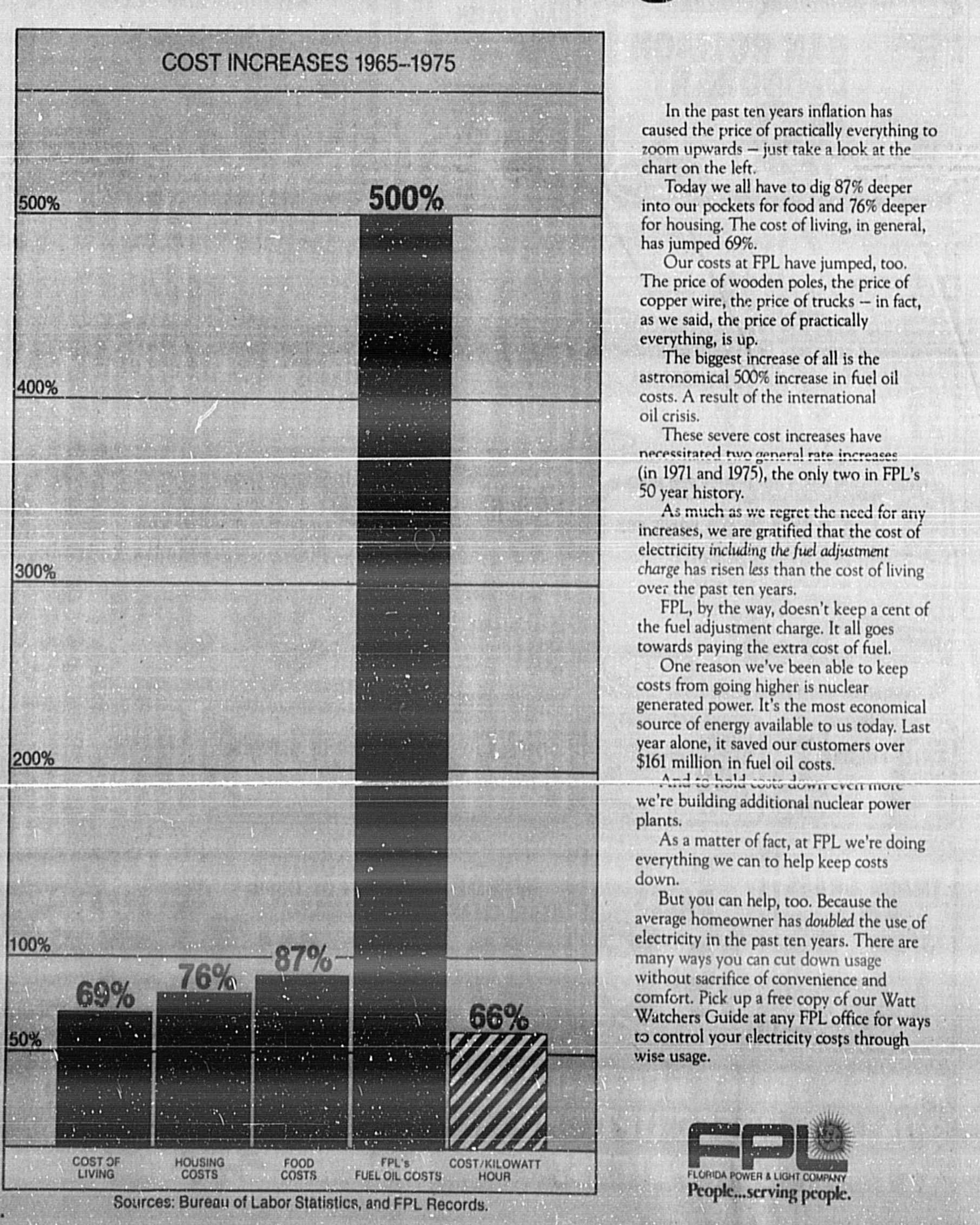



Cook Of The Week Easy Fixings Are Her Specialty

Mrs. Jack Bocco, Forest City, not only has an unusual first name, Clyde, but also admits she likes nothing better than to get all the family together and prepare a huge meal for them. "It's rewarding, because I love to fix things and they love to eat them," she said.

When Clyde gets all her family together, it is no small undertaking, as she has nine children (eight are married) plus 15 grandchildren.

So what does she like to do when she isn't working at her full-time job at Deep South?

"Why, I enjoy whipping up a cake or something tasty, just for the fun of it!" she said.

Clyde prefers Southern cooking, and said, "I believe people in the North eat more pies, while Southerners seem to prefer cake." She remembers

baking a birthday cake for her mother, when she was only nine years old. "I don't suppose it tasted very good, but at least, I made it," she laughed.

Attractive and charmingly modest, Clyde said, "My family has always liked to eat my cooking. I like good food, but I also like things that are easy to prepare. I don't think you need to spend all your time in the kitchen to have good meals." Two of the following recipes are Clyde's own creations: the Swiss Steak recipe and chocolate cake.

SWISS STEAK
3 lbs. round steak, thick sliced
1/2 cup chopped celery
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1/2 cup chopped onions
2 cans tomato soup
1 can water
1/2 cup Crisco Oil
Salt and pepper to taste

Put steak in wide strips, salt lightly. Flour lightly, in 1/2 cup self-rising flour and brown sides in Crisco Oil in hot skillet. Put steak and all drippings in baking pan along with celery, peppers, onion, soup, salt and pepper, and water. Cover and cook in preheated 350 degree oven for about one hour, or until steak is tender. Very good served over rice or with hot biscuits.

BISCUITS
2 cups sifted self-rising flour
1/2 cup shortening
About 3/4 cup milk
Heat oven to 475 degrees.
Place sifted flour in bowl, add shortening and cut in until all particles are as fine as corn meal. Add milk and mix quickly with a fork. Turn dough out on lightly floured board. Knead lightly. Roll out and cut with floured cutter. Place on baking sheet and bake 12 minutes, use one cup, less tablespoons.

BRUNSWICK STEW
Pre-heat fryer, lean pork shoulder or ham in sufficient quantity to yield six lbs. chopped meat. Add the following, 16 oz. size can —
2 cans cream style corn
1 can whole kernel corn
3 cans tomatoes, tear in small pieces with fork
1 can tomato sauce
1 can small English peas
1 bottle ketchup
3 medium onions finely chopped
1 Tsp. hot sauce
1 cup Worcestershire sauce
1/2 cup barbecue sauce
1/2 pint maple syrup
Salt and pepper to taste. Mix all ingredients and cook slowly for four hours. Very good when served with barbecue. Will serve a crowd, or half, for a small picnic or family gathering.

CHOCOLATE CAKE
1 cup shortening
2 cups sugar
4 squares bitter chocolate
4 eggs
1 cup buttermilk
2 cups sifted self-rising flour
1 Tbs. vanilla
Cream shortening and sugar until fluffy. Add melted chocolate, and eggs, beat till fluffy. Add flour alternately with buttermilk and vanilla. Bake in 2 greased 9 inch pans, 350 degrees.

CHOCOLATE FROSTING
2 squares bitter chocolate, melted
3 cup confectioners sugar
1/2 cup butter, or margarine
Cream margarine and sugar, add melted chocolate and enough milk to allow a good spread, but don't allow it to become thin. Fill between layers, top and sides.

GUMDROP COOKIES
1 cup shortening
1 cup sugar
1 cup brown sugar firmly packed
3 eggs well beaten
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. baking powder
1 cup flaked coconut
2 cups oats (regular or quick)
1 cup gumdrops, chopped
1 cup chopped pecans
1/2 cup chocolate chips

Cream shortening and sugar, add beaten eggs and vanilla. Mix well. Sift dry ingredients together and add to creamed mixture. Stir in coconut, oats, gumdrops, pecans and chocolate chips. Form into balls and place on greased cookie sheet. Press flat with fork. Bake 7-8 degrees for 10 minutes. Yields about six dozen.

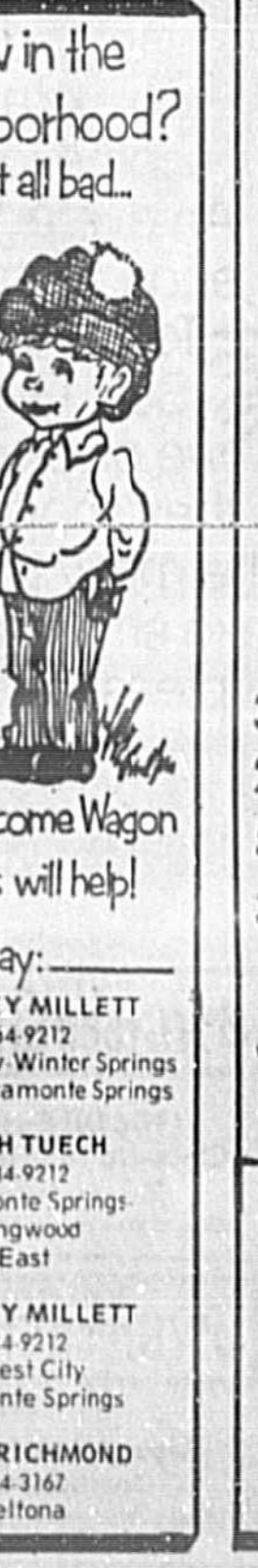

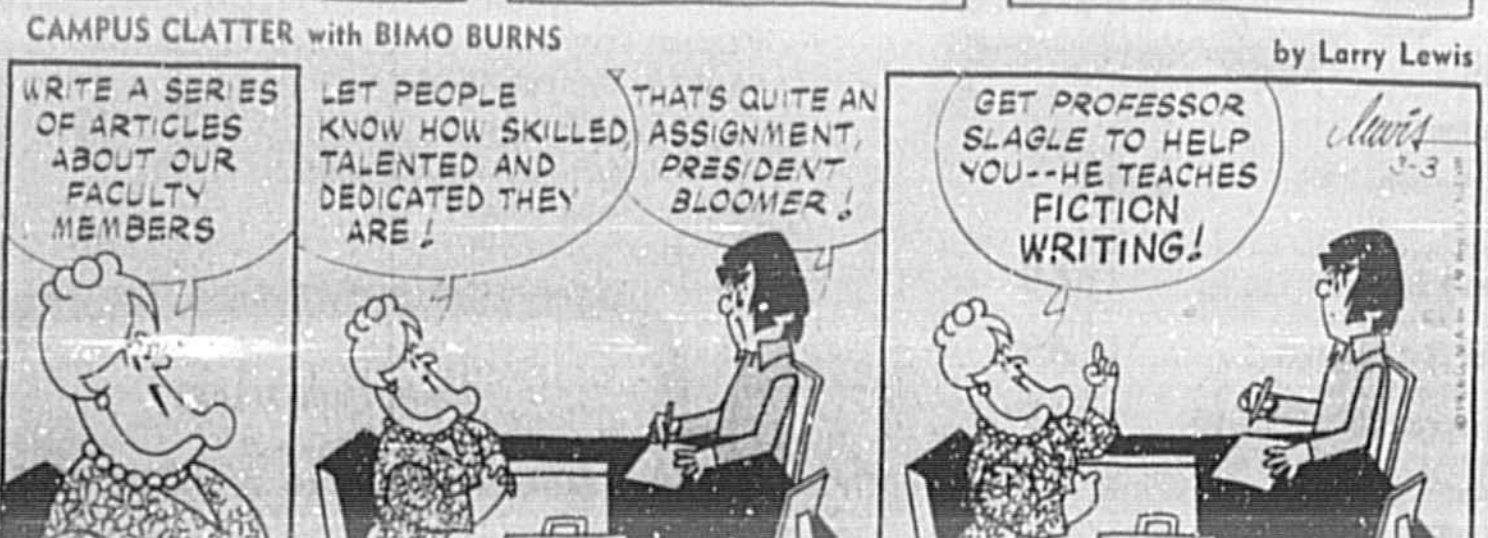

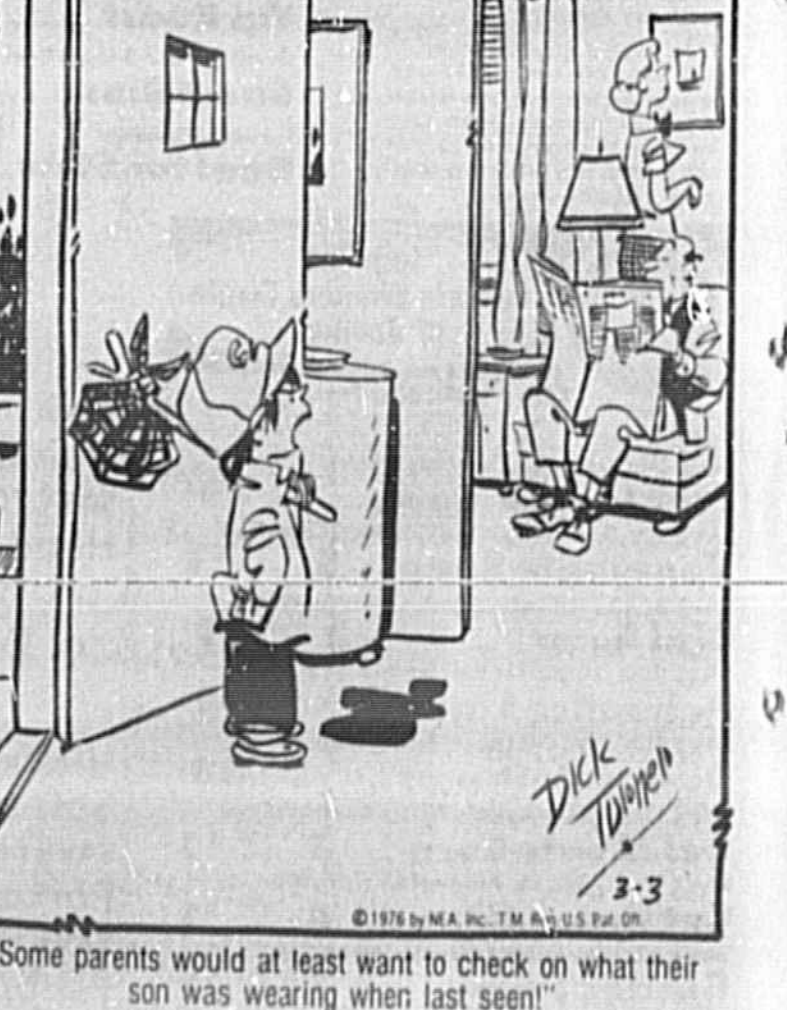

It's Back To Basics For Seminole County Youngsters

By JEAN PATTESON

The pendulum swings. In recent years, Seminole County mathematics students have been strong in concepts, but weak in computation. Now it seems, they will go back to drilling the basics of addition and subtraction, multiplication and division.

This information, which the Seminole County School Board regards as heartening, was a by-product of an instructional presentation made at Wednesday night's school board meeting by teachers at Tusawilla Middle School.

The presentation was designed to show how the Comprehensive

Test of Basic Skills (CTBS) is utilized at Tusawilla as a tool to provide students with a carefully planned, meaningful educational program.

Test results achieved by the local students over the past two school years were illustrated graphically in comparison to national reference groups.

This comparison is interesting, but is not the main purpose of the testing, the school board was advised.

Rather, the CTBS is used for diagnostic purposes. First, it is used to evaluate the strengths and weaknesses of the entire student body in order to determine what areas need special attention.

Also, through the guidance department, individual students are advised as to the meaning of the test results and how improvements can be made.

The Tusawilla staff and principal, Owen R. McCarron, feel the CTBS is the single most effective tool available to use for these purposes.

Tusawilla students are tested in September, and retested in April.

Analysis of the results identifies areas of concern and evaluates progress from the previous year. Teachers then work out specific plans to remedy the problem areas.

One of these specific plans was to concentrate on the basic skills

of computation, rather than on more advance concepts.

"In other words," commented school board member Allan Keeth, "you mean drill."

"We mean drill," responded the Tusawilla teachers.

"Historically," interjected School Supt. William P. Layer, Seminole County has been high in concept, but low in computation."

The CTBS is being used in the school to evaluate strengths and diagnose weaknesses. The prescription to overcome computational weaknesses, is drill.

And drill has apparently been strong medicine. Because not (Continued On Page 2-A)

County Loses \$162,000 Grant To So. Carolina

Bypassing Florida and Seminole County, the U.S. Department of Labor has awarded a \$162,000 grant to South Carolina, Bob Ellis said today.

Ellis, acting administrative assistant to the county commission, said he was disappointed Seminole lost the entire award, which would have been used to teach English to persons whose mother tongue is any language other than English.

Since the Disney boom, more and more Spanish-speaking persons have moved to Seminole County.

The program was to be administered by Seminole Community College and the grant was applied for through the county's Comprehensive Education and Training Act (CETA) program.

"It seems to me they (labor officials) could have spread the money around a little," Commission Chairman Michael Hattaway said.

Ellis said he was unaware of any specific reason why all the money was awarded to South Carolina.

The grant was applied for months ago by Jim Bedsole, CETA director. At that time, SCC officials appeared at a county commission meeting with Bedsole. Everyone was enthused about the grant.

One of the most difficult problems a non-English speaking person faces is the difficulty in getting a job because of communication problems.

And, Bedsole says the first step toward securing a paying job is to learn the language. Then other federally funded programs take over and try and teach skills that will enable a person to compete in the economic marketplace.

Both Ellis and Hattaway said grant money other than the \$162,000 went, also, to South Carolina.

Others Focus On Florida Bayh Drops Out Of Race

Indiana Sen. Birch Bayh suspended his active campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination today, while four other Democrats began their drive toward Florida's March 9 primary election.

Bayh told a New York news conference he had made his decision because after his seventh place finish in Tuesday's Massachusetts primary election, "our campaign treasury is depleted."

But he said he would "continue to speak out on the issues that concern the American people."

He did not throw his support to another candidate. He said he was urging his backers to take "an active role" in the Democratic campaign.

Bayh had met for more than five hours Wednesday with campaign aides in Washington, then flew to New York for another meeting with supporters there. He planned to return to Washington after the news conference to spend the day in his office.

Ronald Reagan, President Ford's challenger for the Republican nomination, was headed for Florida today to step up his own campaign.

Florida's primary is the first major test in the South for Alabama Sen. George Wallace and ex-Governor Jimmy Carter. Sen. Henry M. Jackson of Washington, winner of the Massachusetts election, and Gov.

Milton Shapp of Pennsylvania are running there, too.

The ballot lists a dozen Democrats, but only four have actively campaigned in the state where Wallace won overwhelmingly four years ago with 41.6 per cent of the vote.

The GOP race is considered crucial, particularly for Reagan. Both Ford and the former California governor all but ignored Massachusetts last week to concentrate on Florida.

Ford edged Reagan in the first-in-the-nation New Hampshire primary, then overwhelmed the challenger in Massachusetts and Vermont. Reagan was not on the ballot in Vermont.

In Washington, Ford campaign aides said the President has no plans to visit Florida before Tuesday's election. He made two trips to the state in February, and has predicted victory in the primary.

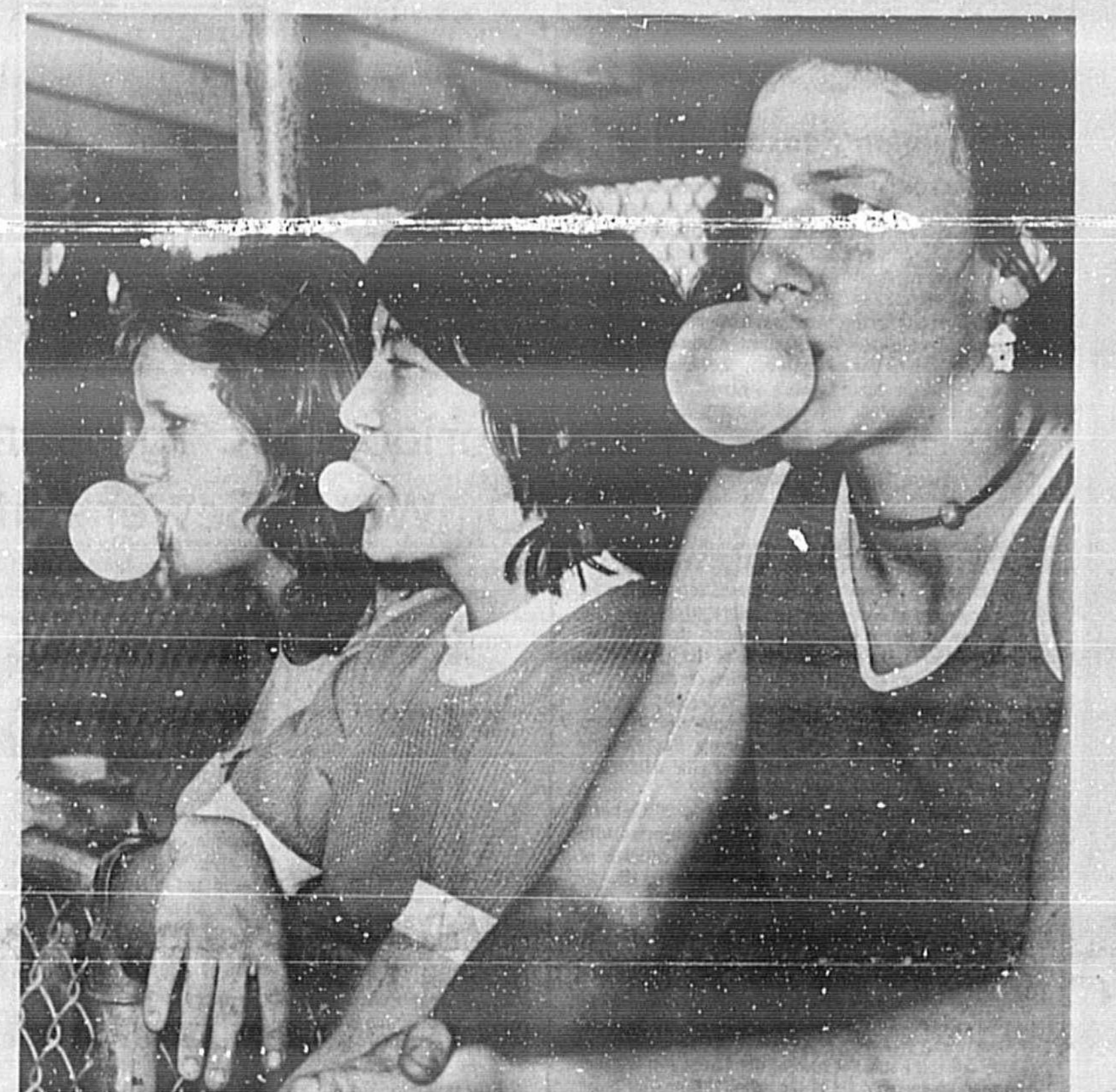
Among Democrats, Jackson has rejected the notion that the Wallace-Carter race is the focal point for Florida's primary. At several campaign stops in the state Wednesday, he declared, "It's a lose-lose issue race."

Jackson wouldn't say who would get the biggest share of Florida's 81 Democratic national convention delegates, but he told reporters in Tampa, "I am the only candidate to beat George Wallace. Gov. Carter has met him three times and was defeated three times."

Jackson apparently referred to the Massachusetts election and party caucuses in Mississippi and South Carolina.

Carter, who visited five Florida cities Wednesday, conceded he underestimated Jackson in Massachusetts. Carter ran fourth there.

Tentative Approval Granted

Courtesy Busing Policy Ok'd

A new courtesy busing policy was given tentative approval Wednesday night by the Seminole County School Board, which authorized its advertisement.

The policy, presented by Carmen W. Hall, spokesman for the County Wide Advisory Committee's busing committee, requires that the school superintendent establish a safety committee to determine hazardous conditions for transporting students within two miles of the school, or within one-and-a-half miles between the home and nearest bus stop.

The safety committee will be composed of appropriate county and municipal authorities, school staff and advisory members.

This committee will review data collected during an on-site inspection of proposed courtesy busing zones. It will make a recommendation to the superintendent to either provide or refuse courtesy busing.

Each area will be reviewed annually to establish whether continued courtesy busing is required. The school board will determine which routes be reviewed on-site — some routes, such as those along busy highways SR-436 and U.S. 17-92, absolutely require continued review without an on-site review being conducted.

If an area shows marked improvement in safety during the year, it will be examined by procedures to determine if courtesy busing should be discontinued.

If the area should disqualify for courtesy busing, the service will be discontinued after proper notification of school and parents.

Any changes in courtesy busing must receive school board approval. The board will also act as an "appeal board" in situations where a conflict arises.

Requests for courtesy busing, however, should be submitted to the schools superintendent.

The board directed Schools Supt. William P. Layer to get out an administrative order that only school principals be authorized to suspend students from school. Layer was also instructed to examine an apparent breakdown in communications between school authorities and parents relating to discipline problems in school.

This action was prompted by the request of a parent, Cmdr. Melbourne King, that two suspensions against his son at Lake Branley High School be revoked.

Harden Sentenced: 5 Years In Prison

Ben Harden Jr. of Sanford was sentenced to five years in prison plus 10 years probation today for the Nov. 12 shotgun slaying of his ex-wife, 47-year-old Laura Mae Harden.

Harden, 46, had been convicted of second-degree murder in the case by a circuit court jury Jan. 9 but the court granted a motion by defense attorney Newman Brock for a new trial. The re-trial had been scheduled for this week, but then Brock withdrew the motion.

The new trial had been granted on the grounds that Circuit Judge A.J. Hoseman Jr. erred by not going to the slaying scene, the couple's 1808 Mulberry Ave., Sanford, residence with the jury.

Today Judge Hoseman meted the split sentence for Harden after Brock withdrew the motion for a new trial.

The sentence was in accord with negotiations between Brock and Assistant State Atty. Claude Van Hook. Judge Hoseman was party to the negotiations and told Harden what his sentence would be at the start of the proceeding today.

At his trial Harden testified that his ex-wife tried to shoot him with a shotgun inside their house and he took the weapon from her.

The dead woman's relatives testified they saw Harden chase her from the house and blast her with the shotgun.

Harden testified he shot in self-defense when he thought his ex-wife was reaching for a pistol in her clothing. Authorities said no pistol was found at the slaying scene.
