

OH YEAH!

The class of the leagues appears to be asserting itself as we study the results of games played in the big show Saturday and Sunday. The Yanks, who landed in first place Saturday, when the Red Sox whipped the Indians; the Athletics, who jumped from fourth to second place; the Cards, who, in whipping the Pirates Saturday won their eighth straight game and gave them a firmer grip on first place, and the Giants, who took two straight from the Cubs, to put them close to first place, all give signs of being the clubs which will battle it out during the latter days of September. That's not news though, because they are the clubs that have been picked to win. The idea is that they are getting set for the long grind early, after rain and spring upsets had put them off their stride.

Rain stopped four of the eight games in the big leagues yesterday. In the National League, the climbing Giants, led by Fred Fitzsimmons, the season's pitching sensation, stopped the Cubs for the second straight day in a 5 to 0 game. It was Fred's fifth straight win, his second straight shutout, and his third straight low hit game. He also hit a home run with the bases full in the second inning, to give the Giants plenty runs.

The first appearance in the East of the Pirates was the occasion of their victory over the Red Sox when Larry French held the Pinstripers to eight hits while his mates hit timely to put over a 3 to 1 win. O'Doul's error in the eighth after Traynor had doubled, gave the Pirates the runs they needed to win. French, a left-hander, was the 22nd flinger of that type to appear against the Robins this year, the pitchers seeming to take great delight in sending the lefties against the poor Robins.

In the American League, the Senators won a dramatic 12 inning game from the Tigers, 7 to 4, when Joe Kuhel hit a double with the bases loaded in the last frame. The Sena had their batting clothes on, pounding out 16 hits off Hoyt and Uhl, while the Tigers were able to get but seven hits off Jones, Hadley, and Marberry. It was the second extra-inning game of the series.

For the third straight day, the Red Sox trampled the Indians under a heavy score. They came from behind yesterday and won out 9 to 4, sending the Indians into third place with a bang. Durham pitched a great game for the Sox although he was touched for 11 hits four of which were racked up by Hodapp, Webb and Roth-

sock were the slugging stars for the Sox, (Webb leading 1-00) while Rothrock got three out of four tries.

Sherid and Ruffing pitched for the Yanks, allowing 15 hits, while McKain, Braxton, and Moore went the route for the Sox, allowing 15 hits. . . . Gaston's fine pitching and Webb's home run gave the Red Sox a win over the Indians, 5 to 1. The Indians got but 5 hits off the Gaston, while the Sox touched Hudlin and Jablonowski for 11 blows. . . . A five-run rally in the eighth featured by Fox's home run with two on, gave the Athletics a 6 to 4 win over the Browns. Walberg and Grove did the pitching for the champions, giving up 12 hits, while Gray and Kinsey were touched for six hits by the A's. . . . Washington and Detroit were rained out.


