SAYS 1920-21 CROP CITRUS FRUIT WILL BE SMALLER THAN LAST YEAR'S YIELD

C. E. Stewart, Jr. Business Manager Florida Citrus Exchange, Repudiates Estimate of Sixteen million Boxes, Credited to Exchange

That the grapefruit and orange crop of Florida for the coming season probably will be smaller than for 1919-20 is the belief of C. E. Stewart, Jr., business manager of the Florida Citrus Exchange, expressed in telegram received here yesterday.

Mr. Stewart is quite positive that while more oranges will be grown in the state than last year, the lesser yield of grapefruit will reduce the total production to a figure considerably below the eleven million box aggregate of the past seasons.

Estimate of a sixteen million box crop for 1920-21, credited to the Florida Citrus Exchange in recent dispatches from Tampa that were widely published throughout Florida, are repudiated by Mr. Stewart who is in the North on business connected with the completion of sales plans for the organization of which he is the active executive.

Any over-estimate of the citrus crop at this time of the year is a serious matter for growers he says. Speculators seize upon the figures as a means of inducing grove owners to part with their fruit at lower prices than conditions justify.

If the Florida Highway Association will come out in the open, recognize the popular opposition to changing the constitution of the state or gratify a temporal desire and advocate a vote on specified bond issue for a specified purpose they will have a proposition which will appeal to all progressive taxpayers.

SPEEDING ON BEACH IS FATAL

AUSES THE DEATH OF CHARLES STEWART AND OTHERS FATALY INJURED

Daytona, Sept. 1.—Another fatal accident occurred on Daytona Beach Sunday afternoon, the tragedy resulting from the ditching of a large automobile which turned turtle after one of the front wheels came off while the car was moving at fast speed.

Mr. Stewart was owner of a touring car, was instantly killed when the machine turned turtle. With the victim of the accident were Mrs. Stewart who received a pelvic fracture, cuts on the head and internal injuries; Alfred H. Fuller, who sustained a fracture at the base of the skull, and Mrs. Fuller who had two ribs broken and was injured internally.

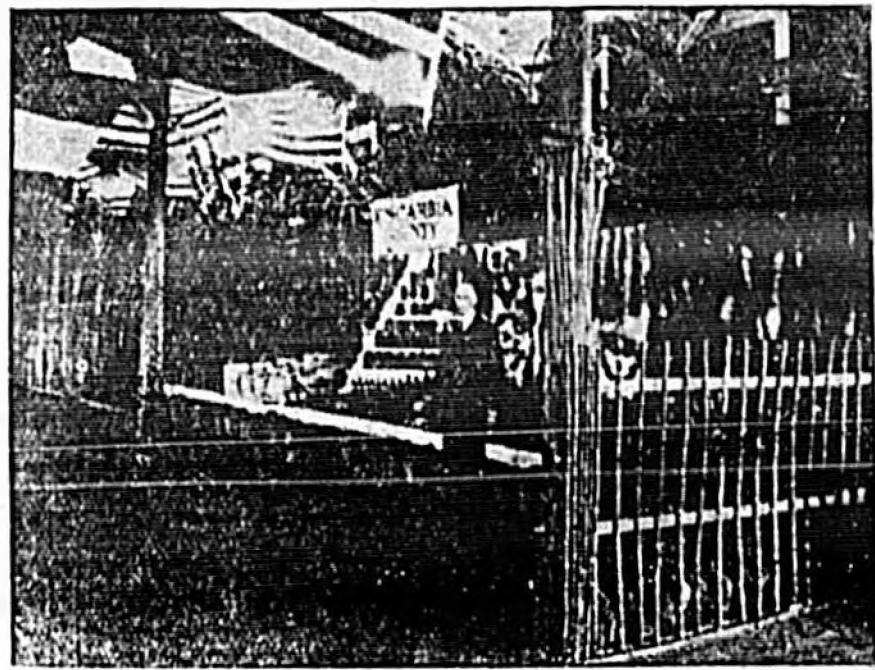

AMERICAN RED CROSS TO GIVE RURAL HELP

Program for Public Health and Community Welfare is Now Well Under Way.

Rural communities and towns of less than 8,000 population benefit in a very large part by the public health and community welfare work of the American Red Cross.

Briefly, the purpose of Rural Service is to assist people to get out of life more health, wealth and happiness. In this purpose public health instruction and general educational progress of both children and adults play a big part.

Recreation is found to be one of the biggest needs in rural life. There is lack of sufficient play-life for the children and social life for the adults. Picnics, regattas, debating clubs, baseball leagues, community singing and other social events which bring the people of surrounding communities together have been organized and carried on under the guidance of Red Cross rural workers to great advantage.

As a result of community organization, townships in which there had been neither plans nor interest in community progress have been organized to work together with the united purpose of bringing their community up to the most enlightened standards.

In order that there may be concerted effort in carrying on the programs of the various welfare agencies in the rural districts, Red Cross Rural Service helps the organizations already on the ground. The main object of the service is to lead a hand everywhere and take the lead only where necessary.

FEDERAL AID FOR ROAD BUILDING

REACHES HIGH FIGURE AND FLORIDA HAS ONE MILLION.

Washington, Sept. 1.—Combined federal and state expenditures for road building may reach a total of \$250,000,000 during the current fiscal year, according to Thomas H. McDonald, chief of the bureau of public roads, department of agriculture.

The last installment of federal aid funds totaling \$100,000,000 became available last July 1. Three quarters of this appropriation was derived from the 1919 appropriation, while \$25,000,000 was provided from the original appropriation in 1916.

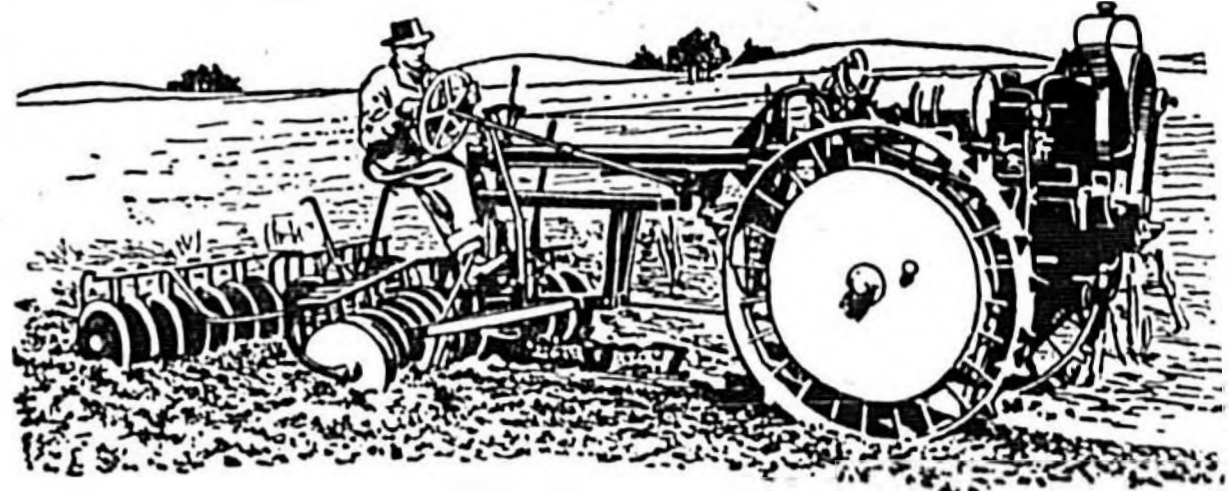

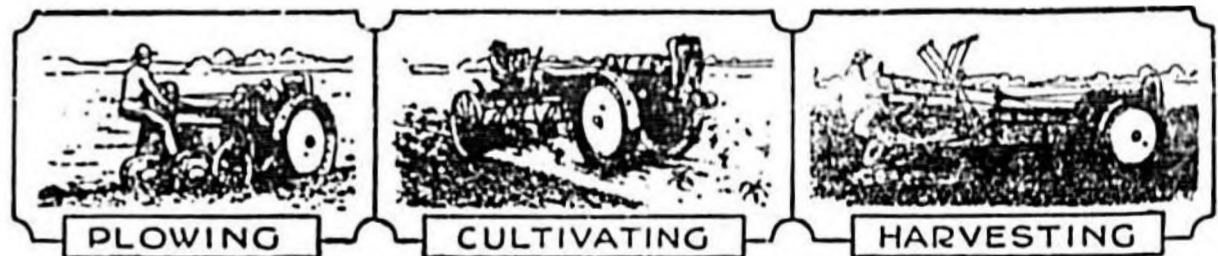

# WILL MAKE AUTO BODIES IN SANFORD

### THE SPIRIT OF SOUTH FLORIDA

We believe there has not come to light a finer illustration of "the spirit of south Florida" than that shown in two short editorial utterances in the last issue of the Palmetto News.

The Palmetto News is urging its district in Manatee County to vote bond to build permanently its part of the Bayshore road. And the Palmetto News is opposing the proposed constitutional amendment to give the legislature power to bond the state or five per cent of its value for road building.

Urging the bonding at home it says: "Everything is high now, we are painfully aware, and we know another bond issue for roads would be hard to carry, but it seems to us to be the reasonable thing to do now to bond this district for enough to build our part of the Bayshore road of asphalt blocks or brick. The shell road we now have is fast wearing away and it won't be much of a road soon, but it would make a dandy foundation for a better road that would last forever. We are going to make this a track or asphalt road some day, so why not do so now before the base is worn away? However, we would not vote for a bond issue unless a rock-ribbed guarantee of some sort was given that we would at least get a little for our money."

Why it will oppose to the last the state bonding scheme, it says: proposed amendment to the constitution, which seeks to bond this state for \$20,000,000 and more for two reasons: First we do not believe it would do justice to those counties which have been progressive and bonded heavily for good roads already. Second, the legislature could keep on issuing bond indefinitely, beyond the \$20,000,000 now wanted, and we do not care to trust any such a proposition to a body of men who will forget their oaths from year to year, as shown by their not obeying the law of apportionment. There is no telling what they might do with such a elastic proposition as the one suggested. The amendment should and will be killed in November."

Here we have the spirit of South Florida. If you want anything done, do it yourself. Three west Florida counties which have not a dollar of local road, are loudly clamoring for the state bonding amendment; and even such a good north Florida county as Alachua wants the bond amendment because "Alachua

will probably benefit more from it than any other county in the state." Eleven counties in South Florida have more permanent roads and more automobiles than three times that many counties—leaving out Duval—in any other part of the state; and it is because, like the News is urging now, they have spent their own money for what will be the most direct benefit to them.

The bonding amendment will be killed.

Meiton, managing editor both young men and full of great business promise, Jack Worthington, editor of the Tampa Times and ripe with years of experience in this and other states Howard Mayes a university student who is business manager of his mother's paper the Pensacola Journal and a worthy son of a noble sire, the late Frank Mayes, all of these men coming a long distance from the big paper to mingle with the smaller fry with the idea of standing together or falling together and then we come to Harry Brown of the St. Augustine Record, Goode Guerry of the Palatka News, Ed Fitzgerald of the Daytona News, Chris. Odrington the sage of the press and his nephew Clayton of the younger generation, Bill Glen of the Sentinel who looks like a preacher but is really an editor, the Brosiers Twins, young and active and full of pep and Josiah Ferris of the Reporter Star, the old wheel horse of Orange County Journalism and Walter Essington the B. M. of the Sentinel, fat and not yet forty, L. W. Bloom of the Lakeland Star with a Napoleonic pose, Carr and Naugle of the St. Petersburg Times, of uncer tain age but filled with the proper spirit and ideas of boost, Hosmer of the Bradentown Journal of the resounding voice, Clarence Woods former press slave but now a professor of the Montverde School, silver tongued suave, smart, sugary and shampooed Frank Kay Anderson of the Thomas Agency, former editor who has lost none of the nerve and dash and who is the life of every gathering, Smiling Fisher of the Aircraft Service who would make a man afflicted with paralysis get up and laugh, and there are others that we might mention who were there and some who were not there. But we have never attended a meeting of newspaper men in Florida that we did not note each one of them and come to the conclusion that they are just about the best bunch of pen pushers that any state can boast and having been gathered here from almost every state in the union they are broad mind, cosmopolitan, free handed, whole souled boys—just boys when they leave the office behind them and gather together for business and pleasure.

Their troubles are many with the and advancing costs of paper material and labor and many of them hardly know whether paper will be available this winter or not but every one of them are going ahead and getting on the best paper that money and brain can produce, giving their various communities columns of free advertising and hours of time and working for less money than any other profession in the world but working all the time. Surely the Florida press is a green bunch of men and of women for we have some of the finest newspaper women in the world in the "P" side press. Bless them all, they will get their reward some day and methink it is coming sooner than expected.

### STATE REPORTS OF FLORIDA'S RESOURCES AMAZING

Tallahassee, July 19.—Figures showing the magnitude of some of Florida's crops, as well as other statistics designed to give the people of other parts of the country an idea of the state, its resources, its possibilities are contained in the last report of the state commission of agriculture.

This report shows that the cattle of the state are worth \$25,000,000; hog another \$25,000,000; horses and mules, \$17,000,000; sheep \$10,000,000, and goat \$50,000.

The state produces and ships each year an average of 5,000 carloads of winter-grown tomatoes, a total larger than that of all other states combined.

Florida farms, grove poultry and dairy products have attained a value of at least \$150,000,000 annually. The last year for which these products were shown to be slightly more than \$120,000,000. It is estimated that if all land available for and adapted to cultivation of one kind or another were made productive, the value of these products would be close to \$1,000,000,000 annually.

The fine county of Lee is known to contain 4,641 square miles of territory an area greater than Rhode Island and Delaware combined, and nearly as large as Connecticut.

In destiny of population Florida is far down the list, with only about 16 persons to the square mile, the average for the entire United States as shown in the census of 1910 was 30 persons to the square mile. Of Florida's farmers, however, 70 per cent are whites.

Only 20 states in the Union have more daily newspapers than Florida though this state is thirty-third in population.

Within the last five years Florida's bank deposits increased 205 per cent. The state has 201 banks under state control and 51 national banks.

Every American variety of file plant, including sisal, for which many millions of dollars annually is or can be produced on a commercial scale in Florida.

Approximately 90 per cent of the original forests of the state still are timbered, though hundreds of acres

of timberland are being cleared each year.

Some of the largest springs in the world are to be found in Florida, several of which have a flow sufficient in volume to float good-sized steamships. Silver Springs near Ocala, with a flow of 375,000 gallons a minute, is believed to be the largest spring in the world.

### Good Old Cheap Coal Days.

In the good old days of 1812 one could step out with a couple of dollars and come home with food and fuel sufficient to supply a good-sized family for a week. Facts regarding the big expenses a century ago are contained in a letter from John Sims, great-grandfather of Admiral Sims, to his wife Molly, dated Uniontown, Pa. October 1812. At that time, board and lodging for two cost \$3.50 a week. Coal was 4 cents a bushel. Chickens cost 10 cents a pair, feathers cost 7 cents a dozen. Beef was from 3 to 4 cents a pound, while butter cost 10 cents from 2 1/2 cents a pound.

Through the Junior Red Cross the boys and girls of the United States are giving a fresh start in life to little war orphans scattered all over Europe. They have set up orphan's homes in France, school colonies in Belgium and Montenegro, and day schools in Albania.

They are sending dozens of young Byrtons, Montegrinos, and Albanians to American colleges in Constantinople and Helrut, and maintaining more than a hundred orphans of French soldiers at colleges and trade schools. In orphanages and farm schools up and down the peninsula of Italy there are nearly 600 wards of American Juniors.

Last winter a thousand French children from the inadequate shelters of the devastated regions were sent by the Junior Red Cross to spend the cold months in warmer parts of France. At the same time five thousand little Belgians were having a hot lunch every day at Junior Red Cross school cafeterias.

American school children have already raised something like a million dollars for these enterprises, and they are still hard at work.

In China, through campaigns of education, the Junior Red Cross is helping to combat widely prevalent blindness and cholera.

### RED CROSS RELIEF IN CENTRAL EUROPE

But for timely assistance of the American Red Cross during the last year, a large proportion of the 20,000,000 population of the Balkan States might have starved or perished from disease or exposure. Six million dollars worth of food, clothing and medical supplies have been sent to the Balkans—Rumania, Bulgaria, Albania, Montenegro, Serbia, Bosnia and Greece—since the beginning of Red Cross relief operations in Central Europe, while millions of dollars worth of food alone has been sent to the needy in these states.

The money expended by the Red Cross in this stricken portion of Europe has been used to set up hospitals, orphanages, dispensaries, mobile medical units and to help in the general reconstruction of devastated areas. American tractors and other farming implements have been sent to the agricultural regions where aid has been given in plowing the land.

By the last of this year probably all American Red Cross agencies of ministering relief in Central Europe will have withdrawn. By that time, it is believed, the people will have approached a normal state of living and will be able through their own agencies, which the Red Cross has helped set up to provide for themselves.

### RED CROSS EXTENDS RELIEF TO POLAND

More than \$5,000,000 has been spent by the American Red Cross in aiding the stricken people of Poland. The organization has nursed the sick, fed the starving, clothed the naked, sheltered the homeless, schooled the children and cared for the orphans there. It has conducted a relentless fight against typhus, cholera and other terrible diseases. So today millions of men and women in that resurrected nation speak in grateful appreciation of "The Greatest Mother in the World."

Nearly 200 American Red Cross workers are now engaged in relief activities in Poland. Four large relief bases are in operation and eleven mobile units are in the field. During the last twelve months this organization was largely instrumental in the re-establishment of a million refugees at a cost for general relief of more than \$1,000,000. Last winter one-half million war orphans were aided materially, and since then a series of large orphanages have been established to give them permanent care.

But for American Red Cross aid, officials of Poland declared recently, millions of people in that country would have perished of disease, exposure or starvation the last eighteen months. And the work there must be kept up for another year.

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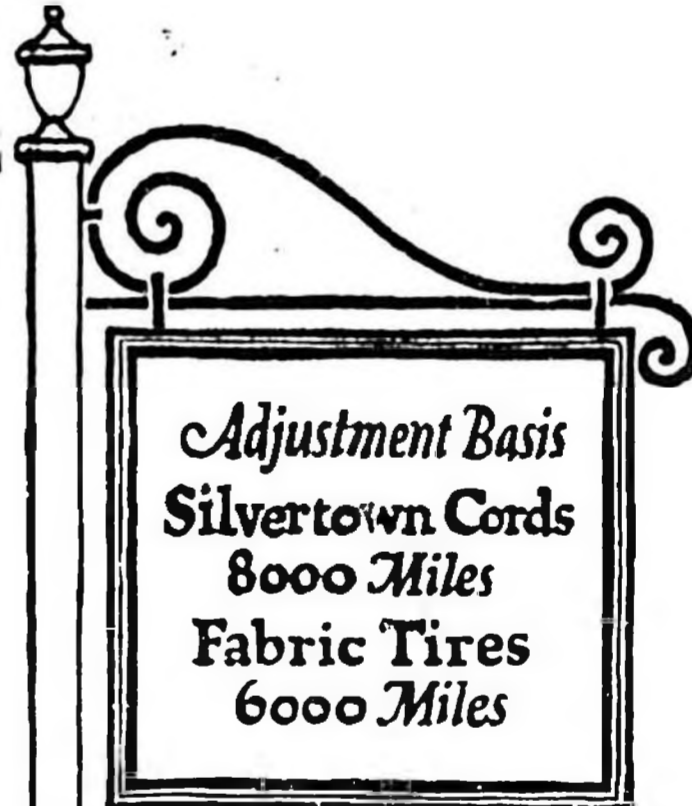
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
