







# Legislative Shakeups Seen Sessums May Purge Staff

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—House Republican Minority Leader Jim Tillman recently demanded the resignations of 14 staff members, but some legislative insiders say the shakeup may be nothing compared to one planned by Speaker Terrell Sessums.

Sources predict the Tampa Democrat will shortly replace Education Committee Chairman William Donagy, D-Dorchester Beach, whom he reportedly considers ineffective. Rep. Kenneth H. "Buddy" MacKay, D-Ocala, could get the assignment.

Other committee changes apparently are in the works — including possibly a new chairman for the Finance and Taxation Committee. Sessums reportedly is still peeved at the current chairman, veteran Rep. Ralph Turlington, D-Gainesville, for openly opposing a resort tax bill Sessums supported.

It is possible there will be lateral transfers on two or three committees," said Dr. Roger Nichols, Sessums' executive assistant. "More than that I can't tell you."

But one source close to Sessums noted, "Terrell is going over a list of those who voted against him. And committee chairmen who find themselves on the list could be in trouble."

One of the least successful lobbyists of the 1973 session was Hayden Burns, former governor of Florida and mayor of Jacksonville. Even though he even stood outside the House chamber door during the last days of the session trying to push his bill, Jacksonville lawmakers showed little enthusiasm for it. The bill, never introduced, would have given Burns a lifetime yearly pension equal to half his annual \$25,000 salary while he was governor.

The Florida Democratic Executive Committee reportedly is looking for an administrator, director and press liaison for the party.

# Nixon Squares Off Against Inflation Tonight

WASHINGTON (AP) — With an unwilling tentativeness set tonight, President Nixon has sought on a major program to fight the nation's worst outbreak of inflation in more than 20 years.

Details of the new plan, described variously by administration sources as a "major operation," a "firm but moderate approach," and "more than cosmetic this time," were hard to come by.

During several days of intensive debate with his economic advisers, Nixon has gone over almost every conceivable option to tackle the price surge that has swept the nation in the past few months.

Officials expected the President to move against recently posted price boosts in the steel and copper industries in an attempt to create more credibility for the price-control program.

# Imported South African Wines Pass Writer's Taste Test

I have never before written a column on wines other than those from the United States. There, again, I had never been to a wine tasting of imports where I thought the wines were of so interesting a nature — plus holding a reasonable price line — that I cared to carry one in print.

The tasting was of South African wines newly introduced into the American market and was held for the benefit of wine writers. There were 10 table wines offered; I tasted five.

It is said that Napoleon Bonaparte preferred the wines of South Africa to his own country's French wines. Could be; after all, South Africa's wine production dates back to 1659 and during Napoleon's heyday, France's Chateau Mouton-Rothschild wasn't yet in existence and Romanee-Conti was practically in the experimental stage.

Also, unlike European wines, in which there is a considerable variation in quality due mainly to climatic reasons, it is said by vintners that "every year is a vintage year" with South African wines because of the constant and constant warmer Mediterranean-like weather in the Cape's grape growing area.

The five wines I tasted were all fleur du cap. This French spelling for "Flower of the Cape" is in big lettering on the bottle and would be like a brand name. On the neck band label is printed the name of the wine in the bottle.

The two whites I had were: Fleur du Cap Emerald Stein; a light, naturally sweet wine, and Fleur du Cap Riesling, a clear, almost colorless dry wine from Riesling grapes. (I

# Nutrition Could Greatly Reduce Dental Problems

If you've ever had a toothache, your teeth have tried to tell you that they are more than just hardened hunks of mineral sticking in your mouth. They're depending on you to give them care that will keep them strong and healthy. According to statistics, we've failed to heed their plea. Over 98 per cent of Americans have cavities, and half of those over 55 have no teeth left at all.

Your teeth will have the best chance if you pay attention to both nutrition and oral hygiene. The cells which build and feed your teeth need not just calcium and phosphorus, but all of the life-sustaining vitamins, minerals and amino acids. Requirements for some nutrients may be higher at certain times. Investigation has also shown that requirements may vary with the individual. Some people need up to five times as much calcium as others. Vitamin D is needed to absorb calcium, and your requirements for both nutrients will increase with age.

Did you realize that if a deficiency occurs, your body "borrows back" part of the calcium content of your teeth and bones? During pregnancy and lactation, women often have a higher than normal calcium requirement. While human studies have never confirmed the threat to mother's teeth implied by the old adage, "A tooth for every child," rat studies are suggestive. The mineral content and hardness of the teeth was found to be greater for rats who had never had offspring than for those of comparable age who had one or two litters. Since the permanent teeth which must last a lifetime start to develop five months before birth, good prenatal nutrition is vital. Researchers have found that the oldest child in a family tends to have better teeth than younger brothers and sisters. There's also a tendency for a mother's nutritional status to decline with successive pregnancies. Could improved prenatal nutrition correct this situation? While heredity plays a part in susceptibility to decay, indications are that nutrition may help to overcome this.

The United States Department of Agriculture reports that improved nutrition could mean a potential FIFTY PER CENT REDUCTION in incidence, severity and cost of dental problems.

Some authorities say that healthy teeth can actually "walk off" a decaying area. Weston Price, D.D.S., cites the cases of three children whose pulp chambers (the part of the tooth next to the root) were exposed. Without changing any other factor, these youngsters were fed one highly nutritious meal a day, six days a week, for several months. By sealing off the threatened area with a secondary layer of dentine.

Good nutrition is also essential for the health of your gums. Vitamin C is especially important because it is needed to make the collagen which plays a key role in forming connective tissue. Gum inflammation can be brought on by dietary deficiencies, and healing has been retarded because of a lack of protein.

Finally, keep in mind that the teeth can be a focal point of infection which may spread from the mouth to other parts of the body without your even realizing it. Tracing such infection to its source may be difficult.

To decrease your chances of decay, fill your "oral cavity" with fresh, unprocessed foods and try to eat some coarse course foods each day to stimulate circulation in the teeth and gums. Chewing soft foods doesn't provide enough exercise.

Remember that the acid-producing bacteria in your mouth thrive on the refined sugar in sweets and many processed foods.

Brush after eating, if even with plain water, especially following sweets. If this is impossible, rinse vigorously. Use floss to get at the food between the teeth. Massage gums with the rubber tip on your toothbrush to stimulate circulation.

One final thought. What you chew on may play a big part in determining what you have to chew with.

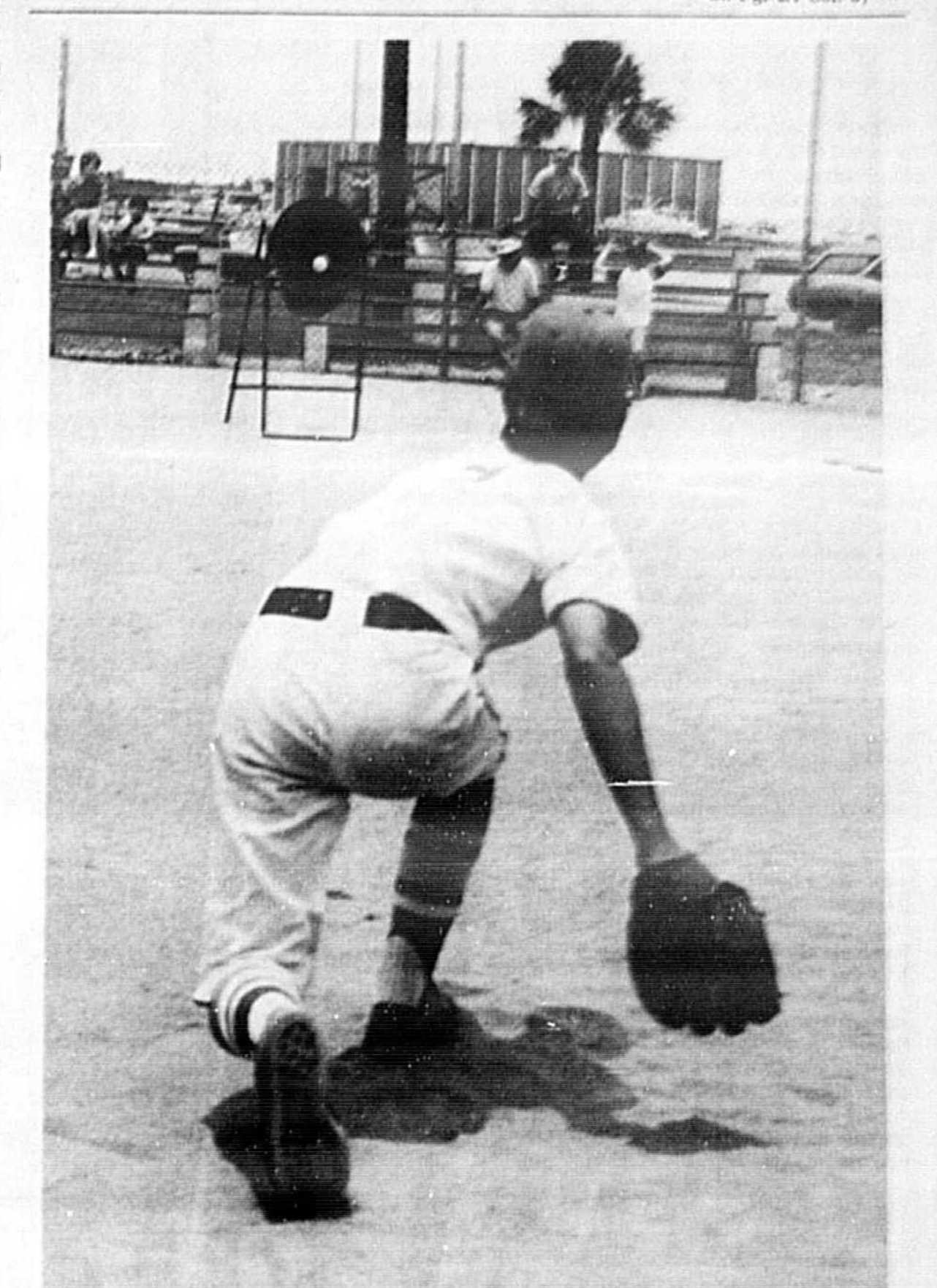
